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Chapter 1 - Introduction

The MultiMobile PC Card modems offer high-speed performance and reliability for mobile users with laptops. They provide the flexibility needed for local and remote connections to the Internet. These Type II PCMCIA credit card size modems comply with the PCMCIA 2.1 and JEIDA 4.1 standards and support the fastest downloading speeds available over standard phone lines.

They are Bell, ITU-T and AT command compatible, allowing them to be used worldwide (except for the ZLX which is limited to the United States and Canada) with today's popular communication software programs. You can send and receive faxes with any Group 3 compatible fax device.

- The MT5634ZLX is designed for use in the United States and Canada.
- The MT5634ZLXI is designed for use worldwide. See the Multi-Tech Web site at http://www.multitech.com for a list of approved countries.
- The MT5634ZLX/FE is designed for use in the United States, Canada, and Europe. It can connect to an enterprise LAN as well as the Internet.

- provide V.90 compatibility for data transmission speeds up to 56 Kbps, while maintaining compatibility with lower-speed modems.





Chapter 2 - Installation

Installing the MT5634ZLX Card


- 1. Insert the MT5634ZLX Card into the laptop's PCMCIA slot. Be sure the label is facing up.
- 2. Plug 15-pin adapter end of the telephone cord into the MT5634ZLX Card.
- Plug the other end of the RJ-11 into an available telephone wall jack. This connects you to the PSTN (Public Switched Telephone Network).

Installing the MT5634ZLXI Card

- 1. Insert the MT5634ZLXI Card into the laptop's PCMCIA slot. Be sure the label is facing up.
- 2. Plug the Modem-LAM (Line Adapter Module) into the modem port of the PC Card.
- **3.** Plug one end of the RJ-11 telephone line cord into the open end of the Modem-LAM (this is the LAM's RJ-11 receptacle side).
- **4.** Plug the other end of the RJ-11 into an available telephone wall jack. This connects you to the PSTN (Public Switched Telephone Network).
- **5.** With your PC turned on, verify the operation of the LEDs.
 - OH (Off-Hook) light on means the MT5634ZLXI is dialing, is online, or answering a call.
 - CD (Carrier Detect) light on means a valid carrier signal from another modem is detected.
 - RD (Receive Data) light flashes when data is being received.
 - TD (Transmit Data) light flashes when data is being transmitted.

Installing the MT5634ZLX/FE Card

- 1. Insert the MT5634ZLX/FE Card into the computer's PCMCIA slot. Be sure the label is facing up.
- 2. Plug the Modem-LAM (Line Adapter Module) into the modem port of the PC Card.
- **3.** Plug one end of the RJ-11 telephone line cord into the open end of the Modem-LAM (this is the LAM's RJ-11 receptacle side).
- **4.** Plug the other end of the RJ-11 into an available telephone wall jack. This connects you to the PSTN (Public Switched Telephone Network).
- 5. Plug the Ethernet-LAM into the Ethernet port of the PC Card.
- 6. Plug one end of either a UTP or an STP cable into the Ethernet-LAM.
- 7. Plug the other end of the UTP/STP cable into the Ethernet LAN.
- **8.** Installation of the driver for the MT5634ZLE/FE: When prompted for drivers, choose the Advanced path and browse to the **Drivers_FE** folder and then to the appropriate subfolder for your Windows version.
- 9. With your PC turned on, verify the operation of the LEDs.

Modem LAM LEDs


- OH (Off-Hook) light on means the MT5634ZLXI is dialing, is online, or answering a call.
- CD (Carrier Detect) light on means a valid carrier signal from another modem is detected.
- RD (Receive Data) light flashes when data is being received.
- TD (Transmit Data) light flashes when data is being transmitted.

Ethernet LAM LEDs

ACT light on means there's activity on the line.

10/100 light on means 100m; 10/100 light off means 10m.

Link light on means the line is active.



Installing the Modem Driver

You must install the modem's driver onto the hard drive of your laptop PC. If you are using Windows 95/98/Me/2000/XP, the driver is installed with Windows' Plug and Play feature. For Windows NT, which does not support Plug and Play, see the **Modem Driver Installation for Windows NT** below.

