# -Owner's Instructions

# Important Warranty Information Regarding Television Format Viewing

Standard screen format televisions (4:3, the aspect ratio of the screen width to height) are primarily designed to view standard format full-motion video. The images displayed on them should primarily be in the standard 4:3 ratio format and constantly moving. Displaying stationary graphics and images on screen, such as the dark top and bottom letterbox bars (wide screen pictures), should be limited to no more than 15% of the total television viewing per week.

Wide screen format televisions (16:9, the aspect ratio of the screen width to height) are primarily designed to view wide screen format full-motion video. The images displayed on them should primarily be in the wide screen 16:9 ratio format, or expanded to fill the screen if your model offers this feature, and constantly moving. Displaying stationary graphics and images on screen, such as the dark side-bars on non-expanded standard format television video and programming, should be limited to no more than 15% of the total television viewing per week.

Additionally, viewing other stationary images and text such as stock market reports, video game displays, station logos, web sites or computer graphics and patterns, should be limited as described above for all televisions. Displaying any stationary images that exceed the above guidelines can cause uneven aging of picture tubes (CRTs) that leave subtle, but permanent burned-in ghost images in the television picture. To avoid this, vary the programming and images, and primarily display full screen moving images, not stationary patterns or dark bars. On television models that offer picture sizing features, use these controls to view the different formats as a full screen picture.

Be careful in the selection and duration of television formats used for viewing. Uneven CRT aging as a result of format selection and use, as well as other burned-in images, is not covered by your Samsung limited warranty.






# Familiarizing Yourself with Your New TV

#### **Control Buttons**

You can control your TV's basic features, including the on-screen menu. To use the more advanced features, you must use the remote control.

• The actual configuration on your TV may be different, depending on your model.



#### O POWER

Press to turn the TV on and off.

#### Stand-By Indicator

Lights up when you turn the power off.

- Power Off ; Red
- Power On; Off
- Timer On; Green

#### Remote Control Sensor

Aim the remote control towards this spot on the TV.

#### SOURCE

Press to switch between viewing TV programs and signals from connected components.

#### **6** MENU

Press to see an on-screen menu of your TV's features.

#### **6** + VOL -

Press to lower or raise the volume and to select items when using the on-screen menu.

#### Λ CH ∨


Press to change channels and move between items on the on-screen menu.

#### **③ ⊕** (Enter)

While using the on-screen menus, press to activate (or change) a particular item.

#### **Connection Jacks (Side or Front)**

You can connect an A/V component that is used only occasionally, such as a camcorder or video game. For information on connecting equipment, see page 18.



- S-VIDEO Input
  - Connect an S-Video signal from a camcorder or video game.
- **Q** VIDEO Input


Connect the video signal from a camcorder or video game.

**3** AUDIO Input

Connect the audio signals from a camcorder or video game.

#### **Connection Jacks (Rear)**

Use the rear panel jacks to connect an A/V component that will be connected continuously, such as a VCR or a DVD player. For more information on connecting equipment, see pages 10~17.



#### Antenna terminals

Two independent cables or antennas can be connected to these terminals. Use "ANT 1 IN" and "ANT 2 IN" terminals to receive a signal from VHF/UHF antennas or your cable system.

Use the "ANT 1 OUT" terminal to send the signal being received by the "ANT 1 IN" terminal out to another component (such as a Cable Set-Top Box). The PIP channel can be received only when a signal source is connected to "ANT 1 IN".

#### 2 Audio/Video Output jacks Connect to the audio/video input jacks of a recording VCR.

#### **8** Video Input jacks

Connect to the video output jacks of VCRs, DVD players and similar devices.

#### 4 Audio Input jacks

Connect to the audio output jacks of VCRs, DVD players and similar devices.

#### **6** S-Video Input jack

Connect to S-VIDEO output jacks of an S-VHS VCR or DVD player.

# **60** COMPONENT Input jacks (Y, PB, PR, AUDIO-L/R)

Connect to the audio and video outputs of DVD or DTV Set-Top Box. 480i/480p/1080i Y,PB and PR video signal outputs are available.

