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# RuncoCare<sup>™</sup> Standard Two Year Limited Warranty

Congratulations on your purchase of a Runco® product! With proper installation, setup and care, you should enjoy many years of unparalleled video performance.

This RuncoCare Standard Limited Warranty is provided free of charge by Runco International with the purchase of a covered Runco product. The following sets forth Runco's Standard Limited Warranty applicable to all Runco projectors, processors, LCD and plasma display products, with the exception of the following models: XP-103DHD, SC-1, SC-1a and VW-100HD<sup>1</sup>.

The following terms and conditions of the RuncoCare Standard Limited Warranty represent a contract between us, Runco International and you, the customer who has purchased a Runco product. This contract applies to purchases of covered Runco products occurring on or after September 1, 2008. Runco reserves the right to change the terms of this contract, and such changes shall apply to purchases of covered Runco products that occur on or after any future effective date.

#### Warranty Coverage

Runco warrants its products to be free from defects in material and workmanship during the warranty period provided below. If, in Runco's determination, a product proves to be defective in material or workmanship during the warranty period, Runco will repair the product, replace the product with a similar new or like new product, or refund a prorata share of the purchase price (calculated based on the remainder of the warranty period and the thencurrent MSRP<sup>2</sup> of a similar product), if repair or replacement of the product is determined by Runco to not be feasible.

#### Length of Warranty

Runco products are warranted for two (2) years from the date of shipment from Runco. Lamps are warranted six (6) months from the date of shipment or 1000 hours, whichever comes first. All other accessories, which includes, but is not limited to, cables, remotes, carrying cases, lens cap and other peripherals sold with the Runco product, are warranted for ninety (90) days from the date of shipment. Repaired product or replacement lamp is subsequently warranted for the remaining portion (if any) of the original warranty term or 90 days from the date the product was shipped to you, whichever is longer.

#### Eligibility

This RuncoCare Standard Limited Warranty is valid only for the first customer who purchases the covered product from an authorized Runco dealer or distributor. This warranty is not transferable. You may be required to provide proof of purchase in order to receive warranty services.

<sup>1.</sup> Runco may update this list of products excluded from this warranty from time to time at Runco's sole discretion, but updates to the list of covered products will not apply on a retroactive basis.

<sup>2.</sup> MSRP is defined as the most recent product price listed on Runco's price list.

#### **RuncoCare Claim Procedure**

In the event of a product defect, please follow the warranty claim procedure provided below:

- 1. The Customer is required to contact a Runco dealer or Runco Technical Support via email at support@runco.com or via phone at (toll free) 800-23RUNCO (800-237-8626). If the customer is located outside North America, call +3589 4200 554 in Europe for product service.
- 2. Be prepared to provide the date of purchase, the place of purchase, serial number, product model number, description of the problem and troubleshooting steps already attempted.
- 3. Runco Technical Support staff will attempt to correct any minor issues that may be causing the problem. If Runco is unable to fix the problem to the customer's satisfaction, Runco will issue a Return Material Authorization (RMA) if it is determined that the claim was made within the coverage period of the Standard Limited Warranty.
- 4. The customer will need to return the defective product to the Runco repair depot location specified by the Runco technical support representative. The customer will need to properly package the defective product, consisting of the product only, and not include any accessories (e.g., cables, remotes, carrying cases, lens, lens cap and other peripherals) and return it to the Runco repair depot specified by the technical support representative. It is the customer's responsibility to properly package the hardware, include all appropriate materials, and return it to the location specified by the Runco technical support department. The customer will need to address and resolve any shipping damage claims directly with the shipping company.
- 5. The customer is responsible for providing a suitable box to ship the defective product to an authorized Runco repair depot. Boxes may be purchased from a Runco technical support representative.
- 6. The customer is responsible for paying freight charges to ship the defective product to an authorized Runco repair depot.
- 7. Runco will pay freight charges to return the repaired/replacement product to the customer from the Runco repair depot.
- 8. Once an RMA has been created, the customer may contact serviceorders@runco.com for followup questions or confirmation status of the claim process.



# 2. Controls and Functions

#### Figure 2-1 shows the key Q-750i components.



#### Figure 2-1. Q-750i Front/Side/Top View

• TOP IR SENSOR

Receives infrared signals from the remote control unit.

#### • INTAKE VENT

Internal fans draw cool air into the projector through this vent.

#### RUNCO LOGO

The logo can be rotated to match the projector orientation: inverted (ceiling-mounted) or upright. To rotate the logo, grip it at the sides, pull it away from the projector and rotate it 180 degrees.

#### • FOCUS RING

Rotate this to focus the projected image.

#### PROJECTION LENS

Available in two versions: standard throw range (1.85:1 to 2.40:1) and short throw range (1.56:1 to 1.86:1).

#### • FRONT BEZEL RETAINING SCREW

Loosen this screw to allow removal of the decorative front bezel, which provides access to the lens shift controls (refer to *Lens Shift* on page 34).

#### ZOOM RING

Rotate this to change the projected image size.

• FRONT IR SENSOR

Receives infrared signals from the remote control unit.


- EXHAUST VENT Warm air exits the projector through this vent. Ensure that it is not blocked.
- STATUS LED

Indicates projector status as follows:

- Solid green = AC power present, ready to turn on.
- Flashing green = Projector is initializing; keypad functions not allowed.
- Off = Normal operation.
- Flashing red = Over temperature, user intervention (clear vents, turn on AC) may fix problem
- Solid red = Error that requires servicing (fan failure, Power-on Self-Test (POST) failure).

Figure 2-2 shows the Q-750i rear panel.

- HDMI 1 (Digital) HDMI 2 (Digital) HDCP-compliant digital video inputs for connecting an HDMI or DVI source.
- 2. **POWER INPUT (100 to 240 VAC)** Connect the Q-750i to power here.
- 3. **RGB**

Provides a standard, 15-pin VGA-style connection to either an RGB or component high-definition source, or to a personal computer. The Q-750i automatically detects the input signal resolution.

