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Phaser® 350 Warranty

Tektronix warrants that the Phaser 350 will be free from defects in materials and workmanship for a period of one (1) year from the date of shipment and that the Maintenance Cartridge in the Phaser 350 will be free from defects in materials and workmanship for a period of ninety (90) days from the date of shipment or six months where longer periods are required by law. If the Phaser 350 or its Maintenance Cartridge proves defective during their respective warranty periods, Tektronix, at its option, will either repair the defective product without charge for parts and labor, or provide a replacement in exchange for the defective product.

This warranty applies only to products returned to the designated Tektronix depot or the Tektronix authorized representative from which the product was originally purchased. For products returned to other locations, Customer will be assessed the applicable service charge. The above limitation shall not apply within the European Economic Area, where products may be returned for warranty service to the nearest designated service depot regardless of the place of purchase.

In order to obtain service under this warranty, Customer must provide the applicable office of Tektronix or its authorized representative with notice of the defect before the expiration of the warranty period and make suitable arrangements for the performance of service. Customer shall be responsible for packaging and shipping the defective product to the service center designated by Tektronix or its representative, with shipping charges prepaid. Tektronix or its representative shall pay for the return of the product to Customer. Customer shall be responsible for paying any associated taxes or duties.

This warranty shall not apply to any defect, failure or damage caused by improper use or improper or inadequate maintenance and care. Tektronix shall not be obligated to furnish service under this warranty:

- a. to repair damage resulting from attempts by personnel other than Tektronix representatives to install, repair or service the product;
- b. to repair damage resulting from improper use or connection to incompatible equipment;
- c. to repair any damage or malfunction caused by the use of non-Tektronix supplies or consumables;
- d. to repair a product that has been modified or integrated with other products when the effect of such modification or integration increases the time or difficulty of servicing the product;
- e. to repair damage or malfunction resulting from failure to perform user maintenance and cleaning at the frequency and as prescribed in the user manual; or
- f. to repair this product after the limit of its duty cycle of 20,000 pages per month has been reached; all service thereafter shall be billed on a time and material basis.

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Users safety summary

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Introduction

Overview

The Tektronix Phaser® 350 Color Printer uses Tektronix' solid ink-jet technology. Solid ink-jet refers to the melting of the solid inks inside the printer which then resolidify quickly as the image is transferred onto paper. The ink hardens so rapidly that it does not have time to bleed into the paper, so the printed colors remain brilliant and well-defined.

The Phaser 350 printer produces laser-quality color prints on Letter-size and A4-size paper, transparency and peel-off label media. With a print speed of up to six pages-per-minute on paper and two pages-per-minute on transparencies, the printer is well suited to workgroup printing environments.

For paper printing, the printer accepts common office paper ranging from 16 to 32 lbs. (60 to 120 g/m²). Using the printer's manual feed capability, you can print on non-glossy cover stock ranging from 50 to 80 lbs. (135 to 220 g/m²). For transparency printing, use Tektronix premium transparencies for enhanced ink adhesion and superior print quality.

In its standard configuration, the printer provides 300 x 300 dots-per-inch (dpi) resolution color printing, 8 Mbytes of memory and a total of 17 fonts. Adding the Extended Features option increases print resolution and print performance, making it *the* choice for larger workgroups. The Extended Features option adds 600 x 300 dpi resolution printing, 24 Mbytes of memory, job collation and Check Print features, and a total of 69 fonts. Additional memory improves the printer's performance by offloading your computer faster, improving processing speeds, allowing job pipelining, and providing storage for more downloadable fonts.

Options and Accessories. The printer can be upgraded with a variety of accessories to expand its capabilities. A 500-sheet Lower Paper Tray Assembly increases print capacity for high-demand printing environments. Optional Letter- and A4-size transparency trays make it possible to print on paper and transparency media without changing trays. Network options make the printer a fast, sharable printing resource.

Network printing. The printer works with PCs, Macintosh computers, and Unix and VMS workstations, making it a resource that can be shared in mixed environments. You can connect the printer to one host or several hosts because it supports simultaneously active interface ports. In addition to its standard bidirectional parallel port, optional PhaserShare network interface cards provide Ethernet, Token Ring and LocalTalk/serial connectivity. Automatic port and protocol sensing and switching makes the printer accessible in mixed network environments.

Language support. Using the Phaser 350 printer, you can make color prints from a variety of software applications, since it incorporates Adobe's PostScript Level 2 software. The printer accepts Hewlett-Packard Graphics Language (HP-GL) files. Support for monochrome PCL5 (Printer Command Language) files is optionally available. The printer can automatically switch between all three supported languages: PostScript, HP-GL, and PCL5.

Font support. The printer accepts Adobe Type 1 and Type 3 downloadable fonts, TrueType fonts, PCL5, and a variety of user-defined fonts. To extend font capacity, the printer supports a SCSI-connected external hard disk for storage of additional fonts.

Color corrections. TekColor™ Correction provides several user-selectable color correction modes that let you optimize your color prints.

Print quality modes. The printer provides three print-quality modes that let you balance print requirements between speed and quality.

- **Fast Color** mode for good print quality at 6 pages per minute.
- **Standard** mode for better print quality at 4 pages per minute.
- ***Enhanced (600 x 300)** mode for the best text and image quality at 2 pages per minute.

* Requires the printer's Extended Features option.

PhaserLink software printer control and information access. PhaserLink™ software provides a breakthrough in printer control and information access. Rather than use vendor-proprietary, printer-specific, and platform-specific management utilities, PhaserLink software provides this function using HTTP (HyperText Transfer Protocol, the basis for World Wide Web browsers). This allows you to use a standard web browser to view printer status, control printer configuration, and link to online documentation via the World Wide Web.

Note *To use PhaserLink software, the printer must be connected to a network running TCP/IP. Refer to the **PhaserShare Network Cards and Software System Administrator Manual** for complete details.*

Easy to use and maintain. Designed for the business office environment, the Phaser 350 printer is a fast, easy-to-use printer. When the printer is low on ink, you just drop in Tektronix ColorStix® solid-ink sticks and continue printing. Each ColorStix solid-ink stick has a unique color and shape to simplify loading.

To order ColorStix solid-ink sticks, transparencies, paper or other supplies, refer to the supplies information sheet that is shipped with the printer and contact your local dealer or, in the United States and Canada, call Tektronix at **1-800-835-6100**.

Getting Set Up

At a glance

Installation of your printer involves these tasks:

1. **Setting up the printer** (page 2-2).
Putting all the pieces together: unpacking the printer and accessories, installing the optional Lower Paper Tray Assembly, installing the optional Phaser CopyStation, loading the media tray(s), loading ink sticks, and installing the maintenance tray.

Note *For instructions on installing a SCSI hard disk for font storage and print collation, refer to the printer's CD-ROM.*

Caution *To ensure proper printer operation, install the printer on a flat surface having no more than 3 degrees of tilt. This is approximately equivalent to lifting one side of the printer 2 cm (0.75 inches) off of a flat surface.*

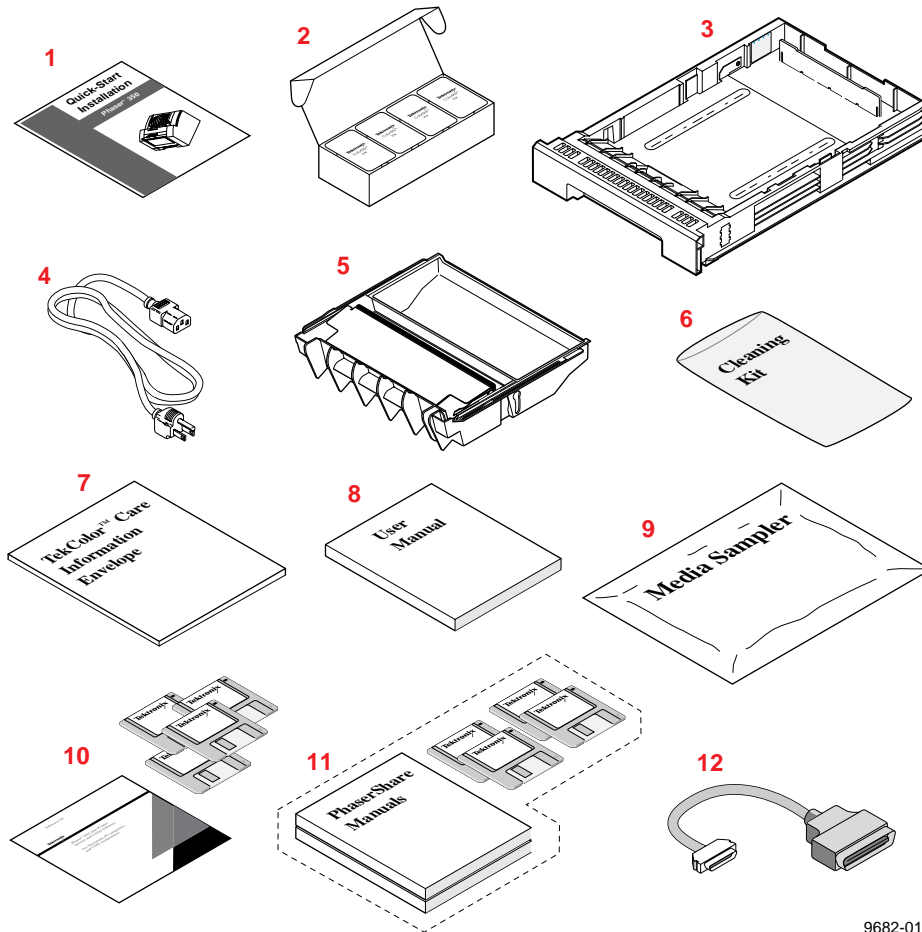
What you get with your printer

The printer and its basic accessories are shipped in a single box. If you ordered an optional Lower Paper Tray Assembly or Phaser Copystation, each is shipped separately.

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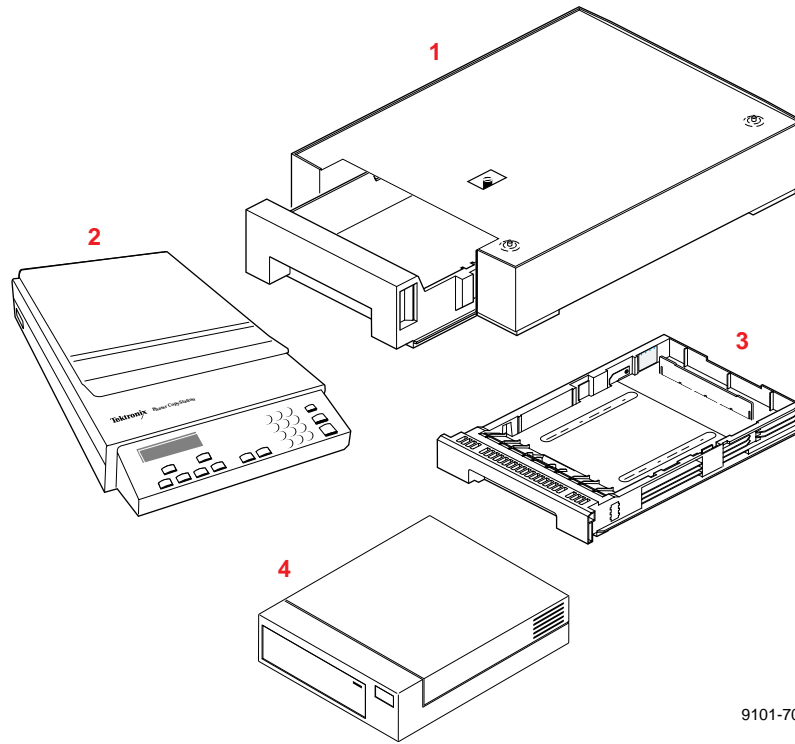
Optional accessories

When you order one of the printer's optional accessories, each is shipped separately in its own box. For information on ordering optional accessories, refer to Chapter 8.

1. **Lower Paper Tray Assembly (recommended).** With a 500-sheet capacity, the Lower Paper Tray Assembly transforms the printer into a high-volume printing solution for networked environments. Dual-tray printing capability is especially useful if you commonly print on several types of media, for example, office paper in the lower tray, and transparencies, letterhead, or label media in the upper tray.
2. **Phaser Copystation.** The Phaser Copystation adds easy-to-use, walk-up color copying capability to the printer. Its front-panel controls let you specify the number of copies and select among color, gray scale and black-and-white copying modes. You can choose to make copies reduced to 25% or enlarged to 200% of the original's size, and you can adjust copies for color balance and lightness.
3. **Transparency tray (recommended).** If you often print transparencies, you can save time and effort by purchasing an optional transparency tray dedicated for printing transparencies.

Using both paper and transparency trays, you can conveniently print on several types of media by simply swapping trays. There is no need to load and unload trays when changing between media types.

4. **SCSI disk for collation.** When you add a 1.2 Gigabyte external SCSI hard disk to a Phaser 350 printer with the Extended Features option, you can take advantage of the printer's Quick Collate feature. This specific SCSI drive is available from Tektronix; refer to Chapter 8 for ordering information. Quick Collate performs document collation *in the printer*, which is faster than the collation feature that exists in some applications. For more information, refer to "Using the Quick Collate option" on page 4-12.

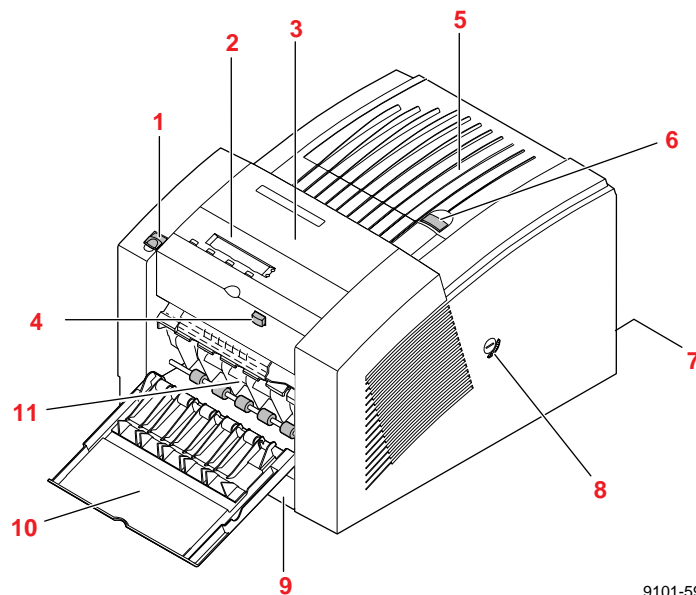


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Touring the printer

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Registering the printer

The TekColor Care information envelope contains your TekColor Care registration card.

1. Find the registration card that is appropriate for you (U. S. or international versions).
2. Fill out the registration card and mail it.

By registering your printer with Tektronix, you are validating the product warranty and you are ensuring that you will be sent information about upgrades, service, and accessories as it becomes available.

Removing the packing material

Remove the plastic bag and packing materials surrounding the printer.

Note *Save all boxes and packing material in case you need to ship the printer later.*

Installing the optional Lower Paper Tray Assembly

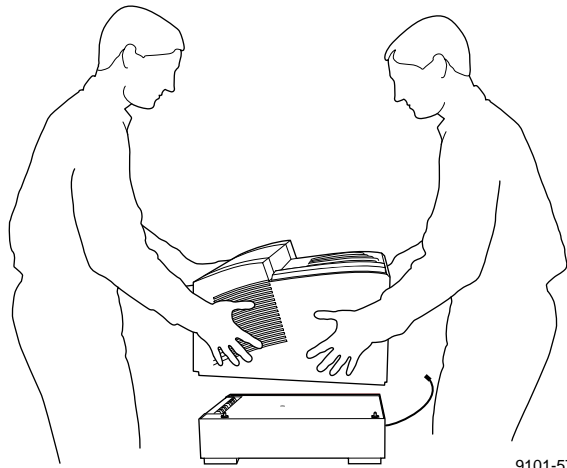
An optional Lower Paper Tray Assembly for paper printing is available as an option (Tektronix order number Z340LTA). With a 500-sheet capacity, the Lower Paper Tray Assembly enables the printer to be used as a high-volume printing solution for networked environments.

Using the optional Lower Paper Tray Assembly, you can configure the printer for dual-tray printing capability. Two trays are especially useful if you commonly print on several types of media, for example office paper in the lower tray and transparencies, letterhead, or label media in the upper tray.

Caution *To avoid damaging the printer, let the printer cool down for at least 30 minutes before you begin installing a Lower Paper Tray Assembly. This provides sufficient time for the melted ink to solidify.*

Warning *The printer is not permanently attached to the Lower Paper Tray Assembly. When moving the printer, first disconnect it from the Lower Paper Tray Assembly and then move each unit separately. Moving the printer incorrectly may cause damage or personal injury.*

The printer weighs about 32 kg (70 lbs.). Do not attempt to lift the printer without the assistance of another person.



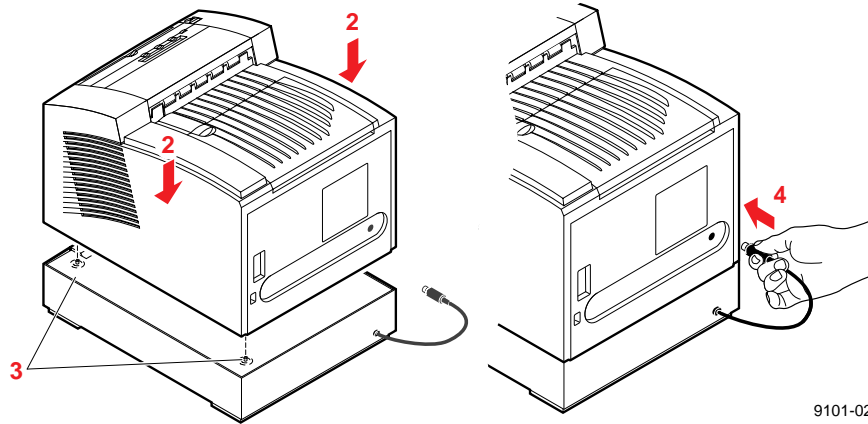
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Install the Lower Paper Tray Assembly using these steps:

1. Remove the tray from the Lower Paper Tray Assembly. Remove the shipping block from the tray and replace the tray in the Lower Paper Tray Assembly.
2. Place the printer on top of the Lower Paper Tray Assembly.

Note *To ensure proper printer operation, install the printer and Lower Paper Tray Assembly on a flat surface having no more than 3 degrees of tilt. This is approximately equivalent to lifting one side of the printer 2 cm (0.75 inches) off of a flat surface.*

3. Make sure that the left and right alignment pins fit in the holes in the base of the printer.
4. Plug the Lower Paper Tray Assembly cable into the printer.



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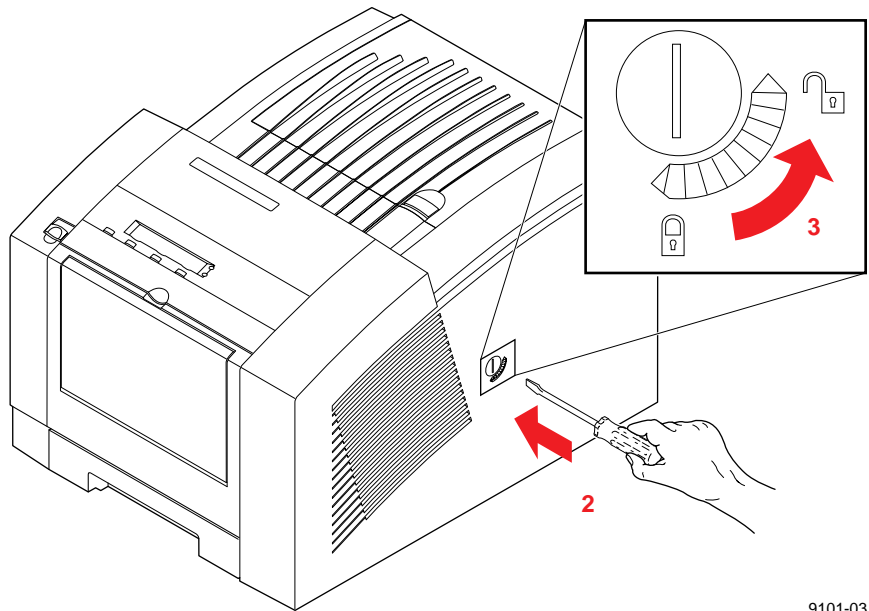
To move the printer more than a few feet, it is easier to disconnect the Lower Paper Tray Assembly and move the printer separately from the Lower Paper Tray Assembly.

Caution *To avoid damaging the printer, let the printer cool down for at least 30 minutes before you move it so that the ink has time to solidify.*

Unlocking the transit restraint

Caution To avoid damaging the printer, always turn the printer power off using the On/Off switch before locking or unlocking the transit restraint.

1. Turn the printer power off using the rear-panel **On/Off** switch.
2. The transit restraint lock is located on the right side of the printer. Insert a wide flat-blade screwdriver into the lock slot.
3. While pushing inward with slight pressure, turn the lock button counterclockwise until it springs out flush with the side of the printer.



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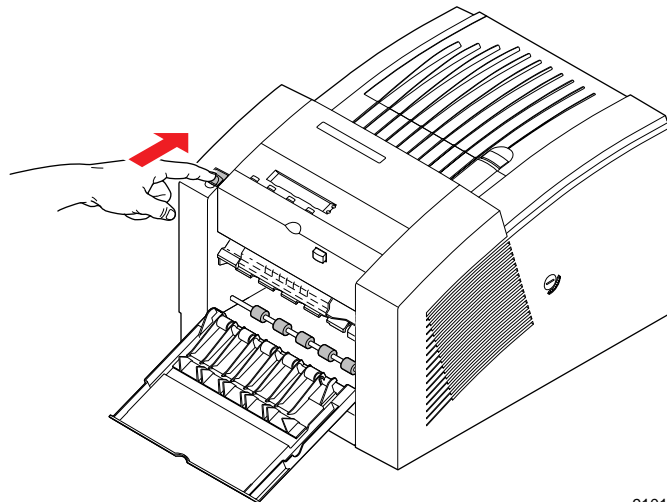
Caution If you move or ship the printer, be sure to lock the transit restraint to protect the printhead from damage. Refer to “Moving Your Printer” on page 5-39 for more information.

Installing the maintenance tray

The printer is shipped with a maintenance tray that must be installed before printing is possible. The front panel displays a message telling you when the maintenance tray is low, allowing you to make a limited number of prints before the tray is depleted. To avoid printing delays, always keep an extra maintenance tray available for use in the printer.

Note When you reorder a replacement maintenance tray for the printer, use Tektronix order number 436-0294-03.

1. Open the front cover.

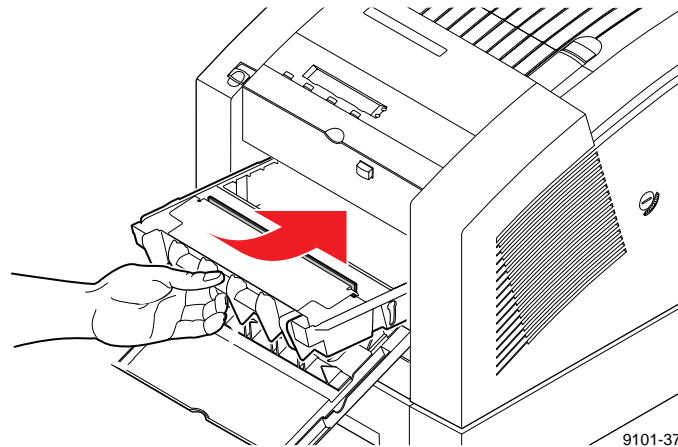


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2. Open the maintenance tray shipping box and remove the maintenance tray.

3. Remove the packing materials from the maintenance tray. Retain the plastic bag for disposal of the used maintenance tray.
4. Install the maintenance tray by sliding it into the printer.



