### Setting up service on your Sanyo SCP-8300 is quick and easy.

This section walks you through the necessary steps to unlock your phone, set up your voicemail, and contact Qwest for assistance with your wireless service.

## **Getting Started**

### **Unlocking Your Phone**

To unlock your phone, follow these easy steps:

- 1. Press END/O to turn the phone on.
- 2. Press Unlock (left softkey).

**Note:** To select a softkey, press the softkey button directly below the softkey text that appears at the bottom left and bottom right of your phone's display screen. Softkey actions change according to the screen you're viewing and will not appear if there is no corresponding action available.

Enter your four-digit lock code. (For security purposes, the code is not visible as you type.)

Tip: If you can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of your wireless phone number or try 0000. If neither of these work, call Qwest Wireless™ Repair at 1-888-879-0611.

## **Setting Up Your Voicemail**

All unanswered calls to your wireless phone are automatically transferred to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. Therefore, you will want to set up your voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated.

### To set up your voicemail:

- 1. Press and hold .
- **2**. Follow the system prompts to:
  - Create your passcode
  - Record your greeting
  - Record your name announcement
  - Choose whether or not to activate One-Touch Message Access (a feature that lets you access messages simply by pressing and holding by bypassing the need for you to enter your passcode)

## **Account Passwords**

As a Qwest customer, you enjoy unlimited access to your personal account information, your voicemail account, and your Sprint PCS Vision account. To ensure that no one else has access to your information, you will need to create passwords to protect your privacy.

#### **Account Password**

If you are the account owner, you'll have an account password to sign on to <a href="www.qwestwireless.com">www.qwestwireless.com</a> and to use when calling Qwest Wireless Customer Service. Your default account password is the last four digits of your Social Security number.

#### Voicemail Password

You'll create your voicemail password (or passcode) when you set up your voicemail. See "Setting Up Your Voicemail" on page 240 for more information on your voicemail password.

### **Sprint PCS Vision Password**

If your service plan includes Sprint PCS Vision™, you can set up a Sprint PCS Vision Password. This optional password may be used to authorize purchase of Premium Services content and to protect personal information on multiphone accounts.

Your SCP-8300 by Sanyo is packed with features that simplify your life and expand your ability to stay connected to the people and information that are important to you. This section will guide you through the basic functions and calling features of your phone.

## **Front View of Your Phone**



## **Key Functions**

- 1. **Earpiece** lets you hear the caller and automated prompts.
- 2. **Main LCD (display)** displays the phone's main menu, features, modes, etc.
- 3. **Softkey (left)** lets you select the menu corresponding to the bottom left line on the Main LCD.
- 4. **Navigation Key** lets you navigate quickly and easily through the menu options. You can access the menu shortcuts by pressing **Right**: Contacts, **Left**: Shortcut, **Up**: Messaging, and **Down**: Downloads.
- MENU/OK lets you access the phone's menus and select menu options.
- Camera Key lets you access the Picture & Video menu and take pictures and videos.
- 7. **TALK Key** lets you place or receive calls, answer Call Waiting, or use Three-Way Calling.
- 8. Microphone to speak into or record your voice.
- Accessories Connector connects accessories such as travel charger (included).
- Standard Charger Jack connects a standard, barrel-type AC adapter charger (not included).
- Keypad lets you enter numbers, letters, and characters, and navigate within menus. Press and hold keys 2-9 for speed dialing.
- **12. SPEAKER Key** lets you place or receive calls in speakerphone mode.
- **13. END/POWER Key** lets you turn the phone on/off, end a call, or return to standby mode.

- **14. Side Camera Key** lets you activate the camera and video mode and take pictures and videos.
- **15. BACK Key** lets you display the previous page or clear characters from the screen.
- **16. Side Call Key** lets you place calls without opening the phone.
- 17. **Softkey** (right) lets you select the menu corresponding to the bottom right line on the Main LCD.
- **18. Speaker** lets you hear the different ringers and sounds. You can mute the ringer when receiving incoming calls by pressing (NO), or any of the side keys.
- **19. LED Indicator** shows your phone's connection status at a glance.
- 20. Sub LCD lets you monitor the phone's status and see who's calling without opening the phone.
- **21. Flash** the built-in flash lets you take pictures and videos in low light.
- **22. Camera Lens** the built-in camera lens lets you take pictures and videos.
- **23**. **Antenna** fully extend the antenna for the best reception.
- **24. Headset Jack** allows you to plug in an optional headset for convenient, hands-free conversations.
- 25. Ready Link/Memo Button allows you to access the Ready Link List or Voice Memo menu. (See "Using Ready Link"" on page 201 or "Managing Voice Memos" on page 149.)
- **26. Side Volume Key** lets you adjust the receiver volume during a call or ringer volume in standby mode. You can also use it to scroll up or down to navigate through the different menu options.

## Viewing the Display Screen

Your phone's display screen provides a wealth of information about your phone's status and options. This list identifies the symbols you'll see on your phone's display screen:

**Tip:** To view a list of your phone's icons and descriptions, from the main menu select **Settings > Phone Info > Help**.

means your phone cannot find a signal.

tells you a call is in progress.

indicates the call is on hold.





## **Features of Your Wireless Phone**

Congratulations on the purchase of your wireless phone. The SCP-8300 by Sanyo is lightweight, easy-to-use, and reliable, and it also offers many significant features and service options. The following list previews some of those features and provides page numbers where you can find out more:

- Digital dual-band/tri-mode capability allows you to make and receive calls while on the network available to you and to roam on other analog and 1900 and 800 MHz digital networks where roaming agreements have been implemented with other carriers (page 91).
- Sprint PCS Vision<sup>™</sup> provides access to the wireless Internet in digital mode (page 257).
- Email and SMS Text Messaging provide quick and convenient messaging capabilities (pages 264 and 249, respectively).

- Games, ringers, screen savers, and other applications can be downloaded to make your phone as unique as you are (page 268). Additional charges may apply.
- The Contacts directory can store up to 300 entries with up to seven phone numbers per entry (page 115).
   A separate Ready Link Contacts List provides easy access to up to 200 personal contacts (page 213).
- The built-in Calendar offers several personal information management features to help you manage your busy lifestyle (page 128).
- Your phone is equipped with a Location feature for use in connection with location-based services that may be available in the future (page 66).
- Your phone's external LCD display allows you to monitor the phone's status and to see who's calling without opening the phone.
- Speed dial lets you dial phone numbers with one key press (see page 39).
- The built-in camera allows you to take full-color digital pictures and videos, view your pictures and videos using the phone's display, and instantly send them to family and friends using Sprint PCS Picture Mail<sup>™</sup> service (page 157).
- Ready Link allows you to enjoy quick, two-way, "walkietalkie-style" communication with one or several Ready Link users (page 201).
- The Media Player allows you to enjoy streaming video and audio with your phone (page 229).

## **Turning Your Phone On and Off**

### **Turning Your Phone On**

To turn your phone on:

Press END/O.

Once your phone is on, it may display "Looking for service...," which indicates that your phone is searching for a signal. When your phone finds a signal, it automatically enters standby mode – the phone's idle state. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls.

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to standby mode.

In Power Save mode, your phone searches for a signal periodically without your intervention. You can also initiate a search for service by pressing any key (when your phone is turned on).

Tip: The Power Save feature helps to conserve your battery power when you are in an area where there is no signal.

## **Turning Your Phone Off**

To turn your phone off:

Press and hold for two seconds until you see the powering down animation on the display screen.

Your screen remains blank while your phone is off (unless the battery is charging).

## **Using Your Phone's Battery and Charger**

### **Battery Capacity**

Your phone is equipped with a Lithium Ion (LiIon) battery. It allows you to recharge your battery before it is fully drained. The battery provides up to 3.5 hours of continuous digital talk time (up to 2 hours in analog).

When the battery reaches 5% of its capacity, the battery icon blinks. When there are approximately 5 minutes of talk time left, the phone sounds an audible alert and then powers down.

**Note:** Long backlight settings, searching for service, vibrate mode, and browser use affect the battery's talk and standby times.

**Tip:** Be sure to watch your phone's battery level indicator and charge the battery before it runs out of power.

### Installing the Battery

To install the Lilon battery:

To install, insert the battery into the opening on the back of the phone and gently press down until the latch snaps into place.



#### Removing the Battery

To remove your battery:

- Make sure the power is off so that you don't lose any stored numbers or messages.
- 2. Press the battery release latch up and remove the battery from the phone at a 45-degree angle.



#### Charging the Battery

Your phone's LiIon battery is rechargeable and should be charged as soon as possible so you can begin using your phone.

Keeping track of your battery's charge is important. If your battery level becomes too low, your phone automatically turns off and you will lose all the information you were just working on. For a quick check of your phone's battery level, glance at the battery charge indicator located in the upper-right corner of your phone's display screen. If the battery charge is getting too low, the battery icon appears and the phone displays a warning message.

Always use a Qwest-approved desktop charger, travel charger, or vehicle power adapter to charge your battery.

**Warning:** Using the wrong battery charger could cause damage to your phone and void the warranty.

### **Using the Charger**

To use the travel charger provided with your phone:

- Plug the round end of the AC adapter into the phone's charger jack and the other end into an electrical outlet.
  - The icon on the phone lets you know the battery is charging.
  - The iii icon on the phone lets you know the battery is fully charged.

It takes approximately 4 hours to fully recharge a completely rundown battery. With the Qwest-approved LiIon battery, you can recharge the battery before it becomes completely run down.

# **Displaying Your Phone Number**

Just in case you forget your phone number, your SCP-8300 can remind you.

To display your phone number:

Press to access the main menu, then select Settings > Phone Info > Phone#/User ID. (Your phone number and other information about your phone and account will be displayed.)


### Removing the Faceplate

Press down on both edges of the faceplate and slide it to remove.



### Installing the Faceplate

Fit the hooks into the notches and slide the faceplate until it snaps into place.



# Making and Answering Calls

### **Making Calls**


Placing a call from your wireless phone is as easy as making a call from any land line phone. Just enter the number and press TALK, and you're on your way to clear calls.

To make a call using your keypad:

- 1. Make sure your phone is on.
- 2. Enter a phone number from standby mode. (If you make a mistake while dialing, press to erase one digit at a time. Press and hold to erase the entire number.)
- 3. Press TALK. (To make a call when you are roaming and Call Guard is enabled, see "Controlling Roaming Charges Using Call Guard" on page 96.)
- **4.** Press or close the phone when you are finished.

Tip: When making calls off the network available to you, always dial using 11 digits (1 + area code + phone number).

You can also place calls from your SCP-8300 by Speed Dialing a number (page 39) and using your Call History listings (page 110).



Important: To maximize performance when using your wireless phone, extend the antenna before a call and do not touch the antenna during a call.

### **Dialing Options**

Dialing options are displayed when you press **Options** (right softkey) after entering numbers in the phone's standby mode.

To select an option, highlight it and press .



- Abbrev. Dial to dial the phone number in your Contacts list that ends with the digits you entered. (See "Using Abbreviated Dialing" on page 40.)
- Call to dial the phone number.
- Call:Speaker On to dial the phone number in speakerphone mode.
- Send Message to send a text message (page 250), picture (page 186), or video (page 190) (mobile numbers only).
- **Save Phone#** to save the phone number in your Contacts list. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on page 35.)
- Find to display Contacts list entries that end with the digits you entered. (See "Finding a Phone Number" on page 36.)
- Hard Pause to insert a hard pause. (See "Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses" on page 36.)
- 12-Sec. Pause to insert a 2-second pause. (See "Dialing" and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses" on page 36.)
- **Hyphen** to insert a hyphen. (Hyphens are generally for visual appeal only; they are not necessary when entering numbers.)

Tip: To speed dial a phone number, press and hold the appropriate speed dial key (locations 2-9). See "Assigning Speed Dial Numbers" on page 123.

### **Answering Calls**

To answer an incoming call:

- Make sure your phone is on. (If your phone is off, incoming calls go to voicemail.)
- 2. Press TALK or STATE to answer an incoming call.

  (Depending on your phone's settings, you may also answer incoming calls by opening the phone or by pressing any number key.)

To answer an incoming call with the flip closed:

- Make sure your phone is on. (If your phone is off, incoming calls go to voicemail.)
- When your phone rings or vibrates, press and hold the Side Call key ( ) on the right side of the phone. (The call will be answered in speakerphone mode.)
   - or -

Open the phone to use the earpiece.

**Note:** If the setting for Open Flip is set to "No Action," opening the phone will not answer the call. (See "Setting the Open/Close Flip Option" on page 76.)

Your wireless phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings and/or vibrates.
- The indicator light flashes.
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays an incoming call message.

If the incoming call is from a number stored in your Contacts List, the entry's name is displayed. The caller's phone number may also be displayed, if available.

When receiving a call, the following options are also displayed by pressing **Options** (right softkey). To select an option, highlight it and press .

- Call Guard to answer the call when you are in roaming mode. (See page 96 for setting Call Guard.)
- Answer to answer the call.
- Answer:Speaker to answer the call in speakerphone mode.
- Answer on Hold to put the call on hold. (See "Setting Answer on Hold" on page 28.)
- Screen Call to answer the call by using a pre-recorded announcement. (Appears when you are in a network service area or digital roaming area. See "Setting Up Screen Call" on page 151.)
- Quiet Ringer to mute the ringer. (Appears when the ringer is set.)

### Answering a Roam Call With Call Guard Enabled

Call Guard is an option that helps you manage your roaming charges when making or receiving calls while outside the network available to you. Please see Section 2D:

Controlling Your Roaming Experience on page 91 for more information about roaming.

To answer a call when you are roaming and Call Guard is enabled:

- 1. Press TALK or SPEAKER.
- Press 1 to proceed while the pop-up message is displayed.

Note: When your phone is off, incoming calls go directly to voicemail.

#### **Setting Answer on Hold**

This feature allows you to hold an incoming call when you cannot answer immediately.

#### To set Answer on Hold:

- When you receive an incoming call, press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight Answer on Hold and press . (The caller hears a message to wait your answer. will display on the screen while the call is on hold.)

#### To resume the call:

- ► Press **Answer** (left softkey) or TALK.
  - or -
- Press Options (right softkey), highlight Answer or Answer:Speaker and press .

Note: Answer on Hold is not available in analog areas.

#### Ending a Call

To disconnect a call when you are finished:

#### With the Flip open:

Close the phone or press END/O.

#### With the Flip closed:

**Note:** If the setting for Close Flip is not set to "End," closing the phone will not end the call. (See "Setting the Open/Close Flip Option" on page 76.)

Tip: Time/Date is displayed when you press Make while the phone is in use.

### **Using the Speakerphone**

The speakerphone feature lets you hear audio through the speaker and talk without holding the phone. When the speakerphone is activated, use the volume control keys on the side of the phone to adjust the volume.

To turn the speakerphone on during a call:

- Press SPEAKER.
  - or -

Press **Options** (right softkey), highlight **Speaker On**, and press ...

To turn the speakerphone off during a call:

- Press SPEAKER.
  - or -

Press **Options** (right softkey), highlight **Speaker Off**, and press **.** 

 $\overline{\mbox{Tip:}}$  You can adjust the speakerphone volume using the Side Volume key or the navigation key.

**Warning!** Due to higher volume levels, do not place the phone near your ear during speakerphone use.

### **Changing the Ringer Volume**

To change the ringer volume, press the Side Volume key when the phone is open and in standby mode.

**Note:** To change the ringer volume from the main menu, see "Adjusting the Phone's Volume Settings" on page 53.

### **Adjusting Volume During a Conversation**

When you need to adjust the receiver volume during a conversation, use the side volume key, or press the navigation key up or down while a call is in progress.

### **Muting a Call**

There are times when it's necessary to mute a call so that your caller does not hear you or certain background noise.

#### To mute a call:

Press Options (right softkey), highlight Mute, and press . (When the phone is muted, "Muted" appears on the display.)

#### To unmute a call:

Press Options (right softkey), highlight Unmute, and press ...

Tip: You can also mute a call with the flip closed. Simply press which is located on the side of your phone.

#### **Missed Call Notification**

When an incoming call is not answered, the Missed Call log and the icon are displayed on your screen.

To call the Missed Call entry:

Press TALK or SPEAKER.

**Tip:** If you have two or more notifications, the event list will appear.

To erase the Missed Call log:

▶ Press **Dismiss** (right softkey).

**Tip:** If you press before checking your notification, **Events** (right softkey) appears in standby mode. Press **Events** (right softkey) to display the notification list. To call the entry, highlight the entry and press **Call** (left softkey).

### **Calling Emergency Numbers**

You can place calls to 911 (dial **2019 201 201** and press **TALK**), even if your phone is locked or your account is restricted. When you place an emergency call, your phone automatically enters Emergency mode.

Press **Options** (right softkey) to display the options. To select an option, highlight it and press **...** 

- Speaker On to activate speakerphone mode. (If you are in speakerphone mode, the option will appear as Speaker Off to deactivate.)
- Unlock Phone to unlock your phone (appears only if the phone is locked).
- Close Menu to close the pop-up menu (appears only if the phone is unlocked).

Tip: Press My Phone (left softkey) to display your phone number during Emergency mode.

#### To exit Emergency mode:

- 1. Press END/O.
- 2. Press **Options** (right softkey) to display the options.
- 3. Highlight Exit Emergency and press 🐯.

**Note:** When you are in Emergency mode, you can only exit from the options menu.

#### To select Emergency mode options:

- 1. Press END/O during a 911 call.
- **2.** Press **Options** (right softkey).
  - Call 911 to call 911.
  - Call 911:Speaker to call 911 in speakerphone mode.
  - **Exit Emergency** to exit Emergency mode.
- 3. Highlight an option and press ...

### **In-Call Options**

Pressing **Options** (right softkey) during a call displays a list of features you may use during the course of a call. To select an option, highlight it and press . The following options are available through the Options menu:

- Flash to answer an incoming Call Waiting call or to connect a third party during Three-Way Calling.
- Mute or Unmute to mute or reactivate your phone's microphone.
- Speaker On or Speaker Off to activate or deactivate speakerphone mode.

**Warning!** Due to higher volume levels, do not place the phone near your ear during speakerphone use.

- Three-Way Call to call a third party.
- Call History to access the Call History menu. (See "Managing Call History" on page 107.)
- Contacts to access the Contacts menu. (See "Using the Contacts Directory" on page 115.)

- Messaging to access the Messaging menu. (See "Accessing Messaging" on page 264.)
- **Settings** to access the Settings menu. (See "Controlling Your Phone's Settings" on page 47.)
- Tools/Extras to access the Tools/Extras menu. (See "Using the phone's Calendar and Tools" on page 127.)

**Note:** The Flash menu appears only for Call Waiting and Three-Way Calling. The Mute menu does not appear during a 911 call. The Three-Way Call menu does not appear in Roaming areas.

### **End-of-Call Options**

To display the following options, press **Options** (right softkey) within 10 seconds after disconnecting a call.

To select an option, highlight it and press .

- **Call Again** to dial the phone number.
- **Call:Speaker On** to dial the phone number in speakerphone mode.
- Save Phone# to save the phone number in your Contacts list.
  - **Go to Phone Book** appears when the number is already in your Contacts list. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on page 35.)

**Note:** The End-of-Call options are not displayed for calls identified as No ID or Restricted.

### Saving a Phone Number

Your SCP-8300 can store up to 500 phone numbers in up to 300 Contacts entries (an entry may contain up to seven numbers). Each entry's name can contain 16 characters. Your phone automatically sorts the Contacts entries alphabetically. (For more information, see Section 2G: Using the Contacts Directory on page 115.)

To save a number from standby mode:

- 1. Enter a phone number.
- **2.** Press **Options** (right softkey).
- 3. Highlight Save Phone# and press 🐯.
- 4. Select a label and press (R).
- **5.** Enter a name and press . If you have already stored entries in the Contacts list, you are prompted to select the following entry modes:
  - New Name to enter a new name.
  - From Ph. Book to select a name from the Contacts entry list.
- 6. Press Save (left softkey).

### **Finding a Phone Number**

You can search Contacts list entries for phone numbers that contain a specific string of numbers.