#### 4. COMPONENT 2

Three BNCs for connecting component (YPbPr) video sources.

#### 5. COMPONENT 1/SCART (RCA connectors)

#### 9. TRIGGER 2 (3.5-mm, mini phono jack)

Provides 12 (+/- 1.5) volt switched output for screen relays with 250mA current capacity and short protection.

#### 10. TRIGGER 1

Provides 12 (+/- 1.5) volt switched output for screen relays with 250mA current capacity and short protection.

#### 11. RS-232

A female, 9-pin D-sub connector for interfacing with a PC or home theater automation/control system.

#### 2.3 Q-750i Remote Control




Figure 2-3. Q-750i Remote Control

#### 1. LIGHT

Press to illuminate the buttons.

#### 2. **ON / OFF**

Use these buttons to turn the projector on or off.

#### 3. Source Selection Buttons:

#### VID

Press to select Composite video input as the source.

#### S-VID (S-Video)

Press to select the S-Video input as the source.

#### HDMI 1 / HDMI 2

Press to select an HDMI input.

#### HD 1 / HD 2 / HD 3

Press to select the "HD 1," "HD 2" or "HD 3" video input as the source. By default, these buttons are assigned to the COMPONENT 1, COMPONENT 2 and RGB video inputs respectively; however, you can re-assign these buttons to other inputs. For more information, refer to *HD 1 Key / HD 2 Key / HD 3 Key* on page 66.

#### 4. INFO

Press to display input signal and product information.

#### Cursor Keys ( $\land$ , $\prec$ , $\forall$ , $\succ$ )

Use these buttons to select items or settings, adjust settings or switch display patterns.

#### EXIT

Press to save menu item setting(s), exit the current menu and return to the previous one.

#### ENTER

Press to select a highlighted menu item or confirm a changed setting.

#### MENU

Press this button to show or hide the OSD controls.

#### 5. Picture Adjustment Buttons:

#### BRT (Brightness)

Press to adjust black level.

#### **CONT (Contrast)**

Press to adjust white level.

#### COL (Color)

Press to adjust color intensity.

#### TNT (Tint)

Press to adjust color hues.

#### 6. Memory Preset Buttons:

#### CUST1

Press to recall settings for the current input from the "Custom 1" memory preset.

#### **ISF NIGHT**

Press to recall settings for the current input from the "ISF Night" memory preset.

#### **ISF DAY**

Press to recall settings for the current input from the "ISF Day" memory preset.

#### CUST2

Press to recall settings for the current input from the "Custom 2" memory preset.

#### 7. Aspect Ratio Selection Buttons

Use these buttons to select an aspect ratio directly, as follows:

#### 16:9

For viewing 16:9 DVDs or HDTV programs in their native aspect ratio.

#### 4:3

Scales the input signal to fit 4:3 display mode in the center of the screen.

#### LBOX (Letterbox)

For viewing LaserDisc movies or non-anamorphic DVDs on a 16:9 screen.

#### VWIDE (VirtualWide)

Enlarges a 4:3 image horizontally in a NON-linear fashion to fit 16:9 full screen display.

#### CINEMA

For viewing 2.35:1 source material.

#### VCINE (Virtual Cinema – CineWide-equipped projectors only)

Selects the Virtual Cinema aspect ratio, used for viewing 16:9 source material on a 2.35:1 screen.


#### 9. FOCUS / ZOOM / LENS

Not used with this projector.

# 3. Installation

To install batteries in the remote control:

- 1. Slide the battery compartment cover in the direction of the arrow to remove it.
- 2. Install two AAA batteries with the correct polarity.
- 3. Replace the cover.



#### 3.1 Remote Control

- Make sure that the battery polarities are correct when installing the batteries.
- Do not mix an old battery with a new one or different types of batteries.
- If you will not use the remote control for a long time, remove the batteries to avoid damage from battery leakage.
- Make sure that there is nothing obstructing the infrared beam between the remote control and the IR receiver on the projector.
- If the effective range of the remote control decreases, or it stops working, replace the batteries with new ones.
- The remote control may fail to operate if the infrared remote sensor is exposed to bright sunlight or fluorescent lighting.
- Ambient conditions may possibly impede the operation of the remote control. If this happens, point the remote control at the projector, and repeat the operation.

Proper installation of your projector will ensure the quality of your display. Whether you are installing a projector temporarily or permanently, you should take the following into account to ensure your projector performs optimally.

Choose the installation type that best suits your needs: front or rear screen, floor mount or inverted mount. Table 3-2 compares these various installation methods.

#### 3.3 Installation Considerations

< Installation Type


In general, minimize or eliminate light sources directed at the screen. Contrast ratio in your images will be noticeably reduced if light directly strikes the screen, such as when a shaft of light from a window or floodlight falls on the image. Images may then appear washed out and less vibrant.

< Ambient Light

#### Throw Distance >

Throw distance is the distance measured from the front of the projector to the screen. This is an important calculation in any projector installation as it determines whether or not you have enough room to install your projector with a desired screen size and if your image will be the right size for your screen.

You can quickly estimate the throw distance by taking the width of the screen and multiplying it by the lens throw ratio; see Figure 3-1. The result of this calculation tells you roughly how far back the projector should be positioned from the screen in order to project a focused image large enough to fill the screen.




Proper placement of the projector relative to the screen will yield a rectangular, perfectly-centered image that completely fills the screen.




#### Figure 3-2. Projector Placement

Ideally, the projector should be positioned perpendicular to the screen and in such a way that the lens center is aligned with either the top or bottom edge of the screen area, and centered horizontally. See Figure 3-2.

#### Vertical and Horizontal Lens Shift


#### Figure 3-4. Horizontal Lens Shift (Example Only)

You can use the lens shift controls on the projector remote to center the image on the screen. Lens shift is generally expressed as a percentage of the screen height or width, as shown in Figure 3-3 and Figure 3-4.




