## Tips for using ABC mode

- To enter the same letter twice or to enter a different letter on the same key, wait for the cursor to move to the right automatically or press [Right]. Then, enter the next letter.
- Press [\#] to insert a space.
- Press [ * ] to change case. Capital lock (企), Lower case (No indicator), and Initial capital
 are available.
- Press [Left] or [Right] to move the cursor.
- Press [C] to delete characters one by one. Press and hold [C] to clear the display.


## Using T9 mode

T9 is a predictive text input mode that allows you to key in any character using single keystrokes.

## Entering a word in T9 mode

1. Press [2] to [9] to start entering a word. Press each key once for each letter.
For example, press [4], [3], [5], [5], and [6] to enter Hello.
T9 predicts the word that you are typing, and it may change with each key that you press.
2. Enter the whole word before editing or deleting characters.
3. When the word displays correctly, go to step 4. Otherwise, press [0] to display alternative word choices. For example, Of and Me use [6] and [3].
4. Press [\#] to insert a space and enter the next word.

## Tips for using T9 mode

- Press [1] to enter periods or apostrophes automatically.
- Press [ * ] to change case in T9 mode. Capital lock
(企), Lower case (No indicator), and Initial capital
(슨) are available.
- Press [Left] or [Right] to move the cursor.
- Press [C] to delete characters one by one. Press and hold [C] to clear the display.


## Adding a new word to the $\mathbf{T 9}$ dictionary

This feature may not be available for some languages.

1. Enter the word that you want to add.
2. Press [0] to display alternative words for your key presses. When there are no more alternative words, Spell displays on the bottom line.
3. Press <Spell>.
4. Enter the word you want using ABC mode and press <OK>.

## Making an international call

1. In Idle mode, press and hold [0]. The + character appears.
2. Enter the country code, area code, and phone number, then press [ $\boldsymbol{\text { ] }}$.

## Redialling recent numbers

1. In Idle mode, press [ $\mathbf{~ ]}$ to display the list of recent numbers.
2. Scroll to the number you want and press [ 入].

## Making a call from Phonebook

You can also use the speed dial feature to assign your most frequently called numbers to specific number keys. p. 27

## Dialling a number from the SIM card

1. In Idle mode, enter the location number for the phone number you want and press [\#].
2. Scroll through other numbers.
3. Press <Dial> or [ $\mathbf{\lambda}$ ] to dial the number you want.

## Ending a call

## Answering a call

When you receive an incoming call, the phone rings and displays the incoming call image.

## Recording your call conversation.

Press <Options> and select Conv. record to record your conversation during a call.
Access your recorded conversation in the Voices menu.

## Placing a call on hold/ Retrieving

Press <Hold> or <Retrie.> to place the call on hold or retrieve the call.

## Making a second call

You can make another call if your network supports it.

1. Press <Hold> to put the call on hold.
2. Make the second call in the normal way.
3. Press <Swap> to switch between the calls.
4. Press <Options> and select End held call to end the call on hold.
5. To end the current call, press [ $\sigma$ ].

## Answering a second call

You can answer an incoming call, if your network supports it and you have activated the call waiting feature. p. 31

1. Press [ $\overline{\text { ] }}$ ] to answer the call. The first call is automatically put on hold.
2. Press <Swap> to switch between the calls.
3. Press <Options> and select End held call to end the call on hold.
4. To end the current call, press [ $\boldsymbol{\sigma}$ ].

## Transferring a call

You can transfer the current call to the call on hold so the callers can talk to each other.
Press <Options> and select Transfer.

## Using the loudspeaker

You can talk and listen to the phone a short distance away.
Press <Options> and select Loud spk. on or Loud spk. off.

## Using the voice clarity feature

This feature removes extraneous noise and increases call quality so that the person with whom you are speaking can hear you clearly even if you are in a noisy place.
Press <Options> and select Voiceclarity on or Voiceclarity off.

Switching off the microphone (Mute mode)
You can temporarily switch off your phone's microphone so that the person on the phone cannot hear you.
Press <Options> and select Mute or Unmute.

