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User Guide for the Kyocera K132 Phone

FCC Notice

This device complies with part 15 of the FCC rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) This device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation. To maintain compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines, if you wear a handset on your body, use the Kyocera Wireless Corp. (KWC) supplied and approved universal pouch CV90-61344-02(03) or case CV90-M2834-01.

Other accessories used with this device for bodyworn operations must not contain any metallic components and must provide at least 15mm separation distance including the antenna and the user's body.

THIS MODEL PHONE MEETS THE GOVERNMENT'S REQUIREMENTS FOR EXPOSURE TO RADIO WAVES.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission of the U.S. Government. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population.

The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health. The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC is 1.6 W/kg.* Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions specified by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands.

Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network.

In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government-adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. The body-worn SAR values were obtained by using Kyocera Wireless Corp. [KWC] supplied and approved universal pouch CV90-61344-02(03) or case CV90-M2834-01.

Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon availability of accessories and FCC requirements.

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement for safe exposure. The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF emission guidelines. * In the United States and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 1.6 watts/kg (W/kg) averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

Optimize your phone's performance

Use the guidelines on page 2 to learn how to optimize the performance and life of your phone and battery.

Air bags

If you have an air bag, DO NOT place installed or portable phone equipment or other objects over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If equipment is not properly installed, you and your passengers risk serious injury.

Medical devices

Pacemakers—Warning to pacemaker wearers: Wireless phones, when in the 'on' position, have been shown to interfere with pacemakers. The phone should be kept at least six (6) inches away from the pacemaker to reduce risk. The Health Industry Manufacturers Association and the wireless technology research community recommend that you follow these guidelines to minimize the potential for interference.

- Always keep the phone at least six inches (15 centimeters) away from your pacemaker when the phone is turned on.
- Do not carry your phone near your heart.
- · Use the ear opposite the pacemaker.
- If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, turn off your phone immediately.

Hearing aids—Some digital wireless phones may interfere with hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your service provider or call the customer service line to discuss alternatives.

Other medical devices—If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of the device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to help you obtain this information.

In health care facilities—Turn your phone off in health care facilities when instructed. Hospitals and health care facilities may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

Potentially unsafe areas

Posted facilities—Turn your phone off in any facility when posted notices require you to do so.

Aircraft—FCC regulations prohibit using your phone on a plane that is in the air. Turn your phone off or switch it to Airplane Mode before boarding aircraft. Vehicles—RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer of the device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to help you obtain this information. Blasting areas—Turn off your phone where blasting is in progress. Observe restrictions, and follow any regulations or rules.

Potentially explosive atmospheres—Turn off your phone when you are in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. Obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire, resulting in bodily injury or death. Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include:

- fueling areas such as gas stations
- · below deck on boats
- transfer or storage facilities for fuel or chemicals
- vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas, such as propane or butane
- areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust, or metal powders
- any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine

Use with care

Use only in normal position (to ear). Avoid dropping, hitting, bending, or sitting on the phone.

Keep phone dry

If the phone gets wet, turn the power off immediately and contact your dealer. Water damage may not be covered under warranty.

Resetting the phone

If the screen seems frozen and the keypad does not respond to keypresses, reset the phone by completing the following steps:

- 1. Remove the battery door.
- 2. Remove and replace the battery.

If the problem persists, return the phone to the dealer for service.

Accessories

Use only Kyocera-approved accessories with Kyocera phones. Use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and will invalidate the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Radio Frequency (RF) energy

Your telephone is a radio transmitter and receiver. When it is on, it receives and sends out RF energy. Your service provider's network controls the power of the RF signal. This power level can range from 0.006 to 0.6 watts.

In August 1996, the U.S. Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted RF exposure guidelines with safety levels for hand-held wireless phones. These guidelines are consistent with the safety standards previously set by both U.S. and international standards bodies in the following reports:

- ANSI C95.1
 (American National Standards Institute, 1992)
- NCRP Report 86 (National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements, 1986)
- ICNIRP
 (International Commission on Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection, 1996)

Your phone complies with the standards set by these reports and the FCC guidelines.

E911 mandates

Where service is available, this handset complies with the Phase I and Phase II E911 Mandates issued by the FCC.

Hearing Aid Compatibility (HAC) with Mobile Phones

Some mobile phones and hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), when used together, result in buzzing, humming, or whining noises detected by the user. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.

The wireless telephone industry has developed ratings for some of their mobile phones, to assist hearing device users in finding phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated.

Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label on the box. The ratings are not guarantees and results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings— Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings— Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. (Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.) Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you choose the proper rating for your mobile phone. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones. 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Installing the battery

Your Kyocera K132 phone comes with a removable lithium ion (LiIon) battery. Fully charge the battery before using the phone.

To install the battery:

- 1. Hold the phone face down.
- Toward the bottom of the phone there is a recess to aid you in opening the battery door. Use your fingernail to pull the battery door away.
- Place the battery in the phone casing with the metal contacts toward the bottom of the phone.
- 4. Place the battery door tab in the openings near the top of the phone.
- 5. Press the battery door until it clicks into place.

Note: Before you remove the battery, make sure the phone is powered off.



Charging the battery

You must have at least a partial charge in the battery to make or receive calls.

To charge the battery:

 Connect the AC adapter to the jack on the bottom of the phone.



2. Plug the adapter into a wall outlet.

The battery icon in the upper-right corner of the screen tells you whether the phone is:

- Charging (the icon is animated)
- Partially charged
- Fully charged

Note: The battery will not charge if you use the phone while it is connected to an AC adapter.

Note: If you are using a 400 mA charger with any of the following part numbers: CV90-G2968-01; CV90-G2610-02; or CV90-60859-1, please be aware that this power unit is intended to be correctly oriented in a vertical or floor mount position.

Recharging the battery

You can safely recharge the battery at any time, even if it has a partial charge.

Caring for the battery

General safety guidelines

- Do not take apart, puncture, or short-circuit the battery.
- If you have not used the battery for more than a month, recharge it before using your phone.
- Avoid exposing the battery to extreme temperatures, direct sunlight, or high humidity.
- Never dispose of any battery in or near a fire. It could explode.

Common causes of battery drain

- Playing games or using the Web.
- Keeping backlighting on.
- Operating in analog (▲) mode. Your phone switches between modes to find the best signal. To set your phone to operate in a single mode, select Menu → Settings → Network → Digital/Analog.
- Operating in digital mode when far away from a base station or cell site.
- Using data cables or accessories.
- Operating when no service is available, or service is available intermittently.
- High earpiece and ringer volume settings.
- Repeating sound, vibration, or lighted alerts.

Performing basic functions

Turn the phone on and off: Press and hold nutil the phone beeps or plays a tone.

Make a call: Enter the number and press 🙆.

End a call: Press 😭.

Answer a call: Open the flip and press 🙆.

Access voicemail: Press and hold () and follow the system prompts.

Verify your phone number: Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Phone Info.

Silence the ringer on an incoming call:

Press for then for answer.

-or-

Press the side volume key \bigcirc up or down then \bigcirc to answer.

Silent Mode shortcut: Press and hold .

Record a voice memo: Press and hold 🕥 right.


Access Recent Calls list: Press and (2) hold down.

Launch the Browser: Press and () hold left.

Access your custom menu: Press and hold () up. (see "Creating and updating your custom menu" on page 32 for instructions on setting up your custom menu).

Getting to know your phone


- (1) Home screen.
- (2) Left softkey accesses menus and functions.
- (3) Navigation key scrolls through lists and text entry fields and accesses shortcuts from the home screen.
- (4) Send/Talk key starts or answers calls. Press once to activate voice dialing, twice to display the Recent Calls list, and three times to redial the last dialed number.
- (5) Back key erases characters in text entry and returns to the previous screen.
- (6) Keypad for entering numbers, letters, or symbols.
- (7) * Shift key changes the text mode in text entry.
- (8) Right softkey accesses the Contacts directory and other menu options.
- (9) OK key selects a menu item or option.
- (10) End/Power key turns the phone on and off, ends a call or browser session, and returns you to the home screen from other menus.
- (1) **Speakerphone key** activates the speakerphone and answers incoming calls.
- (12) **# Space** key enters a space during text entry. Activates Silent mode.
- (13) 0 Next key cycles through word choices during text entry.
- (14) Jack for AC adapter (included) $\underline{\wedge}$.
 - Warning: Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack will damage the phone.