Note: This is a general example of lens shift. Lenses vary in their shift capabilities. No particular lens or projector is used in this example.

#### Figure 3-3. Vertical Lens Shift (Example Only)

Vertical Lens Shift (Standard Q-750i): The Q-750i provides up to 60% of vertical lens shift up or down. For example, with a 100 x 56 inch (1.78:1) screen, you can shift the image up to 33.60 inches (0.85 meters) above or below the screen center.

Vertical Lens Shift (Q-750i/CineWide or Q-750i/CineWide with AutoScope): The Q-750i provides up to 25% of upward vertical lens shift and up to 60% of downward vertical lens shift. For example, with a 100 x 56 inch (1.78:1) screen, you can shift the image up to 14.00 inches (0.36 meters) above or 33.60 inches (0.85 meters) below the screen center.

Horizontal Lens Shift: The Q-750i provides up to 12.5% of horizontal lens shift left or right. For example, with a 100 x 56 inch (1.78:1) screen, you can shift the image up to 12.50 inches (0.32 meters) left or right of the screen center.



Note: This is a general example of lens shift. Lenses vary in their shift capabilities. No particular lens or projector is used in this example.

- 1. With no vertical or horizontal lens shift, the lens center and screen center are aligned with each other.
- 2. Vertical shift limits are percentages of the screen height. Horizontal shift limits are percentages of the screen width.
- 3. Vertical lens shift figures are for ceiling mount configurations. For floor installations (where the projector is upright), reverse the up/down vertical lens shift percentages.

#### Folded Optics >

In rear-screen applications where space behind the projector is limited, a mirror may be used to fold the optical path, as shown in Figure 3-5. The position of the projector and mirror must be accurately set. If you are considering this type of installation, contact your dealer for assistance.



#### Figure 3-5. Folded Optics

- **Other Considerations** > Other considerations and tips that can help improve your installation:
  - Keep the ambient temperature constant and below 35°C (95°F). Keep the projector away from heating and/or air conditioning vents. Changes in temperature may cause drifts in the projector circuitry, which may affect performance.
  - Keep the projector away from devices that radiate electromagnetic energy such as motors and transformers. Common sources of these include slide projectors, speakers, power amplifiers and elevators.

If you are installing a standard (non-CineWide) Q-750i, skip this step and proceed with *Mounting the Q-750i* (page 26).

If you are installing a Q-750i/CineWide projector equipped with a *cylindrical* (Rainier II or McKinley) anamorphic lens, proceed with *Installing the Fixed CineWide Base Plate* (page 24).



**3.4** Installing the Optional CineWide/AutoScope Lens Mount

If you are installing a Q-750i/CineWide with AutoScope, proceed as follows to install the AutoScope lens motor.



- 1. Do not install the CineWide lens yet, only the fixed CineWide base plate or AutoScope lens motor. You will install the CineWide lens after you install the projector and adjust the primary lens.
- 2. Some components shipped with your projector may differ slightly from what is shown in these instructions.





Figure 3-6. Q-750i/CineWide with AutoScope Motor Assembly

## **Remove Projector Front Feet:**

Place the projector upside down on a blanket or other soft surface. Loosen and remove the two front feet on the projector.



**Install Ceiling Mount Adapters/Projector Stands:** For ceiling installations, these brackets bring the mounting points for the projector mounting plate (included with the projector ceiling mount kit) from the bottom of the projector up and around the AutoScope lens motor housing. For floor installations (where the projector is upright), the adapters allow the projector to lie flat on the mounting surface.




Figure 3-7. Q750i with Ceiling Mount Adapters/Projector Stands

Using six (6) each of the supplied, M6 x 12mm Pan-Head Phillips screws (item #2), attach the AutoScope Ceiling Mount Adapters/Projector Stands (items #3 and #4) to the projector as shown in Figure 3-7.

## Install Lens Motor:




Figure 3-8. AutoScope Lens Motor Installation




Figure 3-9. Q-750i/CineWide with Rainier II/McKinley (Cylindrical) Lens Base Plate - Exploded View

To install the fixed CineWide base plate on a Q-750i/CineWide:

- 1. Place the projector upside down on a blanket or other soft surface.
- 2. Place the CineWide base plate on the bottom of the projector.
- 3. **If you are mounting the projector on a ceiling:** Line up the three holes on the left and right mounting rails (included with the projector ceiling mount kit) with those on the projector and base plate.
- 4. Secure the CineWide base plate (and ceiling mounting rails, if needed) to the projector with the Pan-Head Phillips screws provided with the CineWide lens base plate.






Figure 3-11. RGB Connections




Figure 3-12. Component Video Connections




Figure 3-13. Composite and S-Video Connections





Figure 3-14. RS-232 Control System Connection






## Figure 3-16. External IR Receiver Connection



Press  $\blacktriangle$  or  $\blacktriangledown$  to select a language. Then, press **ENTER** to confirm your selection.

If the Q-750i is installed behind the screen, you must change the picture orientation to match the installation method. To do this, press **MENU** on the remote control. Then, select System from the Main Menu.

If the projector is used in a rear-projection application (see Figure 3-5), press ▼ repeatedly to select Rear Projection from the System Menu. Press ◀ or ► to set it to On.

If the projector is ceiling-mounted, the Q-750i automatically inverts the image. If this automatic inversion is not desired, select Ceiling Mode from the System Menu and set it to **Off**.

# 3.11 Installing and Adjusting the CineWide Anamorphic Lens

It is extremely important that the primary lens is properly adjusted before you install the anamorphic lens. Ensure that the image from the primary lens is perfectly centered on the screen.





Figure 3-17. Anamorphic Lens Mounting Assembly - Exploded View

The Anamorphic lens mount kit consists of everything shown in Figure 3-17. Some components shipped with your projector may differ slightly from what is shown in these instructions.