Modem Driver Installation for Windows 95/98/Me/2000/XP

- 1. Make sure your modem PC card is connected properly, and then turn on your laptop PC. Windows should detect your new modem and open the install New Modem wizard.
 - **Note:** If Windows cannot find a modem, your modem may not be connected properly. Check your connections.
- 2. Insert the MT5634ZLX Modem Family CD into your laptop PC's CD-ROM drive, and then click OK.
- 3. Windows installs the modern driver.
- **4.** Installing the ZLX/FE drivers requires you to select the *Advanced* option. Then browse the **Drivers_FE** folder and select the appropriate subfolder.
- 5. Click Finish to exit.

Modem Driver Installation for Windows NT

- 1. Make sure your modem PC card is connected properly, and then turn on your laptop PC. Windows should detect your new modem and open the install New Modem wizard.
 - **Note:** If Windows cannot find a modem, your modem may not be connected properly. Check your connections.
- 2. In the Install New Modem wizard, select *Don't detect my modem; I will select it from a list*, and then click Next.
- 3. Insert the MT5634ZLX CD into your laptop PC's CD-ROM drive, and then click Have Disk.
- 4. In the Install from Disk dialog box, select the drive that the CD is in, and then click OK.
- 5. A list of modems appears. Select your modem and click Next.
- **6.** Select the port that the modem is connected to, and then click **Next**.
- 7. Windows installs and configures the modem driver.
- 8. Click Finish to exit.

Installing Data Communication Software

Data communications software is designed to enable your modem to send and receive data. Multi-Tech has included a communications software program, Phone Tools, with your modem. To install Phone Tools:

- Insert the MultiMobile CD into your laptop's CD-ROM drive.
- Click on the Phone Tools icon.
- You will be asked to choose your language.
- The software automatically loads onto your PC.

Important: How to Eject the PC Card

The PC Card is a hot-swappable card. However, when MT5634ZLX/FE is connected to a LAN and transferring data, it is recommended that you use the following steps to eject the PC Card if you choose to do so during this process. Removing the PC Card during this process without using these steps could cause Windows to lock up.

- 1. On the task bar, click the PCMCIA icon.
- 2. Select Stop MultiMobile MT5634ZLX PCMCIA.
- 3. The Safe to Remove Hardware dialog box displays. Click OK.
- 4. Eject the PCMCIA adapter.

Configure the Modem for Your Country

Note: Country configuration applies to the MT5634ZLXI is designed for use worldwide.

Different countries have different requirements for how modems must function. Therefore, before you use your modem, you must configure it to match the defaults of the country in which you are using it. You can use one of two configuration methods:

- Using the Global Wizard to Configure Your Modem
- Using AT Commands to Configure Your Modem

Using the Global Wizard to Configure Your Modem

The Global Wizard configuration utility is recommended for computers running in Windows.

- 1. Insert the MT5634ZLX CD into the CD-ROM drive. The Autorun dialog box appears.
- 2. Click Initial Setup and Country Selection.
- 3. Choose either:
 - Run Global Wizard from CD. This option will not load the wizard onto your hard drive, or
 - Install Global Wizard on the HD. This option installs the wizard onto your hard drive.
- 4. The Global Wizard dialog box appears. Click Next.
- 5. The Global Wizard searches for your modem and identifies it. Click **Next**.
- 6. Select the country in which the modem will be used, and then click **Next**.
- 7. Review your choice of country. If it is correct, click **Next** to configure the modem.
- 8. When Global Wizard announces that the parameters have been set, click Finish to exit.

Using AT Commands to Configure Your Modem

- 1. Run Phone Tools or use your favorite communications program and open the program's terminal window.
- 2. To configure the modem for a specific country, type AT%T19,0,nn, where nn is the country code, and then press Enter. The message OK displays.
- 3. To verify the change, type ATI9, and then press Enter. The country code is displayed, as in this example:

Dial-Up Networking

Before you can connect to the Internet, you must set up a *remote-node client program*, known as Dial-Up Networking in Windows. Dial-Up Networking establishes your connection to your ISP's (Internet Service Provider) server, which is the shared computer that manages calls from clients (your computer and other clients' computers) to the Internet. Most, if not all, Windows browsers start Dial-Up Networking automatically when you open them after you have setup your PC for Dial-Up Networking.

Many ISPs provide a program that will install and configure Dial-Up Networking automatically for you. If this program was not provided, contact your ISP for instructions. You can also find Dial-Up Networking information in your Windows operating system online help or printed documentation.