(15) Antenna (does not extend)

- (16) Jack for hands-free headset and data cable (sold separately) $\underline{\wedge}$.
- (17) Volume key to raise or lower speaker volume.
- (18) External speaker for speakerphone and alerts.

Navigating through menus

- Press the left soft key \bigcirc to select Menu.
- Press (a) left, right, up, or down to view menus and options.
- Press 🕞 to select a menu item.
- Press to back up a menu level.
- Press 🖻 to return to the home screen.

In this guide, an arrow \rightarrow tells you to select an option from a menu.

For example, $Menu \rightarrow Settings$ means select Menu then select the Settings option.

Note: To change the way the menus appear, see "Choosing a menu view" on page 32 for details.

Understanding screen icons

These icons may appear on your phone's home screen.

Making a call

Make sure you are in an area where a signal can be received. Look for "III on the home screen. Note: The more bars you see in this symbol, the stronger the signal. If there are no bars, move to where the signal strength is better.

- 1. Open the flip.
- 2. Enter the phone number and press 🔗.
- 3. Press \bigcirc or close the flip to end the call.

Redialing a number

• Press A three times to redial the last number called.

Calling a saved number

Use your Contacts directory to quickly find a saved number.

- 1. Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select **Contacts**.
- 2. Scroll down the list to find the contact you want to call.
- 3. Highlight the name and press 🖆 to dial the number.

Answering a call

When a call comes in, the phone rings, vibrates, or lights up, depending on your settings. The phone number of the caller appears on the home screen if the flip is open. If the number is stored in your Contacts directory, the contact name also appears.

- 1. Open the flip.
- 2. Press ♠ to answer the incoming call.

Press 😈 to answer the incoming call and turn on the speakerphone simultaneously.

Setting Open to Answer

The default setting of your phone requires you to press (a) to answer an incoming call. You can set the phone to answer immediately when you open the flip.

- Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Convenience \rightarrow Open to Answer \rightarrow Enabled.
 - Select **Disabled** to have the phone continue ringing when you open the flip.

Silencing an incoming call

Press
 or
 or
 to silence the call.
 Note: In the absence of voicemail, this feature
 drops the call.

- or -

• Press . to silence the call then press a to answer it.

Either action silences only the current call. The next call will ring according to your settings.

Adjusting the volume during a call

• To adjust the earpiece volume during a call, press or (a) up or down.

Using the speakerphone

Your Kyocera K132 phone has a built-in speakerphone that you can use during a call when the flip is open.

Note: This function works only for the current call. Once the call is ended, the speakerphone turns off and the earpiece volume returns to normal.

- 1. Open the flip.

- or -

Press 💽 to turn on the speakerphone at any time during a call.

To turn off the speakerphone, press 🛐.

Setting the phone to hold calls

The Hold Call feature allows you to place incoming calls on hold until you are ready to answer them.

Note: This feature will not work if "Open to Answer" is enabled. See "Setting Open to Answer" on page 7.

- $\label{eq:select} \begin{array}{l} \mbox{Select Menu} \to \mbox{Settings} \to \mbox{Convenience} \to \\ \mbox{Hold Call} \to \mbox{Enabled}. \end{array}$
- 2. If you have not recorded a hold message, you will be prompted to record one, such as "Please hold. I'll answer in a minute."
 - **a.** Press the left soft key \bigcirc to select **Record**.
 - $\textbf{b.} \ \ Record \ the \ message \ and \ select \ \textbf{Save}.$
 - $\textbf{c.} \hspace{0.1 cm} \text{Select} \hspace{0.1 cm} \textbf{OK} \hspace{0.1 cm} \text{to record the message again.} \\$
 - d. Select Save or Options (Play, Re-Record, or Exit).

The next time a call comes in, you will have the option of placing it on hold.

Placing a call on hold

You can place a call on hold once you have enabled this feature.

Note: If you are already on a call and you receive another call, you cannot place the incoming call on hold. It will go to voicemail.

When a call comes in, press the right soft key
 O to select Hold Call. The caller will be

placed on hold and will hear your recorded hold message.

2. To speak to the caller, select Answer. - or -

To hang up without speaking to the caller, select **End Call**.

Changing the hold message

- Select Menu → Settings → Convenience → Hold Call → Re-Record Msg and follow the prompts.
- 2. Record the message twice.
- 3. Select Save or Options (Play, Re-Record, or Exit).

Dealing with missed calls

When you have missed a call, "Missed Call" appears on your screen unless the caller leaves a voicemail.

- To clear the screen, open the flip and press the left soft key ⊙ to select OK.
- To return the call, highlight the number and press *≧*.

Setting missed call alerts

You can set an alert to beep every five minutes after you have missed a call.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Missed Call Alert
- **2.** Highlight an option and press \bigcirc .

Viewing recent call details

Details on the last 30 calls you made, received, or missed are stored in the Recent Calls list and are identified by the following icons:

- G→ Outgoing call G← Incoming call
- **X** Missed call (flashing)

Viewing recent calls

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Recent Calls.
- 2. Select a list: All Calls, Incoming Calls, Outgoing Calls, or Missed Calls.
- Highlight a recent call and press the right soft key ⊙ to select Options:
 - Save adds the phone number to the Contacts list.
 - Send Msg allows you to send a text message to the phone number.
 - Erase erases the selected call record.

Note: If the phone number has been classified as "secret," you must enter your four-digit lock code to view or edit it. For information on the lock code, see "Changing your lock code" on page 34. To classify a phone number as secret, see "Creating a new contact" on page 17.

Calling recent calls

- 1. Open the flip.
- 2. Press and hold 🗿 down.
- 3. Highlight a number to call and press 🔗.

Erasing recent calls

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Recent Calls \rightarrow Erase Call Lists.
- 2. Select an option: All Calls, Incoming Calls, Outgoing Calls, or Missed Calls.
- 3. Press the left soft key 💽 to select Yes.

Speed dialing

Before you can use speed dialing, you must save a phone number as a contact and assign a speed dial location to it.

• To add a speed dial location to a saved or new contact, see "Customizing a phone number" on page 19.

Using speed dialing

To call a contact that has a speed dial location:

 From the home screen, enter the one- or twodigit speed dialing location and press

1-Touch dialing

1-Touch dialing is the fastest way to call a saved contact.

Note: You must (1) enable 1-Touch dialing on your phone and (2) have a speed dial location assigned to a contact.

Enabling 1-Touch dialing

• Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Convenience \rightarrow 1-Touch Dialing \rightarrow Enabled.

Using 1-Touch dialing

To call a contact that has a speed dial location:

From the home screen, press and hold the speed dialing number. If it is a two-digit number, press the first digit briefly, then press and hold the second digit. For example, if the speed dialing location is 15, press the briefly then press and hold Example.

Setting up voicemail

Before your phone can receive voicemail messages, you must set up a password and record a personal greeting with your service provider. All unanswered calls to your phone are then automatically transferred to voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off.

- 1. From the home screen, press and hold 💷
- 2. Follow the system prompts to create a password and record a greeting.

Note: If you have trouble accessing your voicemail, contact your service provider.

Checking voicemail messages

When a voice message is received, your screen displays "New Messages" along with the Symbol at the top of your screen. The symbol flashes if the message is urgent.

If you see "New Messages" on your screen

- 1. Press the left soft key ⊙ to select Call and call your voicemail number.
- 2. Press when you hear your greeting.
- 3. Follow the prompts to retrieve the message.

To clear the screen without checking messages:

• Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select Ignore.

If you see only the 🖂 symbol

- 1. Press and hold to call to your voicemail number.
- 2. Follow the prompts to retrieve the message.

