

Features of the Organizer

Clock function

Displays current date and time. →PAGE 19

Calendar function

Contains a calendar, which extends from the year 1901 to 2099. Important dates on your monthly calendar will be flagged, so you can check what has been scheduled for any designated day. \rightarrow PAGE 23

Schedule function

Allows you to store important dates and events. Important dates will also be flagged on the calendar to remind you to check them. A schedule alarm can also be set. \rightarrow PAGE 29

Anniversary function

Allows you to register wedding anniversaries, birthdays, etc. After registration, the corresponding day is considered an anniversary for every year from 1901 to 2099. \rightarrow PAGE 47

Telephone book function

Three telephone lists allow you to list business and private numbers separately. Phone numbers can be recalled in alphabetical order using the sequential search function, or directly **recalled** by entering. → PAGE 53

'Memo function

Allows you to note important details, such as timetables and also store price lists, etc. \rightarrow PAGE 63

Calculator

Contains a lo-digit calculator with memory. → PAGE 71

Secret function

Protects personal information. A password is required to see the information you mark as secret. \rightarrow PAGE 75

Data transfer function

By using an optional cable, data can be transferred between two Organizers. \rightarrow PAGF 89

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BEFORE USE

Be sure to perform the following procedures before using the Organizer for the first time:

1. Remove the insulation sheet.




Note: When you remove the insulation sheet, write down the date on the label on the back of the Organizer (refer to page 101).

2. Initialize the Organizer.

While holding $\boxed{\text{ON}}$, press the RESET switch on the back. Release the RESET switch and then release $\boxed{\text{ON}}$. The following display will appear:





Note: Under certain conditions the message may appear as "DATA ALL CLEAR OK (Y/N)?". Proceed to the next step in either case.


Press Y.



The Organizer is initialized and then the TEL1 directory is displayed.

GETTING STARTED

Part names



Display symbols

- BATT This symbol appears when the operating battery level is low.
- **EDIT** The entry on the display may be edited.
- SHIFT SHIFT has been pressed...
- **CAPS** Capital letters will be entered. (To enter small letters, turn "CAPS" off by pressing CAPS.)
- The data appearing on the display is secret data accessible only by password.
- The secret function is in effect. (Secret data cannot be recalled without the password.)
- A "beep" will sound when a key is pressed.
- The specified schedule alarm(s) will sound.
- ↑ There is more data which is not on the display. The data can be displayed by pressing or .


Note: In this manual, only the symbols necessary for explanation will be shown.

Key notations

This manual uses the following notations for key operations and functions.

Note: The blue functions and symbols are operated by pressing SHIFT ("SHIFT" will be displayed) and the appropriate key.



Distinguishing between "0" and "0"

Zero is indicated as "0" on the display and also in this manual when it may be confused with the letter "0".

Contrast adjustment

Adjust the display contrast to make the display easier to read.

1. Press SHIFT FUNCTION .

2. Select "2 LCD CONT".

- 3. Press ▲ or ▼ to darken or lighten the display as required. The amount of contrast will change continuously when either ▲ or ▼ is held.
- 4. After adjusting the contrast, press C·CE .

Turning the "beep" on and off

BASIC ENTRY PROCEDURES

To practice entering characters and numbers, select the MEMO mode, for example, and enter the characters as follows:

1. Enter "ABCDE" in capital letters, for example.

C·CE ABCDE

CAPS

2. To enter "abcde" in small letters, press <u>CAPS</u>. After "CAPS" disappears, enter "abcde".

ABCDEabcde

To enter capital letters again, turn "CAPS" back on by pressing aCAPS in .

Note: To enter a hyphen, press SHIFT ___.

Entering non-English characters

Enter "Ä", "ii", "é" and "ô", for example.

Entering numbers

Enter "12345", for example.

Entering graphic symbols and special characters

Press <u>SMBL</u> to select the symbol entry mode. A total of 33 symbol displays may be selected. To select the symbol display containing the desired characters, press <u>v</u> or <u>A</u>. When the desired symbol or character appears, press the number corresponding to its symbol position.

1. Enter the symbol entry mode.

5 symbols will be displayed.

Note: When you press , the previous set of symbols reappears. The initial symbol display is thus determined by your previous choice. The 5 most recently used symbols and characters will appear in the initial symbol display.

Making corrections Misspellings and incorrect entries can be corrected using the cursor keys as well as SHIFT INS and SHIFT DEL as follows:

SHIFT DEL: Deletes the character at the cursor.

Deletes the character to the left of the cursor

("backspace").

C:CE: Clears the data being entered.