# Attaching Lens Mounting Assembly to Lens Motor Carriage Plate or Fixed CineWide Base Plate:

- 1. Remove the two Yaw/X Adjustment Levers (item #8) from the bottom of the Anamorphic Lens Holder (item #5).
- 2. Place the Anamorphic Lens Holder on top of the AutoScope Carriage Plate or Fixed CineWide Base Plate (item #7). Position the bracket so that the long slot at the bottom of the lens holder is perpendicular to the corresponding slots on the plate.
- 3. Secure the Anamorphic Lens Holder to the plate using the Hex Bolts/Washers (item #6) and Yaw/X Adjustment Levers that you removed in Step 1.
- 4. Use the Lens Mounting Screws to attach the Lens Adapter Ring (item #1) to the Pitch Adjustment Yoke (item #2); see Figure 3-18. (Use the round, threaded holes on the yoke.)
- Use the Height/Y Adjustment T-Screws/Washers (item #3), Pitch Adjustment T-Screws/Washers (item #4) and T-Nuts (item #9) to attach the Pitch Adjustment Yoke and Lens Adapter Ring to the Anamorphic Lens Holder. The Yoke should be as close to the primary lens as possible.
- 6. Attach the lens to the Lens Adapter Ring by threading it clockwise.

**Select the Appropriate CineWide Scaling Method:** CineWide and CineWide with AutoScope both produce the same image geometry for a given aspect ratio (refer to Table 4-2). However, when the viewer selects the 16:9, 4:3, Letterbox or VirtualWide aspect ratio, CineWide uses different scaling algorithms to compensate for the fact that the anamorphic lens is always in front of the primary lens.

To configure the Q-750i to use the appropriate CineWide scaling method:

- 1. Press **MENU** on the remote control.
- 2. Select Control from the Main menu and press ENTER.
- 3. Select CineWide from the Control menu.
- For a Q-750i/CineWide (fixed anamorphic lens), choose CineWide. For a Q-750i/CineWide with AutoScope (motorized anamorphic lens), choose AutoScope.

**Configure Lens Motor Trigger (Q-750i/CineWide with AutoScope only):** CineWide with AutoScope maintains constant image height independent of the aspect ratio, while using the full display resolution of the projector. It accomplishes this by moving the anamorphic lens in front of the primary lens when widescreen material is being viewed. When the viewer transitions back to 16:9 or 4:3 source material, the anamorphic lens moves out of the light path.


To configure the lens motor trigger on the Q-750i for proper AutoScope operation:

- 1. Press **MENU** on the remote control.
- 2. Select Control from the Main menu and press ENTER.
- 3. Select Trigger 1 or Trigger 2 (whichever one is connected to the lens motor) from the Control menu.
- 4. Set Trigger 1 or Trigger 2 to "AutoScope." This enables the lens motor to move the anamorphic lens into position (in front of the primary lens) when the Cinema or Virtual Cinema aspect ratio is selected.
- Select the Cinema or Virtual Cinema aspect ratio to move the anamorphic lens into position, if it isn't already. To do this, press CINEMA or VCINE on the Q-750i remote control (Figure 2-3).

### Adjusting the Horizontal (X) Lens Position:

- 1. Project a white field on the screen.
- 2. Loosen the Yaw/X-Adjustment Levers underneath the lens.


3. Slowly move the anamorphic lens into place (from right to left or vice versa) so that there are no shadows on either side of the screen:

4. When the horizontal position is properly set, tighten the Yaw/X-Adjustment Levers to secure the lens in place.


Adjusting the Height (Y): With the white field still on-screen, loosen the Height/Y Adjustment T-Screws on either side of the lens. Then, slowly move the anamorphic lens into place so that there are no shadows on the top or bottom of the screen:

When the height is properly set, tighten the Height Adjustment T-Screws to secure the lens in place.

**Adjusting the Pitch (Angle):** Next, angle the lens to even out any top-to-bottom pincushion distortion. To do this, loosen the Pitch Adjustment T-Screws (directly below the Height/Y Adjustment T-Screws) on either side of the lens to allow it to pivot freely. Then, adjust the anamorphic lens angle so that the projected image is rectangular:



Incorrect Lens Angle

The anamorphic lens will almost always be angled with respect to the projector; this is normal.


Once the proper lens angle has been set, firmly tighten the Pitch Adjustment T-Screws to secure the lens in place.




There may be some pincushion distortion even after the lens is properly adjusted, especially at shorter throw distances. If this is the case, Runco recommends that you slightly over-scan the image into the screen frame area to mask the distortion.

**Adjusting the Yaw:** Loosen the Yaw/X-Adjustment Levers to allow the lens to pivot freely from side to side. Then, angle the lens to even out any left-right pincushion distortion:

Anamorphic Lens (Top View)









Once the proper lens angle has been set, firmly tighten the Yaw/X-Adjustment Levers to secure the lens in place.

# Geometry:

- 1. Input an anamorphic cross-hatch test pattern to the projector.
- 2. Unscrew the Anamorphic Lens just enough to allow it to rotate freely.
- 3. Grasp the lens by the center ring and rotate the lens until the image is properly anamorphic:







**Focus:** Finally, rotate the Focus Ring on the anamorphic lens to fine-tune the optical focus.

**Selecting An Input**

Source

When you turn on the Q-750i, it switches to the last selected input and looks for a valid signal.

Use these buttons on the remote control to select an input source directly.

You can assign the HD 1, HD 2 and HD 3 buttons to any input. The default assignments are: HD 1 = Component 1, HD 2 = Component 2, HD 3 = RGB.

For more information, refer to HD 1 Key / HD 2 Key / HD 3 Key on page 66.

For PIP purposes, there are three groups of inputs separated by their display modes:

- Video (SD) group: Video, S-Video and SCART inputs.
- Graphic (HD) group: Component 1, Component 2 and RGB inputs.
- Digital Video group: HDMI 1 and HDMI 2 inputs.

PIP shows one input from any of these groups within or beside one input from either of the other two groups.

For more information, refer to **PIP Position** on page 63.