Note: You can set the phone to beep or vibrate every five minutes to remind you that you have a voicemail message. See "Setting message alerts" on page 31.

Calling emergency services

Regardless of your 3-digit emergency code (911, 111, 999, 000, etc.), your phone operates as described below.

Dial your 3-digit emergency code and press *⊆*.

You can call the code even if your phone is locked, has no balance, or your account is restricted. When you call, your phone enters **Emergency mode**. This enables the emergency service exclusive access to your phone to call you back, if necessary. To make or receive regular calls after dialing the code, you must exit this mode.

To exit Emergency mode

When you have completed the emergency call:

- 1. Press the left soft key 💽 to select Exit.
- 2. Press the left soft key ⊙ again to confirm your choice.

Note: To determine who has access to your location, see "Setting position location" on page 36.

Using your phone in an airplane

While in an airplane, it is normally required that you turn off your mobile phone because it emits RF signals that interfere with air traffic control.

In Airplane mode, however, your phone will not emit RF signals. You cannot make or receive calls, send text messages, or use the Web, but you can play games, use the Scheduler, set the clock, and make emergency calls to designated emergency numbers.

Note: Please check with uniformed personnel before operating your phone in Airplane mode.

Setting Airplane mode

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Convenience \rightarrow Airplane Mode.
- 2. Press the left soft key 🕥 to select OK after reading the message.
- 3. Select Enabled or Disabled.
- 4. Select Yes or No to set the date and time.
- 5. Press the left soft key \bigcirc to select Done.

Tracking calls

You can track the number and duration of calls made and received on your phone.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Recent Calls.
- 2. Select a timer:

 - All Calls Timer tracks all calls you have made and received. This timer cannot be reset.
 - Home Calls Timer tracks all calls you have made while your phone is not roaming. To reset this timer, press the left soft key ⊙ to select Reset. This will reset both the Home Calls and the Roam Calls Timer.

— Roam Calls Timer tracks all the roam calls you have made. To reset this timer, press the left soft key ⊙ to select Reset. This will reset both the Home Calls and the Roam Calls Timer.

Timing your calls

You can set your phone to beep 10 seconds before each minute passes when you are on a call.

Understanding roaming

Setting an alert for roaming

The phone can alert you when you roam outside of your home service area.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Network \rightarrow Roam/Svc Alert.
- 2. Select an option and press 🕞 .
 - When no svc alerts you with three tones decreasing in pitch when service is lost and three tones increasing in pitch when service is acquired again.
 - On roam change alerts you with two decreasing tones when roaming service is acquired and three increasing tones when home area service is acquired again.

 On any change alerts you with three increasing tones if there is a change in roaming service or three decreasing tones if the phone loses service.

Setting the roam ringer

You can set a ringer to indicate when an incoming call will be subject to roaming charges.

• Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Roam Ringer \rightarrow Enabled. You will hear the ringer.

Setting Call Guard

You can set the phone to warn you before you answer or place a call while roaming.

- $\label{eq:select} \begin{array}{l} \bullet & {\rm Select} \; {\rm Menu} \to {\rm Settings} \to {\rm Convenience} \to \\ {\rm Call} \; {\rm Guard} \to {\rm Call} \; {\rm Prompt}. \end{array}$
 - The phone now emits a distinctive roam ring to indicate when you are roaming during calls.
 - To accept or place a call while roaming, you must press .

Note: Call Prompt is disabled when the phone is in emergency mode.

Setting digital or analog mode

Depending on services available from your service provider, you may set the phone to either digital or analog mode. This is useful if you are in an area that borders on digital service and the automatic feature is causing the phone to keep switching between modes.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Network \rightarrow Digital/Analog.
- **2**. Select an option and press \bigcirc .
 - **Automatic** automatically switches the phone between digital and analog.
 - Digital only sets the phone to work in digital mode only.

Turning roaming on or off

This setting allows you to control the phone's roaming feature by specifying which signals the phone will accept.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Network \rightarrow Roam Option.
- 2. Select an option and press 🕞 .
 - Automatic (recommended setting) accepts any system the phone service provides.
 - No roaming prevents you from making or receiving calls outside of your home service area.


Note: If your phone has more than one setting for Automatic, contact you service provider to determine which one to use.

3 ENTERING LETTERS, NUMBERS, AND SYMBOLS

You can enter letters, numbers, and symbols in contacts, text messages, and your banner.

Understanding text entry screens

The current text entry mode (and capitalization setting, when applicable) is indicated by an icon.



Text entry modes

There are six text entry modes:

- ACase change123Numbers onlyabcNormal alphaeZiRapid Entry
- ه: Add Symbol د: Add Smiley

Note: The mode you start in depends on the task you are performing. For example, when entering a phone number, you're in number mode. When entering a name for a contact, you're in normal text mode. See "Changing modes" on page 15.

123 Entering numbers

- To enter a number while in 1₂3 mode, press a number key once.
- To enter a number while in abc or eZi mode, press and hold a number key until the number appears on the screen.

$\mathbf{a}_b \mathbf{c}$ Entering words letter by letter

- Press a key once for the first letter, twice for the second letter, and so on. If your phone is set to Spanish, French, or Portuguese, accented letters are available.
- 2. Wait for the cursor to move right, then enter the next letter.

Note: To enter a space, press \fbox .

eZi Entering words quickly

When you press a series of keys using e_{Zi} mode, e_{Zi} checks its dictionary of common words and guesses at the word you are trying to spell.

- For each letter of the word you want, press the key once. For example, to enter the word "any" press end → end → end → end .
- If the word doesn't match what you want, press out to look at other word matches.
- 3. When you see the word you want, press \blacksquare .

&?! Entering symbols

@?!-,&:'1

To access the full set of symbols:

- 1. From the text entry screen, select Options.
- 2. Select &?! Add Symbol.
- 3. Press 🗿 down to view the list of symbols.
- 4. Press the number key corresponding to the symbol you want.

Entering smileys ئ

- 1. From the text entry screen, select Options.
- Select Select Add Smiley.
- 3. Press 🙆 down to view the list of smileys.
- 4. Press the number key that corresponds to the smiley you want.

Switching default text entry modes

You can change the default text entry mode when creating a text message. This setting applies only to the message body screen, not the "To" screen.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Messages \rightarrow Msg Settings \rightarrow Default Text.
- 2. Select Normal Alpha or Rapid Mode.

Changing modes

Sometimes you need to change modes. For example, to enter numbers in an email address while in ^{abc} mode, you must change to 1₂3 mode, enter the numbers, and then change back to ^{abc} mode to complete the address.

To change text entry modes:

- Press and hold until the icon for the mode you want appears.
 -or-
- Select **Options**, then select a different mode.

Capitalization settings

You can change your capitalization setting at any time while entering text. Press end to choose upper or lower case while in ^{abc} Normal Alpha mode.

4 STORING CONTACTS

Use your phone's Contacts directory to store information about a person or company. Each contact entry can have up to six phone numbers, two email addresses, two Web addresses, two street addresses, and a space for notes.

Creating a new contact

- 1. From the home screen, enter the phone number you want to save, including the area code.
- **2**. Press the left soft key \bigcirc to select **Save**.
- 3. Press 🕞 to select Save New Contact.
- 4. Enter a name for the contact.
 - If you need to learn how to enter letters, see "Understanding text entry screens" on page 14.
 - To add a symbol or smiley to the contact name, or to change the text entry mode, press the right soft key to select **Options**.
- 5. Either save now or add more contact information.
 - To save now, press the left soft key ⊙ to select Save.
 - To enter additional phone numbers, email and Web addresses, or notes, press (2) down repeatedly. For help switching between numbers and letters for email or Web addresses, see "Changing modes" on page 15.

Adding a code or extension

When you save the phone number of an automated service, you may include a pause to stop dialing, such as when waiting to dial an extension.