Cursor:

"_" designates the cursor. The cursor is used to indicate the position where the next letter, number, or symbol will be entered. When correcting an entry, move the cursor to the position where a character is to be typed over or deleted. The cursor changes to " \blacksquare ". When inserting characters, the cursor changes to " \blacktriangleleft ".


USING THE CLOCK

The Organizer features a built-in clock which allows the Organizer to do the following:

- 1. To display the current monthly calendar in the CALENDAR mode.
- 2. To keep track of the items scheduled on the agenda for the current day in the SCHEDULE mode (automatic tracking).
- 3. To sound the schedule alarm.

Displaying the time

Pressing CLOCK displays the current date and time.



* The display can be changed to show the date in the format of "day. month. year". Refer to page 86.

Note: If CLOCK is pressed continuously, the time when CLOCK was initially pressed is displayed. The internal clock continues working while CLOCK is pressed, but the display does not change.

Setting the clock

The time can be displayed using either the conventional 12-hour AM/PM system or the 24-hour system (0:00 to 23:59 hrs.).

For example, set the clock to January 10, 1992, 1:30 PM.

Setting the clock on a 12-hour AM/PM basis

1. Press CLOCK _____.

2. Select the time system.


The number highlighted in the lower left corner of the screen indicates the time system. Each time 12◀▶24 is pressed, this alternates between 12 and 24.

In this example, "12" is displayed.

Note: To set the 24-hour system, display "24".

3. Set the time.



Note: The hours and minutes must be entered using two digits each.

4. Enter the date.


Enter the roonth and day using 2 digits and the year using 4 digits. For single digit months or days, enter "0" before the single digit.

5. Enter the correct starting time.

Notes:

- Use the beep of the time announcements given on the radio, on T.V., or by telephone time services.
- The clock starts from 0 seconds.
- 6. Check the set time on the display.





When the time is set with 12-hour basis, noon and midnight changes are displayed as below.

11:59AM \rightarrow 12:00PM (noon) \rightarrow 12:59PM \rightarrow 1 :00PM \rightarrow

11:59PM \rightarrow 12:00AM (midnight) \rightarrow 12:59AM \rightarrow 1:00AM \rightarrow 11:59AM

Correcting the clock

To correct the time, reset the clock by following the procedure in 'Setting the clock".

USING THE CALENDAR FUNCTION

Monthly calendars covering the period from January, 1901 through December, 2099 can be displayed.

In addition, for a given day it is possible to determine the number of days passed since January 1st of that year and the number of days remaining until December 31st of the same year.

Displaying and changing the monthly calendar

There are three methods of recalling dates and scanning the built-in calendar.


- 1. Displaying the calendar and changing the month with [v] or [h].
- 2. Specifying the desired date, past or future, with the numerical keys.
- 3. Designating the year and month on the monthly calendar.

Changing the month with v or <

Once the CALENDAR mode has been selected, the month can be changed by pressing $\boxed{\lor}$ (to display upcoming months) or $\boxed{\land}$ (to display past months) as follows:

1. Select the CALENDAR mode.

CALENDAR



Notes:

- If the above display does not appear, press SHIFT CALENDAR to display the current monthly calendar. In this instance, if you set the Organizer's built-in clock for January 10, the calendar for January 1992 will be displayed.
- In the year display, a " ' " is attached to the years 1901 to 1999, while no mark is attached to the years 2000 to 2099.


2. Display the calendar for the next month.





3. Display the calendar for three months prior to the month presently on the display.





Note: When vor is pressed continuously, the calendar will scroll forward or backward.

To return the calendar to the current date:

Press CALENDAR

Setting a date with the numerical keys

Use ___ or ___ to set a date that is a specified number of days in the past or future.

1. Select the CALENDAR mode.

CALENDAR

2. Set January 15 as the reference date.

To set the reference date to a different month, display the new month by pressing v or and then flash the date with the cursor movement key.

3. Set the date for the 90th day from today.

The 90th day from today will flash on the display.

Note: The number of days specified can range from 9999 days in the past to 9999 days in the future.

4. Set the date five weeks (35 days) before April 14th, 1992.

Recalling a month by designating the date

You can also change the calendar with $\boxed{\text{C-CE}}$, entering the date which you would like to display when the date prompt appears, and then pressing $\boxed{\text{CALENDAR}}$ again.

For example, to display the month of February, 1992:

1. Select the CALENDAR mode.

CALENDAR

2. Enter the date entry mode.

To make a correction, move the cursor with the cursor movement keys, or press $\boxed{\text{C-CE}}$ to clear the displayed date.