Chapter 3 - Remote Configuration

Remote configuration is a network management tool that allows you to configure modems anywhere in your network from one location. With password-protected remote configuration, you can issue AT commands to a remote MultiMobile Modem for maintenance or troubleshooting as if you were on-site.

Basic Procedure

The following steps are valid regardless of whether the connection is established by the local or the remote Multi-Tech modem.

- 1. Establish a data connection with a remote MultiMobile Modem.
- 2. Send three remote configuration escape characters followed by **AT** and the setup password, and press **Enter**. Example: **%%%ATMTSMODEM**. You have four tries to enter the correct password before being disconnected. If the password is correct, the remote modem responds with **OK**.
- 3. You can now send AT commands to configure the remote modem.
- 4. When you have finished configuring the remote modem, save the new configuration by typing **AT&W0** and pressing **Enter**.
- 5. Type **ATO** and press **Enter** to exit remote configuration. You can now break the connection in the normal way.

Setup

Multi-Tech modems are shipped with a default setup password (MTSMODEM). Because anyone who has the User Guide knows the default setup password, you should change the password and possibly also the remote configuration escape character.

Changing the Setup Password

- 1. Open a data communications program such as HyperTerminal.
- 2. In the terminal window, type **AT#SMTSMODEM** (or **AT#Syyyyyy** if you have replaced the MTSMODEM password with yyyyyy) and press **Enter**. The modem responds with **OK** if the setup password is correct and **ERROR** if it is wrong.
- 3. To change the password, type **AT#S=yyyyyy**, where yyyyyy stands for the password, and press **Enter**. The password can include any keyboard character and can be up to eight characters long. The modem responds with **OK**.
- 4. The new password is saved automatically. You can now either enter more AT commands or exit the data communications program. The next time you remotely configure the modem you must use the new setup password.

Caution: You can only change the setup password locally; you cannot do it remotely. Also, passwords are case sensitive. The next time you enter the password, it must be in the same case as you set it up.

Changing the Remote Escape Character

To further improve security, you can change a remote modem's remote configuration escape character. The remote configuration escape character is stored in register S9. The factory default is 37, which is the ASCII code for the percent character (%). Setting S9 to 0 (zero) disables remote configuration entirely.

Caution: If you do this remotely, you won't be able to change it back remotely!

- 1. Establish a remote configuration link with the remote modem as described in Basic Procedure.
- 2. **Note:** This command can be executed locally as well as remotely.
- 3. Type ATS9=n, where *n* is the ASCII code for the new remote configuration escape character, then press Enter.
- 4. Save the new value by typing AT&W and pressing Enter.
- 5. Type ATO and press Enter to exit remote configuration.

Chapter 4 – AT Commands, S-Registers, and Result Codes

Typically, your fax and data communications software controls the modem for you. For complete control over your modem, you may also want to use AT commands. Each AT command must be preceded by the characters AT to get the ATtention of the modem. You need to be careful when using these commands because they can cause your software to lose its ability to control the modem. If an AT command you've entered has caused a problem, turn the computer off and then back on to reset the modem to factory default settings. You may also reset the factory defaults by typing **AT&F&WZ**.

The format for entering an AT command is **AT**Xn, where X is the command and n is the value for the command, sometimes called the command parameter. The value is always a number. If the value is zero, you can omit it from the command; (e.g. **AT&W** is equivalent to **AT&W0**). Most commands have a default value, which is the value that is set at the factory. The default values are included in the AT Commands section which follows. You must press **Enter** to send the command to the modem.

To send AT commands to the modem you must use a communications program, such as HyperTerminal, which is included in Windows 95, 98, NT and 2000. You can issue commands to the modem directly by typing them in the terminal window of the communications program or indirectly by configuring the communications program to send the command automatically. If you are using Windows Dial-Up Networking, AT commands can be included in the connection properties (described later in this chapter).

You can issue several commands in one line; this is called a command *string*. A command string begins with **AT** and ends when you press **Enter**. Spaces separating the commands are optional; they are ignored by the command interpreter. The most familiar command string is the *initialization string* (used to configure the modem when it is turned off, reset, or when your communications software initiates a call to another modem).

To use an AT command, you must first:

- 1. Run your communication software.
- 2. Configure the software for the appropriate COM port and IRQ settings, if necessary.
- **3.** Enter Terminal mode (also known as *Command mode*, *Local mode*, or *Direct mode*). This is the mode in which most data communications software packages start up. You can then type the desired AT command and press the **Enter** key.