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Note *To prevent jams at the media tray, be sure to push the maintenance tray into the printer until both sides latch firmly into place.*

5. Close the front cover.

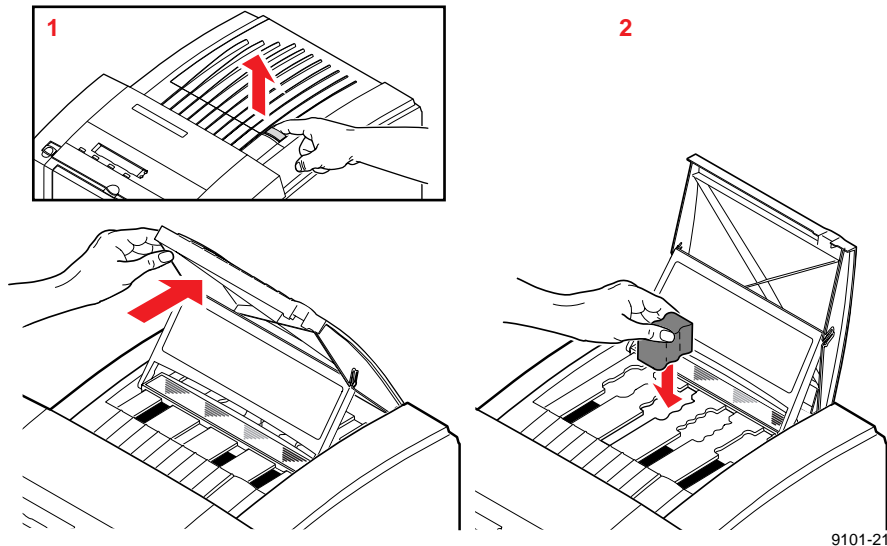
Caution *If you move or ship the printer, be sure to remove the maintenance tray to protect the printer from damage. Refer to "Moving Your Printer" on page 5-39 for more information.*

Loading ink sticks

The printer's standard accessories include a box containing one of each color Phaser 350 ColorStix® solid ink sticks: cyan, magenta, yellow and black. You'll need to load the box of ink sticks during printer set up. To ensure that your printer is always available for use, Tektronix recommends that you immediately reorder and maintain a stock of each color ink stick. Refer to "Ordering printer supplies" on page 8-2 for ordering information.

Note *To ensure optimum printing performance and best ink economy, leave the printer turned on overnight and during weekends.*

1. Open the top cover.
2. Drop the appropriate color Phaser 350 ColorStix ink stick into each ink loading bin. Ink sticks are uniquely shaped to fit into the correct ink-loading bin.



3. After loading the appropriate color ink stick, close the top cover.

Selecting a media tray configuration

If you print on different types of media (paper and transparencies, letterhead or label stock) or different media sizes (U.S./Letter and Metric/A4), you'll want to obtain a media tray for each type of media you use. For transparency printing, the optional transparency tray is recommended.

The standard paper tray shipped with your printer accepts Letter-size paper and label stock. An optional A4-size paper tray supports A4-size paper and label stock printing. Optional transparency trays can be ordered for Letter- and A4-size transparency media. An optional Lower Paper Tray Assembly for high-volume printing can be ordered for Letter- and A4-size paper only.

Refer to "Optional media trays" on page 8-6 for ordering information.

Office paper, letterhead, and label printing

Standard paper tray: Use the standard 200-sheet paper tray shipped with your printer for paper, letterhead, and label stock print jobs.

Optional Lower Paper Tray Assembly: In workgroup printing environments, you'll want to add the optional 500-sheet Lower Paper Tray Assembly to supplement the standard paper tray. The Lower Paper Tray is also convenient when you want to print on paper (lower tray) and another media, such as transparency, letterhead, or label stock (upper tray). With dual-tray capability, you can print on different media directly from the printer driver without the need to leave your computer to switch trays.

Note *The Lower Paper Tray Assembly supports printing on paper only.*

Transparency printing

Transparency tray: If you often print transparencies, you can save time and effort by purchasing an optional transparency tray dedicated for printing transparencies. Using both paper and transparency trays, you can easily print on several types of media by simply swapping trays. There is no need to load and unload trays when changing between media types.

When you add the Lower Paper Tray Assembly to the printer, you can select between paper printing (lower tray) and transparency printing (upper tray) directly from the printer driver without leaving your computer. Refer to “Optional media trays” on page 8-6 for ordering information.

Standard paper tray: You can use the standard paper tray to print on transparencies. However, when you print you’ll need to follow these instructions:

- a. Select **Transparency** as the Media Source in the Tektronix printer driver.
- b. When the printer’s front panel message prompts you, load the transparency media, confirm your action using the front panel, and continue printing.
- c. When printing is completed, remove the extra transparency media from the paper tray and replace paper media.

Loading media trays

The standard tray shipped with the printer accepts common office Letter-size (8.5 x 11 in.) paper ranging from 16 to 32 lbs. (60 to 120 g/m²). An optional A4-size (210 x 297 mm) paper tray supports printing on common office A4-size paper. Optional transparency trays are also available for Letter- size and A4-size transparency printing.

The optional Lower Paper Tray Assembly can be ordered with either a Letter- or an A4-size paper tray for printing on paper ranging from 16 to 32 lbs. (60 to 120 g/m²). For more information about media types, refer to “All about media” on page 3-29.

Note *Samples of paper and transparency media are included in the Media Sampler kit shipped with the printer.*

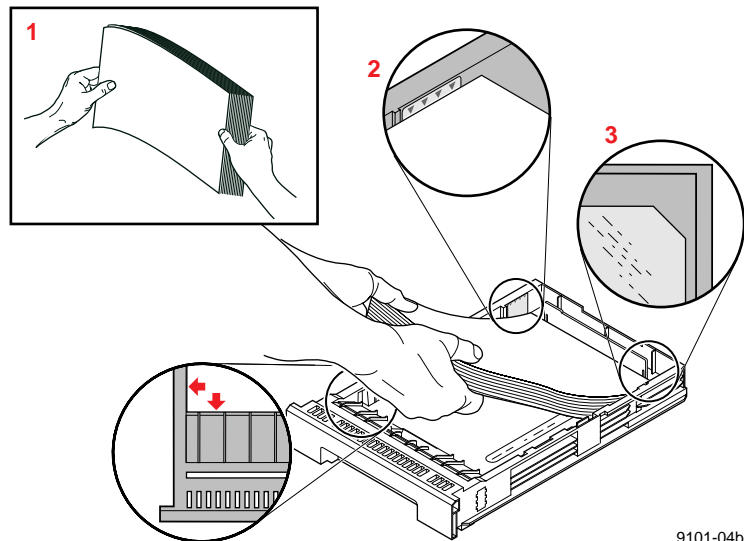
Loading paper and transparency trays

1. Prior to loading paper in a tray, fan the paper to release sheets that are stuck together.

Note Handle transparencies by the edges and with both hands to avoid fingerprints and creases, which can result in poor print quality.

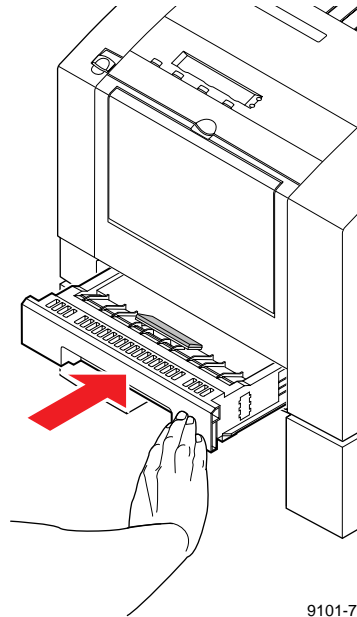
2. If you are loading paper in the standard paper tray, load up to 200 sheets of common office paper (slightly less than one-half ream). If you are loading transparencies in the standard paper tray, load up to 50 transparency sheets.
3. If you are loading transparencies in the transparency tray, load up to three boxes (a total of 175 sheets) of transparency media. If you are using Tektronix premium transparency media, position the transparency notch in the back, right corner of the tray. Standard Tektronix transparencies can be loaded in any orientation.

Make sure that the media fits snugly against the inside front wall of the tray. A label on the inside of the paper and transparency trays provide a fill line to indicate the tray's maximum capacity.



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4. Insert the media tray into the printer.



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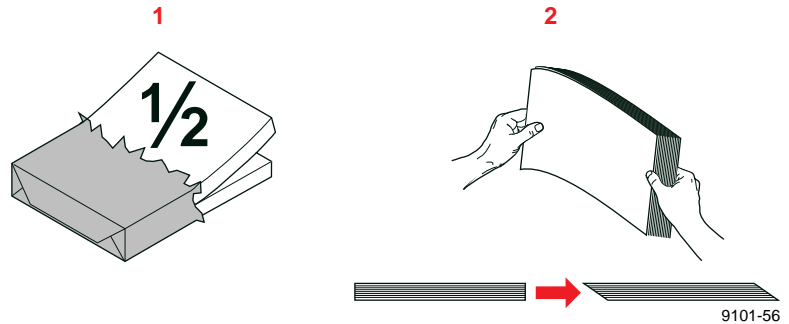
Loading the Lower Paper Tray Assembly

The Lower Paper Tray Assembly holds up to 500 sheets of paper. A label on the inside of the tray provides a fill line to indicate the tray's maximum paper capacity.

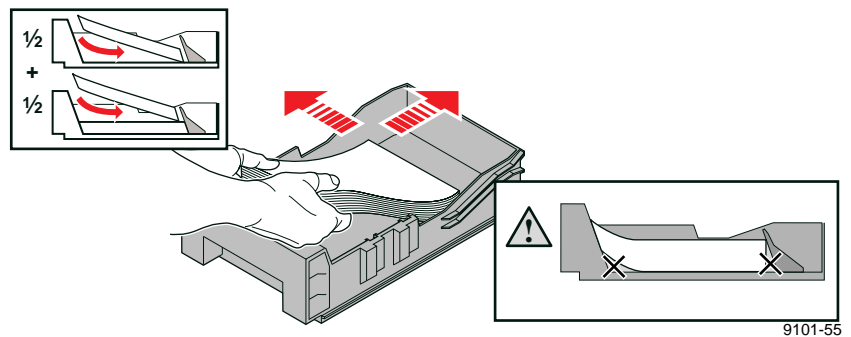
Note *The Lower Paper Tray Assembly accepts paper media only; it should not be used with transparencies or label stock.*

2 Getting Set Up

1. Load one-half of a ream (250 sheets or less) of paper at a time.
2. Prior to loading paper in the Lower Paper Tray Assembly, fan the paper stack to release sheets that are stuck together.

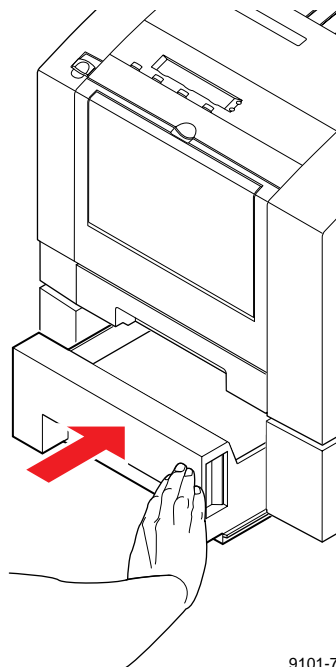


3. Load the first stack of paper in the tray. Make sure that the paper fits snugly against the inside front wall of the tray.



4. Load the second stack of paper. Make sure that the paper fits flat in the tray.

5. Insert the paper tray into the Lower Paper Tray Assembly.



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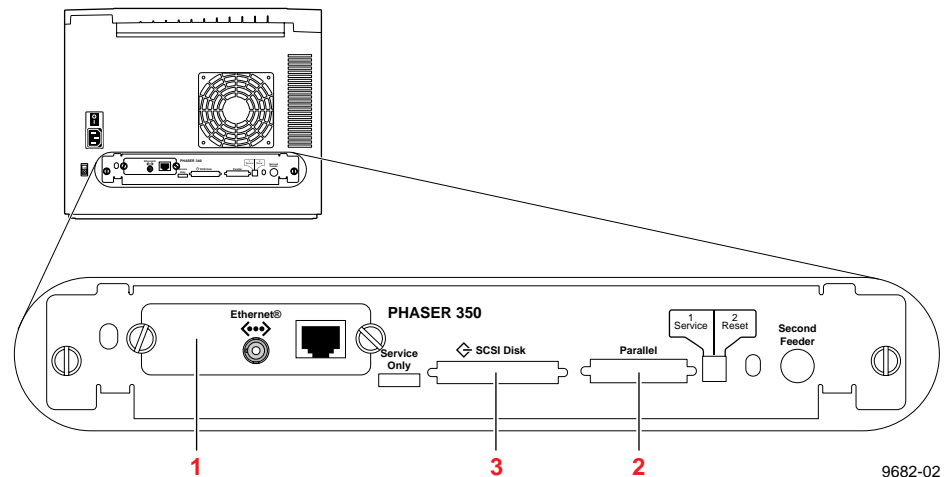
Connecting the printer

Printer ports

The printer can support one optional PhaserShare™ network card; refer to the description for number 1. The printer is shipped with a parallel port available on the rear panel; refer to the description for number 2. A SCSI port is also included on the printer's rear panel; refer to the description for number 3.

Note See “Interface cables and adapters” on page 8-3 about ordering cables for connecting the printer.

All ports and network protocols are simultaneously active. The printer accepts print jobs on a first-come, first-served basis.



1. PhaserShare card (optional)

The printer accepts one of the following:

- PhaserShare Ethernet card supporting Novell NetWare, EtherTalk, TCP/IP, Telnet and FTP protocols.
- PhaserShare Token Ring card supporting Novell NetWare, TCP/IP, TokenTalk, Telnet and FTP protocols.
- PhaserShare LocalTalk/serial card.

The *PhaserShare Network Cards and Software System Administrator Manual* contains all the information necessary for configuring and using the optional network interfaces. Refer to “PhaserShare network cards” on page 8-8 for ordering information.

2. Parallel (standard)

If needed, the parallel port can be configured for bi-directional communications. Refer to the on-line manual on the printer’s CD-ROM for instructions on using utility files to control the parallel port. The CD-ROM also covers other topics such as disabling timeouts, bi-directional status reporting and the parallel port pinout.

3. SCSI (standard)

The SCSI port is used only for connecting an external hard disk or for connecting the Phaser Copystation. Refer to “SCSI peripheral devices” on page 2-24 for more information on the SCSI port. Refer to “Phaser Copystation” on page 8-9 for more information on the Phaser Copystation.

Note *Make all printer connections **before** you turn on the printer.*

PhaserShare network and serial connections

Optional PhaserShare cards provide Ethernet, Token Ring, or LocalTalk/serial connections for the printer. PhaserShare cards can be purchased initially with the printer as an installed option or later as a separate upgrade kit. If purchased initially, you will find the PhaserShare network manuals included in the shipping box with your printer. If you purchased a PhaserShare card as an upgrade kit, install the card using the directions provided with the upgrade kit.

PhaserShare network interfaces offer high performance and flexible workgroup connectivity. All data input ports and network protocols are simultaneously active. Print jobs are processed on a first-come, first-served basis.

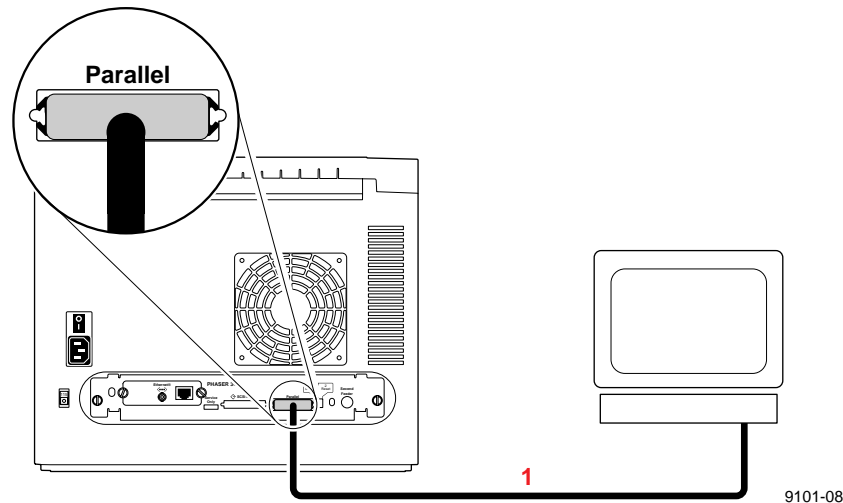
The *PhaserShare Network Cards and Software System Administrator Manual* contains all the information necessary for configuring and using the optional network interfaces. Parallel connection

The printer supports a standard (uni-directional) parallel port. The parallel port can also be set for bi-directional communications using downloadable utility files or from your World Wide Web browser. Refer to the printer's CD-ROM or the *PhaserShare Network Cards and Software System Administrator Manual*, respectively, for information on changing parallel communications.

Connect to the printer's parallel port using the high-density bi-directional parallel cable included with your printer. This cable is a 36-pin high-density printer to 25-pin DSUB PC cable.

Using the following illustration, connect a parallel interface cable to your computer and to the printer's parallel port.



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SCSI peripheral devices

The SCSI port is used for connecting these optional peripheral devices:

■ Phaser Copystation

To set up the Phaser Copystation and to connect it to your printer, refer to Chapter 2 of the *Phaser Copystation User Manual*. Refer to “Phaser Copystation” on page 8-9 for ordering information.

■ External SCSI hard disk

- Provides storage for additional downloadable fonts. You can connect one or more SCSI external hard disks to the printer for additional font storage. When you download a font to an external disk, the font remains there until you remove it.
- Allows for collation of print jobs on Phaser 350 printers with the Extended Features option. Refer to “Using the Quick Collate option” on page 4-12 for more information.

Refer to “Interface cables and adapters” on page 8-3 for information on ordering SCSI cables.

Selecting a SCSI hard disk

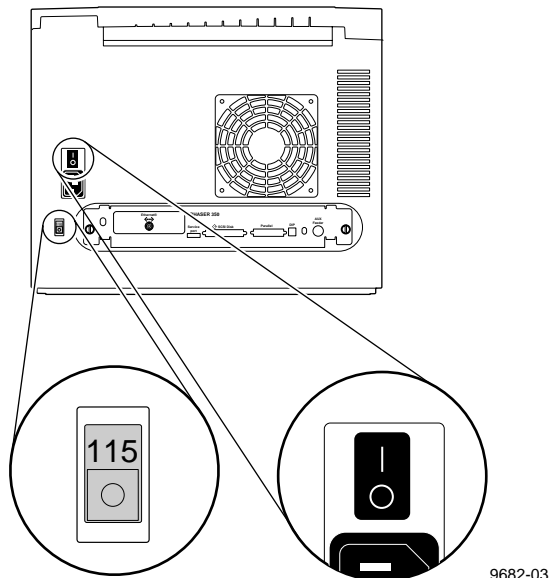
- **For font storage.** The Phaser 350 printer can use most SCSI hard disks that support the full SCSI command set. Also, most SCSI hard disks that work with an Apple LaserWriter will work with a Phaser 350 printer. Contact your computer or printer dealer for information.
- **For printer collation.** To use the collation feature available with the printer’s Extended Features option, you’ll need to order a 1.2 Gigabyte external SCSI hard disk. This specific SCSI drive, available from Tektronix, is required for use with the Phaser 350 printer. Refer to Chapter 8 for ordering information.

Turning on the printer

After you have connected the interface cables, you are ready to connect the power cord and turn on the printer. If you need to turn the printer off, wait until the display shows *Ready* or the printer's name before powering it down.

Caution *To avoid damaging the printer, make sure that the voltage select switch is set to match the AC line voltage for your location and that the power switch is in the **off** position before connecting the power cord.*

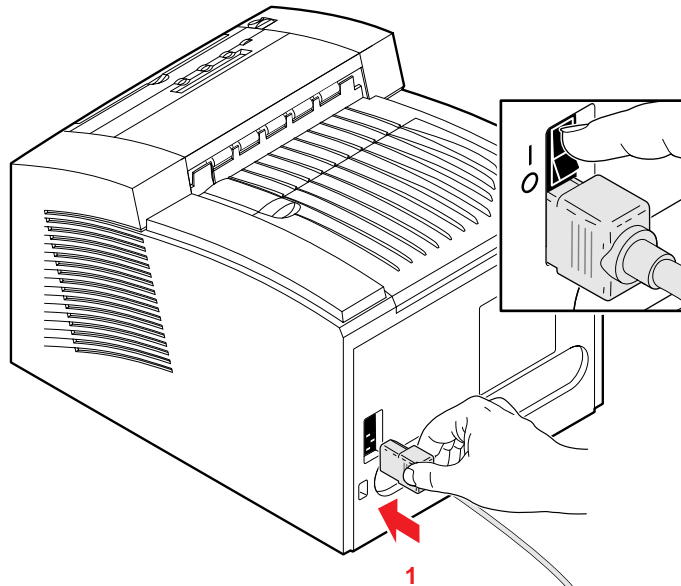
If you move the printer to a location that uses a line voltage other than the printer's current setting, refer to "Changing line voltage" on page 5-41 for information on changing the line voltage selection switch.



2 Getting Set Up

1. Plug the power cord into the printer and into a grounded outlet.
2. Turn on the printer.

Note *To ensure optimum printing performance and best ink economy, leave the printer turned on overnight and during weekends. The printer automatically switches into a standby mode to reduce power consumption during periods of infrequent use.*



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As the printer warms up



The first time you turn your printer on, it will take about 15 minutes to warm up. The printer's front panel displays a percentage value to indicate its progress. The warm-up cycle is complete when the front panel displays 100%.

As the printer initializes, you will hear a series of start-up noises that are normal and are not an indication of problems with the printer. During warm-up, the printer outputs a cleaning page as part of its initialization. The printer is available for printing when it displays *Ready* or the printer's name.

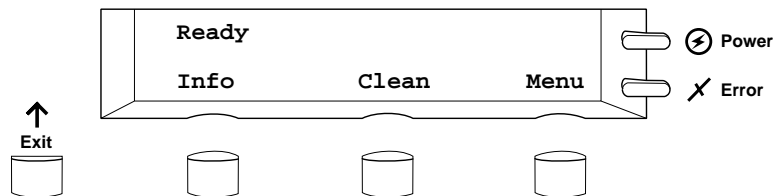
Turning off the Startup page

After the printer has warmed up, it automatically prints a startup page. If you want to turn off the startup page, you can do so through the front panel. Refer to Chapter 7 for instructions on using the front panel. You can also control the startup page through a utility file provided on the printer's CD-ROM, or through your World Wide Web browser. Refer to the CD-ROM or the *PhaserShare Network Cards and Software System Administrator Manual*, respectively, for information on utility files and web browsers.

Front panel controls

When you first turn on the printer, the **Power**  and **Error**  indicators on the front panel are lighted. The printer takes about 15 minutes to completely warm up. During the warm-up cycle, the **Power** indicator remains on, the **Error** light goes out, and the front panel displays a series of "Warming up" messages.

Status messages, such as `Warming Up`, appear on the top line of the display. Button labels, such as **Info**, **Clean**, and **Menu**, appear on the lower line of the display. Button labels identify a function for the corresponding button located under the label. For example, to access other menus, press the button located under the word **Menu**.



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Accessing the front panel menu

When the printer is shipped, access to the front panel menu is made by pressing the **Menu** button. System administrators may choose to limit access to front panel menus, requiring users to know a two-button combination to gain full access to menus. Refer to Chapter 7 for a complete description of front panel controls and menus.

Selecting a language for the front panel

Messages that appear in the front panel window are in English by default. To change the language to Spanish, French, German, Italian, or Japanese, follow these steps.

1. When the printer is on and Ready or the printer's name appears, press the **Menu** button. The printer displays the first selection in the menu:

```
Help Pages
<----- > Menu
```

2. Using the left (<-----) or right (----->) arrow buttons, scroll through the selections until the following message appears:

```
Language
<----- > Menu
```

3. Press the **Menu** button to access language selections. The printer displays the following message:

```
Language: English*
<----- > OK
```

where the asterisk (*) indicates the currently selected language.

4. Using the left or right arrow buttons, scroll through the language selections until you reach the appropriate setting.
5. Press the **OK** button to confirm your language selection.
6. Return to the top level of the menu by pressing the **Exit** button until the printer displays the Ready message.

Help Pages overview

The printer has several Help Pages that you can print to learn more about the printer's operation and configuration. Refer to "Printer Help Pages" on page 7-6 for a detailed list of available Help Pages. You can print the Help Pages from the front panel; refer to the instructions below. You can also print Help Pages using your World Wide Web browser; refer to the *PhaserShare Status Software User Manual* for information.

Printing Help Pages from the front panel

After setting up the printer, you may want to print Help Pages to check that the printer is operating correctly. A general description of printing Help Pages from the front panel is described in the following steps. For detailed steps on printing specific Help Pages, refer to the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM.

1. When the printer is on and the **Ready** message or the printer's name appears, press the **Menu** button. The printer displays the following message:

```
Help Pages
<----  ----> Menu
```

2. Press the **Menu** button to access the Help Pages. The printer displays the following message:

```
Menu Map
<----  ----> Print
```

3. Using the left (<----) or right (---->) arrow buttons, scroll through these selections: Menu Map, Configuration Page, Startup Page, Demonstration Pages, RGB Color Sampler, and CMYK Color Sampler.
4. Press the **Print** button to print the displayed page(s).