#### To find a phone number:

- Enter the last four or more digits of the number and press **Options** (right softkey). (The more numbers you enter, the more specific the search becomes.)
- 2. Highlight **Find** and press **.** (The Contacts entry that ends with the digits you entered appears.)
- 3. Scroll to your desired entry.
  - Press to display the entry details.
  - Press TALK or SPEAKER to dial.

### Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as voicemail or credit card billing numbers.

There are two types of pauses available on your phone:

- Hard Pause sends the next set of numbers when you press TALK.
- 2-Sec. Pause automatically sends the next set of numbers after two seconds.

**Note:** You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine 2-second and hard pauses.

#### To dial or save phone numbers with pauses:

- Enter the phone number and press Options (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight either **Hard Pause** or **2-Sec. Pause** and press . (Hard pauses are displayed as a "H" and 2-second pauses as a "T".)
- **3.** Enter additional numbers (for example, a passcode or an extension).
- 4. To dial the number, press TALK or SPANED. (When dialing a number with a hard pause, press TALK to send the next set of numbers.)

- or -

To save the number in your Contacts list, press **Options** (right softkey), highlight **Save Phone#**, and press **@**.

### Plus (+) Code Dialing

Plus Code Dialing automatically dials the international access code for the country in which you are travelling – including for calls back to the United States.

#### To make a call using Plus Code Dialing:

- Press and hold • until a "+" appears on your phone display.
- 2. Dial the country code and phone number you're calling and press TALK. (The access code for international dialing will automatically be dialed, followed by the country code and phone number.)

### **Dialing From the Contacts Directory**

To dial directly from a Contacts entry:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Contacts.
- 3. Select Find/Add Entry (■1).

Shortcut: Press the navigation key right to list entries.

- 4. Scroll to the desired entry in the Contacts list and press .
- 5. Select the number you want to call.
- **6.** Press **Options** (right softkey) for the menu options.
- Highlight Call or Call:Speaker On and press to place a call.

Tip: You can also place a call by pressing TALK, SPEAKED, or Call (left softkey) during step 5 above.

**Note:** The icons next to each entry represent the Contacts labels (for example, Mobile, Home, Work, etc.). A triangle next to an icon means there is another label for the entry. Press the navigation key right or left to select the desired label.

### **Using Speed Dialing**

With this feature, you can dial your favorite entries using one key press for locations 2-9. (See "Assigning Speed Dial Numbers" on page 123.)

To use speed dial for voice calls:

- From standby mode, press and hold the appropriate key for approximately two seconds.
  - or -
- From standby mode, press the appropriate key and press TALK or STAND.

The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "Connecting...".

To use speed dial for Ready Link calls:

➤ From standby mode, press the appropriate key and press . (See "Assigning Speed Dialing for Ready Link Entries" on page 222.)

The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "R-Link calling...".

**Note:** Speed dialing is not available when you are roaming; when you are roaming off the network available to you, you must always dial using eleven digits (1 + area code + number).

### **Using Abbreviated Dialing**

Abbreviated Dialing is another form of speed dialing. It allows you to dial a number by entering the last 3-6 digits of any number in your Contacts directory. This feature becomes available when you enable Abbreviated Dialing and enter the appropriate digits of a phone number. (See "Setting Abbreviated Dialing" on page 78.)

To place a call using Abbreviated Dialing:

- 1. Dial the last 3-6 digits of a contact's phone number.
- Press Options (right softkey) to display the dialing options.
- 3. Highlight Abbrev. Dial and press (R), TALK, or SPEAKER.

Tip: You can also place a call by pressing TALK or SPEAKER during step 2 above.

**Note:** If there is no matched number, your phone dials the number you set for abbreviated dial with the last four or five digits you entered. If there are matched numbers in your Contacts list, the abbreviated dial list will be displayed. To place a call, select a number and press **TALK**.

# **Entering Text**

### **Selecting a Character Input Mode**

Your SCP-8300 provides convenient ways to enter words, letters, punctuation, and numbers whenever you are prompted to enter text (for example, when adding a Contacts entry or when using Email and SMS Text Messaging).

#### To change the character input mode:

- When you display a screen where you can enter text, press Mode (right softkey).
- 2. Select a character input mode:
  - Add Word to store words that you use frequently (see page 43).
  - Preset Messages to enter preset messages (see page 69).
  - Recent Messages to enter messages you have used recently.
  - **Signature** to enter your signature (see page 68).
  - **T9 Word** to enter characters using predictive T9 Text Input (see page 42).
  - Alphabet to enter characters by tapping the keypad (see page 45).
  - SYMBOL to enter symbols.
  - **NUMBER** to enter numbers.
  - PRESET SUFFIX to enter a preset suffix.
  - SMILEYS to enter smile pictures.
  - **Emoticons** to enter an emotion icon.
  - Select Language to select the language (English or Spanish).

- **Erase All** to erase all text (if applicable).
- Paste to paste copied or cut text (if applicable).
- Select Text to select stored text for copying or cutting.

**Note:** Preset Messages, Recent Messages, Signature and Emoticons are only available when composing text messages.

Tip: When entering text, press the key to change letter capitalization (Abc > ABC > abc).

### **Entering Characters Using T9 Text Input**

T9 Text Input lets you enter text in your phone by pressing keys just once per letter. (To select the **T9 Word** mode when entering text, see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 41.)

T9 Text Input analyzes the letters you enter using an intuitive word database and creates a suitable word. (The word may change as you type.)

To enter a word using T9 Text Input:

- Select the T9Word character input mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 41.)
- 2. Press the corresponding keys once per letter to enter a word (for example, to enter the word "Bill," press [802] [914] [915]. (If you make a mistake, press to erase a single character. Press and hold [844] to delete word by word.)
- 3. To accept a word and insert a space, press ...

#### Adding a Word to the T9 Database

If a word you want to enter does not display as an option when you are using T9 Text Input, you can add it to the database.

#### To add a word to the T9 Text Input database:

- 1. Select the **Add Word** mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 41.)
- 2. Enter the word using multi-tap (Alphabet) text entry and press **Save** (left softkey).
  - or -
- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXXZ 9).
- 4. Select Text Entry.
- Select Add Word.
- Enter the word using multi-tap (Alphabet) text entry and press Save (left softkey).

#### To edit or erase the words you have added:

- 1. Follow steps 1-4 above.
- 2. Select My Words.
- Select your desired word and press Options (right softkey).
- 4. To select an option, highlight it and press ...
  - Edit to edit a word in My Words.
  - Erase to erase a word in My Words.

### **Customizing the T9 Settings**

To customize the T9 Settings:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXZ 9).
- 4. Select Text Entry.
- 5. Select T9 Settings.
- **6.** Select your desired option and press **...** 
  - Predict.Txt Mode to allow T9 text input to recognize words you have added to the T9 database.
  - Word Choice List to display word choice list.
  - Show aft enter to select digits number (1-3 digits) to display the words choice list. The word choice list will display based on the number of digits you selected.
  - Show aft wait to select how many seconds the phone should wait to display the words choice list.

For more information about T9 Text Input, visit the Tegic Web site at www.t9.com.

### **Entering Characters by Tapping the Keypad**

To enter characters by tapping the keypad:

- Select the Alphabet mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 41.)
- 2. Press the corresponding keys repeatedly until the desired letter appears (for example, to enter the word "Bill," press twice, at three times, and three times again). (If you make a mistake, press to erase a single character. Press and hold to delete word by word.)

By default, the first letter of an entry is capitalized and the following letters are lowercase. After a character is entered, the cursor automatically advances to the next space after two seconds or when you enter a character on a different key.

Using the menu options available on your wireless phone, you can customize your phone to sound, look, and operate just the way you want it to. This section describes how you can change your phone's settings to best suit your needs. Take a few moments to review these options and to adjust or add settings that are right for you.

# **Sound Settings**

### **Ringer Types**

Ringer types help you identify incoming calls and messages. You can assign ringer types to individual Contacts entries, types of calls, and types of messages.

- Preprogrammed Ringers include a variety of standard ringer types and familiar music.
- Vibrating Ringer alerts you to calls or messages without disturbing others.
- Downloaded Ringers can be downloaded right to your phone. (See "Downloading Premium Services Content" on page 268.)

#### Selecting Ringer Types for Voice Calls

Your wireless phone provides a variety of ringer options that allow you to customize your ring and volume settings. These options allow you to identify incoming calls by the ring.

To select a ringer type for voice calls:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- **3.** Select **Sounds** (■1).
- 4. Select Ringer Type (ABC 2).
- 5. Select Voice Calls.
- 6. Select With Caller ID or No Caller ID.
- 7. Scroll to your desired ringer type and press ...

To select a distinctive ringer for voice calls while roaming:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Sounds ( ).
- 4. Select Ringer Type (ABC 2).
- 5. Select Voice Calls.
- 6. Select Roaming.
- Select Distinctive. (Select Normal to deactivate this feature.)

**Note:** The Normal ringer is available only when you are in a digital roaming area.

### Selecting Ringer Types for Ready Link Calls

To select a ringer type for Ready Link calls:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- **3.** Select **Sounds** (■1).
- 4. Select Ringer Type (ABC 2).
- 5. Select Ready Link.
- Select Ready Link Calls, R-Link Missed, or R-Link Floor Tone.
- 7. Scroll to your desired ringer type and press 🐯.

#### Selecting Ringer Types for Voicemail, Messaging, or Calendar/Alarm

To select a ringer type for voicemail, messaging, or calendar/alarm:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select **Settings**.
- 3. Select Sounds ( ).
- 4. Select Ringer Type (ABC 2).
- 5. Select Voicemail, Messaging, or Calendar/Alarm.
- **6.** Press , scroll to your desired ringer type, and press .

### **Selecting a Tone Length**

Your phone offers a number of options for selecting the audible tones accompanying a key press. (Longer tone lengths may be better for tone recognition when dialing voicemail or other automated systems.)

To select a tone length:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- **3.** Select **Sounds** (■ **1**).
- 4. Select Others (MNO 6).
- 5. Select Tone Length.
- 6. Select Short or Long.

### Setting a Start-up/Power-off Tone

To set a start-up/power-off tone:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Sounds ( ).
- 4. Select Others (MNO 6).
- **5.** Select **Start-up Tone** or **Power-off Tone**.
- **6.** Scroll to your desired tone and press **3.**

### **Using Voice Prompt**

This feature allows you to hear voice prompts at Voice Memo, Screen Call setting, etc. (default setting is Off).

To enable or disable voice prompt:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- **3.** Select **Sounds** (■1).
- **4.** Select **0thers** ( **MNO 6** ).
- **5.** Select **Voice Prompt**.
- 6. Select **On** or **Off**.

 $\textbf{Tip:} \ When \ ringer \ volume \ is \ set to \ "Silence \ All," \ voice \ prompts \ cannot \ be \ heard.$ 

### **Setting Up Key Press Echo**

With this feature, you can hear a voice say the numbers when you press the keypad. This feature is available when you are in standby mode.

To turn Key Press Echo on or off:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select **Settings**.
- 3. Select Sounds ( ).
- 4. Select Others (MIO 6).
- 5. Select Key Press Echo.
- 6. Select On or Off.

### Adjusting the Phone's Volume Settings

You can adjust your phone's volume settings to suit your needs and your environment.

To adjust the ringer and key volume:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Sounds ( ).
- 4. Select Ringer/Key Vol. ( ).
- Select Ringer Volume, Calendar/Alarm, Start-up/Pw-off, or Key Beep.
- 6. Using the navigation key, choose a volume level and press .

To adjust the earpiece or speaker volume:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- **3.** Select **Sounds** (■1).
- 4. Select Receiver Vol. (GHI 4).
- 5. Select either Earpiece or Speaker.
- 6. Using the navigation key, choose a volume level and press .

Tip: You can adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (or the earpiece volume during a call) by using the Side Volume key.

#### To adjust the application volume:

This setting is available for the volume of video, Media Player, downloaded data, and browser.

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Sounds (■1).
- 4. Select Application Vol. (JKL 5).
- 5. Using the navigation key, choose a volume level and press .

#### **Alert Notification**

Your SCP-8300 can alert you with an audible tone when you change service areas, once a minute during a voice call, for incoming or missed Ready Link calls, or when a call has been connected

#### To set alerts:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- **3.** Select **Sounds** (■1).
- 4. Select Alerts (DEF 3).
- **5.** Select your desired option and press 🐯.
  - Service sets an alert to notify you of network services parameter changes.
  - Ready Link sets an alert to notify you of Ready Link calls. Select Ready Link Calls for incoming Ready Link calls, or R-Link Missed for missed Ready Link calls.

- Voicemail sets an alert to notify you of voice messages. Select Ringer Length to set the ringer length of Voicemail notification.
- Messaging sets an alert to notify you of text messages. Select Ringer Length to set the ringer length of Messaging notification.
- Minute Beep sets a minute reminder that beeps ten seconds before the end of each minute during a call.
- Signal Fade sets an alert to notify you when your phone loses a signal during a call.
- Use your navigation key to select a setting and press



Tip: You can select Once or Repeat Alert if you select Ready Link Calls, R-Link Missed, Voicemail, or Messaging, Repeat Alert sounds an alert every two minutes for twenty minutes.

#### Silence All

There may be times when you need to silence your phone entirely. The phone's Silence All option allows you to mute all sounds without turning your phone off.

#### To activate Silence All:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Sounds ( ).
- 4. Select Ringer/Key Vol. ( ).
- 5. Select Ringer Volume.
- Press the navigation key down until Silence All appears on the display and press ...

Tip: When Ringer Volume is set as Silence All, other items are changed to Off and cannot be highlighted.

#### To deactivate Silence All:

 Press the volume key up repeatedly to select a desired volume level.

# **Display Settings**

### **Changing the Text Greeting**

The text greeting can be up to fifteen characters and is displayed on your phone's screen in standby mode. You may choose to keep the phone's default greeting ("Qwest"), or you may enter your own custom greeting.

To display or change your custom greeting:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Greeting.
- 5. Select Custom (ABC 2).
  - You can customize the greeting by entering a personalized greeting. (See "Entering Text" on page 41.)
- Enter a custom greeting using your keypad and press



To display the default greeting ("Qwest"):

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Greeting.
- 5. Select **Default** ( □ 1 ).

### **Changing the Backlight Time Length**

The backlight setting lets you select how long the display screen and keypad are backlit after any key press is made.

To change the Main LCD or Sub LCD backlight setting:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Backlight.
- 5. Select Main LCD or Sub LCD.
- Select Always On, Always Off, or your defined time length.
  - Always Off always turns the backlight off.
  - Always On keeps the backlight on indefinitely.

 $\mbox{\bf Note:}$  The Always On setting returns to the previous value the next time you turn on the phone.

To change the Keypad backlight setting:

- 1. Select **Key** during step 5 above.
- 2. Select **Always Off** or your defined time length.

Note: Long backlight settings affect the battery's talk and standby times.

### **Changing the Display Screen Animation**

Your new phone offers options for what you see on the display screen during various phone functions.

To change the animation display:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Animation.
- 5. Select Standby, Outgoing Calls, or Service Search.
- **6.** Press , scroll to your desired option and press .
  - For standby, you can also set the animation starting time. Select after and select a time setting and press
- 7. Press **0K** (left softkey) to assign the desired image.

### **Changing the Display for Incoming Calls**

You can set the color or downloaded image to be shown on the Incoming Calls display.

To change the incoming calls display:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select **Settings**.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Incoming Calls.
- 5. Press , scroll to your desired option and press ...
- **6.** Press **0K** (left softkey) twice to assign the desired color or image.

### **Changing the Display for Area Name**

This feature enables you to show the area of the phone number you are calling or are called from when the number is not registered in your Contacts list. For example, a call to or from 213-555-5555 will display "California."

### To set your area name display:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Match Area Code.
- 5. Select On or Off.
  - This feature is available only when the phone number is 10 digits, or 11 digits beginning with 1 and matches an area code.
  - The area name will not be displayed when the number of an incoming call is saved in your Contacts list.

### **Changing the Display for Standby Mode**

This feature enables you to select a variety of items to display in standby mode.

To set your standby display:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Standby Display.
- 5. Select Main LCD and select Others.
  - or -
  - Select **Sub LCD**.
- 6. Select your desired item and press ...
  - Screen Saver displays the screen saver.
  - Calendar displays the calendar. (Main LCD only.)
  - **Digital Clock** displays the local time in digital view.
  - Analog Clock displays the local time in analog view.
  - World Clock displays the time of the selected city or country along with the local time.
  - **Default** returns the standby display to its default setting.
- 7. Press to save the setting to follow each system prompt or when confirming the preview display.

Tip: In an area without service, the signal search display appears instead of the display for standby mode.

### **Changing the Screen Saver**

Your new phone offers you the option of displaying a screen saver while in standby mode.

#### To change the screen saver:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Standby Display.
- 5. Select Main LCD or Sub LCD.
- 6. Select Screen Saver.
- 7. Press, scroll to your desired option and press.
- 8. Press **OK** (left softkey) twice to assign the screen saver.

### Changing the Phone's Menu Style

Your phone allows you to choose how the main menu appears on your display screen.

#### To change the main menu style:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Main Menu.
- 5. Select either **Graphic** or **Text**.

### Changing the Display for My Buddy

This feature enables you to see a funny animation on the Main LCD and Sub LCD by opening the flip.

To activate or deactivate My Buddy:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select My Buddy.
- 5. Select Main LCD or Sub LCD.
- 6. Select On or Off.

### **Changing the Background**

You can customize your phone display's appearance by selecting a color scheme to reflect your personality.

To change the display's background:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select **Settings**.
- 3. Select **Display** (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Background.
- 5. Select Main LCD or Sub LCD.
- 6. Select your desired color.

### **Changing the Font Size**

You can change the font size settings for the message and browser.

#### To change the font size:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Font Size.
- 5. Select either Messaging or Browser.
- 6. Select your desired font size.

**Tip:** From the font example display, select your desired font size by pressing the navigation key right or left.

### **Setting Return to Standby Mode**

This feature allows you to select the way to return to standby mode.

#### To set this feature:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Display (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Return to Idle.
- **5.** A message appears. Press **0K** (left softkey) to continue.
- **6.** Select **Automatically** or **End Key**.
  - Automatically to return to standby mode automatically in 30 seconds.
  - End Key to return to standby mode by pressing END/O

Note: End Key setting affects the battery's talk and standby times.

### Sleep Mode

This feature helps conserve your battery power by restricting the display.

### To set sleep mode:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select **Display** (ABC 2).
- 4. Select Sleep Mode.
- 5. Select Main LCD or Sub LCD.
- Select your desired option. (Select Off to deactivate this feature.)

### **Location Settings**

Your wireless phone is equipped with a Location feature for use in connection with location-based services that may be available in the future.

The Location feature allows the network to detect your position. Turning Location off will hide your location from everyone except 911.

**Note:** Even if the Location feature is enabled, no service may use your location without your express permission, unless the service called cannot identify the caller.

To turn your phone's Location feature on or off:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 4. Read the disclaimer and press **OK** (left softkey).
- Select On or Off.

When the Location feature is on, your phone's standby screen will display the  $\bigoplus$  icon. When Location is turned off, the  $\bigotimes$  icon will display.

### **Messaging Settings**

Staying connected to your friends and family has never been easier. With your phone's advanced messaging capabilities, you can send and receive many different kinds of text messages without placing a voice call. (For more information, see "Accessing Messaging" on page 264.)

Your phone's messaging settings make text messaging even faster and easier by letting you decide how you would like to be notified of new messages, create a signature with each sent message, and create your own canned messages, to name just a few.

### **Displaying Pop-up Messages**

When you receive a text message, your phone notifies you by displaying an icon on your display screen. You can also choose to be notified with a larger pop-up message on your display screen.

### To display pop-up messages:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select **Messaging** (PORS 7).
- **4.** Select **Notification** (■ 1).
- 5. Select Msgs and Icon or Icon Only.

### Adding a Customized Signature

Each message you send can have a customized signature to reflect your personality.