- For best results, Runco recommends that you set ConstantContrast to Off before adjusting Brightness, Contrast and other image quality settings in this menu (refer to **ConstantContrast** on page 58). After you have completed the initial calibration, set ConstantContrast to On if desired.
- 2. Image controls only operate on the active source. To adjust the PIP source, switch to the PIP source (thereby making it the active source), adjust the controls and then switch back.

**Aspect Ratio:** To change the aspect ratio (size and shape) of the projected image, press ▲ or ▼ to highlight Aspect Ratio. Use the ◀ or ▶ buttons to select the appropriate aspect ratio for your screen size, installed lens configuration and the type of program material being viewed, then press ENTER; refer to Table 4-2.

**Memory:** Select Memory from the Main menu, then press **ENTER** to recall image quality settings previously saved, or to save changed settings in any of four memory locations.

- Recall Memory: Select Recall Memory from the Memory menu to recall saved image quality settings. Unless you select **Default** (see below), this control affects all sources, not just the active source.
  - **Custom 1** and **Custom 2** contain the factory default settings when the projector is initially turned on.
  - When you recall the **ISF Day** or **ISF Night** memory settings, all settings associated with these stored values are grayed out. This prevents unintended adjustments from being made. To remove this restriction, choose **Custom 1** or **Custom 2**.

**ISF Day** and **ISF Night** are grayed out unless these custom settings have already been saved.

- Choose Default to restore the factory-default settings for the active source only. The other sources are unaffected.
- Save Settings: Select Save Settings from the Memory menu to save any image-related settings you have changed to **Custom 1** or **Custom 2**.



# You must enter a passcode to access the Save ISF sub-menu.

The settings that are saved are the same as those saved with the *Save Settings* command (see above).


# Figure 4-3. Typical PLUGE Pattern for Adjusting Brightness

**Brightness:** On your external test pattern source, select a PLUGE pattern. (PLUGE is an acronym for "Picture Line-Up Generation Equipment.") Figure 4-3 shows a typical PLUGE pattern.

PLUGE patterns vary but generally consist of some combination of black, white and gray areas against a black background. The example above includes two vertical bars and four shaded boxes.

Select Brightness from the Main menu. Use the ◀ or ▶ buttons to adjust the level so that:

- The darkest black bars disappear into the background.
- The dark gray areas are barely visible.
- The lighter gray areas are clearly visible.
- The white areas are a comfortable level of true white.
- The image contains only black, gray and white (no color).

**Contrast:** On your external test pattern source, select a stepped, gray-bar pattern like the one shown in Figure 4-4.



# Figure 4-4. Typical Gray Bar Pattern for Adjusting Contrast

Select Contrast from the Main menu. Use the  $\blacktriangleleft$  or  $\triangleright$  buttons to adjust the contrast up until the top two bars become almost the same brightness, then down just until the brightness change between these bars is consistent with the other bars.



Brightness and Contrast controls are interactive. A change to one may require a subtle change to the other in order to achieve the optimum setting.

**Color:** To adjust the overall color intensity, select Color from the Main menu. Decrease this setting if colors are overly saturated; increase it if colors appear muted or washed out.

**Tint:** Tint or "hue" is the ratio of red to green in the color portion of the image. To adjust the tint, select Tint from the Main menu. Decrease this setting to shift the hue toward red; increase it to shift the hue toward green.



Like the Brightness and Contrast controls, the color and tint controls are interactive. A change to one may require a subtle change to the other in order to achieve the optimum setting.




Figure 4-5. Typical Test Pattern for Adjusting Sharpness

**Sharpness:** "Sharpness" is the amount of high-frequency detail in the image. To adjust this, select Sharpness from the Main menu. On your external test pattern source, select a pattern like the one shown in Figure 4-5.

Adjust as needed, looking for white edges around the transitions from black to gray and differently-sized lines in the "sweep" patterns at the top and bottom. Lower the sharpness setting to eliminate them.

**Noise Reduction:** To apply noise reduction to the source signal, select Noise Reduction from the Main menu. Noise Reduction is useful for clearing up noisy images from interlaced SD sources.

Use the ◀ or ▶ button to adjust as desired, keeping in mind that reducing noise (which reduces high frequencies) may also soften the image.


**Overscan:** Some television programs are produced based on the assumption that older television sets may not display the outer edges of the broadcast picture area. Overscan effectively hides these inactive, outer edges of the image. Choose one of the following:

- Off: This setting leaves the image as-is.
- **Crop:** This setting adds a mask at the left and right edges of the source active image equal to 3% of the displayed horizontal resolution, and at the top and bottom edges equal to 3% of the displayed vertical resolution.
- **Zoom:** This setting adds a factor to the scaling of the source active image so that the vertical and horizontal resolutions are 106% of the size determined by the aspect ratio function. Anything outside of the original image area is removed.



When the Aspect Ratio is set to **Native**, set Overscan to **Off** or **Crop**.

Figure 4-6 illustrates the effect of each overscan setting for each aspect ratio.

**Input Select:** To select a video source, press  $\blacktriangle$  or  $\triangledown$  to highlight Input Select, then press ENTER. This displays the Input Select sub-menu, shown in Figure 4-7.

The default source selection is **HDMI 1**. All sources that are not available per the source enable function (refer to *Input Enable* on page 62) are grayed out.

**PIP Select:** To select a PIP (secondary) video source, press  $\blacktriangle$  or  $\triangledown$  to highlight PIP Select, then press **ENTER**. The default PIP selection is Off.

All sources that are not available per the source enable function (refer to *Input Enable* on page 62) are grayed out.

All sources that cannot be used for PIP due to a shared electronic path with the Active source are grayed out. The PIP source is a saved setting for each source, like brightness and contrast.

If for some reason the current PIP source becomes invalid (by disabling it in the source enable menu, for instance), PIP Select automatically resets to Off.

**Resync:** If the projected image becomes unstable or degraded, press  $\blacktriangle$  or  $\checkmark$  to highlight Resync, then press ENTER. This causes a re-acquisition of the active source and the PIP source, if present. It also changes any Fine Sync settings (described on page page 59) for this timing to the default setting.