## Muting or sending key tones

You can turn the key tones off or on.
Press <Options> and select Mute keys or Send keys.To communicate with answering machines or computerised telephone systems, Send keys must be selected.

## Call functions

## Sending a sequence of DTMF tones

Dual tone multi-frequency (DTMF) tones are the tones used in phones for tone dialling.
You can send DTMF tones as a group after entering the entire number you need to send or retrieving a number from Phonebook. This feature is helpful for entering a password or an account number when you call an automated system, like a banking service.

1. When connected with a teleservice system, press <Options> and select Send DTMF.
2. Enter the number you need to send and press <OK>.

## Using Phonebook

You can access the Phonebook menu to locate or store entries. p. 25
Press <Options> and select Phonebook.

## Using the message service

You can access the Messages menu to read an incoming message and send a new message. p. 34
Press <Options> and select Message.

## Using the SIM service

The SIM service menu is available if you use a SIM card in your phone. A SIM card provides services such as news, weather, sports, entertainment, and location services.
For details, see your SIM card instructions or contact your service provider.

## Making a multi-party call

Use this feature to allow as many as six people to join a multi-party call, or conference call.
Your service provider must support multi-party calls for you to use this feature.

## Setting up a multi-party call

1. Call the first participant.
2. Call the second participant. The first call is automatically put on hold.
3. Press <Options> and select Join. The first participant is added to the multi-party call.
4. If desired, call another person or answer an incoming call.
5. Press <Options> and select Join.
6. Repeat steps 4 and 5 as desired.

## Having a private conversation with one participant

1. Press <Options> and select Split.
2. Select a name or number from the participant list. You can talk privately with that person, while the other participants converse with each other.
3. To return to the multi-party call, press <Options> and select Join.

## Dropping one participant

1. Press <Options> and select Remove.
2. Select a name or number from the participant list. The participant is dropped from the call, but the call continues with the other parties.
3. Close the phone or press [ $\boldsymbol{\sigma}$ ] to end the multi-party call.

## Phonebook

You can store phone numbers on your SIM card and in your phone's memory. The SIM card and phone's memory are physically separate, but they are used as a single entity called Phonebook.
You can manage your Phonebook entries and access the service directory in the Phonebook menu
To access this menu, press <Phonebook> in Idle mode.

Find name (Phonebook 1.1)
Use this menu to search for numbers in Phonebook.

## Finding an entry

1. Enter the first few letters of the name that you want to find.
2. Select the name you want from the list.

## Menu functions

3. If you selected an entry in the phone's memory, scroll to the number or information item you want.
4. Press [ \] to dial the number, or <Options> or <Edit> to change the information.

## Using Phonebook options

While viewing a contact in Phonebook, press
<Options> to access the following options:

- Edit number: change the currently selected number.
- Change name: change the contact's name.
- Send message: send an SMS message.
- Copy: copy the number to the phone's memory or SIM card.
- Delete entry: delete the entry.


## Add entry (Phonebook 1.2)

Use this menu to add a new contact to Phonebook.

## Storing a number in the phone's memory

1. Enter a number and press <Save>.
2. Select Phone.
3. Select a number type.
4. Enter a name and press $<\mathbf{O K}>$.
5. Press [Right] and change the settings or enter information about the contact.

- Mobile/Home/Office/Fax/Other: add a number in any category.
- Email: assign an e-mail address.
- Note: add a memo about the person.
- Group: assign the number to a caller group.
- Graphic: assign an image as a caller ID image to alert you to a call from the number.
- Alert: assign a ringer melody to alert you to a call from the number.


## Storing a number on the SI M card

1. Enter a number and press <Save>.
2. Select SIM
3. Enter a name and press <OK>.
4. If necessary, change the location number and press <OK>.

## Speed-dial list (Phonebook 1.3)

Use this menu to assign speed dial numbers (2 to 9) for eight of your most frequently called numbers.

## Assigning speed dial entries

1. Select a key location from $\mathbf{2}$ to $\mathbf{9}$. Key $\mathbf{1}$ is reserved for your voice mail server.
2. Select Edit number.
3. Enter a phone number, or press <Phonebook> and select the contact you want from the contact list.
4. Press $<\mathbf{O K}>$.