- 1. From the home screen, enter the first portion of the phone number.
- **2.** Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select **Options**.
- 3. Select a type of pause:
 - 👅 Time Pause
 - 🛛 🕀 Hard Pause
- 4. Enter the remaining numbers.
- 5. Press the left soft key \bigcirc to select Save.

Customizing your contacts

You can customize each contact in your Contacts directory by assigning ringers, pictures, and number types, or by classifying your contacts as Personal or Business.

Assigning ringers

- 1. Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select **Contacts**.
- **2**. Highlight a contact and press \bigcirc .
- 3. Highlight the contact name and press the right soft key ⊙ to select **Options**.
- 4. Select Ringer \rightarrow Assign Ringer.
- Scroll down the list to hear the different ringers and press (to select one.

Assigning pictures

- 1. Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select **Contacts**.
- 2. Highlight a contact and press 🕞 .
- 3. Highlight the contact name and press the right soft key ⊙ to select **Options**.
- 4. Select Picture \rightarrow Assign Picture \rightarrow Images.
- 5. Select Saved Images or Caller IDs.

Note: With Kyocera Mobile PhoneTools, you can transfer digital pictures to your phone. To purchase MPT or other accessories, visit www.kyocera-wireless.com/store.

6. Scroll through the list to view your options and press ⊕ to assign it to your contact.

Classifying contacts as Personal or Business

- 1. Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select **Contacts**.
- **2**. Highlight a contact and press \bigcirc .
- 3. Highlight the contact name and press the right soft key ⊙ to select **Options**.
- 4. Select Classify.
- 5. Select Personal or Business and press \odot .

Note: To assign Personal or Business ringers, see "Assigning business and personal ringers" on page 29.

Assigning number types

When you assign a number type, an icon is placed in front of a contact number to specify the type of number, such as work, home, or mobile.

- 1. Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select **Contacts**.
- 2. Highlight a contact and press 🕞 .
- 3. Highlight the contact number and press the left soft key ⊙ to select Edit.
- 4. Press 🛞 down once and press 🕞 .
- Highlight an option to designate the number as General, Work, Home, Mobile, Pager, or Fax and press . The associated icon will appear next to the number in your Contacts directory and Recent Calls list.

6. Press the left soft key \bigcirc to select Save.

Editing a contact

- 1. Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select **Contacts**.
- 2. Highlight a contact and press 🕞 .
- 3. Highlight the contact name or number and press the left soft key ⊙ to select Edit.
- Enter your changes and press the left soft key
 to select Save.

Erasing a contact

- 1. Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select **Contacts**.
- 2. Highlight the contact to erase and press \odot .
- 3. Select Options.
- 4. Highlight Erase Contact and press 🕞 .
- 5. Press the left soft key \bigcirc to confirm.

Customizing a phone number

- 1. Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select **Contacts**.
- **2**. Highlight the contact to edit and press \bigcirc .
- 3. Press 🕥 down to highlight the number.
- **4.** Press the right soft key \bigcirc to select **Options**.
- 5. Highlight an option and press 💮 :
 - Call to call the contact.
 - Send Text Msg brings you to the text messaging screen.
 - Add Speed Dial assigns or removes the speed dial location.
 - View Number to see the selected phone number.
 - **Erase Number** erases the number from the contact.
 - Secret makes the number secret so that it will not appear on the screen until the lock code is entered. Secret numbers can be called without a lock code. (For more information, see "Limiting calls" on page 35.)

- Primary Number makes this number the first one that shows up when you open the contact.
- Add to Group... allows you to add the contact to a caller group that you have defined. For more information on caller groups, see "Using caller groups" on page 20.
- Add Voice Dial to record a voice tag so you can call a contact using voice recognition (VR). For more information, see page 37.
- **Erase Voice Dial** erases the voice tag associated with the number.
- Edit Voice Dial records a new voice tag.
- 6. Enter the new information and follow the prompts.
- 7. Select Save, if necessary.

Finding contact information

To find a phone number or contact, you can (1) check the Frequent list, (2) search the Contacts directory, or (3) use Fast Find.

Checking the Frequent List

From the home screen, select **Contacts**. The last 15 of your most frequently called contacts appear when the Frequent List is enabled. Scroll past the double line to view the All Contacts list.

To enable the Frequent List setting

 $\label{eq:select} \begin{array}{l} \bullet & {\rm Select} \; {\rm Menu} \to {\rm Settings} \to {\rm Convenience} \to \\ {\rm Frequent} \; {\rm List} \to {\rm Enabled}. \end{array}$

Searching the Contacts directory

 Select Contacts for a list of all contacts. To quickly get down the list, enter the first letter of the contact. The menu skips to that letter of the alphabet.

- or -

 $\text{Select Menu} \rightarrow \text{Contacts}.$

- 2. Select a search method:
 - View All lists all saved contacts.
 - View Groups, Speed Dial List, Voice Dial List selects a contact from the specified list.
- 3. Highlight a contact and press \bigcirc .
 - To call the contact, highlight the number and press a.

Setting Fast Find

With Fast Find, you press one or two keys to view close matches of the number you are looking for.

 $\label{eq:select} \begin{array}{l} \bullet \quad \mbox{Select Menu} \to \mbox{Settings} \to \mbox{Convenience} \to \\ \mbox{Fast Find} \to \mbox{Enabled}. \end{array}$

Using Fast Find

 From the home screen, press the keys corresponding to the letters of the name you want to find. A matching contact or speed dial entry appears.

- 2. Press (a) down to scroll through matching entries.
- 3. Highlight the name you want then press 🝙 to call the number.

Using caller groups

Caller groups are a way to organize your contacts into groups that can then share a common ring tone or graphic.

Note: Your phone comes with two groups already defined, **Business** and **Personal**.

Creating a caller group

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Contacts \rightarrow View Groups.
- 2. Press the left option button \bigcirc to select New.
- 3. Enter a name for the group.
 - If you need to learn how to enter letters, see "Understanding text entry screens" on page 14.
 - To add a symbol or smiley to the contact name, or to change the text entry mode, press the right option button O to select Options.
- **4.** Press the left option button \bigcirc to select Next.
- Press (a) down to scroll through your saved contacts. Press the left option button (a) to Add a contact to the group. A check mark appears next to the name.

Note: To remove a checked contact from the group, press the left option button \bigcirc again to select Remove.

Note: If a contact you are trying to add already belongs to another group, an alert dialog appears. To continue adding the contact to the new group, select **Yes**. To abort, select **No**.

 Press the right option button ⊙ to select Done and save the group.

Editing a caller group

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Contacts \rightarrow View Groups.
- Press () down to scroll through the list of groups. When you come to the group you wish to edit, press the right option button () to select Options → Edit.
- **3.** Follow Steps 3 through 6 under "Creating a caller group" on page 20 to edit the group.

Assigning a ring tone to a caller group

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Contacts \rightarrow View Groups.
- 3. Select Options \rightarrow Ringer \rightarrow Assign ringer.
- Press (3) up and down to scroll through the list of available ring tones. When you come to the desired ring tone, press (3).

Note: You can assign ringtones to the Business or Personal caller group by selecting Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Business ringtones or Personal ringtones.

5 SENDING AND RECEIVING TEXT MESSAGES

This chapter describes how to send, receive, and erase text messages from your phone. For information on voicemail messages, see "Setting up voicemail" on page 10.

Important: The features and menus described in this chapter may vary depending on services available in your area. Check with your service provider for details and possible usage charges.

Sending text messages

You can only send text messages to phones that are capable of receiving them or to email addresses.

Creating a text message

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Messages \rightarrow New Text Msg.
- 2. Enter a recipient's phone number or email address:
 - Select Options to access your Recent List, Contacts, or Group Lists and press . Select a contact and press . Highlight the number field and press . For more about group lists, see "Creating a caller group" on page 20.
 - Enter a New Address manually. (To learn how to enter text, see "Understanding text entry screens" on page 14.)

- **3.** Add another recipient if desired:
 - Press the right soft key ⊙ to select
 Options then select Recent List, Contacts, or Group Lists.