For example, type:

ATH0<Enter> to hang up the modem connection, or

AT&K3<Enter> to enable bi-directional CTS/RTS hardware flow control.

Most of the AT commands can be entered in "strings" (i.e., on the same command line) without spaces between the individual commands.

For example: AT&K3H0<Enter>

Any time the modem receives a command, it sends a response known as a *Result Code*. The most common result codes are *OK*, *ERROR*, and *CONNECT*.

Fortunately, communication programs make daily operation of modems effortless by hiding the commands from the user. Most users, therefore need to use AT commands only when reconfiguring the modem, e.g., to turn autoanswer on or off.

AT Commands

The commands labeled as default are factory default settings.

Chapter 5 - Troubleshooting

This chapter provides general and specific problem solving steps. Below are a number of examples of problems, probable causes, and solutions. If your MultiMobile PC Card is not working properly, look up the problem and solution here. If you cannot solve the problem, Technical Support (see the Copyright page – it's the page after the cover). There are some specific steps for resolving IRQ and COM port conflicts listed at the end of this chapter.

No Response to AT Commands

- Cause: The COMx port may be in use by another device in the computer.
 Solution: Change the COMx port of MultiMobile PC Card to a different, unused port. It might be best to set it to COM3 or COM4. Even if you are not using a serial port that is set to the same COMx port as the modem, it can still interfere with the modem. Be sure to update your software COMx port setting as well.
- Cause: The Interrupt the modem is using may be the same Interrupt used by another device.

 Solution: Change the IRQ settings to a different, unused, IRQ. Even if you are not using a serial port that is set to the same IRQ as the modem, it can still interfere with the modem.

The Modem Does Not Execute the Command Line

- Cause: Make sure you are typing AT at the beginning of the command line (and hit Enter at the
 end).
- Cause: Make sure the modem is not in Data Mode. Type +++ if necessary.
- Cause: Make sure your software is set to the same COMx port as your MultiMobile PC Card.

The Modem Does Not Give a Response After an Executed AT Command

- Cause: The echo and/or responses may be turned off by the *ATE0Q1* commands. Solution: Use *ATE1Q0* then Enter to change them back.
- Cause: Make sure the modem is in Command Mode and not Data Mode when you enter AT commands.

The Modem Gives an 'ERROR' Response After an Executed AT Command

- Cause: Make sure you did not type an invalid command.
- Cause: Make sure your command line is 40 characters or less.

The Modem Goes Off-Hook and Disables the Telephone Line

Cause: The modem may be set to auto-answer the phone when it rings.
 Solution: Disable auto-answer by typing ATS0=0 then Enter at the command line.

The Modem Does Not Auto-Answer the Phone

Cause: If necessary, make sure the software is configured to auto-answer the phone.
 Solution: To set auto-answer mode on from AT command mode, type ATS0=n then press Enter.
 The n stands for number of rings the modem answers. For example: ATS0=3 causes the modem to answer on the third ring.

The Software Does Not Control the Modem Properly or Cannot Detect the Modem

• Cause: The software may not have been set up correctly.

Solution: Check the initialization string and dial string.

 Cause: Some TSRs (programs that stay in memory after they are loaded) may conflict with the communications software.

Solution: Try starting your computer without loading any TSRs.

Doubled Characters on the Screen

• Cause: Both the modem and the software have the echo feature turned on.

Solution: Since only one needs an echo, turn the software echo feature off.

• Cause: The remote modem is echoing your typed characters.

Solution: Type ATE1 then Enter at the command line. Then turn off the software echo feature.

No Text Appears on the Screen in Data Mode

• Cause: The remote modem is not echoing your typed characters.

Solution: Type **ATE0** and press **Enter** at the command line. Then turn the software echo feature on.

- Cause: Your software may not be set to use Full Duplex or the remote modem may not be set to use Full Duplex either.
- Cause: The remote modem may be waiting for you to type a command before it replies with text.

No Text Appears on the Screen When in Command Mode

Solution: If you can't see the typed characters, then type ATE1 then press Enter.

The Modem Does Not Dial a Phone Number After AT Dial Command Execution

• Cause: If you are using touch tone dialing on a phone line that requires pulse dialing, then it may not work.

Solution: Use **ATDT** in place of **ATDP**.