## Managing speed dial entries

Use this feature to check your phone numbers, or to assign a name to each of the numbers.
Changes made here do not affect the actual subscriber numbers on your SIM card.

## Group setting (Phonebook 2.2)

Use this menu to change the properties of caller groups.

- Melody: select a melody to sound when a call comes in from a member of the group.
- Change name: change the group name.
- View image: view an image to display when a call comes in from a member of the group.

Memory status (Phonebook 2.3)
Use this menu to check the number of entries you have saved and the total number of entries you can save in the phone's memory and on the SIM card.

## Service directory (Phonebook 3.1)

This menu is available if your SIM card supports Service Dialling Numbers (SDN). Use this menu to view the list of SDNs assigned by your service provider, including emergency numbers, directory enquiries, and voice mail numbers.
Scroll to the number you want and press <Dial> or [ 入].

## SI M-AT (Menu 1)

This menu is available if you use a SIM AT card that provides additional services, such as news, weather, sports, entertainment, and location services. Available services may vary, depending on your service provider's plans.
For details, see your SIM card instructions or contact your service provider.

## Call records (Menu 2)

Use this menu to view the calls you have dialled, received, or missed, the length of your calls, and the cost of your calls.
To access this menu, press <Menu> in Idle mode and select Call records.

## Missed calls (Menu 2.1)

This menu displays the most recently received calls that you did not answer.
While viewing a call record, press <Options> to access the following options:

- Delete: delete the call record.
- Delete all: delete all call records.
- Paste: paste the number of the call into the dialling mode screen.


## Received calls (Menu 2.2)

This menu displays the most recent calls you have received.

## Dialled calls (Menu 2.3)

This menu displays the most recent calls you have dialled.

## Delete all (Menu 2.4)

Use this menu to delete all of the records in each call type.

1. Press <Select> to check the call type(s) to be cleared.
2. Press $<\mathbf{O K}>$.
3. Press $<$ Yes $>$ to confirm the deletion.

Call time (Menu 2.5)
This menu displays the time log for calls made and received. The actual time invoiced by your service provider will vary.

- Last call time: check the length of your last call.
- Total sent: check the total length of all the calls you have dialled.
- Total received: check the total length of all the calls you have received.


## Menu functions

- Reset timers: reset the call timers. You need to enter the phone password.

The password is preset to 00000000. You can change this password. p. 56

## Call costs (Menu 2.6)

This network feature displays the cost of calls. This menu is available only if your SIM card supports this feature. Note that this is not intended to be used for billing purposes.

- Last call cost: check the cost of your last call.
- Total cost: check the total cost of all of your calls. If the total cost exceeds the maximum cost set in Set max cost, you must reset the counter before you can make another call.
- Max cost: check the maximum cost limit set in Set max cost.
- Reset counters: reset the cost counters. You need to enter your PIN2.
- Set max cost: set the maximum cost authorised for your calls. You need to enter your PIN2.
- Price/ Unit: set the price per unit that is applied when the cost of your calls is calculated. You need to enter your PIN2.


## Network services (Menu 3)

Use this menu to access network services. Please contact your service provider to check their availability and subscribe to them, if you wish.
To access this menu, press <Menu> in Idle mode and select Network services.

## Call diverting (Menu 3.1)

This network service reroutes incoming calls to a phone number that you specify.

1. Select a call diverting option:

- Divert always: divert all calls.
- Busy: diver calls when you are on another call.
- No reply: divert calls when you do not answer the phone.
- Unreachable: divert calls when you are not in an area covered by your service provider or when your phone is switched off.
- Cancel all: cancel all call diverting options.

2. Select the type of calls to be diverted.
3. To activate call diverting, select Activate.

Otherwise, select Remove.
4. Enter the number to which calls are to be diverted and press <OK>.
5. If you selected No reply, select the length of time the network delays before diverting a call and press <Select>.

## Call barring (Menu 3.2)

This network service allows you to restrict your calls.