3. Enter the date.

02 01 1992

MM/DD/YYYY MONTH:02 DAY:01 YEAR: 1992

Note: To enter a single-digit date or month, enter zero and the digit (i.e., "06").

4. Recall the calendar.

CALENDAR

The specified monthly calendar will be displayed.

Displaying the number of days and weeks between January 1st or December 31 to a specified date

It is possible to determine the number of days between January 1st and a specified date, as well as the number of days between a specified date and December 31. It is also possible to determine how many weeks have passed since the beginning of the current year.

To determine these items, press <u>CALENDAR</u> while the calendar is displayed.

1. Select the CALENDAR mode.

CALENDAR

2. Determine the number of days passed/left, and number of weeks passed in the year. Press CALENDAR a second time.

CALENDAR



The numbers "[I 0/356]2" will appear at the end of the display. "10" indicates that this is the 10th day of 1992, "356" indicates that there are 356 days left in the year, and "2" indicates that this is the 2nd week of the year.

- * The Organizer recognizes each Monday-to-Sunday interval as one week. The number of the week in the year (1 st, 2nd, 3rd, etc.) is determined as follows:
 - 1. If January 1st falls between Monday and Thursday, it begins the first week of the year.
 - 2. If January 1st falls between Friday and Sunday, it begins the final week of the previous year.
 - 3. If December 31 falls between Monday and Wednesday, it begins the first week of the next year.

Note: To display a date not shown, move the cursor with the cursor movement keys.

3. Return to the original display.

CALENDAR

USING THE SCHEDULE FUNCTION

You can enter important future appointments as well as important dates in the past into the Organizer's schedule function. These dates are marked with tags on the Organizer's calendar display. In addition, you can set an alarm to sound at the scheduled time as a reminder. (Refer to "Using the schedule alarm," page 45.)

Entering data in the SCHEDULE mode

The date of a schedule item can be selected using three different methods.

- 1. By selecting the desired date in the CALENDAR mode.
- 2. By selecting the desired date in the SCHEDULE mode.
- 3. By recalling the desired date directly.

Once the date has been selected, actual entry of the schedule item is the same for all three methods.

Note: Multiple items may be scheduled on the same date.

If other items have been previously scheduled for a given date, simply enter the new appointment over the old one. The Organizer's display will clear upon recognition of the new entry.

Entering items from the CALENDAR mode

To enter an item from the CALENDAR mode, such as, "February 20, 1992 1 0:00AM-2:00PM ABC Project meeting"

1. Select the CALENDAR mode.

CALENDAR



3. Move the cursor to the 20th of February, using the cursor movement keys.



4. Change to the SCHEDULE mode.

The date you have selected (February 20, 1992) will appear at the top of the display. The bottom part of the display is for schedule time and detail.

5. Enter the starting time.

(":00" will be entered automatically.)

6. Enter the finishing time.

THU 2/20/'92 10:00AM~ 2:00PM - 7. After both starting and finishing times are entered, enter the schedule detail.

ABC Project meeting

8. Store the scheduled meeting in the memory.

ENTER

9. Now, check to see if the data was registered in the memory.

Notice the tag (•) next to "February 20". It indicates a scheduled item for that date. (Items beginning in the morning result in a tag at the upper right of the date, while those beginning after noon result in a tag appearing at the lower right of the date.)


Entering items from the SCHEDULE mode

There are two methods of selecting the date depending on which is more convenient.

This method is convenient for displaying a nearby date. It changes the schedule display day by day until the desired date appears.

For example, if you wish to schedule an item such as, "February 18, 3:00PM - 5:00PM Sales meeting"

- 1. Press SCHEDULE .
- 2. Recall "February 18".



Press or until "February 18" is recalled.

TUE 2/18/' 92

- 3. Enter the schedule time and detail.
 - 3 PM 5 PM
 Sales meeting ENTER

Scheduling with C·CE and the numerical keys

When the date is not close to the displayed date, you may find it more convenient to enter the schedule items with the numerical keys. For example, to schedule, "February 25, 1992 1:30PM DR. WILSON VISIT AT GUEST ROOM".

1. Enter the date entry mode.


2. Enter the scheduled date. (February 25, 1992)

3. Select the SCHEDULE mode.

SCHEDULE

4. Enter the scheduled time and detail.





Note: If you don't know what time a scheduled item, such as a meeting, will finish, press either vor ENTER following the starting time, then enter the schedule item.

Scheduling items without times

After selecting the schedule date as outlined above, schedule items can be entered directly without a specified time, except in instances when the data begins with a number. Simply begin by entering the letters in the item. (In this instance, the tag marking the scheduled item on the monthly calendar will appear on the-upper right next to the date.)