- or -

 Enter a space or comma after the first number then enter another recipient manually.

Note: You can send a message to up to 10 contacts at once. The messages will be sent one at a time, once to each addressee.

- 4. When you are done entering addresses, press ⊕ twice.
- 5. Enter the message. To learn how to enter text, see "Understanding text entry screens" on page 14.

- or -

Add QuickText, symbols, or emoticons in your message. See "Including prewritten text and symbols" for information.

 Press the left soft key
 to select Send. See "Setting sending options" for information about how and when you want the message to be received.

Including prewritten text and symbols

During text entry, you can add QuickText, symbols, or emoticons in your message.

- 1. From the text entry screen, select Options.
- 2. Select an option and press 🕞 .

 - Add Symbol: Scroll through the list and press the corresponding number key to select it.
 - Add Smiley: Scroll through the list and press the corresponding number key to select it.
- When you have finished your message, select Send. See "Setting sending options" for information about how and when you want the message to be received.

Setting sending options

When you are ready to send a message, you have several options for how and when you want the message to be received.

- 1. Once you have completed the message, select **Options**:
 - Add Address returns to the "Send To" screen to add another recipient without losing the message. Select Options to access your Recent List, Contacts, or Group Lists and press (a). Select a contact and press (a). Highlight the number field and press (a).
 - Save Message saves the message in your Drafts folder. This prevents the message from being deleted if you have activated AutoErase and enables you to send the message to others.

- Save QuickText saves the message you have just entered as a prewritten message then returns to the message entry screen so you can send the message.
- Settings allows you to choose from the following after pressing (...):
 - **Request Receipt** to request notification when the message has been received.
 - Set Priority labels the message as "Urgent."
 - Callback Number includes a callback number with the message to let recipients know at what number they can call you back. Select OK to include your own number or Edit to enter a different callback number.
 - Send Later schedules a time to send the message.
 - Validity Period defines the expiration period limit for a message.
- When you have finished setting options, press the right soft key

 to return to the message window.
- 3. Press the left soft key \bigcirc to select Send.

Adding a signature

The signature you create is included at the end of all outgoing messages and is counted as characters in your messages; however, it does not appear in the message creation screen. To create a signature:


- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Messaging \rightarrow Signature.
- 2. Enter your signature in the text field.
- 3. Select OK to save the setting.

Note: The characters in the signature are included in the total character count of the message. See the note under step 5 in "Creating a text message" on page 22.

If you cannot send messages

You may not be able to send or receive messages if your phone's memory is nearly full, or if digital service is not available at the time. To free up memory, erase old messages. See "Erasing messages" on page 27.

Understanding appended messages



If you go over the character limit for a single message, the phone may automatically append an empty segment to your message to make space.

Important: Your service provider will charge you for each message segment.

When you start a message, the maximum character limit appears once you are in the message entry field. This number counts down as you enter characters, until it reaches 0. If you continue to enter text after this counter reaches 0, a message segment may be appended. When you reach the message size limit, you are prompted to edit the message or alerted that the message is being appended.

Receiving incoming calls while creating messages

- If you don't wish to answer the call, press the right soft key () to select **Ignore**. The phone returns to the message screen.

Viewing your sent messages

To save your outgoing messages, you must first enable Save to Sent.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Messages \rightarrow Msg Settings \rightarrow Save to Sent.
- 2. Select an option and press 🕞 .
 - Disabled is the default setting. Outgoing messages are not saved.
 - Prompt allows you to choose whether or not to save your message when you send it.

 Enabled automatically saves all successfully sent messages in the Sent folder.

To view successfully sent messages:

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Messages \rightarrow Sent.
- Press () up or down through the list of messages. One of the following symbols appears next to each message:

╚	The scheduled message will be sent at
\cup	the scheduled time. You cannot
	cancel delivery of the message.

- The scheduled message has been sent and will be delivered as scheduled. You cannot cancel delivery of the message.
- The message has been received.
- The message has been received and opened. (This symbol may not be available. Check with your service provider.)
- The message has been sent to more than one recipient.
- The message has never been sent or has not been sent since it was last modified. You can cancel delivery of the message.

Viewing failed or pending messages

Failed or pending messages are stored in your OutBox.

To view your OutBox:

- Select Menu → Messages → OutBox. A list of all failed or pending messages appears.
- Scroll through the list of messages and press
 to read one. One of the following symbols appears next to each message:
- The message is pending and will be sent when possible. You can cancel delivery of the message.
- X The message cannot be sent because service is not available. An alert appears on your phone if the message cannot be sent.

Retrieving text messages

When a text message is received, your screen displays "New Messages" with the 🖂 symbol at the top of your screen. The symbol flashes if the message is urgent.

If you see the "New Messages" note

- To Ignore the message, press the right soft key ⊙.

Note: If you receive a new message while you are reading a message, the one you are reading will be replaced by the new one. You can find the older message in the InBox:

 $\bullet \quad \text{Select Menu} \to \text{Messages} \to \text{InBox}.$

If you see the 🖂 symbol

- Select Menu → Messages → InBox. A list of all your received messages appears.
 - ______ indicates an "Urgent" message.
- Scroll through the list of messages and press
 to read one.

Reading the message

The options available to you may vary. Check with your service provider.

- If the text message is long, press (a) down to view the entire message.
- When you are finished, you can Reply to the sender, Erase the message, Save the message to your Saved folder, or set additional Options for the message:
 - Erase the message.
 - Lock Msg to protect the message from being accidentally deleted.
 - Forward the message.
 - Reply with Copy to reply to the message with a copy of the original attached.
 - Save Message to save the message.

- Save as QuickText to save the text from the message as QuickText, which you can insert into other messages. Graphics and sound are not saved as part of QuickText. (For more about QuickText, see page 27.)
- View Sender information.
- 3. Select Done.

Setting message alerts

You can set your phone to alert you of incoming text messages or pages. For more information, see "Setting message alerts" on page 31.

Blocking unwanted messages

You can block messages from particular senders by adding their addresses to a "block list."

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Messaging \rightarrow Block Msgs.
- 2. Do one of the following:
 - To block an address, select Block Address and enter the address into the provided field.
 - To unblock an address, select Unblock Address and enter the address into the provided field.
 - To see a list of blocked addresses, select Get List.

Erasing messages

It is a good idea to erase old messages to free up memory in your phone.

You have the option of erasing text messages and pages as you send or read them, erasing them one at a time from the list in the OutBox or InBox, or erasing them all at once.

Erasing single messages

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Messages.
- 3. Highlight the message to erase and press \bigcirc .
- 4. Select Options.
- Select Erase to erase the message. A notification appears: "Erase this message?"
- 6. Select Yes to erase the message.

Note: You can erase a scheduled message from the **OutBox**, but you cannot cancel delivery of the message.

Erasing all messages

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Messages \rightarrow Erase Messages.
- Select a folder from which to erase all messages: InBox, Sent, OutBox, Saved Folder, Drafts Folder, or All Messages. To erase messages from all folders, select All Messages.
- 3. A message appears: "Erase all messages?" Select Yes to erase messages or No to cancel.

Erasing messages automatically

Use this setting to have old messages automatically erased from the InBox, Sent Msgs folder, or both when memory is low.

 Select Menu → Messages → Msg Settings → Auto-Erase → Old InBox Msgs/Sent Msgs/Both. Older messages will be erased as new messages are received.

Creating and editing prewritten messages (QuickText)

Your phone comes with prewritten (QuickText) messages, such as "Please call me," which you can insert into the body of a text message. You can edit these messages and create new ones.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Messages \rightarrow Msg Settings \rightarrow Edit QuickText.
- 2. To create a new pre-written message, select New Msg.

- or -

To edit an existing pre-written message, highlight the message and select **Edit**.

 Enter or edit the text and press the left soft key

 to select Done. For help entering text, see
 "Understanding text entry screens" on page 14.

Note: You can also save a message you have written or received as QuickText. See "Setting sending options" on page 23 or "Reading the message" on page 26.