To add a customized signature to each sent message:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select **Messaging** (PORS 7).
- 4. Select Signature (GH 4).
- 5. Press and select **0n**.
- 6. Select Text.
- 7. Enter your signature and press **OK** (left softkey).
- **8.** Press **Save** (left softkey) to save your signature.

**Note:** You can insert your signature even when your signature setting is off. Press **Mode** (right softkey) and select **Signature** while composing your message.

### **Managing Preset Messages**

Your phone is pre-set with twenty canned messages each in English and Spanish to help make sending text messages faster and easier. These messages, such as "Where are you?," "Let's get lunch.," and "Meet me at," can be customized or deleted to suit your needs. You can even add your own preset messages to the list.

#### To edit a preset message:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select **Messaging** (PORS 7).
- Select Preset Msgs ( ). (The list of preset messages displays.)
- 5. Select the message you want to edit.
- 6. Use your keypad to edit the message and press OK (left softkey) to save your changes. ("Preset Msgs Saved" will display.)
  - To reset all messages, press Options (right softkey) and select Reset All Msgs during step 5 above.

#### To change the language of the preset messages:

- **1.** Follow steps 1-4 above.
- 2. Press Options (right softkey) and select Select Language.
- 3. Select English or Spanish.

**Note:** For information on editing text, see "Entering Text" on page 41.

### **Setting a Callback Number**

With this feature, you can notify your recipients of your callback number with the text message.

#### To set the callback number:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select **Messaging** (PORS 7).
- 4. Select Send Callback# (DEF 3).
- **5**. Select an option from the following.
  - None to send no callback number.
  - My Phone# to send your phone number.
  - Other to send a specific callback number. To set a number, enter a phone number and press .

### **Airplane Mode**

Airplane Mode allows you to use many of your phone's features, such as Games, Voice Memos, etc., when you are in an airplane or in any other area where making or receiving calls or data is prohibited. When your phone is in Airplane Mode, it cannot send or receive any calls or access online information

To set your phone to Airplane Mode:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXZ 9).
- **4.** Select **Airplane Mode**. (The Airplane Mode disclaimer displays.)
- **5.** Read the disclaimer and press **0K** (left softkey).
- 6. Select On or Off.

While in Airplane Mode, your phone's standby screen will display "Phone Off."

# TTY Use

A TTY (also known as a TDD or Text Telephone) is a telecommunications device that allows people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or who have speech or language disabilities, to communicate by telephone.

Your phone is compatible with select TTY devices. Please check with the manufacturer of your TTY device to ensure that it supports digital wireless transmission. Your phone and TTY device will connect via a special cable that plugs into your phone's headset jack. If this cable was not provided with your TTY device, contact your TTY device manufacturer to purchase the connector cable.

When establishing your service, please call Qwest via the state Telecommunications Relay Service (TRS) by first dialing (TAK). Then provide the state TRS with this number: 866-727-4889.

#### To turn TTY Mode on or off:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXZ 9).
- 4. Select TTY. (You will see a message on the display.)
- **5**. Press **0K** (left softkey) to continue.
- 6. Select Enable or Disable.

**Note:** In TTY Mode, your phone will display the **a**icon.

**Note:** If TTY mode is enabled, the audio quality of non-TTY devices connected to the headset jack may be impaired.

#### **IMPORTANT NOTICE: 911 Emergency Calling**

Qwest recommends that TTY users make emergency calls by other means, including Telecommunications Relay Services (TRS), analog cellular, and landline communications. Wireless TTY calls to 911 may be corrupted when received by public safety answering points (PSAPs) rendering some communications unintelligible. The problem encountered appears related to TTY equipment or software used by PSAPs. This matter has been brought to the attention of the FCC, and the wireless industry and PSAP community are currently working to resolve this.

### **Phone Setup Options**

#### Shortcut

Your phone offers you the option of assigning a shortcut key to a favorite or often-used function. Pressing the navigation key to the left in standby mode will launch your personally designated shortcut.

#### To assign your shortcut key:

- 1. Press the navigation key left.
- Select an unassigned number and press Add (right softkey).
- 3. Select your desired menu and press Set (right softkey).

#### To edit the shortcut name:

- 1. Press the navigation key left.
- Select your desired menu and press Options (right softkey).
- 3. Highlight Edit Name and press 🐯.
- **4.** Edit the name and press **0K** (left softkey).
- **5.** Press **Save** (left softkey) to save the name.

#### To reset the shortcut:

- 1. Press the navigation key left.
- Select your desired menu and press Options (right softkey).
- 3. Highlight Reset and press 🐯.
- 4. Select Yes.
  - To reset all shortcuts, select Reset All during step 3 above.

#### **Auto Answer Mode**

You may set your phone to automatically pick up incoming calls in speakerphone mode or when connected to an optional hands-free car kit and headset.

#### To set Auto Answer mode:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXZ 9).
- 4. Select Auto Answer.
- 5. Select Car Kit/Headset or Speakerphone.
- 6. Select **5 Seconds**, **15 Seconds**, or **Off**.

### **Display Language**

You can choose to display your phone's onscreen menus in English or in Spanish.

To assign a language for the phone's display:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXZ 9).
- 4. Select Language.
- 5. Select English or Español.

### **Setting the Open/Close Flip Option**

This feature enables you to answer an incoming call by opening the flip or to end a call by closing the flip.

#### To activate the Open Flip feature:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXZ 9).
- 4. Select Open/Close Flip.
- 5. Select Open.
- 6. Select Answer Call.
  - To deactivate this feature, select No Action during step 6 above.

#### To activate the Close Flip feature:

- 1. From step 5 above, select **Close**. (You will see a message on the display.)
- 2. Press **OK** (left softkey) to continue.
- 3. Select an option from the following.
  - End to end the call.
  - Continue(Mute) to continue the call. Your voice is muted, however you can hear the caller's voice from the speaker.
  - **Contin(Unmute)** to continue the call. You can hear the caller's voice and speak to the phone to answer.

**Note:** The Close Flip feature does not apply during Ready Link calls or when you are using the speakerphone, a headset, or a car kit.

### **Setting Any Key Answer**

This feature allows you to answer incoming calls by pressing any key (except ( ), ), softkeys and sidekeys).

To turn any key answer on or off:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (wxz 9).
- 4. Select Any Key Answer.
- 5. Select On or Off.

### Setting the Side Key Guard

This feature enables you to lock your side keys while the flip is closed.

To turn any Side Key Guard on or off:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXZ 9).
- 4. Select Side Key Guard.
- 5. Select **On** or **Off**.

Note: This feature does not apply when the flip is open.

Tip: You can deactivate this feature temporarily to use side keys by pressing and holding while the clamshell is closed.

### **Setting the Text Entry Options**

To set the text entry options:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXZ 9).
- 4. Select Text Entry.
- 5. Select your desired option and press .
  - Auto-Capital to set the auto-capital On or Off.
  - My Words to set your original words.
  - Input Language to select the language (English or Spanish).
  - **T9 Settings** to customize the T9 settings (see page 42).
  - Add Word to store words that you use frequently (see page 43).

### **Setting Abbreviated Dialing**

Abbreviated Dialing is another form of speed dialing. It allows you to dial a number by entering 3-6 digits of any number in your Contacts Directory. If the digits you enter do not match any stored Contacts entry, your phone will automatically prepend the digits you specify.

#### To activate this feature:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (wxz 9).
- 4. Select Abbrev. Dial.
- 5. Select Ph. Book Match.
- 6. Select Enable.

#### To set your prepend number:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXYZ 9).
- 4. Select Abbrev. Dial.
- 5. Select Prepend.
- 6. Select Enable.
- 7. Select Prepend#.
- Enter a five- or six-digit number and press **OK** (left softkey).
  - To deactivate this feature, highlight Disable during step 6 above.

**Tip:** To dial the prepend number, see "Using Abbreviated Dialing" on page 40.

Note: This setting does not apply to 911 or Directory Assistance.

### **Headset Mode**

This feature allows you hands-free phone use.

Set the headset mode to Voice Call or Ready Link and press the Turbo Button (the operation button) on the headset to activate useful functions.

#### To connect the headset:

Simply plug the headset into your phone's headset jack.

#### To set headset mode:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Others (WXZ 9).
- 4. Select Headset Mode.
- 5. Select Turbo Button
- **6.** Select an option from the following.
  - Voice Calls: Press the Turbo Button to activate
     Voice dial. Press twice to redial the last call. Press and hold the button to activate the Voice Memo.
  - **Ready Link:** Press and hold the Turbo Button to redial the last Ready Link call.
  - **Off:** Turns this feature off.

#### To set the sound mode:

- 1. From step 4 above, select **Earpiece**.
- 2. Select Stereo or Mono.

### To set the ringer audio:

- 1. From step 4 above, select Ringer Audio.
- 2. Select Normal or Discreet.

**Note:** Please make sure to insert the headset plug into the headset jack as far as it goes. Improper connection of the headset plug can cause abnormal sounds.

**Note:** When using the headset, **DO NOT** set the volume too high. Listening at high volume for an extensive period of time may cause hearing loss.

By using the security settings on your wireless phone, you receive peace of mind without sacrificing flexibility. This section will familiarize you with your phone's security settings. With several options available, you can customize your phone to meet your personal needs.

### **Accessing the Security Menu**

All of your phone's security settings are available through the Security menu. You must enter your lock code to view the Security menu.

### To access the Security menu:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Security (TUV 8).
- 4. Enter your lock code to display the Security menu.

Tip: If you can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of your wireless phone number or try 0000. If neither of these work, call Qwest Wireless™ Repair at 1-888-879-0611.

# **Using Your Phone's Lock Feature**

### **Locking Your Phone**

When your phone is locked, you can only receive incoming calls or make calls to 911 or special numbers. (See "Using Special Numbers" on page 86.)

#### To lock your phone:

- 1. From the Security menu, select **Lock Phone** ( ).
- 3. Highlight Full Lock or Excp. Incom. Calls.

### **Unlocking Your Phone**

#### To unlock your phone:

- 1. From standby mode, press **Unlock** (left softkey).
- 2. Enter your lock code.

### Locking the Pictures and Videos Menu

With this feature, you must enter your lock code when you access the Pictures and Videos menu.

#### To lock the Pictures menu:

- 1. From the Security Menu, select Lock Pic&Video (ABC<sup>2</sup>).
- Select Lock Now. (Select Unlocked to deactivate this feature.)

### **Lock Services**

With this feature, you can choose to restrict access to Sprint PCS Vision services and incoming and outgoing voice calls and Ready Link calls.

### To activate lock services:

- 1. From the Security Menu, select **Others** (PORS **7**).
- 2. Select Lock Services ( JKL 5 ).
- 3. Select Voice Calls, PCS Vision, or Ready Link.
- Select Locked. (Select Unlocked to deactivate this feature.)

### **Changing the Lock Code**

To change your lock code:

- 1. From the Security Menu, select **Others** (PORS **7**).
- 2. Select Change Lock ( ).
- 3. Enter a new lock code ("1234" for example).
- Reenter the new code.

### **Calling in Lock Mode**

You can place calls to 911 and to your special numbers when in lock mode. (For information on special numbers, see "Using Special Numbers" on page 86.)

To place an outgoing call in lock mode:

➤ To call an Emergency number or special number, enter the phone number and press TALK.

**Note:** You cannot place calls to your special numbers in the voice call locked state. See "Lock Services" on page 83 for details.

### **Restricting Calls**

There may be occasions when you want to limit the numbers your phone can call or from which it can receive calls. You can use the Restrict Calls setting to do just that. (The Restrict Calls setting does not apply to 911 or Qwest Wireless Repair.)

#### To restrict calls:

- 1. From the Security Menu, select **Others** (PORS **7**).
- 2. Select Limit Use (ABC 2).
- 3. Select Outgoing Calls or Incoming Calls.
- 4. Select your desired option and press ...
  - Allow All lets you make or receive all calls.
  - PhoneBook Only lets you make or receive calls to or from Contacts entries, voicemail, or special numbers only.
  - Special #s Only lets you make or receive calls to or from three special numbers only. (See "Using Special Numbers" on page 86.)

Note: Restricted incoming calls are forwarded to voicemail.

## **Using Special Numbers**

Special numbers are important numbers that you have designated as being "always available." You can receive calls from special numbers even if your phone is locked.

You can save 3 special numbers in addition to your Contacts entries (the same number may be in both directories).

To add or replace a special number:

- 1. From the Security Menu, select **Others** (POS **7**).
- 2. Select Special #s (DEF 3).
- 3. Select an entry number.
- 4. Enter your desired phone number and press .
   or Press Options (right softkey), highlight From Ph. Book or Voicemail, and press .

Note: Special numbers cannot be called in the voice call locked state.

# **Erasing the Contacts Directory**

You can quickly and easily erase all of the contents of your Contacts Directory.

To erase all the names and phone numbers in your Contacts Directory:

- 1. From the Security Menu, select **Erase Ph. Book** (DEF 3).
- **2.** Press **0K** (left softkey) to continue.
- If you are certain you would like to erase all of your Contacts entries, select Yes.

### **Erasing All Downloads**

You can use your phone's security menu to erase all items you have downloaded to your phone.

#### To erase all downloads:

- 1. From the Security Menu, select **Erase Download** ( GH 4 ).
- 2. Press **OK** (left softkey) to continue.
- If you are certain that you would like to erase all items downloaded to your phone, select Yes.
  - If you have assigned downloaded data, the function returns to its default setting.

### **Resetting Your Pictures Account**

This option resets your authentication ID for your Sprint PCS Picture Mail account.

To reset your pictures account:

- 1. From the Security Menu, select **Reset Pictures** ( x. 5 ).
- 2. Press **OK** (left softkey) to continue.
- If you are certain that you would like to reset your pictures account, select Yes.

After resetting, you are prompted to reenter the password when you use Online Pictures.

**Note:** Your account will be locked if you enter wrong password 10 times after resetting your acount. In this case, please contact Ωwest Wireless™ Repair at 1-877-879-0611.

### **Resetting Your Phone**

Resetting the phone restores all the factory defaults, including the ringer types and display settings. The Contacts, Call History, Calendar, and Messaging are not affected.

### To reset your phone:

- 1. From the Security Menu, select **Reset Phone** ( **MO 6** ).
- **2.** Press **0K** (left softkey) to continue.
- 3. If you are certain that you would like to restore all of the factory settings, select **Yes**.

# Enabling and Disabling Sprint PCS Vision Services

You can disable Sprint PCS Vision services without turning off your phone; however, you will not have access to all Sprint PCS Vision services, including Web and Email. Disabling Sprint PCS Vision will avoid any charges associated with Sprint PCS Vision services. While signed out, you can still place or receive phone calls, check voicemail, and use other voice services. You may enable Sprint PCS Vision services again at any time.

#### To disable Sprint PCS Vision services:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select PCS Vision (DEF 3).
- 4. Select **Disable Vision**. (A message will appear.)
- 5. Press **Disable** (right softkey) to confirm that you want to sign out.

#### To enable Sprint PCS Vision services:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select **PCS Vision** (DEF 3).
- 4. Select **Enable Vision**. (A message will appear.)
- **5.** Press **0K** (left softkey) to enable Vision service.

# **Controlling Your Roaming Experience**

#### In This Section

Roaming is the ability to make or receive calls when you're off the network available to you. Your new dual band/tri-mode SCP-8300 by Sanyo works anywhere on the network available to you and allows you to roam on other analog and 1900 and 800 MHz digital networks where we've implemented roaming agreements with other carriers.

This section explains how roaming works as well as special features that let you manage your roaming experience.

### **Understanding Roaming**

### Recognizing the Roaming Icon on the Display Screen

Your phone's display screen always lets you know when you're off the network available to you. Any time you are roaming, the phone displays the roaming icon (). If you are roaming on a digital system, the roaming icon will display along with the text **Digital Roam**, and on an analog system, with the text **Analog Roam**.

Tip: Remember, when you are using your phone off the network available to you, always dial numbers using 11 digits (1 + area code + number).

**Note:** Unless your service plan includes roaming, you will pay a higher per-minute rate for roaming calls.

### Roaming on Other Digital Networks

When you're roaming on digital networks, your call quality and security will be similar to the quality you receive when making calls on the network available to you. However, you may not be able to access certain features, such as Sprint PCS Vision.

Note: Ready Link Service is not available in roaming areas.

**Note:** If you're on a call when you leave the network available to you and enter an area where roaming is available, your call is dropped. If your call is dropped in an area where you think network service is available, turn your phone off and on again to reconnect to the network available to you.

### Roaming on Analog Networks

When you roam on analog networks, you will experience a similar quality provided by other analog carriers today. Although some features, such as Sprint PCS Vision, will be unavailable, you can still make and receive calls and access voicemail. If you are accustomed to network service, you may notice some of the following differences when using analog service:

- You are more likely to experience static, cross-talk, fade-out, and dropped calls.
- Some features which are standard on the network available to you, such as call waiting, Sprint PCS Vision, Ready Link, and direct international dialing, are unavailable
- Though callers can leave voicemail messages while you are roaming, you will not receive notification until you return to the network available to you. (See "Checking for Voicemail Messages While Roaming" on page 94.)
- There are security and privacy risks (eavesdropping and cloning) that exist with conventional analog services today.
- Your battery's charge will deplete more quickly and you will need to recharge it more often when you use your phone for analog roaming.

**Note:** When using your phone in analog mode, the phone may feel warm. This is normal for analog operation.

### **Checking for Voicemail Messages While Roaming**

When you are roaming off the network available to you, you may not receive on-phone notification of new voicemail messages. Callers can still leave messages, but you will need to periodically check your voicemail for new messages if you are in a roaming service area for an extended period of time.

To check your voicemail while roaming:

- 1. Dial 1+area code+your wireless phone number.
- 2. When you hear your voicemail greeting, press shirt ×.
- Enter your passcode at the prompt and follow the voice prompts.

When you return to the network available to you, voicemail notification will resume as normal.

# **Setting Your Phone's Roam Mode**

Your wireless phone allows you to control your roaming capabilities. By using the **Roaming** menu option, you can determine which signals your phone accepts.

### Set Mode

Choose from three different settings on your dual-band/trimode phone to control your roaming experience.

To set your phone's roam mode:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Roaming (MNO 6).
- 4. Select Set Mode.
- **5.** Select an option from the following, and press ...



- Qwest Only allows you to access the enhanced network available to you only and prevents roaming on other networks.
- Automatic seeks network service. When service is unavailable, the phone searches for an alternate system.
- Roaming Only forces the phone to seek a roaming system. The previous setting (Qwest Only or Automatic) is restored the next time the phone is turned on

# Controlling Roaming Charges Using Call Guard

Your phone has two ways of alerting you when you are roaming off the network available to you: the onscreen roaming icon and Call Guard. Call Guard makes it easy to manage your roaming charges by requiring an extra step before you can place or answer a roaming call. (This additional step is not required when you make or receive calls while on the network available to you.)

#### To turn Call Guard on or off:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Roaming ( MO 6 ).
- 4. Select Call Guard.
- 5. Select On or Off.

### To place roaming calls with Call Guard on:

- From standby mode, dial 1 + area code + the sevendigit number. (You can also initiate a call from the Contacts directory, Call History, or Messaging.)
- Press TALK or STALE (or press Options [right softkey] and highlight Call or Call:Speaker On).
- 3. Press to proceed while the pop-up message is displayed.
  - or -

Press any key to erase the pop-up message, press **Options** (right softkey), highlight **Roam Call**, or **Roam:Speaker On**, and press ...

To answer incoming roaming calls with Call Guard on:

- Press Options (right softkey), highlight Answer or Answer:Speaker, and press ...
  - or -
- 1. Press TALK or SPEAKER.
- Press 1 to proceed while the pop-up message is displayed.

 $\textbf{Reminder:} \ \text{If the Call Guard feature is set to } \textbf{On, you need to take extrasteps to make and receive roaming calls.}$

The Call History keeps track of incoming calls, calls made from your wireless phone, and missed calls. This section guides you through accessing and making the most of your Call History.

## **Viewing History**

You'll find the Call History feature very helpful. It is a list of the last 20 voice calls and the last 10 Ready Link calls for calls you placed, accepted, or missed. Call History makes redialing a number fast and easy. It is continually updated as new numbers are added to the beginning of the list and the oldest entries are removed from the bottom of the list.

