WARNING

CONTROLLER SETTINGS FOR RANGER II,

Set-up of the Electronic Control Unit is to be performed ONLY by a qualified technician. Factory setting of the controller MUST be used for daily activities. Reprogramming the controller reduces the stability/controllability of the wheelchair. Other program settings could cause the wheelchair to tip over resulting in serious injury to the user and/or damage to the surrounding property.

REPAIR OR SERVICE INFORMATION

Set-up of the Electronic Control Unit is to be performed ONLY by a qualified technician. The final tuning adjustments of the controller may affect other activities of the wheelchair. Damage to the equipment could occur under these circumstances. If any individual other than an a qualified technician performs any work on these units, the warranty is void.

OPERATING INFORMATION

GENERAL WARNINGS

Performance adjustments should only be made by professionals of the healthcare field or persons fully conversant with this process and the driver's capabilities. Incorrect settings could cause injury to the driver, bystanders, damage to the chair and to surrounding property.

After the wheelchair has been set-up, check to make sure that the wheelchair performs to the specifications entered during the set-up procedure. If the wheelchair does NOT perform to specifications, turn the wheelchair OFF immediately and reenter set-up specifications. Repeat this procedure until the wheelchair performs to specifications.

DO NOT shift your weight or sitting position toward the direction you are reaching as the wheelchair may tip over.

DO NOT engage or disengage the motor locks/clutches until the power is in the OFF position.

DO NOT operate on roads, streets or highways.

DO NOT climb, go up or down ramps or traverse slopes greater than 9°.

DO NOT attempt to move up or down an incline with a water, ice or oil film.

DO NOT attempt to drive over curbs or obstacles. Doing so may cause your wheelchair to turn over and cause bodily harm or damage to the chair.

DO NOT use parts, accessories, or adapters other than those authorized by Invacare.

DO NOT leave the power button ON when entering or exiting your wheelchair.

DO NOT stand on the frame of the wheelchair.

DO NOT use the footplates as a platform. When getting in or out of the wheelchair, make sure that the footplates are in the upward position or swing footrests towards the outside of the chair.

ALWAYS wear your seat positioning strap.

TIRE PRESSURE

DO NOT use your wheelchair unless it has the proper tire pressure (P.S.I.). DO NOT overinflate the tires. Failure to follow these suggestions may cause the tire to explode and cause bodily harm. The recommended tire pressure is listed on the side wall of the tire.

GENERAL WARNINGS (CONTINUED)

ELECTRICAL

EXTREME care should be exercised when using oxygen in close proximity to electric circuits. Contact your oxygen supplier for instruction in the use of oxygen.

BATTERIES

The warranty and performance specifications contained in this manual are based on the use of deep cycle gel cell or sealed lead acid batteries. Invacare strongly recommends their use as the power source for this unit.

The use of rubber glovesand safety glasses is recommended when working with batteries.

Carefully read battery/battery charger information prior to installing, servicing or operating your wheelchair.

GROUNDING INSTRUCTIONS:

DO NOT, under any circumstances, cut or remove the round grounding prong from any plug used with or for Invacare products. Some devices are equipped with three-prong (grounding) plugs for protection against possible shock hazards. Where a two-prong wall receptacle is encountered, it is the personal responsibility and obligation of the customer to contact a qualified electrician and have the two-prong receptacle replaced with a properly grounded three-prong wall receptacle in accordance with the National Electrical Code. If you must use an extension cord, use ONLY a three-wire extension cord having the same or higher electrical rating as the device being connected. In addition, Invacare has placed RED/ORANGE WARNING TAGS on some equipment. DO NOT remove these tags.

RAIN TEST

INVACARE has tested it's power wheelchairs in accordance with ISO 7176 Part 9 "Rain Test". This provides the end user or his/her assistant sufficient time to remove his/her power wheelchair from a rain storm and retain wheelchair operation.

DO NOT leave power wheelchair in a rain storm of any kind.

DO NOT use power wheelchair in a shower or leave it in a damp bathroom while taking a shower.

DO NOT leave power wheelchair in a damp area for any length of time.

Direct exposure to rain or dampness will cause the chair to malfunction electrically and mechanically; may cause the chair to prematurely rust.

Check to ensure that the battery covers are secured in place, joystick boot is NOT torn or cracked where water can enter and that all electrical connections are secure at all times.

DO NOT use the joystick if the boot is torn or cracked. If the joystick boot becomes torn or cracked, replace IMMEDIATELY.

WEIGHT TRAINING

Invacare DOES NOT recommend the use of its wheelchairs as a weight training apparatus. Invacare wheelchairs have NOT been designed or tested as a seat for any kind of weight training. If occupant uses said wheelchair as a weight training apparatus, INVACARE SHALL NOT BE LIABLE FOR BODILY INJURY AND THE WARRANTY IS VOID.

WEIGHT LIMITATION

The Ranger II MWD models that have motors with clutches have a weight limitation of 250 lbs. The Ranger II MWD models that have motors with motor locks have a weight limitation of 300 lbs. The Ranger II MWD models that have the weight shift tilt seating system have a weight limitation of 250 lbs.

The Ranger II FWD models that have motors with clutches have a weight limitation of 250 lbs. EXCEPT RANGER II $_{\rm IR}$ which has a weight limitation of 200 lbs. The Ranger II FWD models that have motors with motor locks have a weight limitation of 300 lbs. Refer to PERCENTAGE OF WEIGHT DISTRIBUTION in this procedure of the manual.

SAFETY/HANDLING OF WHEELCHAIRS

"Safety and Handling" of the wheelchair requires the close attention of the wheelchair user as well as the assistant. This manual points out the most common procedures and techniques involved in the safe operation and maintenance of the wheelchair. It is important to practice and master these safe techniques until you are comfortable in maneuvering around the frequently encountered architectural barriers.

Use this information only as a "basic" guide. The techniques that are discussed on the following pages have been used successfully by many.

Individual wheelchair users often develop skills to deal with daily living activities that may differ from those described in this manual. Invacare recognizes and encourages each individual to try what works best for him/her in overcoming architectural obstacles that they may encounter, however, ALL WARNINGS and CAUTIONS given in this manual MUST be followed. Techniques in this manual are a starting point for the new wheelchair user and assistant with "safety" as the most important consideration for all.

Stability and Balance

WARNING

ALWAYS wear your seat positioning strap.

To assure stability and proper operation of your wheelchair, you must at all times maintain proper balance. Your wheelchair has been designed to remain upright and stable during normal daily activities as long as you do not move beyond the center of gravity. DO NOT lean forward out of the wheelchair any further than the length of the armrests.

Coping With Everyday Obstacles

Coping with the irritation of everyday obstacles can be alleviated somewhat by learning how to manage your wheelchair. Keep in mind your center of gravity to maintain stability and balance.

A Note to Wheelchair Assistants

When assistance to the wheelchair user is required, remember to use good body mechanics. Keep your back straight and bend your knees whenever tilting wheelchair or traversing curbs, or other impediments.

Also, be aware of detachable parts such as arms or legrests. These must NEVER be used for hand-hold or lifting supports, as they may be inadvertently released, resulting in possible injury to the user and/or assistant(s).

When learning a new assistance technique, have an experienced assistant help you before attempting it alone.

Stairways

WARNING

DO NOT attempt to move an occupied power wheelchair between floors using a stairway. Use an elevator to move an occupied power wheelchair between floors. If moving a power wheelchair between floors by means of a stairway, the occupant MUST be removed and transported independently of the power wheelchair.

Extreme caution is advised when it is necessary to move an UNOCCUPIED power wheelchair up or down the stairs. Invacare recommends using two (2) assistants and making thorough preparations. Make sure to use ONLY secure, non-detachable parts for hand-hold supports.

DO NOT attempt to lift the wheelchair by any removable (detachable) parts. Lifting by means of any removable (detachable) parts of a wheelchair may result in injury to the user or damage to the wheelchair.

Follow this procedure for moving the wheelchair between floors when an elevator is NOT available:

WARNING

The weight of the wheelchair without the user and batteries is still between 83 and 142 lbs. Use proper lifting techniques (lift with your legs) to avoid injury.

- Remove the occupant from the wheelchair.
- Remove the battery boxes from the wheelchair. Refer to one (1) of the following:

FWD WHEELCHAIRS - INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES in PROCEDURE 11 of this manual.

MWD WHEELCHAIRS - <u>INSTALLING/REMOVING</u> <u>BATTERY BOXES</u> in PROCEDURE 12 of this manual.

- Bend your knees and keep your back straight.
- Using non-removable (non-detachable) parts of the wheelchair, lift the wheelchair off of the ground and transfer the wheelchair up or down the stairs.
- The wheelchair should not be lowered until the last stair has been negotiated and the wheelchair has been carried away from the stairway.

ESCALATORS? SORRY!

DO NOT use an escalator to move a wheelchair between floors. Serious bodily injury may occur.



Transferring to and From Other Seats

WARNING

ALWAYS turn the wheelchair power OFF and engage the motor locks/clutches to prevent the wheels from moving BEFORE attempting to transfer in or out of the wheelchair. Also, make sure every precaution is taken to reduce the gap distance aligning both rear casters parallel with the object you are transferring onto.


CAUTION

When transferring, position yourself as far back as possible in the seat. This will prevent broken screws, damaged upholstery and the possibility of the wheelchair tipping forward.

NOTE: This activity may be performed independently provided you have adequate mobility and upper body strength.

