The P965 MODBUS Data Access Panel (DAP) is a hand-held diagnostic terminal that connects to a Modicon controller. The major functions of the P965 are as follows:

- Uses either the MODBUS protocol (MDAP mode) when connected to a controller's MODBUS port or the ASCII protocol (DAP mode) when connected to a controller's ASCII/DAP port. In DAP mode, all functions and features of the P964 DAP are provided.
- Can be battery powered.
- Retains operating parameters upon power-down and restores them on power-up.

The P965 supports the following Modicon controller models: Micro 84 (with a J375 MODBUS interface), 484 (with a J475 MODBUS interface), 584, 884, and the 984 family.

## Terminology

The words 'connected,' 'detached,' and 'attached' have special meanings in this manual. Furthermore, connected can be used in two ways: physically connected or logically connected.

**Physically Connected** This means that the male connector of the P965 is coupled with the female port on the controller.

**Logically Connected** The P965 is 'logically connected,' 'successfully connected,' or, more simply, 'connected' when it is physically connected AND communication parameters in the P965 and the controller match. (The word 'logically' is generally omitted in this manual.) In DAP mode, connected and attached are equivalent.

**Attached and Detached** These two terms are significant only in MDAP mode. Attaching the P965 to the controller requires MODBUS login commands and allows the P965 to perform more privileged functions such as stop/start and modifying the contents of the controller.

Attaching and detaching are done via the ATT/DET function key. If the software label for this key shows DET, the P965 is not attached (logged in) to the connected port of the controller.

Pressing this key sends a login command to the controller. If the login is successful, the display shows ATT, indicating attached. Pressing the key again sends a logout command to the controller. The screen now shows DET, indicating that the P965 is detached from the controller.

### Attached

With the P965 attached, you can perform the following operations:

- Display the status of inputs, coils, and registers.
- Enable, disable, and force inputs and coils.
- Display controller memory contents.
- Modify the contents of holding registers.
- Monitor or alter MODBUS or ASCII port parameters.
- Monitor or alter MODBUS or ASCII port parameters while the controller is in dim awareness.
- Automatically determine the port parameters of the MODBUS port to which the P965 is connected using all possible port parameters or a list of parameters determined by the user.
- Set the P965 to detached mode, thereby allowing no changes to the controller.
- Display the status of the controller, including memory-protect, run/stop, attach/detach, and controller type.
- Set time value at which an inactive P965 automatically powers down, saving battery life.
- Configure and troubleshoot communication networks:
  - by monitoring and setting MODBUS and ASCII port parameters.
  - by using the P965 to test the controller communication ports.
- Start and stop the controller.
- (884 only) Allow the entry of passwords containing uppercase letters A-Z and numerals 0-9 for attaching to 884. See Chapter 4 for information about changing a password that is incompatible with the P965.

#### Detached

When detached, the P965 can perform 'read' type commands that do not reguire a login. These functions are:

- Display the status of inputs, coils and registers.
- Display the contents of controller memory.
- Display MODBUS communication parameters.
- Display 984 simple ASCII port parameters.
- Display controller status, including controller type, attached or detached, stopped or running, and memory protect on or off. (Memory protect not displayed for the 884.)
- Display communication parameters for P453 and J812/J892 ASCII ports configured within the 584/984 controllers.

#### Terminal

In addition, the P965 can act as a simple terminal. In this mode, it can display status or error messages from the controller. ASCII characters can also be sent to the controller via the P965 keypad. See P965 MODBUS Description and Installation, Power-Up Tests and Displays, Overview of Menus, and Appendix B for further information.

#### **P965 and Modicon Controllers**

Not all of the above functions are supported by the P965 for all controller types.

Table 1-1, Functions for Each Type of Controller, shows the types of controllers supported by the indicated P965 functions, where

- Y = fully supported
- (Y) = limited support. See notes for further explanation
  - = not applicable to indicated PC type
- N = not supported

#### Notes:

- 1. P965 supports passwords of uppercase A-Z and 0-9 characters only. If other characters are in the password, see Chapter 4 for information about entering a new password accessible by the P965.
- 2. Coils and discrete inputs cannot be written (forced) unless disabled.
- 3. Coils and registers cannot be written unless memory protect is off, and P965 is attached to the controller.
- 4. P965 cannot read password Table.
- 5. 884 and M84 can only modify port parameter settings for connected (i.e., to the P965) port. Cannot read MODBUS slave address.

#### **Unsupported Functions**

The following functionality is specifically not supported by the P965.

- 1. Configure a programmable controller.
- 2. Ladder logic programming.
- 3. Modify 884 MODBUS slave address.
- 4. Modify 884 port parameters for non-connected port.
- 5. Display 884, 484, or Micro84 memory protect as part of status display.

- 6. Enter 884 passwords other than uppercase A-Z and numeric 0-9.
- 7. Read 884 password table.
- 8. Display or modify reference types 2xxxx, 5xxxx, 6xxxx, and 9xxxx.
- 9. Modify Micro84 port parameters.
- 10. Display or modify port parameters for 484.
- 11. Modify 484 input/output discrete enable/disable status.
- 12. Communicate to programmable controller at 3600 or 7200 baud
- 13. Port parameter combination: ASCII, no parity, 1 stop bit.
- 14. Port parameter combination: RTU, parity, 2 stop bits.
- 15. Communicate to Micro84 at 1800 or 2000 baud.