#### **10** HDMI/DVI Video Input jack

(**H**igh **D**efinition **M**ultimedia Interface)
Connect to the HDMI jack for device with HDMI or DVI output.

#### O DVI Audio Input jacks

(Digital Visual Interface)
Connect to the digital audio output jacks for device with DVI output.

#### **Remote Control**

You can use the remote control up to about 23 feet from the TV. When using the remote control, always point it directly at the TV. You can also use your remote control to operate your Set-Top box, VCR, Cable box or DVD player. See pages 64~65 for details.

#### O POWER

Turns the TV on and off.

#### A PSIZE

Press to change the picture size.

FAV. CH (Favorite Channel) Press to switch between your favorite channels.

#### Number buttons

Press to select channels directly on the TV.

#### 6 + 100

Press to select channels over 100. For example, to select channel 121, press the "+100," then press the "2" and "1."

#### 6 MUTE

Press to temporarily cut off the sound.

#### VOL +, VOL -

Press to increase or decrease the volume.

#### 6 SLEEP

Press to select a preset time interval for automatic shut off.

#### **MENU**

Displays the main on-screen menu.

STILL (Main picture)
 Press to stop the action during a particular scene. Press again to resume normal video.

The still function doesn't operate in "Component 1, 2, 3" mode.

#### P.MODE

Adjust the TV picture by selecting one of the preset factory settings (or select your personal, customized picture settings.)

#### **®** SRS TSXT


Activates TruSurround.

#### (B) ADD/DEL

Press to add or erase channels in the TV's memory. Use to memorize or erase the fine tuning after fine tuning channels.

#### **@** CAPTION

Press to view closed caption information.



#### **(b)** VCR/DVD Controls

Controls VCR/DVD functions: Rewind, Stop, Play/Pause, Fast Forward.

#### (6) SET

Used during set up of this remote control, so that it will work compatibly with other devices (VCR, Set-Top box, Cable box, DVD, etc.)

#### **M** RESET

If your remote control is not functioning properly, take out the batteries and press the **RESET** button for about 2~3 seconds. Re-insert the batteries and try using the remote control again.

#### **MODE**

Selects a target device to be controlled by this remote control (i.e., TV, STB, VCR, CABLE or DVD).

#### PRE-CH

Tunes to the previous channel.

#### ② CH△, CH∨

Press to change channels.

#### **4** SOURCE

Each time the button is pressed, all the inputs connected to the external component jacks will be shown in regular sequence.

#### @ INFO

Press to display information on the TV screen.

#### **3** EXIT

Press to exit the menu.

#### 24/▶/▼/▲

Control the cursor in the menu.

#### **49 ENTER**

While using the on-screen menus, press ENTER to activate (or change) a particular item.

#### S.MODE

Adjust the TV sound by selecting one of the preset factory settings (or select your personal, customized sound settings.)

MTS (Multichannel Television Sound)

Press to choose "Stereo", "Mono" or "SAP (Secondary Audio Program)".

#### @ PIP ON

Activates PIP (Picture-In-Picture).

#### ② CH△, CH ✓

Displays the available channels in sequence. (These buttons change channels in the PIP window only.)

#### **® SELF FOCUS**


Press to adjust for the optimum picture set in the factory.

# **Connecting VHF and UHF Antennas**

If your antenna has a set of leads that look like this, see "Antennas with 300-ohm Flat Twin Leads," below.




If your antenna has one lead that looks like this, see "Antennas with 75-ohm Round Leads," on next page.




If you have two antennas, see "Separate VHF and UHF Antennas," on next page.

#### Antennas with 300-ohm Flat Twin Leads

If you are using an off-air antenna (such as a roof antenna or "rabbit ears") that has 300-ohm twin flat leads, follow the directions below.






#### **Antennas with 75-ohm Round Leads**

Plug the antenna lead into the "ANT 1 IN" terminal on the rear panel.