Installing printer description files

PostScript printer description files (PPDs) are used by some drivers and applications for gaining information about a printer's page sizes, color corrections, and other options. To properly use the printer with one of the following applications, install the appropriate file.

QuarkXPress

The QuarkXPress application uses a unique PDF file.

1. Locate the *TKPH3501.PDF*:
 - On the printer's CD-ROM in the *QUARK* directory.
 - On the Printer Software for Windows diskette in the *QUARK* directory.
2. Copy the *TKPH3501.PDF* file to the *PDF* subdirectory of the Quark application on your hard disk. For example:

```
COPY TKPH3501.PDF C:\XPRESS33\PDF
```


Aldus and Adobe applications

Aldus and Adobe applications, such as PageMaker and FreeHand, use PostScript printer description (PPD) files. Refer to your applications' documentation for details on using PPD files.

Note *To add PPDs for printers other than the Phaser 350 printer, open the WIN95_NT directory on the printer's CD-ROM.*

1. Locate the printer's PPD files:
 - On the printer's CD-ROM in the WIN95_NT directory.
 - On the Printer Software for Windows diskette at the top level.
2. Select a PPD file:
 - Use *TK350171.PPD* if you have the standard version of the printer.
 - Use *TK350691.PPD* if you have the printer's Extended Features option.

3. Copy the PPD file to the directory on your hard disk where other PPD files are located. For example, the subdirectory in FreeHand's File Manager containing printer description files should be called:

`ALDUS\USENGLISH\PPD4`

Setting up the Microsoft PostScript driver for Windows 95

1. Use either the printer's CD-ROM or diskette:
 - **CD-ROM:** Insert the printer's CD-ROM into your CD-ROM drive.
 - **Diskette:** Insert the Printer Software for Windows diskette into your disk drive.
2. Click the **Start** icon in the taskbar on your screen. In the menu that appears, click **Settings**.
3. In the menu that appears, click **Printers**; the **Printers** window appears.
4. In the **Printers** window, double-click **Add Printer**.
5. When the **Add Printer Wizard** window appears, click **Next**.
6. Select your printer's connection:
 - Select **Local Printer** if your printer is connected directly to your computer, then click **Next**.
 - Select **Network Printer** if you are accessing your printer through a network. Click **Browse** to search the network and select a printer queue. Then click **Next**.
7. In the window listing **Manufacturers/Printers**, click the **Have Disk** button.

8. In the **Install From Disk** dialog box, do one of the following:

CD-ROM:

- a. Click **Browse**.
- b. In the **Open** dialog box select the **Drive** for the printer's CD-ROM.
- c. Select the `\WIN95_NT` directory under **Folders**.
- d. Click **OK**.

Diskette:

- a. Click **Browse**.
- b. In the **Open** dialog box select the **Drive** for the Printer Software for Windows diskette.
- c. Click **OK**.

9. A list of Tektronix printers appears. Select your printer in the list, then click **Next**.
 - Select **Tektronix Phaser 350** if you have the standard version of the printer.
 - Select **Tektronix Phaser 350 600x300** if you have the printer's Extended Features option.

Note *If you are not sure which configuration of the printer you have, the printer's startup page lists this information under **Extended Features: Yes/No**. See page 2-29 for instructions on printing a copy of the printer's startup page.*

10. Select the port your printer is connected to, then click **Next**.
11. It is recommended that you use the default printer name shown under **Printer name**. Click **Yes** if you want this printer to be the default printer. Then click **Next**.

12. At the prompt, *Would you like to print a test page?* click **Yes** to verify the printer's connection, or click **No**. Then click **Finish**.

A status bar appears while files are copied to your computer.

13. If prompted, select the path for the PostScript driver files; these should be in your *WINDOWS/SYSTEM* directory.

If the files aren't installed on your hard disk, do *one* of the following:

- Select the drive for the printer's CD-ROM and the *\WIN95_NT* directory, and click **OK**.
- Select the drive for the printer's diskette and click **OK**.

The software you need is installed.

14. If your printer is set up correctly, and you clicked **Yes** in Step 12, a test page prints showing the Windows 95 logo and information on your printer.

Your Phaser 350 printer is added to the **Printers** window.

Setting up the Adobe PostScript driver for Windows 95

Note *The files for this driver are available only on the printer's CD-ROM. If you already have the driver installed and you are only adding a printer, such as the Phaser 350 printer, open the Control Panel, double-click the Adobe driver icon, then continue with Step 7.*

1. Insert the printer's CD-ROM into your CD-ROM drive.
2. Click the **Start** icon in the taskbar on your screen. In the menu that appears, click **Run**.
3. In the **Run** window, type in the drive the CD-ROM is in, followed by the `\ADOBEPS4` directory and the file name `SETUP.EXE` and click **OK**. For example:

```
C:\ADOBEPS4\SETUP
```

4. When the **AdobePS4 PostScript Printer Driver Setup** dialog box appears, click the **Read** button if you wish to see a text file with driver instructions. Click **Next** to continue, or **Exit** to quit.
5. In the **Install Setup Program** dialog box, decide if you want to copy the Adobe driver setup program to your hard disk, then click **Next**.

If you selected **Yes**, continue with the on-screen instructions.

6. In the **Printer Type** dialog box, select your printer's connection:
 - Select **Local Printer** if your printer is connected directly to your computer, then click **Next**.
 - Select **Network Printer** if you are accessing your printer through a network. Click **Browse** to search the network and select a printer queue. Then click **Next**.

7. In the **Install PostScript Printer from PPD** dialog box, select the directory and drive for the printer's CD-ROM and the *ADOBEPS4* directory. Select your printer, then click **Next**.
 - Select **Tektronix Phaser 350** if you have the standard version of the printer.
 - Select **Tektronix Phaser 350 600x300** if you have the printer's Extended Features option.

Note *If you are not sure which configuration of the printer you have, the printer's startup page lists this information under **Extended Features: Yes/No**. See page 2-29 for instructions on printing a copy of the printer's startup page.*

8. In the **Local Port Selection** dialog box, select the port you want to use, then click **Next**. (You can configure the port in this dialog box at any time.)
9. In the **Add Printer** dialog box, type in the printer's name, select the printer as default, and decide if you want to print a test page. Click **Next** to continue.
10. If you see the **Different Versions Detected** dialog box, click **Next** to update the files from the printer's CD-ROM.
11. When the installation is finished, the **Tektronix Phaser 350 Properties** dialog box appears. Make selections in the driver, referring to Chapter 3 for more information on printer options.

Setting up the Tektronix driver for Windows 3.1

Packaged with your printer is a *Tektronix Printer Driver for Windows 3.1* floppy diskette. This diskette contains a customized version of the Microsoft printer driver, version 3.58.

1. Start Windows, if it isn't already running.
2. Insert the *Tektronix Printer Driver for Windows 3.1* diskette into your computer's disk drive.
3. Open the **Control Panel** and double-click on the **Printers** icon; the **Printers** dialog box appears.
4. Click the **Add>>** button.
5. In the **List of Printers**, select **Install Unlisted or Updated Printer**.
6. Click the **Install** button.
7. Type in the drive containing the printer's diskette, for example, **A:**, and click **OK**.
8. Select your printer, then click **OK**. The driver software you need is automatically installed.
 - Select **Tek Phaser 350 (TekColor)** if you have the standard version of the printer.
 - Select **Tek Phaser 350 (TekColor) Ext** if you have the printer's Extended Features option.

Note *If you are not sure which configuration of the printer you have, the printer's startup page lists this information under **Extended Features: Yes/No**. You can print a copy of the startup page from the printer's front panel.*

Note *If you see a message that the driver is currently being used and cannot be updated, exit all programs, restart Windows, and try installing the printer again.*

Configuring the driver

1. Open the **Printers** dialog box if it is not still displayed. (From the **Control Panel**, double-click the **Printers** icon.)
2. In the **Printers** dialog box, choose your printer from the list of installed printers.
3. Click the **Set As Default Printer** button if you want to select your printer as the default.
4. Click the **Connect** button; the **Connect** dialog box appears.
5. Select the port your printer is connected to.

The printer's configuration page contains the information you need to set up the printer's port.

Note *You can use the **FILE** port to save a document to a PostScript file instead of sending it to the printer. For more information, see your Microsoft Windows documentation.*

6. Set the **Timeouts**. These options regulate your computer's communications with its printer ports.
 - **Device Not Selected:** Use this text box to change the number of seconds Windows waits before notifying you that a printer is off-line. The default of **15 seconds** is recommended.
 - **Transmission Retry:** On large or multiple page documents you may see an Alert message that the printer is no longer accepting data before the job is completely downloaded to the printer. To minimize the occurrence of this message, you should set this option to a larger value, such as **900 seconds** (15 minutes). Type a value between **45** and **999** in this text box; the default setting is **45 seconds**.
7. Click **OK** to return to the **Printers** dialog box, then click the **Setup** button. A dialog box appears with the name of the printer you selected across the top. Use this dialog box to select paper source, paper size, image orientation, and number of copies.

Note *You may want to set the number of copies from your application because the number of copies in the Setup dialog box remains the same until you change it again. Also, if you are printing multiple pages, make sure the Transmission Retry is set for at least 600 seconds (10 minutes), to avoid unnecessary timeouts.*

8. Click the **Options** button to see the **Options** dialog box; make the following selections:
 - Make sure the **Color** check box is checked **on** to print in color.

- Select one of the **Header** options. The Header contains important PostScript information that must accompany each print job; it is *not* a banner page printed with each job. If the Header is not used, your job does not print. Click one of the following options:
 - Check the **Send Header with Each Job** box to download PostScript header information with each print job.

Or:

- Click the **Send Header** button to save the PostScript header information in the printer. This option makes print files a little smaller and faster than the first option, but you need to click the **Send Header** button every time the printer is turned on or reset.
9. From the **Options** dialog box, click the **Advanced** button to see the **Advanced Options** dialog box. Make sure the **Use PostScript Level 2 Features** check box is checked *on*.

Note *The **Use PostScript Level 2 Features** option affects the print time of bitmapped (raster) images by improving the image transfer time from the computer to the printer, and by improving the image processing time in the printer. This option is only available to applications that use this Tektronix driver with Tektronix PostScript Level 2 printers, such as the Phaser 350. When this box is checked, the **Compress Bitmaps** option is unavailable (grayed out).*

10. Click **OK** to return to the **Options** dialog box.
11. In the **Options** dialog box, click the **Printer Features** button to see the **Tektronix Printer Features** dialog box. Make color correction, print quality, and other selections as desired. Click **OK** to return to the **Options** dialog box.
12. Continue clicking **OK** to return to the **Printers** dialog box, then click **Close**.

Setting up the Adobe PostScript driver for Windows 3.1

Note *The files for this driver are available on the printer's CD-ROM and on the AdobePS 3 Driver diskette.*

If you already have the driver installed and you are only adding the Phaser 350 printer, open the Control Panel, double-click the Adobe driver icon, then continue with Step 5.

If you already have the driver installed and you want to add a printer other than the Phaser 350 printer, open the Control Panel, double-click the Adobe driver icon, then continue with Step 5. Printer PPD files are located in the \WIN95_NT directory on the printer's CD-ROM only.

1. Insert the printer's CD-ROM into your CD-ROM drive, or insert the AdobePS 3 Driver diskette into your disk drive.
2. In the **Program Manager** in Windows 3.1, select **Run** from the **File** menu.
3. At the **Command Line**, do one of the following:
 - **CD-ROM:** Type in the drive the CD-ROM is in, followed by the \ADOBEPS3 directory and the file name *SETUP.EXE*, and click **OK**. For example:

`C:\ADOBEPS3\SETUP`
 - **Diskette:** Type in the drive the diskette is in, followed by the file name *SETUP.EXE*, and click **OK**. For example:

`A:SETUP`
4. When the **README.WRI** dialog box appears, select one of the buttons as desired.
5. In the **PostScript Printer Driver Setup** dialog box, click **Continue** to begin the driver installation. This installer overwrites older versions of the Adobe PostScript driver.

6. A message appears as files are copied to your hard disk. Click the **Restart Windows** button when the installation is complete.
7. When the **Install PostScript Printer from PPD** dialog box appears, select your printer in the **Printer Descriptions Available** list and click **Install**:
 - Select **Tektronix Phaser 350** if you have the standard version of the printer.
 - Select **Tektronix Phaser 350 600x300** if you have the printer's Extended Features option.

8. At the installation successful message, click **OK**.

Refer to your Microsoft Windows NT documentation for details on features in the driver.

Note *The Windows NT 4.0 driver does not support the PhaserMatch™ application.*

These instructions assume a basic familiarity with Windows NT operation and terminology. For additional information about Windows NT, refer to your Microsoft Windows NT documentation.

1. Locate the *Microsoft® Driver for Windows NT™ 3.51 and 4.0 (for i386)* diskette that was shipped with your printer. Insert the diskette into your computer's disk drive.
2. Click the **Start** icon in the taskbar on your screen. In the menu that appears, click **Settings**. In the **Settings** menu, click **Printers**.
3. In the **Printers Folder**, double-click the **Add Printer** icon.
4. From the **Add Printer** menu, follow the **Add Printer Wizard** instructions until the **Manufacturers/Printers** window appears.
5. Click the **Have Disk** button.
6. In the **Install From Disk** dialog box, type in the disk drive location of the printer's diskette, such as **A:**, then click **OK**.

7. A list of Tektronix printers appears. Select your printer in the list, then click **Next**:
 - Select **Tektronix Phaser 350** if you have the standard version of the printer.
 - Select **Tektronix Phaser 350 Extended** if you have the printer's Extended Features option.

Note *If you are not sure which configuration of the printer you have, the printer's startup page lists this information under **Extended Features: Yes/No**. You can print a copy of the startup page from the printer's front panel.*

8. Select the appropriate settings in **Add Printer Wizard**, then click the **Finish** button. When the **Properties** dialog box appears, continue with the following instructions: "Setting up installed options" and "Making default settings."

Setting up installed options

Note *If you are not sure which printer options you have installed, the printer's startup page lists some of this information, such as SCSI hard disks. You can print a copy of the startup page from the printer's front panel.*

1. From the **Properties** dialog box, click the **Device Settings** tab.
2. In the **Device Setting** sheet, scroll to the end of the list to **Installable Options**.
3. Under **Installable Options**, highlight **Optional Lower Tray**.
4. In the box that appears at the bottom of the window, click **Installed**.
5. Select other options you have installed.
6. Click **OK** to return to the **Control Panel**.

Making default settings

1. From the **Properties** dialog box, click the **Device Settings** tab.
2. In the **Device Settings** sheet, locate **Form To Tray Assignment**.
3. Under **Form To Tray Assignment**, highlight the first tray.
4. In the box that appears at the bottom of the window, select the size media you will be using in that tray.
5. Repeat Steps 3 and 4 for each installed tray.
6. Click **OK** to return to the **Control Panel**.

Selecting a printer's Default Document Properties

Note *Document properties set from an application always override document defaults set in the printer's **Document Properties** sheets. However, if an application does not set a document property (such as page orientation or paper size), the printer defaults to the document properties set in the printer's **Document Properties** sheets.*

1. From the Control Panel, open the **Printers** folder.
2. With the right mouse button, click on the printer's icon.
3. With the left mouse button, click on **Document Defaults**.
4. Click the **Advanced** tab to change any printer features, including TekColor color corrections.
5. Click the **Page Setup** tab to see other features.

Setting up a PostScript driver for Windows NT 3.51

This update procedure provides printer page size information for Windows NT 3.51 applications. However, TekColor color corrections and other PostScript Level 2 printer features are *not* supported by the Windows NT 3.51 PostScript driver. Refer to the manuals that were shipped with your printer for instructions on other ways of selecting color corrections. Refer to your Microsoft Windows NT documentation for details on features in the driver.

These instructions assume a basic familiarity with Windows NT operation and terminology. For additional information about Windows NT, refer to your Microsoft Windows NT documentation.

1. Locate the *Microsoft® Driver for Windows NT™ 3.51 and 4.0 (for i386)* diskette that was shipped with your printer. Insert the diskette into your computer's disk drive.
2. From the **Main** window, double-click on the **Print Manager** icon.
3. From the **Printer** menu select **Create Printer**; the **Create Printer** dialog box appears.
4. Under **Driver**, scroll to the end of the list and select **Other**; the **Install Driver** dialog box appears.
5. When prompted, type in the path for the printer's diskette.
6. Under **Printer Driver**, select your printer from the list, then click **OK**.
 - Select **Tektronix Phaser 350** if you have the standard version of the printer.
 - Select **Tektronix Phaser 350 Extended** if you have the printer's Extended Features option.

Note *If you are not sure which configuration of the printer you have, the printer's startup page lists this information under **Extended Features: Yes/No**. You can print a copy of the startup page from the printer's front panel.*

7. When you are returned to the **Create Printer** dialog box, fill in the other fields as desired, then click **OK**; the **PostScript Printer Setup** dialog box appears.
8. Select options in the **PostScript Printer Setup** dialog box. Click **OK** when you are finished.
 - Enabling the **Use Printer Halftoning** option is recommended.
9. When the **Windows NT Setup** dialog box appears, click **Close**.

Installing Adobe Acrobat Reader

1. Insert the printer's CD-ROM into your CD-ROM drive.
2. Do one of the following depending on your system:

Windows 95:

- a. Click the **Start** icon in the taskbar on your screen. In the menu that appears, click **Run**.
- b. In the **Run** window, type in the drive the CD-ROM is in, followed by the `\TOOLS` directory and the file name `ACROREAD.EXE` and click **OK**. For example:

`C:\TOOLS\ACROREAD`

Windows 3.1:

- a. In the **Program Manager** in Windows 3.1, select **Run** from the **File** menu.
- b. At the **Command Line**, type in the drive the CD-ROM is in, followed by the `\TOOLS` directory and the file name `ACROREAD.EXE`, and click **OK**. For example:

`C:\TOOLS\ACROREAD`

3. Follow the on-screen instructions to install Acrobat Reader.

Installing ATM software

Setting up the Phaser 350 printer driver

The Phaser 350 driver is a Tektronix-modified version of Apple's LaserWriter 7.1.2 printer driver. Use the Phaser 350 driver if you are using System Software 6.0.7, or 7.0 and later.

1. Install the printer's software as described on page 2-53. Choose **Easy Install** to install all of the necessary software, or select **Phaser 350 Driver** in the **Custom Install** window.

4. Click on the **Zone** your printer is in. See your network administrator if you have questions.
5. Click on your Phaser 350 printer in the list of printers on the right side of the **Chooser**.
6. Close the **Chooser** by clicking its close box.

Setting up the Adobe PSPrinter Driver

The Adobe PSPrinter driver uses printer-specific PPDs (PostScript Printer Description files) for information on a printer's page sizes, printing options, and media type options. To use the Adobe PSPrinter driver with a Phaser 350 printer, do the following steps. If the printer is busy, it may take some time to complete this set-up procedure; you may want to do this procedure when the printer is idle. You only have to set up a printer once.

Note Refer to the *Adobe PostScript Printer Driver User Guide on the printer's CD-ROM* for more detailed information on the Adobe PSPrinter driver.

1. Install the printer's software as described on page 2-53. Select **Easy Install** to automatically install all of the necessary software, or select **Adobe PSPrinter Driver** and **Printer Descriptions** in the **Custom Install** window.
2. Open the **Chooser**.
3. Select the **PSPrinter** driver icon.
4. Click on the **Zone** your printer is in. See your network administrator if you have questions.
5. Select your printer from the list.
6. Still in the **Chooser**, click the **Setup** button to see a list of options.
7. The correct PPD file should be selected automatically.

If the PPD file is not automatically selected, a dialog box opens showing the location of the PPD files you have installed in the *Printer Descriptions* folder, in the *Extensions* folder, inside your *System Folder*. Click one of the following PPDs and click **Select**:

- Use *TK350171.PPD* with the standard version of the printer.
- Use *TK350691.PPD* with the printer's Extended Features option.

Note *If you are not sure which configuration of the printer you have, the printer's startup page lists this information under **Extended Features: Yes/No**. See page 2-29 for instructions on printing a copy of the printer's startup page.*

8. In the dialog box that appears, select the appropriate items under **Installable Options** then click **OK**.
9. Click the **Chooser's** close box.

Setting up the Phaser 350 GX driver

If you are using Apple Macintosh QuickDraw GX and System Software 7.5 or later, use the Phaser 350 GX driver to print to your Phaser 350 printer.

- The Phaser 350 GX driver works with QuickDraw GX and non-QuickDraw GX applications.
- QuickDraw GX does not work with non-QuickDraw GX printer drivers. If you want to print from non-QuickDraw GX applications with a driver such as the LaserWriter 8.x, you must first disable QuickDraw GX.

1. Install the printer's software as described on page 2-53. Select **Easy Install** to automatically install all of the necessary software, or select **Phaser 350 GX Driver** in the **Custom Install** window.

5. In the **Connect via** field's pop-up menu, select your printer's communication method:
 - The **AppleTalk** option is the standard network connection.

This driver software is available only on the printer's CD-ROM.

Note *During installation, the LaserWriter 8.x driver leaves other versions of the LaserWriter driver (such as 7.x and 6.x) intact, but overwrites an earlier version of the LaserWriter 8.x driver, if one exists.*

1. Install the printer's software as described on page 2-53. Choose **Custom Install**, then select **LaserWriter 8.x Driver** and **Printer Descriptions**.
2. Install the driver:
 - a. In the *PhaserTools* folder on your hard disk, locate the alias to the *LaserWriter 8.x Installer*.
 - b. Double-click on the alias to open the installer application on the printer's CD-ROM
 - c. Follow the on-screen instructions to install the driver.
3. Open the **Chooser**.
4. Select the **LaserWriter 8** driver icon.
5. Click on the **Zone** your printer is in. See your network administrator if you have questions.
6. Select your printer from the list.
7. Still in the **Chooser**, click the **Setup** button to see a list of options.

1. From the **Control Panel**, double-click the **Printers** icon to open the **Printers** dialog box.
2. In the **Printers** dialog box, choose your printer from the list of installed printers.
3. Click the **Setup** button. A dialog box appears with the name of the printer you selected across the top. Use this dialog box to select paper source, paper size, image orientation, and number of copies.

Note *You may want to set the number of copies from your application because the number of copies in the Setup dialog box remains the same until you change it again. Also, if you are printing multiple pages, make sure the Transmission Retry is set for at least 600 seconds (10 minutes), to avoid unnecessary timeouts.*

4. Click the **Options** button to see the **Options** dialog box.
5. Click the **Printer Features** button to see the **Tektronix Printer Features** dialog box. Make color correction, print quality, and other selections as desired.
6. Click **OK** until you return to the **Printers** dialog box, then click **Close**.

Using the Adobe PostScript driver for Windows 3.1

To select printing options, follow these steps:

1. From the **Control Panel**, double-click **Printers**.
2. In the **Printers** dialog box, select the **Tektronix Phaser 350** printer, then click **Setup**. A dialog box appears with the printer's name across the top.
3. Click the following tabs to see printing options; refer to your Windows documentation for more information on tabs and options.
 - Click the **Paper** tab to see media options, such as media sizes, media trays, and media types.
 - Click the **Features** tab to see printer-specific options, such as color corrections.
 - Set the **Timeout settings**.

Not Selected: Type a value of **0**, or between **15** and **999**, in this text box to change the number of seconds Windows waits before notifying you that a printer is off-line. The default is **15** seconds.

Transmission Retry: On large or multiple-page documents you may see an Alert message that the printer is no longer accepting data before the job is completely sent to the printer. When using a shared printer, you should set this option to a larger value, such as **900 seconds** (15 minutes) to avoid these unnecessary timeouts. Type a value between **45** and **999** in this text box; the default setting is **45** seconds.

- Click the **PostScript** tab to see PostScript-related options.
 - In the **Performance Options** field, select the **Use PostScript Level 2 Features** option.

- Click the **Job Control** tab to see print job-related options.
 - The PostScript header contains important PostScript information that must accompany each print job; it is not a banner page printed with each job. If an option is not selected, an error message is displayed on your computer screen and your job does not print. Click one of the following in the **PostScript Header** field:

Select **Download Each Job**. This option downloads PostScript header information with each print job.

Select the **Already Downloaded** option to save the PostScript header information in the printer, then click the **Download** button. This option makes print files a little smaller and faster than the first option, but you need to click the **Download** button every time the printer is turned off or reset.

- For better performance, select the **Binary Mode** option.

Using the Windows NT 4.0 PostScript driver

If you are using Microsoft Windows NT 4.0, first follow the instructions in Chapter 2 to set up a printer driver for a Phaser 350 printer. Then, select TekColor color corrections and other printer features from the Windows NT driver.