Each entry contains the phone number (if it is available) and Contact's name (if the phone number is in your Contacts List). Duplicate calls (same number and type of call) may only appear once on the list (except missed calls).

### To view a Call History entry:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Call History.
- Select Outgoing ( ), Incoming ( ), or Missed ( ).
- 4. Select the entry you wish to view.

Tip: You can switch the voice call history to the Ready Link call history by pressing R-Link (left softkey). To return to the voice call history, press Voice Call (left softkey). This option is not available when Ready Link mode is set to Disable (see page 202), or Ready Link is locked (see page 83).

# **Call History Options**

For additional information and options on a particular call, highlight a Call History entry and press . This feature displays the date and time of the call, the phone number (if available), and the caller's name (if the number is already in your Contacts List). By pressing **Options** (right softkey), you can select from the following options:

- Call to dial the phone number.
- **Call:Speaker On** to dial the phone number in speakerphone mode.
- Send Message to send a text message, picture, or video. (To send a text message, see "Composing SMS Text Messages" on page 250. To send a picture or video, see "Sending Sprint PCS Picture Mail" on page 186.)
- **Save Phone#** to save the phone number (if applicable).
  - Go to Phone Book appears when the number is already in your Contacts list. (See "Saving a Phone Number From Call History" on page 111.)
- Prepend to add numbers to the beginning of the phone number. (See "Prepending a Phone Number From Call History" on page 112.)
- Copy to Personal to copy the phone number to the Ready Link Personal List (if applicable).
- **Erase** to erase the entry.

# Making a Call From Call History

To place a call from Call History:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Call History.
- Select Outgoing ( ), Incoming ( ), or Missed ( ).
- 4. Scroll to the entry you want to call.
- 5. Press TALK Or SPEAKER.
  - or -

Press **Options** (right softkey), highlight **Call** or **Call:Speaker On**, and press .

**Note:** You cannot make calls from Call History to entries identified as **No ID** or **Restricted**.

# Saving a Phone Number From Call History

Your SCP-8300 can store up to 500 phone numbers in up to 300 Contacts entries (an entry may contain up to seven numbers). Each entry's name can contain sixteen characters.

To save a phone number from Call History:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Call History.
- Select Outgoing ( ), Incoming ( ), or Missed ( or 3 ).
- Scroll to a call history entry and press Options (right softkey).
- 5. Highlight Save Phone# and press 🐨.
- **6.** Select the appropriate label.
- 7. Enter a name and press ...
  Once you have stored an entry in the Contacts list, you are prompted to select the following entry mode:
  - New Name to enter a name directly.
  - From Ph. Book to select a name from the Contacts list.
- 8. Press Save (left softkey).

**Note:** You cannot save phone numbers already in your Contacts list or from calls identified as **No ID** or **Restricted**. If the selected entry has already been stored in the Contacts list, **Go to Phone Book** appears during step 5 above.

# Prepending a Phone Number From Call History

If you need to place a call from Call History and you happen to be outside your local area code, you can add the appropriate prefix by prepending the number.

To prepend a phone number from Call History:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Call History.
- Select Outgoing ( ), Incoming ( ), or Missed ( ).
- Scroll to a call history entry and press Options (right softkey).
- 5. Highlight **Prepend** and press 🐯.
- **6.** Enter the digits you want to add to the number.
- 7. Press TALK or SPEAKER to place a call.

To select another option, press **Options** (right softkey), highlight it and press **@**.

- Call to dial the phone number.
- **Call:Speaker On** to dial the phone number in speakerphone mode.
- Save Phone# to store the phone number in your Contacts directory.
- Hard Pause to insert a hard pause.
- **12-Sec. Pause** to insert a 2-second pause.

# **Erasing Call History**

To erase individual Call History entries, see "Call History Options" on page 109.

### To erase Call History:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Call History.
- 3. Select Erase History (GH 4).
- 4. Select Outgoing ( ), Incoming ( ), Missed ( or 3), or All ( or 4).
- 5. Highlight Voice Calls or Ready Link and press .
  - Voice Calls to erase call history for voice calls.
  - Ready Link to erase call history for Ready Link calls.
- 6. Select Yes.

# **Displaying the Contacts List**

To display your contacts list:

- Press the navigation key right.
  - or -
- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Contacts.
- 3. Select Find/Add Entry ( ).

# **Adding a New Contacts Entry**

Your phone can store up to 500 phone numbers in up to 300 Contacts entries (an entry may contain up to seven numbers). Each entry's name can contain sixteen characters.

### To add a new entry:

- Press the navigation key right to display the Contacts list
- 2. Highlight <Add Contact> and press ...
- 3. Enter a name and press .
- Select the appropriate label (Mobile, Home, Work, Pager, Fax, Other, No Label, Email, or Web), enter the phone number or address and press
- **5.** Press **Save** (left softkey).

# **Finding Contacts List Entries**

There are several ways to display your Contacts entries: by name, by speed dial number, by Ready Link List, and by voice tags. Follow the steps outlined in the sections below to display entries from the Contacts list menu.

### **Finding Names**

To find Contacts list entries by name:

- Press the navigation key right to display the Contacts list.
- Scroll through all the entries using your navigation key.
   or -

Enter the first letter of the name or part of the name. (The display shows the entries beginning with the letter entered.)

- To display the entry's details, select your desired entry and press .
- 4. To make the call, press TALK, SPEAKER, or **Call** (left softkey).

### To find Ready Link List entries:

- Press the navigation key right to display your Contacts list.
- 2. Press **Go to** (left softkey). Highlight your desired list and press **T**.
  - **Phone Book** to display the Contacts list.
  - Personal List to display the Personal List.
  - Personal Grps. to display the Personal Group List.
- 3. Scroll through the list to select your desired entry.

**Note:** The **Go to** (left softkey) option does not appear when Ready Link mode is set to **Disable** (see page 202), or Ready Link is locked (see page 83).

### Finding Speed Dial Numbers

To find phone numbers you have stored in speed dial locations:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Contacts.
- 3. Select **Speed Dial #s** ( No. 2 ). (The Speed Dial numbers list appears.)

### Finding Voice Tags

To find Voice Tags in your phone:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services (■1).
- 4. Select Voice Dial (DEF 3).
- 5. Select Review ( or Rev:Speaker ( or 3 ). (The Voice Dial tags list appears.)

# **Contacts List Entry Options**

To access a contact's options, display the Contacts list, highlight an entry and press . Then select a phone number and press **Options** (right softkey). To select an option, highlight it and press .

- **Edit** to edit the selected entry.
- Call to dial the selected number.
- **Call:Speaker On** to dial the phone number in speakerphone mode.
- Send Message to send a text message, picture, or video (mobile numbers only). (See page 249 and 186 for details.)
- Call Alarm to set a call alarm for the entry. (See page 131 for Call Alarm.)
- Set Speed Dial to assign speed dial numbers to your favorite entries. (See "Assigning Speed Dial Numbers" on page 123.)
- **Set Voice Dial** to set a voice dial for the entry. (See page 146 for Voice Dial.)
- Prepend to alter a phone number by adding numbers to the beginning of the entry. (See "Prepending a Phone Number From Call History" on page 112.)
- **Copy to Personal** to copy the phone number to your Ready Link Personal List (if available).

# Adding a Phone Number to a Contacts Entry

To add a phone number to an entry:

- Press the navigation key right to display the Contacts list.
- 2. Scroll to the entry you wish to add and press ...
- 3. Select a phone number, press **Options** (right softkey), highlight **Edit**, and press ...
- 4. Select the label field you want to add.
- **5.** Enter the number and press ...
- 6. Press Save (left softkey).

# Editing a Contacts Entry

### To make changes to an entry:

- 1. Press the navigation key right.
- 2. Scroll to the entry you wish to edit and press ...



3. Select a phone number, press **Options** (right softkey), highlight **Edit**, and press .

- or -

Select an email address or Web address and press Edit (right softkey).

- 4. Select the field you want to edit.
- Edit the entry by using your keypad and press ....
- **6.** Press **Save** (left softkey) to save your changes.

# **Erasing a Contacts Entry From the List**

### To erase the selected entry:

- Press the navigation key right.
- 2. Scroll to the entry you wish to delete by using the navigation key and press **Options** (right softkey).
- Highlight **Erase Contact** and press .
- 4. Select Yes.

# **Assigning Speed Dial Numbers**

With this feature you can dial Contacts Directory entries with one key press for locations 2-9. For details on how to make calls using speed dial numbers, see "Using Speed Dialing" on page 39.

### To assign Speed Dial:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Contacts.
- 3. Select Speed Dial #s (ABC 2).
- 4. Select an available speed dial location.
- 5. Select an entry from the list.
- **6.** Select the phone number you want to set as a speed dial.
  - or -
- 1. Press the navigation key right.
- 2. Scroll to your desired entry in the Contacts list and press .
- **3.** Select the phone number you want to set as a speed dial and press **Options** (right softkey).
- 4. Highlight Set Speed Dial and press 🐯.
- 5. Select an available speed dial location.

**Note:** If you attempt to assign an already in-use speed dial location to a new phone number, a dialog will appear asking if you wish to overwrite the existing speed dial assignment. Select **Yes** to assign the location to the new phone number or **No** to cancel. To delete the previous speed dial assignment, select **Reset**.

# **Assigning an Image to a Contacts Entry**

You can assign an image to a Contacts entry. The image is displayed when the entry calls you.

To assign an image for an entry:

- 1. Press the navigation key right.
- 2. Select the entry for which you want to assign the image and press .
- 3. Press Options (right softkey), highlight Edit, and press or if you are selecting email/web address, press Edit (right softkey).
- 4. Scroll down to the box under **Picture ID** and press ...
- **5.** Select your desired option and press **0K** (left softkey) to assign.
- **6.** Press **Save** (left softkey) to save the image type.

# Selecting a Ringer for an Entry

You can assign a ringer type to a Contacts entry so you can identify the caller by the ringer type. (See "Ringer Types" on page 48.)

To select a ringer type for an entry:

- 1. Press the navigation key right.
- 2. Select the entry for which you want to set the incoming ringer and press .
- 3. Press Options (right softkey), highlight Edit, and press or if you are selecting email/web address, press Edit (right softkey).
- 4. Scroll down to the box under **Ringer** and press ...
- 5. Scroll to your desired ringer and press (When you highlight a ringer type, a sample ringer will sound.)
- 6. Press Save (left softkey) to save the ringer type.

**Note:** If you set an animation ringer (indicated with the **b**icon) and an image, your phone plays the ringer (audio) of the animation ringer and displays the image you selected.

### **Secret Contacts Entries**

You can hide an entry's phone number(s) and require your lock code to edit the entry by making it secret. The entry name is still displayed, but the entry's phone numbers are replaced with "<Secret>".

### To make an entry secret:

- 1. Press the navigation key right.
- 2. Scroll to the Contacts entry you want to tag as secret.
- Press Options (right softkey) to display the menu options.
- 4. Highlight Set Secret and press 🐯.
- **5**. Enter the 4-digit lock code.
- Select On.

### To make an entry public:

- 1. Press the navigation key right.
- 2. Scroll to the Contacts entry you want to tag as public.
- Press Options (right softkey) to display the menu options.
- 4. Highlight Set Secret and press 🐵.
- **5.** Enter the 4-digit lock code.
- Select Off.

Tip: If you can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of your wireless phone number or try 0000. If neither of these work, call Qwest Wireless™ Repair at 1-888-879-0611.

Your wireless phone is equipped with several personal information management features that help you manage your busy lifestyle. This section shows you how to use these features to turn your phone into a time management planner that helps you keep up with your contacts, schedules, and commitments. It takes productivity to a whole new level.

# **Using Your Phone's Calendar**

### **Displaying Your Calendar**

To display your calendar:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Calendar (ABC 2).

### Adding an Event to the Calendar

Your Calendar helps organize your time and reminds you of important events (up to 100 events).

#### To add an event:

- From the Calendar display (see above), select the day you want to add an event and press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight Add Event and press 🐯.
- **3.** Select **Schedule** (■1).
- 4. Enter the description using your keypad and press (or press **Mode** [right softkey] to select a description from "From To Do List").

**Note:** The "From To Do List "option will not appear if there are no items stored in the To Do List. See "Adding To Do List Items" on page 134 for details.

- **5.** Select the following items.
  - Description to enter a description of your event (up to 14 characters).
  - From to schedule the start time.
  - To to schedule the end time.
  - Location to edit the location of your event (up to 14 characters).
  - Alarm to select your desired ringer.
  - Alarm Time to edit the alarm time (number of hours or minutes before the event starts). Default alarm time is 10 minutes before.
  - Repeat to set the event's repeating status. Select None, Daily, Weekly, Monthly, or Yearly.
- **6.** Press **Save** (left softkey) to schedule the event.

Tip: The date you have scheduled events for is indicated by "▶".

**Tip:** Press the navigation key up or down to scroll by week through the Calendar and the Side Volume key to scroll by month.

#### **Event Alerts**

There are several ways your phone alerts you of scheduled events:

- By playing the alert tone (depending on the Ringer Type and Ringer Volume setting).
- By blinking the LED.
- By displaying the event's description on the Main LCD or Sub LCD.
- By lighting the LCD backlight (depending on the backlight setting).

#### **Event Alert Menu**

When you have an event alarm scheduled, your phone alerts you and displays the icon and the event summary.

To silence an event alert:

 Press any key to silence an event alert. (The alarm will snooze again after 10 minutes.)

Other options available include:

- Press and hold the side camera key to cancel snoozing.
- Press **Dismiss** (right softkey) to dismiss the event.

**Note:** If you press any key before checking your event, **Events** (right softkey) appears in standby mode. Press **Events** (right softkey) to display the event and press to see the event details. To cancel snoozing, press **Dismiss** (right softkey) while the event list is displayed.

# Adding a Call Alarm to the Calendar

You can set call alarms to notify you when you need to place a call. The call alarm will let you know when and to whom to place a scheduled call. You can set up to 15 call alarms.

#### To add a call alarm to the calendar:

- 1. From the Calendar display (see page 128), select the day you want to add an event and press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight Add Event and press .
- 3. Select Call Alarm (ABC 2).
- Enter the phone number directly or press Options (right softkey) for options.
  - From Ph. Book to select the desired number from your Contacts list.
  - Voicemail to select the number for voicemail access.
- **5**. Select the following items.
  - **Time/Date** to edit the start time and date.
  - Alarm to select the ringer alarm.
  - Repeat to set the Call Alarm's repeat status. Select None, Daily, Weekly, Monthly, or Yearly.
- **6.** Press **Save** (left softkey).

#### **Call Alarm Alerts**

There are several ways your phone alerts you of a scheduled call alarm:

- By playing the alert tone (depending on the Ringer Type and Ringer Volume setting).
- By blinking the LED.
- By displaying the call alarm notification on the Main LCD or Sub LCD.
- By lighting the LCD backlight (depending on the backlight setting).

#### Call Alarm Menu

When you have scheduled a call alarm, your phone alerts you and displays the icon and the name or phone number you wish to call.

To respond to a call alarm:

Press TALK or SPEAKER to dial the phone number.

Other options available include:

- Press ••• to make a Ready Link call (if applicable).
- Press any key (except or while the phone is closed) to repeat the alarm in 10 minutes.
- Press and hold the side camera key to cancel snoozing.
- Press Dismiss (right softkey) to dismiss the call alarm.

# **Editing an Event or Call Alarm**

To edit an event or call alarm:

- 1. From the Calendar display (see page 128), select the date for which you set events and press ...
- Select one of the events or call alarms. (The event or call alarm details appear.)
- 3. Select the information you want to edit.
- 4. Enter or select a new setting and press ...
- **5.** Press **Save** (left softkey).

### Viewing a Future or Past Day's Scheduled Events

To view a future or past day's scheduled events:

- From the Calendar display (see page 128), press Options (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight Go To Date and press 🐯.
- 3. Enter the date by using numeric keys and the navigation key and press **OK** (left softkey).
- 4. Press once again to view the day's event list.

# **Erasing an Event or Call Alarm**

To erase a scheduled event or call alarm:

- 1. From the Calendar display (see page 128), select the date for which you set events and press ...
- Select one of the events or call alarms and press Options (right softkey).
- 3. Highlight **Erase Event** and press **\***.
- 4. Select Yes.

### **Adding To Do List Items**

Your phone can store and manage up to 20 To Do List items.

To add an item to your To Do List:

- From the Calendar display (see page 128), press Options (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight **To Do List** and press ...
- **3.** Press **Options** (right softkey).
- 4. Highlight Add Item and press .
- 5. Enter the description (up to 14 characters) and press .
- 6. Select **Priority** and edit the To Do's priority. You can select from **Normal**, **¶ Urgent**, or **₡ Done**.
- 7. Press **Save** (left softkey).

# Adding a To Do List Item to the Calendar

To add your To Do List item to the calendar:

- 1. From the To Do List display (see page 134), select the item you want to add to the schedule and press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight Add To Schedule and press .



- Add To Schedule to extract the item from the To Do List and make it a scheduled event.
- 3. Enter the description using your keypad and press ... (See "Adding an Event to the Calendar" on page 128 for entering.)
- 4. Press Save (left softkey).

Note: If you have saved a To Do List item to the calendar, deleting it from the To Do List will not delete it from the calendar. To remove an item saved to the calendar, see "Erasing an Event or Call Alarm" on page 134.

# **Viewing Memory in Your Calendar**

To view available memory space and options:

- From the Calendar display (see page 128), press Options (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight View Memory and press 🐯.
- 3. Select Schedule ( ), Call Alarm ( ), or To Do List ( ). (The available memory space and options display.)

#### For further options:

- 4. Press **Options** (right softkey).
- 5. Highlight an option and press ...
  - **Erase Old** deletes old events or call alarms.
  - Erase Selection deletes the To Do List items you selected.
  - Erase Done deletes the To Do List items that have been completed.
  - Erase All deletes all events, call alarms, or To Do List items.
- 6. Select Yes or No.

# Purging All Events, Call Alarms, or To Do List Items

To delete all scheduled events, call alarms, or To Do List items:

- 1. From the Calendar display (see page 128), press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight Erase Memory and press 🐯.
- **3.** Select one item from the options.
  - Erase Old (□1) deletes old events, call alarms, and To Do List items that are done.
  - Erase All (🗠 2) deletes all events, call alarms, and To Do List items.
- 4. Select Yes.

# **Displaying Your User Address**

To display the phone's current user address:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Phone Info (+0).
- 4. Select Phone#/User ID ( ).
  - If you sign out, <PCS Vision Disabled> appears on the display.

### **Finding Icon Definitions**

To view an explanation of icons that appear on the display:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Phone Info (+0).
- 4. Select Help (ABC 2).
- **5.** Select the item for which you want to see the explanation and press (The icon's explanation appears.)

# **Displaying the Version Information**

To display the version number of the software, hardware, PRL (Preferred Roaming List), PRI (Product Release Instructions), etc., installed on your phone:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Phone Info (+0).
- 4. Select Version (DEF 3).

# **Displaying Advanced Information**

To display advanced information such as technology and frequency:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Phone Info (+0).
- 4. Select Advanced (GHI 4).

# **Using Your Phone's Tools**

In addition to helping you be more efficient and organized, your wireless phone offers useful and entertaining tools.

# **Using the Alarm Clock**

Your phone comes with a built-in alarm clock with alarm capabilities. You can set up to 5 alarms. This feature is also available while your phone is turned off.

#### To use the alarm clock:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Alarm Clock (DEF 3).
  - Press Settings (right softkey) to set the Ringer Length or Snooze Interval.
- 4. Select an unassigned number and the following items.
  - Alarm to set the alarm On or Off.
  - Time to enter the alarm time. Enter the desired alarm time and press .
  - Repeat to select the alarm frequency. Select Once,
     Daily, Weekday, or your desired day of the week.
  - Description to enter a description of the alarm.
- **5.** Press **Save** (left softkey) to save the alarm settings.

**Note:** In a no-service area or an analog service area, it's necessary to set the actual time and date to use the Alarm Clock function after removing and installing your battery.