Use the controls in the Advanced menu, shown in Figure 4-8, to perform advanced image **Advanced** adjustments.

**Color Space:** Select Color Space from the Advanced menu to choose the color space of the source signal for HDMI, RGB, and component connections.

- The default setting, Auto, functions as follows:
  - HDMI: If the Auxiliary Video Information (AVI) infoframe contains color space and/or range data, the Q-750i uses that information. Otherwise, for RGB sources, the Q-750i uses the RGB-Video color space. For component SDTV and EDTV resolutions, REC601 is used. For other component video resolutions, REC709 is used.
  - RGB: If Hsync or Vsync signals are present, the Q-750i uses the RGB-PC color space. Otherwise, REC601 is used for SDTV and EDTV sources, and REC709 for all other sources.
  - Component: For SDTV and EDTV resolutions, the Q-750i uses the **REC601** color space. For all other resolutions **REC709** is used.

In most cases, the **Auto** setting determines the correct color space to use. If it does not, you can force the Q-750i to use a specific color space. Choose one of the following:

- **REC709** sets the color space matrix to that defined in ITU-R BT.709.
- **REC601** sets the color space matrix to that defined in ITU-R BT.601.
- **RGB-PC** uses RGB color space and sets black at 0,0,0 RGB and white at 255,255,255 RGB, assuming an 8-bit image.
- **RGB-Video** uses RGB color space and sets black at 16,16,16 RGB and white at 235,235,235, assuming an 8-bit image, to correspond to the luminance values defined in digital component standards.

**Video Standard:** Select Video Standard from the Advanced menu to specify the color system for composite video or S-Video input signals.

Different countries use different formats for video signals. Select the appropriate Video Standard for your region:

- Auto: The color systems are automatically identified and the format is set accordingly.
- **PAL:** This is the standard used in Europe, Australia and many other parts of the world, typically with a 50Hz frame rate.
- SECAM: This is a standard format used mainly in France and Russia.
- NTSC: This is the standard format used mainly in the United States and Japan.

**Gamma:** Select Gamma from the Advanced menu to choose a DLP de-gamma curve. The available settings are 1.8, 2.0, 2.2, 2.35 and 2.5.

Used correctly, the Gamma control can improve contrast while maintaining good details for blacks and whites.

If excess ambient light washes out the image and it becomes difficult or impossible to see details in dark areas, lower the gamma setting to compensate. This improves contrast while maintaining good details for blacks. Conversely, if the image is washed out and unnatural, with excessive detail in black areas, increase the setting.

**Color Temperature:** Color temperature defines the "color of gray;" that is, adjusts the 75% white point to various color points.

To choose a color temperature setting, select Color Temperature from the Advanced menu. Then, press  $\blacktriangleleft$  or  $\triangleright$  to select **5500K**, **6500K**, **7500K** or **9300K**. The default setting, 6500K, is appropriate for most situations. Higher settings produce a "bluer" picture; lower ones impart a reddish hue to the image. Select **Native** to disable white point adjustment of the source signal.



The Color Temperature setting is unavailable when you choose the "PCE" Color Gamut setting (refer to **Color Gamut**, below).

**DLP Frame Rate:** Select DLP Frame Rate from the Advanced menu to choose the output frame rate. You can have the Q-750i automatically determine the optimum frame rate, or you can force it to use a specific frame rate.



If PIP is active, the Q-750i converts the PIP source frame rate to the same frame rate as the main source.

- The default setting, **Auto**, frame locks to the main source if it has a vertical refresh rate of between 48 and 62Hz. Vertical refresh rates of from 24 to 31Hz are doubled. Frame rates between 31 and 48Hz and greater than 62Hz are converted to 60Hz.
- Select **48Hz** to force the output frame rate to 48Hz. Use this setting to eliminate 2:3 pull-down judder with 60Hz film-based sources.
- **50Hz** and **60Hz** force the output frame rate to 50Hz and 60Hz respectively.

**Color Gamut:** Select Color Gamut from the Advanced menu to select a color gamut (range) that may be different from the default color gamut.

Each setting defines the precise hue of each primary (red, green and blue) and secondary (yellow, cyan and magenta) color component used to generate the millions of colors produced in displays. Changing either or both of these numbers changes the hue of the color and relocates the "triangle" for possible colors. For example, changing the x/y coordinates for red moves the color closer to either orange or violet, which in turn affects all displayed colors having a red component.

- Auto automatically chooses the appropriate color gamut:
  - SMPTE-C for NTSC, 480i and 480p sources.
  - **EBU** for PAL, SECAM, 576i and 576p sources.
  - **REC709** for all other sources.
- **REC709** chooses the REC709 color gamut.
- Select **SMPTE-C** to use the color gamut defined in SMPTE 170M-1999.
- Select EBU to use the color gamut defined in EBU Tech. 3213-E.
- Select **Native** for Runco's recommended Personal Color Equalizer preset for typical video sources. It displays the fully saturated LED color gamut with appropriate color brightness, hue, and Runco Smart Color settings.
- Select **DCI** to use the color gamut defined in Digital Cinema System Specification Version 1.2.
- Select PCE to use the Personal Color Equalizer feature of the Q-750i. PCE lets you
  define a custom color gamut. Refer to PCE on page 60 for instructions on how to do
  this.

**SatCo:** Select SatCo from the Advanced menu to enable (**On**) or disable (**Off**) BrilliantColor<sup>™</sup> processing, which improves brightness in grays and secondary colors by allowing simultaneous display of multiple colors from the LED light sources. **ConstantContrast:** Select ConstantContrast from the Advanced menu to enable (**On**) or disable (**Off**) the ConstantContrast algorithm in the optical engine. ConstantContrast uses a dynamic LED driver that modulates light to the DMD based on the actual content of the video material. Runco recommends that you disable ConstantContrast before adjusting Brightness, Contrast or other image settings.