#### **Separate VHF and UHF Antennas**

If you have two separate antennas for your TV (one VHF and one UHF), you must combine the two antenna signals before connecting the antennas to the TV. This procedure requires an optional combiner-adaptor (available at most electronics shops).





# **Connecting Cable TV**

You can connect different cable systems to your TV, including cable without a cable box, and cable with a cable box that descrambles some or all channels.

#### Cable without a Cable Box


If you want to connect cable, and you do not need to use a cable box:







#### Cable with a Cable box that Descrambles All Channels






■ This terminal might be labeled "ANT OUT", "VHF OUT", or simply "OUT".





#### Connecting to a Cable Box that Descrambles Some Channels

If your cable box descrambles only some channels (such as premium channels), follow the instructions below. You will need a two-way splitter, an RF (A/B) switch, and four lengths of coaxial cable. (These items are available at most electronics stores.)



After you've made this connection, set the A/B switch to the "A" position for normal viewing. Set the A/B switch to the "B" position to view scrambled channels. (When you set the A/B switch to "B," you will need to tune your TV to the cable box's output channel, which is usually channel 3 or 4.)

# Connecting a VCR

These instructions assume that you have already connected your TV to an antenna or a cable TV system (according to the instructions on pages 10-13). Skip step **1** if you have not yet connected to an antenna or a cable system.

#### 1

Connect a coaxial cable between the "ANT IN" (1 or 2) terminal on the TV and the ANTENNA OUT terminal on the VCR

A coaxial cable is usually included with a VCR. (If not, check your local electronics store).

#### 2


Connect a set of audio cables between the "AV IN 1 (L, R)" (or "AV IN 2 (L, R)") jacks on the TV and AUDIO OUT jacks on the VCR.

If you have a mono VCR, connect L(mono) to VCR audio out using only one audio cable.

#### 3

Connect a video cable between the "AV IN 1 (VIDEO)" (or "AV IN 2 (VIDEO)") jack on the TV and the VIDEO OUT jack on the VCR.

Follow the instructions in "Viewing a VCR or Camcorder Tape" to view your VCR tape.



• Also, you can connect to "AV 3" on the side panel of TV.

#### Connecting a Second VCR to Record from the TV

Your TV can send out signals of its picture and sound to be recorded by a second VCR. To do this, connect your second VCR as follows:

#### 1


Connect a set of audio cables between the "AV OUT (L, R)" jacks on the TV and the AUDIO IN jacks on the VCR

(The VCR input jacks might be either on the front or rear of the VCR.)

# 2

Connect a video cable between the "AV OUT (VIDEO)" jack on the TV and the VIDEO IN jack on the VCR.

Refer to your VCR's instructions for more information about how to record using this kind of connection.



# **Connecting a DVD Player**

The rear panel jacks on your TV make it easy to connect a DVD player to your TV.

#### Connecting to Y, PB, PR



Connect a set of audio cables between the "COMPONENT IN 1 (L, R)" (or "COMPONENT IN 2 or 3 (L, R)") jacks on the TV and the AUDIO OUT jacks on the DVD player.

Connect a set of video cables between the "COMPONENT IN 1 (Y, PB, PR)" (or "COMPONENT IN 2 or 3 (Y, PB, PR)") jacks on the TV and the VIDEO OUT (Y, PB, PR) jacks on the DVD player.

For an explanation of Component video, see your DVD player's owner's instruction.




#### Connecting to Regular Audio and Video jacks

Connect a set of audio cables between the "AV IN 1 (L, R)" (or "AV IN 2 (L, R)") jacks on the TV and the AUDIO OUT jacks on the DVD player.

Connect a video cable between the "AV IN 1 (VIDEO)" (or "AV IN 2 (VIDEO)") jack on the TV and the VIDEO OUT jack on the DVD player.



• Also, you can connect to "AV 3" on the side panel of TV.

# **Connecting a Digital TV Set-Top Box**

The rear panel jacks on your TV make it easy to connect a Set-Top Box to your TV.

#### Connecting to Y, PB, PR

Connect a coaxial cable to the ANTENNA IN terminal on the Set-Top Box.