Recalling scheduled data

The following $\overline{7}$ methods may be used to display previously scheduled items.

- 1. Recalling today's agenda.
- 2. Recalling scheduled items from the CALENDAR mode.
- 3. Recalling scheduled items from the SCHEDULE mode.
- 4. Recalling only scheduled dates (skip empty dates).
- Recalling scheduled items from the SCHEDULE mode by entering the date numerically.
- 6. Recalling scheduled items by using the first letter(s) of the item.
- 7. Recalling scheduled items with a keyword search.

Note: When several schedule items are entered for the same day, items without a specified time are recalled first, followed by items with a specified time in chronological order.

When there is more than one schedule item with the same starting time, items with an earlier finishing time are recalled first.

Recalling today's agenda

Press SHIFT SCHEDULE

If nothing has been entered for the day, only the date will be displayed.


Recalling scheduled items from the CALENDAR mode

When a daily schedule is recalled from the CALENDAR mode, first select the CALENDAR mode and then press SCHEDULE .

For example, to recall the schedule for February 20, 1992:

1. Select the CALENDAR mode.





2. Select the 20th with the cursor keys.



Note: You may also recall February 20 by pressing C·CE and entering the date.



3. Recall the schedule display.

SCHEDULE

THU 2/20/' 92 10:00AM~ 2:00PM ABC Project meeting

Recalling scheduled items from the SCHEDULE mode

To recall the schedule directly from the SCHEDULE mode in forward or reverse direction, first set the SCHEDULE mode and then press (to recall the next day and future days) or (to recall the last and previous days) as required.

For example, to recall the schedule for January 10, 1992 (today):

1. Select the SCHEDULE mode and display the today's schedule.

SHIFT SCHEDULE

FRI 1/10/'92

2. Recall the schedule for the next day.

The agenda for the next day will be displayed. If there are several items scheduled on the same day, use v to recall them in chronological order.

SAT 1/11/' 92

Recalling only scheduled dates (skip empty dates)

Press VIIFEPeatedly so that the days on which there are items on the agenda are searched for, starting with the day appearing on the display.

1. Search for all days containing agenda items.



TUE 2/18/'92 3:00PM~ 5:00PM Sales meetin g

- 2. Press villet recall the next agenda items.
- * After the last agenda item has been found, "NOT FOUND!" is briefly displayed and then the previous display reappears. Pressing SHIFT , references agenda items in reverse.
- * Pressing | SCHEDULE | C·CE | C·CE | a n d | SHIFT | V displays the oldest past agenda item. If you press | ^ IFT | , the most distant future agenda item is displayed.

Recalling scheduled items from the SCHEDULE mode by entering the date numerically

You can recall the date directly from the SCHEDULE mode by numerical entry. Select the SCHEDULE mode, press C-CE, then enter the date with the numerical keys in accordance with the prompts. This method is handy for recalling scheduled items which are far away.

For example, to recall the schedule for February 18, 1992:

1. Enter the date entry mode.

SCHEDULE1 C.CE C.CE

2. Enter the date.

02 18 1992

MM/DD/YYYY MONTH:02 DAY :18 YEAR :1992

3. Recall the agenda for that date.

Recalling scheduled items by using the first letter(s) of the item

Enter the first letter(s) of the schedule item you would like to recall on the display and then press $\[\]$ to recall it.

Note: Be sure to enter the first letter(s) exactly as they were entered. A difference in capital or small letters will not search properly.

For example, to recall the "DR."-related items scheduled after January 10, 1992 (today):

1. Select the SCHEDULE mode. Today's schedule is displayed.

SSHIFTH EDULE

2. Enter the first letter(s).

DR.

3. Begin the search.

Note: When v is pressed, a forward search from the displayed date will begin for scheduled items beginning with the word "DR.".

If is pressed, a reverse search will take place for items scheduled before the date presently appearing on the display.

Recalling scheduled items with a keyword search

Enter any word contained anywhere in the entry, and the Organizer will find it with $\boxed{\ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ \ }$

Note: Be sure to enter the keyword exactly as it was entered. Adifference in capital or small letters will not search properly.

To search for agenda items containing the word "meeting", after January 1, 1992, for example:

1. Recall the schedule for January 1, 1992.

SCHEDULE C.CE 01 01 1992 SCHEDULE

2. Enter the keyword for the search.

meeting

WED 1/1/'92 meeting

3. Begin the search.

SHIFT

TUE 2/18/'92 3: 00PM 5: 00PM Sales meetin

The first scheduled item containing the word "meeting" after January 1, 1992 will appear on the display.