Communications Software Dials, But Fails

- Cause: Make sure the software-dialing prefix is ATDT.
- Cause: Make sure the software and modem are set to the same COMx port.
- Cause: The modem may not have hung up the phone line since the last call.

Solution: Change to Command mode and type ATH then press Enter.

The Modem Connects with Some Modems, But Not Others

• Cause: The remote modem may not support data compression or error correction, which might cause it to take too long to negotiate a link.

Solution: You might try changing the way the modem negotiates by using the *AT&Qn*, *ATNn*, and *ATS37=n* commands. It might be best to start with *AT&Q0N1*.

When Dialing Another Modem, a CONNECT Response Is Received, But Nothing Else

- **Cause:** The remote modem may be waiting for you to type a command.
- Solution: Try to log on to the remote site (press Enter).
 Solution: Type an AT command, then press Enter.

The Modem Speaker Does Not Make Any Sound When Connecting to Another Modem

Cause: The software may have the speaker disabled.
 Solution: Change the setting in your software or use the ATMn command to turn the speaker on.

Occasionally, the Modem Gives a Burst of Errors

- Cause: The telephone line may be noisy or bad.
 Solution: Hang up the call and try to connect again to get a better telephone line.
- Cause: If there are other telephones on the same line your modem is using, someone may have picked up a telephone on that extension.
- Cause: Your telephone line may have the Call Waiting feature.
 Solution: Try adding *70 to your ATDT dialing command line. If it doesn't help, ask your telephone company how to temporarily disable call waiting.

Transmitted Data Random Errors

Solution: Try to use V.42 or MNP2-4 if possible. **Solution**: Connect the modems at a slower baud rate.

After Downloading a File, the File Does Not Store on the Disk Drive

• Cause: If both modems are using MNP or V.42 protocol, then flow control may not be enabled. Solution: Configure your software to use RTS/CTS flow control to cause your computer to pause long enough for the file to be stored to disk.

The Text on the Screen Is Not Legible

- Cause: Your software settings may not match the settings of the remote device.

 Solution: Make sure your data bits, stop bits, and parity settings match the settings that the other computer is using. The two most common settings are: 8 data bits, None parity, and 1 stop bit (8,N,1) or 7 data bits, Even parity, and 1 stop bit (7,E,1).
- Cause: If the telephone line is very noisy, you may see corrupted data on your screen.
- Cause: Due to poor telephone line conditions, the modem may have fallen back to a slower communication speed. You may need to change the baud rate setting in your software to match this slower speed. To return the modem to the higher speed, disconnect the link and re-establish again.

When Using V.42bis or MNP5, Some Features Are Disabled

- Cause: You may be using a non-streaming protocol, like Xmodem or Ymodem to transfer files. Those are fine unless you are using V.42bis or MNP5.
- Cause: When using V.42bis or MNP5, you should use a streaming transfer protocol like Ymodem-G or Zmodem.

Solution: Configure your software to use hardware flow control (RTS/CTS ON).

When Connecting to Another Modem, the Modem Reports a Higher Baud Rate Than It's Really Using

 Cause: The modem defaults to report the modem-to-computer baud rate when it responds with CONNECT.

Solution: Go to Command mode with your communication program and type *ATW2*, then press Enter. This tells the modem to report the modem-to-modem baud rate instead.

COM Port and IRQ Conflicts

If you have isolated a problem to an IRQ or COM port conflict, refer to the following sections for resolving IRQ and COM port conflicts in Windows 95/98.

- 1. In Windows 98/95, right-click on My Computer.
- 2. Select Properties from the menu.
- 3. Click on the Device Manager tab
- 4. Double-click on **Ports**, and then double-click on the *Communications Port* your modem is connected to
- **5.** In the port's **Properties** sheet, click on the *Resources* tab to see the port's Input/Output range and Interrupt Request.
 - If another device is using the same address range or IRQ, it will appear in the Conflicting Device List.
- **6.** Uncheck *Use Automatic Settings* to change the port's settings so they do not conflict with the other device, or select the port the conflicting device is on and change it instead.
 - If you need to open your computer to change switches or jumpers on the conflicting device, refer to the device's documentation.

Appendix B - Global Wizard

Before using your modem, or if you operate your modem from a country different than where it was originally set up, you must configure it for country-specific operation. If you are using Windows 95, 98, NT, Me, 2000, or XP, you may quickly and easily configure your modem using Multi-Tech Systems *Global Wizard* configuration utility.