- Position the wheelchair as close as possible along side the seat to which you are transferring, with the rear casters pointing away from it.
- 2. Engage motor locks/clutches. Refer to one (1) of the following.
 - A. WHEELCHAIRS WITH MOTORS THAT HAVE CLUTCHES ENGAGING/DISENGAGING MOTORS WITH CLUTCHES in PROCEDURE 8 of this manual.
 - B. WHEELCHAIRS WITH MOTORS THAT HAVE MOTOR LOCKS ENGAGING/DISENGAG-ING MOTORS WITH MOTOR LOCKS in PROCEDURE 8 of this manual.
- 3. Shift body weight into seat with transfer.

During independent transfer, little or no seat platform will be beneath you. Use a transfer board if at all possible.



Percentage of Weight Distribution

WARNING

DO NOT attempt to reach objects if you have to move forward in the seat or pick them up from the floor by reaching down between your knees.

Many activities require the wheelchair user to reach, bend and transfer in and out of the wheelchair. These movements will cause a change to normal balance, center of gravity, and weight distribution of the wheelchair. To determine and establish your particular safety limits, practice bending, reaching and transferring activities in several combinations in the presence of a qualified healthcare professional BEFORE attempting active use of the wheelchair.

Proper positioning is essential for your safety. When reaching, leaning, bending or bending forward, it is important to use the rear casters as a tool to maintain stability and balance.

RII MWD WHEELCHAIRS ONLY.

WARNING

NEVER reposition the motors. Repositioning the motors rearward WILL reduce the stability of the wheelchair. This procedure MUST be performed by an Invacare Dealer.

RII FWD MODEL WHEELCHAIRS ONLY (FIGURE 1).

WARNING

The overall performance of the wheelchair WILL be affected by the front wheel mounting position. The following charts show the mounting position of the motors for each seat width and depth depending on the factory setting or user's weight.

If the mounting position that corresponds to the user's weight is different than the factory setting, the motors MUST BE repositioned to maintain proper stability and controllability BEFORE using the wheelchair. Otherwise injury or damage can occur.

Periodically review the following charts to make sure the motor mounting position still corresponds to the user's weight to maintain the proper stability and controllability.

Repositioning the motors MUST be performed by an Invacare Dealer.

RANGER II_{JR} ONLY - NEVER reposition the motors. Repositioning the motors forward WILL reduce the controllability of the wheelchair. This procedure MUST be performed by an Invacare Dealer.

NOTE: If motors are repositioned, the front riggings may need to be repositioned. Refer to <u>ADJUSTING/REPLAC-ING TELESCOPING FRONT RIGGING SUPPORT</u> in PROCEDURE 3 of this manual.







MOUNTING POSITION






REAR MOTOR

Functional Reach From a Wheelchair

The approximate reach-limit values shown in the accompanying graphs were derived on the basis of a sample of 91 male and 36 female wheelchair users. Note the difference between the maximum and the comfortable reach limits, a subjective but important consideration in design.



Reaching, Leaning, Bending and Bending - Forward

Position the rear casters so that they are extended as far rearward as possible and engage motor locks/ clutches. DO NOT ATTEMPT TO REACH OBJECTS IF YOU HAVE TO MOVE FORWARD IN THE SEAT OR PICK THEM UP FROM THE FLOOR BY REACHING DOWN BETWEEN YOUR KNEES.





Reaching, Bending - Backward

WARNING

DO NOT lean over the top of the back upholstery. This will change your center of gravity and may cause you to tip over.



Position wheelchair as close as possible to the desired object. Point rear casters rearward to create the longest possible wheelbase. Reach back only as far as your arm will extend without changing your sitting position.

WARNING

CAUTION: IT IS VERY IMPORTANT THAT YOU READ THIS INFORMATION REGARDING THE POSSIBLE EFFECTS OF ELECTROMAGNETIC INTERFERENCE ON YOUR POWERED WHEELCHAIR.

Electromagnetic Interference (EMI) From Radio Wave sources

Powered wheelchairs and motorized scooters (in this text, both will be referred to as powered wheelchairs) may be susceptible to electromagnetic interference (EMI), which is interfering electromagnetic energy (EM) emitted from sources such as radio stations, TV stations, amateur radio (HAM) transmitters, two way radios, and cellular phones. The interference (from radio wave sources) can cause the powered wheelchair to release its brakes, move by itself, or move in unintended directions. It can also permanently damage the powered wheelchair's control system. The intensity of the interfering EM energy can be measured in volts per meter (V/m). Each powered wheelchair can resist EMI up to a certain intensity. This is called its "immunity level." The higher the immunity level, the greater the protection. At this time, current technology is capable of achieving at least a 20 V/m immunity level, which would provide useful protection from the more common sources of radiated EMI. This powered wheelchair model as shipped has an unknown immunity level.

There are a number of sources of relatively intense electromagnetic fields in the everyday environment. Some of these sources are obvious and easy to avoid. Others are not apparent and exposure is unavoidable. However, we believe that by following the warnings listed below, your risk to EMI will be minimized.

The sources of radiated EMI can be broadly classified into three types:

- Hand-held Portable transceivers (transmitters-receivers with the antenna mounted directly on the transmitting unit. Examples include: citizens band (CB) radios, "walkie talkie", security, fire and police transceivers, cellular telephones, and other personal communication devices. **NOTE: Some cellular telephones and similar devices transmit signals while they are ON, even when not being used;
- Medium-range mobile transceivers, such as those used in police cars, fire trucks, ambulances, and taxis. These usually have the antenna mounted on the outside of the vehicle; and
- 3) Long-range transmitters and transceivers, such as commercial broadcast transmitters (radio and TV broadcast antenna towers) and amateur (HAM) radios.

NOTE: Other types of hand-held devices, such as cordless phones, laptop computers, AM/FM radios, TV sets, CD players, cassette players, and small appliances, such as electric shavers and hair dryers, so far as we know, are not likely to cause EMI problems to your powered wheelchair.

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WARNING

Powered Wheelchair Electromagnetic Interference (EMI)

Because EM energy rapidly becomes more intense as one moves closer to the transmitting antenna (source), the EM fields from hand-held radio wave sources (transceivers) are of special concern. It is possible to unintentionally bring high levels of EM energy very close to the powered wheelchair's control system while using these devices. This can affect powered wheelchair movement and braking. Therefore, the warnings listed below are recommended to prevent possible interference with the control system of the powered wheelchair.

Electromagnetic interference (EMI) from sources such as radio and TV stations, amateur radio (HAM) transmitters, two-way radios, and cellular phones can affect powered wheelchairs and motorized scooters. Following the warnings listed below should reduce the chance of unintended brake release or powered wheelchair movement which could result in serious injury.


- Do not operate hand-held transceivers (transmitters receivers), such as citizens band (CB) radios, or turn ON personal communication devices, such as cellular phones, while the powered wheelchair is turned ON;
- 2) Be aware of nearby transmitters, such as radio or TV stations, and try to avoid coming close to them;
- 3) If unintended movement or brake release occurs, turn the powered wheelchair OFF as soon as it is safe;
- Be aware that adding accessories or components, or modifying the powered wheelchair, may make it more susceptible to EMI (Note: There is no easy way to evaluate their effect on the overall immunity of the powered wheelchair); and
- 5) Report all incidents of unintended movement or brake release to the powered wheelchair manufacturer, and note whether there is a source of EMI nearby.

Important Information


- 20 volts per meter (V/m) is a generally achievable and useful immunity level against EMI (as of May 1994) (the higher the level, the greater the protection);
- 2) The MCC MKIV controller for this application has an unknown immunity level.

Modification of any kind to the electronics of this wheelchair as manufactured by Invacare may adversely affect the RFI immunity levels.





CHECKING BATTERY CHARGE LEVEL

The following "Do's" and "Don'ts" are provided for your convenience and safety.

DON'T	DO
Don't perform any installation or maintenance without first reading this manual.	Read and understand this manual and any service information that accompanies a battery and charger before operating the wheelchair.
Don't perform installation or maintenance of batteries in an area that could be damaged by battery spills.	Move the wheelchair to a work area before checking the fluid level, adding distilled water, cleaning terminals, or opening battery box.

DON'T Recharge as frequently as possible to maintain a high charge level and extend

battery life.

Don't make it a habit to discharge batteries to the lowest level.

Don't use randomly chosen batteries/chargers.

Don't put new batteries into service before charging.

Don't tip or tilt batteries.

Don't use ordinary tap water.

Don't overfill cells.

Don't use uneven levels of distilled water in cells.

Don't tap on clamps or terminals with tools.

Don't mismatch your battery and chargers.

ONLY use distilled water to refill.

Keep the liquid level in the cells at the "split ring" level.

Use a lifting strap to remove, move or install a battery.

Maintain the liquid in all cells at the "split ring" level.

Fully charge a new battery before using.

Push battery clamps onto terminals. Spread clamps wider if necessary.

Use ONLY a GEL charger for a GEL or sealed battery and a regular charger for regular batteries.

Follow recommendations in this manual when selecting a battery or charger.




FIGURE 1 - USING HYDROMETER TO CHECK **BATTERY CELLS (LEAD ACID)**

Using Hydrometer to Check Battery Cells (Lead Acid) (FIGURE 1)

NOTE: Perform this procedure when a digital voltmeter is not available.

WARNING

NEVER smoke or strike a match near the batteries. If the caps of battery cells are removed, NEVER look directly into them when charging battery.

The use of rubber gloves and safety glasses is recommended when testing the battery cells.