#### To stop the alarm:

- Press any key to stop the alarm. (The alarm will "snooze" and then sound again after the selected snooze interval.)
  - Press and hold the side camera key to cancel snoozing.
  - Press **Dismiss** (right softkey) to dismiss the alarm.

# **Updating Your Phone**

Your SCP-8300 by Sanyo allows you to update its software version over the air. You will be notified if a new software version is available for your phone. You can also check if an update is available through the **Tools/Extras** menu.

#### To update your phone:

- 1. Press **Yes** (left softkey) when an update notification appears.
- 2. Read the information screen and press **Next** (left softkey) to continue.
- 3. Select **Update Phone** to update your phone's software.

#### To update your phone through the Tools/Extras menu:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Update Phone (TWB).
- **4.** If a new software version is available, press **Yes** (left softkey) to continue.
- Read the information screen and press Next (left softkey) to continue.
- Select Update Phone to update your phone's software version.

# **Using the Stop Watch**

#### To start the stop watch:



  - Press Start (left softkey) to start the stop watch operation.
  - Press Stop (left softkey) to stop the stop watch operation.
  - Press Resume (left softkey) to start the stop watch operation again.

#### To record a lap time while the stop watch is running:

- Press Lap (right softkey) to record time of first lap.
- Press Lap (right softkey) again to record next lap.
   (You may continue this until lap 5.)

#### To display the stop watch options:

- During stop watch operation, press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. To select an option, highlight it and press 🐯.



- softkey) to display the lap list detail or press **Options** (right softkey) for the further options.
- **Edit Title** to edit the current lap list's title.
- Erase This to erase an individual Lap List.
- **Erase All** to erase all existing Lap Lists.
- Save to Lap List to save the recorded lap times.
- Reset to reset the time to zero and clear any recorded lap times.

# **Using the Calculator**

Your phone comes with a built-in calculator.

#### To use the calculator:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Calculator (GH 4).
- **4.** Enter numbers using your keypad. (Press the left softkey to insert a decimal point.)
- Press the appropriate navigation key for an arithmetic option (Up for addition, Down for subtraction, Left for multiplication, Right for division).
- **6.** Enter numbers and press for the result.
  - To clear the numbers, press **CLR** (right softkey).

# **Using the World Clock**

This feature is available only in digital service areas.

To set the world clock display:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select World Clock (MMO 6).
- 4. The world clock display appears.
  - Press the navigation key right or left to change countries.

**Tip:** Press **Summer** (left softkey) or **Standard** (right softkey) to select between daylight savings and standard time (if applicable). The icon is shown in summer mode.

# **Using Your Phone's Voice Services**

Your phone's Voice Services let you place calls using your voice, store voice reminders, and record memos right on your phone. This section includes easy-to-follow instructions on using voice-activated dialing and managing voice memos.

# **Using Voice-Activated Dialing**

Your SCP-8300 lets you use a voice dial tag to automatically dial a phone number in your Contacts List. (A voice dial tag is a command you record and use to place calls without using the keypad.) Your phone can store up to 30 voice dial tags.

# **Making a Call Using Voice-Activated Dialing**

To use a voice dial tag to call a phone number:

- 1. Press TALK or SPEAKER.
- 2. Follow the voice prompts and recite the entry's voice dial tag into your phone's microphone.

**Tip:** Record voice dial tags in a quiet environment and without the aid of an accessory (for example, a headset or hands-free car kit).

Tip: You can also make a call using voice activated dialing with the flip closed. Press and hold the Side Call key (), and follow the voice prompts.

# **Programming Voice Dial Tags**

To program a voice dial tag:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services ( ).
- 4. Select Voice Dial (DEF 3).
- **5.** Select **Program**(**1**).
- **6.** After you are prompted to say the name you wish to program, wait for the beep and then say the name into your phone's microphone.

- 7. Respond to the prompt by repeating the name after the beep.
- 8. Enter or highlight the Voice Dial entry (name) in the Contacts List and press .
- 9. Select the number you want to assign to the voice dial tag (Home, Work, Mobile, etc.) and press .

# **Reviewing Voice Dial Tags**

To review voice dial tags:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services ( ).
- 4. Select Voice Dial (DEF 3).
- 5. Select Review (ABC 2) or Rev:Speaker (DEF 3).
- **6.** Highlight the voice dial entry you want to review and press to play it.

- or -

Highlight the desired voice dial entry and press **Options** (right softkey). (To select an option, highlight it and press **(a)**.)

- Play to play the selected voice dial tag.
- **Speaker On** to play the tag in speakerphone mode. (If your phone is in speakerphone mode, the option will appear as **Speaker Off**.)
- Erase to erase the voice dial tag. Select Yes to erase; select No to cancel.

# **Erasing All Voice Dial Tags**

To erase all voice dial tags:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services ( □ 1 ).
- 4. Select Voice Dial (DEF 3).
- 5. Select Erase All (GHI 4).
- Select Yes to erase all recorded voice dial tags; select No to cancel.

# **Managing Voice Memos**

You can use your phone's Voice Services to record brief memos to remind you of important events, phone numbers, or grocery list items.

### **Recording Voice Memos**

To record a voice memo:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services ( ).
- 4. Select Voice Memo ( ).
- **5.** Select **Record** (■ 1).
- 6. Start recording after the beep.

Tip: You can also press and hold SPEAKER to record a voice memo in standby mode.

To end the recording of your memo:

Press (END), BACK, or END/O.

To record the other party's voice during a phone call:

- 1. During a call, press **Options** (right softkey).
- Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services (≥1).
- 4. Select Voice Memo (■1).
- **5.** Select **Record** (■1).
- **6.** Start recording after the beep.

To end the recording and the conversation:

Press END/O.

Note: Your phone can store a total of 72 seconds of memos.

### **Reviewing Voice Memos**

To play the voice memos you have recorded:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services ( ).
- 4. Select Voice Memo ( ).
- 5. Select Play or Play: Speaker.
- **6.** Select the memo you want to play.
  - or -

Select All to play all memos continuously.

- Press Slow (left softkey) or Fast (right softkey) to change the playing speed.
- To play the newer/older memo, press the navigation key right or left.

# **Erasing Voice Memos**

To erase all voice memos:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services ( ).
- 4. Select Voice Memo (■1).
- 5. Select **Erase All** ( ).
- 6. Select Yes.

**Tip:** To erase individual memos, select **Play** or **Play:Speaker** during step 5 above, and then select the memo you want to erase, press **Options** (right softkey), and select **Erase**.

# **Setting Up Screen Call**

This feature enables you to screen incoming calls by using a recorded announcement, either one that is pre-recorded or one that you record.

# **Activating Screen Call**

To start Screen Call when you have incoming calls:

- When the phone rings or vibrates, press Options (right softkey) to display the options.
- 2. Highlight Screen Call and press .

#### To set Auto Screen Call:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services ( ).
- 4. Select Screen Call (ABC 2).
- Select Auto.
- 6. Select On.
- 7. Set the answering time by using numeric keys or by pressing the navigation key up or down.
- 8. Press (The icon is displayed on the standby display.)

Tip: If a new caller's message is waiting, the ﷺ icon appears on the display. The memos recorded while activating "Screen Call" are shown with the 

for 
icon in the Voice Memo list (
icon e played, 
icon

Tip: While the caller's message is being recorded, press TALK to answer the call, or press (10) to stop recording and disconnect the call.

# Selecting an Announcement for Screen Call

To select a Screen Call announcement:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services ( □ 1 ).
- 4. Select Screen Call (ABC 2).
- 5. Select Announcement.
- **6.** Depending on your preference, select **Pre-Recorded** ( or **Custom** ( **Custom** ( **Custom** ).

# Recording Your Name for a Pre-Recorded Announcement

You can use a pre-recorded announcement with or without your name. If you record your name, your phone uses your name recording to announce that you are not available to answer the call.

#### To record your name:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services (■1).
- 4. Select Screen Call (ABC 2).
- 5. Select Announcement.
- **6**. Highlight **Pre-Recorded** and press **Edit** (right softkey).

  - If your name has already been recorded, select Yes or No to overwrite the existing recording.
- 8. Press to start the first recording.
- **9.** Press to stop recording.
- **10.** After the first recording, press again to start the second recording.
- 11. Press to stop recording.

Tip: Recording terminates automatically in 12 seconds.

  - When an announcement has already been recorded, select Yes or No to overwrite the existing recording.
- 8. Press to start the first recording.
- 9. Press to stop recording.
- **10.** After the first recording, press again to start the second recording.
- 11. Press to stop recording.

- 2. Select Tools/Extras.
- 3. Select Voice Services ( □ 1 ).
- 4. Select Screen Call (ABC 2).
- Select Announcement.

- 7. Highlight Play or Play:Speaker and press ...

To erase an announcement:

Your phone's built-in camera gives you the ability to take full-color digital pictures, view your pictures using the phone's display, and instantly send them to family and friends. It's fun and as easy to use as a traditional point-and-click camera: just take a picture, view it on your phone's display, and send it from your phone to up to ten people.

This section explains the features and options of your wireless phone's built-in camera.

# **Taking Pictures**

Taking pictures with your phone's built-in camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the lens, and pressing a button. You can activate the phone's camera mode whether the phone is open or closed.

To take a picture with the phone open:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select **Picture & Video** to access the Picture & Video menu
- Select Camera ( ) to activate camera mode.
   (Additional camera options are available through the camera mode Options menu. See "Camera Mode Options" on page 161 for more information.)

**Shortcut:** To activate camera mode, you can also press twice or just press the side camera key (see illustration on page 12).

- 4. Using the phone's main LCD as a viewfinder, aim the camera lens at your subject.
- **5.** Press **Capture** (left softkey), , , or the side camera key until the shutter sounds. (The picture will automatically be saved in the In Camera folder.)
  - To return to camera mode to take another picture, press .
- **6.** Press **Next** (right softkey) for more options:
  - **Send Picture** to send the picture to up to 10 contacts at one time. (See page 186 for details.)
  - Go to Camera to return to camera mode to take another picture.

- Upload to Albums to upload the picture you just took to the Sprint PCS Picture Mail Web site ( http://pictures.qwest.com). Depending on your settings, you may be prompted to accept a Sprint PCS Vision connection.
- Prints by Mail to order 4" x 6" prints of the pictures by mail and deliver them to any address you set up at Sprint PCS Picture Mail Web site.
- Set as to assign the picture. Select Picture ID or Screen Saver and press ...
- Display/Edit to edit or display your picture's details. (See "In Camera Folder Options" on page 171 for details.)
- Delete to delete the picture you just took.
- Pics In Camera to go to the In Camera folder to review your saved pictures.

#### To take a picture with the phone closed:

- Press and hold the side camera key to activate camera mode.
- Point the camera lens at your subject. (You can check the picture framing through the external display screen.)

**Note:** When taking a picture with the phone closed, the subject image appears in reverse on the external display. The captured image will not be saved in reverse.

**3.** Press the side camera key to take the picture. (The picture will automatically be saved in the In Camera folder.)

### Creating Your Sprint PCS Picture Mail™ Password

The first time you use any of the picture management options involving the Sprint PCS Picture Mail Web site, you will need to establish a Sprint PCS Picture Mail password through your wireless phone. This password will also allow you to sign in to the Sprint PCS Picture Mail Web site at <a href="http://pictures.qwest.com">http://pictures.qwest.com</a> to access and manage your uploaded pictures and albums.

To create your Sprint PCS Picture Mail password:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Picture & Video to access the Picture & Video menu.
- 3. Select Online Albums (JKL 5).
- 4. Select **View Albums** ( ). (You will be prompted to create a Sprint PCS Picture Mail password.)
- 5. Enter a four- to eight-digit password and press (You will be prompted to confirm your password.)
- **6.** Please wait while the system creates your account.

Tip: Write down your Sprint PCS Picture Mail password in a secure place.

Once you have received confirmation that your account has been successfully registered, you may upload and share pictures and access the Sprint PCS Picture Mail Web site.

### **Camera Mode Options**

When the phone is open and in camera mode, press **Options** (right softkey) to display additional camera options:

- Picture Mode to select picture mode from Normal, Night/Dark, Beach/Snow, Scenery, or Soft Focus.
- Flash to activate the flash. (See "Setting the Flash" on page 162 for details.)
- Zoom to zoom in on a subject. You can adjust the zoom from 1x to 20x. (See "Using the Zoom" on page 166 for details.)
- **Self-timer** to activate the camera's timer. (See "Setting the Self-timer" on page 163 for details.)
- Fun Tools to select an option from the following:
  - **Multiple Shots** to shoot multiple shots on multiple targets (see page 164).
  - **Stitch Shot** to take a stitch shot by stitching separate images together (see page 165).
  - Fun Frames to select your favorite fun picture frame to decorate your picture.
  - Color Tone to select a wide variety of color tones for the picture.

**Note:** Zoom and Stitch Shot are not available when the resolution setting is High (see "Selecting Camera Settings" on page 167 for details).

- Image Controls to select an option from the following:
  - Brightness to select Auto or Manual brightness control.
  - White Balance to adjust white balance based on changing conditions.

- Camera Settings to select your settings. (See "Selecting Camera Settings" on page 167 for details.)
- Pics In Camera to go to your phone's In Camera folder. (See "In Camera Folder" on page 170 for details.)
- **Go to Camcorder** to switch to video mode. (See "Recording Videos" on page 176 for details.)
- Key Guidance to indicate the key functions in camera mode.

#### Setting the Flash

To activate the flash:

- 1. From camera mode, press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight **Flash** and press 🐯.
- 3. Select one of the following options and press 🐯:
  - Off to deactivate the flash.
  - **On This Shot** to activate the flash for one shot.
  - **On Always** to activate the flash for all pictures.
  - Auto to activate the flash automatically.

**Note:** While the phone is open and in camera mode, press to switch between flash modes.

#### Setting the Self-timer

To activate the Self-timer:

- 1. From camera mode, press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight **Self-timer** and press 🐯.
- 3. Highlight the length of delay you want the timer to use (10 seconds or 5 seconds) and press ...
  - To deactivate the Self-timer, highlight **Off** and press
- 4. Press **Start** (left softkey) when you are ready to start the timer. ( appears on the lower left portion of the main LCD during the Self-timer countdown.)
- 5. Get ready for the picture. (When the timer is down to three seconds, the Self-timer icon will turn red and the phone will begin to beep.)

To cancel the Self-timer after it has started:

▶ Press **Cancel** (right softkey).

Note: While the Self-timer is active, all keys are disabled except , and Cancel (right softkey).

### **Taking Multiple Shots**

This feature allows you to take up to nine continuous shots of one moment. When you take multiple shots, the icon will appear in the viewfinder.

#### To take multiple shots:

- 1. From camera mode, press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight Fun Tools and press .
- 3. Highlight Multiple Shots and press ...

**Note:** If your phone's memory is full, the **Multiple Shots** option will not appear.

- **4.** Select one of the following options and press **...**:
  - **Off** to deactivate the multiple shots option.
  - **3 Shots** to take a series of three pictures.
  - 6 Shots to take a series of six pictures. (Only appears when the resolution setting is Low or Medium.)
  - 9 Shots to take a series of nine pictures. (Only appears when the resolution setting is Low.)
- 5. Select the duration of the interval between shots (**Normal** or **Fast**) and press .
- **6.** Press **Capture** (left softkey), , , , or the side camera key to take the pictures. (The Multiple Shots folder will display up to nine thumbnail pictures per screen.)

**Note:** After taking multiple shots, the pictures are automatically saved in the In Camera folder. (See "In Camera Folder" on page 170 for details.)

### **Taking Stitch Shots**

Stitch shot allows you to stitch separate images together. With this feature, your phone's viewfinder is divided in two and you can shoot each part separately. When you shoot the first part, the camera displays a section of the previous part, so you can line up the next picture with the first one.

#### To take a stitch shot:

- 1. From camera mode, press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight **Fun Tools** and press **(BP)**.
- 3. Highlight Stitch Shot and press 🐯.
- 4. Select **Vertical** or **Horizontal** and press **\***.
  - Use your navigation key to switch the stitch display.
- **5.** To take the first picture, press .
- **6.** To take the second picture, press .

**Note:** This option is not available when the resolution setting is High (see page 167).

### Using the Zoom

This feature allows you to zoom in on an object when you take a picture. Depending on your resolution settings, you can adjust the zoom from 1x to 20x.

#### To use the zoom:

- From camera mode, press the navigation key right or left, or the side volume key up or down to adjust the zoom. (The gauge bar appears.)
- 2. Press **Capture** (left softkey), , , or the side camera key to take the picture. (The picture will automatically be saved in the In Camera folder.)

**Note:** The Zoom gauge will not appear when the resolution setting is High.

### Using the Mini-Flashlight

This function allows you to use the phone's camera flash as a miniature flashlight. To use this function, your phone must be in standby mode with the Side Key Guard unlocked. (See page 77 for the Side Key Guard.)

### To use the mini flashlight:

▶ With the flip closed and in standby mode, press and hold the Side Volume key (◄ □ ). (The light remains on for 8 seconds.)

**Note:** This function doesn't apply when a Missed Call or Notification is displayed.

### **Setting Auto Delete**

With this feature, pictures and videos that have been uploaded to your online Sprint PCS Picture Mail account will be erased automatically from your phone. (Default setting is Off.)

#### To set Auto Delete:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Picture&Video.
- 3. Select Settings & Info (PORS 7).
- 4. Select Auto Delete ( ).
- Select On or Off.

### **Selecting Camera Settings**


To select your camera settings:

- Highlight **Camera Settings** and press . 2.
- 3. Select one of the following options and press (EX): • **Resolution** to select a picture's file size

  - (High-640x480, Medium-320x240, or Low-160x120). • Quality to select the picture quality setting (Fine, Normal, or Economy).
  - Shutter Sound to select a shutter sound (Default.) Sav "Cheez", or Off).
  - Full Screen to expand the camera display to full screen view without icons (except the flash icon).

# **Storing Pictures**

Your phone's picture storage area is called **My Pictures**. There are two types of folders in My Pictures that can be used separately according to your needs:

- In Camera (see below)
- Saved to Phone (see page 174)

### In Camera Folder

Once a picture is taken, it is automatically saved to the **In Camera** folder. From the In Camera folder, you can view all of the pictures you have taken, store selected images in your phone, send pictures to the Sprint PCS Picture Mail Web site (<a href="http://pictures.qwest.com">http://pictures.qwest.com</a>), delete images, and access additional picture options.

To review your stored pictures in the In Camera folder:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Picture & Video to access the Picture & Video menu.
- 3. Select My Pictures (DEF 3).
- 4. Select In Camera ( ). (Thumbnail pictures will display, up to nine pictures at a time.)
- Use your navigation key to view and scroll through the pictures.

### In Camera Folder Options

When you are viewing the In Camera folder, press **Options** (right softkey) to display the following options:

- **Expand** to switch to the Expand view mode.
- Thumbnail to switch to the Thumbnail view mode.
- Upload to Albums to upload pictures from the In Camera folder to the Sprint PCS Picture Mail Web site (<a href="http://pictures.qwest.com">http://pictures.qwest.com</a>). Depending on your settings, you may be prompted to accept a Sprint PCS Vision connection. Choose from the following options:
  - This Picture to upload the currently highlighted picture.
  - Selected Pictures to upload the selected pictures.
     Press to select a picture (the check box on the lower right corner will be marked).
  - All Pictures to upload all pictures in the In Camera folder.

**Note:** If this is the first time you have accessed the Sprint PCS Picture Mail account, you will be prompted to create your Sprint PCS Picture Mail password. See "Creating Your Sprint PCS Picture Mail Password" on page 160.