If you are using a non-Windows operating system, or if you prefer to configure your Windows based modem using AT commands, follow the procedure titled, "Configuring Your Modem for Country-Specific Operation" in Chapter 2.

Using the Global Wizard

- 1. Insert the MultiMobile Modern CD into your CD-ROM drive. The AutoRun dialog box displays:
- 2. Click the *Initial Setup & Country Selection* icon.
- 3. Select either Run Global Wizard or Install Global Wizard.
 - Run **Global Wizard** allows you to configure your modem by running Multi-Tech's *Global Wizard* configuration utility from the CD. If you select this option, continue with Step 4.
 - If you plan to use your computer from different countries, you may want to select **Install Global Wizard** to install the configuration utility to your hard drive and add the *Global Wizard* to your Start Menu.
 - After installing the Global Wizard, you may use the program by selecting **Start I Programs I Global Wizard**. Continue with Step 4.
- 4. The **Global Wizard** dialog box displays, prompting you to begin the configuration process. Click **Next>**.
- 5. Wait while the wizard searches for your modem (this process may take a couple of minutes).
- The Global Wizard dialog box indicates the modem has been identified. Click Next>.
- 7. An informational message appears indicating that the country list provided within the Global Wizard application does *not* indicate that the modem you are using is approved for use in that country. Refer to Multi-Tech System's web site at www.multitech.com for the most up-to-date country approval information or contact your Multi-Tech sales representative.
 - Click **OK** to continue.
- 8. The Global Wizard prompts you to select the country to configure the modem for.
- 9. Scroll through the country list and highlight the country from which you'll operate the modem.
- The Global Wizard dialog box displays the name of the country that you have selected.
 Click Next>.

- 11. The **Global Wizard** dialog box indicates it will set the homologation parameters for the country you have selected.
 - If the correct country is displayed, click **Next>** to continue; otherwise, click the **<Back** button and make the appropriate country selection.
- 12. The **Global Wizard** dialog box displays asking you to wait while it sets the homologation parameters for the selected country.
- 13. The **Global Wizard** indicates the homologation parameters have been successfully set for the country you selected.
 - Click Finish to exit the Global Wizard. Your modem is ready to use.

Appendix C - Flash Wizard

Your modem is controlled by semi-permanent software, called firmware, which is stored in flash memory. Firmware is nonvolatile; that is, it remains stored in memory when the modem is turned off. However, either the manufacturer or the user can change the firmware as bugs are repaired or new features are added.

Multi-Tech System's *Flash Wizard* utility can be used in the Windows operating system to update (flash) your modem's firmware.

The Flash Wizard utility is available on the MultiMobile CD or can be downloaded from Multi-Tech's Web site.

Upgrade Procedures

Overview

The upgrade (flash) procedure for the Windows operating system consists of the following steps, which are described in greater detail later in the chapter:

- 1. Identify the modem's model number and firmware version.
- 2. Identify the current version of the firmware from the Multi-Tech Web site. If your modem already has the current firmware, there is no need to update it.
- 3. Download the upgrade (.HEX) file for your modem.
- 4. Install the Flash Wizard.
- Extract the firmware upgrade (.HEX) file.
- 6. Document and clear your stored parameters.
- 7. Upgrade the modem's firmware.
- 8. Restore your parameters.

Step 1: Identify the Modem's Model Number and Firmware Version

You must know the model number and firmware version of your Multi-Tech modem to know whether you should update it.

- 1. Run your favorite terminal program. In Windows 95, Windows 98, Windows NT, or Windows 2000, you may use HyperTerminal.
- 2. In the program's terminal window, type **AT&F**. Even if you cannot see the **AT&F** command on your screen, be sure to type it completely, and then press **Enter**. The modem should respond **OK**.
- 3. After the modem responds **OK**, type **ATi** and press **Enter**. Record your results. The model number and firmware version should appear similar to that shown below.

Step 2: Identify the Current Version of the Firmware

Identify the current version of the firmware available for your modem on the Multi-Tech web site. If your modem already has the current firmware, there is no need to update it.

- 1. Using your favorite Web browser, go to Multi-Tech System's support web page. Follow the links to the modern firmware page.
- 2. Locate your modem model number.
- 3. Compare the firmware version number for your modem as found in *Step 1: Identify the Modem Firmware*, to the latest firmware version as listed on the web site. If your modem is at the current version, it does not need to be updated.
- 4. If the current firmware version is greater than the firmware version number found in *Step 1: Identify the Modem Firmware*, your modem has an older firmware version. Continue with *Step 3: Download the Upgrade File*.