When reading a hydrometer, DO NOT allow any liquid to come in contact with your eyes or skin. It is a form of acid and can cause serious burns, and in some cases, blindness. If you do get battery acid on you, flush the exposed areas with cool water IMMEDIATELY. If the acid comes into contact with eyes or causes serious burns, get medical help IMMEDIATELY.

The battery acid can damage your wheelchair, clothing, and household items. Therefore, take readings cautiously and only in designated areas.

ONLY use distilled water when topping off the battery cells.

Most batteries are not sold with instructions. However, warnings are frequently noted on the cell caps. Read them carefully.

Remove the battery boxes from the wheelchair. Refer to one (1) of the following:

FWD WHEELCHAIRS - INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES in PROCEDURE 11 of this manual.

MWD WHEELCHAIRS - INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES in PROCEDURE 12 of this manual.

- Remove the battery caps from the battery.
- Squeeze the air from the hydrometer.
- Place the hydrometer into a battery cell.

NOTE: **DO NOT** fill hydrometer more than 3/4 full.

- Draw up sufficient acid to cover float balls.
- Tap lightly to remove air bubbles.
- 7. Number of floating balls indicates charge.

- Flush the liquid back into the same cell after reading the float. Repeat this step until all cells have been properly read. A shorted or dead cell can be detected when it is the only cell that doesn't charge.
- 9. Flush hydrometer in cold running water by allowing the water to rise into the hydrometer as far as possible. Do this several times to guard against burn damage.
- 10. Replace the battery caps.
- 11. Install the battery boxes onto the wheelchair. Refer to one (1) of the following:

FWD WHEELCHAIRS - INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES in PROCEDURE 11 of this manual.

MWD WHEELCHAIRS - INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES in PROCEDURE 12 of this manual.

NOTE: Every six (6) months take your wheelchair to a qualified dealer for a thorough inspection and servicing. Regular cleaning will reveal loose or worn parts and enhance the smooth operation of your wheelchair. To operate properly and safely, your wheelchair must be cared for just like any other vehicle. Routine maintenance will extend the life and efficiency of your wheelchair.

After ANY adjustments, repair or service and BE-FORE use, make sure all attaching hardware is tightened securely - otherwise injury or damage may result.

NOTE: Some footrests may require the use of two (2) hands to install/remove from the wheelchair.




FIGURE 1 - INSTALLING/REMOVING FOOTRESTS

INSTALLING/REMOVING FOOTRESTS (FIGURE 1)

Installing

- 1. Turn the footrest to the side (open footplate is perpendicular to wheelchair) and position the mounting holes in the footrest hinge plates with the hinge pins on the wheelchair frame.
- 2. Install the footrest hinge plates onto the hinge pins on the wheelchair frame.
- Push the footrest towards the inside of the wheelchair until it locks into place.

NOTE: The footplate will be on the inside of the wheelchair when locked in place.

4. Repeat STEPS 1-3 for opposite side of wheelchair.

Removing

- Push the footrest release lever inward and rotate the footrest outward.
- 2. Lift up on the footrest and remove from the wheel-chair.
- Repeat STEPS 1-2 for the opposite side of the wheelchair.

ADJUSTING FOOTREST HEIGHT




FIGURE 2 - ADJUSTING FOOTREST HEIGHT - ALL FOOTRESTS EXCEPT MODEL P93M FOOTRESTS

All Footrests Except Model P93M Footrests (FIGURE 2)

- 1. Remove any accessory from the footrest(s).
- Remove the footrest from the wheelchair. Refer to <u>INSTALLING/REMOVING FOOTRESTS</u> in this procedure of the manual.

NOTE: Lay the footrest on a flat surface to simplify this procedure.

- Remove the hex bolt, coved washers and locknut that secure the lower footrest to the footrest support.
- 4. Reposition the lower footrest to the desired height.
- Reinstall the hex bolt, coved washers and locknut that secure the lower footrest to the footrest support and tighten securely.
- 6. Repeat STEPS 1-5 for the opposite side of the wheel-chair footrest, if necessary.
- Reinstall the footrest(s) onto the wheelchair. Refer to <u>INSTALLING/REMOVING FOOTRESTS</u> in this procedure of the manual.
- 8. Reinstall any accessory onto the footrest(s).

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PROCEDURE 3 FRONT RIGGINGS




FIGURE 3 - ADJUSTING FOOTREST HEIGHT - P93M **MODEL FOOTRESTS**

P93M Model Footrests (FIGURE 3)

- Loosen, but do not remove the lug bolt and locknut that secure the lower footrest to the footrest support.
- 2. Reposition the lower footrest to the desired height.
- 3. Securely tighten the lug bolt and locknut that secure the lower footrest to the footrest support.
- 4. Repeat STEPS 1-3 for the opposite side of the wheelchair footrest, if necessary.




FIGURE 4 - REPLACING HEEL LOOPS

REPLACING HEEL LOOPS (FIGURE 4)

- 1. Note the position of the hex bolt, coved washers and locknut for reinstallation.
- 2. Remove the hex bolt, coved washers and locknut that secure the lower footrest to the footrest support.
- 3. Remove the lower footrest.
- 4. Remove the phillips bolt, spacer and locknut that secure the existing heel loop to the lower footrest.
- 5. Slide the existing heel loop off the lower footrest.
- Replace heel loop.
- Reverse STEPS 1-6 to reassemble.

NOTE: When securing the heel loop to the lower footrest, tighten the phillips screw and locknut until spacer is secure.




FIGURE 5- INSTALLING/REMOVING ELEVATING **LEGRESTS**

INSTALLING/REMOVING **ELEVATING LEGRESTS (FIGURE 5)**

NOTE: On RANGER II, Models, the Elevating Legrests MUST be elevated to install/remove from the wheelchair.

Installing

- 1. Turn the legrest to the side (open footplate is perpendicular to wheelchair) and position the mounting holes in the legrest hinge plates with the hinge pins on the wheelchair frame.
- 2. Install the legrest hinge plates onto the hinge pins on the wheelchair frame.
- Rotate legrest toward the inside of the wheelchair until it locks in place.

NOTE: The footplate will be on the inside of the wheelchair when locked in place.

- Repeat STEPS 1-3 for the opposite legrest.
- 5. After seated in wheelchair, adjust footplate to correct height by loosening the nut and sliding the lower footrest assembly up or down until desired height is achieved.

Removing

- Push the legrest release handle toward the inside of the wheelchair (facing the front of the wheelchair) and swing the legrest to the outside of the wheelchair.
- 2. Lift up on the legrest and remove from the wheelchair.
- 3. Repeat STEPS 1-2 for the opposite side of the wheelchair.

FRONT RIGGINGS PROCEDURE 3




FIGURE 6- RAISING/LOWERING ELEVATING LEGRESTS AND/OR ADJUSTING CALFPADS

RAISING/LOWERING ELEVATING LEGRESTS AND/OR ADJUSTING CALFPADS (FIGURE 6)

Raising/Lowering Elevating Legrests

1. Perform one (1) of the following:

RAISING - Pull back on the release lever

until the leg is at the desired

height.

LOWERING - Support leg with one (1) hand

and push release lever down-

ward with other hand.

Adjusting Calfpads

- 1. Turn calfpad towards the outside of the wheelchair.
- 2. Slide the calfpad up or down until the desired position is obtained.

NOTE: If one (1) of the top two (2) calfpad adjustment positions is being used, the legrest will need to be raised to avoid interference with the front stabilizers while going over obstacles or going up and down ramps. Refer to RAISING/LOWERING ELEVATING LEGRESTS in this procedure of the manual.

3. Turn the calfpad towards the inside of the wheelchair.




FIGURE 7 - ADJUSTING/REPLACING TELESCOPING FRONT RIGGING SUPPORT

ADJUSTING/REPLACING TELESCOPING FRONT RIGGING SUPPORT (FIGURE 7)

- Lift up on the crossbraces until they release from the H-blocks on the wheelchair frame.
- 2. Remove the phillips bolt and locknut that secure the front H-block to the wheelchair frame.

- 3. Remove the two (2) locknuts and socket bolts that secure telescoping front rigging support to wheelchair.
- 4. If necessary, remove the hex bolt and locknut that secures the battery charger connector bracket to the wheelchair.

Adjusting

1. Position the telescoping front rigging support to the desired depth.

NOTE: The footplate will be on the inside of the wheelchair when locked in place.

- Insert front socket bolt into wheelchair frame and mounting hole in the telescoping front rigging support determined in STEP 1 and securely tighten with the locknut.
- Insert the rear socket bolt through the wheelchair frame and the telescoping front rigging support and securely tighten with the locknut.
- Resecure the front H-block to the wheelchair with the phillips bolt and locknut.
- 5. If necessary, resecure the battery charger connector bracket to the wheelchair with the two (2) hex bolts and locknuts.
- 6. Snap crossbraces into H-blocks. Wiggle crossbraces to make sure they are secured in the H-blocks.

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PROCEDURE 3 FRONT RIGGINGS

Replacing

NOTE: Observe the position of the current telescoping front rigging support before removal to ensure correct position of new support assembly.

- Remove the existing telescoping front rigging support from the wheelchair.
- 2. Install the new telescoping front rigging support into the wheelchair.
- Adjust the telescoping front rigging support. Refer to <u>ADJUSTING TELESCOPING FRONT RIGGING</u> <u>SUPPORT</u> in this procedure of the manual.

ADJUSTING REMOVABLE FOOTBOARD

Depth - All Models (FIGURE 8)

1. Remove the four (4) flat head screws and barrel nuts that secure the removable footboard to the two (2) footplate clamps.