Selecting printer options within an application: **Print**

2. Click on the **Properties** button; the **Printer Document Properties** sheet appears.

4. Click the **Page Setup** tab to see other features. This tab displays the same information as the **Document Defaults Properties Page Setup** tab.

Selecting printer options within an application: Page Setup

Note *If changing the Printer Driver settings through Page Setup causes problems with the application you are using, then change the Printer Driver settings through **Print** under the **File** menu, described on page 11.*

1. Select **Page Setup** from the **File** menu; the **Page Setup** dialog box appears.
2. Select **Paper Size** and **Source**.

Note *Selecting **Printer Folder Setting** as the **Paper Source** uses the default setting made under **Document Defaults** in the **Printers** folder. To change this setting, select a different **Source** in **Page Setup**.*

3. Click on the **Printer** button; another **Page Setup** dialog box appears. You can select a different printer here.
4. Click on the **Properties** button; the **Printer Document Properties** sheet appears.
5. Click the **Advanced** tab to change any printer features, including TekColor. This tab displays the same information as the **Document Defaults Properties Advanced** tab.
6. Click the **Page Setup** tab to see other features. This tab displays the same information as the **Document Defaults Properties Page Setup** tab.

Note *Changes to any of these settings overrides the **Default Printer Properties** settings in the **Printers** folder.*

Using the Windows NT 3.51 PostScript driver

If you are using Microsoft Windows NT 3.51, follow the instructions in Chapter 2 to set up a Windows NT 3.51 PostScript driver with a Phaser 350 printer. You can select printer page sizes in the driver for Windows NT 3.51 applications, however, TekColor color corrections and other PostScript Level 2 features are not supported by the Windows NT 3.51 driver. Refer to page 3-25 for instructions on selecting color corrections from the printer's front panel or from downloadable utility files. Refer to your Microsoft Windows NT documentation for details on features in the Windows NT driver.

Printing from DOS

Printing from a workstation

Overview

You can print from a UNIX or VMS workstation through Ethernet, Token Ring, parallel, or serial interfaces. Workstation users can print from any application that generates color PostScript.

Note *If you are printing ASCII files directly to the printer, you will need PCL5 activated on your printer; refer to the on-line manuals on the printer's CD-ROM for instructions.*

To use the TekColor color corrections and other printer features, use one of the following methods:

- PhaserPrint™ software for UNIX workstations functions like a printer driver for selecting printing options, and provides fast screen copy printing.
- PhaserSym™ software and EasyCopy/X for VMS workstations provides proper communication with the printer.
- The menus on the printer's front panel let you select printing options; refer to Chapter 7 for instructions on using the front panel.
- Downloadable utility files let you select printing options; refer to the on-line manuals on the printer's CD-ROM for instructions.

UNIX workstations

For UNIX environments, Tektronix offers the optional PhaserPrint™ software. PhaserPrint software offers driver-selectable printer options and provides fast, raster file and screen copy printing to Tektronix color printers.

VMS workstations

To print from VMS workstations, the optional PhaserSym™ utility, a VMS print symbiont, functions as a driver for selecting printing options, and as a queue manager. PhaserSym software is compatible with DEC workstations running VAX/VMS version 5.0 and later. PhaserSym software communicates over the printer's optional TCP/IP Ethernet interface, and is required for proper communication with the printer.

The optional EasyCopy/X software provides fast raster image printing to Tektronix printers.

Print quality modes

Using the printer drivers provided with your printer, you can select from three print quality modes:

Fast Color Produces the fastest full-color printing on paper at 6 pages per minute (ppm). This print-quality mode is not available for transparency printing. Transparency prints made with this setting are printed using the **Standard** print-quality mode instead.

Standard The default print-quality setting for full-color printing on paper at 4 ppm and transparencies at 2 ppm. Select this print-quality mode when printing transparencies for the most vibrant, saturated colors but less fine detail.

***Enhanced (600 x 300)** Available with the Phaser 350 printer's Extended Features option. For paper printing, select this print-quality mode for the best text quality and the smoothest color blends at 2 ppm. For transparency printing, select this print-quality mode for transparencies containing small text and fine lines.

* If you select **Enhanced (600x300)** mode but do not have the Extended Features option and sufficient memory installed, prints are made in **Standard** mode.

Color corrections

The printer provides TekColor Dynamic Correction software, which consists of the following color correction modes:

Color correction mode	Description
None	No correction made to colors.
Vivid Color	Default setting. Produces the brightest possible colors.
Display	Adjusts color to closely approximate the colors on a standard display screen.
SWOP Press	Specification for Web Offset Publications. Typically used to match U.S. press standards.
Euroscale Press	Used to match equivalent 3M Matchprint® proofs.
Commercial Press	Used to match commercial 3M Matchprint® proofs.
Monochrome	Prints a color image as a monochrome gray scale. Outputs color page masters in black-and-white for photocopying.
Use Printer Setting	Uses the color correction mode specified in the printer's front panel setting rather than any printer driver setting.

Vivid Color, the default color correction mode, is generally recommended for typical office printing.

You can view an approximate sample output of some color corrections at the bottom of the printer's startup page. Refer to "Startup Page" on page 7-6 for more information.

Note *If your printer is networked and you have changed the front panel settings, make sure that you tell other users on the network. Printer settings affect **all** prints made with non-supported drivers.*

All about media

The printer prints on Letter- and A4-size office paper, Tektronix-supplied transparencies, and full-sheet, peel-off label stock (such as Avery 5160). Tektronix premium and standard grades of transparency media are designed to provide optimal image quality and reliable operation. Tektronix premium transparency media offers enhanced ink adhesion and print quality for overhead transparencies.

Note *Tektronix inks and transparencies are formulated for use with this printer to ensure the best print quality and long-term reliability. Tektronix does not guarantee printer performance on non-Tektronix transparency media.*

For information on ordering Tektronix' paper and transparency media, refer to the supplies information sheet included with your printer.

Caution *To avoid damaging your printer, do not use perforated paper, three-holed paper, legal-size paper or envelopes.*

Do not use transparency media intended for ink-jet or thermal-wax printers.

Never attempt duplex (two-sided) printing on any type of media. Ink already present on the media will offset onto the internal paper path, requiring you to perform cleaning procedures.

You can recycle the paper printed on this printer the same way you would recycle paper from any laser printer.

Media size and weight

The standard paper trays, optional transparency trays, the optional Lower Paper Tray Assembly trays and manual feed slot accept two sizes of media: Letter/A-size (8.5 x 11 in.) and A4-size (210 x 297 mm). Refer to “Margins and image area” on page 3-31 for details on the size of the image area.

Margins and image area

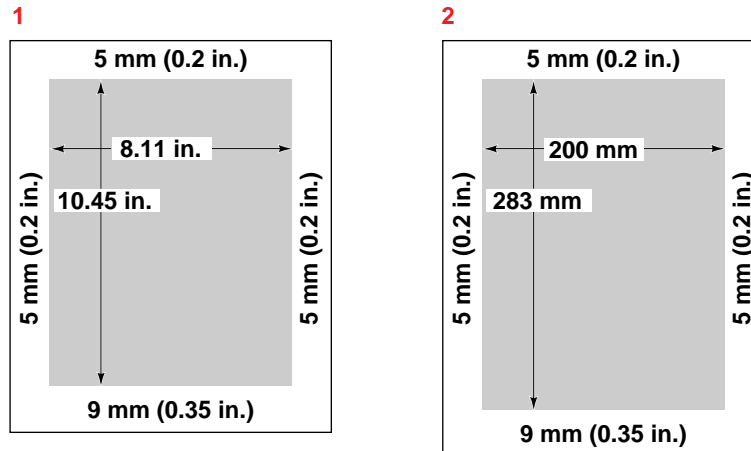
The image area is the part of the media where the image appears. When the printer places an image on the media, the image area is a bit smaller than the actual media size. You may need to adjust the page margins in your application software to match the image area. The printer must be set for the correct size media through the printer driver.

The image area for the Phaser 350 printer is 8.11 x 10.45 in. (Letter-size) and 200 x 283 mm (A4-size). The difference between the image area and the media size for the top margin and side margins is 5 mm (0.2 in.). The bottom margin is 9 mm (0.35 in.).

Note For maximum print speed, set left and right margins to 0.3 in. (7.4 mm) or larger.

The following illustration shows the image area and top, side and bottom margins.

1. Letter-size: 8.5 x 11 in.
2. A4-size: 210 x 297 mm



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Media and ink handling tips

- Keep the media supplies, trays, and ink in covered containers. Dust and dirt can be transferred to the paper or transparency media, resulting in poor print quality.
- Handle transparencies by the edges and with both hands to avoid fingerprints and creases, which can result in poor print quality.
- Place slip sheets between printed transparencies or use a protective cover to prevent contact between transparencies.
- To avoid having the paper stick together, gently fan the paper before loading it into the paper tray.
- Paper that has been sitting out of its sealed wrapper can become distorted, causing paper jams. Keep paper sealed until you are ready to use it for printing.
- Do not use paper that has been creased or wrinkled.

Media trays

Standard paper trays. The printer is shipped with a standard Letter- or A4-size paper tray which holds 200 sheets (slightly less than one-half ream) of paper.

Note *The standard paper trays are designed for use with paper media. You can use a standard paper tray for printing up to 50 transparency sheets. However you must use a Tektronix printer driver to specify **Transparency** as the media type and confirm the print at the front panel. Following these steps ensures the highest transparency print quality.*

Transparency trays. If you print on both paper and transparencies, consider ordering a separate, dedicated transparency tray. This lets you quickly switch between paper and transparency print jobs by simply swapping media trays in the printer. Optional Letter- and A4-size transparency trays have a capacity of 175 sheets (approximately three boxes). Refer to “Optional media trays” on page 8-6 for ordering information.

Lower Paper Tray Assembly. An optional Lower Paper Tray Assembly extends the printer’s capabilities. Its 500-sheet capacity adds to the 200-sheet capacity of the standard paper tray for high-volume printing environments. When the upper tray is loaded with a second media type such as transparencies or letterhead, the printer then supports printing of two media types without the need to swap trays.

Note *The Lower Paper Tray Assembly only accepts paper media; it should not be used with label stock or transparency media.*

Establishing a default media tray (optional)

When you add the Lower Tray Assembly to your printer, you then have the option of selecting which tray (the upper or lower) will be the default media tray for printing. You can set the default media tray selection through the printer's front panel menu or a PostScript utility file. Refer to the printer's CD-ROM for more information on downloading utility files. When using a supported printer driver, explicit driver selections override the printer's default media tray setting.

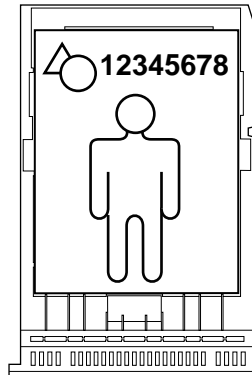
When the Lower Paper Tray Assembly is first installed, the default media tray selection is set to `AutoSelect`. With this selection, the printer automatically switches to the upper tray if the Lower Paper Tray Assembly becomes empty. If a paper tray of the same size exists in the upper tray slot, then printing resumes. However, if the transparency tray is installed, then the printer prompts you to load paper in the Lower Paper Tray Assembly.

Other default media tray selections (`Upper` and `Lower`) let you explicitly set printing from the upper or lower tray with no automatic tray switching capability. This is valuable if you have, for example, common office paper in the Lower Paper Tray Assembly and letterhead in the upper paper tray. You can have the default media tray selection set for printing office paper in the lower tray. When you want to print on letterhead in the upper tray, you will need to change the default media tray setting to `Upper`. (Supported printer driver users can choose between the upper and lower trays directly from the printer driver.)

If you attempt to print transparencies using a non-supported driver, the printer uses the printing mode of the tray (paper) and produces unsatisfactory results. To print transparencies from the upper paper tray, use a supported printer driver and explicitly select **Transparency**, or purchase a dedicated transparency tray. Refer to "Optional media trays" on page 8-6.

Printing letterhead

Letterhead must be loaded face up in the standard paper tray with the bottom edge of the page closest to the paper tray handle.



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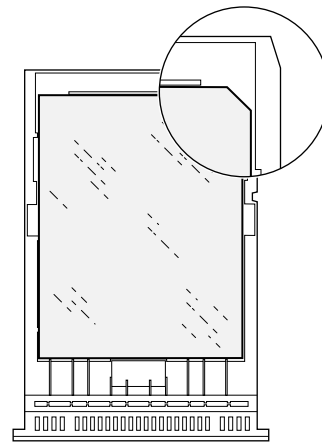
Caution *Some letterhead may be printed using ink that will offset onto printer internal parts during the overprint, requiring you to perform cleaning procedures. Run several test sheets of letterhead to check for letterhead smearing before attempting a large print job.*

Printing transparencies

Tektronix transparency media is recommended for use in this printer, as it provides optimal image quality and reliable printer operation. Tektronix premium transparency media provides enhanced ink adhesion and print quality. Load transparency media in the appropriate Letter- or A4-size paper tray. For best results, Tektronix recommends that you order the optional transparency tray. (Refer to Chapter 8 for ordering information.) A label inside the transparency tray indicates the tray's maximum transparency capacity.

Note *Do not use transparency media intended for ink-jet or thermal-wax printers. For best results, use Tektronix transparency media.*

Tektronix premium transparencies must be loaded face up in the media tray with the notched corner of the sheet in the back-right corner of the tray. Tektronix standard transparency media is not notched and can be loaded into the tray in any orientation.



Transparency quality tips

- Select the **Standard** print-quality mode in the printer driver for the most vibrant, saturated colors on transparencies. Use the **Enhanced (600 x 300)** print-quality mode (Extended Features option) for transparencies containing small text and fine lines.
- Use large type on overheads; 18-point type or larger works well.
- Use yellow or other light colors for text on solid-color backgrounds.
- Place slip sheets between printed transparencies or use a protective cover to prevent contact between transparencies.

Note *Do not load transparencies in the Lower Paper Tray Assembly. To avoid a jam condition, do not re-use transparencies that have been fed through the printer once (for example, after a jam or if the transparency was ejected without being printed).*

1. If you are using the optional transparency tray for printing transparencies, load up to 175 transparencies (approximately three boxes) and install the transparency tray in the printer.

When you print, use a supported printer driver and specify **Transparency** to obtain the correct print mode for transparency media. The printer senses the presence of the transparency tray and prints correctly without further interaction.

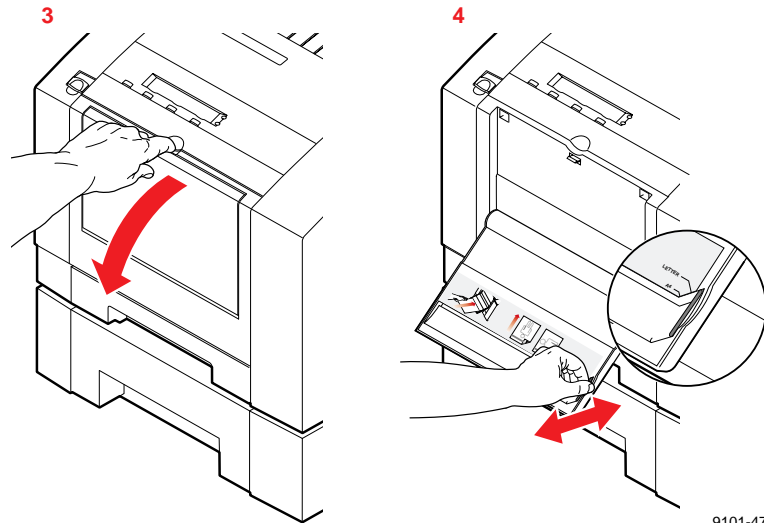
2. If you are using the standard paper tray for printing transparencies, replace the paper in the tray with up to 50 transparency sheets and install the paper tray in the printer.

When you print, use a supported printer driver and specify **Transparency** to obtain the correct print mode for transparency media. The printer senses the mismatch of the transparency media loaded in the paper tray and asks you to confirm the print through the printer's front panel.

Caution *Never attempt two-sided or two-pass printing on any type of media. Ink already present on the media will offset onto the internal paper path, requiring you to perform cleaning procedures.*

Manual feed printing

1. Select **Manual Feed** from a supported printer driver.
2. Click on the **Print** button.
3. Go to the printer and open the manual feed cover using the recessed finger tab.
4. Adjust the guide on the inside of the manual feed cover to match the Letter- or A4-size media you are using.

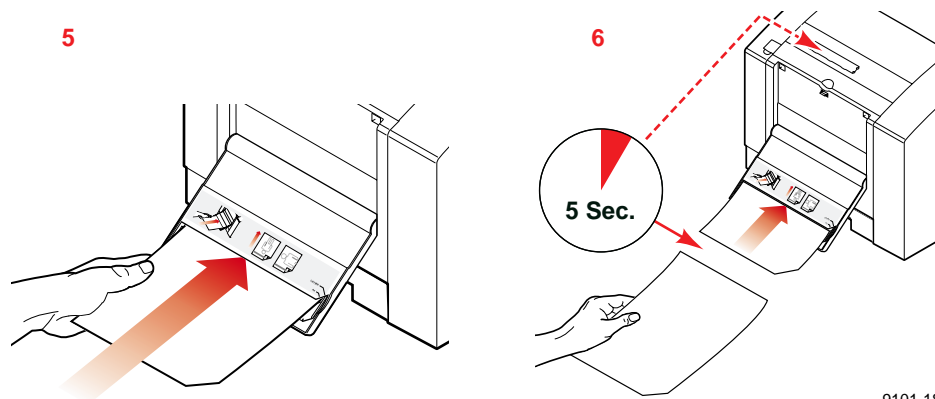

Manual feed letterhead: When you manually feed letterhead, orient the letterhead face down and feed the bottom edge first.

Manual feed transparencies: When you manually feed Tektronix premium transparencies, orient the transparency notch closest to you with the notch on the right side. The standard Tektronix transparency media is not notched.

5. When prompted by the front panel, insert one sheet of paper or transparency media until it stops.
6. After the first sheet enters the printer, wait for the front panel to prompt you again before feeding the next sheet (approximately 5 seconds).



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Note *A jam error will occur if you feed the second sheet of media into the manual feed slot before the front panel prompts you.*

Printer languages: PostScript, HP-GL, PCL5

The printer supports PostScript Level 1 and Level 2, and HP-GL (Hewlett-Packard Graphics Language) printer languages. Additionally, the printer supports the monochrome PCL5 (Printer Command Language) printer language as a separately enabled option. Refer to the CD-ROM or Tektronix' World Wide Web site for details on enabling the PCL printing option.

The default language for the parallel port is PostScript. For information on default language for other interface ports, refer to the *PhaserShare Network Cards and Software System Administrator Manual*.

If you want to print HP-GL or PCL5 files on a port set to PostScript, you must set up that printer port for that type of data or enable Adobe IntelliSelect™ automatic language selection. Refer to the CD-ROM or Tektronix' World Wide Web site for instructions.

If automatic language selection is enabled, you can send PostScript, HP-GL, and PCL5 files (when enabled) to the printer and the printer automatically detects the type of file and prints it. You can change the default language so that the next time you turn on the printer, it is set to receive PostScript, HP-GL, or PCL5 data on a specific port.

The printer has default values for the HP-GL parameters, such as pen color and pen width. However, you can change these values. Refer to the printer's CD-ROM or Tektronix' World Wide Web site for instructions.

Fonts

For general information on fonts, you can request a document catalog from HAL or EuroHAL, Tektronix' automated fax systems. Refer to "Using the automated fax systems" on page 6-2 for instructions on using HAL and EuroHAL.

Resident typefaces (PostScript)

The printer accepts Adobe Type 1 and Type 3 downloadable fonts, TrueType fonts, PCL5 (optionally enabled), and a variety of user-defined fonts. To extend font capability, the printer supports a SCSI-connected external hard disk for storage of additional fonts. Refer to the printer's CD-ROM or Tektronix' World Wide Web site for more information.

The Phaser 350 printer's standard configuration is shipped with a set of 17 resident fonts in these typeface families: Courier, Helvetica, Helvetica Narrow, Times and Symbol.

Resident typefaces (PCL5)

For PCL5 (Printer Command Language) printing (HP Laserjet III emulation), the printer supports Courier, Times, and Universe typefaces in medium, bold, italic medium, and italic bold. Printing of PCL5 files is supported as a separately enabled option.

You can determine if the PCL5 language is enabled for your printer by checking the printer's configuration page. Refer to "Help Pages overview" on page 2-29 for information on printing the configuration page. Refer to the printer's CD-ROM or Tektronix' World Wide Web site for details on enabling the PCL printing option.

Downloading fonts

The fonts resident in the printer are stored in the printer as outlines and are always available for printing. The PostScript interpreter in the printer can also accept and store additional fonts known as downloadable fonts. If you want to print PostScript outline fonts that are not built into the printer, you can transfer or download outline fonts from your computer to the printer. Downloading fonts saves print time if you plan to print several documents or a large document using those fonts.

When you download a font, it is stored in the printer's memory or on a SCSI hard disk attached to the printer. Refer to the printer's CD-ROM for more information on using an external SCSI disk for font storage. You can download as many outline fonts as the printer's memory or hard disk allow. Adding more printer memory expands the number of fonts that can be downloaded to the printer.

The printer accepts Type 1 and Type 3 downloadable fonts including those from Adobe, Agfa, Bitstream, Microsoft, Apple, and many others.

The printer also accepts TrueType downloadable fonts which can be scaled to any point size. TrueType fonts look the same on the screen as they do when printed.

You download a font from a PC or Macintosh the same way you download fonts to any PostScript printer. Follow the documentation that was shipped with your fonts.

Macintosh screen fonts

Note *If you already have these fonts installed on your computer, you don't need to install them again.*

The printer's diskettes and CD-ROM for the standard version of the printer contain screen fonts for the printer's standard 17 fonts. The CD-ROM shipped with the Extended Features option of the printer contains the Adobe Type Manager (ATM) with 69 fonts.

You need to install the screen fonts on your computer if you want to see the printer's standard resident typefaces on the Macintosh screen. If you select a font the printer doesn't have, the Macintosh creates a representative font for printing.

1. Use either the Phaser 350 printer's diskettes or CD-ROM.
 - **Floppy diskettes:** Insert the Printer Software for Macintosh diskette into your computer's disk drive.
 - **CD-ROM:** Insert the Phaser 350 printer's CD-ROM into your computer's CD-ROM drive.
2. Double-click the **Phaser 350 Installer** icon. Click **Continue** until the **Easy Install** window appears.
3. To automatically install the printer's screen fonts and other printer software, click **Install** in the **Easy Install** window.

Or, select **Custom Install** from the pull-down menu (available with the installer on the CD-ROM only). Then select the **Screen Fonts** item, and click **Install**.

Fonts are installed in the *Fonts* folder inside your *System Folder*.

4. Select the printer font you want to use within an application and see the same font on the screen.

Using fonts with Windows

Before printing, you need to make sure the fonts specified in your document are installed in the printer or are set up correctly in Windows. If you request a font in an application that is not resident in the printer, or is not correctly installed in Windows, the text is printed in the Courier typeface. Or, to use fonts that are not resident in the printer, do one of the following:

- Use a font downloader supplied with your font package to download the desired font to the printer.
- Edit your *WIN.INI* file so the Windows driver automatically downloads the fonts you need as part of a print job. Refer to your Microsoft Windows documentation for details on this procedure.

Some font packages automatically update the PostScript port entries in your *WIN.INI* file when you reinstall the fonts. Refer to the font package's documentation for instructions.

For more information on using fonts with Windows, request a document catalog from HAL or EuroHAL, the Tektronix automated fax systems. Refer to "Using the automated fax systems" on page 6-2 for instructions on using these systems.

Printing font samplers

Printing a font sampler from a Macintosh

You can print a sample of the printer's resident fonts by downloading the *Fonts Sampler* utility file to the printer.

Note *If you are using QuickDraw GX and System 7.5, you can print the fonts sampler from the Tektronix Phaser 350 GX printer driver.*

1. Install the sampler and utility files from either the Printer Software for Macintosh diskette or the printer's CD-ROM; see Chapter 2 for details.
2. Select the appropriate printer in the **Chooser**.

3. Locate the *LaserWriter Utility* in the *PhaserTools* folder on your hard disk, and double-click its icon to start the application.
4. Choose **Download PostScript File** from the **Utilities** menu.
5. Select the *Font Sampler* file from the list, then click **Open**. (This file was installed in the *Samplers* folder inside the *PhaserTools* folder.)
6. If no output is returned by the printer, the *LaserWriter Utility* displays a dialog box; click **OK** to continue.

Printing a font sampler from a PC

You can print a sample of the printer's resident fonts by downloading the *FONTS.PS* utility file to the printer.