Connect a set of audio cables between the "COMPONENT IN 1 (L, R)" (or "COMPONENT IN 2 or 3 (L, R)") jacks on the TV and the AUDIO OUT jacks on the Set-Top Box.

Connect a set of video cables between the "COMPONENT IN 1 (Y, PB, PR)" (or "COMPONENT IN 2 or 3 (Y, PB, PR)") jacks on the TV and the VIDEO OUT (Y, PB, PR) jacks on the Set-Top

The connections for a typical Set-Top Box are shown. For detailed information, refer to the Set-Top Box instruction manual.



#### **Connecting to DVI (Digital Visual Interface)**


By inputting a high-bandwidth digital content protection high-definition picture source to the DIGITAL INPUT jack on the TV, high-definition pictures can be displayed on the screen in their digital forms. (This DIGITAL INPUT jack is for use in the future when high-bandwidth digital content protection DTV decoders, DVD players and D-VHS are put on the market.)

#### 1

Connect a set of audio cables between the "DVI IN (AUDIO-L, R)" jacks on the TV and the AUDIO OUT jacks on the Set-Top Box.

## 2

Connect a video cable between the "HDMI/DVI IN" jack on the TV and the VIDEO OUT jack on the Set-Top Box.




• The DIGITAL INPUT jack can only be used with 1080i and 480p picture signals. Set the DTV decoder DIGITAL OUTPUT jack output setting to 1080i or 480p. The DIGITAL INPUT jack is not compatible with the picture signal of a PC.

#### **Connecting to HDMI (High Definition Multimedia Interface)**

Connect a HDMI cable between the "HDMI/DVI IN" jacks on the TV and the HDMI OUT jacks on the Set-Top Box.

Please check that the HDMI source is powered on. If not, you can not select "HDMI" in the "Source List" on-screen menu.



# **Connecting a Camcorder**

The side panel jacks on your TV make it easy to connect a camcorder to your TV. They allow you to view the camcorder tapes without using a VCR. (Also see "Viewing an External Signal Source" on page 39).

1

Locate the A/V output jacks on the camcorder. They are usually found on the side or rear of the camcorder.


2

Connect a set of audio cables between the "AV 3 (L, R)" jacks on the TV and the AUDIO OUT jacks on the camcorder. If you have mono camcorder, connect L(mono) to camcorder audio out using only one audio cable.

3

Connect a video cable between the "AV 3 (VIDEO)" (or "S-VIDEO2) jack on the TV and the VIDEO OUT jacks on the camcorder.

The audio-video cables shown here are usually included with a Camcorder. (If not, check your local electronics store.) If your camcorder is stereo, you need to connect a set of two cables.




• This figure shows the Standard connector-jack panel. The actual configuration for your TV may be different.

# **Installing Batteries in the Remote Control**






**2** Install two AAA size batteries.



■ Make sure to match the "+" and "−" ends of the batteries with the diagram inside the compartment.



■ Remove the batteries and store them in a cool, dry place if you won't be using the remote control for a long time. (Assuming typical TV usage, the batteries last for about one year.)

• The remote control can be used up to about 23 feet from the TV.

# **Turning the TV On and Off**

Press the **POWER** button on the remote control.

You can also use the POWER button on the front panel.

# **Plug & Play Feature**

When the TV is initially powered On, basic customer settings proceed automatically and subsequently as below.

Press the **POWER** button on the remote control.
The "Start Plug & Play" is

displayed.

Press the **ENTER** button to start.



■ Plug & Play feature doesn't work when the V-Chip is activated or when in the A/V mode.

The "Language" menu is displayed.

Press the  $\triangle$  or  $\nabla$  button to select the appropriate language, then press the **ENTER** button.

The "Check antenna input" is displayed.

Make sure that the antenna is connected to the TV, then press the **ENTER** button.


The "Air/CATV" menu is displayed.

Press the  $\triangle$  or  $\blacktriangledown$  button to select the video signal source, then press the **ENTER** button.

