

Installation

- Do not place the projector in the following conditions:
 - on an unstable cart, stand, or table.
 - near water, baths, or damp rooms.
 - in direct sunlight, near heaters, or heat radiating appliances.
 - in a dusty, smoky or steamy environment.
 - on a sheet of paper or cloth, rugs or carpets.
- If you wish to have the projector installed on the ceiling:
 - Do not attempt to install the projector yourself.
 - The projector must be installed by qualified technicians in order to ensure proper operation and reduce the risk of bodily injury.
 - In addition, the ceiling must be strong enough to support the projector and the installation must be in accordance with any local building codes.
 - Please consult your dealer for more information.

Place the projector in a horizontal position

The tilt angle of the projector should not exceed 15 degrees, nor should the projector be installed in any way other than the desktop and ceiling mount, otherwise lamp life could decrease dramatically.

Fire and Shock Precautions



- Ensure that there is sufficient ventilation and that vents are unobstructed to prevent the build-up of heat inside your projector. Allow at least 4 inches (10cm) of space between your projector and a wall.
- Do not try to touch the ventilation outlet as it can become heated while the projector is turned on and immediately after the projector is turned off.
- Prevent foreign objects such as paper clips and bits of paper from falling into your projector. Do not attempt to retrieve any objects that might fall into your projector. Do not insert any metal objects such as a wire or screwdriver into your projector. If something should fall into your projector, disconnect it immediately and have the object removed by a qualified service personnel.
- Do not place any objects on top of the projector.
- Do not touch the power plug during a thunderstorm. Doing so can cause electrical shock or fire.
- The projector is designed to operate on a power supply of 100-240V AC 50/60 Hz. Ensure that your power supply fits this requirement before attempting to use your projector.
- Do not look into the lens while the projector is on. Serious damage to your eyes could result.
- Keep any items such as magnifying glass out of the light path of the projector. The light being projected from the lens is extensive, therefore any kind of abnormal objects that can redirect light coming out of the lens, can cause unpredictable outcome such as fire or injury to the eyes.
- Do not cover the lens with the black lens cap or equivalent while the projector is on. Doing so can lead to melting of the cap and possibly burning your hands due to the heat emitted from the light output.
- Do not place any objects, which are easily affected by heat, in front of the projector lens or a projector exhaust vent.

Doing so could lead to the object melting or getting your hands burned from the heat that is emitted from the light output and exhaust.

- Handle the power cable carefully. A damaged or frayed power cable can cause electric shock or fire.
 - Do not use any power cables than the supplied one.
 - Do not bend or tug the power cable excessively.
 - Do not place the power cable under the projector, or any heavy object.

- Turn off the projector and unplug the power cable before cleaning the cabinet or replacing the lamp.
- Turn off the projector and unplug the power cable if the projector is not to be used for an extended period of time

CAUTION

- Do not use the tilt-foot for purposes other than originally intended. Misuses such as using the tilt foot to carry or hang (from the wall or ceiling) the projector can cause damage to the projector.
- Do not send the projector in the soft case by parcel delivery service or cargo shipment. The projector inside the soft case could be damaged.
- Select [On] in Fan mode if you continue to use the projector for consecutive days. (From the menu, select [Default setting] → [Fan Control] → [On].)
- Do not turn off the AC power for 60 seconds after the lamp is turned on and while the POWER indicator is blinking blue.

Doing so could cause premature lamp failure.

Lamp Replacement

- To replace the lamp, follow all instructions provided on page 33 to 34.

If you continue to use the lamp after the lamp has reached the end of its usable life, the lamp bulb may shatter, and pieces of glass may be scattered in the lamp case. Do not touch them as the pieces of glass may cause injury. If this happens, contact your dealer for lamp replacement.

A Lamp Characteristic

The projector has a high-pressure mercury lamp as a light source.

A lamp has a characteristic that its brightness gradually decreases with age. Also repeatedly turning the lamp on and off will increase the possibility of its lower brightness.



A CAUTION:

When removing the lamp from a ceiling-mounted projector, make sure that no one is under the projector. Glass fragments could fall if the lamp has been burned out.