Repeated search:

To search for additional items containing the word "meeting", press vilFrepeatedly. When no more items containing the word "meeting" are scheduled, "NOT FOUND!" will appear on the display.

Reverse search:

To browse back through the list of entries containing the keyword, press SHIFT .


Editing scheduled data

Previously scheduled data may be edited by pressing SHIFT.

EDIT . Once the edit mode is entered, the data may be edited directly using , , , , SHIFT INS and SHIFT DEL , etc.


For example, to change "GUEST ROOM" within a schedule item on February 25, to "MEETING ROOM":

1. Recall this item on the schedule for February 25.



2. Enter the edit mode.






3. Move the cursor to the section to be edited and correct it.





4. Store the edited data.




Copying scheduled data

If you would like to enter a new item on a different date that has the same or similar content to a previously scheduled item, you may save time by copying the previous entry onto the new date using the copy function and editing it later if required.

The copy function operates similarly to the edit mode, instead of pressing **ENTER** to store the data, **SHIFT ENTER** are pressed. After the data is copied onto the new date, it also remains on the previous date as it was originally entered.

For example, if the "ABC Project meeting" scheduled on February 20 is also to be held at the same time on March 6, you may copy it onto the new date as follows:

1. Recall the items scheduled for February 20 and enter the edit mode.



2. Change the date.

03 06

(You can also change the entire date by pressing A C·CE at this point and reentering the entire date.)



Using the schedule alarm

The Organizer schedule alarm sounds when the time for a scheduled appointment or other item on the agenda arrives. To stop the alarm after it starts beeping, simply press C·CE . If C·CE is not pressed, the alarm will stop automatically after approximately 20 seconds.

Setting the alarm to ring

The schedule alarm can be set for a scheduled appointment.

- 1) Select an agenda item and mark it for the alarm with ".ii.".
- 2) Activate the alarm for that item with "2".

Once an agenda item has been selected for an alarm and the alarm has been turned on, the alarm will sound automatically and the relevant item will be displayed even if the Organizer has been turned off. The alarm can also be set to sound for secret items without displaying the item. If you do not wish to have the alarm sound at that time, you can turn the alarm off.

Setting the schedule alarm

First display the schedule item for which you wish to set the alarm and press SHIFT ALARM. "#" appears to the left of the starting time for the scheduled item on the display, to indicate that the alarm has been set for that item. You can also set the alarm while you schedule an item on the agenda by pressing SHIFT ALARM. However, when you press ALARM while "#" is displayed, the alarm will be canceled and "#" will disappear from the display. For example, to set an alarm for a meeting scheduled on December 18 ("December 18, 1992, 10:00 AM-1 1:00 AM Meeting") while entering the schedule item:

USING THE ANNIVERSARY FUNCTION

Anniversaries (date, label) can be stored in the Organizer. Once a date is designated as an anniversary, the date will be an anniversary for every year from 1901 to 2099. Thus, the anniversary function serves as a mnemonic aid for these important personal dates.

Note: Anniversary data cannot be coded as secret data.

Entering anniversaries

To enter "NANCY'S BIRTHDAY" on February 12, for example, proceed as described below.

USING THE TELEPHONE DIRECTORY

The telephone directory stores the names, telephone numbers, and addresses of business clients, companies, personal friends and so on.

The Organizer's telephone directory is actually three different telephone directories in one (TEL1, TEL2, and TEL3) for keeping business, private, and other listings separate.

Designating the file names

The file names for the different directories (business, private, etc.) can be input from the miscellaneous function mode. Input directory file names of 10 letters or less as follows:



USING THE SECRET FUNCTION

To turn off the secret function, press SHIFT SECRET while "S" appears. "SECRET OFF" appears, enter the password and press ENTER. The secret function will be turned off. While the secret function is off, secret data can be viewed in the same manner as non-secret data.

1. Recall the prompt to turn off the secret function.





2. Enter the password, "1234", that was used in the previous example.

1234 ENTER

* After the password is entered, "SECRET OFF!" will appear momentarily on the display and then the initial mode display excluding "S" reappears.

* If the password you have entered is incorrect, the message "INCORRECT PASSWORD!" will be displayed and the initial mode display reappears.

Turning on the secret function

The secret function turns on automatically whenever the power is turned off and back on again. To turn the secret function on manually:

1. Recall the secret function menu.

SHIFT SECRET



2. Select "1 SECRET ON".

Notes:

- After you enter 1, "SECRET ON!" will appear on the display momentarily
 and then the initial display will reappear. The secret function is now
 on but the same password can be used to turn the secret function off.
- The secret function remains on after manual or automatic power turnoff.