1. Locate the *FONTS.PS* file in the *SAMPLERS* directory either on the printer's CD-ROM or the Printer Software for Windows diskette.
2. Copy the *FONTS.PS* file to your hard disk or use the file directly from the CD-ROM.
3. Use one of the following methods to send the *FONTS.PS* file to the printer:
 - **PC users:** Use the DOS **COPY** command to send the file to the printer. (Windows 3.1 users can also use the **Copy** command in the **File Manager**.)
 - **Workstation users:** Send the file to the printer as you would any PostScript file.

Working with color

Whether you are producing color reports, memos, graphs, charts, overhead transparencies for presentations, color handouts, or design comps, there are a few things to keep in mind when using color.

- A large area of color looks more saturated (brighter) than a small area of the same color.
- A color looks brighter against a dark background than it does against a white background.
- Colors look different due to the background color or to the surrounding colors.
- The appearance of a color varies with the type and amount of light, for example fluorescent lighting versus sunlight.

General guidelines

- Keep a document or design simple and consistent.
- Select colors that look good together and that reinforce your message.
- Check your application for standard palettes to get you started.
- Use a color scheme of five or six shades, and in a series of images, use the colors in a consistent manner throughout the series.
- Use color to highlight the most important information, such as a bar or pie segment in a chart or graph.
- Use color to show relationships between objects, such as a range of values. Objects with a similar meaning or value should be in similar colors.
- Use color as graphic elements in the design of newsletters, logos, and brochures.
- Avoid red and green combinations; these colors are hard for people with red/green color blindness to distinguish.

TekColor corrections — making the best selection

The printer's TekColor color correction options provide simulations of different color devices. Follow these basic guidelines so that the printer accurately reproduces the colors you want on your prints.

- For typical business and office printing, select the **Vivid Color** option before printing.
- For engineering and scientific imaging applications, try printing with the **Simulate Display** option.
- For graphic arts purposes, there are three printing press standards to choose from: **SWOP Press** (Specifications for Web Offset Publications), **Commercial Press** and **Euroscale Press**.

Color corrections can be selected from printer drivers, set in the printer with downloadable utility files, or set from the printer's front panel.

TekColor color corrections are performed in the printer. To use ColorSync color matching on a Macintosh, or to use host color correction in Windows 95, refer to the printer's CD-ROM or Tektronix' World Wide Web site for additional information.

Note *TekColor color corrections do not affect colors specified in the PostScript Level 2 international color standard CIE XYZ developed by the Commission Internationale de l'Eclairage (International Commission on Illumination).*

Deciding which color correction to use

Color printers and computer display screens produce color differently. Printers use the subtractive primaries CMYK (cyan, magenta, yellow, and black), and produce color when light is reflected off the paper. Computers use the additive primaries RGB (red, green, blue) with a light-emitting CRT screen. The printer and the computer screen each have a different range of possible colors they can produce, with some overlap between them.

Software application packages specify color in different ways, for example as CMYK or RGB, or they may give you a choice. Get to know your applications so you can work more efficiently.

The TekColor color correction options are available for a finer degree of control over color. Since no single color correction option can address all uses, refer to the following table for the description that best fits your printing situation, and try the suggested color correction.

Printing objective or problem	Color correction to use
Turn off all color corrections	None
Using PANTONE Colors	
Brightest, most vibrant colors	Vivid Color
Overhead transparency presentations	
Blue colors are printing too purple	
Colors are washed out or faded

* For other ways of matching the screen's colors, use ColorSync color matching on a Macintosh or use host color correction in Windows 95 (refer to the printer's CD-ROM or Tektronix' World Wide Web site for more information).

Color correction descriptions

Turning off all color corrections

If you do not want to use any TekColor color corrections, you can specify no corrections from a supported driver, or with utility files, or from the printer's front panel. Select **None** when you are doing the following:

- Using applications that do their own color adjusting
- Using ColorSync on a Macintosh or host color correction in Windows 95
- Printing PANTONE Colors

Printing the brightest colors and a truer blue

The **Vivid Color** option is the best choice for typical office printing. This option also makes printed blue appear less purple by reducing the amount of magenta used to print blue colors. Other colors in the cyan-blue-purple-magenta range in the image are also adjusted to compensate for the adjusted blue. Colors in the red-orange-yellow-green range are not affected. This selection is good for making presentation graphics, such as overhead transparencies, and for bright-looking colors that don't need to match the screen's colors or printing press colors.

Vivid Color adjusts CMYK colors using a method that adds black to other components. This option prints more saturated (darker) colors and may be useful for printing overhead transparencies for presentations from some applications, such as CorelDRAW!. Use this option if you have specified a color in the CMYK system, *and* the color has a black component, *and* the color appears lighter than you expected when printed.

Simulating display screen colors

The Simulate Display option makes printed colors approximate the colors on a standard display screen. This selection should improve the screen-to-printer color accuracy for most applications that don't perform their own color corrections. This selection is best for applications that define colors as RGB (red, green, blue), HLS (hue, lightness, saturation), or HSB (hue, saturation, brightness).

Closely match printing press colors

There are three printing press color correction options. Each press option conforms to a different printing standard. Use a press option if you are previewing work for a four-color job to be printed on a printing press. These options simulate a four-color commercial printing press, *not* solid spot colors, such as PANTONE Colors.

Note *If you are selecting PANTONE Colors in your application, use the **None** option; see page 4-6 for details. Also, use the **None** option with other color management systems, such as EfiColor.*

Printing press color corrections

Press option	Inks	Base (paper)	Target match (equivalent 3M Matchprint®)

Printing in gray scale

The **Monochrome** option prints your color image as a monochrome gray scale (shades of gray between black and white). Use this option to print page masters for photocopying in black-and-white.

Using the printer's current color defaults

The **Use Printer Setting** option is available only in the supported drivers. This option sends no color correction information to the printer. It uses the current default in the printer to process colors for printing. The printer's default can be one of the following:

- Any option selected in the **TekColor Corrections** menu on the printer's front panel.
- One of the color correction utility files sent to the printer.

Using simple color conversions

The following utility files use Adobe's standard color conversions to tell the printer what type of output device you want it to simulate:

- *Raw CMYK Colors (RAWCMYK.PS)*: Converts all colors (CMYK, RGB, grays) to CMYK colors. Use this file if your application specifies colors as CMYK (cyan, magenta, yellow, and black). This file lets you control the CMYK output of the printer's colors without using any TekColor color corrections.
- *Raw RGB Colors (RAWRGB.PS)*: Converts all colors (CMY, CMYK, grays) to RGB colors. Use this file if your application specifies colors as RGB (red, green, and blue). This file lets you control the CMY output of the printer's colors without using any TekColor color corrections.

Note *Refer to the on-line documentation on the printer's CD-ROM for instructions on installing and using the utility files.*

Special considerations

If your Phaser 350 printer is shared on a network

Another user may use the downloadable color correction utility files, or the printer's front panel, to change the printer's default color correction setting. If this situation occurs, the prints you make through a non-supported driver may not print as expected. Refer to "Sharing the printer on a network" on page 6-39 for details on how the color corrections interact with the driver settings for either supported or non-supported drivers.

Application color corrections

Some applications perform color corrections to improve screen-to-printer color matching. The TekColor color correction options in the supported drivers adjust colors in the printer after the application has performed its color corrections.

- If the application uses CIE (Commission Internationale de l'Eclairage) colors, the TekColor corrections will *not* be applied.
- If you select a TekColor color correction option in a driver other than **None**, the selection may override some application features.
- If you try one of the TekColor color correction options in a supported driver and the printed results are not what you expected, then select the **None** option and try reprinting your image.
- Select the **None** TekColor color correction option in a supported driver if you are using ColorSync color matching on a Macintosh or host color correction in Windows 95 (refer to the printer's CD-ROM or Tektronix' World Wide Web site).

If you are using an unsupported driver

If you are not using one of the printer drivers shipped with the printer, or another PPD-driven driver, then use the downloadable utility files or the printer's front panel to select color corrections.

Printing and using the color sampler charts

You can print color sampler charts from your printer to see how the colors, as specified from within an application, will look when printed. Having a pre-printed sample of each color can help you save time in selecting the right color for your use.

The printer's color sampler files are available from a variety of sources, according to the following table:

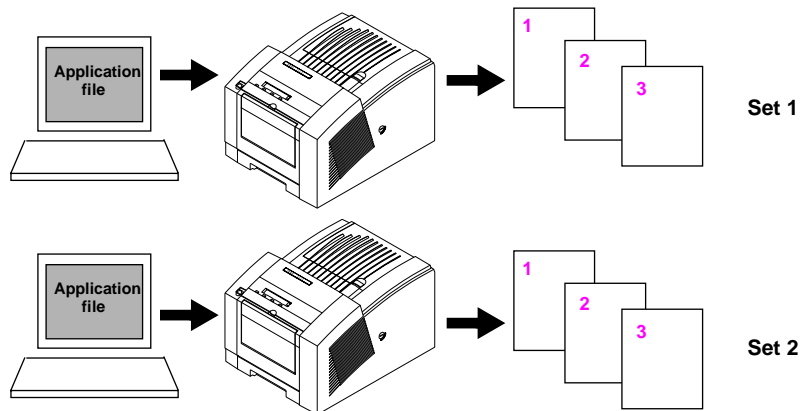


Using the Quick Collate option

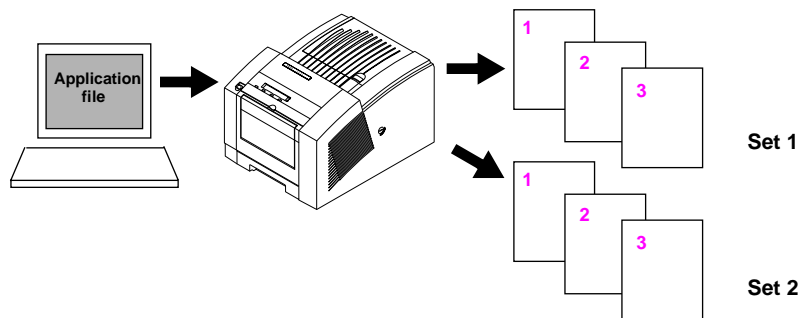
The **Quick Collate** option in the supported drivers performs document collation *in the printer*. This is faster than the collate option that exists in some applications because applications send each page to the printer in sequence, as many times as necessary to provide the requested number of copies. With the Phaser 350 printer's **Quick Collate** option, the job is sent *only once*, and then multiple collated sets are produced *by the printer*.

Note *The **Quick Collate** feature requires that the printer be configured with the Extended Features option. The printer must also be connected to a specific external SCSI hard disk before collation is possible. Refer to "Optional media trays" on page 8-6 for ordering information.*

Phaser 350 Printer Quick Collate option

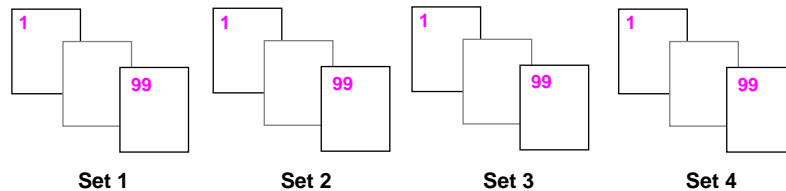


The number of pages that can be collated at one time depends on these factors:

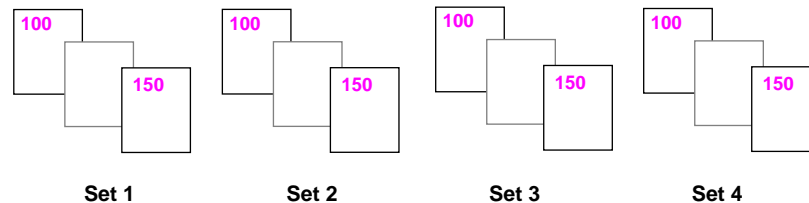
- The number of hard disks attached to the printer.
- Complexity of the pages to be collated.

According to these factors, the printer collates in sequential sets as many pages as will fit in the available disk space. For example, you have a 150-page job and you request 4 copies. Because the print job is very complex, all of its description will not fit on the hard disk. In this case, the printer divides the job into two segments and prints in this manner:

❶ 4 sets of pages 1 through 99



❷ 4 sets of pages 100 through 150



Quick Collate and the Check Print option

When you use the Phaser 350 printer's **Quick Collate** option in combination with the **Check Print** option, only the first page of the first set is printed before pausing for review.

Previewing with Check Print

This feature is available only with the printer's Extended Features option. When sending a multiple-page file to the printer through the driver, you can select **Check Print** to preview the first page of the job and determine if the job is printing as expected before proceeding with the remainder of the job. This is especially useful when printing a large job.

The ability to access **Check Print** from the driver is enabled and disabled in the printer's front panel. You can also set the timeout in the front panel (the timeout is the amount of time the printer will wait after sending the first page of a file, before it continues with the remainder of the job).

By default, access to **Check Print** is enabled, with a default timeout of 5 minutes.

Refer to "Front panel menu map" on page 7-5 for information on navigating the front panel menus. Use the following instructions to select the **Check Print** option in the printer driver:

1. Select **Check Print** in a supported driver:
 - **Windows 95 PostScript driver:**
Select **Check Print** options in the **Printer features** field in the **Device Options** tab options.
 - **Adobe PS3 driver for Windows 3.1:**
Select **Check Print** options in the **Features** tab options.
 - **LaserWriter 8.x driver:**
Select the **Check Print** option in the **Options** dialog box available by clicking the **Options** button in the **Print** dialog box.
 - **Phaser 350 driver:**
Select the **Check Print** option in the **TekColor Options** dialog box available by clicking the **TekColor** button in the **Print** dialog box.
 - **Phaser 350 GX driver:**
Select the **Check Print** option in the **TekColor** printing extension in the **Print** dialog box (or in the **Printer Driver Defaults** dialog box available from the **Printing** menu).

2. Check your first print. At the **Check Print** message on the printer's front panel, press one of the buttons:
 - **Reprint:** Reprints the first page, then the printer pauses again for the duration of the selected timeout or until you press one of the buttons.
 - **Cancel:** Cancels the print job.
 - **Continue:** Continues printing the entire print job.

Using Image Smoothing

Image Smoothing blends the adjacent colors in an image so that color transitions are less noticeable. Image smoothing is typically used when the image being printed is at a lower resolution than the printer's output resolution. For example, printing an image downloaded from the World-Wide Web at 72 dpi using the printer's **Standard** print-quality mode (300 dpi). Images printed using Image Smoothing will appear with less sharp detail but with smoother color transitions. Image Smoothing is not recommended for printing 300-dpi or 600-dpi images.

There are two ways of selecting Image Smoothing:

- In a supported printer driver, check the **Image Smoothing** box *on*.
- Download a PostScript utility file to the printer to turn on Image Smoothing. Use the following utility files for your computer type:

Macintosh file name	PC file name
<i>Image Smoothing On</i>	<i>SMOOTHON.PS</i>
<i>Image Smoothing Off</i>	<i>SMOOTHOFF.PS</i>

Refer to the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM for instructions on downloading utility files.

Caring for Your Printer

Overview

This chapter describes the following topics to help you care for the printer and keep it in peak operating condition:

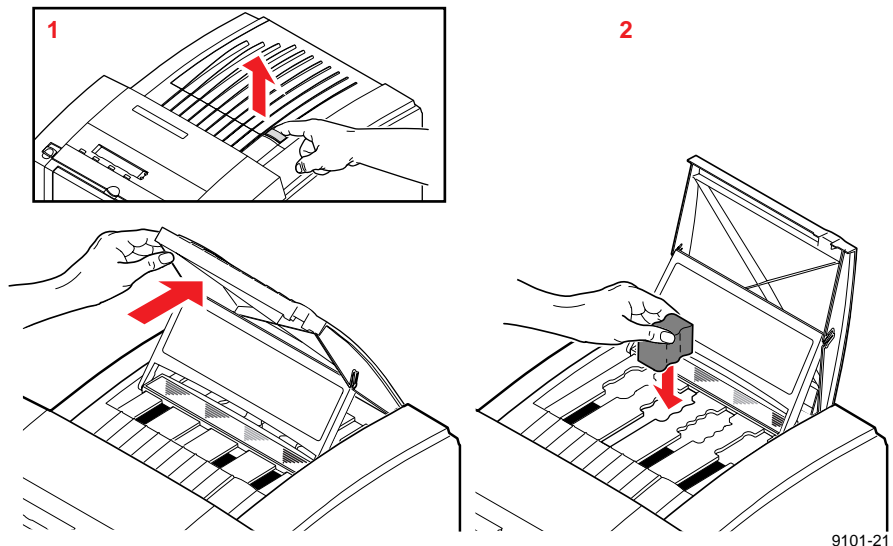
- **Adding ink**
Add ink when the ink level drops to one-half stick. The front panel displays an `Ink Low` message telling you when to add ink.
- **Emptying the waste tray**
Empty the excess ink from the waste tray when a front panel message tells you that the waste tray is full or anytime you remove the maintenance tray.
- **Replacing the maintenance tray**
Replace the maintenance tray when a front panel message tells you that the maintenance tray is low, approximately every 12,500 prints.
- **Cleaning the printer**
Describes how to clean the printer to solve specific print problems: light stripes or missing colors, ink smears on prints, and problems picking paper or transparencies from the media tray.
- **Moving the printer**
Describes the steps you must take to properly move the printer from one location to another.

Adding ink

Approximate time to complete: 1 minute

The printer is shipped already loaded with Phaser 340/350 ColorStix solid-ink sticks. The front panel displays a message telling you when the printer is low on ink, giving you time to reorder. When the printer is out of ink, it displays an *Out of Ink* message. Add up to three ink sticks of each color to the printer before continuing to print.

1. Open the top cover.
2. Drop the appropriate color Phaser 340/350 ColorStix ink stick into the ink loading bin that appears low. Each ink stick is uniquely shaped to fit into the correct ink-loading bin.



3. After loading the appropriate color ink stick, a front panel message directs you to close the top cover.

The print-quality setting and ink coverage per print affect the printer's ink consumption. For typical office document printing using the printer's **Fast Color** print-quality mode, you'll use one of each color ColorStix ink stick to print approximately 1250 pages. To reorder additional ink sticks, contact your local dealer or, in the United States, call Tektronix at **1-800-835-6100** to locate a dealer near you.

★ Free Black ColorStix Ink: Three Phaser 340/350 ColorStix Black ink sticks are shipped free of charge with every order of Cyan, Magenta or Yellow ColorStix Ink. To order Black ColorStix ink separately in the United States, call Tektronix at 1-800-835-6100.

Ink handling tips

- To ensure optimum print quality and best performance, leave the printer turned on overnight and during weekends. This reduces cleaning cycles which consume ink.
- Keep ink sticks clean by storing them in their original containers until you are ready to use them.
- The ColorStix ink sticks will break if dropped; handle them with care.

Caution *Do not load used ink into the printer. Reusing waste ink ruins the printhead and invalidates the printer's warranty.*

Discard broken ink sticks. Loading broken pieces of ink sticks can cause the ink-loading system to jam.

Use only Phaser 340/350 ColorStix ink sticks. The Phaser 350 printer cannot be used with solid-ink ColorStix intended for other printers.

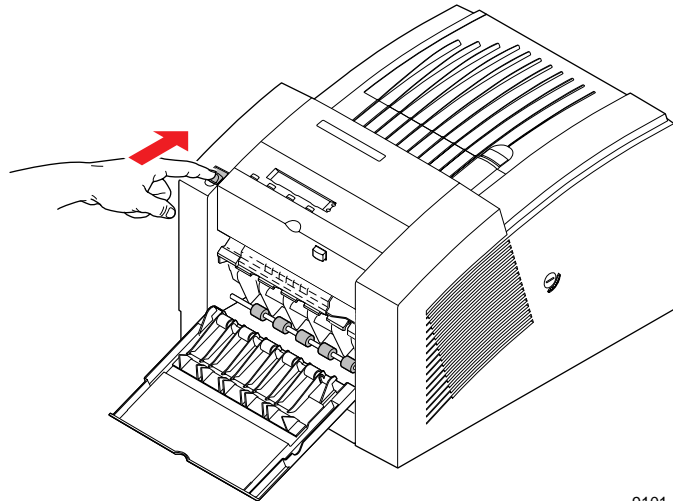
Emptying the waste tray

Approximate time to complete: 3 minutes

The waste tray fits inside the maintenance tray which is located behind the front cover. You should empty the waste tray anytime you remove the maintenance tray or when the front panel displays the following message:

Waste Tray Full
Open Front Cover

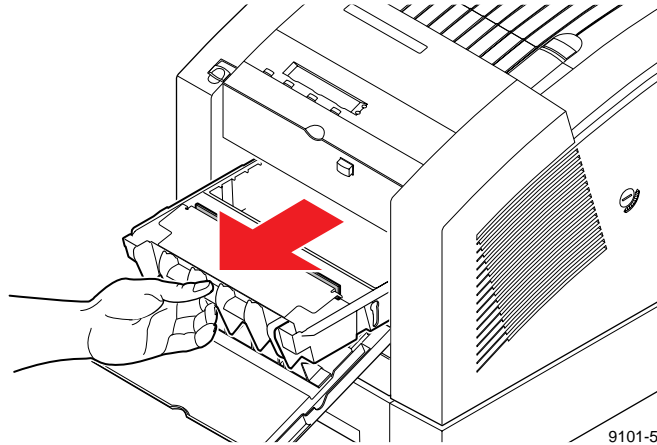

Note *Once the maintenance tray has been partially used, it will leak drum fluid if tipped. Place the maintenance tray on a flat surface after removing it from the printer. Contact with the drum fluid poses no known health risk. Refer to “MSDS for silicone oil” on page 9-6 for more information.*

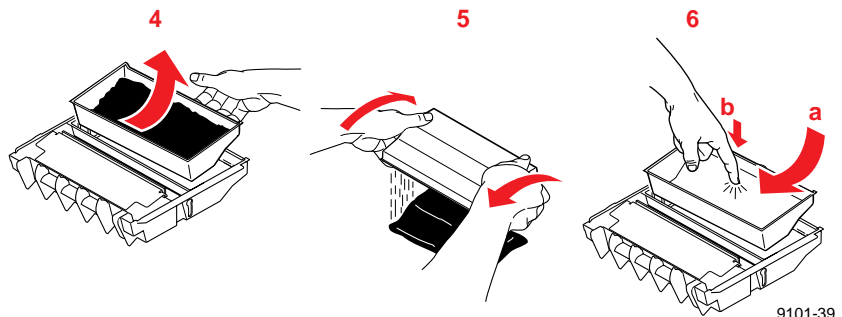

4. Lift one corner of the waste tray handle to release it from the maintenance tray; remove the waste tray from the maintenance tray.
5. Empty the contents of the waste tray by twisting it. Used ink is nontoxic; it can be treated as normal office waste.

Each time you remove the waste tray to empty waste ink, be sure to empty the waste tray completely before replacing it in the maintenance tray.

Caution *Do not load used ink into the printer. Reusing waste ink ruins the printhead and invalidates the printer warranty.*

6. Replace the waste tray in the maintenance tray.
 - a. Place the side opposite the handle into the maintenance tray first.
 - b. Press down firmly in the center of the waste tray to lock it into place. Make sure the waste tray is fully seated in the maintenance tray.



7. Replace the maintenance tray in the printer.

Note *To prevent media jams at the media tray, be sure to push the maintenance tray into the printer until both sides latch in place.*

8. Close the front cover.

Replacing the maintenance tray

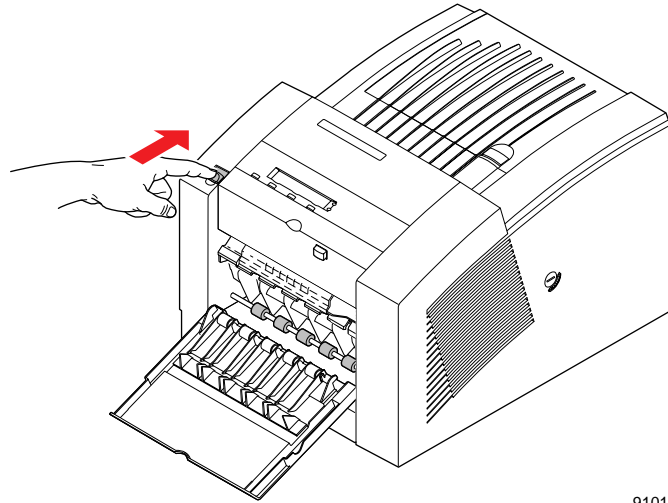
Approximate time to complete: 1 minute

The printer uses the maintenance tray, located inside the printer behind the front cover, prior to each printing and during cleaning operations. A front panel message tells you when the maintenance tray is low, allowing you to make a minimal number of prints before the tray is depleted. Install a new maintenance tray to continue printing. Each replacement maintenance tray has a print capacity of approximately 12,500 prints. To avoid printing delays, keep an extra maintenance tray available for use in the printer.