2. Move the removable footboard to one (1) of the four (4) positions.

NOTE: Before reinstalling the four (4) flat head screws, make sure the footplate clamps are in the proper position as shown in DETAIL "A".

3. Reinstall the four (4) flat head screws and barrel nuts that secure the removable footboard to the two (2) footplate clamps. Tighten securely.

Angle




FIGURE 9 - ADJUSTING FLIP-UP REMOVABLE FOOTBOARD - ADJUSTING FOOTBOARD ANGLE

ADJUSTING FOOTBOARD ANGLE - ALL MODELS (FIGURE 9).

 Loosen, but do not remove, the four (4) flat head screws and barrel nuts that secure the removable footboard to the two (2) footplate clamps.

NOTE: Because of the two (2) support tubes, the angle of the removable footboard can be adjusted downward ONLY.

- Grasp the front of the removable footboard and rotate it DOWNWARD until the desired angle is reached.
- While holding the removable footboard in place, tighten the four (4) flat head screws and barrel nuts securely.





FIGURE 10 - ADJUSTING REMOVABLE FOOTBOARD - ADJUSTING FOOTBOARD MOUNTING BRACKET ANGLE

ADJUSTING FOOTBOARD MOUNTING BRACKET ANGLE - FWD MODELS ONLY (FIGURE 10).

NOTE: This procedure applies to FWD wheelchair models only.

NOTE: Angle availability is limited when the motors are in the forward-most position.

- 1. Remove the caplug cap.
- Remove the front hex screw and caplug washer that secure the footboard mounting bracket and bushing to the wheelchair.
- 3. Repeat STEPS 1-2 for the opposite footboard mounting bracket.
- 4. Move the footboard mounting brackets to one (1) of three (3) positions.

NOTE: To ensure the existing hex screws tighten securely, apply Loctite 242 onto the threads.

- 5. Reinstall the two (2) hex screws and caplug washers through the two (2) footboard mounting brackets and bushings and into the wheelchair.
- 6. Torque the two (2) hex screws to 13-ft/lbs.
- 7. Reinstall the two (2) caplug caps.


ADJUSTING THE REMOVABLE FOOTBOARD HEIGHT (FIGURE 11)

- Remove the removable footboard plate. Refer to <u>REMOVING/INSTALLING THE REMOVABLE</u> <u>FOOTBOARD ONTO/FROM THE WHEELCHAIR</u> in PROCEDURE 3 of the Owner's Manual.
- 2. Remove the caplug cap.
- Remove the mounting screw, caplug washer, flat washer and nut that secures the two (2) large washers and support tube to the height adjustment bracket and footboard bracket. Refer to DETAIL "A".
- 4. Remove the nut, flat washer and that secure the threaded arm on the height adjustment bracket to the footboard bracket. Refer to DETAIL "B".
- 5. Perform one (1) of the following:
 - A. MWD WHEELCHAIRS Move the height adjustment bracket to one (1) of seven (7) height positions.
 - B. FWD WHEELCHAIRS Move the height adjustment bracket to one (1) of five (5) height positions.
- 6. Reinstall the flat washer and nut that secures the threaded arm on the height adjustment bracket to the footboard bracket. Refer to DETAIL "B".
- Reinstall the mounting screw, caplug washer, flat washer and nut that secures the two (2) large washers and support tube to the height adjustment bracket and footboard bracket. Refer to DETAIL "A".
- 8. Reinstall the caplug caps.
- Repeat STEPS 2-8 for the opposite footboard bracket.
- Reinstall the removable footboard plate. Refer to REMOVING/INSTALLING THE REMOVABLE FOOTBOARD ONTO/FROM THE WHEELCHAIR in PROCEDURE 3 of the Owner's Manual.

PREPARING REMOVABLE FOOTBOARD FOR WHEELCHAIR TRANSPORTATION (FIGURE 12)

Removing The Removable Footboard Plate

- 1. Depress the push pins on the two (2) support tubes on the removable footboard plate.
- 2. While performing STEP 1, grasp the removable footboard plate and pull it away from the two (2) support tubes on the removable footboard mounting brackets.


Installing The Removable Footboard Plate

- Align the two (2) support tubes on the removable footboard plate with the two (2) support tubes on the removable footboard mounting brackets.
- Push the two (2) support tubes on the removable footboard plate onto the two (2) support tubes on the removable footboard mounting brackets, until the push pins release into the adjustment holes.

WARNING

Make sure the push pins are fully protruding through the adjustment holes BEFORE using the wheelchair. Otherwise, injury or damage can occur.

3. Make sure the push pins are completely released.

ARMS PROCEDURE 4

This Procedure Includes the Following:

Installing/Removing Flip Back Armrests
Adjusting Flip Back Armrests
Adjusting Captain's Seat Armrests

WARNING

After ANY adjustments, repair or service and BE-FORE use, make sure all attaching hardware is tightened securely - otherwise injury or damage may result.




FIGURE 1 - INSTALLING/REMOVING FLIP BACK ARMRESTS

INSTALLING/REMOVING FLIP BACK ARMRESTS (FIGURE 1)

NOTE: Flip back armrests are available on integrated sling seat model wheelchairs only.

WARNING

Make sure the flip back armrest release and height adjustment levers are in the locked position before using the wheelchair.

NOTE: Flip back armrest release lever must be in unlocked position when placing armrest into the arm sockets.

Installing

- Slide the flip back armrest into the arm sockets on the wheelchair frame.
- 2. Install the quick release pin through the rear arm socket and flip back armrest.

- 3. Lock flip back armrest by pressing flip back armrest release lever into the DOWN (VERTICAL) position.
- 4. Lift up on flip back armrest to make sure the armrest is locked in place.

Removing

- 1. Unlock flip back armrest by pulling flip back armrest release lever into the UP (HORIZONTAL) position.
- Remove the quick release pin that secures the flip back armrest to the wheelchair frame.
- Pull up on the flip back armrest and remove the armrest from the arm sockets.
- Repeat STEPS 1-3 for the opposite flip back armrest, if necessary.




FIGURE 2 - ADJUSTING FLIP BACK ARMRESTS

ADJUSTING FLIP BACK ARMRESTS (FIGURE 2)

NOTE: Flip back armrests are available on integrated sling seat model wheelchairs only.

Positioning Flip Back Armrests for User Transfer

- 1. Unlock the flip back armrest by pulling the armrest release lever into the UP (HORIZONTAL) position.
- 2. Pull up on the flip back armrest and remove the armrest from the front arm socket.
- 3. Continue to pull up on the flip back armrest until the armrest is out of the way.
- Repeat STEPS 1-3 for opposite flip back armrest, if necessary.

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PROCEDURE 4 ARMS

Positioning Flip Back Armrests for Use

- 1. Make sure the flip back armrest release lever is in the UP (HORIZONTAL) position.
- 2. Install the flip back armrest into the front arm socket.
- 3. Lock flip back armrest by pressing flip back armrest release lever into the DOWN (VERTICAL) position.
- 4. Lift up on flip back armrest to make sure the armrest is locked in place.
- Repeat STEPS 1-4 for opposite flip back armrest, if necessary.

Adjusting

- Unlock top of flip back armrest by pulling height adjustment lever into the UP (HORIZONTAL) position.
- 2. Adjust top of the flip back armrest to the desired height.
- Lock top of flip back armrest by pushing height adjustment lever into the DOWN (VERTICAL) position.
- 4. Lift up on flip back armrest to make sure the armrest is locked in place.
- Repeat STEPS 1-4 for opposite flip back armrest, if necessary.

ADJUSTING CAPTAIN'S SEAT ARMRESTS




FIGURE 3 - ADJUSTING CAPTAIN'S SEAT ARMRESTS -ANGLE

Angle (FIGURE 3)

- 1. Lift-up the armrest.
- Loosen the jam nut.
- Adjust the socket screw up or down to the desired arm angle position.
- 4. Tighten the jam nut.
- To determine the same angle for the opposite armrest, count the exposed threads after the jam nut has been tightened.




FIGURE 4 - ADJUSTING CAPTAIN'S SEAT ARMRESTS - HEIGHT




FIGURE 1 - REPLACING SEAT UPHOLSTERY

REPLACING SEAT UPHOLSTERY (FIGURE 1)

NOTE: Seat upholstery is available on integrated sling seat model wheelchairs only.

- Remove the eight (8) phillips screws and washers that secure the existing seat upholstery to the crossbraces.
- Remove existing seat upholstery from the crossbraces.
- 3. Line up mounting holes in new seat upholstery with mounting holes in the crossbraces.
- 4. Securely tighten with existing phillips screws and washers.

NOTE: Clean upholstery with warm DAMP cloth and mild detergent to remove superficial soil.

WARNING

Laundering or moisture will reduce flame retardation of the upholstery.




FIGURE 2 - ADJUSTING CAPTAIN'S SEAT

ADJUSTING CAPTAIN'S SEAT (FIGURE 2)

Low Back Captain's Seats

 Lift up on the release handle and move the back to the desired position.

High Back Captain's Seats

ANGLE.

WARNING

HIGH BACK CAPTAIN'S SEATS ONLY - NEVER operate the wheelchair while in any recline position over 114° RELATIVE TO THE SEAT FRAME. If the limit switch does not stop the wheelchair from operating in a recline position greater than 114° RELATIVE TO THE SEAT FRAME, do not operate the wheelchair. Have the wheelchair serviced by an authorized Invacare dealer or qualified technician.