- Prints by Mail to order 4" x 6" prints of the pictures by mail and deliver them to any address you set up at the Sprint PCS Picture Mail Web site.
- Set as to assign the picture.
  - Picture ID to display the currently highlighted picture for incoming calls from a specific Phone Book entry. Select the desired entry and press
  - Screen Saver to display the currently highlighted picture as a screen saver. Select Main LCD or Sub LCD and press

**Note:** Pictures assigned as Picture ID or Screen Savers will automatically be copied to the Saved to Phone folder.

- Display/Edit to display the following options:
  - Special Effects to apply special effects on your pictures. You can select from Color Tone,
     Fun Stamps, or Rotate.
  - **Text Caption** to edit the selected picture's caption.
  - **Picture Info** to display information such as the picture's caption, time/date, and size.
  - Full Screen to display the selected picture in full screen mode without any icons or Info Bar.
  - Info Bar to display the selected picture's information bar. (Expanded view only.)
  - Slideshow to view your pictures in slideshow mode. (Only available when two or more pictures are saved to the folder.)
  - **Sort by** to sort pictures by Name, Size, Date-Taken or Date-Uploaded. (Thumbnail view only.)
- Delete to delete pictures in the In Camera folder. Select This Picture, Selected Pictures, or All Pictures.

**Note:** Deleting pictures will free up memory space in your phone to enable you to take more pictures. Once deleted, pictures cannot be uploaded to your online Sprint PCS Picture Mail account or saved to the Saved to Phone folder.



Note: Save to Phone and Upload to Albums copy pictures from your phone's In Camera folder to your Saved to Phone folder or your online Sprint PCS Picture Mail account. Pictures that have been stored in your Saved to Phone folder or uploaded to your online account will remain available in the In Camera folder until you erase them.

- Go to Saved to Ph. to display the Saved to Phone folder.
- Go to Camera to activate Camera mode.

# **Recording Videos**

In addition to taking pictures, you can also record, view, and send videos to your friends and family with your phone's built-in video camera.

#### To record a video:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Picture & Video to access the Picture & Video menu.
- Select Camcorder ( ) to activate video mode.
   (Additional video options are available through the video mode Options menu. See "Video Mode Options" on page 178 for more information.)
- 4. Using the phone's main LCD as a viewfinder, aim the camera lens at your subject.
- 5. Press **Record** (left softkey), , , or the side camera key to begin recording. (Maximum recording time is 30 seconds.)
- **6.** Press , **Stop** (right softkey), or the side camera key to stop recording. (The video will automatically be saved in the In Camcorder folder.)
  - To return to video mode to record another video, press or the side camera key.
- 7. Press **Next** (right softkey) for more options:
  - **Send Video** to send the video. (See page 190 for details.)
  - Go to Camcorder to return to video mode to take another video.

- **Upload to Albums** to upload the video you just took to the Sprint PCS Picture Mail Web site.
- Set as to assign the video. Select Ringer or Animation and press
- Playback to play back the video you just took.
- **Delete** to delete the video you just took.
- Videos In Camcord. to access the In Camcorder folder to review your saved videos.

### To take a video with the flip closed:

- Press and hold the side camera key to activate camera mode.
- 2. Press and hold the side camera key to activate video mode.
- 3. Point the camera lens at your subject. (You can check the video framing through the Sub LCD.)

**Note:** When taking a video with the phone closed, the subject image appears in reverse on the external display. The captured image will not be saved in reverse.

- 4. Press the side camera key to start recording.
- Press the side camera key to stop recording. (Your video will be saved automatically in the In Camcorder folder.)

### **Video Mode Options**

Several options are available from video mode.

Press **Options** (right softkey) to display additional options:

- Video Mode to select video mode from Normal, Night/Dark, Beach/Snow, Scenery, or Soft Focus.
- Video Light to select a Video Light setting. Select On to light the video light.
- Zoom to zoom in on an object. You can adjust the zoom from 1x to 18x in Medium-resolution, or 1x to 12x in Good-resolution.
- **Self-timer** to activate the timer function. (See "Setting the Self-timer" on page 163 for details.)
- **Image Controls** to select an option from the following:
  - Brightness to select Auto or Manual brightness control.
  - White Balance to adjust white balance based on changing conditions.
- Camcord.Settings to select your settings. (See "Selecting Camcorder Settings" on page 179 for details.)
- Videos In Camcord. to go to your phone's In Camcorder folder (if applicable).
- **Go to Camera** to switch to camera mode (if applicable).
- Key Guidance to indicate the key functions in video mode.


To select your camcorder settings:

# **Storing Videos**

Your phone's video storage area is called **My Videos**. There are two types of folders in My Videos that can be used separately according to your needs:

- In Camcorder (see below)
- Saved to Phone (see page 184)

### In Camcorder Folder

Once a video is recorded, it is automatically saved to the **In Camcorder** folder. From the In Camcorder folder, you can view all of the videos you have taken, store selected videos in your phone, send videos to the Sprint PCS Picture Mail Web site, delete videos, and access additional video options.

To review your stored videos in the In Camcorder folder:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Picture & Video to access the Picture & Video menu.
- 3. Select My Videos (GH 4).
- Select In Camcorder ( ). (Thumbnail stills will display, up to nine at a time.)
- Use your navigation key to scroll through and select a video.

### In Camcorder Folder Options



Ready Link allows you to enjoy quick, two-way, "walkie-talkie-style" communication with your friends, family, and co-workers. You can make one-to-one or one-to-many calls (up to five others on the same call) to any other Ready Link user, anywhere on the network available to you. You can make and receive Ready Link calls when your phone displays the Ready Link icon.

#### **Setting Ready Link Mode**

To enable or disable Ready Link mode:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Ready Link (GHI 4).
- 4. Select Enable/Disable ( ).
- **5**. Select **Enable**. (The default is Disable.)
  - Enable: Lets you make or receive Ready Link calls any time your phone is not in use.
  - Disable: Disables your phone's Ready Link service; you will not be able to make or receive Ready Link calls or access your Ready Link contacts.

Tip: If you haven't signed up for the Ready Link service and Ready Link mode is set to Disable, or the Ready Link service is locked, you can use the Ready Link/Memo Button as a Voice Memo button in standby mode.

#### **Preparing Your Phone for Ready Link Service**

Every time you turn on your phone, your phone will identify itself and make itself available to the Ready Link network.

When you turn on your phone in an area where Ready Link service is available, your phone will display "Preparing Ready Link service... Please wait." (When the Ready Link icon appears on the display, your phone is ready to make and receive Ready Link calls.)

#### **Ready Link Call Alerts**

There are several ways your phone alerts you during Ready Link calls.

When you make or receive a Ready Link call:


- The phone sounds (depending on the Ringer Type and Ringer Volume setting).
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays a Ready Link call message.
- The other party's Ready Link number and name (if available) are displayed.
- The screen displays who has the floor.

The status of a Ready Link call is displayed as follows:



#### **Displaying the Ready Link List**

From standby mode, press R-Link (left softkey) or the Ready Link/Memo button on the side of your phone (\*\*\*) to access the Ready Link List.

**Tip:** The first time you access the list, the Ready Link Help message will appear. Press **Yes** (left softkey) and **Next** (left softkey) to read a brief introduction of Ready Link.

#### **Selecting a Contacts List**

When your phone displays a Ready Link List, the left softkey is labeled Go to. To switch to another contact list, press **Go to** (left softkey), highlight your desired list, and press **@**.

- Personal List/Personal Grps. contain your personal Ready Link contact names and numbers, separately or in groups. You can create and edit your own Personal List. Your phone can store a total of 200 entries (you may include up to five contacts per group).
- Outgoing shows the last 10 different Ready Link calls you placed.

- Incoming shows the last 10 different Ready Link calls you accepted.
- **Missed** shows the last 10 Ready Link calls you missed.

Note: The icon next to the group name indicates a group.

## Making a Ready Link Call (One-to-One Call)

You can place a one-to-one Ready Link call by entering a Ready Link number or by selecting a contact from the Ready Link List.

To place a Ready Link call by selecting a contact:

- 1. Press **R-Link** (left softkey) or press ••••.
- Press Go to (left softkey), highlight the list from which you want to place a call (Personal List, Outgoing, Incoming, or Missed), and press

Tip: You can also select Enter R-Link# from the Go to option to enter a Ready Link number directly. (See page 209 for details.)

3. Scroll to the contact you want to call, and press and hold to place the call and get the floor. (You will see "R-Link calling..." and "Connecting..." followed by "You have floor." You can now begin speaking.)

Scroll to the contact you want to call and press and release to place the call. (The call will connect as described above, but "Floor is open." will appear on the screen and either you or your contact may press and hold to take the floor and speak.)

**Note:** During a Ready Link call, the "floor" is the right to speak. When you see "Floor is open.," the first person to press the Ready Link/Memo button can speak (while holding the button). Only the person who has the floor can speak. The phone beeps if you press the Ready Link button when another contact has the floor.

- 4. Continue holding ••• as you speak. (When you are finished speaking, release ••• to allow the other contact to speak. When the other party takes the floor, you will see the speaker's name and phone number and the text "has floor.")
- **5.** When you are finished, press END/O.

**Note:** When neither party has the floor during a Ready Link call, "Floor is open." appears on the display. If no one takes the floor for 20 seconds, the Ready Link call ends automatically.

Tip: If you press TALK or SPEAKER during step 3, you can make a standard voice call.

#### Making a Ready Link Call (Group Call)

You can make a Ready Link call to all members in a Group entry, which you have in your Ready Link List. You can communicate with up to five members at a time.

To place a Ready Link Group call:

- Press R-Link (left softkey) or press ...........
- 2. Press **Go to** (left softkey), highlight **Personal Grps.**, and press ...
- 3. Scroll to the group you want to call, and press and hold ••• to place the call and take the floor. (You will see "R-Link calling..." and "Connecting..." followed by "You have floor." Continue with the Ready Link call as described previously.)
  - To make a Ready Link call to a group member, select your desired group, highlight your desired group member, and press and hold
- 4. When the call is finished, press END/O.

Tip: The phone beeps if you press the Ready Link button when another contact has the floor.

Tip: To redial your last Ready Link call, highlight Redial and press from the Ready Link List.

## Making a Ready Link Call by Entering a Number

To place a Ready Link call by entering a number:

- From standby mode, enter the Ready Link number you want to dial.
- 2. Press •••• to place the Ready Link call. Continue holding •••• to take the floor and speak.
- 3. Continue with the Ready Link call, pressing and holding •••• to speak and releasing it to allow others to reply.
- **4.** When the call is finished, press (END/O).
  - or -
- 1. Press **R-Link** (left softkey) or press ......
- 2. Press **Go to** (left softkey), highlight **Enter R-Link#** and press .
- 3. Enter the Ready Link number you want to dial.
- 4. Follow steps 2-4 above.

**Note:** Ready Link numbers must contain ten digits (area code + phone number). Your Ready Link number is the same as your wireless phone number.

#### Missed Call Notification for Ready Link Calls

When an incoming Ready Link call is not answered, the Missed Call Notification and the Zi icon are displayed on your screen.

To call the last Missed Ready Link call:

Simply press while the Missed Call Notification is displayed. (Continue with the Ready Link call as described previously.)

To erase the Missed Call log:

Press Dismiss (right softkey).

**Note:** When you display Missed Calls entries, you will see the Zicon next to the name. Once you confirm the entry by pressing , the icon turns to the icon. The icon will remain until you make or receive a Ready Link call to or from the entry.

#### Receiving a Ready Link Call

To receive a Ready Link call:

- 1. Make sure your phone's Ready Link mode is enabled (see "Setting Ready Link Mode" on page 202).
- When you receive a Ready Link call from a contact, "R-Link Call," the contact's name, and the Ready Link number appear on the display. (You do not need to take any action to answer the call.)
  - When you receive a group call, "Group Call," the group member's name, and the Ready Link number appear.
- 3. If the person placing the call has kept the floor (held the Ready Link/Memo button), you will see the contact name and Ready Link number along with "has floor," and you will hear the caller speaking.
- 4. When the caller finishes speaking and releases , you will see "Floor is open." on the display screen. Press and hold to take the floor and reply to the caller. (You will see "You have floor." and hear a tone confirming that you may speak.)
- **5.** When the conversation is finished, press **END/O**.

**Tip:** You can also receive a Ready Link call with the flip closed. Press and hold the Ready Link button to take the floor when the floor is open.

Note: You can change the volume and the speaker setting during a Ready Link call. Volume: Adjust the voice volume by using the Side Volume key or by pressing the navigation key up or down except when you are pressing and holding the Ready Link button. Speaker: Switch the speaker on or off by pressing the Speaker button ( ).

#### **Ready Link Options**

When you use Ready Link, several user options are available by pressing **Options** (right softkey). To select an option, highlight it and press ...

- Copy to Personal to copy a contact to the Personal List.
- Edit to edit a Ready Link number and/or name.
- **Send Message** to send a text message, picture, or video.
- Copy to Ph. Book to copy a contact to the Contacts List.
- Erase to erase a contact. Erase Group appears when you highlight a group.
- Add Contact to add a new contact. Add Group appears when you highlight a group list. (See page 215 for details.)
- Erase R-Link List to erase all entries saved in the Ready Link List.
- **Help** to see the Ready Link instruction page.

# Adding and Editing Ready Link Contacts

#### Copying an Entry to Your Personal List or Personal Group List

You can copy an entry to your Personal Lists from several different sources. If the selected entry is already stored in the Personal Lists, the "copy" option does not appear.

To copy an entry from the Ready Link List:

- 1. Press **R-Link** (left softkey) or press ......
- Press Goto (left softkey), highlight the list from which you want to copy an entry (Personal Grps., Outgoing, Incoming, or Missed), and press .
- Select the entry you want to copy and press Options (right softkey). Highlight Copy to Personal or Copy Group, and press .
- Press Yes (left softkey) to copy and save the entry to your Personal List or Personal Group List.

#### Saving a Ready Link Number

You can save a Ready Link number from the ending display to your Personal Lists.

#### To save the number:

- 1. From the end display, press **Save** (right softkey).
- 2. Enter a name and press **OK** (left softkey).
- 3. Press Save (left softkey).
- 4. Press Yes (left softkey).

**Note:** If the number is already stored in the Personal List or Personal Groups, the "Save" softkey does not appear.

#### Finding an Entry in the Ready Link List

You can find your desired entry by entering a few letters.

#### To find a Ready Link entry:

- 1. Press **R-Link** (left softkey) or press .....
- 2. Press **Go to** (left softkey), highlight your desired list (**Personal List** or **Personal Grps.**), and press ...
- 3. Enter the first letter or the first few letters of the name.
  - The display shows the list beginning with the letter(s) you entered.
- Scroll through the list and press to select your desired entry.

#### Adding a New Contact to Your Personal List

You can store a total of 200 entries in the Personal Lists.

To add a new Ready Link contact:

- 1. Press **R-Link** (left softkey) or press ••••.
- 2. Press **Go to** (left softkey), highlight **Personal List**, and press ...
- 3. Highlight < Add Contact> and press ...
- 4. Enter a name for the new contact and press (This is the name you will see when calling or receiving a call from the contact.)
- 5. Select **R-Link Number**, enter the contact's 10-digit Ready Link number (their wireless phone number) and press **OK** (left softkey).
- **6.** Press **Save** (left softkey) to save the new contact to your Personal List.

**Tip:** You are not allowed to use the following symbols during step 4: @:;/\*) (.

## Adding a New Group to Your Personal Group List

You can add new groups to the Personal Group List. Each group can include up to five members. You can enter a group member directly or select the member from the Personal List.

To add a new Ready Link group entry:

- 1. Press **R-Link** (left softkey) or press ••••.
- 2. Press **Go to** (left softkey), highlight **Personal Grps.**, and press ...
- 4. Enter a Group Name, press , and press **Next** (left softkey).
- **5**. To add contacts to the group, press **Add** (right softkey).
- **6**. Highlight one item from the following and press **(8)**:
  - New to add a new contact. (See page 215 for details.)
  - from Personal to add a contact from your Personal List.

- 7. Scroll to the contacts you want to add and press or **Pick** (right softkey) to include the entries.
- **8.** Press **Done** (left softkey) when you are finished selecting contacts, then press **Update** (left softkey) to update your Personal Group List with the new group entry.

Tip: To add members directly, highlight < Add Members > and press (\$\mathbb{R}\$) during step 5.



#### **Editing a Contact in Your Personal List**

To edit a Personal List contact:

- 1. Press **R-Link** (left softkey) or press ......

To edit a group name:

- 2. Press **Goto** (left softkey), then highlight **Personal Grps**. and press **\*\***.
- 3. Scroll to the group entry you want to edit and press **Options** (right softkey).
- 4. Highlight **Edit** and press ...
- 5. Edit the group name and press **OK** (left softkey).

Tip: If you don't need to edit the group name, press **Next** (left softkey) during step 5 above and skip step 6.

- **6.** Press **Save** (left softkey) to save your changes.
- 7. To edit a group member, scroll to the contact you want to edit and press **Options** (right softkey).
  - Edit to edit a group member's name and phone number.
  - **Erase** to erase the group member.
  - Add New to add a new group member.
  - Add (Personal) to add a new group member from the Personal List.
  - **Details** to display a group member's information.

- 8. Highlight **Edit** and press ...
- 9. Select the field you want to edit (Name or R-Link Number) and press ...
- **10.** Edit the entry, press **0K** (left softkey), and press **Save** (left softkey) to save your changes.
- **11.** Press **Update** (left softkey) to update your Personal Group List.

#### **Erasing Ready Link List Entries**

#### Erasing an Entry in Your Personal List or Personal Group List

To erase a contact or a group:

- From the Ready Link List, press Go to (left softkey), then highlight Personal List or Personal Grps. and press
- Scroll to the entry you want to erase and press Options (right softkey).
- 3. Highlight **Erase** and press **®**.
  - **Erase Group** appears when you select Personal Grps.
- 4. Select Yes.

#### To erase a group member:

- 1. From the Ready Link List, press **Go to** (left softkey), then highlight **Personal Grps**. and press .
- 2. Scroll to your desired group and press to display the group members.
- 3. Select the contact you want to erase and press **Options** (right softkey).
- 4. Highlight Erase and press 🐯.
- 5. Select Yes.
- **6.** Press **Update** (left softkey) to update your Personal Group List.

#### **Erasing a Ready Link List**

You can erase all entries saved in the Ready Link List.

#### To erase a Ready Link List:

- 1. From the Ready Link List, press **Options** (right softkey).
- 2. Highlight Erase R-Link List and press .
- 3. Select your desired option and press .....
  - **Outgoing** to erase all outgoing Ready Link calls.
  - Incoming to erase all incoming Ready Link calls.
  - Missed to erase all missed Ready Link calls.
  - All Calls to erase all Ready Link call history, except redial.
  - All Personal Ent to erase all entries in Personal List and Personal Grps. You are prompted to enter your 4-digit lock code.
- 4. Select Yes.

**Tip:** The Redial number will not be erased.

#### **Updating the Personal List**

To update your Personal List manually through the Ready Link server:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Settings.
- 3. Select Ready Link (GH 4).
- 4. Select List Update (ABC 2).

## Assigning Speed Dialing for Ready Link Entries

To assign Speed Dialing for Ready Link entries:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Contacts.
- 3. Select SpeedDial#s (ABC 2).
- 4. Select an unassigned number.
  - When you highlight an assigned number and press , you'll be asked whether you want to overwrite the assigned number. Select Yes or No, or you can also select Reset to cancel the stored speed dial.
- 5. Press **Go to** (left softkey), highlight the list from which you want to set a speed dial (**Personal List** or **Personal Grps.**), and press ...
- **6.** Select the contact.
  - or -

Select the group and press , then highlight an option and press .

- **Set as** to assign the selected group as a speed dial.
- **Details** to display the group details. You can select the group member from the group list.

#### To use Speed Dial for a Ready Link entry:

#### **Restarting the Ready Link Service**

- 3. Select Ready Link (GH 4).
- 4. Select **R-Link Guard** ( ( ( A message will appear. )
- **5**. Press **0K** (left softkey) to continue.
- **6.** Select **0n**. (Select **0ff** to deactivate this feature.)

#### **Setting Ringer Types for Ready Link Calls**

Your SCP-8300 provides a variety of ringer types that allow you to customize your ringer.

To select a ringer type for Ready Link calls:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Ready Link (GH 4).
- 4. Select Sounds (DEF 3).
- 5. Select Ringer Type ( ).
- Select Ready Link Calls, R-Link Missed, or R-Link Floor Tone.
- 7. Scroll to your desired ringer type and press 🐨.