1. Select a call barring option:

- All outgoing: prohibit all outgoing calls.
- International: prohibit international calls.
- International except to home: only allow calls to numbers within the current country when you are abroad, and to your home country, defined as where your home network provider is located.
- All incoming: prohibit incoming calls.
- Incoming while abroad: prohibit incoming calls when you use your phone outside of your home country.
- Cancel all: cancel all call barring settings, allowing calls to be sent and received normally.
- Change barring password: change the call barring password obtained from your service provider.

2. Select the type of calls to be barred.
3. Press <Activate>. To deactivate call barring, press <Deactivate>.
4. Enter the call barring password supplied by your service provider and press $<\mathbf{O K}>$.

## Call waiting (Menu 3.3)

This network service informs you when someone is trying to reach you while you are on another call.

1. Select the type of calls to which the call waiting option will apply.
2. Press <Activate>. To deactivate call waiting, press <Deactivate>.

## Network selection (Menu 3.4)

This network service allows you to either automatically or manually select the network used when roaming outside of your home area.
You can select a network other than your home network only if there is a valid roaming agreement between the two.

- Automatic: connect to the first available network when roaming.
- Manual: select the network you want.

Caller ID (Menu 3.5)
This network service allows you to prevent your phone number from being displayed on the phone of the person being called. However, some networks do not allow the user to change this setting.

- Default: use the default setting provided by the network.
- Hide number: ensure your number does not display on the other person's phone.
- Send number: send your number each time you make a call.


## Band selection (Menu 3.6)

For the phone to make and receive phone calls, it must register with an available network. Your phone can handle any of the following types of networks: GSM 1900 and Combined GSM 900/1800.
The country where you purchased your phone determines the default band that it uses. When you travel abroad, you must remember to change to an appropriate band.
When you select a new band, your phone automatically searches for all available networks. Your phone registers with a preferred network within the band.

## Active line (Menu 3.7)

Some SIM cards may be used with two subscriber numbers. Use this menu to select the line to be used to make calls, if your SIM card supports two numbers.Calls come in on both lines, regardless of the selected line.

## Sound settings (Мепи 4)

Use this menu to customise various sound settings.

## Incoming calls (Menu 4.1)

Use this menu to set up the ringer for incoming calls.

- Default melodies: select one of the preset melodies.
- My sounds: select one of sounds downloaded from the wireless web or Samsung PC Studio programme, or received by MMS.
- Ring volume: adjust the ringer volume.
- Alert type: specify how you are to be informed of incoming calls.
Melody: the phone rings using the selected ring tone.
Vibration: the phone vibrates but not rings.
Vibration then melody: the phone vibrates three times and then starts ringing.
Light only: the phone flashes the service light.


## Messages (Menu 4.2)

Use this menu to set up the ringer for incoming SMS messages and MMS messages.

- Tone: select one of several message tones.
- Alert type: specify how you are informed of any incoming messages.
- Repetition: specify how often the phone informs you of a new message.


## Power on/off (Menu 4.3)

Use this menu to select the melody that the phone sounds when it is switched on or off.

Connection tone (Menu 4.4)
Use this menu to set the phone to beep when it is connected to the system.

Key tone (Мепи 4.5)
Use this menu to select the tone that the phone sounds when you press a key.

You can adjust the keypad tone volume using

## Minute minder (Menu 4.6)

Use this menu to set the phone to beep every minute during an outgoing call to keep you informed of the length of your call.

Quiet mode (Menu 4.7)
Use this menu to set how the phone acts to alert you to a specific event in Quiet mode, instead of making sounds.

- Mute: mute all sound settings.


## Alerts on call (Menu 4.8)

Messages (Menu 5)

## Short messages (Menu 5.1)

Short Message Service (SMS) allows you to send or receive text messages including pictures, audio clips, and animated images.

The maximum number of characters allowed in a short message varies by service provider. If your message exceeds the maximum number of characters, the phone will split the message.

- Channel: specify the channels from which you receive broadcast messages.
- Language: select the language in which broadcast messages display.

Use this menu to perform basic arithmetic functions such as addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

1. Enter the first number. Press [ * ] to insert a decimal point.
2. Press [\#] to access the math function you want.
3. Enter the second number.
4. Press <Equal> to view the result.

Conversion (Menu 7.8)
Use this menu for common conversions, such as currency and temperature.

