

- 1 You have performed the steps in Turning Off Your Computer and Before Working Inside Your Computer.
- 1 You have read the safety information that shipped with your computer.
- 1 A component can be replaced or-if purchased separately-installed by performing the removal procedure in reverse order.

- 1 Plastic scribe
- 1 Hex nut driver
- 1 BIOS upgrade CD or the BIOS executable update program available on the Dell Support website at support.dell.com

Turning Off Your Computer

🛆 CAUTION: To avoid losing data, save and close all open files and exit all open programs before you turn off your computer.

- 1. Save and close all open files and exit all open programs.
- 2. In Microsoft[®] Windows Vista[®], click Start 😗 , click the arrow 🌇 , and then click Shut Down.

The computer turns off after the operating system shutdown process finishes.

3. Ensure that the computer is turned off. If your computer did not automatically turn off when you shut down the operating system, press and hold the power button until the computer turns off.

Before Working Inside Your Computer

Flashing the BIOS

If a BIOS upgrade CD is provided with the new processor or new system board, flash the BIOS from the CD. If you do not have a BIOS upgrade CD, flash the BIOS from the hard drive.

Flashing the BIOS From a CD

1. Ensure that the AC adapter is plugged in and that the main battery is installed properly.

MOTE: If you use a BIOS upgrade CD to flash the BIOS, set up the computer to boot from a CD before inserting the CD.

2. Insert the BIOS upgrade CD, and restart the computer.

Follow the instructions that appear on the screen. The computer continues to boot and updates the new BIOS. When the flash update is complete, the computer will automatically reboot.

- 3. Press <F2> during POST to enter the system setup program.
- 4. Press < Esc> and then select Load Setup Defaults and select Yes in the pop-up window to reset the computer defaults.
- 5. Remove the BIOS upgrade CD from the drive.
- 6. Select Exit Saving Changes and select Yes in the pop-up window to save configuration changes.
- 7. The BIOS upgrade finishes and the computer restarts automatically.

Flashing the BIOS From the Hard Drive

- 1. Ensure that the AC adapter is plugged in, the main battery is properly installed, and a network cable is attached.
- 2. Turn on the computer.
- 3. Go to the Dell Support website at support.dell.com.
- 4. Click Drivers & Downloads→ Select Model.
- 5. Select the type of product in the Select Your Product Family list.
- 6. Select the product brand in the Select Your Product Line list.
- 7. Select the product model number in the Select Your Product Model list.

MOTE: If you have selected a different model and want to start over again, click Start Over on the top right of the menu.

- 8. Click Confirm.
- 9. A list of results appear on the screen. Click BIOS.
- 10. Click Download Now to download the latest BIOS file.
- 11. The File Download window appears.
- 12. Click Save to save the file on your desktop. The file downloads to your desktop.
- 13. Click Close if the Download Complete window appears.

The file appears on your desktop and is titled the same as the downloaded BIOS update file.

14. Double-click the file on the desktop and follow the procedures on the screen.



- 5. Replace the battery (see Replacing the Battery) or connect the AC adapter to your computer and an electrical outlet.
- 6. Turn on the computer.

- CAUTION: To prevent intermittent contact between the ZIF-socket cam screw and the processor when removing or replacing the processor, press to apply slight pressure to the center of the processor while turning the cam screw.
- 4. To loosen the ZIF socket, use a small, flat-blade screwdriver and rotate the ZIF-socket cam screw counterclockwise until it comes to the cam stop.

The ZIF-socket cam screw secures the processor to the system board. Take note of the arrow on the ZIF-socket cam screw.

5. Use a processor extraction tool to remove the processor.

Replacing the Processor

- Δ CAUTION: Ensure that the cam lock is in the fully open position before seating the processor. Seating the processor properly in the ZIF socket does not require force.
- △ CAUTION: A processor that is not properly seated can result in an intermittent connection or permanent damage to the processor and ZIF socket.
- 1. Follow the instructions in Before You Begin.
- 2. Align the pin-1 corner of the processor so that it points to the triangle on the ZIF socket, and insert the processor into the ZIF socket.

When the processor is correctly seated, all four corners are aligned at the same height. If one or more corners of the processor are higher than the others, the processor is not seated correctly.

CAUTION: To prevent intermittent contact between the ZIF-socket cam screw and the processor when removing or replacing the processor, press to apply slight pressure to the center of the processor while turning the cam screw.

- 3. Tighten the ZIF socket by turning the cam screw clockwise to secure the processor to the system board.
- 4. Peel the backing off the thermal cooling pad and adhere the pad to the portion of the processor heat sink that covers the processor.
- 5. Replace the processor heat sink assembly (see Replacing the Processor Heat Sink Assembly).
- 6. Replace the system board (see Replacing the System Board).
- 7. Update the BIOS using a flash BIOS-update program CD (see <u>Flashing the BIOS</u>).

Replacing the Processor Heat Sink Assembly

- MARNING: Before working inside your computer, follow the safety instructions that shipped with your computer.
- CAUTION: To prevent static damage to components inside your computer, discharge static electricity from your body before you touch any of your computer's electronic components. You can do so by touching an unpainted metal surface.
- NOTE: The original thermal pad can be reused if the original processor and heat sink are reinstalled together. If either the processor or heat sink is replaced, use the thermal pad provided in the kit to ensure that thermal conductivity is achieved.
- MOTE: This procedure assumes that you have already removed the processor heat sink and are ready to replace it.
- 1. Follow the instructions in Before You Begin.

- 2. Peel the backing off the thermal cooling pad and adhere the pad to the portion of the heat sink that covers the processor.
- 3. Place the processor heat sink assembly on the system board.
- 4. Tighten the seven captive spring screws that secure the processor heat sink assembly to the system board.
- 5. Replace the system board (see <u>Replacing the System Board</u>).







- 2. Turn on the computer.
- 3. Press <F2> during POST to enter the system setup program.
- 4. Navigate to the security tab and enter the service tag in the Set Service Tag field.