Note *There is a 15-minute warm-up period required after replacing the maintenance tray.*

To order a maintenance tray (Tektronix order number 436-0294-03), contact your local dealer or, in the United States, call Tektronix at **1-800-835-6100**.

1. Open the front cover.

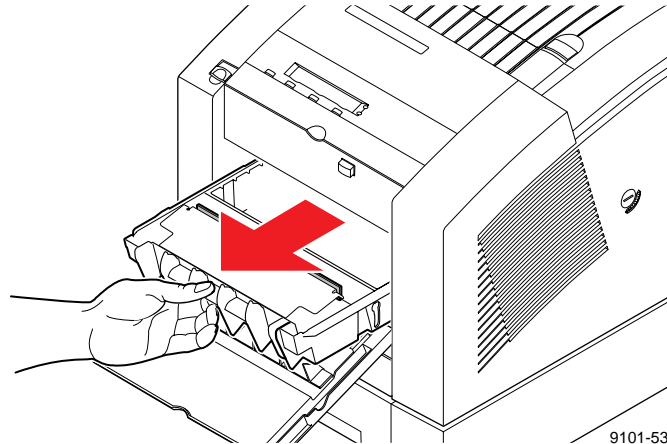

2. When you open the front cover, the following message appears:

Caution Hot Surfaces
Replace Maintenance Tray

3. Grasp the maintenance tray by the front edge and lift up while sliding it out of the printer.



Note *Once the maintenance tray has been partially used, it leaks drum fluid if tipped. Never ship a partially used maintenance tray. Contact with the drum fluid poses no known health risk. Refer to "MSDS for silicone oil" on page 9-6 for more information.*

4. Install a new maintenance tray in the printer.

Note *Be sure to push on both sides of the maintenance tray to latch it firmly into the printer.*

5. Close the front cover and wait for the printer to warm-up.
6. To prevent leaking, seal the used maintenance tray in the plastic bag from the new (replacement) maintenance tray. Treat the used maintenance tray as normal office waste.

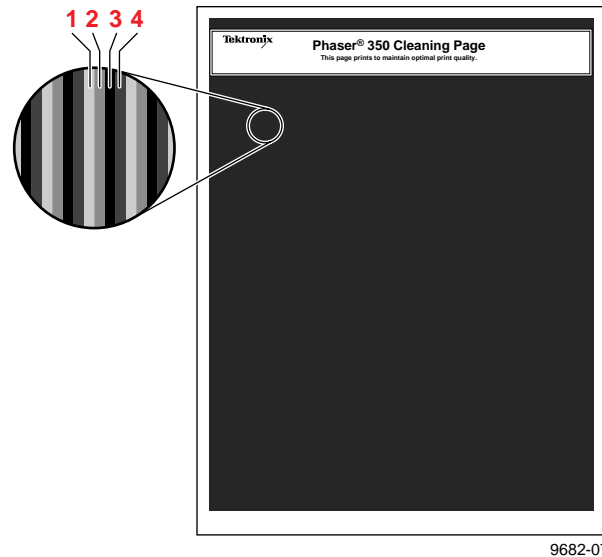
Cleaning the printer

Periodically cleaning the printer keeps it in peak operating condition. Automatic cleaning procedures to cure most problems are available through the front panel by pressing the **Clean** button. When necessary, the front panel guides you through steps to perform cleaning procedures. When appropriate, the printer offers to print instructions detailing the cleaning procedure.

Cleaning pages

The printer occasionally prints a cleaning page as part of a self-maintenance operation. This helps the printer maintain the highest quality printing possible. You can clean the printer anytime you see light stripes on your prints by running the **Clean:Light Stripes** cleaning procedure from the front panel; see page 5-14 for instructions. Discard the cleaning page as normal office waste. To change the cleaning page source, see page 7-9.

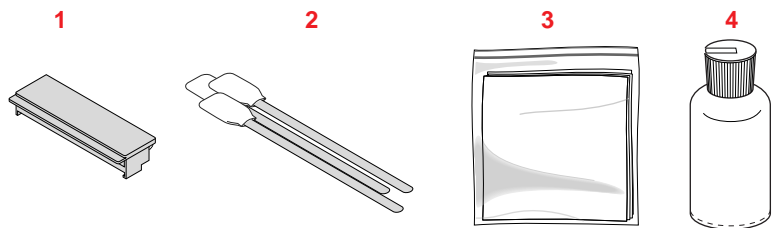

Cleaning supplies

When you receive your new printer, you receive these cleaning supplies:

1. Cleaning tray
2. Foam swabs
3. Lint-free wipes (dry)
4. Plastic bottle for dispensing isopropyl alcohol



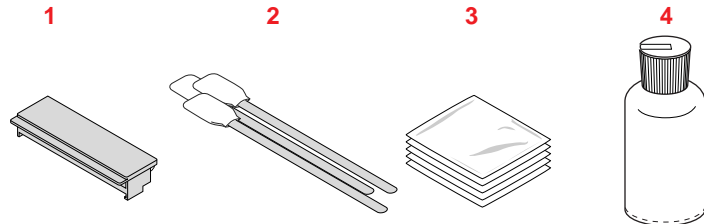
Some cleaning procedures require you to use cloth wipes or swabs saturated with isopropyl alcohol. Since shipping regulations prohibit supplying alcohol or presoaked cleaning materials with the printer, you must supply 90% pure isopropyl alcohol (available at pharmacies). You can obtain pre-soaked alcohol wipes by ordering a separate cleaning kit from Tektronix or by ordering them in packs of 10 (Tektronix order number 006-7824-01).

Reordering cleaning kit supplies

To reorder the cleaning kit (Tektronix order number 016-1341-00), contact your dealer or local Tektronix office. In the United States, call: **1-800-835-6100**, or order by fax: **(503) 682-2980**.

When you order the cleaning kit, you receive these items:

1. Cleaning tray
2. Foam swabs
3. Lint-free wipes (isopropyl alcohol-saturated)
4. Plastic bottle for dispensing isopropyl alcohol

Note *You can order alcohol-saturated wipe packets separately in packs of 10 (Tektronix order number 006-7824-01).*

Using isopropyl alcohol

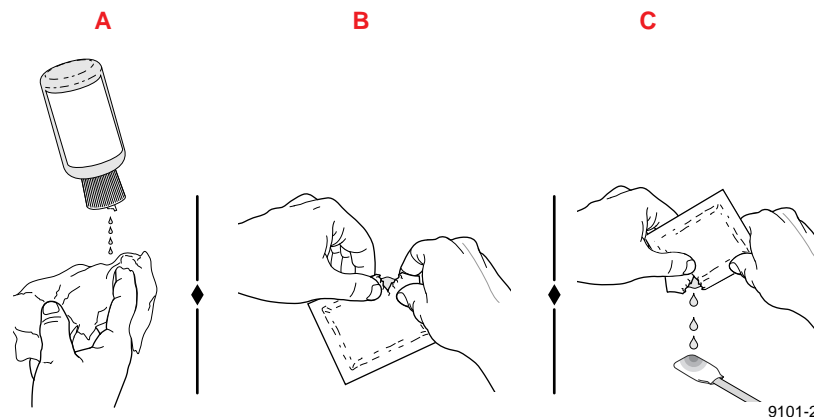
In general, it is best to use the purest isopropyl alcohol (99%) available to you. You can use 90% pure isopropyl alcohol, but if you do, you must wait after cleaning to make sure that printer parts are completely dry. 99% isopropyl alcohol dries quickly; 90% isopropyl alcohol may take several minutes to dry.

Caution Do not use **rubbing alcohol** because it can contain water and oils that leave undesirable residue on the printer parts. Never use **water** to clean the printer's internal components. Failure to follow these instructions may invalidate your printer's warranty.

Whenever the cleaning instructions refer to a *lint-free cloth moistened with isopropyl alcohol* (A), you can substitute a *pre-soaked alcohol cloth* (B). When the cleaning instructions direct you to use an alcohol-soaked swab, you can use the extra alcohol in a pre-soaked alcohol cloth packet to moisten the swab (C).

Warning Alcohol is flammable; keep alcohol-soaked cloths and swabs away from hot surfaces.

The reorder cleaning kit (order number 016-1341-00) includes these pre-soaked alcohol cloth packets.



Identifying cleaning solutions

Cleaning procedures listed in this chapter are referenced by the type of printing problem your printer may be experiencing. Use the following tables to help identify cleaning solutions for these printing problems.

Light stripes or missing colors

Problem type	Solution
Missing or light-colored stripes on prints.	Refer to "Cleaning for light stripes: printhead" on page 5-14.

Ink smears or random streaks

Problem type	Solution
Ink smears on the front, back or edges of a page.	Refer to "Cleaning for ink smears and transfix problems: internal paper path" on page 5-17.
Oil (drum fluid) on top edge of print.	Refer to "Cleaning for jams and ink smears: paper-feed rollers" on page 5-19.

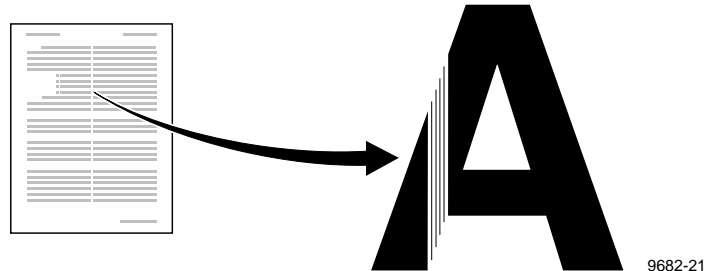

Cleaning for light stripes: printhead

Approximate time to complete: 3-10 minutes

If your prints have 1/10 in. (2.5 mm) lengthwise stripes that are the wrong color or have missing colors, you can correct the problem by cleaning the printhead. The printer automatically executes a printhead cleaning sequence when you run the `Clean:Light Stripes` routine from the front panel.



1. When the printer is on and the Ready message or the printer's name appears, press the **Clean** button. The printer displays the first selection in the menu:

```
Clean:Light Stripes  
<---- Clean Test
```

2. Press the **Clean** button once again.
3. A series of front panel messages indicate the condition of the printer as it progresses through a sequence of automatic cleaning routines. The printer outputs a cleaning page at the end of the cleaning sequence that you may discard as normal office waste.
4. When the cleaning sequence is completed, the printer displays the following message:

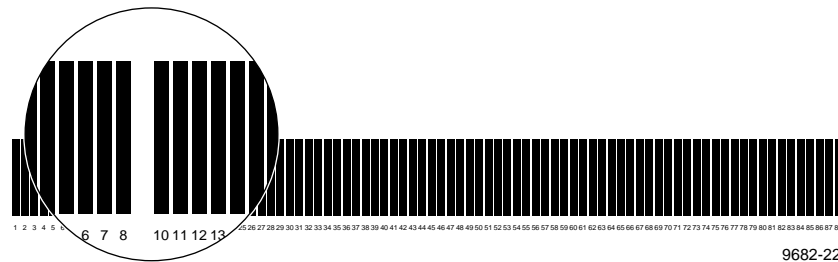
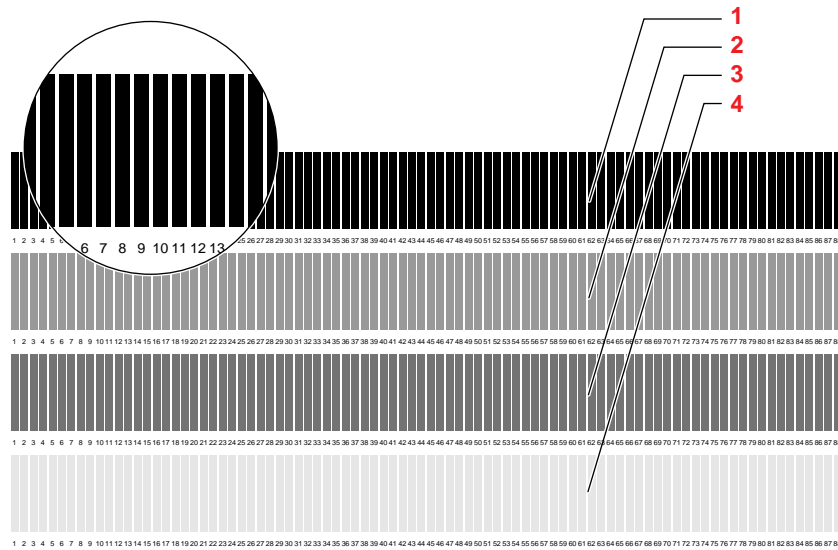

Clean:Light Stripes  
<---- Clean Test
```

- To confirm that the problem has been corrected, press the **Test** button to print a test page. Check for any missing color bars on the test page. The following illustration shows a correct test print, and an example of a test print with a missing color bar.

If your test print looks like the first example, go on to Step 8 to end this procedure.


If your test print looks like the second example with a missing color bar, go on to Step 6 to perform the cleaning procedure again.

- 1 Black 2 Cyan 3 Magenta 4 Yellow



6. If one or more of the color bars are still missing, repeat the cleaning sequence by pressing the **Clean** button once again. When cleaning ends, the printer outputs a cleaning page that you may discard as normal office waste.

If the second cleaning sequence does not cure the light stripes or missing colors problem, you can press the **Clean** button for a third time to repeat the cleaning sequence.

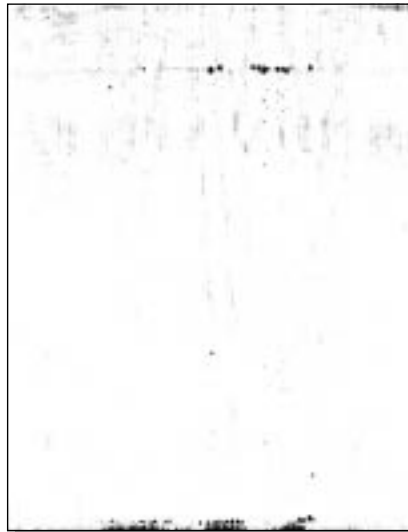
7. If your prints still have color stripe problems after the third cleaning sequence, turn the printer off for at least 12 hours to allow the ink to solidify. Turning the printer on again after it has completely cooled down automatically purges ink.
8. If your prints still have color stripe problems, service may be required.
9. Return the printer to normal operation by pressing the  button until the Ready message appears.

Cleaning for ink smears and transfix problems: internal paper path

Approximate time to complete: 3-6 minutes

If your prints have stray ink marks on the front or the back, or the media is wrapping around the black transfix roller inside the exit cover, you can correct the problem by cleaning the printer's internal paper path surfaces. The printer automatically feeds 10 sheets of paper through the print path to collect stray ink particles when you run the `Clean: Ink Smears` routine from the front panel.

Sample ink smear: internal paper path

Caution *Always use clean sheets of paper to clean the paper path. Do not reuse cleaning sheets. High-grade, heavier papers, such as 32 lbs. (120 g/m²) Bond, works best.*

Do not attempt duplex (two-sided) printing on any type of media. Ink already present on the media offsets onto the internal paper path, requiring you to perform cleaning procedures.

1. Load the upper media tray with sheets of clean, high-grade paper.
2. When the printer is on and the *Ready* message or the printer's name appears in the front panel, press the **Clean** button. The printer displays the first selection in the menu:

```
Clean:Light Stripes  
<---- Clean Test
```

3. Press the left arrow (<---) button until the following front panel message appears:

```
Clean:Ink Smears  
<---- Clean Test
```

4. Press the **Clean** button. The printer displays the following front panel message:

```
Warming Up  
Cancel
```

5. After a short delay during the warm-up period, the printer begins an automatic sequence of feeding 10 clean sheets of paper from the upper media tray.

A front panel message indicates the number of sheets remaining to be fed. For example:

```
Cleaning:Using 10 Sheets
```

6. When the cleaning sequence is complete, inspect the last sheet of paper fed through the printer. If it is not clean, repeat the cleaning sequence by pressing the **Clean** button once again.
7. Return the printer to normal operation by pressing the **Exit** button.

If the ink smear problem persists after running clean sheets of paper through the paper path, refer to the following two procedures for directions on cleaning paper feed rollers and the paper exit path.

Cleaning for jams and ink smears: paper-feed rollers

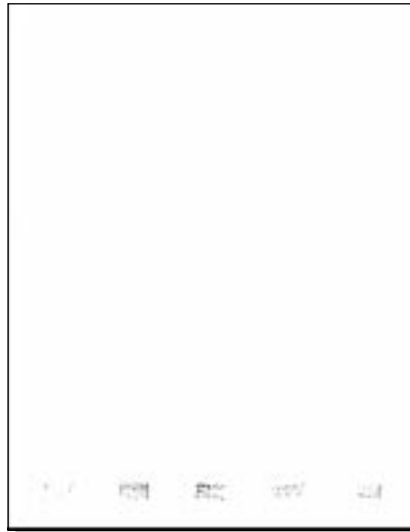
Approximate time to complete: 5 minutes

You should clean the upper and lower media feed rollers if any of the following conditions exist:

- Media is consistently jamming behind the front cover or at the manual-feed slot.
- Ink smear problems persist after you have performed the “Cleaning for ink smears: internal paper path” procedure.

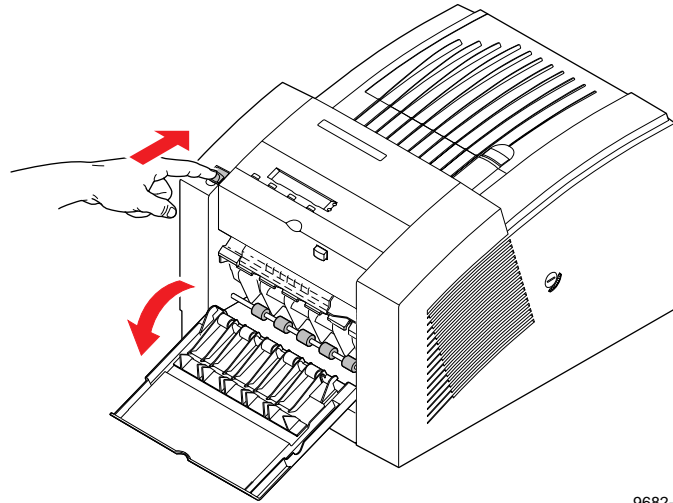
The media-feed rollers carry the print media from the media tray and manual-feed slot through the printer. Occasionally, stray ink particles become attached to the paper-feed rollers creating slick roller surfaces. When media feed problems or ink smears appear on prints, you can generally correct the problem by cleaning the media-feed rollers. Refer to “Using isopropyl alcohol” on page 5-12 for more information.

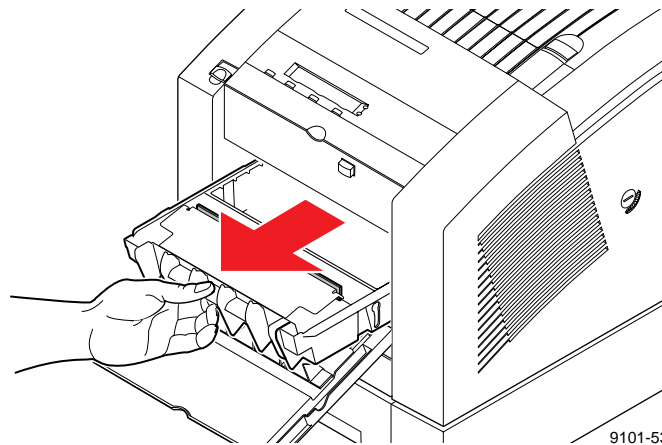

Caution *Hot surfaces exist behind the upper paper-feed rollers. To avoid personal injury during cleaning procedures, do not reach in behind the paper-feed rollers.*

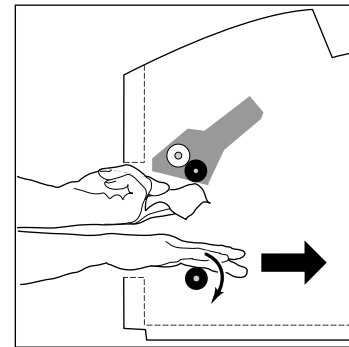
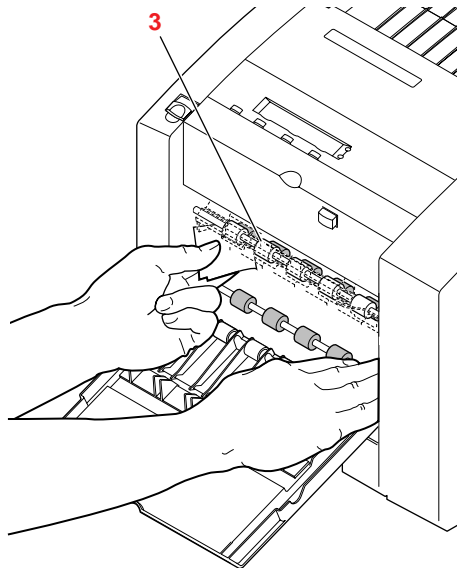
Note *Once the maintenance tray has been partially used, it leaks drum fluid if tipped. Contact with the drum fluid poses no known health risk; refer to page 9-6 for more information.*

3. There are two sets of upper paper-feed rollers located above the maintenance tray. One set of rollers is rubber; the other set is white plastic. The rubber rollers are mechanically linked to companion rubber rollers located under the maintenance tray. Turning the lower rubber rollers also turns the upper rollers. Turning the lower rubber rollers also turns the upper rollers.

To clean the upper rubber rollers, use either the pre-packaged alcohol-soaked cloth or fold a lint-free cloth into a two-inch square and soak with alcohol.

Place the cleaning cloth against the underside of each upper rubber roller, lifting to create pressure against the roller. Press the middle finger of your other hand flat against a lower roller and turn the roller using the entire length of your finger. The upper rubber roller should rotate *four or five complete revolutions* to ensure proper cleaning.

Scrub each roller thoroughly. If the cloth becomes dirty, discard it and use another.

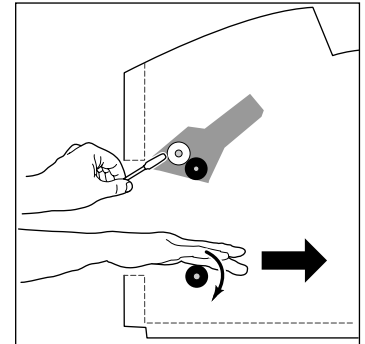
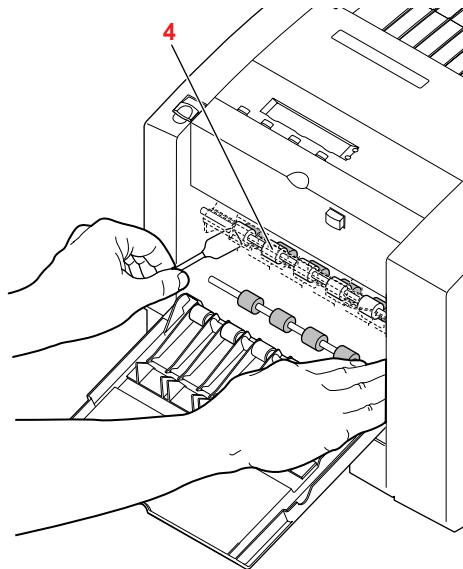

4. If the upper white plastic rollers are dirty, clean the rollers with an alcohol-soaked swab. Place the swab on top of each upper white roller and lift on the swab to create pressure against the roller. Rotate the upper white roller *four or five complete revolutions* by sliding the index finger of your other hand along the lower rollers.

Scrub each roller thoroughly until clean. If the swab becomes dirty, discard it and use another.

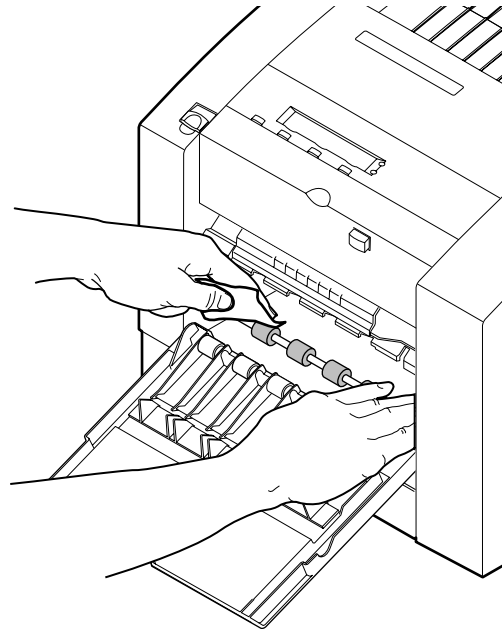
5. There are two sets of lower paper-feed rollers. One set of rollers is rubber; the other set is white plastic. The rubber lower rollers are located below the maintenance tray; the white plastic rollers are located on the inside of the front cover.

To clean the lower rubber-feed rollers, use either the pre-packaged alcohol-soaked cloth or fold a lint-free cloth into a two-inch square and soak with alcohol.

Place and hold the cleaning cloth on top of each lower rubber roller, pressing to create pressure against the roller.

Press the middle finger of your other hand flat against a lower roller and turn the roller using the entire length of your finger. The lower rubber roller should rotate *four or five complete revolutions* to ensure proper cleaning.

Scrub each roller thoroughly. If the cloth becomes dirty, discard it and use another.

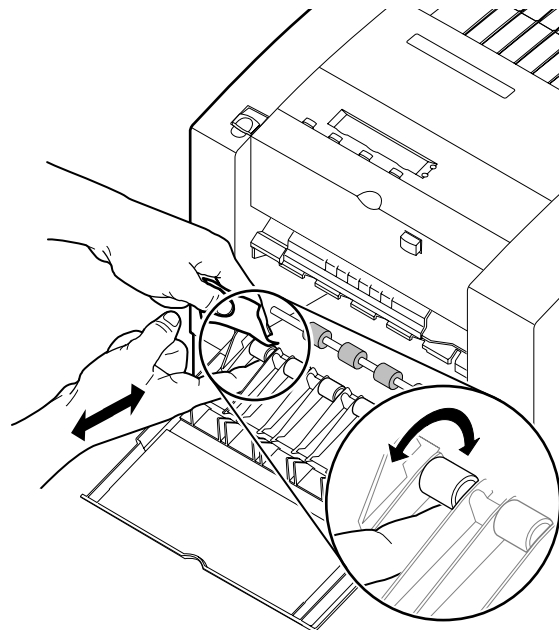

6. If the lower white plastic rollers are dirty, clean them using either the pre-packaged alcohol-soaked cloth or fold a lint-free cloth into a two-inch square and soak with alcohol.

Place and hold the cleaning cloth on top of each lower white roller while turning the individual roller with your thumb and forefinger.

Scrub each roller thoroughly until clean. If the cloth becomes dirty, discard it and use another.

7. Put the maintenance tray back in the printer, pushing on both sides of the maintenance tray to latch it firmly in place.
8. Close the front cover. If the problem persists, refer to “Cleaning for ink smears: paper-exit path” on page 5-25.

Cleaning for ink smears: paper-exit path

Approximate time to complete: 10 minutes

If you have already performed the other “Cleaning for ink smears” procedures described earlier in this chapter but problems persist, you should manually clean the paper-exit path. Refer also to “Cleaning for jams and ink smears: paper-feed rollers” on page 5-19.

Occasionally, stray ink particles become attached to the exit fingers, rollers and guides under the exit cover causing ink streaks or marks on the top edge, front or back of prints. When this occurs, you must clean these parts using both dry and alcohol-soaked swabs. Refer to “Using isopropyl alcohol” on page 5-12 for more information.

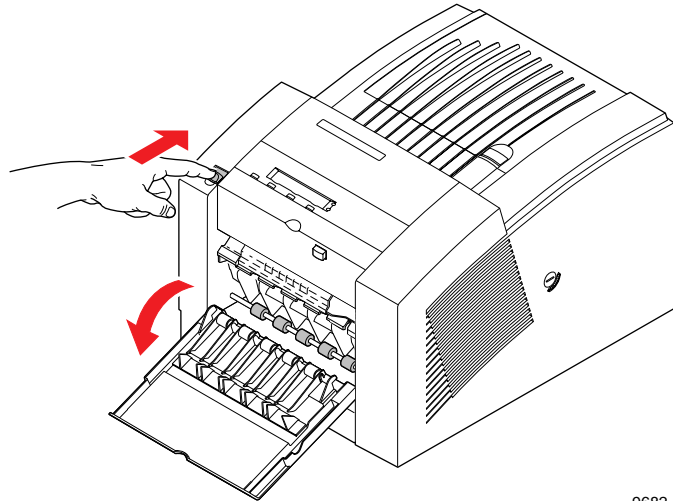
Sample ink smear: paper-exit path

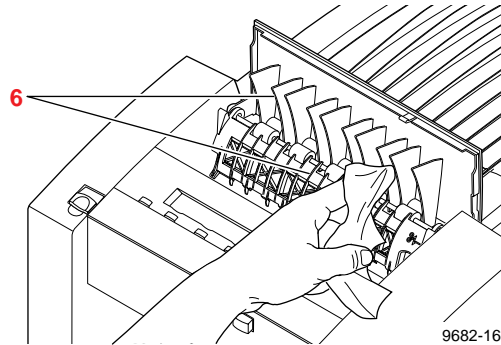
4. To clean the rubber exit rollers, wrap an alcohol-soaked cloth around the index finger of one hand. Press your cloth-covered finger against each roller and turn the roller several times to clean each roller individually.



Note *You may notice some staining of the exit rollers while performing the cleaning procedure. This is normal and does not indicate additional cleaning is necessary. Simply clean rollers to remove any build-up of ink.*

5. To clean the white plastic exit rollers, wrap an alcohol-soaked cloth around the index finger of one hand. Place and hold your cloth covered finger on top of each roller while turning the individual roller with the thumb and forefinger of your other hand.

6. To clean the two sets of ribbed exit guides on the underside of the exit cover, gently wipe the raised ribs using an alcohol-soaked cloth.



Caution *To avoid damaging the print drum and exit guide, never scrape excess ink with a tool or fingernail. Use only the materials provided with the cleaning kit.*

7. Close the exit cover and the front cover.
8. If the ribbed guides on top of the printer (the output tray) require cleaning, use an alcohol-soaked wipe.

Cleaning for upper media tray jams: media-pick roller

Approximate time to complete: 5 minutes

If you are experiencing media-feeding problems, including mispicks and multiple picks of media from the standard (upper) media tray, you can generally correct the problem by cleaning the media-pick roller with isopropyl alcohol. Refer to “Using isopropyl alcohol” on page 5-12 for more information.

The printer’s front panel messages guide you through the necessary steps to perform automatic cleaning procedures. You will need the pick roller cleaning tray included in the cleaning kit when you run the `Clean: Media Tray Jams` routine from the printer’s front panel. You can also clean the media-pick roller using an alcohol-soaked cloth; refer to “Manually cleaning the upper pick roller” on page 5-34.

Note *Media-picking problems can also occur when the maintenance tray is not properly latched. You may need to remove and re-latch the maintenance tray to cure a media picking problem. Refer to “Replacing the maintenance tray” on page 5-7 for instructions.*

Automatically cleaning the upper pick roller

1. When the printer is on and the `Ready` message or the printer’s name appears in the front panel, press the `Clean` button. The printer displays the first selection in the menu:

```
Clean:Light Stripes  
<---- Clean Test
```

2. Press the left arrow (`<---`) button until the following front panel message appears:

```
Clean:Media Tray Jams  
<---- Clean Test
```

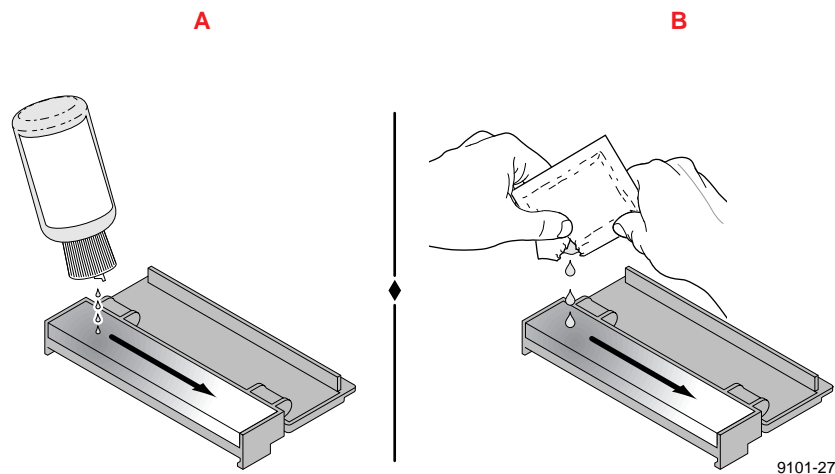

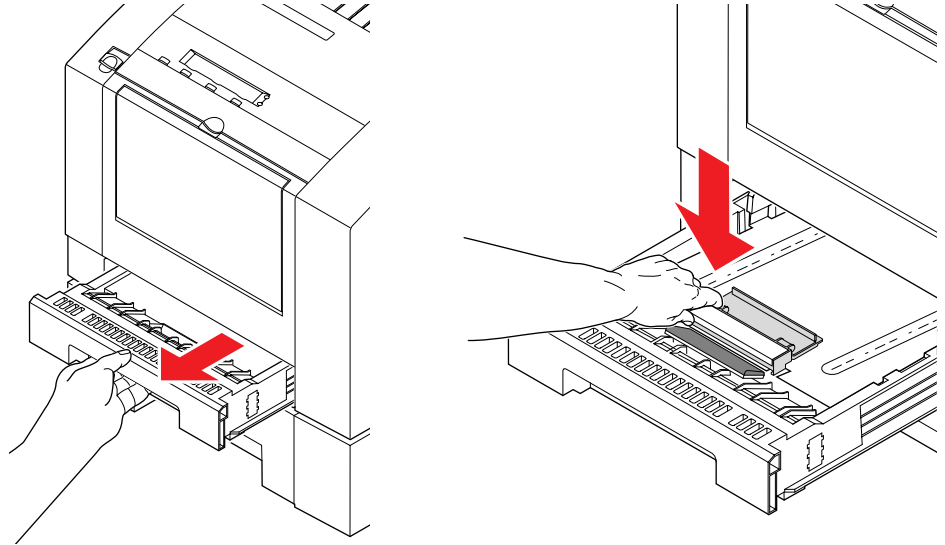
5. When you press **Continue**, a front panel message prompts you to install the cleaning tray in the media tray.
- Remove the upper media tray from the printer. Remove all print media from the media tray.
 - Remove the cleaning tray from the cleaning kit and open the tray lid to reveal the cleaning tray sponge.
 - Wet the cleaning tray sponge with isopropyl alcohol (A); a bottle is provided in the cleaning kit for dispensing the alcohol. Alternately, you can squeeze the alcohol from two pre-soaked alcohol wipe packets to moisten the cleaning tray sponge (B).

Caution Do not use **rubbing alcohol** because it can contain water and oils that leave undesirable residue on the printer parts. Never use **water** to clean the printer's internal components. Failure to follow these instructions may invalidate your printer's warranty.

- d. Place the cleaning tray in the media tray so that the tray's sponge pad is nearest the paper tray's handle. Press the two tabs underneath the cleaning tray into the two square notches provided in the media tray.

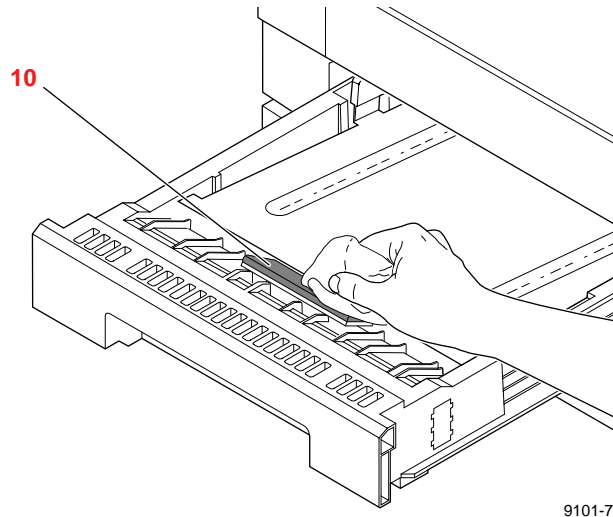



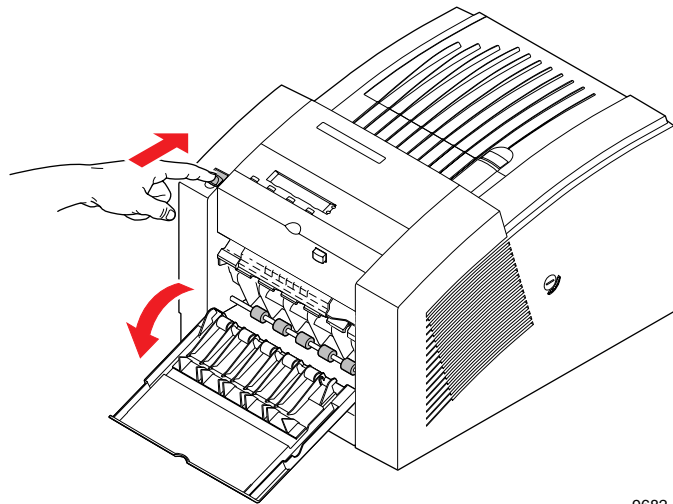

Manually cleaning the upper pick roller

1. Remove the upper media tray from the printer.
2. Open the front cover.

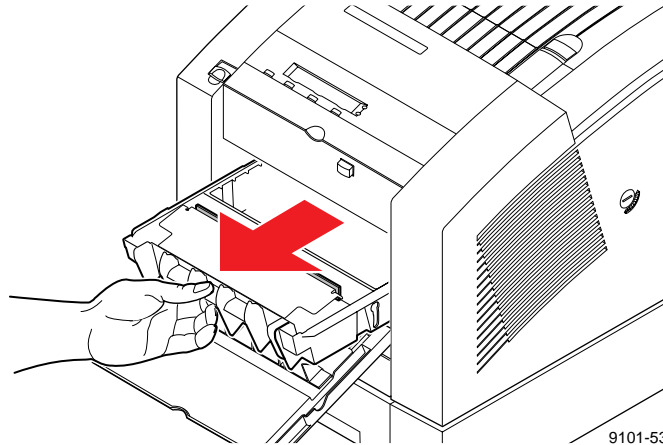

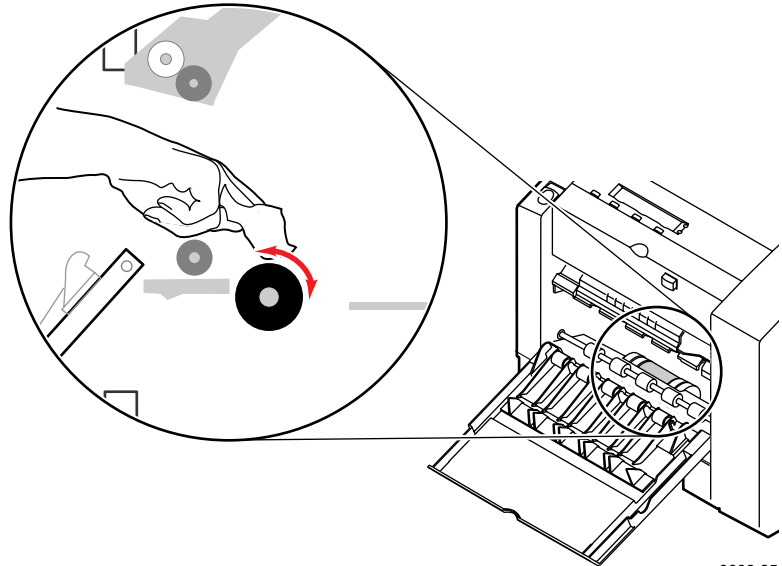

4. Locate the top of the media-pick roller behind the black rubber transport rollers. To clean the top surface of the media-pick roller, use either the pre-packaged alcohol-soaked cloth or a lint-free cloth folded into a two-inch square and soaked with alcohol.

5. **Scrub the top surface of the media-pick roller thoroughly.** If the cloth becomes dirty, discard it and use another.



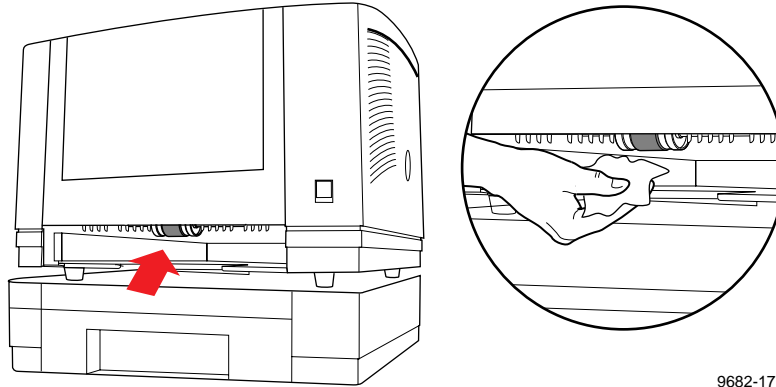

Cleaning for lower tray jams: paper-pick rollers

Approximate time to complete: 1 minutes

If you are experiencing media-feeding problems, including mispicks and multiple picks of paper from the Lower Paper Tray Assembly, you can generally correct the problem by cleaning the media-pick rollers with isopropyl alcohol. Refer to “Using isopropyl alcohol” on page 5-12 for more information.

1. Remove the lower paper tray from the Lower Paper Tray Assembly.
2. Locate the media-pick rollers according to the following illustration.

Moving Your Printer

Waiting 30 minutes before moving

Before you move the printer, you'll want to wait for the printer to display the **Ready** message or the printer's network name, then turn off the printer using the rear-panel **On/Off** switch.

Caution *To avoid damaging the printer, let the printer cool down for at least 30 minutes before you move it so that the ink has time to solidify. Failure to wait 30 minutes will likely result in an ink spill that will damage the printer's internal components.*

Removing the maintenance tray

1. Remove the maintenance tray from the printer, keeping it level. Remove, empty, and replace the waste tray. Refer to "Emptying the waste tray" on page 5-4 for detailed instructions.
2. Place the maintenance tray in a plastic bag and seal the bag.

The maintenance tray contains drum fluid that leaks if the tray is tipped. Keep the maintenance tray level and in a sealed plastic bag while transporting it.

Caution *To avoid damaging your printer and invalidating your printer's warranty, remove the maintenance tray before moving the printer. Always store a used maintenance tray in a leak-proof package. When handling the maintenance tray, keep it level. Never ship a partially used maintenance tray. Contact with the drum fluid poses no known health risk. Refer to "MSDS for silicone oil" on page 9-6 for more information.*

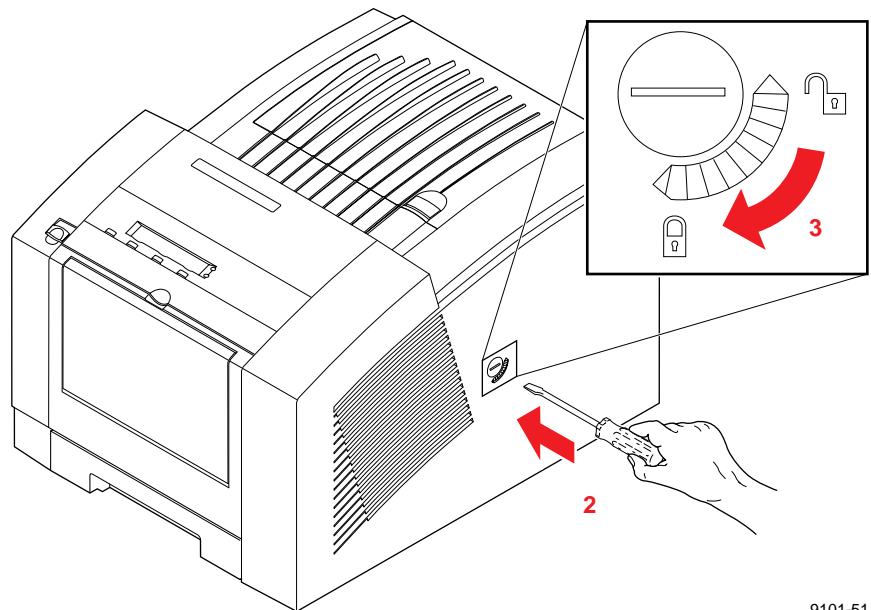
Locking the transit restraint

Refer to the following illustration while performing these steps.

1. When the printer displays the Ready message or the printer's name, power it down using the rear-panel On/Off switch. The printer places the print head in the locking position.

Caution *To avoid damaging the printer's internal components, always turn the printer power off and lock the transit restraint before moving the printer. Failure to do so may result in damage to the printers' internal components and may invalidate your printer's warranty.*

2. Locate the transit restraint on the right side of the printer and insert a wide flat-blade screwdriver into the transit restraint slot.

3. While pressing inward with medium pressure, turn the transit restraint slot in a *clockwise* direction to lock the printhead in position. The lock button is recessed from the side of the printer when fully engaged.

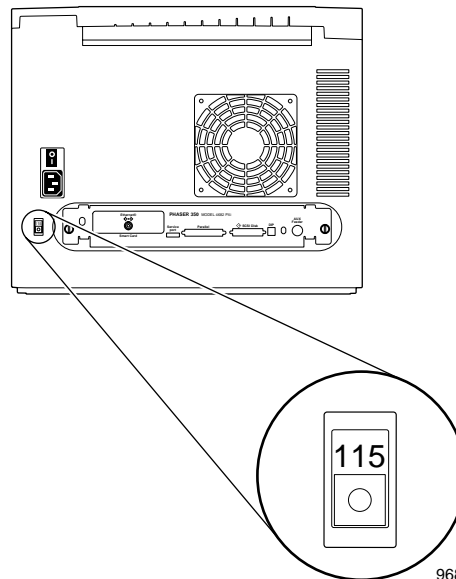
Changing line voltage

If you move the printer to a country that uses a line voltage different from the printer's factory setting, you can change the line voltage to the appropriate setting by using the line voltage selector switch. The line voltage selector switch is located next to the **On/Off** switch.

Warning *To avoid damaging the printer, turn the printer power off using the On/Off switch and unplug the power cord before changing the line voltage selector switch. To avoid risk of electric shock, do not remove any of the printer's covers.*

The new location may require a different power cord; contact your local Tektronix office or dealer for details.

Front panel messages

The front panel displays messages indicating the condition of the printer. Some messages, such as *Standby* and *Warming Up*, simply provide status information. These messages do not require user action. Error messages, such as *Jam:Open Front Cover*, require you to perform some action such as remove a paper jam. Use the following table to determine the appropriate action for each type of front panel message.

The printer may display a numeric error code when it detects certain types of problems. If you see a numeric error code, first write down the number. Try turning off the printer's power and wait at least 15 seconds before turning the power on again. If that does not solve the problem, call your local Tektronix office for assistance or call Tektronix Service in the U.S. and Canada at **1-800-835-6100**.

Front panel messages

Message	Action
<printer network name>	No user action required. The printer is ready to print.
Busy < message >	No user action required.
Check Print	The printer is waiting for confirmation of the print job from the front panel.
Cleaning	No user action required. The printer is running an automatic cleaning operation.
Clearing Job	No user action required. May be displayed after you press the Cancel button.
Close Front Cover	Close the front cover.
Close Top Cover	Close the top cover.
Close Exit Cover	Close the exit cover.
Energy Star Mode	Press Wakeup or send a print job to bring the printer to Ready.
Fault. Service Required	Turn the printer off, wait at least 15 seconds and turn the printer's power on again. If the failure persists, note the code number in the display. In the U.S., call Tektronix service at 1-800-835-6100 . Outside the U.S., contact your local Tektronix office.

Front panel messages (cont'd.)

Incorrect Media Size	An incorrect paper size is loaded in the tray or paper narrower than A4-size is in the manual feed slot. Use Letter- or A4-size media.

Initializing	No user action required. Wait for a period of time.

Maintenance Tray Missing	Insert a maintenance tray into the printer.

Problems and solutions

Also refer to "Cleaning for jams and ink smears: paper-feed rollers" on page 5-19. ■ Microsoft PowerPoint users: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ■ Macintosh users need to leave Background Printing in the Chooser set to Off. ■ PC users need to turn off background printing through the Print Manager.

Refer to the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM for information on setting timeouts and the Ctrl-D character.
The printer receives a file on the serial or parallel port and the job prints successfully. After printing, the printer displays <code>Waiting For Data</code> , goes into Standby mode, but doesn't come out of Standby mode for the next print job.	To recover, press the WakeUp or Cancel button or turn the printer's power off, wait at least 15 seconds, and turn the power on again. (If you reset the printer, you must send the print job again.) To prevent this condition, do not set the wait timeout to 0. Also, print files should not have extra characters after the End-of-File character (Ctrl-D). Refer to the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM for information on setting timeouts and the Ctrl-D character.
The startup page prints although you disabled it.	If the printer detects a non-fatal error at power-up, the startup page prints, even if you have disabled it. Maintenance tray is locked inside printer.	The printer locks the maintenance tray until it has cooled down. Wait for a few minutes and try removing it again.

All about media jams

Use the following guidelines to help prevent paper and transparencies from jamming inside the printer.

- When installing a new maintenance tray, push on *both* sides of the tray to latch it firmly into the printer.
- Periodically clean the printer to keep it operating in peak condition. Refer to cleaning details in Chapter 5.
- Fan the paper before loading it into the upper and lower paper trays. For additional information on loading media trays, refer to “All about media” on page 3-29.
- Use standard grade paper 60–120 g/m² (16–32 lb.); use the manual feed slot for thick papers. Do not use three-holed paper, perforated paper, legal-size paper or envelopes.
- Wait until a front panel message prompts you before feeding a second sheet of paper or transparency into the manual feed slot.
- Keep paper and other supplies clean and free from dust.
- Paper that has been sitting out of its sealed wrapper can become distorted, causing paper jams. Keep paper sealed until you are ready to use it for printing.
- Do not use paper that has been creased or wrinkled.

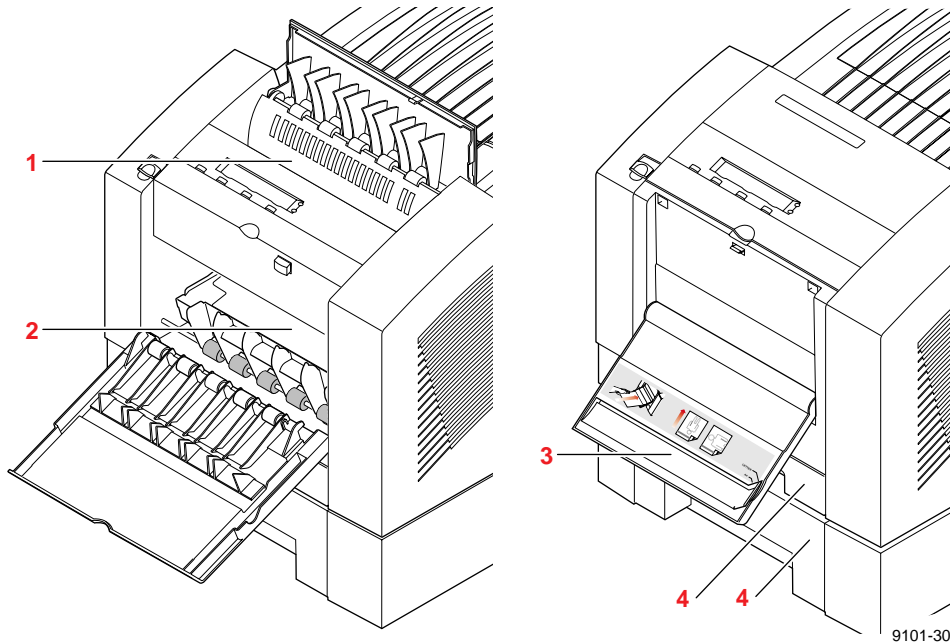
Caution *Never attempt two-sided or two-pass printing on any type of media. Ink already present on the media will offset onto the internal paper path, requiring you to perform cleaning procedures. Excessive buildup of ink in the paper path may cause paper jams.*

After you clear the jammed media, the printer feeds a cleaning page to remove a partial image that may be on the printdrum. Once the printdrum is cleared, the printer outputs the original image on a second page. The source of the cleaning page (upper tray is default) is selected through the Printer Defaults menu, Cleaning Page Source front panel menu selection. If you have letterhead or transparencies in the upper tray, you can change the source of the cleaning page to avoid using letterhead for the cleaning page; refer to “Selecting the cleaning page source” on page 7-9.

Locating jammed media

Paper jams can occur in these places:

1. Inside the exit cover
2. Inside the front cover
3. At the manual feed slot
4. At the standard media tray and Lower Paper Tray Assembly



Caution *Some surfaces inside the printer may be hot. Be careful not to touch the areas marked with this caution icon:*

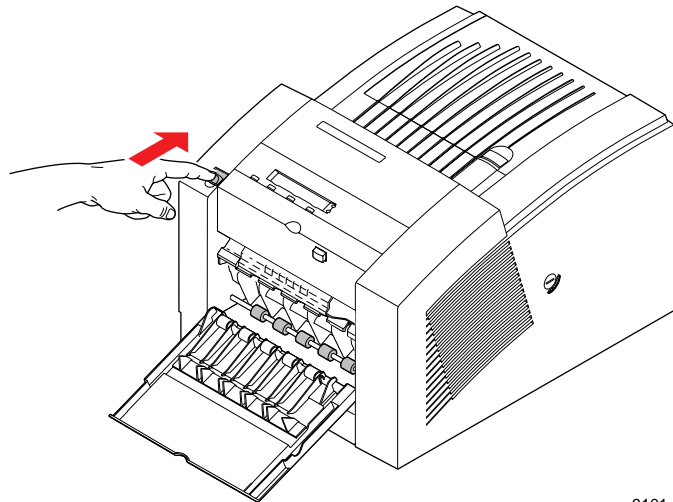


Removing jammed media

To avoid ink smears inside the printer, always try to pull jammed paper or transparency media out through the top of the printer (the exit cover). If the jammed media cannot be cleared from the exit cover, open the front cover and check for jammed media. If the jam is not inside the front cover, remove the media tray and check for jammed media.

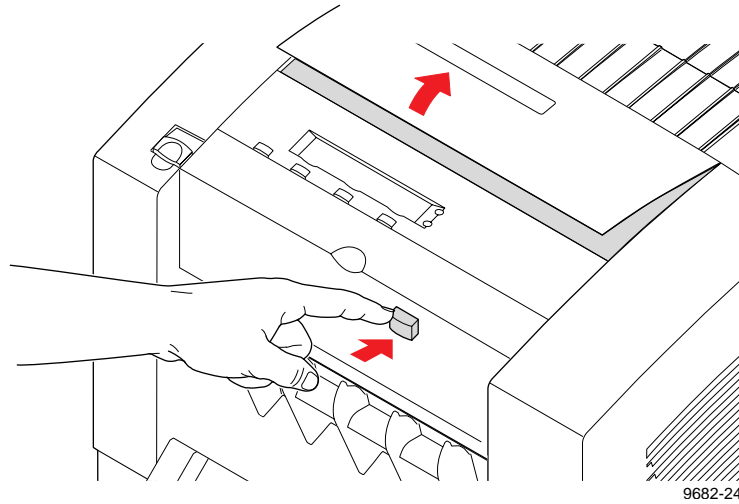
Follow these guidelines when you remove jammed media:

- Use both hands to gently pull the media through its normal path out the top of the printer (exit cover), if possible.
 - Do not use excessive force pulling the media; it may tear.
 - After removing the jammed media, inspect it for tears. Leave no media scraps in the printer.
 - If your prints have ink smears after clearing a jam condition, refer to “Cleaning for ink smears: paper-exit path” on page 5-25.
1. Check for jammed media that has partially exited the printer’s exit cover. Remove any jammed media by pulling the media out through the top of the printer.
 2. Open the front cover and check for jammed media.



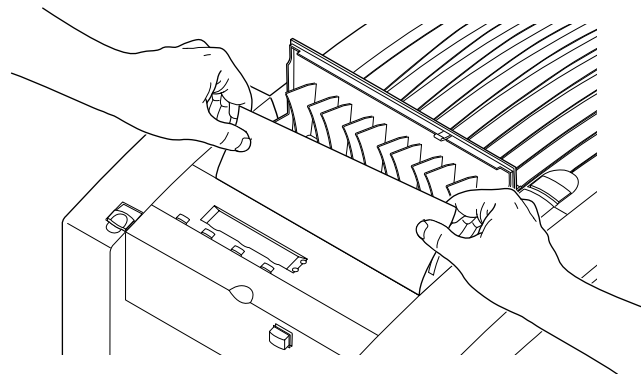

3. If necessary, open the exit cover using the blue release button located inside the front cover, at the top of the printer.

4. Using both hands, pull the jammed media out the top of the printer.

5. If necessary, remove the media tray to locate and clear jammed media.

Improving print speed

Note *There are different ways to improve print speed, such as by upgrading to Ethernet. For more information, request a document catalog from HAL or EuroHAL, the Tektronix automated fax systems. Refer to “Using the automated fax systems” on page 6-2 for instructions.*

If you tried to print a document with scanned images, but are dissatisfied with the speed of the output, here are some suggestions.

All users

- When you use any color correction option (other than **None**), your printer can take longer to process bitmapped images. Select color corrections from the supported drivers, with downloadable utility files, or from the printer’s front panel; see “Color correction descriptions” on page 4-6 for more information.
- The **Fast Color** print quality mode is the fastest print-quality mode, followed by the **Standard** print-quality mode and the **Enhanced (600 x 300)** mode (available with the printer’s Extended Features option). Select print quality modes from the supported drivers, with downloadable utility files, or from the printer’s front panel; see “Print quality modes” on page 3-27 for more information.

Macintosh users

- If you are using Adobe Photoshop, you can print using the Tektronix PhaserPrint software plug-in to improve the image data transfer time from your Macintosh to the printer. See the on-line manual on the printer’s CD-ROM for instructions on installing and using the plug-in.

Windows 3.1 users

Note *Only use the following procedure if your computer is connected to the printer through the parallel port or the optional serial port.*

1. From the **Control Panel**, double-click **Printers**.
2. In the **Printers** dialog box, select the **Tektronix Phaser 350** printer, (or **Tektronix Phaser 350 600x300** if you have the printer's Extended Features option) then click **Setup**. A dialog box appears with the printer's name across the top.
3. Click the **PostScript** tab.
4. In the **Performance Options** field, select the **Use PostScript Level 2 Features** option.
5. Click the **Job Control** tab.
6. For better performance, select the **Binary Mode** option.
7. From your application, choose the **Tektronix Phaser 350** as your printer.
8. Try printing the document again.

Windows 95 users

1. Click the **Start** icon in the taskbar on your screen; a menu appears.
2. Move the cursor over **Settings**; another menu appears.
3. In the menu, click **Printers**; the **Printers** window appears.
4. In the **Printers** window, select the **Phaser 350** printer icon (or **Phaser 350 600x300** if you have the printer's Extended Features option), then select **Properties** from the **File** menu.
5. Click the **PostScript** tab, then click the **Advanced** button.
6. Select **Use PostScript Level 2 features**.
7. Select **Binary communications protocol** under **Data format**.
8. Click **OK** when finished.
9. Try printing the document again.

UNIX workstation users

Workstation users can use the PhaserPrint software for UNIX to significantly increase printer performance when printing bitmapped images; refer to "Workstation software" on page 2-61 for details.

If your file doesn't print

If you've configured a supported driver for your printer but your printer isn't printing, try the following suggestions. If these suggestions fail to solve the problem, copy the Tektronix PostScript Level 2 error handler utility to your printer to determine what is wrong. Refer to "Using a PostScript error handler" on page 6-27 for information on using the error handler.

General things to check for

Macintosh users

- Open the **Chooser** and select a supported driver, such as the LaserWriter 8.x, and your printer.