Silencing all sounds

Your phone is set to make sounds when you receive calls, press keys, navigate through menus, and receive alerts (such as new messages). You can silence all sounds and set the phone to vibrate or light up when you receive calls and alerts.

Setting the phone to vibrate or light up

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Silent Mode.
- **2**. Choose an option and press \bigcirc :
 - Vibrate Only: The phone vibrates for the duration of the incoming call or other alert. appears on the home screen.
 - Vibe then Ring: The phone vibrates for the first 10 seconds and then rings for the remainder of the incoming call alert.
 appears on the home screen.
 - Lights Only: The phone lights up for the duration of the incoming call or other alert. 🔆 appears on the home screen.
 - Normal Sounds: The phone rings for the incoming call or alert (in effect, returns phone to a non-silent mode).

Note: The phone will ring when it is attached to an external power source (such as a charger), even if all sounds have been silenced.

Shortcut to Vibrate Only mode

• Press and hold 📖 .

Turning sounds back on

• Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Silent Mode \rightarrow Normal Sounds.

- or -

Press and hold .

Choosing ringers

Your Kyocera K132 phone has pre-programmed ringers you can choose to use for incoming calls.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Ringer Type.
- 2. Scroll down the list to hear the different ringers and press (a) to select one.

Note: Downloaded ringers are added to the end of the standard list of ringers.

Assigning business and personal ringers

You can assign ringers to contacts classified as Business or Personal in your Contacts directory.

Note: To classify a contact as Business or Personal, see "Classifying contacts as Personal or Business" on page 18.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds.
- 2. Highlight Business Ringer or Personal Ringer and press 🕞 .
- 3. Select a ringer and press 🕞 .

Importing ringers

You can download additional ringers to your phone using the Kyocera Mobile PhoneTools software, if available (sold separately). To purchase this software and other accessories, visit www.kyocera-wireless.com/store.

Setting sounds for your phone

You can set your phone to sound tones when you open and close the flip and when you turn the phone on and off. Sounds will not occur during an incoming call, if you are on a call, or if a headset or car kit is attached to your phone.

Set sound when flip opens

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Flip Open.
- Scroll through the list to hear the sounds and press imes to select one.

Set sound when flip closes

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Flip Closed.
- Scroll through the list to hear the sounds and press imes to select one.

Set sound when phone powers on or off

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- To deselect this sound, select Disabled.

Adjusting volume

You can adjust the earpiece, speakerphone, and ringer volume as well as key tones.

Adjusting the earpiece volume

To adjust the earpiece volume manually during a call, press the core key up or down.

To set the earpiece volume:

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Earpiece Volume.
- Press (a) right to increase the volume or left to decrease the volume and select Save.

Using smart sound

You can set a baseline volume that the phone uses to automatically adjust the earpiece volume when there is a change in the amount of noise around you or the caller's voice.

Adjusting the ringer volume

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Ringer Volume.
- 2. Press () right to increase the volume or left to decrease the volume and select **Save**.

Adjusting speakerphone volume

1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Spkrphone Volume.

2. Press () right to increase the volume or left to decrease the volume and select **Save**.

Adjusting key tone volume

You can change the volume of the tones the phone makes when you press the keys.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Key Volume.
- Press () right to increase the volume, or left to decrease the volume and select Save.

Setting key length

You can change duration of the tones the phone makes when you press the keys.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Key Length.
- 2. Choose Normal or Long and press \bigcirc .

Setting key sound

You can choose the sound the phone makes when you press the keys.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow Key Sound.
- 2. Choose Tone, Click, or Off and press \bigodot .

Setting DTFM tone

You can turn on or off the ability for your phone to make DTFM tones.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Sounds \rightarrow DTMF Tone.
- 2. Choose On or Off and press 🕞 .

Setting message alerts

You can choose how you want be alerted of incoming voicemail, pages, or text messages.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Messaging \rightarrow Alerts.
- 2. Select the type of alert and press : Message Alert, Page Alert, or Voicemail Alert.
- 3. Select an option:
 - Vibrate, Beep, Freeway!, Game!, Bloop, Winner!, and Zilofon! sets the phone to vibrate, beep, or play a tune once when a new message is received.
 - Options with Remind set the phone to notify you once when a new message is received and then notify you again every five minutes. To stop a reminder alert, press the right soft key ⊙ to select Ignore.
 - Disabled turns off message alerts.

Using shortcuts

From the home screen, press () in one of four directions to access three shortcuts and one custom menu.

Up	Access your Custom Menu
Down	Access Recent Calls
Left	Access Messaging
Right	Record voice memo

Creating and updating your custom menu

You can create a custom menu that contains your favorite features. After you set up your menu, simply press and hold O up to access it.

- 2. Select Manage List.

You may select more than one feature. Items appear in alphabetical order in the menu.

4. Select Save changes.

Choosing a different language

Your phone may display alternative languages.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow Language.
- **2**. Select a language and press \bigcirc .

Personalizing the screen

Changing your banner

Your personal banner appears on the home screen above the time and date and can be up to 14 characters long.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow My Banner.
- 2. Select Edit.
- 3. Press 🗔 to clear the screen.

- 4. Enter your new text. See "Understanding text entry screens" on page 14.
- 5. Select Save.

Choosing a menu view

You can change the appearance of your phone's menus:

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow Main Menu View.
- 2. Select an option and press 💮 :
 - Graphic displays icons of each menu item, with its name at the bottom of the screen.
 - List displays a list of each menu item.
- Press a to return to the home screen. The next time you select Menu, you will see the menu view you selected.

Adjusting the backlighting

Your screen lights up while you are in a call or when you press a key on the keypad. However, you can set the duration and brightness of backlighting.

- 2. Select an option and press 🕞 :
 - 7 seconds, 15 seconds, or 30 seconds turns backlighting on for 7, 15, or 30 seconds after your last keypress.

 7 sec. & in call, 15 sec. & in call, or 30 sec. & in call turns backlighting on for the duration of a call and for 7, 15, or 30 seconds after your last keypress.

Note: The "in call" settings drain the battery more quickly.

Using Power Save Mode

You can conserve battery life by activating Power Save mode. The backlighting appears for the selected duration, but is less bright than with Power Save off.

• Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow Backlighting \rightarrow Pwr Save Mode \rightarrow On.

Setting power backlighting

You can set backlighting to remain on when an external power source, such as the AC adapter, is used with the phone.

Note: Power backlighting may not be available with the optional desktop charger or other accessories.

- $\label{eq:select} \begin{array}{l} \bullet & {\rm Select} \; {\rm Menu} \to {\rm Settings} \to {\rm Accessories} \to \\ {\rm Pwr} \; {\rm Backlighting} \to {\rm Always} \; {\rm On}. \end{array}$
 - To disable this feature, select Normal.

Note: The battery charges more slowly when power backlighting is on.

Changing the display contrast

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow Contrast.
- 2. Press (a) left or right to adjust the contrast and select **Save**.

Changing the display brightness

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow Brightness.
- 2. Press 💿 left or right to adjust the brightness and select Save.

Setting numbers to auto-hyphenate

Auto-hyphenation (when enabled) automatically inserts hyphens into your phone numbers to be consistent with the U.S. dialing plan. For example, 1-222-333-4444.

• Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow Auto-Hyphen \rightarrow Enabled.

Selecting a screen saver

Screen savers appear on the home screen when the flip is open and are activated 10 seconds after the last keypress. Incoming calls and alerts override screen savers.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow Screen Saver.
- 2. Highlight a screen saver and press . The image appears.
- 3. Press 🕞 to assign the screen saver.
- Press to return to the home screen and wait 10 seconds to view the selected screen saver.

Note: Downloaded screen savers are added to the end of the list.

Selecting wallpaper

Wallpaper appears as background on the home screen.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow Wallpaper.
- 2. Highlight a wallpaper design and press \odot .
- 3. Select Assign to save your selection.

Selecting a color theme

You can select a color theme for the display background of your phone.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow Color Themes.
- Scroll through the options to view the color themes and press to select one.