- 1. Lift up on the release handle and move the back to the desired position.
- 2. Check the angle of the back RELATIVE TO THE SEAT FRAME.
- 3. If necessary, have the limit switch adjusted. Contact an authorized Invacare dealer or qualified technician.

LUMBAR.

 Rotate the knob on the side of the high back Captain's Seat COUNTERCLOCKWISE until the desired support is obtained.

NOTE: The knob only rotates COUNTERCLOCKWISE.




FIGURE 3- REMOVING/INSTALLING CAPTAIN'S SEAT

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REMOVING/INSTALLING CAPTAIN'S SEAT (FIGURE 3)

Removing

- Turn the adjustment lock lever to release the joystick mounting tube from the armrest.
- 2. Remove the joystick from the wheelchair.
- HIGH BACK CAPTAIN'S SEATS ONLY Disconnect the limit switch. Refer to <u>DISCONNECTING/CONNECTING LIMIT SWITCH</u> in PROCEDURE 6 of this manual.
- 4. Remove the four (4) quick release pins that secure the Captain's Seat to the wheelchair frame.
- 5. Remove the Captain's Seat from the wheelchair.

Installing

- 1. Push the Captain's Seat down on the wheelchair frame at the position shown in FIGURE 3.
- 2. Line up the mounting holes in the Captain's Seat and the wheelchair frame.

WARNING

Make sure the Captain's Seat is secured to the wheelchair frame with the four (4) quick release pins BEFORE using the wheelchair, otherwise injury or damage can occur.

- 6. Slide the joystick into the adjustment lock lever to the desired position.
- Turn the adjustment lock lever to secure the joystick mounting tube to the armrest.


REPLACING SEAT POSITIONING STRAP

- If necessary, remove the seat cushion from the seat upholstery.
- 2. Remove the two (2) rear phillips screws and washers that secure the seat upholstery and existing seat positioning strap to the crossbraces.




FIGURE 1 - PREPARING MKIV JOYSTICK FOR USE

PREPARING MKIV JOYSTICK FOR USE (FIGURE 1)

NOTE: The MKIV joystick is factory installed on the right side of the wheelchair. To reposition the MKIV joystick onto the left side of the wheelchair, perform one (1) of the following: INTEGRATED SLING SEAT WHEELCHAIRS - RE-POSITIONING MKIV JOYSTICK in this procedure of the manual or CAPTAIN'S SEAT MODEL WHEELCHAIRS - have the joystick repositioned by an authorized Invacare dealer or qualified technician.

- 1. Turn the lever on the adjustment lock to release the adjustment lock from joystick mounting tube.
- 2. Slide joystick mounting tube to the desired position.
- Turn the lever on the adjustment lock to secure the adjustment lock to the joystick mounting tube.


REPOSITIONING MKIV JOYSTICK

Integrated Sling Seat Models (FIGURE 2)

- Turn the lever on the adjustment lock to release the adjustment lock from joystick mounting tube (tube).
- 2. Remove the joystick from the wheelchair.
- 3. Remove the three (3) hex screws that secure joystick mounting bracket (**bracket**), the threaded hole half clamp and the opened hole half clamp to the arm tube.

- Reposition the threaded hole half clamp and opened hole half clamp on the opposite arm tube. Make sure threaded hole half clamp is on the inside of arm tube.
- 5. While holding the two (2) half clamps, install the front hex screw into the two (2) half clamps. Securely tighten.
- 6. Line up mounting holes of the joystick mounting bracket with the mounting holes in the two (2) half clamps.
- Secure the joystick mounting bracket to the two (2) half clamps with the remaining two (2) hex screws.
- 8. Slide tube through the bracket to the desired position.
- Slide adjustment lock over end of tube and secure adjustment lock to tube by turning lever on adjustment lock.

NOTE: If adjustment lock does not fit over tube, rotate 180°.

DISCONNECTING - While holding body of limit switch phono plug, lift up gently.

NOTE: When the limit switch is unplugged the wheel-chair will NOT operate.

CONNECTING - Plug limit switch plug into the limit switch phono jack.




FIGURE 3 - DISCONNECTING/CONNECTING LIMIT SWITCH




FIGURE 4 - REPOSITIONING BATTERY CHARGER CONNECTOR

REPOSITIONING BATTERY CHARGER CONNECTOR (FIGURE 4)

NOTE: The following procedure applies to FWD wheelchairs that are equipped with MKIV controllers ONLY.

- Fold the wheelchair. Refer to <u>TRANSPORTING</u> RANGER II FWD in PROCEDURE 11 of this manual.
- 2. If necessary, remove the battery charger cover from the filler shroud.
- 3. Remove the hex bolt and locknut that secures the battery charger connector bracket to the wheelchair.
- 4. Perform one (1) of the following:

Battery Charger Connector Cable too Long -

- A. Reposition the battery charger connector bracket on the opposite side of the wheelchair frame.
- B. Line up the mounting holes in the battery charger connector bracket and the wheelchair frame.
- Install the hex bolt through the wheelchair frame and battery charger bracket.
- D. Install the locknut onto the hex bolt and tighten securely.
- E. Tuck the excess battery charger cable into the spiral wire cover on the wiring harness.

Battery Charger Connector Cable too Short -

- A. Pull the battery charger cable out of the spiral wire cover on the wiring harness.
- B. Reposition the battery charger connector bracket on the opposite side of the wheelchair frame.
- Line up the mounting holes in the battery charger connector bracket and the wheelchair frame.
- D. Install the hex bolt through the wheelchair frame and battery charger bracket.
- E. Install the locknut onto the hex bolt and tighten securely.
- 5. If necessary, install the battery charger cover on the opposite filler shroud.
- 6. Unfold the wheelchair. Refer to <u>TRANSPORTING</u> RANGER II FWD in PROCEDURE 11 of this manual.




FIGURE 5 - FUSE REPLACEMENT

After ANY adjustments, repair or service and BEFORE use, make sure all attaching hardware is tightened securely - otherwise injury or damage may result.

REPLACING BATTERY BOX RETAINING STRAP

All MWD Models and FWD Model RANGER II_{JR} (FIGURE 1)

- If necessary, remove the front and rear shrouds. Refer to <u>REMOVING/INSTALLING SHROUDS</u> in PROCE-DURE 9 of this manual.
- Remove the battery boxes from the wheelchair. Refer to one (1) of the following:

FWD WHEELCHAIRS - INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES in PROCEDURE 11 of this manual.

MWD WHEELCHAIRS - <u>INSTALLING/REMOVING</u> <u>BATTERY BOXES</u> in PROCEDURE 12 of this manual.

WARNING

The retaining strap MUST be fed through the adjustable end of the battery box retaining strap clip as shown in FIGURE 1.

- Feed the existing battery box retaining strap through the adjustable end of the battery box retaining strap buckle.
- Feed the existing battery box retaining strap through the slot in the battery box tray.
- Feed the new battery box retaining strap through the inside of the slot in the battery box tray.
- 6. Feed the new battery box retaining strap through the adjustable end of the battery box retaining strap buckle.

NOTE: Strap should have 3/4-inch length minimum beyond buckle.

7. Install the battery boxes onto the wheelchair. Refer to one (1) of the following:



WARNING

The Battery Box Retaining Strap MUST be fastened securely and adjusted properly to hold battery boxes in place before using the wheelchair. Otherwise, injury to the user and/or damage to the wheelchair may occur.

 If necessary, install the front and rear shrouds. Refer to <u>REMOVING/INSTALLING SHROUDS</u> in PROCE-DURE 9 of this manual.



NOTE: Tray shown by itself for clarity. There is no need to remove the tray from the wheelchair if the retaining strap is being replaced.

NOTE: RANGER II_{JR} battery tray not shown for clarity. Retaining strap removes/installs in the same manner.

- Remove the battery boxes from the wheelchair. Refer <u>INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES</u> in PROCEDURE 11 of this manual.
- 3. Remove the two (2) hex bolts and locknut that secure the existing battery tray to the tray support.
- 4. Remove the existing battery tray from the wheelchair.




FIGURE 2 - REPLACING BATTERY BOX RETAINING STRAP - ALL FWD MODELS EXCEPT RANGER II,

- 5. Position the new battery tray on the tray support as shown in FIGURE 2.
- 6. Secure the new battery tray to the tray support with the two (2) hex bolts and locknuts. Tighten securely.
- 7. Reinstall the battery boxes. Refer to INSTALLING/REMOVINGBATTERYBOXES in PROCEDURE 11 of this manual.
- 8. If necessary, install the front and rear shrouds. Refer to REMOVING/INSTALLING SHROUDS in PROCEDURE 9 of this manual.

WARNING

After ANY adjustments, repair or service and BE-FORE use, make sure all attaching hardware is tightened securely - otherwise injury or damage may result.

CAUTION

As with any vehicle, the wheels and tires should be checked periodically for cracks and wear and should be replaced.




FIGURE 1 - ENGAGING MOTORS WITH CLUTCHES




FIGURE 2 - DISENGAGING MOTORS WITH CLUTCHES

ENGAGING/DISENGAGING MOTORS WITH CLUTCHES (FIGURES 1 AND 2)

WARNING

DO NOT engage or disengage the clutches until the power is in the OFF position.


CAUTION

Ensure both clutches are fully engaged BEFORE driving the wheelchair.

- 1. Locate the clutch handles on motors.