#### 584/984 Login Failure

A login (attach) attempt to a 584 or a 984 may fail if the controller is already logged in on either the connected MODBUS port (the port to which the P965 is communicating) or a non-connected MODBUS port.

Normally, an attach attempt fails because another user on another controller port has logged in.

However, a failure to attach to the connected port can occur if the P965 were previously attached, powered off but not physically disconnected from the controller, and then the P965 is powered on and attempts to attach again.

This failure to attach to the connected port can also occur if the P965 is connected through a MODBUS Port Multiplexer. The multiplexer allows multiple MODBUS masters to connect to the same 584/984 port. If another master were logged in to the same port connecting to the P965, the P965 user is alerted that the port is already logged in and that a logout/login sequence can force an attach. However, the other user, going through a multiplexer to the same controller port, would be unknowingly logged out.

Login Failed Display

LOGIN.FAILED.... PORT.n.LOGGED.IN DO.LOGOUT,LOGIN? Y.....N

- F1 (Y) sends a logout and then a login command to the controller. This obtains the login privilege to the controller, if it had been rejected on the previous login attempt because the connected port was already logged in.
- F4 (N) abandons the login attempt. Forcing logout, then login, may unwittingly log out another user accessing the same port of the controller through a MODBUS port multiplexer device.

**Set Auto Power-Down** This feature conserves the batteries by shutting off the P965 whenever it is unused, i.e., no key is pressed, for the set time. The MDAP Auto Off Display, described in Chapter 7, allows you to set the Auto Off time.

**Connectors and Adaptors** The P965 cable terminates with a 25-pin male connector that directly connects to 984's with 25-pin MODBUS ports, 884's and Micro84's (J375). The P965 is delivered with a 25-to-9 pin adaptor cable that permits access to the 9-pin female connectors on 984-x8x MODBUS ports. For 484 and 584 controllers, a user-supplied adaptor cable is required. See Chapter 2 for full descriptions of the connectors and for wiring diagrams.

**884 Password** When attaching to an 884, a password may be required. The 884 accepts any printable characters for the password. This includes uppercase and lowercase letters, numerals, and certain special characters. The P965 can use only numerals or uppercase alphabetic characters. If the 884 password contains characters not supported by the P965, change the password via a P190 or and IBM PC. See Chapter 4.

The P965 has three main components:

- a 64-character liquid crystal display (LCD) screen.
- a keypad with alphanumeric and function keys.
- a cable terminated with a 25-pin D connector for connection to the ASCII/DAP port or MODBUS port of a controller .

Figure 2-1 shows a front view of the P965.

There are six groups of keys on the P965 keypad.

- On/Off keys
- Software label keys
- · Control keys
- Display select keys
- Alphanumeric keys
- Reference operation keys

Each of these groups is shown in Figure 2-2.



General key functions are given below. The specific functions of some keys vary depending on the screen display. Also, not all keys are active for each display.

#### **Software Label Keys**

**On,Off** ON turns power on from the internal battery. OFF turns internal battery power off. If power is provided by the port to which the P965 is connected, the ON and OFF keys have no effect.

When the P965 is connected to an ASCII/DAP port or to a J375 (Micro84 MODBUS interface), power is supplied by that port. The P965 automatically utilizes power supplied by the controller. If not supplied, then battery power must be selected via the P965's ON key.

#### Figure 2-2 Keypad Groups



**F1, F2, F3, F4** Selects an option shown on the display screen. Pressing a key selects the option displayed directly above it.

#### Alphanumeric

**A-F, 0-9. and SHIFT** These keys are used to enter decimal or hexadecimal data. The SHIFT keys convert decimal keys 1 through 6 on the numeric keypad to hexadecimal A through F. Press the SHIFT key before pressing the key with the desired character. The shift action lasts for only one keystroke.

#### **Display Select Keys**

**REF** Selects the active line in a display of more than one reference by positioning a cursor in the leftmost display column. The cursor is initially positioned on the last line of the display and is moved up one line by the REF key. When the cursor reaches the top line, the REF key causes it to wrap to the last line. This key also returns to the overview display from the detail display.

**DETAIL** Displays the current line in the detail display format

**DEC/HEX** Toggles the data display between decimal and hexadecimal modes.

Upon power-up, the P965 defaults to the decimal mode. Once you select the hexadecimal mode, the P965 remains in this mode until powered off/on or until you select the decimal mode.

#### **Control Keys**

**NEW DATA** Allows entry of decimal or hexadecimal data from the alphanumeric keys.

**NEW REF** Clears the displayed reference number or detail display and allows the entry of a new reference number.

**GET PREV** Clears the displayed data and displays the previous reference or parameter.

**GET NEXT** Clears the displayed data and displays the next sequential reference or parameter.

**ENTER** Sends newly selected data (reference, parameter, or state) to the controller.

**CLEAR** Clears a partial decimal or hexadecimal numeric operator entry. Control remains at the menu level at which the change occurred. Valid only for entries requiring the REF or ENTER keys. Also used to clear error or information displays and to return to previous menu.