Choosing a different time/date format

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Display \rightarrow Time/Date Format.
- **2.** Highlight an option press \bigcirc .

Creating a secure environment

This section describes all the features involved in securing your phone and preventing access to personal information. All security features are shielded by a four-digit lock code.

Changing your lock code

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The lock code is typically 0000 or the last 4 digits of your phone number.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Security.
- 2. Enter your four-digit lock code.
- 3. Select New Lock Code. A message appears: "Change Code?"
- 4. Select Yes and enter a new four-digit code.
- 5. Enter your new lock code again.

Locking your phone

When your phone is locked, you can call only emergency numbers or your service provider's number. You can still receive incoming calls.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Security.
- 2. Enter your four-digit lock code.
- 3. Select Lock Phone.
- **4.** Highlight an option and press \bigcirc :
 - Never does not lock the phone.
 - On power up locks the phone every time you turn it on.
 - Now locks the phone immediately.

Unlocking the phone

- From the home screen, press the left soft key

 to select Unlock.
- 2. Enter your four-digit lock code.

Designating emergency numbers

The emergency numbers feature allows you to specify three personal phone numbers that can be called when the phone is locked.

1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Security.

- 2. Enter your four-digit lock code.
- 3. Select Emergency Numbers.
- 4. Select an Unassigned slot.
- 5. Enter the phone number, including the area code. Do not enter 1 before the area code.
- 6. Select Done.

Notes:

- You can view these numbers only when they are being entered for the first time.
- To make a call to an emergency number from a locked phone, you must dial the number (including area code) exactly as it was stored in Emergency Numbers.

Limiting calls

You can limit the calls that can be made from your phone to emergency numbers, your contacts, and service provider numbers.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Security.
- 2. Enter your four-digit lock code.
- 3. Select Limit Calls.
- 4. Choose an option and press 💮 :
 - No Limit limits no calls.
 - Limit Outgoing calls only. Incoming calls can still be received and answered.
 - Limit All limits both incoming and outgoing calls.

Erasing all contacts

You can erase all entries in your Contacts directory.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Security.
- 2. Enter your four-digit lock code.
- 3. Select Erase Contacts.
- 4. Select Yes to erase all contacts. A message appears: "Erase ALL Contacts?"
- 5. Select Yes again to erase all contacts.

Network settings

Switching between phone lines

Your phone can have two service accounts, or phone lines, associated with it. If you have two phone lines, each line will have a different phone number.

Only one phone line can be used at a time. Incoming calls made to the other line will go to voice mail.

All contacts and settings are shared for both lines.

Note: You must first establish a second phone line with your service provider. Once established, a second phone number becomes available in the menu for selection.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Network \rightarrow Set Phone Line.
- 2. Select one of the two lines and press \bigcirc .

Ensuring Call Privacy

You can set your phone to sound an alert if enhanced CDMA voice privacy is lost or regained (check with your service provider to see if CDMA voice privacy is enabled in your area). When voice privacy is activated during a call, you will see a message and for on your screen.

To set this alert:

Setting position location

This setting allows you to share your location information with network services other than emergency services (911, 111, 999, 000, etc.) in markets where service has been implemented.

Note: This feature works only when your phone is in digital mode. You do not have the option of turning off the locator to emergency services.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Network \rightarrow Location.
- 2. Select 911 Only or Location On.

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- 911 Only (default) shares your position information only with emergency services when you call your 3-digit emergency code (911, 000, 111, etc.).
- Location On shares your position information with your service provider's network in addition to emergency services.

Accessory Settings

Connecting to a TTY/TDD device

You can connect the phone to a TTY device for the hearing impaired.

Note: Enable TTY only when using the phone with a TTY device.

- 1. Connect the TTY device to the phone.
- 3. Select the TTY option.
- 4. Press 🐷 to clear the message.
- 5. Highlight an option and press \bigcirc .

Note: TTY/TDD service may not be available. Check with your service provider for more information.

Using a Hearing Aid device

You can reduce interference while using the phone with a hearing aid device by activating the phone's T-Coil HAC feature. **Note:** Enable this feature only when using the phone with a hearing aid device.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Call Settings \rightarrow Hearing Aid.
- **2**. Select On and then press \bigcirc .

7 Using Voice Recognition

Voice recognition allows you to make and answer calls by speaking commands into the phone.

Note: You cannot use voice recognition to end a call; you must press 🝙 or close the flip.

Setting up voice dialing

To make or receive calls using voice dialing, contacts must be saved with associated voice tags.

Creating a voice tag for a contact

- Select Menu → Settings → Voice Features → Add Voice Dial.
- 2. Follow the voice prompts to record a name for the contact.
- 3. Highlight an option and press 🕤 :
 - Add New saves a new contact to go with the voice tag.

Viewing entries with voice tags

Select Menu → Contacts → Voice Dial List. A list of all contacts with assigned voice tags appears.

Editing a voice tag

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Contacts \rightarrow Voice Dial List.
- 3. Highlight the phone number and select **Options**.
- 4. Select Add Voice Dial, Erase Voice Dial, or Edit Voice Dial.
- 5. Follow the prompts.

Calling using voice tags

- 1. If you haven't already done so, record a voice tag for the person you wish to call.
- 2. From the home screen, press 🝙. The phone responds: "Say a name" or "Say 'dial.""
- 3. Say the name of the person you want to call.
- 4. If the name you said matches a contact in the Voice Dial List, the phone responds: "Calling (Name)." Remain silent to make the call, or say No to cancel.
- 5. If the phone finds multiple voice tags that sound like the name you stated, you will be asked to verify which name you want to call. Say Yes when you hear the correct name. Say No when you hear an incorrect name.

Erasing all voice tags

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Voice Features \rightarrow Erase Voice Dial.
- 2. Select Yes.
- 3. Select Yes again at the confirmation.

Calling using digit dialing

You can speak the digits of a phone number to dial it.

Note: You cannot speak a string of digits. You must speak one digit at a time and wait for the prompt.

- 1. From the home screen, press ☐. The phone responds: "Say a name or say Dial."
- 2. Say "Dial." The phone responds: "Speak a digit."
- 3. Speak the first digit of the phone number you want to call. Once the phone repeats the digit, you can speak the next digit.

If you pause, the phone prompts you with the following five options. After the prompt, speak an option.

- Say "Clear" to erase the last digit entered. The phone responds: "Digit cleared." To clear the entire phone number, say "Clear" again. When the phone prompts you with "Clear entire phone number?", say "Yes" to clear or "No" to cancel.
- Say "Call" to dial the number.
- Say "Verify" to hear the set of spoken digits.
- Say "Cancel" to exit voice recognizer and return to the home screen.
- Speak a digit to enter the next digit. Once the phone repeats the digit, you can speak the next digit or pause to hear the prompt.

Using voice features with hands-free car kits

You can use voice commands to make a phone call or to answer the phone only if your phone is connected to a portable hands-free car kit (sold separately).

Note: The following features apply only to portable hands-free car kits unless noted.

To shop for these accessories, visit www.kyocera-wireless.com/store or call 800-349-4188 (U.S.A. only) or 858-882-1410.

Waking up the phone

If your phone is connected to a portable handsfree car kit, you can use a voice command to activate the phone to make a call.

Note: Voice Wake-up does not work with Keygaurd active. To disable Keygaurd, see "Locking your phone" on page 34.

To activate the Voice Wake-up setting:

• Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Voice Features \rightarrow Voice Wake-Up \rightarrow With accessory.

To wake up the phone:

1. Say Wake Up and listen for a tone.

2. Say Wake Up again until you hear two tones.

If the phone does not recognize your "Wake up" command, see "Training voice recognition" on page 40.

Answering the phone

You can set the portable hands-free car kit to either (1) answer automatically or (2) answer using a voice command.

Answering automatically

• Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Accessories \rightarrow Auto-Answer \rightarrow After 5 seconds.

Note: This setting also works with the portable hands-free car kit.