**Tip:** You can change the ringer type in another way (see "Selecting Ringer Types for Ready Link Calls" on page 49).

#### Setting an Alert Notification for Ready Link Calls

- Use the navigation key to select Once, Repeat Alert for Ready Link Calls or Once, Repeat Alert, or Off for R-Link Missed

Tip: You can also set alerts using the **Alerts** menu (see "Alert Notification" on page 54).

## Setting the Speakerphone for Ready Link Calls

You can set the speakerphone on or off when Ready Link call is activated. By default, the speakerphone is set to on.

To set the speakerphone on or off:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select Ready Link (GH 4).
- 4. Select Speakerphone (GH 4).
- 5. Select On or Off.

Note: If the phone's ringer volume is set to Vibrate, Ringer off, or Silence All, the speakerphone turns off. Press

# Setting the Default View of the Ready Link List

You can select the default Ready Link List when Ready Link is launched.

To select the default view of the Ready Link List:

# Using Your Phone's Built-In Media Player

Your wireless phone's built-in media player gives you the ability to listen to audio clips and view video clips right from your phone's display. It's a great way to stay up-to-date with news, weather, and sports information while also enjoying the latest blockbuster movie trailers or music videos – anywhere, anytime on the network available to you. Just access your media player from your phone's main menu, scroll to your choice of channel, and select one of the videos or audio clips to play. It's like having a TV in the palm of your hand.

This section explains the features and options of your phone's built-in media player.

#### **Your Multimedia Channel Options**

Multimedia Service offers a variety of accessible audio or video channels, depending on your service plan and multimedia subscriptions. Your subscription options include a comprehensive basic service as well as a full menu of a variety of additional channel options.

- Preview Channel: This free channel lets you sample clips from all of the available channels before you make a decision to subscribe. It's like viewing the movie preview before deciding whether you want to spend the money to go see the full motion picture.
- **Sprint TV**: This comprehensive basic service gives you access to a variety of content from familiar brands. Think of it as "basic cable" for your phone. It allows you unlimited access to this content as long as you continue to pay the monthly subscription fee.
- Available Individual Channel Options: You also have the
  option of subscribing to individual channels from an
  extensive menu offering. These channels are available
  for a monthly subscription fee and allow you unlimited
  access as long as you continue to pay your monthly
  subscription fee.

# Accessing Your Media Player's Channel Listings

It's easy to access and view the multimedia Channel Listings on your SCP-8300 by Sanyo from the phone's main menu.

To access your media player and Channel Listings:

- Press from standby mode to display the phone's main menu.
- Select Media Player. Your Channel Listings will display, divided into the following two sections:
  - My Channels: These include the complimentary
     Previews channel that Sprint provides, as well as
     any available individual channels for which you
     have purchased access. If you have purchased
     Sprint TV, either through a Sprint TV Vision Plan
     subscription or by purchasing it separately, it will
     be displayed here.
  - Available Channels: These are channels that have not yet been purchased but are available to access for a monthly subscription fee. Use your navigation key to scroll through and select a channel, and follow the onscreen instructions to purchase access to it. Upon purchasing access to one of these channels, the channel will be listed, along with its corresponding channel number, in the My Channels section of your media player's Channel Listings. You will see it displayed in this section the next time you access your phone's media player.

#### Playing a Video or Audio Clip

To select and play a media clip:

- Press from standby mode to display the phone's main menu.
- Select Media Player and press to display your Channel Listings.
- Use your keypad to enter a channel number (or use your navigation key to scroll to a channel and press ?).
  - My Channels: If you have selected a channel that you've already signed up for (or if it's a channel with no monthly fee), you will see a list of available clips.
  - Available Channels: If you have selected a channel
    you have not yet signed up for, you will be prompted
    to accept the corresponding monthly charge. Follow
    the onscreen prompts to subscribe to the selected
    channel. (A list of available clips will display.)
- Scroll to the clip you would like to play and press
   Select (left softkey) or . (The clip will automatically load and begin playing.)

**Tip:** When entering the specific channel number, channels 01 - 09 do not require you to enter a "0." For example, to access channel "07," just press the "7" key.

#### Multimedia FAQs

#### How does my phone's Multimedia Service differ from Video Mail?

Multimedia Service lets you access high-quality video and audio clips provided by external sources. Video Mail lets you capture, upload and share videos that you personally create with your phone's built-in camcorder

#### 2. How am I charged for Multimedia Service? Sprint PCS Vision Plan:

- With a Sprint PCS Vision Plan, you can play an unlimited number of video/audio clips on your phone's display as long as you've subscribed to a channel (see next bullet). You also receive access to the Previews channel as a courtesy from Sprint. It doesn't cost you anything to play the clips, but you will need to pay a monthly fee for any channel subscriptions (see below).
- In addition to complimentary access to the Previews channel, you can subscribe to any of the channels listed in the Available Channels section of your Channel Listings for an additional monthly fee. Clips within these channels will continue to be available to you as long as you continue to pay your monthly channel subscription fee.

#### Will I know if I'm receiving an incoming call while I'm viewing or listening to an audio clip?

No. All incoming calls will roll into voicemail while you are playing a clip. If the caller leaves a voicemail, the voicemail icon will appear on the screen.

### 4. How long are the clips? Will I know the estimated time it will take to play the clip prior to accessing it?

Once you have selected a channel, you will see a listing of the available clips, with the clip's length appearing after the clip's title. In general, a clip's duration will depend on the story or content being provided, and can be fairly short or as long as a few minutes

## 5. Can I access a multimedia clip wherever I am, as long as I have my phone?

As long as you are on the network available to you, you will have access to the audio and video clips.

**Note:** Multimedia Service does not work while roaming off of the network available to you or where service is unavailable.

#### 6. Are the videos that I'm viewing "live" videos?

Yes, depending on the provider. Some, such as FOX News Channel Live through Sprint TV, stream live content. Others provide media on demand with video and audio clips that are refreshed throughout the day, but that are not "live."

7. After purchasing access to an Available Channel for a monthly fee, do I receive any confirmation? That is, how do I know it has been purchased?

The next time you access your media player's Channel Listings, the purchased channel title and corresponding number will appear in the My Channels section.

8. Why are some channels already pre-loaded into the My Channels section?

Some channels, such as Previews, are offered free of charge as a customer courtesy. These channels automatically appear in the My Channels section of your Channel Listings.

9. If I don't subscribe to a Sprint PCS Vision Plan, am I still able to view the multimedia clips? No.

10. How can I easily access a channel without having to scroll through all the channels in my Channel Listings?

Each channel will have a number to the left of it. You can simply press this number to quickly access the clips located within that channel.

Tip: When entering the specific channel number, channels 01 - 09 do not require you to enter a "0." For example, to access channel "07," just press the "7" kev.

11. What does it mean when the video pauses and I see the word "loading" at the bottom of the screen?

This happens when the media player is in the process of loading the data necessary to play the clip. It

- typically occurs when there is heavy traffic on the network.
- 12. How can I cancel service if I decide I don't want it? To cancel your Multimedia Service, contact your service provider.
- 13. If I place my stereo headphones on and insert them into the phone's headset jack, can I close the flip while I am playing an audio (or video) clip without interrupting the clip?

  Yes. When you insert your stereo headset into the phone's headset jack, the phone automatically goes into "headset mode," allowing you to close the flip and continue playing the clip (likewise, if your phone is in "headset mode," a phone call will not become disconnected by closing the flip).
- 14. Can I surf to a different channel while I am playing a clip?

  Yes; while you are playing a clip, you can use the up and down navigation buttons to surf to a different channel. A small pop-up screen will appear that tells you which channel you are watching as well as other channels you have access to. Use the navigation buttons to scroll through the different channels. Once you find a channel that you want to watch, scroll to it and press (or simply wait approximately three seconds) and the channel will begin loading.

## **Using Voicemail**

## **Setting Up Your Voicemail**

All unanswered calls to your wireless phone are automatically transferred to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. Therefore, you will want to set up your voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated.

To set up your voicemail:

- 1. Press and hold
- 2. Follow the system prompts to:
  - Create your passcode
  - Record your greeting
  - Record your name announcement
  - Choose whether or not to activate One-Touch Message Access (a feature that lets you access messages simply by pressing and holding bypassing the need for you to enter your passcode).

#### **Voicemail Notification**

There are several ways your phone alerts you of a new message:

- By displaying a message on the screen.
- By sounding the assigned ringer type.
- By the LED blinking red.
- By displaying at the top of your screen.

### **New Voicemail Message Alerts**

When you receive a new voice message, your phone alerts you and prompts you to call your voicemail.

To call your voicemail:

Press TALK.

To display your Missed Log:

Press Events (right softkey).

Important: When you are roaming off the network available to you, you may not receive notification of new voicemail messages. It is recommended that you periodically check your voicemail by dialing 1+ area code + your wireless phone number. When your voicemail answers, press and enter your passcode. You will be charged roaming rates when accessing voicemail while roaming off the network available to you.

**Note:** Your phone accepts messages even when it is turned off. However, you are only notified of new messages when your phone is turned on. You may not receive new messages when roaming outside of the network available to you.

## **Retrieving Your Voicemail Messages**

You can review your messages directly from your SCP-8300 or from any other touch-tone phone. To dial from your wireless phone, you can either speed dial your voicemail or use the menu keys.

#### **Using One-Touch Message Access**

 Press and hold 1. (Your phone will dial your voicemail box.)

## Using the Menu Keys on Your Phone to Access Your Messages

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Messaging.
- 3. Select Voicemail (MNO 6).
- 4. Select Call Voicemail ( 1) or Call:Speaker On ( 2) to listen to your messages.

**Note:** You are charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your voicemail from your wireless phone.

## Using a Phone Other Than Your Wireless Phone to Access Messages

- 1. Dial your wireless phone number.
- 2. When your voicemail answers, press shirt ×.
- 3. Enter your passcode.

**Tip:** When you call into voicemail, you first hear the header information (date, time, and sender information) for the message. To skip directly to the message, press during the header.

#### **Voicemail Options**

Your phone offers several options for organizing and accessing your voicemail.

#### **Using Expert Mode**

Using the Expert Mode setting for your personal voicemail box helps you navigate through the voicemail system more quickly by shortening the voice prompts you hear at each level

#### To turn Expert Mode on or off:

- 1. Press and hold to access your voicemail. (If your voicemail box contains any new or saved messages, press to access the main voicemail menu.)
- 2. Press of to change your Personal Options, following the system prompts.
- 3. Press GH 4 for Expert Mode.
- 4. Press to turn Expert Mode on or off.

#### **Setting Up Group Distribution Lists**

Create up to 20 separate group lists, each with up to 20 customers.

- Press and hold to access your voicemail. (If your voicemail box contains any new or saved messages, press to access the main voicemail menu.)
- 2. Press of 3 to change your Personal Options, following the system prompts.
- **3.** Press for Administrative Options.

- 4. Press of Group Distribution Lists.
- Follow the voice prompts to create, edit, rename, or delete group lists.

#### **Callback**

Return a call after listening to a message without disconnecting from voicemail.

▶ Press after listening to a message. (Once the call is complete, you're returned to the voicemail main menu.)

#### Voicemail-to-Voicemail Message

Record and send a voice message to other voicemail users.

- From the main voicemail menu, press to send a message.
- 2. Follow the voice prompts to enter the phone number.
- Follow the voice prompts to record and send your voice message.

### Voicemail-to-Voicemail Message Reply

Reply to a voice message received from any other voicemail user.

- 1. After listening to a voice message, press (ABC 2).
- Follow the voice prompts to record and send your reply.

#### Voicemail-to-Voicemail Message Forwarding

Forward a voice message, except those marked "Private," to other voicemail users.

- 1. After listening to a message, press woo 6.
- 2. Follow the voice prompts to enter the phone number.
- 3. Follow the voice prompts to record your introduction and forward the voice message.

#### **Continue Recording**

When leaving a voice message, you can choose to continue recording even after you've stopped.

▶ Before pressing ▶ to indicate that you are satisfied with the message you recorded, press ♠ to continue recording.

#### **Extended Absence Greeting**

When your phone is turned off or you are off the network available to you for an extended period, this greeting can be played instead of your normal personal greeting.

- From the main voicemail menu, press or 3 for Personal Options.
- 2. Press of Greetings.
- 3. Press of to record an Extended Absence Greeting.

## Clearing the Message Icon

Your phone may temporarily continue to display the message icon after you have checked your voice and text messages.

To clear the icon from the display screen:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Messaging.
- 3. Select Voicemail (MNO 6).
- 4. Select Clear Count (GH 4).
- 5. Select Yes.

## **Using SMS Text Messaging**

With SMS Text Messaging, you can use a person's wireless phone number to send instant text messages from your wireless phone to their messaging-ready phone – and they can send messages to you. When you receive a new message, it will automatically display on your phone's screen. (See "Displaying Pop-up Messages" on page 67.)

In addition, SMS Text Messaging includes a variety of pre-set messages, such as "Can't talk right now. Send me a message." that make composing messages fast and easy. You can also customize your own pre-set messages (up to 50 characters) from your wireless phone.

## **Displaying a Text Message**

To display a text message from the main menu:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Messaging.
- 3. Select **Text Msgs** (DEF 3).
- Select Inbox, Sent, Outbox, Drafts, or your defined folder and press . findicates an unread message.)
- Highlight the message you want to display and press . (To display the message options, press Options [right softkey].)

## **Composing SMS Text Messages**

To compose an SMS Text message:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Messaging.
- 3. Select Send Message (■1).
- 4. Select **Text** and select the entry method you prefer:
  - Phone Book Entry to select a recipient from your Contacts list. (qualifying Phone Book entries must contain a wireless phone number or an email address).
  - Personal List Ent. to select a recipient from your personal list.
  - Personal Grps. Ent. to select a recipient from your personal group list.
  - Mobile Phone# to use the keypad to enter the wireless phone number of the person to whom you wish to send a message.
  - Email Address to enter the recipient's email address.
  - From Recent List to select recipients from a list of recent message recipients.
- **5.** Press to select the recipient. (To include additional recipients, highlight **<Add Entry>** and press . You may include up to 10 recipients per message.)
- **6.** Press **Done** (left softkey) when you are finished selecting and entering recipients, then press **Next** (left softkey).

- Select Message and compose a message or use the canned (pre-set) messages or smileys (icons).
  - Press Mode (right softkey) for different character input mode. (See "Entering Text" on page 41.)
- 8. To set the message priority, scroll to **Priority** and press .
- 9. Select **Ordinary** or **Urgent** and press ...
- 10. Review your message and press Send (left softkey). (You may also select additional messaging options by pressing Options [right softkey] to set the callback number or change the recipients, etc.)

## **Accessing SMS Text Messages**

#### To read an SMS Text message:

When you receive a text message, it will automatically appear on your phone's main display screen. Press View (left softkey) to read the message. Use your navigation key to scroll down and view the entire message.

#### To reply to an SMS Text message:

- 1. While the message is open, select **Reply** (left softkey).
- 2. Compose your reply or press **Mode** (right softkey) to select a character input mode. (See "Entering Text" on page 41.)
- **3.** Review your reply and press **Send** (left softkey).

## **Using Canned (Pre-set) Messages**

Pre-set messages make sending text messages to your friends, family, and co-workers easier than ever.

To add and/or edit Pre-Set Messages:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select **Messaging** (PORS 7).
- 4. Select Preset Msgs (ABC 2).
- 5. Highlight a message you wish to edit and press ...
- **6.** Enter your new message or changes and press **OK** (left softkey). (See "Entering Text" on page 41.)
  - To reset all messages, press Options (right softkey), highlight Reset All Msgs and press during step 5 above.

## **Using Caller ID**

Caller ID allows people to identify a caller before answering the phone by displaying the number of the incoming call. If you do not want your number displayed when you make a call, just follow these easy steps.

To block your phone number from being displayed for a specific outgoing call:

- 1. Press shift X MNO 6 Pars 7
- 2. Enter the number you want to call.
- 3. Press TALK

To permanently block your number, call Qwest Wireless<sup>™</sup> Repair at 1-877-879-0611.

## **Responding to Call Waiting**

When you're on a call, Call Waiting alerts you of incoming calls by sounding beeps. Your phone's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if it is available).

To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

Press TALK. (This puts the first caller on hold and answers the second call.)

To switch back to the first caller:

Press TALK again.

Tip: For those calls where you don't want to be interrupted, you can temporarily disable Call Waiting by pressing (SM) (SM) (SM) (SM) before placing your call. Call Waiting is automatically reactivated once you end the call.

## Making a Three-Way Call

With Three-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.

#### To make a Three-Way Call:

- 1. Enter a number you wish to call and press TALK.
- Once you have established the connection, press (TALK). (This puts the first caller on hold.)
- 3. Dial the second number you wish to call and press TALK.
- When you're connected to the second party, press TALK again to begin your three-way call.

If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all three callers are disconnected

**Note:** Call Waiting and Three-Way Calling are not available while roaming off the network available to you.

## **Using Call Forwarding**

Call Forwarding lets you forward all your incoming calls to another phone number – even when your phone is turned off. You can continue to make calls from your phone when Call Forwarding is activated.

#### To activate Call Forwarding:

- 1. Press Shift X PORS 7 ABC 2
- Enter the area code and phone number to which your future calls should be forwarded.
- 3. Press TALK. (You will hear a tone to confirm the activation of Call Forwarding.)

#### To deactivate Call Forwarding:

- 1. Press Shift X PORS 7 ABC 2 + 0
- 2. Press TALK. (You will hear a tone to confirm the deactivation.)

Note: You are charged a higher rate for calls you have forwarded.

Sprint PCS Vision™ brings you clarity you can see and hear with advanced multimedia services. These features – including Messaging, games, downloadable ringers and screen savers, and portable Web access – are easy to learn and use. Clearly, it's a whole new way to look at wireless.

This section introduces these advanced services and walks you through the necessary steps to start taking advantage of Sprint PCS Vision Services.

## **Getting Started With Sprint PCS Vision**

With your SCP-8300 by Sanyo and wireless service from Qwest, you are ready to start enjoying the advantages of Sprint PCS Vision. This section will help you learn the basics of using your Sprint PCS Vision services, including managing your user name, launching a Vision connection, and navigating the Web with your phone.

#### **Your User Name**

When you buy a compatible phone and sign up for service, you're automatically assigned a user name, which is typically your 10-digit wireless phone number followed by "@qwest.sprintpcs.com." For example, if your phone number is 555-123-4567, your user name will be 5551234567@qwest.sprintpcs.com.

When you use Sprint PCS Vision services, your user name is submitted to identify you to the network available to you. The user name is also useful as an address for email, as a way to personalize Web services, and as an online virtual identity.

Your user name will be automatically programmed into your phone. You don't have to enter it.

#### Finding Your User Name

If you aren't sure what your Sprint PCS Vision user name is, you can easily find it on your phone.

To find your user name:

From standby mode, go to Menu > Settings > Phone Info > Phone#/User ID.

## **Launching a Sprint PCS Vision Connection**

To launch a Sprint PCS Vision connection:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Web. (Your Sprint PCS Vision connection will launch and the Sprint PCS Vision home page will display.)

#### The Sprint PCS Vision Home Page



**Shortcut:** You can also press **Web** (right softkey) to launch the Web in standby mode.

**Note:** If Net Guard is enabled and displayed (see page 260), press  $\mathbf{OK}$  (left softkey) to continue and launch the Web.

While connecting, the following will appear on the screen: **Connecting... Please wait**.

If you had a previous Sprint PCS Vision connection, the last page you visited will display when you launch your browser. When this occurs, you may not see the "Connecting..." message when you launch the session.

Though the browser is open, you are not currently in an active data session - that is, no data is being sent or received. As soon as you navigate to another page, the active session will launch and you will see the "Connecting..." message.

#### **Net Guard**

When you first connect to the Web, the Net Guard will appear to confirm that you want to connect. This feature helps you avoid accidental connections. You can disable the Net Guard in the future by selecting **Always Auto-Connect** when the Net Guard is displayed.

