



Before Operating the PS

 TALK Button:

 Used to make or receive calls.

 Joystick:

 Used to adjust the ringer/receiver

volume, select the Function mode and the function displayed directly above, and move the cursor to select a desired item.

(F)

SPEAKERPHONE Button:

Used for the hands-free conversation. Press TALK button to return to the receiver.

(R) RECALL Button:


Used to disconnect the current call and make another call without hanging up, or answer Call Waiting from the telephone company.

INTERCOM Button:

Used to make or receive intercom calls.

- CANCEL/POWER Button: Used to end calls, exit the Phonebook or Function mode, or turn on/off the PS.
- Soft Buttons: Used to select the function displayed directly above each button. Functions displayed depend on the state of use.



Battery Installation

Insert the batteries as shown. The negative \bigcirc end should be inserted first. Close the cover as indicated by the arrow.





 \bullet When you replace the batteries, the positive \oplus end should be removed first.

Battery Charge

At the time of shipment, the batteries are not charged. **Please charge the batteries for about 7 hours before** initial use.





- When the battery has been completely charged, the charge indicator will change from red to green. Refer to "Battery Information" on page 45.
- It is normal for the PS and charger to feel warm while the battery is charging.
- Keep devices sensitive to magnetic fields away from the charger.

• When the PS is turned on, it will be in standby mode. Standby mode is the state of the PS when it is not performing any operations and is awaiting calls.



Operation Outline

Functions of the PS are accessed through the display menu, and selected with the joystick and soft keys. The guidance display is shown in standby mode for easy operation.



- You cannot toggle the displays while in key lock mode or while the PS is on a charger.
 - You can select whether the guidance display is shown or not. (See page 36.)

Function Menu Display

Press the joystick to display the function menu.

Main menu – while in standby mode





Caller ID: Displays the incoming call log.

Ringer Option: Accesses to the "Ringer Option".



New Phonebook: Stores a new item in the Handset Phonebook.



Setting Handset: Accesses to the "Setting Handset".



PBX Program: Enters the PBX programming mode.



Walkie-Talkie: Sets or turns on/off the Walkie-Talkie mode. (See page 41.)

Sub menu – while in off-hook/during a conversation





Phone book: Accesses to the Phonebook.



Caller ID: Displays the incoming call log.



Redial: Displays the outgoing call log.



Mute:

Turns the microphone on/off.

Used to leave a message waiting indication or call back the party who left you a message waiting indication.



Search Wave:

Searches the strongest radio signal coming from the Cell Station.





Used to enter programming mode.

🕨 Flexible Key Display

The flexible key can be used to seize an line while making or receiving an outside call (F-CO key), or used as a function key. Move the Joystick right to display the F-CO key list. Icons shown in the F-CO list function similarly to the LED indicator on a Proprietary Telephone; \bullet is the same as a green LED, and \bigcirc is the same as a red LED.

You can hold a call exclusively so that other people cannot retrieve the call.




- The method used to hold a call depends on the Call Hold mode (Regular Hold/ Exclusive Call Hold). Ask your manager what the current mode is.
- When you hold several outside line calls, you need to assign the CO keys (Single line/Group line/Loop Line/ICD Group) to a flexible key as necessary, beforehand.

Handset Phonebook


You can store up to 200 items with names, phone numbers and category numbers in the handset for easy access. All directory items are stored in alphabetical order.

Incoming Call Identification

You can organise entries in the Handset Phonebook into one of 9 categories. A call from someone stored in one of these categories will be indicated by the ringer type, light (LED) colour pattern assigned to the category.








• When storing an outside phone number, the line access number will be stored automatically. The line access number must be identical to the PS's "Line Access CD" setting (Call Option). (See page 36.)

Hot Key Dial

The phone numbers stored in the handset phonebook can be assigned as hot key.



Entering Characters

You can enter characters and digits using the dialling buttons. You can select one of 5 character modes by pressing the **Right Soft Key** while entering a name. The function icon above the soft key displays the current character mode.

See "Character Mode Table" (page 28) for available characters.


🕨 Walkie-Talkie

Using Walkie-Talkie mode, you can communicate with another handset even when out of range of a base unit. Only Panasonic DECT Portable Station which supports Walkie-Talkie can be used. Handsets have to be in Walkie-Talkie mode, and have the same Walkie-Talkie group number. In Walkie-Talkie mode, you cannot make or receive a call through the PBX.







Troubleshooting

Problem	Description and Solution
The PS does not work.	 The battery is drained. → Charge the battery fully. (See "Battery Charge" on page 7.) The PS has been cancelled or the PS has not been registered. → Consult your dealer. The power is OFF. → Turn it ON. (See "Power On/Off" on page 8.)
The PS does not ring.	 Ringer volume is set to "off". → Adjust the ringer volume level. (See "Ringer Volume Adjustment" on page 13.)
You cannot make/receive a call.	 The PS is out of range or the Cell Station (CS) is busy. → Move closer to the CS or try again later. The radio channel is busy or a radio communication error occurred. → Try again later.
You cannot dial.	 The number which you dialled is restricted by the Business Telephone System. → Consult your dealer. The key lock mode is ON. → To cancel the mode, press the Joystick for about 2 seconds. (See "Key Lock" on page 13.) The radio channel is busy or a radio communication error occurred. → Try again later.
Noise is frequently heard.	\rightarrow Set the PS and CS away from other electrical appliances. \rightarrow Move closer to the CS.
"CS BUSY" is displayed.	 When the Cell Station is busy, the PS will sound a search tone. If the PS does not find an available Cell Station, a busy tone will be heard. → Try again later.
"PS Not Connected" is displayed.	 The called PS is out of range or the PS is power off. → Try again later.
The PS stops working during operation.	 → Turn the power OFF and ON, then try again. (See "Power On/Off" on page 8.) → Reinsert the batteries and try again. (See "Battery Installation" on page 7.)