Adaptive Contrast: Adaptive Contrast enhancement expands the light and dark portions of an output image according to the mean luminance of the input image.

**RGB Adjust:** To remove any trace of color from the white areas of the projected image, choose RGB Adjust from the Advanced menu and press **ENTER**. This displays the RGB Adjust sub-menu, shown in Figure 4-9.

- **Gain:** Use the Gain controls to correct color imbalances in the bright areas of the image. A good way to do this is to use a test pattern consisting mostly of solid white areas, such as an 80 IRE "window" pattern. If the white areas contain traces of red, green or blue, decrease the Gain for that color.
- Offset: Use the Offset controls in the RGB Adjust sub-menu to correct color imbalances in the dark areas of the image. A good way to do this is to use a test pattern consisting mostly of dark gray areas, such as a 30 IRE "window" pattern. If the gray areas contain traces of red, green or blue, decrease the Offset for that color.

The Gain controls increase or decrease the full-scale input range; the Offset controls shift the entire range, resulting in a change in brightness.



Generally, higher Gain settings reduce the image contrast; higher Offset settings reduce the image brightness.

**Fine Sync:** To fine-tune the position and other image attributes, choose Fine Sync from the Advanced menu and press **ENTER**. This displays the Fine Sync sub-menu, shown in Figure 4-10.

- **V Position:** •This control adjusts the vertical position of the image within the designated image area, up to 25 per cent of the image height up or down.
- **H Position:** This control adjusts the horizontal position of the image within the designated image area, up to 25 per cent of the image width left or right.
- Phase (RGB or Component sources): This control adjusts the phase of the pixel sampling clock relative to the incoming signal. Adjust the phase when an RGB or Component image still shows shimmer or "noise" after Tracking has been optimized.



Adjust the Phase after adjusting Tracking (see below). If some shimmer from a video or HDTV source persists, use the Noise Reduction controls (described on page page 52) to remove high-frequency noise from the signal.

For best results, use a good test pattern such as a smooth gray consisting of a clear pattern of black and white pixels, or a similar "half on, half off" graphic image. Adjust the slidebar until the image stabilizes and each pixel is clearly defined. You may notice that you can stabilize the image at more than one point. Use either setting in such cases.

 Tracking (RGB or Component sources): Tracking determines the frequency of the pixel sampling clock, indicated by the number of incoming pixels per line, so that all pixels generated by a particular source are sampled. Steady flickering or several soft vertical stripes or bands across the entire image indicates poor pixel tracking. Proper pixel tracking helps ensure that the image quality is consistent across the screen, that aspect ratio is maintained and that pixel phase (see above) can be optimized.

• Sync Level (Component sources only): Select Sync Level to adjust the voltage level of the Q-750i Sync signal detection circuitry.

Sync Level adjustment is occasionally necessary when a DVD player or HDTV source signal drops "below black" (for example, during scenes with explosions or when subtitles are present) and causes the projector to temporarily lose sync. If the Sync Level from the source is persistently too low, the projector won't sync with the source at all.

The range is from 50 to 256 millivolts (mV) inclusive. The default setting is 240 mV and should rarely require adjustment.


**PCE:** To use the Personal Color Equalizer to define a custom color gamut, choose the "PCE" Color Gamut setting (refer to **Color Gamut** on page 57). Then, choose PCE from the Advanced menu and press **ENTER**. This displays the PCE sub-menu, shown in Figure 4-11.

**Hue/Saturation/Level:** PCE provides the ability to define a custom color gamut in terms of primary (red, green and blue) and secondary (yellow, cyan and magenta) color hues, saturation and level (brightness).

Each control operates only on the color specified. Surrounding colors are linearly interpolated based on their distance from each of these colors. In the CIE 1931 Yxy coordinate system (see Figure 4-12), Hue rotates the color coordinates around the white point, Saturation adjusts the coordinate's distance from white and Level adjusts the luminance (Y) of the color relative to white.

**RSC™ (Runco Smart Color):** Set RSC to On to to improve the accuracy of flesh tones and increase color saturation, without sacrificing the purity of other colors.

White Balance: To precisely adjust the white point associated with the custom color gamut, choose White Balance from the PCE sub-menu. These controls operate identically to the Gain controls in the RGB Adjust menu (described on page 58).

**System** > Use the controls in the System menu, shown in Figure 4-13, to change the display orientation and perform other, common installation tasks.

- HDMI 1/HDMI 2: Enables or disables the HDMI 1 and HDMI 2 sources.
- **RGB:** Enables or disables the RGB source.
- Comp 1/Comp 2: Enables or disables the Component 1 and Component 2 sources.
- Video: Enables or disables the Composite video source.



If either Component 1 or Video is enabled, SCART must be disabled.

- **S-Video:** Enables or disables the S-Video source.
- **SCART:** Enables or disables the SCART RGBS source.



If SCART is enabled, both Component 1 and Video must be disabled.

**PIP Position:** To change the position of the PIP image, choose PIP Position from the System menu; see Figure 4-15. Choose one of the following:


- **Top Left:** This places the PIP source into a 644x362 designated image area at the top left of the screen.
- **Top Right:** This places the PIP source into a 644x362 designated image area at the top right of the screen.
- **Bottom Left:** This places the PIP source into a 644x362 designated image area at the bottom left of the screen-safe area of the DMD.

- **Bottom Right:** This places the PIP source into a 644x362 designated image area at the bottom right of the screen-safe area of the DMD.
- **Picture-By-Picture:** This reduces the designated image area of the Active source to 921x518 and places it next to the PIP source, which is also in a 921x518 image area. These two images are centered on the screen.
- **Split Screen:** This is a special mode in which the active source is also used as the PIP source and placed in a PIP area equal to half the display on the left side. This results in the right half of the image being the active source and the left half is the PIP source. The Q-750i applies the Custom 2 settings to the PIP image.

Split-screen mode is useful for viewing "before" and "after" settings for Sharpness, Noise Reduction and other advanced image parameters. See Figure 4-16.