To change your Net Guard settings:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- 2. Select Settings.
- 3. Select PCS Vision (DEF 3).
- 4. Select **Net Guard** (ABC 2) and choose an option:
  - **On** to activate the Net Guard.
  - Off to deactivate the Net Guard.

**Note:** When enabled, the Net Guard appears only once per session. The Net Guard does not appear if the phone is merely re-connecting due to a time-out.

## Sprint PCS Vision Connection Status and Indicators

Your phone's display lets you know the current status of your Sprint PCS Vision connection through indicators which appear at the top of the screen. The following symbols are used:

Your Sprint PCS Vision connection is active (data is being transferred); the transmit/receive symbol will blink to indicate data transmission. Incoming voice calls go directly to voicemail; outgoing voice calls can be made, but the Sprint PCS Vision connection will terminate.

Your Sprint PCS Vision connection is dormant (no data is being sent or received). Though not currently active, when dormant the phone can restart an active connection quickly; voice calls can be made and received

Your phone is not currently able to access Sprint PCS Vision service features.

If no indicator appears, your phone does not have a current Sprint PCS Vision connection. To launch a connection, see "Launching a Sprint PCS Vision Connection" on page 259.

### **Navigating the Web**

Navigating through menus and Web sites during a Sprint PCS Vision session is easy once you've learned a few basics. Here are some tips for getting around:

#### Softkeys

During a Sprint PCS Vision session, the bottom line of your phone's display contains one or more softkeys. These keys are shortcut controls for navigating around the Web, and they correspond to the softkey buttons directly below the phone's display screen.

**Tip:** Depending on which Web sites you visit, the labels on the softkeys may change to indicate their function.

#### To use softkeys:

▶ Press the desired softkey button. (If an additional pop-up menu appears when you press the softkey button, select the menu items using your keypad [if they're numbered] or by highlighting the option and pressing ...)

#### Scrolling

As with other parts of your phone's menu, you'll have to scroll up and down to see everything on some Web sites.

To scroll line by line through Web sites:

Press the navigation key up and down.

To scroll page by page through Web sites:

Press the volume buttons on the side of the phone.

#### Selecting

Once you've learned how to use softkeys and scroll, you can start navigating the Web.

To select on-screen items:

 Use the navigation key to highlight the desired item, then press the desired softkey button (or press \*\*).

**Tip:** You'll find that the left softkey is used primarily for selecting items. This softkey is often labeled "Go."

Tip: If the items on a page are numbered, you can use your keypad (number keys) to select an item. (The tenth item in a numbered list may be selected by pressing the vey on your phone's keypad, even though the number 0 doesn't appear on the screen.)

Links, which appear as <u>underlined text</u>, allow you to jump to different Web pages, select special functions, or even place phone calls.

#### To select links:

Highlight the link and press the appropriate softkey.

## **Going Back**

To go back one page:

Press the key on your phone.

**Note:** The **BACK** key is also used for deleting text (like a BACKSPACE key) when you are entering text.

### **Going Home**

To return to the Sprint PCS Vision home page from any other Web page:

Press and hold ...
- or Press ⊟(right softkey) and select Home ( □ 1 ).



## Messaging

## **Accessing Messaging**

Now you can send and receive emails and text messages and participate in Web-based chatrooms right from your phone. Messaging allows you to stay connected to friends, family, and co-workers 24 hours a day anywhere on the network available to you.

## **Message Types**

There are many types of text messaging available on your phone. These include SMS Text Messaging (page 249), Instant Messaging, Email, and Chat.

(Voicemail provides voicemail-to-mailbox messaging. For information on using your phone's voicemail feature, see "Using Voicemail" on page 240.)

## **Accessing Email Providers**

With Sprint PCS Vision, you can use popular email services such as AOL\* Mail, Yahoo!\* Mail, MSN Hotmail and EarthLink\* to keep in touch, even while you're on the go.

To access email providers from your phone:

- From the Sprint PCS Vision home page, select Messaging.
- 2. Select Email.
- 3. Select an email provider, such as **AOL Mail**, **MSN Hotmail**, **Yahoo! Email**, or **Earthlink**.
- 4. Use your keypad to enter the required sign in information for the selected provider, such as user name, email address, and/or password, and select Sign In. (Your mailbox for the selected provider will display.)

**Note:** The information required for sign in will vary depending on the email provider you are accessing.

Follow the onscreen instructions to read, reply to, compose, send, and manage your email account.

## **Accessing Instant Messaging**

Sprint PCS Vision also provides you with access to popular instant messaging (IM) clients, including AOL\* Instant Messenger™, MSN\* Messenger, and Yahoo!\* Messenger.

To access instant messaging clients from your phone:

- From the Sprint PCS Vision home page, select Messaging.
- 2. Select Instant Messaging.
- Select an email provider, such as AOL Instant Messenger, MSN Messenger, or Yahoo! Messenger.
- Use your keypad to enter the required sign in information for the selected provider, such as user name and/or password, and select Sign In. (Your IM screen for the selected provider will display.)

**Note:** The information required for sign in will vary depending on the instant messaging provider you are accessing.

5. Follow the onscreen instructions to read, reply to, compose, send, and manage your IM account.

## **Accessing Wireless Chatrooms**

Sprint PCS Vision gives you the ability to join wireless chatrooms from your phone, to send text messages and icons to chatroom participants, or to launch a one-on-one (private) chatroom.

To access a chatroom from the browser:

- From standby mode, press Web (right softkey) to launch the browser.
- 2. Select Messaging.
- 3. Select Chat.
- **4.** Select **Enter**. (You will see a disclaimer for Wireless Chat.)
- **5.** Press **Go** (left softkey) to accept the disclaimer.
- **6.** Use your keypad to enter a nickname and select **Enter**. (The chat menu will display.)
- Select a chatroom from the menu (for example, "Friends" or "Singles") and press Go (left softkey) to enter.
- 8. Once in the chatroom, you may scroll through the postings to read messages from other chatroom participants and use your keypad to enter your own messages.

Tip: To avoid inadvertent data charges, you should sign out of chatrooms when you are ready to exit.

**Note:** For information about posting to chatrooms or setting up one-onone sessions, please see the Sprint PCS Vision User's Guide at <u>www.qwestwireless.com</u>.

# Downloading Premium Services Content

With Sprint PCS Vision and your new SCP-8300 by Sanyo, you have access to a dynamic variety of Premium Service content, such as downloadable Games, Ringers, Screen Savers, and other applications. (Additional charges may apply.) The basic steps required to access and download Premium Service content are outlined below.

#### Accessing the Download Menus

To access the Sprint PCS Vision download menus:

- 1. Press to access the main menu.
- Select Downloads.
- Select the type of file you wish to download (Games, Ringers, Screen Savers, or Applications) and press .
- 4. Select **Get New** and press ②. (The browser will launch and take you to the corresponding download menu.)

To access the Sprint PCS Vision download menus from the Web browser:

- From the Sprint PCS Vision home page, select Downloads ( ).
- 2. Select Games ( ), Ringers ( ), Screen Savers ( ), or Applications ( ) to go to the corresponding download menu. (For more information on navigating the Web, see "Navigating the Web" on page 262.)

#### Selecting an Item to Download

You can search for available items to download in a number of ways:

- **Featured** displays a rotating selection of featured items.
- Categories allows you to narrow your search to a general category, such as Movie/TV Themes for Ringers or College Logos for Screen Savers. (There may be several pages of available content in a list. Select Next9 to view additional items.)
- Search allows you to use your keypad to enter search criteria to locate an item. You may enter an entire word or title or perform a partial-word search (for example, entering "goo" returns "Good Ol' Boy," "The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly," and "Goofy Club").

#### Downloading an Item

Once you've selected an item you wish to download, highlight it and press or press Go (left softkey). You will see a summary page for the item including its title, the vendor, the download detail, the file size, and the cost. Links allow you to view the License Details page, which outlines the price, license type, and length of license for the download, and the Terms of Use page, which details the Premium Services Terms of Use and your responsibility for payment.

#### To download a selected item:

 From the information page, select Buy. (The item will download automatically. When the New Download screen appears, the item has been successfully downloaded to your phone.) **Note:** If you have not previously purchased an item, you will be prompted to create your purchasing profile.

#### 2. Select an option to continue:

- Once the item has been successfully downloaded and the Completed screen appears, select your desired option to assign the ringer or screen saver, run the application, listen to music, play the game, etc.
- Press (NOTO) to quit the browser and return to standby mode.

## **Exploring the Web**

With Web access on your wireless phone, you can browse full-color graphic versions of your favorite Web sites, making it easier than ever to stay informed while on the go. Follow sports scores and breaking news and weather and shop on your phone anywhere on the network available to you.

In addition to the features already covered in this section, the Sprint PCS Vision home page offers access to these colorful, graphically rich Web categories, including News, Weather, Entertainment, Sports, Finance, Travel, Shopping, Tools, and Business Links, as well as useful management options including My Account and Search. Many sites are available under more than one menu – choose the one that's most convenient for you.

## **Using the Browser Menu**

Navigating the Web from your phone using the Sprint PCS Vision home page is easy once you get the hang of it. For details on how to navigate the Web, select menu items, and more, see "Navigating the Web" on page 262.

Although the Sprint PCS Vision home page offers a broad and convenient array of sites and services for you to browse, not all sites are represented, and certain functions, such as going directly to specific Web sites, are not available. For these and other functions, you will need to use the browser menu. The browser menu offers additional functionality to expand your use of the Web on your SCP-8300.

#### Opening the Browser Menu

The browser menu may be opened anytime you have an active Sprint PCS Vision session, from any page you are viewing.

#### To open the browser menu:

Options available under the browser menu include:

- Home ( 1). Returns the browser to the Sprint PCS Vision home page.
- Forward (22). Returns you to a previously viewed page (after having used the 48 key).
- Mark this page ( ). Allows you to bookmark the current site and edit your bookmarks.
- View Bookmarks ( ). Allows you to view and access bookmarked sites.
- **Search** ( Launches a Google search.
- Show URL (web site address) of the site you're currently viewing.
- Goto URL... ( ). Allows you to navigate directly to a Web site by entering its URL (Web site address).

- History ( ). Keeps a list of links to your most recently visited sites. To navigate to a site, highlight it and press , then select Connect (left softkey).
- Refresh this page (was 9). Reloads the current Web page.
- More... (•••). Displays additional options:
  - Restart Browser. Refreshes the current browser session.
  - Send Page. Allows you to send the current URL as a text message.
  - Preferences. Allows you to configure and manage your browser settings. (Edit Home Page, Revert Home Page, Font Size, Color Setting, Show Images, Delete Cookies, Send Referrer, Title Tag, Sound Volume, and About Browser.)

### Creating a Bookmark

Bookmarks allow you to store the address of your favorite Web sites for easy access at a later time.

#### To create a bookmark:

- 1. Go to the Web page you want to mark.
- 2. Press **□** (right softkey) to open the browser menu.
- 3. Select Mark this page ( ) and press OK (left softkey) twice to save the bookmark.

**Note:** Bookmarking a page does not store the page contents, just its address.

#### **Accessing a Bookmark**

To access a bookmark:

- 1. Press **□** (right softkey) to open the browser menu.
- 2. Select View Bookmarks (GH 4).
- 3. Scroll to highlight the bookmark you'd like to access and press **OK** (left softkey) to go to the Web site (or press the number corresponding to the bookmark you wish to access).

#### **Deleting a Bookmark**

To delete a bookmark:

- 1. Press **□** (right softkey) to open the browser menu.
- 2. Select View Bookmarks (GH 4).
- 3. Scroll to highlight the bookmark you'd like to delete and press 
  ☐(right softkey).
- Select Delete ( 5) from the menu. (A confirmation screen will display.)
- 5. Select **Yes** (right softkey) to remove the bookmark.

#### Going to a Specific Web site

To go to a particular Web site by entering a URL (Web site address):

- Press <u>■</u> (right softkey) to open the browser menu.
- 2. Select Go to URL... (PORS 7).
- 3. Select **Address** and press **OK** (left softkey).
- 4. Use your keypad to enter the URL of the Web site you wish to go to and press ...
- **5.** Press **0K** (left softkey) again to go to the Web site.

Note: Not all Web sites are viewable on your phone.

#### Reloading a Web Page

To reload (refresh) a Web page:

- 1. Press **□** (right softkey) to open the browser menu.
- 2. Select **Refresh this page** (wzg). (The browser will reload the current Web page.)

#### Restarting the Web Browser

If the Web browser appears to be malfunctioning or stops responding, you can usually fix the problem by simply restarting the browser.

To restart the Web browser:

- 1. Press **□** (right softkey) to open the browser menu.
- 2. Select **More**... ( + 0 ).
- **3.** Select **Restart Browser** and press **OK** (left softkey).

#### Adjusting the Browser Sound Volume

To adjust the browser sound volume:

- 1. Press **□** (right softkey) to open the browser menu.
- 2. Select **More**... (+0).
- 3. Select **Preferences** and press **OK** (left softkey).
- 4. Select **Sound Volume** and press **OK** (left softkey).
- **5.** Select your desired volume level by pressing the navigation key up or down and press **a**.

## **Sprint PCS Vision FAQs**

How will I know when my phone is ready for Sprint PCS Vision service?

Your user name (e.g., [phone number]@qwest.sprintpcs.com) will display in the Phone#/UserID menu.

Go to Settings > Phone Info > Phone#/User ID.

How do I sign-in for the first time?

You are automatically signed in to access Sprint PCS Vision services when you turn on your phone.

How do I know when my phone is connected to Sprint PCS Vision services?

Your phone automatically connects when PCS Vision service is used or an incoming message arrives. Your phone will also display the icon. (Connecting takes about 10-12 seconds.)

Can I make calls and use Sprint PCS Vision services at the same time?

You cannot use voice and Sprint PCS Vision services simultaneously. If you receive a call while Sprint PCS Vision service is active, the call will be forwarded to voicemail. You can place an outgoing call anytime, but it will interrupt any in-progress Sprint PCS Vision session.

When is my data connection active?

Your connection is active when data is being transferred. Outgoing calls are allowed; incoming calls go directly to voicemail. When active, the (Sending) or (Receiving) indicator flashes on your phone's display screen.

#### When is my data connection dormant?

If no data is received for 10 seconds, the connection goes dormant. When the connection is dormant, voice calls are allowed. (The connection may become active again quickly.) If no data is received for an extended period of time, the connection will terminate.

#### Can I sign out of data services?

You can sign out without turning off your phone; however, you will not be able to browse the Web or use other Sprint PCS Vision services. While signed out, you can still place or receive phone calls, check voicemail, and use other voice services. You may sign in again at any time. To sign out, go to **Settings** > **PCS Vision** > **Disable Vision** in your phone's menu.

Part of getting the most out of your phone is learning how the phone works and how to care for it. This section outlines performance and safety guidelines that help you understand the basic features of your phone's operation.

## **Getting the Most Out of Your Reception**

#### **Keeping Tabs on Signal Strength**

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal. If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

#### **Understanding the Power Save Feature**

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability; you can also check it yourself by pressing any key. Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message is displayed on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

#### **Understanding How Your Phone Operates**

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radiofrequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

#### **Knowing Radio Frequency Safety**

The design of your wireless phone complies with updated NCRP standards described below

In 1991-92, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) joined in updating ANSI's 1982 standard for safety levels with respect to human exposure to RF signals. More than 120 scientists, engineers and physicians from universities, government health agencies and industries developed this updated standard after reviewing the available body of research. In 1993, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted this updated standard in a regulation. In August 1996, the FCC adopted hybrid standard consisting of the existing ANSI/IEEE standard and the guidelines published by the National Council of Radiation Protection and Measurements (NCRP).

#### Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- Hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended, and over your shoulder.
- Try not to hold, bend, or twist the phone's antenna.
- Don't use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- Speak directly into the mouthpiece.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills.
   If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery.

**Note:** For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

# Maintaining Safe Use of and Access to Your Phone

#### **Using Your Phone While Driving**

Talking on your phone while driving (or operating the phone without a hands-free device) is prohibited in some jurisdictions. Laws vary as to specific restrictions. Remember that safety always comes first.

#### **Following Safety Guidelines**

To operate your phone safely and efficiently, always follow any special regulations in a given area. Turn your phone off in areas where use is forbidden or when it may cause interference or danger.

#### **Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices**

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radiofrequency (RF) signals. However, RF signals from wireless phones may affect inadequately shielded electronic equipment.

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic operating systems and/or entertainment systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or their representative to determine if these systems are adequately shielded from external RF signals. Also check with the manufacturer regarding any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Consult the manufacturer of any personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids, to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF signals.

**Note:** Always turn off the phone in health care facilities and request permission before using the phone near medical equipment.

#### **Turning Off Your Phone Before Flying**

Turn off your phone before boarding any aircraft. To prevent possible interference with aircraft systems, the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations require you to have permission from a crew member to use your phone while the plane is on the ground. To prevent any risk of interference, FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while the plane is in the air.

#### **Turning Off Your Phone in Dangerous Areas**

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn your phone off when in a blasting area or in other areas with signs indicating two-way radios should be turned off. Construction crews often use remote-control RF devices to set off explosives.

Turn your phone off when you're in any area that has a potentially explosive atmosphere. Although it's rare, your phone and accessories could generate sparks. Sparks can cause an explosion or fire, resulting in bodily injury or even death. These areas are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include:

- Fueling areas such as gas stations.
- Below deck on boats.
- Fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities.
- Areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust, or metal powders.
- Any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle's engine.

**Note:** Never transport or store flammable gas, liquid or explosives in the compartment of your vehicle that contains your phone or accessories.

#### Restricting Children's Access to Your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Do not allow children to play with it as they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your invoice.

## **Caring for the Battery**

#### **Protecting Your Battery**

The guidelines listed below help you get the most out of your battery's performance.

- Use only Qwest-approved batteries and desktop chargers. These chargers are designed to maximize battery life. Using other batteries or chargers voids your warranty and may cause damage.
- In order to avoid damage, charge the battery only in temperatures that range from 32° F to 113° F (0° C to 45° C).
- Don't use the battery charger in direct sunlight or in high humidity areas, such as the bathroom.
- Never dispose of the battery by incineration.
- Keep the metal contacts on top of the battery clean.
- Don't attempt to disassemble or short-circuit the battery.
- The battery may need recharging if it has not been used for a long period of time.
- It's best to replace the battery when it no longer provides acceptable
  performance. It can be recharged hundreds of times before it needs
  replacing.
- Don't store the battery in high temperature areas for long periods of time. It's best to follow these storage rules:

Less than one month:

-4° F to 140° F (-20° C to 60° C)

More than one month:

-4° F to 113° F (-20° C to 45° C)

#### Disposal of Lithium Ion (Lilon) Batteries

For safe disposal options of your Lilon batteries, contact your nearest authorized service center.

**Special Note:** Be sure to dispose of your battery properly. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited.

Note: For safety, do not handle a damaged or leaking Lilon battery.

# Acknowledging Special Precautions and the FCC Notice

#### **FCC Notice**

This phone may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the phone if such interference cannot be eliminated.

#### **Cautions**

Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending or sitting on it.

#### **Body-Worn Operation**

To maintain compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines, if you wear a handset on your body, use the supplied or approved carrying case, holster or other body-worn accessory. If you do not use a body-worn accessory, ensure the antenna is at least 1.9 centimeters from your body when transmitting. Use of non-approved accessories may violate FCC RF exposure guidelines.

#### Specific Absorption Rates (SAR) for Wireless Phones

The SAR is a value that corresponds to the relative amount of RF energy absorbed in the head of a user of a wireless handset.

The SAR value of a phone is the result of an extensive testing, measuring and calculation process. It does not represent how much RF the phone emits. All phone models are tested at their highest value in strict laboratory settings. But when in operation, the SAR of a phone can be substantially less than the level reported to the FCC. This is because of a variety of factors including its proximity to a base station antenna, phone design and other factors. What is important to remember is that each phone meets strict federal guidelines. Variations in SARs do not represent a variation in safety.

All phones must meet the federal standard, which incorporates a substantial margin of safety. As stated above, variations in SAR values between different model phones do not mean variations in safety. SAR values at or below the federal standard of 1.6 W/kg are considered safe for use by the public.