**EXIT** Returns to the preceding menu display.

#### **Reference Operation Keys**

**ENABLE/DISABLE** Requests that the controller enable or disable a coil or discrete input.

**FORCE ON** Requests that the controller force on a disabled coil or discrete input.

**FORCE OFF** Requests that the controller force off a disabled coil or discrete input.

- (LEFT ARROW),  $\rightarrow$  (RIGHT ARROW) Selects a specific bit within a detail display of a reference.

**SET/CLEAR** Requests that the controller set to 1 or clear to 0 a specific bit in a reference. This key is used in conjunction with the left and right arrows. Also used as a SHIFT key to enter numerics 0-9 when entering 884 passwords.

## **Installation for Controller Operations**

#### **Batteries**

**Installation** Two screws on the back of the P965 secure the cover of the battery compartment. Remove the screws and the cover. Insert the batteries according to the correct polarity. Replace the cover and the screws. The P965 holds six standard AA-size 1.5-volt alkaline NICAD batteries.

### Connectors

The mechanical connector on the P965 is a snap-lock 25-pin male connector on the end of a coiled cord. This connector mates with the female 25-pin MODBUS ports (or ASCII/DAP ports) on supported controllers. The snap lock on this connector can be removed and the screws reversed to convert to a screw-in type connector. This can be securely fastened to the screw-in 25-pin female MODBUS connector, such as in ports 2 and 3 of a 984B.

The 25-pin male connector permits attaching directly to the 984A, 984B, 984X, 884, and the Micro84. See Figure 2-4, which shows a typical connection between a P965 and a controller.

A short adapter is also provided that has a female 25-pin connector on one end and a standard 9-pin male connector on the opposite end to mate with 984-x8x controllers. This adaptor is attachable to the back of the P965 with hook-and-eye fabric .

With the 25-pin-to-9-pin adapter, the P965 can attach to any 984 controller with a 9-pin female MODBUS port.

#### **Special Adaptors**

**484/J475** The 484/J475 has a 30-pin MODBUS port. The user must supply an adaptor that has a 25-pin female DB-25 connector on one end to mate with the P965. On the other end, attach a 30-pin Buchanan connector. Figure 2-5 describes the wiring for this adaptor for the P965.



**584** The P965 can be connected to a 584 with either a Modicon W190 cable (which connects the 584 to a P190) and a user-supplied adaptor cable or a Modicon W192 cable (which connects the 584 to a modem) and a user-supplied adaptor cable.

**584/W190** The W190 cable has a 24-pin round military connector on one end that fits into either one of two MODBUS ports on the 584. On the other end is a male DB-25 connector. To this you must connect an adaptor cable that has a female DB-25 connector on each end. Figure 2-6 shows the wiring for this adaptor cable.

**584/W192** The W192 cable has a 24-pin round military connector on one end that fits into either one of two MODBUS ports on the 584. On the other end is a male DB-25 connector. To this you must connect an adaptor cable that has a female DB-25 connector on each end, or you can use a standard ribbon cable. Figure 2-7 shows the wiring for this adaptor cable.

The P965 can be used as a simple ASCII terminal as well as a controller data access panel. Its primary application as a terminal is to receive and display status or alarm messages from the controller.

In addition, when in terminal mode, and with the appropriate loopback connector, the P965 can be used in a "loopback" test mode to verify the proper functional operation of the unit.

## **Low Battery Message**

As battery power begins to drop, the P965 displays a screen message indicating a low battery. This screen appears for approximately two seconds, and then the previous display is restored. As soon as possible after this message appears, replace the batteries in the P965. Except for the interruption by the 'low battery' message, the unit continues to function normally until battery power is depleted, which is approximately 15 minutes after the message first appears.

## Chapter 3 Power-Up Tests and Displays

When the P965 is turned on, it performs internal power-up confidence tests. All confidence tests must be passed before further operations can be performed. A series of displays accompanies the tests, ending with an indication of success or failure.

#### **Power-Up Menu Diagram**

The following menus (Figure 3-1) appear for the power-up sequence, with error messages. The figure numbers for the displays/menus are given in the boxes.



The menus for DAP mode and MDAP mode are described in Chapter 4.

**Power On** When power is first turned on, the P965 runs through a series of self tests. While these self tests are being performed, you see arrays of characters on the LCD screen. After the P965 passes all tests successfully, the Power-Up Display (Figure 3-2) appears.

**Operating Modes** The P965 supports the operating modes of the DAP as well as the MODBUS DAP (MDAP), and can function in terminal mode. DAP mode requires connection to an ASCII/DAP port. MDAP mode requires connection to a MODBUS port. Upon power-up you may select the desired operating mode via the power-up display.

To function in terminal mode, the P965 must be connected to an ASCII/DAP controller port. In terminal mode the display shows all received printable ASCII characters as well as carriage return and line feed (95 character printing set plus execute CR and LF). Each P965 keypad key transmits a single printable ASCII code to the controller.