FIGURE 3 - ENGAGING/DISENGAGING MOTORS

ENGAGING/DISENGAGING MOTORS WITH MOTOR LOCKS (FIGURE 3)

WARNING

DO NOT engage or disengage the motor locks until the power is in the OFF position.

CAUTION

Ensure both motor locks are fully engaged BE-FORE driving the wheelchair.

The motor lock disengagement/engagement allows freewheeling or joystick controlled operation. Freewheeling allows an attendant to maneuver the wheelchair without power. To disengage/engage the motor locks:

- 1. Locate the motor lock levers on the motors.
- 2. Perform one (1) of the following:
 - A. DISENGAGE Push the motor lock lever until they are pointing towards the outside of the wheelchair (free wheel position).
 - B. **ENGAGE** Pull the motor lock handles until they are pointing up (drive position).

WITH MOTOR LOCKS




FIGURE 4 - ADJUSTING FORKS

ADJUSTING FORKS (FIGURE 4)

- 1. Remove the dust cover from the caster headtube.
- 2. To properly tighten caster journal system and guard against flutter, perform the following check:
 - A. Tip back the wheelchair to floor.
 - B. Pivot both forks and casters to top of their arc simultaneously.
 - C. Let casters drop to bottom of arc (wheels should swing once to one-side, then immediately rest in a straight downward position).
 - D. Adjust locknuts according to freedom of caster swing.
- 3. Test wheelchair for maneuverability.
- Readjust locknuts if necessary, and repeat STEPS 1-3 until correct.
- 5. Snap dust cover into the caster headtube.

PROCEDURE 9 SHROUDS

This Procedure Includes the Following:

Removing/Installing Shrouds

WARNING

After ANY adjustments, repair or service and BE-FORE use, make sure all attaching hardware is tightened securely - otherwise injury or damage may result.

REMOVING/INSTALLING SHROUDS

MWD Wheelchairs (FIGURE 1)

REMOVING FRONT SHROUD.

- Turn the two (2) 1/4-turn bolts that secure front shroud to the two (2) side shrouds COUNTERCLOCKWISE.
- 2. Remove the front shroud from the wheelchair.

INSTALLING FRONT SHROUD.


- 1. Position the two (2) 1/4-turn bolts with the two (2) mounting holes in the side shrouds.
- 2. Install the front shroud onto the two (2) side shrouds.
- 3. Turn the two (2) 1/4-turn bolts that secure the front shroud to the two (2) side shrouds CLOCKWISE.

REMOVING REAR SHROUD AND REAR STORAGE COMPARTMENT.

- 1. Lift up on rear shroud and remove from wheelchair.
- Turn the two (2) 1/4-turn bolts that secure the rear storage compartment to the wheelchair frame COUNTER-CLOCKWISE.
- 3. Remove rear storage compartment from wheelchair.

INSTALLING REAR SHROUD AND REAR STORAGE COMPARTMENT.

- 1. Position the two (2) 1/4-turn bolts with the two (2) mounting holes in the wheelchair frame.
- 2. Install rear storage compartment onto chair frame.
- Turn two (2) 1/4-turn bolts that secure the rear storage compartment to the wheelchair frame CLOCKWISE.
- 4. Position rear shroud on the two (2) side shrouds and slide towards the front of the wheelchair until it stops.
- 5. Press down on the rear shroud until the two (2) clips secure the rear shroud to the two (2) side shrouds.



NOTE: Side shrouds are exploded away for clarity. There is no need to remove side shrouds.




FIGURE 2 - REMOVING/INSTALLING SHROUDS - FWD WHEELCHAIRS

FWD Wheelchairs (FIGURE 2)

REMOVING FRONT SHROUD.

- 1. Unclip the retaining strap securing the front shroud and battery box to the wheelchair.
- 2. Feed the retaining strap through the front shroud.
- 3. Remove the front shroud from the wheelchair.

INSTALLING FRONT SHROUD.

- 1. Feed the retaining strap through the front shroud as shown in FIGURE 2.
- 2. Position the bottom of the front shroud between the battery box and the battery tray.
- 3. Clip the retaining strap together.
- 4. Pull end of retaining strap to secure front battery box and front shroud in place.

REMOVING REAR SHROUD.

- 1. Peform one (1) of the following:
 - A. For 16,18, and 20-inch wide chairs:
 - Unclip the retaining strap securing the rear shroud and battery box to the wheelchair.
 - Feed the retaining strap through the rear shroud.
 - Remove the rear shroud from the wheelchair.
 - B. For 14-inch wide chairs:
 - Lift up on rear shroud and remove from wheelchair.

INSTALLING REAR SHROUD.

- 1. Peform one (1) of the following:
 - A. For 16,18, and 20-inch wide chairs:
 - Feed the retaining strap through the front shroud as shown in FIGURE 2.
 - Clip the retaining strap together.
 - Press down on the rear shroud until the two (2) clips secure the rear shroud to the two (2) side shrouds.
 - Pull end of retaining strap to secure rear battery box and front shroud in place.
 - B. For 14-inch wide chairs:
 - Algin clips of rear shroud with tabs on side shrouds.
 - Press down on rear shroud until the two clips and dual lock fastener secure the rear shroud in place.

PROCEDURE 10 BATTERIES

This Procedure includes the following:

Installing/Removing Batteries into/From Battery Boxes

Connecting Battery Cables

WARNING

Make sure power to the wheelchair is OFF before performing this procedure.

The use of rubber gloves and safety glasses is recommended when working with batteries.

Invacare strongly recommends that battery installation and battery replacement ALWAYS be done by a qualified technician.

After ANY adjustments, repair or service and BE-FORE use, make sure all attaching hardware is tightened securely - otherwise injury or damage may result.

NOTE: For additional battery information, refer to PROCEDURE 11 - FWD wheelchairs or PROCEDURE 12 - MWD wheelchairs.




FIGURE 1 - INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERIES INTO/ FROM BATTERY BOXES

INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERIES INTO/FROM BATTERY BOXES (FIGURE 1)

NOTE: To remove the battery(ies) from the battery box(es), reverse the following procedure.

NOTE: Have the following tools available:

*NOTE: The Battery Lifting strap supplied is for Group 22 NF Batteries ONLY. Refer to the battery manufacturer for the proper lifting strap and/or battery tools for U1 battery removal/installation.

WARNING

ALWAYS use a battery lifting strap when lifting a battery. It is the most convenient method and assures that the battery acid will not spill. It also helps to prolong the life of the battery.

DO NOT tip the batteries. Keep the batteries in an upright position.

NOTE: If there is battery acid in the bottom or on the sides of the battery box(es) or battery(ies), apply baking soda to these areas to neutralize the battery acid. Before reinstalling the NEW or existing battery(ies), clean the baking soda from the battery box(es) or battery(ies).


NOTE: When securing battery lifting strap to battery, observe polarity markings located on the ends of the battery lifting strap, (+) side to POSITIVE (+) battery terminal/post and (-) side to NEGATIVE (-) battery terminal/post.

- If necessary, remove the battery boxes from the wheelchair. Refer to <u>INSTALLING/REMOVING BAT-TERY BOXES</u> in PROCEDURE 11 - FWD or PRO-CEDURE 12 - MWD of this manual.
- Secure the battery lifting strap to battery terminal(s)/ post(s) (FIGURE 1).

CAUTION

Some battery manufacturers mold a carrying strap and/or hold down flanges directly into the battery case. Batteries which interfere with the battery box cannot be used for these applications. Attempting to "wedge" a battery into a battery box may damage the box and/or the battery.

3. Place batteries into battery box bottom.

BATTERIES PROCEDURE 10

CONNECTING BATTERY CABLES

WARNING

NEVER allow any of your tools and/or battery cable(s) to contact BOTH battery terminal(s)/post(s) at the same time. An electrical short may occur and serious personal injury or damage may occur.

The use of rubber gloves and safety glasses is recommended when working with batteries.

Dual U1 or Dual Group 22 NF Battery Boxes

Perform one (1) of the following methods for connecting the battery cable(s):




FIGURE 3 - CONNECTING BATTERY CABLES - DIRECT MOUNT METHOD




FIGURE 4 - CONNECTING BATTERY CABLES - BATTERY CLAMP METHOD

- A. **FOR DUAL U1 BATTERIES** Use direct mount method. Refer to FIGURES 2, 3 AND 4.
- B. FOR DUAL GROUP 22 NF BATTERIES THAT HAVE MOUNTING HOLES IN THE BATTERY TERMINAL(S)/POST(S) - Use direct mount method. Refer to FIGURES 2 AND 3.




FIGURE 5 - CONNECTING BATTERY CABLES - BATTERY CLAMP METHOD




FIGURE 6 - CONNECTING BATTERY CABLES - BATTERY CLAMP METHOD

- C. FOR DUAL GROUP 22 NF BATTERIES THAT DO NOT HAVE MOUNTING HOLES IN THE BATTERY TERMINAL(S)/POST(S)-Use battery clamp method. Refer to FIGURES 5, 6 AND 7.




FIGURE 2 - TRANSPORTING RANGER II FWD -**CAPTAIN'S SEATS**

DIRECT MOUNT METHOD (FIGURE 2, 3 AND 4).

 Install battery terminal cap(s) onto battery cable(s) as follows (FIGURE 2):


DUAL U1 BATTERIES:

- A. ORANGE battery terminal cap onto RED battery cable.
- B. GRAY battery terminal cap onto BLACK battery cable.

DUAL GROUP 22 NF BATTERIES:

- A. RED battery terminal cap onto RED battery cable.
- B. BLACK battery terminal cap onto BLACK battery cable.