## Viewing the Menus



Press the **MENU** button. The main menu is displayed. There are five menu groups: "Input", "Picture", "Sound", "Channel" and "Setup".

Press the ▲ or ▼ button to move to an item you want in the menu. Press the ◀ or ► button to display, change or use the selected items.

Press the **ENTER** button to enter items in the menu.



■ You can also use the MENU, CH ^/∨, VOL+/- and □ (ENTER) buttons on the control panel of the TV to make selections.

Press the EXIT button to exit.

#### Viewing the Display

Press the **INFO** button on the remote control.

The TV displays the current channel, the status of certain picture and sound settings and the current time.

# **Selecting the Antenna Input**

You can connect two different signal sources by choosing the antenna input ("Ant.1" or "Ant.2").



# **Adjusting the Screen Automatically (Self Focus)**

The "Self Focus" feature automatically finds the optimum picture quality when blurring, overlapping colors or incorrect focus occurs. These conditions may be caused by moving your TV.







Press the  $\triangle$  or  $\blacktriangledown$  button to select "Self Focus", then press the **ENTER** button.

The "Self Focus" is selected.

Press the ENTER button again. The self focus process begins with the message "Self Focus" and horizontal bar is displayed. When it is finished, all of things will disappear and the optimum picture quality can be enjoyed.

Press the EXIT button to exit.






■ During the process, minor distortions of the picture may occur. At this time, the colors may diffuse and a searching pattern will appear on the edges of the screen. This is a normal part of the adjustment.

#### Alternate method:


Simply press the **SELF FOCUS** button on the remote control to enjoy the optimum picture quality.




- Changing channels and any other signal changes will pause the self focus until a stable signal has returned. It resumes after the signal has been stabilised. This feature will not work without a signal
- Ambient light that is too bright may affect the self focus. If this occurs, darken the environment and try again.

#### **Deactivating the Automatic Execution of the Self Focus**

The "Self Focus" feature starts on default. It will automatically begin 10 minutes after switching on the power and the appearance of the screen image. To set the optimum picture quality, the "Self Focus" will automatically begin again after another 30 minutes, as the screen image is then fully stabilised.

# **Memorizing the Channels**


Your TV can memorize and store all of the available channels for both "off-air" (antenna) and cable channels. After the available channels are memorized, use the  $CH \land$  and  $CH \lor$  buttons to scan through the channels. This eliminates the need to change channels by entering the channel digits.

#### Selecting the Video Signal Source

Before your TV can begin memorizing the available channels, you must specify the type of signal source that is connected to the TV (i.e., an antenna or a cable system).








- ◀ If you are connected to an antenna, press the ▲ or ▼ button to select "Air".
- If you connected cable, press
  the ▲ or ▼ button to select the
  type of cable system: "STD",
  "HRC" or "IRC".

- "STD", "HRC" and "IRC" identify various types of cable TV systems. Contact your local cable company to identify the type of cable system that exists in your particular area. At this point the signal source has been selected. Proceed to "Storing Channels in Memory".
- Subscription cable services require service-specific requirement for viewing.

#### **Storing Channels in Memory (Automatic Method)**

First, select the correct signal source ("Air", "STD", "HRC" or "IRC") as described on the previous page.



# **Changing Channels**

#### **Using the Channel Buttons**

Press the  $CH \land$  or  $CH \lor$  button to change channel.

When you press the  $CH \land$  or  $CH \lor$  button, the TV changes channels in sequence. You will see all the channels that the TV has memorized. (The TV must have memorized at least three channels.) You will not see channels that were either erased or not memorized.

#### **Using the Number Buttons**

Use the number buttons to quickly tune to any channel.


Press the number buttons to go directly to a channel. For example, to select channel "27", press the "2", then "7". The TV will change channels when you press the second number.

# **Digital Noise Reduction**


If the broadcast signal received by your TV is weak, you can activate this feature to help reduce any static and ghosting that may appear on the screen.