To exit terminal mode, the P965 must be powered down.

- F1 (DAP) DAP operating mode. Either the DAP Normal Connect Display appears, or an error display appears.
- F2 (MDAP) MDAP operating mode. Either the MDAP Normal Connect Display or the MDAP Connect Timeout Display appears.
- F3 (TER) invokes the terminal mode.

The EXIT key provides no function.

### **Error Message Displays**

If a failure occurs during power-up confidence tests, one of three error messages is displayed: RAM failure (Figure 3-3), ROM failure (Figure 3-4), or NVRAM failure (Figure 3-5).

This failure stops the unit function. Press the CLEAR key to retry the self test. If the retry fails, contact Modicon.

This failure stops unit function. Press the CLEAR key to retry the self test. If the retry fails, contact Modicon.

This display appears for several seconds if the NVRAM fails, and automatically clears itself, returning to the Power-Up display (Figure 3-2) with line 2 blanked (since the self test did not pass).

If the NVRAM fails, the P965 continues to function normally. However, changes to the P965's port parameters are not saved. Auto Search still automatically determines the port parameter values that are set by the controller, and successful communications are established. When convenient, return the unit to Modicon for NVRAM replacement.

The P965 Cold Boot Display, Figure 3-6, appears for several seconds and then automatically clears itself, returning to the Power-Up Display, Figure 3-2 with line 2 blanked (since the self test did not really pass). This display should occur only the first time a new unit is powered up with an uninitialized NVRAM.

This chapter presents an overview of the menus displayed on the P965 screen. The software label keys, F1 through F4, assume the function of the label displayed directly above them. If no label is shown, the key has no function. When a display is described in this guide, the active keys are listed. Menu flow diagrams for DAP normal connect (Figure 4-1) and MDAP normal connect (Figure 4-2) are given below.



In DAP mode the P965 can access controller data and memory, start or stop the controller, or modify communication port parameters, either ASCII or MODBUS. See Figure 4-3.



If you select DAP from the power-up display (Figure 3-2) and no error displays appear, the DAP Normal Connect Display, Figure 4-4, appears.

- F1 (RAP) invokes the RAP submenu. (See Chapter 5.)
- F2 (CMD) invokes the CMD submenu. (See Chapter 6.)
- F3 (COM) invokes the COM submenu. (See Chapter 7.)

If communication with the controller is unsuccessful when you select DAP mode, one of four displays appears with an error message. These displays are shown in figures 4-5, 4-6, 4-7, and 4-8.

### **DAP Mode Error Displays**

The DAP Connect Communication Timeout Failure Display, Figure 4-5, appears if the connect operation fails. The F2 key retries the connect operation.

During the connect attempt, if an invalid response is received, the P965 halts and presents the error display in Figure 4-6.

After the display in either Figure 4-4 or Figure 4-5 appears, pressing the F2 (RETRY) key causes the display to blank momentarily (about 500 msecs). Then the P965 attempts to communicate again. This cycle continues until a successful connection is established, or until the unit is powered down and powered up again.

The DAP Operation Communication Timeout Failure Display, Figure 4-7 allows you to retry or to cancel the function.

# **Selecting MDAP Mode**

In MDAP mode the P965 can access controller data and memory, start or stop the controller, modify port parameters, set communication parameters for the P965, invoke Auto Search, limit the Auto Search list, and set the Auto Off feature. See Figure 4-9.

- F2 (AUTO) invokes the Auto Search Menu Display. In Auto Search, MODBUS port parameters are varied until a correct set is found to communicate with the controller. This correct set becomes the powerup default set of parameters. See Figure 4-11.
- F3 (MSET) sets the MODBUS DAP port parameters. These then become the power-up default parameters.
- EXIT returns to the power-up display (Figure 3-1).

**MDAP Status Display** The MDAP status display describes the state of the controller. Figure 4-12 shows the MDAP status display and gives an example.

- F4 (ATT or DET) If ATT is displayed, the P965 is attached (i.e., logged in) to the controller. If DET is displayed, it is detached from the controller.
- EXIT returns to the MDAP Normal Connect Display.

Exceptions — Memory protect is not displayed for the 484, Micro84 or 884. Status display has line 2 blanked for these controllers.

ATTACH/DETACH is not displayed for the 484, since the 484 does not support MODBUS login commands.

# **Dim Awareness**

Dim awareness is a state whereby the controller reacts only to a limited set of MODBUS commands. A validly configured running controller can be put into dim awareness. (Master must log in and stop controller first.) After exiting dim awareness, the controller can be restarted, i.e., there is no corruption of the configuration or user logic by this process.

A controller in Safe84 condition typically needs to be configured. Exiting dim awareness puts out the Safe84 indicator LED on some controllers **but this does not bring a Safe84 to a state from which it can be run!** For the controller to be able to run, a valid configuration must be written to it, which is beyond the scope of the P965.

The Clear Dim Awareness Display, Figure 4-18, is entered from the MDAP Normal Connect Display after selecting either STATUS or FUNCTIONS.