Recalling secret data

Before you can view secret data, you must turn off the secret function by turning off "S" on the display. After "S" goes off, secret data can be recalled in the same manner as non-secret data in the different modes.

To call up secret data only


If you wish to recall only the secret data, press SHIFT MARK* to dispay "*", then press SHIFT V. When the Organizer is set in this manner only the secret data will be recalled (since "*" acts as a key word.)


Declassifying secret data by removing the secret code

Secret data can be declassified. You must first turn off the secret function and recall the entry you wish to declassify. Then, press SHIFT EDIT and enter the edit mode. Then press SHIFT MARK* to turn off "*" on the display. After the symbol goes off, press ENTER to re-enter the data as non-secret.

To remove "CREDIT CARD 98765" from the secret data list, for example, follow the procedure outlined below. (If the secret function is turned on and "⑤" appears, you must turn it off first — see "Turning off the secret function" above.)

1. Recall the secret data.






(Press SHIFT v repeatedly until the entry to be declassified appears.)

2. Turn off " * ".





3. Re-enter the data as non-secret.

(The data is now declassified and will appear as ordinary data. Make sure to press ENTER at this point, or the data will remain secret.)

Deleting and changing the password

To delete the old password and designate a new one, first turn off the secret function, then delete the password and enter a new one. For example, to change the password "1234" to "9876":

1. Turn off the secret function.

2. Recall the secret function menu.

3. Select "2 PASSWORD CLEAR".

4. Enter the old password and delete it.

5. To register the new password, recall the password entry prompt.

What to do if you forget the password

When you have forgotten the password for the secret function, you can delete the password and all secret data by displaying the miscellaneous function menu and selecting "DATA DEL" from the functions displayed. When you delete the password, however, all your secret data (that is, all data marked with "*") will also be deleted along with it. Thus, be sure to choose a password that is easy to remember.

Once the password is canceled, a new password can be entered. Follow the procedure below to delete the password (and the secret data along with it).

1. Recall the miscellaneous function menu.

The delete prompt appears.

When Y is pressed, both the password and secret data are deleted, and the initial display for the previous mode in use will reappear on the display.



Checking the memory capacity

The memory check function indicates how much of the memory is in use and also the number of entries stored in the various functions, such as the TEL (T1, T2 and T3), MEMO (ME), SCHEDULE (SC) and ANNIVER-SARY (AN) modes. The same memory is used for these four modes. After checking the memory, press C·CE to return to the previous display.



There are two memory check displays. Pressing ▼ scrolls to the next display and pressing scrolls to the previous display.

Setting the date format

The Organizer's sequence for entering the date is "month/day/year". With the "SET UP" function this can be changed to "day. month. year", as follows:

1. Recall the miscellaneous function menu.

Note: The Organizer features two miscellaneous function displays. When ▼ is pressed, the second display appears; when ▲ is pressed, the original returns.







USING THE DATA TRANSFER FUNCTION

This Organizer can transmit data to and receive data from the following products.

- 1. Data transfer between ZQ-2000 series Organizers (using option CE-200L or CE-300L).
- 2. Data transfer with a ZQ-5000 series or IQ series Organizer (using option CE-200L or CE-300L).
- 3. Data transfer with an EL series Organizer (including Auto Dialer) that has data transfer capability (using option CE-220T).

Before establishing communication between products, turn the products off and connect the cable.



Notes:

- To interrupt data transfer, press C·CE .
- If a connector is disconnected, or a similar problem occurs during data transfer, the message "I/O DEVICE ERROR" will appear.
- After data transfer, the data on the transmitter is preserved.

Transferring data between ZQ-2000 series Organizers

Telephone directory data, schedule data, and memo data can be transferred. Data can be transferred and verified by mode (all items in the SCHEDULE mode, MEMO mode, or a telephone directory – TEL1, TEL2, TEL3) or by data item. In addition, data can be backed up using Organizers of the same type.

Transferring data by mode and by data item

Schedule data are transferred by mode. During mode transfer, data previously stored in the specified mode of the receiver are deleted. Proceed with caution.

Note: When mode transfer is carried out in the telephone directory mode, all listings in the directory will be transferred. (In this case, the directory name is transferred at the same time.)

1. Select the mode on the transmitter and receiver.

 If the mode of the transmitter and the mode of the receiver are not the same, data transfer is not established. The message "DATA ERROR" is displayed.