Step 3: Download the Upgrade File

- 1. If you are not already at Multi-Tech's Firmware Web page, follow the procedure in Step 2.
- 2. Downloading the upgrade file for your modem by clicking its name, and save the file in a temporary folder on your hard drive.

Step 4: Install the Flash Wizard

You may install the Flash Wizard upgrade utility from the MultiMobile Modem CD.

- 1. Insert the MultiMobile Modem CD into your computer's CD-ROM drive.
- 2. When the Autorun menu appears, click Flash Wizard.
- 3. The Welcome dialog box displays.
- 5. Before continuing with the firmware update, exit all Windows programs. Click **Cancel** to quit *Setup* if you need to close other Windows programs. Close any programs that are running and restart the update Wizard. When you are ready to proceed, click **Next>** to continue.
- 6. The Choose Destination Location dialog box displays. You may click Browse and select another folder if you do not want to use the default installation path. Remember the location of the destination folder; you'll need to copy the firmware .Hex file to the same location before using the Flash Wizard to update your modem.
 - Click Next>.
- 7. When the program finishes copying files to your computer, the **Setup Complete** dialog box displays.
- 8. Select Finish.

Step 5: Extract the Firmware Upgrade (.HEX) File

- 1. When the system restarts, move the upgrade file (downloaded from the web site) to the Flash Wizard utility directory on your computer's hard drive.
- 2. In Windows, double-click the self-extracting update file. The extracted files include the .HEX file used to update your modem.

Step 6: Document and Clear Your Stored Parameters

Before you flash your modem it is important that you send the **AT&W1Z** command to it to clear out any stored parameters. You should also record the parameters that are currently stored in your modem so you can reprogram it after flashing.

- 1. Run your favorite terminal program.
- 2. In the program's terminal window, type AT&V and press Enter to list your modem's current parameters.
- 3. Record your parameters by saving the screens and sending them to your printer.
- 4. Type AT&W1Z. Press Enter to clear your stored parameters and reset your modem to factory default.
- 5. Close the terminal program.

Step 7: Upgrade the Modem's Firmware

CAUTION: If you are using Windows NT, you must disable Windows RAS and Microsoft Fax Service before upgrading the modem's firmware.

To disable RAS and your Fax service (Windows NT Only):

- Click Start | Settings | Control Panel, then double-click Services. Select Remote
 Access Server and click Startup.... Select Manual as the Start Up Type and click OK.
- If you are using a Fax service in NT, change its Start Up Type to Manual.

Upgrading the Modem's Firmware Using the Flash Wizard

- 1. Use Windows Explorer to copy the new .Hex file (which you downloaded from the Multi-Tech web site) to the folder in which the *Flash Wizard* program was installed.
- 2. Click **Start I Programs I Flash Wizard** to start the firmware update process. The program begins by identifying devices attached to your computer.
- The Wizard displays a list of installed devices able to be flashed with the update. You may update
 more than one device in a single procedure. Select the device(s) you'd like to update and click Next>
 to continue.
- 4. Next, the **Firmware Update Wizard** displays current firmware version information. The top portion of the window provides port, version and country identification for the firmware currently installed on your device(s). The *Hex File* list box displays the firmware versions available for updating your modem.
 - a. If your modem's firmware version number matches or is *higher* than the version number listed in the Hex File list, click **Cancel** to end the update process.
 - b. If your modem's firmware version number is *lower* than the firmware version shown in the Hex File list, continue with the update process. Select the port for the device you are updating. Use the list box to select the latest .Hex file version number for your country and click **Next>**.
- 5. The **Firmware Update Wizard** displays a progress indicator and begins updating your device(s) with the new firmware version. When the Wizard finishes the update, the progress indicator status changes to *Programming Complete*. Click **Next>** to complete the update.
- 6. When the update completes, the **Firmware Update Wizard** displays indicating the device has been successfully updated. Click **Finish>** to close the Wizard.
- 7. You must restart your computer to make the firmware changes effective for your modem.

Step 8: Restore Your Parameters

Your modem has been updated. You can now open your terminal program to reprogram your modem parameters or to confirm the update by typing **ATi** in a terminal window.