- Connect battery cable(s) to battery(ies) terminal(s)/ post(s) as follows (DETAIL "A" or DETAIL "B" of FIG-URE 3, depending on battery type):
 - A. NEGATIVE (-) BLACK battery cable to NEGATIVE (-) battery terminal/post.
 - B. POSITIVE (+) RED battery cable to POSITIVE (+) battery terminal/post.
- Secure the battery cable(s)/ring terminal(s) to the battery terminal(s)/post(s), BLACK to NEGATIVE

 (-) and RED to POSITIVE (+), with the provided 1/4-20 x 7/8-inch hex flange screw and hex flange locknut. Securely tighten. (DETAIL "A" or DETAIL "B" of FIGURE 3, depending on battery type).
- 4. Verify all battery cable(s)/ring terminal(s) are correctly installed and securely tightened.
- 5. Slide terminal cap(s) down battery cable(s) and onto battery clamps (FIGURE 3).
- 6. Secure each terminal cap in place with a tie-wrap (Use tie-wraps 11-1/2-inches long) (FIGURE 3).

NOTE: It will be necessary to trim excess tie-wrap in order to install the battery box top(s).

- 7. Install the battery box top(s).
- Install the battery box(es) into the wheelchair. Refer to <u>INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOX(ES)</u> in the PROCEDURE 11 - FWD MODELS or PROCE-DURE 12 - MWD MODELS of this manual.



BATTERIES PROCEDURE 10

BATTERY CLAMP METHOD (FIGURES 4, 5 AND 6).

CAUTION

The battery clamp of the POSITIVE (+) battery terminal/post MUST be mounted in the position shown in FIGURE 5, otherwise the battery box top cannot be installed properly.

- 1. Perform one (1) of the following:
 - A. If the battery clamp of the POSITIVE (+) battery terminal/post is **NOT** mounted in the orientation shown in FIGURE 5, perform the following:
 - Loosen the hex nut that secures the battery damp to the POSITIVE (+) battery terminal/post.

CAUTION

When tightening the clamps, always use a box wrench. Pliers will "round off" the nuts. NEVER wiggle the battery terminal(s)/post(s) when tightening. The battery may become damaged.

- Remove the battery clamp from the POSI-TIVE (+) battery terminal/post.
- Reposition the battery clamp on the POSI-TIVE (+) battery terminal/post as shown in FIGURE 4.
- Securely tighten the hex nut that secures the battery clamp to the positive (+) battery terminal/post.
- B. If the battery clamp on the POSITIVE (+) battery terminal/post is positioned as shown in FIGURE 4, proceed to STEP 2.

- Connect battery cable(s) to battery(ies) terminal(s)/ post(s) as follows (DETAIL "A"):

 - B. POSITIVE (+) RED battery cable/ring terminal between the mounting plate and battery clamp battery clamp of POSITIVE (+) battery terminal/post.
- Secure the battery cable(s)/ring terminal(s) to the battery clamp(s), BLACK to NEGATIVE (-) and RED to POSI-TIVE (+), with exisiting hex screws. Securely Tighten. (DETAIL "A")
- 5. Verify battery cable ring terminal(s) are correctly installed and securely tightened.
- 6. Slide battery clamp covers down battery cables and onto battery terminals. (DETAIL "B")
- 7. Secure each terminal cap in place with a tie-wrap (Use tie-wraps 11-1/2-inches long). (DETAIL "B")


NOTE: It will be necessary to trim excess tie-wrap in order to install the battery box top(s).

8. Install the battery box top(s).

TRANSPORTING RANGER II FWD

The weight of the wheelchair without the user and batteries is still between 83 and 115 lbs for integrated sling seats and 122 and 142 lbs for Captain's Seats. Use proper lifting techniques (lift with your legs) to avoid injury. Extreme caution is advised when it is necessary to move an UNOCCUPIED power wheelchair. Invacare recommends using two (2) assistants and making thorough preparations. Make sure to use ONLY secure, non-detachable parts for hand-hold supports.

Keep hands and fingers clear of moving parts to avoid injury.





If the BDI is FLASHING RED, the user should charge the batteries as soon as possible.

NOTE: Accurate readings are displayed when in neutral.

MCC-MKIV X, A or A+ Joystick

BATTERY GAUGE DISPLAY (BGD) is the bar graph display located on the MKIV X, A or A+ joystick. It will keep you informed as to power availability. A visual warning is given before the power becomes too low to operate the wheelchair. At full charge the two (2) LEFT segments and the farthest RIGHT segment of the bar graph will be illuminated. As the battery becomes discharged, the farthest RIGHT segment will progressively move to the LEFT until only the last two (2) bars (LEFT) are illuminated. At this level the last two (2) bars (LEFT) will start to Flash ON and OFF to indicate that the end user should charge the batteries as soon as possible.

CHARGING BATTERIES (FIGURE 4)

WARNING

Never attempt to recharge the batteries by attaching cables directly to the battery terminals or clamps. Always use the recharging plug located on the side of the wheelchair frame.

DO NOT attempt to recharge the batteries and operate the power wheelchair at the same time.

During use and charging, unsealed batteries will vent hydrogen gas which is explosive in the right concentration with air.

CAUTION

Always charge new batteries fully BEFORE initial use or battery life will be reduced.

NOTE: As a general rule, batteries should be recharged daily to assure the longest possible life and minimize the required charging time. Plan to recharge the batteries when it is anticipated the wheelchair will not be used for several days.

The range per battery charge using recommended batteries should be approximately 5 to 9 hours of typical operation. Extensive use on inclines or age of batteries may substantially reduce per charge mileage.

Description and Use of Battery Chargers

The charger automatically reduces the amount of charge from an initially high rate to a zero reading at a fully charged condition.

SHUTOFF PROCEDURE.

- A. For Models RANGER II_{BASIC} and RANGER II_{STANDARD} -If left unattended, the charger will automatically shut-off when full charge is obtained.
- B. For RANGER II_{250 SERIES} -The Charger output and green light will stay ON until the power switch on the battery charger is moved to the OFF position.

There are some basic concepts which will help you understand this automatic process:

The amount of electrical current drawn within a given time to charge a battery is called "charge rate". If, due to usage, the charge stored in the battery is low, the charge rate is high. (FOR MODELS RANGER II_{BASIC} and RANGER II_{STANDARD} - this is indicated by the green light on the charger. Initially, the green light will stay illuminated for a short period of time followed by a longer period of off time.)

As a charge builds up, the charge rate is reduced, and the following will occur:

A. For Models RANGER II_{BASIC} and RANGER II_{STANDARD}- the green light will stay illuminated for a longer period of time followed by a shorter off time.

B. For Model RANGER II_{250 SERIES} - the battery charger rate decreases to a "trickle charge".

NOTE: If performing the charging procedures independently, READ and CAREFULLY follow the individual instructions for each charger (supplied or purchased).

NOTE: If charging instructions are not supplied, consult a qualified service technician for proper procedures.



REPLACING BATTERIES

WARNING

Most batteries are not sold with instructions. However, warnings are frequently noted on the cell caps. Read them carefully, otherwise injury or damage can occur.

NOTE: Invacare recommends that both batteries be replaced if one (1) battery is defective.

Recommended Battery Types

WARNING

The warranty and performance specifications contained in this manual are based on the use of deep cycle gel cell or sealed lead acid batteries. Invacare strongly recommends their use as the power source for this unit.

CAUTION

Failure to use the correct battery size and/or voltage may cause damage to the wheelchair and give unsatisfactory performance.

Cleaning Battery Terminals

WARNING

DO NOT allow the liquid in the battery to come in contact with skin, clothes or other possessions. It is a form of acid and harmful or damaging burns may result. Should the liquid touch your skin, wash the area immediately and thoroughly with cool water. In serious cases or if eye contact is made, seek medical attention IMMEDIATELY.

NEVER smoke or strike a match near batteries. If the caps of the battery cells are removed, NEVER look directly into them while charging batteries.

- Examine battery clamps and terminals for corrosion.
- Verify that the plastic caps are in place over the battery cell holes.

Clean the terminals and inside the battery clamps by using a battery cleaning tool, wire brush, or medium grade sand paper.

NOTE: When done, these areas should be shiny, not dull.

4. Carefully dust off all metal particles.

INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES

WARNING

NEVER unplug the battery cables by pulling on the wires. Unplug the battery cables by pulling on the connector ONLY. Otherwise, injury or damage may occur.

NOTE: To remove the battery boxes, reverse the following procedure.

NOTE: If the wheelchair is equipped with the removeable footboard AND it is installed in the heighest position, it is necessary to remove the footboard plate BEFORE removing the battery boxes. Refer to PROCEDURE 3 of this manual.

NOTE: Motors should be in the engaged position when removing/installing batteries. Refer to ENGAGING/DISENGAGING MOTORS in PROCEDURE 8 of this manual.

Installing




FIGURE 5 - INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES ALL MODELS EXCEPT RANGER II,

RANGER II $_{\rm BASIC}$, RANGER II $_{\rm STANDARD}$ AND RANGER II $_{\rm 250~SERIES}$ (FIGURE 5).