Battery Information

After your Panasonic batteries are fully charged [at 25 °C]:

Operation	Operating Time
While in use (TALK)	10 hrs approx.
While not in use (Standby)	120 hrs approx.

- Battery charge may be shortened depending on usage conditions and ambient temperature.
- The batteries cannot be overcharged.
- The batteries will drain even while the unit is "OFF".
- The PS can receive calls while charging.
- Battery consumption increases when the PS is used out of range. If "♥" flashes, power off the PS.
- Clean the handset and the charger contacts with a soft, dry cloth once a month. Clean more often if the unit is subject to grease, dust or high humidity. Otherwise the batteries may not charge properly.
- Read "Important Notice Concerning the Correct Use and Charging of Ni-MH Batteries."

Low Battery Warning

The batteries needs to be charged when " \square " flashes or the alarm sounds every one minute.*

* If the low battery warning occurs during a conversation, you can continue the call for one minute, then the call will be disconnected automatically.

Replacing the Batteries

If " **I** " flashes after a few telephone calls even when the batteries have been fully charged, it is time to replace the batteries with new ones.

Before replacing the batteries, turn the power off to prevent memory loss. Replace the batteries. Charge the new batteries for at least 7 hours.

If you replace the batteries before the low battery warning appears, the battery strength icon may display an incorrect reading. In this case, use the PS as normal with the new batteries installed. When the low battery warning is displayed, charge the batteries for about 7 hours.

The battery strength icon will then display a correct reading.

- Please replace with PANASONIC batteries, part number HHR-4EPT/BA2.
- Replace both batteries and close the cover then charge the handset for about 7 hours.



Please use only Panasonic R03P (Ni-MH) batteries, part number HHR-4EPT/BA2.

Caution

Important Notice Concerning the Correct Use and Charging of Ni-MH Batteries

Batteries, due to their construction, undergo some wear and tear. The lifetime of a battery also depends on correct maintenance. Charging and discharging are the most important factors. You should take notice of the following to maintain the life of the battery as long as possible.

Ni-MH batteries have a kind of memory, the "memory effect." If fully charged batteries are used several times only for 15 minutes in the handset and then recharged, the capacity of the batteries will be reduced to 15 minutes due to the memory effect. Therefore you should discharge the batteries completely, i.e. use them in the handset until " T " on the display starts flashing. Then recharge them as described in the manual. After the memory effect has occurred, it is possible to achieve almost complete capacity of the Ni-MH batteries by charging and discharging several times one after another.

Ni-MH batteries can also self-discharge. This self-discharge depends on the ambient temperature. At temperatures under 0 °C, the self-discharge will be the lowest. High humidity and high temperatures support the self-discharge. Also long-term storage will lead to self-discharge. A dead Ni-MH battery should not be disposed of normally. They contain toxic heavy metal hydride and therefore should be recycled.

Safety Instructions

Pay special attention to the safety suggestions listed below.

Safety

 Power source: The AC adaptor should be connected to a power supply only of the type as marked on the AC adaptor. The AC adaptor is used as the main disconnect device, ensure that the AC outlet is located/installed near the unit and is easily accessible.

- Non use periods: When the PS is not being used, turn the power off. When left unused for a long period of time, the charger should be unplugged from the AC outlet.
- 3) Do not place metal items such as coins or rings on the charger. As they become hot, you might get burned if you touch them.

Installation

Environment

- 1) Water and moisture: Do not use the PS and the charger near water for example, near a bathtub, washbowl, sink, etc. Damp basements should also be avoided.
- 2) Heat: The PS and the charger should be kept away from heat sources such as radiators, kitchen ranges, etc. They also should not be placed in rooms where the temperature is less than 5 °C or greater than 40 °C.

Placement

- 1) Stacking: Do not place heavy objects on top of the PS and charger.
- 2) Foreign material: Care should be taken so that objects do not fall onto and liquids are not spilled into the PS and charger. Do not subject the PS and charger to excessive smoke, dust, mechanical vibration, or shock.
- 3) Surface: Place the charger on a flat surface. If the charger is mounted on the wall, install it straight.



For best performance

Operating Range

- The range of operation depends on the topography of your office, weather or usage conditions, because signals are transmitted between the Cell Station (CS) and the PS by radio waves.
- 2) Normally, you get greater range outdoors than indoors. If there are obstacles such as walls, noise may interfere with your telephone calls. In particular, high metal shelves or reinforced concrete walls will restrict your operating range.
- 3) A PS may not work when it is too far from the CS depending on the structure of the building.

Noise

Occasional noise or interference may occur due to electromagnetic radiation from objects such as refrigerators, microwave ovens, faxes, TVs, radios, or personal computers. If noise disturbs your telephone calls, keep the PS away from these electrical appliances.