1	•	Power	Refer to the "Power On/Off the Projector" section on pages 12-13.
2		Picture Mode	Select the Picture mode from Presentation, Movie, sRGB, Game and User.
3		Computer Source	Press "Computer" to choose Computer connector.
4		Freeze	Freeze To pause the screen image. Press again to resume the screen image.

5	Keystone Correction	Adjust the image to compensate for distortion caused by tilting the projector (vertical ± 40 degrees).
6	Source	Press "Source" to choose RGB, Component, S-Video, Composite and HDTV sources.
7	Menu	Press "Menu" to launch the Onscreen display (OSD), back to the top level of OSD for the OSD main menu operation
8	AV-Mute	Momentarily turn off/on the audio and video.
9	Reset	Change the adjustments and settings to the factory default value.
10	Video Source	Press "Video" to choose Video connector.
11	S-Video Source	Press "S-Video" to choose S-Video connector.
12	Magnify	Zoom the projector display in or out. Use "Magnify", not ◀or ▶
13	Enter	Confirm your section of items in sub menu operation.

Battery Installation


1. Press firmly and slide the battery cover off.



2. Remove the old Lithium coin cell and install new one (CR2025). Ensure that the side with a "+" is facing up.



3. Put the cover back.




Powering On/Off the Projector


Powering On the Projector

- Ensure that the power cable and signal cable are securely connected. The Power LED will flash blue.
- 2. Remove the lens cap. **①**
- 3. Turn on the lamp by pressing "Power" on the control panel.2 The startup screen (NEC logo) will display and the Power LED will turn blue.
- 4. Turn on your source (computer, notebook, video player,etc.) The projector will detect your source automatically.
- If you connect multiple sources at the same time, use the "Source" on the remote control or use "Computer", "S-Video", "Video" on the remote control to switch inputs.



Turn on the projector first and then the signal sources.





Powering Off the Projector

1. Press the "Power" to turn off the projector lamp, you will see a message as below on the on-screen display.



- 2. Press the "Power" again to confirm.
- 3. The cooling fan continues to operate for about 120 seconds during the cool down period and the Power LED will flash blue. When the light starts flashing, the projector has entered standby mode.
 - If you wish to turn the projector back on, you must wait until the projector has completed the cooling cycle and has entered standby mode. Once in standby mode, simply press "Power" to restart the projector.
- 4. Disconnect the power cable from the electrical outlet and the projector.
- 5. Do not turn on the projector immediately following a power off procedure.

Warning Indicator

When the "Power" LED indicator turns red, it indicates the projector has overheated. The projector will automatically shut itself down.



When the "Power" LED indicator flashes red and the message below displays on-screen, the projector has detected that the lamp is approaching its end of life. When you see this message, change the lamp as soon as possible or contact your local dealer or our service center.



When the "Power" LED indicator flashes red and the message below displays on-screen, it indicates the fan failed. Stop using the projector and disconnect the power cable from the electrical outlet, then contact your local dealer or our service center.


Adjusting the Projected Image

Adjusting the Height of Projector Image

The projector is equipped with adjustable feet to raise and lower the image to fill the screen.

To raise/lower the image:

1. Use **0** to fine-tune the display angle.







- The tilt angle of the projector should not exceed 15 degrees, nor should the projector be installed in any way other than the desktop and ceiling mount, otherwise lamp life could decrease dramatically.
- You can raise the projector front up to 4 degrees by rotating the tilt foot.
- 1 Tilt adjusting wheel


Adjusting the Projector Zoom/Focus

You may turn the zoom ring to zoom in or out. To focus the image, rotate the focus ring until the image is clear. The projector will focus at distances from 3.9 to 39.4 feet (1.2 to 12.0 meters) with mechanical travel.



Adjusting Projection Image Size







On Screen Display

The Projector has a multilingual On Screen Display that allows you to make image adjustments and change a variety of settings. The projector will automatically detect the source.