# **Auto Search Function**

After power-up and selection of the MDAP operating mode, if a connect attempt has failed, you may select the Automatic Port Parameter Determination (Auto Search) function.

The P965 tries to establish communications using its existing set of MODBUS port parameter values. If these do not work, then a retry is done with a different set of port parameters.

This is repeated automatically with a different set of parameters until communication is established. The set of port parameters that produces successful communication is then stored as the new default parameters in the P965.

The order of port parameter settings to be tried in order to establish communications is:

- 1. The current MODBUS port parameters saved in the P965.
- 2. The default P190 port parameter settings:
  - Slave address 1 to 32
  - 9600 baud
  - Even Parity
  - 1 Stop Bit
  - RTU Mode
- 3. Slave Address 1 to 32
  - 9600 baud
  - No Parity
  - 2 Stop Bits
  - ASCII Mode
- 4. All other combinations of slave address, baud rate, parity, stop bits, and mode. The baud rate is set higher at first and all other parameters varied, and then the baud rate is set to the next lower rate and all other parameters varied, in order to expend the least amount of time in the search.

You can limit the scope of this retry activity via the LIMITED search function. Before invoking LIMITED search, select SETLIST to limit the range of values.

For example, although 247 MODBUS slave addresses are possible, they frequently range from 1 to 32. By selecting boundary values before the function is executed, the time required to successfully determine the MODBUS parameters can be greatly reduced.





To invoke the Auto Search function after an MDAP communications timeout error, select the Auto Search Menu, Figure 4-20.

- F1 (ALL) attempts to communicate with the controller by varying all possible port parameters.

- F4 (SETL) chooses a reduced set of MODBUS port parameters for communications with the controller. This key invokes the Set Slave Address Range for Search Display. This display allows you to select a reduced set of port parameters to attempt to communicate with the controller. See Figure 4-21.
- EXIT returns to the MDAP Connect Communications Timeout Display.

## **Set Slave Address Range for Search**

Pressing F4 (SETL) in the Auto Search Menu invokes the Set Slave Address Range for Search Display (Figure 4-21).

When shipped, the P965 has a minimum address of 1 and a maximum address of 10. After power-up, this screen displays the values last saved.

The Set Baud Rates for Search Display (Figure 4-22) allows you to set the next parameter, baud rate.

# **Setting MDAP MODBUS Port Parameters**

After you select MDAP operating mode, the P965 automatically attempts to communicate with the controller using current P965 MODBUS port parameters. If the P965 cannot communicate with the controller, the error message in Figure 4-11 appears.

Pressing RETRY (F1) has the P965 repeat its attempt to communicate with the controller. Pressing AUTO (F2) invokes the Auto Search function. This allows the P965 to try different combinations of communication parameters. Pressing MSET (F3) invokes a menu, MDAP MSET Slave Address Select (Figure 4-28), that allows you to set the P965 internal MODBUS parameters.

This allows you to change any/all of the other communication parameters. Whenever you change the MODBUS port parameters, whether by the Auto Search function or with this MSET function, the newly entered parameters become the new power-up default parameters.

## **884 Passwords**

When attaching to an 884 controller with the P965 and the controller is password protected, you must provide a password, using only uppercase A-Z letters or 0-9 numerals.

The level of access granted by the controller for that password is displayed by the P965.

From the MDAP Status or Functions displays, the 884 Enter Password Prompt Display (Figure 4-33) appears.

To gain access to the RAP menu, press F1 (RAP) in the DAP Normal Connect Display or press F1 (RAP) in the MDAP Functions Menu. This invokes the RAP menu, shown in Figure 4-14.

These symbols are used in the displays in this chapter:

- \* -- represents current cursor position.
- 6xxxx represents values between 0 and 65,535.
- 9xxx represents values between 0 and 9999.
- Fxxx represents hexadecimal values.

# **Overview Display**

When you press F1 (REF) on the RAP menu, the overview prompt display appears, which is shown in Figure 5-1.

- Discrete Inputs State (on or off, enabled or disabled) (1XXXX)
- Input Registers Value (0 to 9999 decimal, or overflow) (3XXXX)
- Output Registers Value (0 to 9999 decimal, or overflow) (4XXXX)
- ► NOTE 484 controllers have four-digit references, e.g., 0xxx, 1xxx, etc.

The valid keys for this display are the following:

- 0-9 used to enter the reference number.
- CLEAR clears the reference number. Allows entry of another number.

- ENTER accepts the value and invokes the overview display.
- EXIT returns to the RAP menu.

### **Some Typical Overview Displays**

Pressing ENTER in the overview prompt display invokes the overview display. A typical overview display (Figure 5-2) may use all four lines on the screen.

The right arrow, which appears in the left most column, indicates the 'active' line. You may alter only the active line. If you select a detail display, it shows the active line.

The overview display can present inputs, coils, input registers, and holding registers. Data values are always displayed as decimal values between 0 and 9999. Values outside the range of 0 to 9999 are displayed as the literal "OVFL." For 484's, values outside the range of 0 to 999 are displayed as "OVFL."