Answering using voice commands

If Auto-Answer is turned off, you can use a voice command to answer an incoming call using the installed Kyocera hands-free car kit.

To turn off Auto-Answer:

• Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Accessories \rightarrow Auto-Answer \rightarrow Disabled.

To activate the Voice Answer setting:

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Voice Features \rightarrow Voice Answer \rightarrow Enabled.
- 2. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Silent Mode \rightarrow Normal Sounds.

To answer a call:

When you receive an incoming call, the phone responds: "Incoming call, answer?" or "Incoming roam call, answer?" If the caller is recognized as a saved contact entry, then the phone says "Incoming call from (Name), answer?"

• Say Yes or press any key except 🕋.

Ignoring an incoming call

To ignore an incoming call, do one of the following:

- Say No and press 🕋 to silence the alert.
- Remain silent. The voice alert repeats twice and the phone rings once, then returns to the home screen.

Using Expert Mode

Expert Mode allows you to use voice recognition at a faster pace by reducing the number of voice instructions and replacing them with tones. Simply speak a command after the tone.

• Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Voice Features \rightarrow Expert Mode \rightarrow Expert.

Training voice recognition

If your phone is having trouble recognizing your voice, you can train it with commands, such as **Yes**, **No**, and **Wake up**.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Settings \rightarrow Voice Features.
- 2. Select Voice Training.
- 3. Read the message and select OK to continue or Cancel to return to the previous screen.
- 4. Select Train All or the item you want to train.
- 5. Follow the prompts for each word until training is complete.

8 USING MEDIA GALLERY

The media gallery stores and displays all the image and sound files in the phone.

Accessing files

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Media Gallery.
- 2. Highlight an option and press 💮 :
 - Images displays a list of categories that contain preloaded, downloaded, saved, or created files, such as wallpapers, screen savers, or caller IDs.
 - Sounds displays a list of categories that contain saved or downloaded sounds, such as ringers and voice memos.

Browsing images

The Images menu allows you to assign your files to various applications.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Media Gallery \rightarrow Images.
- 2. Highlight an option and press 💮 :
 - Saved Images displays available images.
 - Wallpapers displays wallpaper selections.
 - Screen Savers displays available screen savers.
 - Caller IDs displays pictures and images that can be assigned to saved contacts.

- Highlight an image and select Options. Note: Options vary according to phone menu selection.
- 4. Highlight an option and press 🕞 :
 - Erase the image (image must not be locked).
 - Set As Default sets as default setting.
 - Assign an image as a caller ID, wallpaper, or screen saver.
 - Rename an image.
 - Details gives you the file size of the image.
 - Erase All erases all stored images (images must not be locked).
- 5. Select 🝙 or 🖵 when done.

Browsing sounds

The Sounds menu allows you to view and listen to all sound files stored on your phone.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Media Gallery \rightarrow Sounds.
- 2. Highlight an option and press 💮 :
 - Saved Sounds contains sounds saved on your phone.
 - Ringers contains ringers saved on your phone.
 - Voice Memos contains recorded voice memos.
- 3. Highlight a sound file and select Options.

- 4. Highlight an option and press 💮 :
 - Erase the sound.
 - Assign a sound as a ringer.
 - Rename a ringer.
 - Details gives you the file size of the sound.
 - Erase All stored sounds.
- 5. Select 🝙 or 🗔 when done.

Creating free space

If your phone does not have enough memory to store a file, a dialog appears and asks you if you want to create space.

- Select Yes to display the file browser (categories) with the memory needed and available memory.
- Select **No** to return to the previous screen. No files are saved or downloaded.

The actions are limited to the following:

- Erase the selected file (you cannot erase locked files).
- Done re-attempts the download or save.

Voice Memo

The Voice Memo tool allows you to record and play back audio memos.

Recording a voice memo

1. Select Menu \rightarrow Tools & Games \rightarrow

Voice Memo \rightarrow Record New. -or-Press and hold \bigcirc right.

- 2. Say your memo and press the left soft key ⊙ to select **Stop**.
- 3. Select Save to save your memo.

Note: If an incoming call is received while you're recording a memo, the memo is saved and the incoming call screen appears.

Playing or reviewing a voice memo

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Tools & Games \rightarrow Voice Memo \rightarrow Recorded Memos.
- 2. Highlight the voice memo to review and select Play.

Naming a saved voice memo

- 2. Highlight the memo and select Options.
- 3. Select Rename.
- 4. Press and hold 🐷 to clear the default name.
- 5. Use the keypad to enter a name for the memo.

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Tools & Games \rightarrow Voice Memo \rightarrow Recorded Memos.
- 2. Highlight the memo and select Options.
- Select Erase. The prompt "Erase file?" appears.
- 4. Select Yes or No.

The Scheduler allows you to schedule events and set reminder alerts.

Creating an event

- 1. Select Menu \rightarrow Tools & Games \rightarrow Scheduler \rightarrow Add New Event.
- Enter a name for the event and press down. For help entering text, see page 14.

- 3. Select Options and classify the type of event and press ((): Meeting, Phone Call, Birthday, Anniversary, Vacation, Medical, or Other.
- 4. Press (a) to change the date of the event (the current date is the default date of the event).
 - Press (a) left or right to move between the month, day, and year fields.
 - Press () up or down to change the month, day, or year.
 - Press
 or to save your changes.
- 5. Press \bigcirc to set the time of the event.
 - Press (a) left or right to move between the hour, minute, and AM/PM fields.
 - Press (a) up or down to change the hour, minute, or AM/PM.
 - Press 🕞 to save your changes.
- 6. Press \bigcirc to set the duration of the event.
 - Press (a) left or right to move between the hour and minute fields.
 - Press (a) up or down to change the hour and minute.
 - Press
 or to save your changes.
- 7. Press 🕞 to set a reminder of the event.
 - Select an option and press .
- 8. Press \bigcirc to set the reminder sound.

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- Select an option and press .

🕒 Alarm Clock

You can set up to four alerts with your phone's three alarm clocks and one quick alarm.

The Tip Calculator helps you calculate how much tip to include with a bill.

This timer counts down for a specified amount of time. It beeps when that amount of time has elapsed.

World Clock

The World Clock lets you check times in cities around the world in relation to local time.

When you first access World Clock, you are prompted to select a city.

- Press to select Cities. The Cities menu is displayed, showing 85 world cities in alphabetical order.

 The World Clock menu is displayed again, with Athens' time and date.

From the World Clock menu, you can also select **Edit** to search by city or country.

 - Press Search By City.
 - Press (a) down, then press (a) to search By Country.
- **3.** If you search by City, the Search screen is displayed.
 - a. Use your number keys (2-9) to enter the letter(s) by which you want to search. For example, press 2 once to enter the letter A.
 - b. Press Ok.
 - c. Cities beginning with A are displayed, like Anchorage, Athens, and Atlanta.
 - d. Use (③) to move through the list, press the right soft key (⊙) to view information on the city you highlighted
 - e. Press 🛞 to select a city.
- 4. If you search by Country, the Find Country screen is displayed.
 - a. Use your number keys (2-9) to enter the letter(s) by which you want to search. For example, press 2 once to enter the letter A.

- c. Countries beginning with A are displayed, like Afghanistan, Algeria, and Australia.

Use \bigotimes to move through the list, then press \bigoplus to select a country.

Games

😳 Brick Attack

The goal of this game is to eliminate bricks arranged in levels. You send a moving ball upward using a paddle at the bottom of the screen.

 to select Yes at the prompt, "Turn off backlight to conserve battery?"
- 3. Press the left soft key \bigcirc to select New.

To exit the game, highlight Exit and press .

Race 21

This game is a timed variation of Black Jack. Each game comprises three 90-second rounds. To score points, add cards in each of the four columns, trying to reach but not exceed 21 in each column within during the course of the game.

- 2. Press (a) to select Yes at the prompt, "Turn off backlight to conserve battery?"

- An underline and an arrow indicate that there is more text. Press (a) down to view more text. Press (b) to return to the previous screen.