How to operate

- 1. To open the OSD, press "Menu" on the Remote Control.
- When OSD is displayed, use ◀ ▶ keys to select any item in the main menu. While making a selection on a particular page, press ▼ key to enter sub menu.
- 3. Use ▲ ▼ keys to select the desired item in the sub menu and adjust the settings by ◀ ▶ key.
- 4. If the setting has ← icon, you could press "Enter" to enter another sub menu. Press "Menu" to close the sub menu after adjustment.
- 5. After adjusting the settings, press "Menu" go back to the main menu.
- 6. To exit, press "Menu" again. The OSD will be closed and the projector will automatically save the new settings.





If no button operation is made for 30 seconds, the OSD will be closed automatically.




Image (PC Mode)

Picture Mode

There are many factory presets optimized for various types of images. Use the \triangleleft or \triangleright to select the item.

- Presentation: For computer or notebook.
- Movie: For home theater.
- ▶ sRGB: For standard color.

Brightness

Adjust the brightness of the image.

- ▶ Press the ◀ to darken image.

Contrast

Clock

"Clock" changes the display data frequency to match the frequency of your computer's graphic card. If you experience a vertical flickering bar, use this function to make an adjustment.

Phase

Synchronize the signal timing of the projector with the graphics card. If you experience an unstable or flickering image, use this function to correct it.

White Peaking

Use the white peaking control to set the white peaking level of DMD chip. 0 stands for minimal peaking, and 10 stands for maximum peaking. If you prefer a stronger image, adjust towards the maximum setting. For a smooth and more natural image, adjust towards the minimum setting.

Color Temp.

Adjust the color temperature. At higher temperature, the screen looks colder; at lower temperature, the screen looks warmer.



Aspect Ratio

Use this function to choose your desired aspect ratio.

 - This format is for 4x3 input sources not enhanced for Widescreen TV.
- This format is for 16:9 input sources, like HDTV and DVD enhanced for Widescreen TV.

 This format displays the original image without any scaling.

Orientation

Front-Desktop

The factory default setting.

Rear-Desktop

When you select this function, the projector reverses the image so you can project behind a translucent screen.

Front-Ceiling
When you select this function, the projector turns the image upside down for ceiling-mounted projection.

Rear-Ceiling

When you select this function, the projector reverses and turns the image upside down at same time. You can project from behind a translucent screen with ceiling mounted projection.



Default Setting

Source Lock

When this function is turned "Off", the projector will search for other signals if the current input signal is lost. When this function is turned "On", it will only search a specified connection port.

Fan Control

Choose "On" to turn on Fan Control mode. Operate the fan at full speed continuously to allow for proper high altitude cooling of the projector.

Lamp Life Reminder

Choose this function to show or to hide the lamp end of life warning message. The message will show up 100 hours before end of life.

ECO Mode

Choose "On" to dim the projector lamp which will lower power consumption and extend the lamp life. Choose "Off" to return to normal mode.

BrilliantColorTM

Choose "On" to provide true, more vibrant colors.

Power Management

Set the interval of power-off of the system, if there is no signal input. (In minutes)

Audio



- Mute:
 - Choose "On" to mute the volume.
 - Choose "Off" to restore the volume.



Troubleshooting

If you experience trouble with the projector, refer to the following information. If the problem persists, please contact your local dealer or service center.

Problem: No image appears on screen

- ▶ Ensure all the cables and power connections are correctly and securely connected as described in the "Installation" section.
- Ensure the pins of connectors are not crooked or broken.



Fee: US\$200 for 12 days

In case faulty unit is under warranty exclusions case or under Out of Warranty period, NEC Authorized Service Station will Inform estimation of actual service cost to the Enduser with reason.

4. Dead on Arrival (DOA):

Enduser must take this issue up with their original supplier in the country of purchase.

NEC Authorized Service Station will repair the DOA unit as a Warranty repair, but will not exchange DOA unit with new units.

5. Loan Service Charges and Conditions:

Upon acceptance of this NEC Projector, Customer agrees to assume liability for this loan unit.

The current cost of use of this loan unit is \$200.00 USD for 12 calendar days.