A typical overview display for either a discrete input or output, invoked via the overview display prompt, is shown in Figure 5-3.

D in Figure 5-3 can be either 0 or 1.

- ENABLE/DISABLE writes an enable or disable change to the controller.
- FORCE ON attempts to force a disabled discrete on within the controller.
- FORCE OFF attempts to force a disabled discrete off within the controller.
- GET PREV displays the previous reference.
- GET NEXT displays the next reference.

- REF moves the line selector up one line or wraps to the bottom line.
- NEW REF clears current line. Allows entry of a new reference.
- EXIT returns to the RAP menu.

Figure 5-4 shows a typical overview display for an input register, invoked via the overview display prompt.

- NEW DATA displays the Holding Register Data Entry Prompt (Figure 5-6).
- GET PREV displays the previous reference.
- GET NEXT displays the next reference.
- DETAIL displays the current line in detail display format.
- NEW REF clears current line. Allows entry of a new reference.
- REF moves the line selector up one line or wraps to the bottom line.
- EXIT -- returns to the RAP menu.

**Holding Register Data Entry Prompt Display** You may use this display (Figure 5-6) to enter new data into a holding register. You can call up this display by pressing the NEW DATA key in the Holding Register Display.

# **Detail Display**

To access the detail display, press F2 (DTL) in the RAP menu. This invokes the Detail Prompt Display, which is described below.

**Detail Prompt Display** This display allows you to specify the register number for a detail display. Figure 5-7 shows this display.

## **Typical Detail Displays**

Detail displays can be entered via the detail display prompt or from an overview display by pressing the DTL key.

The up arrow indicates which bit of the binary value is modified when the SET/CLEAR key is pressed. The number of this bit is shown following the bit indicator on the display. The bits are numbered from 1 to 16 with 1 as the left most bit and 16, the right most bit. If an attempt is made to position the up arrow past the end positions of the display, the arrow wraps horizontally to the other end.

# Chapter 6 Command (CMD) Operations

- Command (CMD) Access
- Starting a Controller
- Stopping a Controller

To gain access to the CMD menu, go to the DAP normal connect menu or the MDAP functions menu and press F2 (CMD). The EXIT key is used to return to the main menu from the command menu, or to get to the command menu from a lower level.

The display presented depends upon the status of the controller (running or stopped) and the setting of the memory-protect key (on or off).

# **Starting a Controller**

To start the controller, select F2 (CMD) from either the DAP main menu or the MDAP function menu. This invokes the CMD Menu Display, which is shown in Figure 6-1.

TTT — The controller type, e.g., 984.

SSSSSS — Running or stopped. The status line indicates whether the controller is RUNNING or STOPPED.

MMM — Off or on. The third line indicates if the memory-protect function is on or off. If memory-protect is on, the controller cannot be started or stopped or have its contents modified.

CCCCC — Start or stop command. (Not displayed if memory-protect is on.)

- F1 starts or stops the controller.
- EXIT returns to the DAP main menu or the MDAP functions menu.
The start request invokes a display (Figure 6-2) that requires a confirmation of the request.

- F2 (CONF) issues the start command to the controller.
- F4 (CNCL) cancels and returns to the CMD menu.

## **Stopping a Controller**

To stop the controller, select F2 (CMD) from either the DAP main menu or the MDAP function menu. This invokes the CMD menu display, which is shown in Figure 6-1.

The stop request invokes the display (Figure 6-3) that requires a confirmation of the request.

- F2 (CONF) issues the stop command to the controller.

In controllers that have both an ASCII/DAP port and MODBUS ports, the P965 may connect to either type port to read or set communications parameters. The P965 can read these parameters while connected, but it must be attached to set communication parameters if connected to a MODBUS port.

The P965 may change port parameters for MODBUS ports or ASCII ports when connected to either the ASCII/DAP port or a MODBUS port.

#### **DAP or MDAP Mode**

You may choose either DAP mode if connected to an ASCII/DAP port or MDAP (MODBUS) mode if connected to a MODBUS port after power-up. For the RAP and the CMD functions, the choices are equivalent. However, two significant differences exist when selecting communications (COM) functions. One difference is single entry or batch entry of parameter changes; the other difference involves the Auto Search function.

**Single Entry or Batch Entry** In DAP mode, each parameter change is written immediately to the controller. In MDAP mode, each parameter change is stored temporarily in the P965. The entire set of new parameters is written to the controller in one step and the controller then performs a series of validity checks. This takes approximately the same amount of time to perform as it takes to start the controller. In MDAP mode, the new parameters written to the controller for the connected port do not take effect until the controller is restarted. In DAP mode, and for non-connected ports in MDAP mode, the changes take effect immediately.

**P965 Auto Search** In the MDAP mode only, you have access to the Auto Search feature. This allows you to automatically connect by varying P965 communication parameters until they match those of the connected port. This can involve varying all parameters or defining a limited list within which the search is conducted. The Auto Search function is described in Chapter 4.

#### **Default Communication Parameters**

Upon power-up, the P965 automatically retrieves the communication parameters that are saved from the previous P965 session.