When telephone directory data are transferred, directories on the transmitter and receiver can be different. However, the contents received by the receiver will be stored in the open directory. For example, if data transfer is established between file TEL1 in the transmitter and file TEL3 in the receiver, then the contents of TEL1 will be sent to and stored in TEL3.

- Turn off the secret function on both the transmitter and the receiver before mode transfer.
- If the amount of memory available on the receiver at the time of transfer is insufficient, data transfer is not possible. The message "MEMORY FULL" appears. Delete any unnecessary data, verify whether the available memory is sufficient, and repeat the data transfer procedure.

Transferring backup data

All the contents of the Organizer are transferred. During backup data transfer, data stored on the receiver are deleted. Proceed with caution. (Backup data transfer is only possible between identical products.)

1. Select the data transfer function on the receiver and set it in the receive mode for backup data transfer.

Transferring data with a ZQ-5000 series or IQ series Organizer

Telephone directory data, schedule data, and memo data can be transferred. Data can be transferred and verified by mode and by data item.

Notes:

- When mode transfer is carried out in the telephone directory mode, all listings in the directory will be transferred. (In this case, the directory name is transferred at the same time.)
- The different number of display columns may result in a different return line position after transferring data. Editing may need to be performed to modify text layout.
- Depending on the models involved, due to such differences as available modes or numbers of characters, some data cannot be transferred.

Transferring data by mode and by data item

Transfer the "ABC BANK" memo data stored in the Organizer.

1. Recall the data in the transmitter to be transferred.



Note: To perform mode transfer, select the mode by pressing the mode key, and then press C-CE . It is not necessary to display the data.

- 2. Select the data transfer function on the receiver, and set the receiver in the receive mode.
- 3. Select the data transfer function on the transmitter and perform data transfer.

Note: Follow the same steps to transfer data from a ZQ-5000 series or IQ series Organizers.

Verification

Follow the steps explained in "Transferring data between ZQ-2000 series Organizers" above.

Transferring data with an EL series Organizer (including Auto Dialer)

Telephone directory data and schedule data can be transferred. (For the Auto Dialer only the telephone directory data can be transferred.)

Data can be transferred by mode and by data item.

When transferring data with an EL series Organizer, the following restrictions apply:

* When transferring data to an EL series Organizer:

Transferred data are added to the data previously stored.

Data are transferred in the same mode and directory.

If the transferred data item exceeds the maximum number of characters that can be entered into the EL series Organizer as one data item, excess characters are deleted.

Characters and symbols that cannot be displayed on the EL series Organizer are replaced by spaces. If all the columns that can be displayed are replaced by spaces, the corresponding data item is not stored.

All received letters are converted to capital letters.

If the secret function is turned on in the Organizer, only non-secret data are transferred.

* When transferring data from an EL series Organizer:

The received data are added to the data previously stored.

When receiving non-English characters, all characters are converted to small letters.

If the secret function is turned on in the EL series Organizer, only non-secret data are transferred.

Transferring data to an EL series Organizer

Transfer all TEL1 data in the Organizer to TEL1 in the EL Series Organizer.

- 1. Set the receiver in the receive mode.
- Select the mode on the transmitter.

TEL

Since telephone directory data is being transferred, select the file.

3. Select the data transfer function on the transmitter.

SHIFT OPTION

Note: To transfer one data item, display the data item to be transferred and press SHIFT OPTION.

4. Perform data transfer.

* If the amount of memory available in the receiver at the time of data transfer is insufficient, an error message appears. Delete any unnecessary data, verify that there is sufficient memory available, and repeat the procedure.

Transferring data from an EL series Organizer

- 1. Select the mode on the receiver.
- 2. Select the data transfer function on the receiver, and set the receiver in the receive mode.
- 3. Perform data transfer from the transmitter.

APPENDIX

Caring for your Organizer




Do not carry the Organizer around in your back pocket, because sitting on it may break it. The display is made of glass and is particularly vulnerable.



Keep the Organizer away from heat (on a car dashboard or near a heater, for example), humidity, and dust — these may cause it to malfunction.



Do not drop it or allow anything to hit it.




Clean it with a soft, dry cloth and use no solvents (no paint thinner or benzine, etc.).

Do not carry the Organizer in your pocket or bag together with sharp or hard objects, because it may scratch the Organizer.

When trouble occurs

An impact or a strong external electrical field may leave none of the keys operational. Press the RESET switch on the back of the Organizer.



The impact or external electrical field may erase some or all of the Organizer's memory.

Press the RESET switch with the tip of a ball-point pen or similar object, but not anything breakable (like a pencil point or a needle).