**Menu Position:** Select Menu Position from the System menu to change the OSD menu position. The default setting is "2" (top left).

**Translucent Menu:** Select Translucent Menu from the System menu to adjust the degree of translucence (show-through) in the menus and message boxes. 0% means that the menus are opaque. The default setting is 25%.

**Blank Screen:** Select Blank Screen from the System menu to choose the color of the blank screen that appears when no source signal is present. The options are Logo, Black, Blue and White. The default is Black.

**Auto Power Off:** Set Auto Power Off to **On** to have the Q-750i turn itself off after 20 minutes of inactivity (no source signal present).

**Auto Power On:** Setting Auto Power On to **On** causes the projector to automatically power up when AC power is present. If the projector is plugged into a switched AC outlet, this allows the projector to be turned on using a wall switch instead of the remote control unit. If you do not need this capability, set Auto Power On to **Off** (this is the default setting).

**Rear Projection:** This control reverses all images and menus, and is necessary when the projector is used in rear-projection applications. The default is **Off**.

**Ceiling Mode:** This control flips the image so the projector can be used in ceiling mounted installations. The default setting, **Auto**, automatically determines the orientation using an internal sensor.

Logo Display: This controls whether or not the Runco logo appears during startup.

Power On Chime: This controls the audible chime at startup.

HD 1 Key / HD 2 Key / HD 3 Key: These menu items assign the function of the HD 1, HD 2 and HD 3 buttons on the remote.

There are eight sources corresponding to the eight connections to the projector. When you assign a source to a numbered key, the projector immediately goes to that source when the key assigned to it is pressed.

If the chosen source is disabled via the Input Enable menu (refer to page page 62), this setting has no effect.

**CineWide:** Select CineWide from the Control menu and set it according to the installed lens configuration, as follows:

- For a standard Q-750i (no anamorphic lens), choose Off.
- For a Q-750i/CineWide (fixed anamorphic lens), choose CineWide.
- For a Q-750i/CineWide with AutoScope (motorized anamorphic lens), choose **AutoScope**.

**Trigger 1:** Select Trigger 1 from the Control menu to specify when the Trigger 1 port outputs 12 volts. There is a three-second delay before activation to prevent operation while selecting an aspect ratio.

- **AutoScope** causes the port to output 12 volts whenever the the Cinema or Virtual Cinema aspect ratio is active.
- Lamp causes the port to output 12 volts whenever the lamp (LED RGB assembly) is on.
- **4:3** causes the port to output 12 volts whenever the 4:3 aspect ratio is chosen. The output stops if PIP is enabled (PIP source is set to anything other than off).
- **RS232** causes the port to output 12 volts when an RS232 screen trigger 1 "on" command is received and stop when a trigger 1 "off" command is received. The 12 volt output also stops when the projector is turned off.

**Trigger 2:** Select Trigger 2 from the Control menu to configure the Trigger 2 output. Trigger 2 operates identically to Trigger 1.

Select Language from the Main Menu to change the OSD Language.

You can also perform various maintenance tasks from this menu.

**Factory Reset:** Select Factory Reset from the Service menu to restore all projector settings – except those listed below – to their factory-default values:

- Custom 1 / Custom 2
- ISF Day
- ISF Night
- Model Name / Serial Number
- Language

**Blue Only:** This feature removes all red and green color information from the image, and is useful for color-calibrating the projector or other video components.

**Test Patterns:** The Q-750i has numerous internal test patterns that are useful to technicians for advanced calibration, measurement and fault isolation purposes. To access them, select Test Patterns from the Service menu and set it to **On**.

The available test patterns are:

- White
- Black
- Red
- Green
- Blue
- Cyan
- Magenta
- Yellow
- ANSI Checkerboard
- Horizontal Gray Ramp
- Focus Grid

Press  $\blacktriangleleft$  or  $\triangleright$  on the remote control unit or built-in keypad to cycle through the test patterns.



The OSD menus are not available when in "test pattern" mode.

To turn test patterns off, press any key other than  $\blacktriangleleft$  or  $\triangleright$  on the remote control unit or built-in keypad.

**Altitude:** Select Altitude from the Service Menu to control the operation of the projector's cooling fan.

In most cases, the default setting (**Auto**) maintains the correct operating temperature. If the projector frequently turns off due to overheating, or in certain high-altitude operating environments, you may need to change this setting to **High**.

# 6. Serial Communications

To interface the Q-750i with a home theater automation/control system or a PC running terminal emulation software:

- 1. Connect it to your control system or PC as shown in Figure 3-11.
- 2. Start a terminal session on your PC using a terminal-emulation program, such as HyperTerminal.
- 3. Configure the RS-232 controller or PC serial port as follows: 38400 bps, no parity, 8 data bits, 1 stop bit and no flow control.
- 4. Type ky or op followed by a command from among those listed in Table 6-1 or Table 6-2 and press <Enter>. For example, to change the aspect ratio to Letterbox, type op aspect = 1<Enter>.

Serial commands to the Q-750i take the following form:

- Commands are in ASCII format.
- Spaces and tabs can be used to improve readability and are ignored by the projector.
- All commands must end with a carriage return (ASCII hex 0D) to signify that the projector can now read and execute the command.
- Commands are not case-sensitive.

The Q-750i supports two types of commands: key commands and operation commands. Key commands mimic pressing a button on the remote control. Operation commands tell the projector exactly what to do.

All commands start with 2 letters:

ky for key commands.

**op** for operations commands.

The syntax for key commands is simple:

#### ky <keyname>[CR]

Some key command examples:

ky menu[CR]

ky mem.sw[CR]

ky asp.16.9[CR]

The response from the projector for key commands will be the same command in UPPERCASE.

Input: ky mem.sw[CR]

Response: KY MEM. SW [CR]

If an **errcode** ? command returns one of the following values, you have encountered a likely system error requiring the attention of a qualified service technician. 




Figure 7-2. Overall Dimensions – Q-750i/CineWide with AutoScope