## **Viewing Picture-In-Picture**

One of the most best features of your TV is the Picture-In-Picture (PIP) feature. The advanced PIP system allows you to watch two different pictures at once, even if you don't have a VCR connected to your TV.

#### **Activating the PIP**



- This feature doesn't work when the "V-Chip" or "Caption" is active.
- If you turn the TV off while watching and turn it on again, then the mode will return to normal video.
- The picture size can't be changed when the "PIP" is active in the TV or AV mode.

#### **Selecting an External Source**

If you have not connected any equipment to the TV's input jacks, the signal from these inputs will not appear.

# **Choosing a Multi-Channel Sound (MTS) track**


Depending on the particular program being broadcast, you can listen to "Mono", "Stereo" or "SAP (Secondary Audio Program)". "SAP" audio is usually a foreign-language translation. Sometimes "SAP" has unrelated information like news or weather.



- Choose **Mono** for channels that are broadcasting in mono, or if you are having difficulty receiving a stereo signal.
- Choose Stereo for channels that are broadcasting in stereo.
- Choose SAP to listen to the Separate Audio Program, which is usually a foreign-language translation.


## **Auto Volume**

Each broadcasting station has its own signal conditions, and it is inconvenient to adjust the volume every time the channel is changed. "Auto Volume" automatically adjusts the volume of the desired channel by lowering the sound output when the modulation signal is high or by raising the sound output when the modulation signal is low.

# **Setting the Sleep Timer**

The sleep timer automatically shuts off the TV after a preset time (from 30 to 180 minutes).

Press the ▲ or ▼ button to select "Sleep Timer", then press the **ENTER** button.

Press the  $\triangle$  or  $\nabla$  button to select the preset time you want, then press the **ENTER** button.

Press the **EXIT** button to exit.

Press the **SLEEP** button on the remote control repeatedly until the appropriate time interval appears (any of the preset values from "30Min" to "180Min").



# **Setting the Blue Screen Mode**

If no signal is being received or the signal is very weak, a blue screen automatically replaces the noisy picture background. If you wish to continue viewing the poor picture, you must set the "Blue Screen" mode to "Off".



## **Viewing Closed Caption Information**

Your TV decodes and displays the closed captions information that is broadcast along with some television shows. These captions are usually subtitles for the hearing impaired or translations into other languages. All VCRs record the closed caption signal from television programs, so pre-recorded video tapes can also deliver closed-caption information. Check for the closed caption symbol (CC) on the tape's package or your TV program-schedule.





- Depending on the particular broadcast, it might be necessary to make changes to "Channel" and "Field".
- Different channels and fields display different information: "Field 2" carries additional information that supplements the information in "Field 1". (For example, "Channel 1" may have subtitles in English, while "Channel 2" has subtitles in Spanish.)
- Press the ▲ or ▼ button to select "Field", then press the ENTER button.

  Press the ▲ or ▼ button to select "1" or "2", then press the ENTER button.

  Press the EXIT button to exit.

• Misspellings and unusual characters sometimes occur during closed caption transmissions, especially those of live events. There may be a small delay before captions appear when you change channels. These are not malfunctions of the TV.

## **Setting the On/Off Melody**

A melody sound can be set to come on when the TV is powered On or Off.




# **Selecting the HDMI Standard**

This feature is for aligning the screen image center dislocated by the differences of various HDMI or DVI signal sources.

Initial setting is "861B". If you experience not aligned screen image center when the "HDMI/DVI IN" jack on the rear of your TV is used for external device, switch the setting to "SMPTE".

This feature only works when the external source is set to "HDMI". Refer to the "Viewing an External Signal Source" on the page 39 for further details.



## **Using the V-Chip**

Access to channels and programs is controlled by a password (i.e., a 4-digit secret code that is defined by the user). The on-screen menu will instruct you to assign a password (and you can change it later, if necessary).

Parents strongly cautioned. This program may contain sophisticated themes, sexual content, strong language and more intense violence.

#### TV-PG

Parental guidance suggested. The program may contain infrequent coarse language, limited violence, some suggestive sexual dialogue and situations

#### TV-G

General audience. It contains little or no violence, no strong language, and little or no sexual dialogue or situations.