The ASCII/DAP port can be viewed as two ports exiting the controller through a single connector. The P965, operating in DAP mode, communicates always at the fixed parameters shown in Table 3-1.

| Table 7-1                                    | Parameter | <b>Default Value</b> |  |

The ASCII parameters are for ASCII devices (e.g., CRT's) connected to the ASCII/DAP port. These devices operate at variable port parameters, and thus the P965 has the capability of varying these simple ASCII parameters. Changing the ASCII port parameters does not change the ability of the P965 to communicate in DAP mode, since the controller's "DAP" port parameters remain fixed.

Initially, the default communication parameters in MDAP mode connected to a MODBUS port are (see Table 3-2):

These are the same as the P190 default parameters. This default setting changes whenever you modify them through the MSET option, whenever a new set of port parameters is saved by the P965, or whenever they change as a result of the Auto Search function.

The P965 saves a new set of port parameters in its NVRAM whenever successful communication is established to a controller at port parameters different from what had been previously saved in the P965.

Upon power-up, the P965 attempts to connect using the parameter values saved from the last session. If this fails, the above P190 default parameters are used, with the slave address varying from 1 to 32. If this fails, the P965 tries to connect in ASCII mode, 9600 baud, no parity, two stop bits, addresses 1 to 32. If these parameters fail to produce a normal connect, the connect failure display appears. Then you must either use the Auto Search option to establish communications or set the correct port parameters via the MSET option.

In all instances, the communication parameters in effect at each power-down become the default parameters at the next power-up.

#### Unsupported Communications Parameter Combinations

The P965 does not support the following port parameter combinations:

- RTU mode, (eight data bits), parity, two stop bits
- ASCII mode, (seven data bits), one stop bit, no parity

All other port parameter combinations are supported unless noted below.

**984-380: Two Stop Bits** The 984-380 requires two stop bits in ASCII mode, even parity.

**3600 and 7200 Baud** The P965 does not communicate at 3600 or 7200 baud. These two baud rates are not included in the Auto Search, Set-List, or MSET functions.

The P965 can read baud rates of 3600 or 7200 on MODBUS ports other than the connected port. It can change the baud rate on a NON-connected port to 3600 or 7200. However, it cannot change the baud rate to 3600 or 7200 on a connected port.

Micro84 Port Parameters These can be displayed, but not modified.

484 Port Parameters These can neither be displayed nor modified.

**884 Port Parameters** You may modify the parameters only of the port to which you are connected.

Figure 7-1 shows the menu path that allows you to set communication parameters in the DAP mode for both ASCII/DAP and MODBUS ports.

# Setting Communication Parameters in DAP Mode

If, after power-up, you select DAP mode and then go to the communications function, the DAP Communications Menu (Figure 7-2) appears.

To gain access to the COM menu from the DAP Normal Connect Menu, press F3 (COM). This invokes the DAP Communication Menu Display (Figure 7-2).

- F1 (MP1) sets communication parameters for MODBUS port 1.
- F2 (MP2) sets communication parameters for MODBUS port 2.
- F3 (MP3) sets communication parameters for MODBUS port 3.

Pressing F1, F2, or F3 takes you to the MODBUS Port Address Selection Display.

The procedure for setting port parameters is identical for all three MODBUS ports.

- F4 (AP1) sets communication parameters for the ASCII port. This takes you to the DAP ASCII Port Baud Rate Selection Display.
- EXIT returns to the DAP Communications Menu.

#### **DAP Mode MODBUS Port Display**

Press F1, F2, or F3 on the DAP Communication Menu to display the MODBUS port parameters. This invokes the MODBUS Port Address Selection Display (Figure 7-3).

After you press GET NEXT on the port address selection display, the MODBUS Baud Rate Selection Display appears (Figure 7-4).

► NOTE Baud rates of 3600 and 7200 are not supported by the P965. This means the P965 cannot communicate at these rates, but it can change the baud rate of any port (except the one to which it is connected) to these rates. In MDAP mode, port parameter changes to a connected port do not take effect until the controller is started.

- F1 (LOWER) selects next lower baud rate.
- F4 (HIGHER) selects next higher baud rate.
- ENTER writes new baud rate to MODBUS port.
- GET NEXT goes to next parameter, parity.
- EXIT returns to DAP Communications menu.

After you press GET NEXT on the baud rate selection display, the MODBUS Parity Selection Display (Figure 7-5) appears.

After you press GET NEXT on the parity selection display, the MODBUS Stop Bit Selection Display appears (Figure 7-6).

- EXIT returns to DAP Communications Menu.

After you press GET NEXT on the stop bit selection display, the MODBUS Mode Selection Display appears (Figure 7-7).

- EXIT returns to DAP Communications Menu.

After you press GET NEXT on the mode selection display, the MODBUS Delay Time Selection Display appears (Figure 7-8).

- CLEAR erases entered data. Allows entry of new data.
- ENTER --- writes new delay time to MODBUS port.
- GET NEXT goes to MODBUS port address display.
- EXIT returns to DAP Communications Menu.

#### **DAP Mode ASCII Port Definition**

The procedure for setting ASCII port parameters is similar to that for the MODBUS ports.