- Bundle excess joystick cable and tie wrap together. See **DETAIL "A"**.
- 10. Position bundled joystick cable between retaining strap and rear battery box. See **DETAIL "A"**.
- 11. Clip the retaining strap together to secure the rear shroud and battery box in place.
- 12. Press down on the rear shroud until the two (2) clips secure the rear shroud to the two side shrouds.
- 13. Connect the battery leads from the battery boxes to the battery connectors on the wheelchair frame.
- If necessary, install the Captain's Seat. Refer to <u>RE-MOVING/INSTALLING CAPTAIN'S SEAT</u> in PROCE-DURE 5 of this manual.
- 15. If necessary, reinstall the removeable footboard. Refer to <u>PREPARING THE REMOVEABLE FOOTBOARD FOR WHEELCHAIR TRANSPORTATION</u> in PROCEDURE 3 of this manual.




FIGURE 6 - INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES RANGER II.

RANGER II_{JR} (FIGURE 6).









FIGURE 9 - BATTERY TRAY - FOLDING BATTERY TRAY FOR TRANSPORT






FIGURE 10 - BATTERY TRAY - UNFOLDING BATTERY TRAY FOR USE








FIGURE 2 - TRANSPORTING RANGER II MWD -CAPTAIN'S SEATS










FIGURE 4 - CHARGING BATTERIES

Most batteries are not sold with instructions. However, warnings are frequently noted on the cell caps. Read them carefully, otherwise injury or damage can occur.

NOTE: Invacare recommends that both batteries be replaced if one (1) battery is defective.

Recommended Battery Types

WARNING

The waranty and performance specifications contained in this manual are based on the use of deep cycle gel cell or sealed lead acid bateries. Invacare strongly recommends their use as the power source for this unit.

CAUTION

Failure to use the correct battery size and/or voltage may cause damage to your wheelchair and give you unsatisfactory performance.

*NOTE: RANGER II_{250 SERIES} requires U1 gel cell batteries.

- Remove the battery boxes from the wheelchair. Refer to <u>REMOVING/INSTALLING BATTERY BOXES</u> in this procedure of the manual.
- Remove existing batteries from the battery boxes. Refer to <u>INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERIES INTO/FROM BATTERY BOXES</u> in PROCEDURE 10 of this manual.
- 3. Clean the new battery terminals.
- Install the new batteries into the battery boxes. Refer to <u>INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERIES INTO/FROM</u> <u>BATTERY BOXES</u> in PROCEDURE 10 of this manual.

Cleaning Battery Terminals

WARNING

DO NOT allow the liquid in the battery to come in contact with skin, clothes or other possessions. It is a form of acid and harmful or damaging burns may result. Should the liquid touch your skin, wash the area immediately and thoroughly with cool water. In serious cases or if eye contact is made, seek medical attention IMMEDIATELY.

NEVER smoke or strike a match near batteries. If the caps of the battery cells are removed, NEVER look directly into them while charging batteries.

- 1. Examine battery clamps and terminals for corrosion.
- If applicable, verify that the plastic caps are in place over the battery cell holes.
- 3. Cut the tie wraps around the terminal caps/covers.
- 4. Slide the terminal cap/cover up the wire to expose the battery terminal.
- Clean the terminals and inside the battery clamps by using a battery cleaning tool, wire brush, or medium grade sand paper.

NOTE: When done, these areas should be shiny, not dull.

- 6. Carefully dust off all metal particles.
- Slide the terminal cap/cover back down the wire to cover the battery terminal.
- 8. Secure the terminal cap/cover using NEW tie wraps.




FIGURE 5 - INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES

INSTALLING/REMOVING BATTERY BOXES (FIGURE 5)

NOTE: To remove the battery boxes from the wheelchair, reverse the following procedure.

NOTE: If the wheelchair is equipped with the removeable footboard AND it is installed in the heighest position, it is necessary to remove the footboard plate BEFORE removing the battery boxes. Refer to <u>PRE-PARING THE REMOVEABLE FOOTBOARD FOR WHEELCHAIR TRANSPORTATION</u> in PROCEDURE 3 of this manual.

NOTE: Motors should be in the engaged position when removing/installing batteries. Refer to <u>ENGAGING/DISEN-GAGING MOTORS</u> in PROCEDURE 8 of this manual.

- Verify that the ON/OFF switch on the joystick is in the OFF position.
- If necessary, remove the front and rear shrouds. Refer to <u>REMOVING/INSTALLING SHROUDS</u> in PROCE-DURE 9 of this manual.

WARNING

Battery boxes MUST be installed/removed in the order stated below or the battery tray could rotate causing the rear battery box to fall possibly causing injury or damage.

Use extreme care when installing/removing the battery boxes.

NEVER unplug the battery cables by pulling on the wires. Unplug the battery cables by pulling on the connector ONLY. Otherwise injury or damage may result.

When removing the battery boxes from the wheelchair, remove the rear battery box first.

- 3. Position the battery boxes onto the battery tray in the following order:
 - A. FRONT Battery Box.
 - B. REAR Battery Box.
- Position retaining straps around each battery box as shown in DETAIL "A" of FIGURE 7 and clip retaining strap together.

NOTE: Make sure battery box leads are on the same side as battery connectors on wheelchair frame.

- 5. Connect the battery box leads to the battery connectors on the wheelchair frame.
- If necessary, reinstall the removeable footboard. Refer to <u>PREPARING THE REMOVEABLE</u> <u>FOOTBOARD FOR WHEELCHAIR TRANSPOR-</u> TATION in PROCEDURE 3 of this manual.




FIGURE 6 - ADJUSTING THE STABILIZER

ADJUSTING THE STABILIZER (FIGURE 6)


 With the batteries and the user in the wheelchair, grasp the swing arm and pull up. Clearance between the stabilizer wheel and the surface should be 1/8-inch or greater. If the clearance is less than 1/8-inch contact Invacare Dealer for service. See DETAIL "A".

Additional Adjustments for User Preference (DETAIL "B")

- Rotating the locknut that is located on top of the lower spring provides one (1) of the following:
 - A. Rotating the locknut CLOCKWISE provides more resistance of the stabilizer when stopping.
 - B. Rotating the locknut COUNTER-CLOCKWISE

 provides less resistance of the stabilizer when stopping.




FIGURE 7 - BATTERY TRAY

BATTERY TRAY (FIGURE 7)

Installing Battery Tray

- If necessary, remove the shrouds. Refer to <u>REMOV-ING/INSTALLING SHROUDS MWD WHEEL-CHAIRS</u> in PROCEDURE 9 of this manual.
- 2. Turn the battery tray slightly to one (1) side.

NOTE: Make sure the end of the battery tray labeled "FRONT" is towards the front of the wheelchair.

3. Position the battery tray pins over the mounting slots on the hanger brackets.

WARNING

Make sure pins of battery tray are secure in the mounting slots of the hanger bracket, otherwise injury or damage may result.

- 4. Push down on the battery tray to secure in place.
- 5. Install the battery boxes. Refer to <u>INSTALLING/REMOV-ING BATTERY BOXES</u> in this procedure of the manual.
- If necessary, install the shrouds. Refer to <u>REMOVING/INSTALLING SHROUDS MWD WHEELCHAIRS</u> in PROCEDURE 9 of this manual.

LIMITED WARRANTY

PLEASE NOTE: THE WARRANTY BELOW HAS BEEN DRAFTED TO COMPLY WITH FEDERAL LAW APPLICABLE TO PRODUCTS MANUFACTURED AFTER JULY 4, 1975.

This warranty is extended only to the original purchaser/user of our products.

This warranty gives you specific legal rights and you may also have other legal rights which vary from tate to state.

With regards to the original purchaser/user only, Invacare warrants the side frames and crossbraces to be free from defects in materials and workmanship for a period of five (5) years from date of purchase; electronics for a period of one (1) year from the date of purchase; motors and gearboxes for a period of eighteen (18) months for Ranger II models with motors that have motor locks and a period of twelve (12) months for Ranger II models with motors that have clutches from the date of purchase; all remaining components (including gas cylinders for recliners) for one (1) year from the date of purchase except upholstered materials, padded materials and tires/wheels. If within such warranty period any product shall be proven to be defective, such product shall be repaired or replaced, at Invacare's option. This warranty does not include any labor or shipping charges incurred in replacement part installation or repair of any such product. Invacare's sole obligation and your exclusive remedy under this warranty shall be limited to such repair and/or replacement.

For warranty service, please contact the dealer from whom you purchased your Invacare product. In the event you do not receive satisfactory warranty service, please write directly to Invacare at the address on the bottom of the page. Provide dealer's name address, date of purchase, indicate nature of the defect and, if the product is serialized, indicate the serial number. Do not return products to our factory without our prior consent.

LIMITATIONS AND EXCLUSIONS: THE FOREGOING WARRANTY SHALL NOT APPLY TO SERIAL NUMBERED PRODUCTS IF THE SERIAL NUMBER HAS BEEN REMOVED OR DEFACED, PRODUCTS SUBJECT TO NEGLI-GENCE, ACCIDENT, IMPROPER OPERATION, MAINTENANCE OR STORAGE, COMMERCIAL OR INSTITUTIONAL USE, PRODUCTS MODIFIED WITHOUT INVACARE'S EXPRESS WRITTEN CONSENT INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, MODIFICATION THROUGH THE USE OF UNAUTHORIZED PARTS OR ATTACHMENTS; PRODUCTS DAMAGED BY REASON OF REPAIRS MADE TO ANY COMPONENT WITHOUT THE SPECIFIC CONSENT OF INVACARE, OR TO A PRODUCT DAMAGED BY CIRCUMSTANCES BEYOND INVACARE'S CONTROL, AND SUCH EVALUATION WILL BE SOLELY DETERMINED BY INVACARE.