#### TV-Y7

Directed to older children. Themes and elements in this program may include mild physical or comedic violence, or may frighten children under the age of seven.

All children. The themes and elements in this program are specifically designed for a very young audience, including children from ages two - six.

# Setting Up Your Remote Control to Operate Your VCR (Cable box or DVD player)

## 1

Turn off your VCR (Cable box or DVD player).

## 2

Press the  ${\bf MODE}$  button to switch the remote control to the  ${\bf VCR}$  (CABLE or  ${\bf DVD}$ ) mode.

■ The remote control has five modes: TV, STB, VCR, CABLE and DVD.

## 3

On your Samsung remote control, press the SET button.

## 4

Enter 3 digits of the VCR (Cable box or DVD player) code listed on next page for your brand of VCR (Cable box or DVD player).

■ Make sure you enter 3 digits of the code, even if the first digit is a "0". (If more than one code listed, try the first one.)

## 5

Press the **POWER** button on the remote control. Your VCR (Cable box or DVD player) should turn on. If your VCR (Cable box or DVD player) turns on, your remote control is now set correctly.

■ If your VCR (Cable box or DVD player) does not turn on, repeat steps 2, 3, and 4, but try one of the other codes listed for the brand of your particular VCR (Cable box or DVD player).

## 6

Once your remote control is set up, press the **MODE** button any time you want to use the remote to operate your VCR (Cable box or DVD player).

- When your remote is in the TV mode, the VCR (or DVD player) control buttons (REW, STOP, PLAY/PAUSE and FF) will still operate your VCR (or DVD player).
- When your remote control is in the STB, VCR, CABLE or DVD mode, the volume buttons still control your TV's volume.

# **Chapter Five**

Troubleshooting

If the TV seems to have a problem, first try this list of possible problems and solutions. If none of these troubleshooting tips apply, then call your nearest service center.

# **Identifying Problems**

Problem	Possible Solution
Poor picture.	Try another channel. Adjust the antenna. Check all wire connections.
Poor sound quality.	Try another channel. Adjust the antenna. Make sure the <b>MUTE</b> button is off.
No picture or sound.	Try another channel. Press the <b>SOURCE</b> button. Make sure the TV is plugged in. Check the antenna connections.
No color, wrong colors or tints.	Make sure the program is broadcast in color. Adjust the picture settings.
Picture rolls vertically.	Adjust the antenna. Check all wire connections. If you are using a VCR, check the tracking.
The TV operates erratically.	Unplug the TV for 30 seconds, then try operating it again.
Your remote control does not operate your TV.	Press the <b>MODE</b> button to put your remote control in the <b>TV</b> mode.  Make sure the remote has batteries.
The TV won't turn on.	Make sure the wall outlet is working.  Make sure the remote has batteries.

## **Cleaning and Maintaining Your TV**

With proper care, your TV unit will give you many years of service. Please follow these guidelines to get the maximum performance from your TV.

#### **Placement**

- Do not place the TV near extremely hot, cold, humid or dusty places.
- Do not place the TV near appliances with electric motors that create magnetic fields, such as vacuum cleaners.
- Keep the ventilation openings clear; do not place the TV on a soft surface, such as cloth or paper.
- Place the TV in a vertical position only.

#### Liquids

• Do not handle liquids near or on the TV. Liquids that spill into it can cause serious damage.

#### Cabinet

- Never open the cabinet or touch the parts inside.
- Wipe your TV with a clean, dry cloth. Never use water, cleaning fluids, wax, or chemicals.
- Do not put heavy objects on top of the cabinet.

#### **Temperature**

• If your TV is suddenly moved from a cold to a warm place, unplug the power cord, and allow at least two hours for moisture that may have formed inside the unit to dry completely.

# **Using Your TV in Another Country**

If you plan to take your TV with you to a foreign country, please be aware of the different television systems that are in use around the world. A TV designed for one system may not work properly with another system due to differences in the TV channel frequencies.