All RESET operation

If a problem occurs after replacing the batteries, or if the Organizer does not function properly even after the above RESET operation, perform the following:

1. While holding ON , press the RESET switch on the back. Release the RESET switch and then release ON .

The following display will appear.

OK (Y/N) ?

2. Press N

Returns to the initial display.

Caution: Do not press Y in step 2. Pressing Y will delete all data and reset the clock.

Replacing batteries

The standard built-in clock is powered by the operating batteries.

Precautions when replacing the batteries

Before replacing the battery, be sure to press OFF to turn the power off.

Do not replace the memory backup battery when the operating batteries are depleted. When the operating batteries become weak and you turn the power on, "BATT" " will be displayed and the following display will appear temporarily:

Please replace the operating batteries!

If the batteries become weaker (the alarm or the key beep does not sound), the power may go off during operation or the Organizer may fail to turn on.

The memory contents will still be retained by the memory backup battery. Replace the operating batteries to avoid loss or alteration of data.

Before removing the batteries for replacement, record important information on paper.

Precautions on battery use

Always replace both operating batteries at the same time.

Do not use an old battery and a new one together.

Use only the specified lithium batteries.

Replace the memory backup battery at least every 5 years.

The original batteries were installed in the factory at the time of shipment

1pa

and might be depleted before satisfying the operating time indicated in the specifications.

Battery precautions

- Keep the batteries out of the reach of children.
- When batteries become weak, remove them from the Organizer immediately. If depleted batteries are left in the Organizer for any length of time, they might leak and cause corrosion inside the Organizer.
- Do not dispose of batteries by fire as they may explode.

Operating batteries

Replacement intervals for the power source batteries

When "BATT" is displayed and the LCD becomes too dim to read despite contrast adjustment, the operating batteries are depleted. Press OFF to turn the power off and then turn the power back on. If the following display appears when the power is turned on, replace both operating batteries immediately.




Replacing the operating batteries

- 1. Press OFF to turn the power off.
- 2. Loosen the screw and remove the back cover. (Fig. 1)
- 3. Set the battery replacement switch to "Replace OPERATING batteries". (Fig. 2)
- 4. Slide the battery cover. (Fig. 3)
- 5. Remove the used batteries by prying them out with a ball-point pen. (Fig. 4)
 - Do not use a mechanical pencil or sharp pointed object. This may break and cause damage to the mechanical pencil or the Organizer.
- 6. Install 2 new batteries with the (+) sides facing up. (Fig. 5)
- 7. Replace the battery cover and set the battery replacement switch to "Normal Operation". (Fig. 6)

Caution: If the battery replacement switch is not returned to "Normal Operation", the Organizer will not function properly. Make sure that the switch is in the correct position.

- 8. Replace the back cover and screw. (Fig. 7)
- Press the RESET switch.
 If the power is not turned on or a meaningless display appears, repeat the above battery replacement procedure.
- 10. Set the clock. (Refer to "Setting the clock".)





Memory backup battery

The life of the memory backup battery

The memory backup battery in your Organizer has an effective life of about 5 years under normal operating conditions. Note that temperature extremes can shorten the battery life and cause memory losses.

Replace the memory backup battery every 5 years.

When you remove the insulation sheet or replace the battery, write down the date on the label of the Organizer so you know when to replace the battery next time. For example, if you replace the battery in January, 1997, write:




Note: Extremes of temperature will shorten battery life and endanger the memory information.

Replacing the memory backup battery

When replacing the memory backup battery, make sure that the operating batteries are not depleted. If the operating batteries are depleted, replace these before replacing the memory backup battery. If you replace the memory backup battery while the operating batteries are depleted, all of the data in the memory will be lost.


- 1. Press OFF to turn the power off.
- 2. Loosen the screw and remove the back cover.
- 3. Set the battery replacement switch to "Replace MEMORY backup battery" and slide the battery cover. (Fig.1)



- 4. Remove the used battery by prying it out with a ball-point pen.

 Do not use a mechanical pencil or sharp pointed object. This may break and cause damage to the mechanical pencil or the Organizer.
- 5. Install the new battery with the (+) side facing up.

6. Replace the battery cover and set the battery replacement switch to "Normal Operation". (Fig.2)



Caution: If the battery replacement switch is not returned to "Normal

Operation", the Organizer will not function properly. Make

sure that the switch is in the correct position.

7. Replace the back cover and screw.

AUTO POWER OFF function

When none of the keys have been pressed for approximately 7 minutes, the Organizer automatically turns the power off to save the batteries. (The actual time may vary depending upon the condition of use.) Press ON to resume operation.