Press F4 on the DAP Communications Menu to begin setting up the ASCII port parameters. This invokes the ASCII Port Baud Rate Selection Display (Figure 7-9).

After you press GET NEXT in the ASCII Baud Rate Display, the ASCII Parity Selection Display (Figure 7-10) appears.

- F3 (NONE) disables parity.
- ENTER writes new parity to ASCII port.
- GET NEXT goes to next parameter, data bits.
- EXIT returns to DAP Communications Menu.

After you press GET NEXT in the ASCII Parity Select Display, the ASCII Data Bit Selection Display appears (Figure 7-11).

You have now reviewed all of the ASCII port parameters in the DAP mode.

After power-up, you can select MDAP mode, which invokes the MDAP Normal Connect Display. This allows you to go to the Functions Menu and select the MDAP Communications Menu.

From the MDAP Communications Menu you can set the Auto Off function or set parameters for either MODBUS or ASCII/DAP ports. Furthermore, MDAP mode offers you the Auto Search function.

The MDAP mode brings you first to the Set Port Parameters Menu and to the Auto Off Menu. The Set Port Parameters Menu allows you to choose one of the MODBUS ports or the ASCII/DAP port on your controller. Alternatively, you may go to the Auto Off Menu to select the automatic power-off time setting.

Figure 7-13 shows the MDAP mode communications menu path that takes you to the point where you choose between MODBUS and ASCII/DAP port communication parameters.





Figure 7-14, MDAP Communications Menu Display, is entered from the MDAP Functions Display. This menu allows you to choose between setting the Auto Off function or continuing to the communications menus.

In MDAP mode, you may separately review simple ASCII port parameters or remote ASCII port parameters.

The menu path for setting ASCII/DAP port parameters begins with the Select Simple/Remote ASCII Display, then leads through either a series of simple ASCII/DAP port communication parameters or a series of remote ASCII/DAP port communication parameters.

In either case, the parameters are stored in the P965. With the Save Port Parameters Display, you write them to the controller. Figure 7-25, MDAP ASCII Port Menu Path describes the setting of simple and remote ASCII port parameters.

#### **MODBUS Plus Networks**

Some 984 programmable controllers support MODBUS Plus networking. Those controllers have a toggle switch associated with the MODBUS port that either supports MODBUS or MODBUS Plus. If that toggle switch is in the "DIP" position, the port does not act as a standard MODBUS port. Instead, the port is a window into the MODBUS Plus network. When the P965 attempts to connect to that port, it is actually interrogating controllers along the MODBUS Plus network. When this occurs, if the P965 fails to communicate because its saved port parameters do not match those of the first controller along the network, the MODBUS Plus network returns a MODBUS Error 2, Illegal Address, not a Communications Timeout Error. Retries produce the same error.

To connect to a controller along the MODBUS Plus network, power up the P965 without physically connecting to the controller. After trying the default port parameters, the P965 times out with a Communications Timeout Error Display.

Now select the MSET option, and set the P965's port parameters to the parameters needed to communicate with the controller along the MODBUS Plus network. Physically connect the P965 to the 984 controller port, and select RETRY on the P965 screen. This should now logically connect you to the selected controller along the MODBUS Plus network.

This chapter presents P965 error displays in alphanumeric order for easy reference. Descriptions and suggested actions are also given.

Several types of error displays appear in the P965. Some are due to errors in P965 operation, and some are due to controller faults.

Upon receiving an error indication, control is returned to the menu level appropriate for modifying the parameters used to invoke the command. The parameters can be changed, and a retry executed. Generally, this results in returning up one menu level from the current operation.

Invalid operator entries generally result in an error display. On some invalid operator entries, the invalid key or keys have no effect, but no error screen is displayed. Upon clearing the error display, a screen appears requesting operator input.

When an error display appears, locate the display in this section. If retries or other suggested actions fail, contact your local Modicon representative or the Modicon Field Support Center in North Andover, Massachusetts. You can contact the Modicon Field Support Center by telephone. The numbers are given in the front of this guide.

### **Types of Errors**

Error Messages are organized in groups. One group pertains to DAP mode. These are listed in Table 8-6. Another group pertains to general MODBUS errors. Other groups of error messages are organized by controller type: 484, 884/M84, and 584/984.

In the error displays shown below, TTT is the controller type.

#### **Unexpected Errors**

UNEXPECTED ERROR is a category of error that should not occur. For example, a legitimate 984 error may result from an operation modifying user logic. Since the P965 does not modify user logic, this error should never occur. If this error, or other errors not supported by the P965, is returned to the P965 from the controller, the Unexpected Error Display appears. The general format of this display is shown in Figure 8-1.

nn specifies the error number.

If an unexpected error occurs, perform the following steps:

- Retry the operation. If this is not successful:
- Power the unit off and on, and retry again.
- In any case, inform Modicon of the error.

If the P965 receives what it believes to be an error message from a controller but cannot classify the message as to USER, SYSTEM, MODBUS, or LINK error, the Unknown Error Display (Figure 8-2) appears.