## Solve problems

To save the time and expense of an unnecessary service call, perform the simple checks in this section before contacting a service professional.

## When you switch on your phone, the following messages may appear:

"Insert SIM"

- Be sure that the SIM card is correctly installed.
"Phone lock Enter password"
- The automatic locking function has been enabled. You must enter the phone's password before you can use the phone.
"Enter PIN"
- You are using your phone for the first time. You must enter the PIN supplied with the SIM card.
- The PIN Check feature is enabled. Every time the phone is switched on, the PIN has to be entered. To disable this feature, use the PI N check menu.


## "Enter PUK"

- The PIN code has been entered incorrectly three times in succession, and the phone is now blocked. Enter the PUK supplied by your service provider.


## "No service," "Network failure," or "Not done"

 displays- The network connection has been lost. You may be in a weak signal area. Move and try again.
- You are trying to access an option for which you have no subscription with your service provider. Contact the service provider for further details.


## You have entered a number but it was not dialled

- Be sure that you have pressed [ \].
- Be sure you have accessed the right cellular network.
- Be sure that you have not set an outgoing call barring option.


## Your correspondent cannot reach you

- Be sure your phone is switched on. ([ ब] pressed for more than one second.)
- Be sure you are accessing the correct cellular network.
- Be sure that you have not set an outgoing call barring option.


## Your correspondent cannot hear you speaking

- Be sure you have switched off the microphone.
- Be sure you are holding the phone close enough to your mouth. The microphone is located at the bottom of the phone.


## The phone starts beeping and "Battery low" flashes on the display

- Your battery is insufficiently charged. Recharge the battery.


## The audio quality of the call is poor

- Check the signal strength indicator on the display ( $\mathrm{F}_{\mathrm{n}} \mathrm{ll} \mid$ ). The number of bars indicates the signal strength from strong ( $\mathbb{T}_{\text {ıllllll }}$ ) to weak ( $\mathrm{T}_{\mathbf{1}}$ ).
- Try moving the phone slightly or moving closer to a window if you are in a building.


## No number is dialled when you re-call a Phonebook entry

- Use the Phonebook Search feature to ensure the number has been stored correctly.
- Re-store the number, if necessary.

## SAR certification information

This phone meets European Union (EU) requirements concerning exposure to radio waves.
Your mobile phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed the limits for exposure to radio-frequency (RF) energy, as recommended by the EU Council. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines were developed by independent scientific organisations through the periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The limits include a substantial safety margin designed to ensure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit recommended by the EU Council is 2.0W/ kg. ${ }^{*}$
The highest SAR value for this model phone was $0.795 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{kg}$.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a base station, the lower the power output of the phone.
Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, compliance with the European R\&TTE Directive must be shown. This directive includes as one of its essential requirements the protection of the health and safety of the user and any other person.

## Precautions when using batteries

- Never use a charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power. Talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge, the type of battery, and the charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries, and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. Disconnect the charger from the power source when it is not in use. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places because the capacity and lifetime of the battery will be reduced. Try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may not work temporarily, even when the battery is fully charged. Liion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below $0^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(32^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$.
- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental shortcircuiting can occur when a metallic object like a coin, clip or pen causes a direct connection between the + and - terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery). For example, do not carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag where the battery may contact metal objects. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.


## Road safety

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

## Electronic devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

## Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm ( 6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research. If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch off your phone immediately.

## Hearing aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

## Other medical devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy.
Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.
Switch off your phone in health care facilities when regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so.

## Vehicles

- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases, or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts, or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including installed or portable wireless equipment, in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Improperly installed wireless equipment could result in serious injury if the air bag inflates.
- Switch off your phone before boarding an aircraft. It is dangerous and illegal to use wireless phones in an aircraft because they can interfere with the operation of the aircraft.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.


## Care and maintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years.

- Keep the phone and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children.
- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation, humidity, and liquids contain minerals that corrode electronic circuits.
- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.
- Do not use or store the phone in dusty, dirty areas, as its moving parts may be damaged.
- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.


## Health and safety information

- Do not drop, knock, or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.