 - If the driver isn't installed or properly set up with your printer, refer to "Macintosh software" on page 2-52 for instructions.
 - Make sure that **Background Printing** is turned **off**.
 - Close the **Chooser** and try printing again.
- If you are having trouble printing from the Finder in System 7.1, for example if the driver's dialog boxes are not opening, it may be because the Finder doesn't have enough allocated memory. Reinstall a supported driver to automatically allocate enough memory for printing from the Finder.
- For PCI-based PowerMacs, you should be using the latest version of **Open Transport**, available from Apple Computer.

Windows users (general)

- Check to make sure that you have configured the communications ports and the Handshake option correctly. Refer to “Printing Help Pages from the front panel” on page 2-29 for information on printing a configuration page.
- Make sure that you are using the correct cables for your computer and printer. See “Interface cables and adapters” on page 8-3 for cable information.

Windows 3.1 users

- Make sure that your printer is connected to the port you selected in the driver’s **Printers/Connect** dialog box.
- Check the **Options** dialog box to make sure **Printer**, not **Encapsulated PostScript File**, is selected in the driver’s **Print To** box.
- If the error message *Windows Header has not been downloaded to the printer* appears on your computer screen, click the **Job Control** tab and click one of the options for PostScript Header. Refer to “Using the Adobe PostScript driver for Windows 3.1” on page 3-9 for details on the **Job Control** tab.

Windows 95 users

- Make sure that your printer is connected to the port you selected in the driver’s **Details** tab.
- Make sure that the correct port is selected in the driver’s **Details** tab.
- If the error message *Windows Header has not been downloaded to the printer* appears on your computer screen, click the **PostScript** tab and click one of the options for **PostScript Header**. Refer to “Using the Microsoft PostScript driver with Windows 95” on page 3-4 for details on the **PostScript** tab.

If you are using PC/NFS

If you have PC/NFS software installed on your computer, you need to make the following selection in the **Network Options** dialog box:

1. From the **Main** window, double-click the **Print Manager** icon.
2. From the **Options** menu in the **Print Manager**, select **Network Settings**.
3. In the **Network Options** dialog box, uncheck the **Print Net Jobs Direct** box.
4. Click **OK**.

If you can't print from Windows to an LPT port

Windows 3.1

If your printer is connected through an LPT (parallel) port and your document doesn't print, try the following:

1. Double-click the **Printers** icon in the **Control Panel**.
2. In the **Printers** dialog box, choose your printer from the list of installed printers.
3. Click the **Connect** button; the **Connect** dialog box appears.
4. Change your port connection from **LPTx** to **LPTx.DOS** (where *x* is 1, 2, or 3).
5. Click **OK**.

Note Also, refer to "Fixing timeout problems in Windows" on page 6-29 for instructions on fixing timeout problems.

Windows 95

1. Select **Start** in the taskbar on your screen.
2. In the menu that appears, select **Settings**.
3. In the next menu, select **Printers**; the **Printers** window appears.
4. Click on your printer's icon and select **Properties** from the **File** menu.
5. Click the **Details** tab.
6. Click **Add Port**.
7. Click **Other**.
8. Make sure **Local Port** is highlighted, then click **OK**.
9. Type **LPTx.DOS** (where **x** is 1, 2, or 3).
10. Click **OK**.
11. In the **Details** tab, the *Print to the following port* should be **LPT.DOS** (unknown local port).

Check the printer's language mode

If your file doesn't print, the language on the printer's port you are using may have been changed.

Note *Monochrome PCL5 is optional and must be authorized before you can use it; see the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM for instructions.*

1. Print a copy of the printer's configuration page to see the language mode on each port. Refer to the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM for instructions on printing a configuration page.
2. If the printer port you are using has the wrong language set for the type of application you are using, send one of the following utility files to the printer:
 - To print PostScript files, use the *PSCRIPT.PS* file to set up a port to receive PostScript. Refer to the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM for details.
 - To print HP-GL files, use the *HPGL.PS* file to set up a port to receive HP-GL. Refer to the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM for details.
 - To print PostScript, or HP-GL, or Monochrome PCL5 files interchangeably, use the *AIS.PS* file to set up a port for automatic language selection. Refer to the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM for details.

PostScript printing errors

Note *For information on specific applications, request a document catalog from HAL or EuroHAL, the Tektronix automated fax systems. Refer to “Using the automated fax systems” on page 6-2 for instructions on using these systems.*

If you get a PostScript error when printing from Aldus PageMaker, Aldus FreeHand, QuarkXPress, or Canvas, you may be using an older or incorrect version of the printer description file.

1. You should always use the most current printer description file. To determine the **date** of the file you are using, do the following:
 - **Macintosh users:**
Select (highlight) a printer description file and choose **Get Info** from the **File** menu. Make a note of the version date.
 - **Windows 3.1 users:**
Check a printer description file’s creation date in the **File Manager**. Make a note of the version date.
 - **Windows 95 users:**
Check a printer description file’s creation date in the **Windows Explorer**. Make a note of the version date.
2. Check Tektronix’ on-line services to see if the printer-related files you have are the most recent. Refer to the on-line manual on the printer’s CD-ROM or “If you need help” on page 6-1 for information on Tektronix’ online services.

Using a PostScript error handler

The error handling utility is useful for diagnosing problems when a job doesn't print. This utility installs a PostScript error-handling function in the printer to help determine the cause of some PostScript printing problems. PostScript errors are printed on a page with other status information when an error occurs. This utility can be useful to programmers for debugging PostScript code.

To turn on the error handler, follow the instructions below. To turn off the error handler, turn the printer off, wait 15 seconds, and turn the printer on again. Alternately, refer to the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM for instructions on resetting the printer to turn off the error handler. Use the following utility files for your computer type:

Macintosh file name	PC file name
<i>Tek Error Handler and LaserWriter Utility</i>	<i>TEKEHAND.PS</i>

Macintosh users

1. Refer to "Using the Macintosh Installer" on page 2-53 for instructions on installing the utility files from the printer's CD-ROM.
2. Select the appropriate printer in the **Chooser**.
3. Locate the *LaserWriter Utility* in the *PhaserTools* folder on your hard disk, and double-click its icon to start the application.
4. Choose **Download PostScript File** from the **Utilities** menu.
5. Select the *Tek Error Handler* file from the list, then click **Open**. (This file was installed in the *Printer Utilities* folder inside the *PhaserTools* folder.)
6. At the prompt `Save PostScript output as:` you are asked for a file name for saving printer output. Use either the default name given in the edit box or type a new name. Click **Save** to send the file to the printer.

7. If no output is returned by the printer, the *LaserWriter Utility* displays a dialog box; click **OK** continue.

PC and workstation users

1. Locate the utility files in the *PHSR350* directory on the printer's CD-ROM.
2. Copy the *TEKEHAND.PS* file to your hard disk or use the file directly from the CD-ROM.
3. Send the *TEKEHAND.PS* file to the printer using one of the following methods:
 - **PC users:** Use the DOS **COPY** command to send the file to the printer. (Windows 3.1 users can also use the **Copy** command in the **File Manager**.)
 - **Workstation users:** Send the file to the printer as you would any PostScript file.

Fixing timeout problems in Windows

If print jobs are timing out and not printing, you may need to increase the timeout values in Windows **and** in the printer.

Try one of the following procedures to change the Windows timeout. If the Windows procedure doesn't work for you, try the DOS procedure. Then, follow the procedure to change the printer's timeout.

Windows timeout: From Windows 3.1

1. Open the **Control Panel** from the **Main** menu.
2. Double-click the **Printers** icon to open the **Printers** dialog box.
3. Click on your printer's icon.
4. Click the **Connect** button to open the **Connect** dialog box.
5. Increase the **Transmission Retry** to **950** seconds by typing in the new number.
6. Click **OK**.

Windows timeout: From Windows 95

1. Click the **Start** icon in the taskbar on your screen; a menu appears.
2. Move the cursor over **Settings**; another menu appears.
3. In the menu, click **Printers**; the **Printers** window appears.
4. In the **Printers** window, select the **Phaser 350** printer icon (or **Phaser 350 600x300** if you have the printer's Extended Features option), then select **Properties** from the **File** menu.
5. Click the **Details** tab and increase the **Transmission Retry** to **999** seconds (or higher).
6. Click **OK**.

Windows timeout: From DOS (and Windows 3.1)

Note *To use this procedure, the printer must be connected directly to your computer, not on a network.*

1. At the DOS prompt, issue the DOS **MODE** command by typing the following:

MODE LPT1:,,P

2. Start Windows 3.1.
3. Open the **Control Panel** from the **Main** menu.
4. Double-click the **Printers** icon to open the **Printers** dialog box.
5. Click the **Connect** button to open the **Connect** dialog box.
6. Change the port selection from **LPT1** to either **LPT1.DOS** or **LPT1.OS2**, depending on the options you see in the dialog box.
7. Click **OK**.

Printer's timeout

Note *This is the basic procedure for changing one of the printer's timeout values. For more information on the printer's timeouts, refer to the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM.*

You can use the *CONFIG.PS* file to change the PostScript and HP-GL job and wait timeout values. When sent to the printer, your edited version of the *CONFIG.PS* file changes the values in the printer, but *only* while the printer is turned on; if the printer is turned off or reset the values return to their defaults. To restore your desired timeout settings, you must send your edited *CONFIG.PS* file to the printer again.

Note *The CONFIG.PS file affects printer operation. If the printer is shared on a network, using this file may affect the prints requested by other users.*

1. Locate the utility files in the *PHSR350* directory on the printer's CD-ROM.
2. Copy the *CONFIG.PS* file to your hard disk.
3. Open the file using a text editor. The default value is **40** seconds for the wait timeout. Change the value in the WaitTimeOut line to 999.
4. Use one of the following methods to send the *CONFIG.PS* file to the printer:
 - **PC users:** Use the DOS **COPY** command to send the file to the printer. (Windows 3.1 users can also use the **Copy** command in the **File Manager**.)
 - **Workstation users:** Send the file to the printer as you would any PostScript file.

Printed colors are not what you expected

In general

- Select another **Color Correction** option in a supported driver and print your image again; refer to “Color correction descriptions” on page 4-6 for more information.
- If you are not using a supported driver and are sharing the printer with other users on a network, another user may have changed the printer's color adjustment setting. Refer to “Sharing the printer on a network” on page 6-39 for more information.
- If you use the driver's **Use Printer Setting** option and printed colors are not what you expected, check the following:
 - A selection may have been made in the **TekColor Correction** menu on the printer's front panel. These settings change the printer's color correction setting.
 - A color correction utility file may have been downloaded to the printer. These files change the printer's color correction setting.

Refer to “Sharing the printer on a network” on page 6-39 for details on how these settings affect prints made from a driver.

Printing PANTONE Colors

If Phaser 350 printer's printer-specific PANTONE Colors are not printing as expected, make sure you are printing with **Enhanced (600 x 300)** mode with color corrections set to **None**. Refer to "Printing the PANTONE Color Chart" in the on-line manual on the printer's CD-ROM for more information.

There are many variables in process reproduction of colors generated by the Phaser 350 printer, any one of which may affect the quality of the PANTONE Color simulation, including:

- Type of ink used on printing press
- Type of ink film used on printing press
- Effective final resolution
- Dot structure/halftones

If you have questions about PANTONE Color Matching, you can get information in the following places:

Blue colors look too purple

If printed blue colors look too purple, print your document with the **Vivid Color** color correction. Refer to "TekColor corrections — making the best selection" on page 4-3 for more information.

Using the Tektronix halftone screens

Tektronix halftone screens are designed for Tektronix printers, and improve print quality over application-set halftone screens. The *Setscreen Off* (*SCRENOFF.PS*) utility file redefines some PostScript operators, such as the *setscreen*, *setcolorscreen* and *sethalftone*. By default, the printer prevents applications from overriding the Tektronix proprietary halftone screens. Use the following utility files, depending on your computer type, to control application-defined halftone screens in your prints.

Macintosh file name	PC file name
<i>Setscreen On</i>	<i>SCRENON.PS</i>
<i>Setscreen Off</i> and <i>LaserWriter Utility</i>	<i>SCRENOFF.PS</i>

Macintosh users

1. Refer to “Using the Macintosh Installer” on page 2-53 for instructions on installing the utility files from the Phaser 350 printer’s CD-ROM.
2. Select the appropriate printer in the **Chooser**.
3. Locate the *LaserWriter Utility* in the *PhaserTools* folder on your hard disk, and double-click its icon to start the application.
4. Choose **Download PostScript File** from the **Utilities** menu.
5. Select either the *Setscreen On* or the *Setscreen Off* file from the list, then click **Open**. (These files were installed in the *Printer Utilities* folder, inside the *PhaserTools* folder.)
6. At the prompt `Save PostScript output as:` you are asked for a file name for saving printer output. Use either the default name given in the edit box or type a new name. Click **Save** to send the file to the printer.
7. If no output is returned by the printer, the *LaserWriter Utility* displays a dialog box; click **OK** continue.

PC and workstation users

1. Locate the utility files in the *PHSR350* directory on the printer's CD-ROM.
2. Copy the files that you need to your hard disk or use them directly from the CD-ROM.
3. Use one of the following methods to send the *SCRENON.PS* or the *SCRENOFF.PS* file to the printer:
 - **PC users:** Use the DOS **COPY** command to send the file to the printer. (Windows 3.1 users can also use the **Copy** command in the **File Manager**.)
 - **Workstation users:** Send the file to the printer as you would any PostScript file.

Selecting page sizes in Windows applications

In some Windows applications, you can select printer page sizes in a **Print Setup** dialog box accessed from the **File** menu. If you use a **Print Setup** dialog box to select the Phaser 350 printer from your application, some page sizes may not be visible in the list.

If the Phaser 350 printer page size you want to use is not visible in the list, do the following:

Windows 3.1

1. From the **Main** window, open the **Control Panel** and double-click the **Printers** icon.
2. In the **Printers** dialog box, select the **Phaser 350** printer in the list of printers.
3. Click the **Setup** button.
4. In the **Setup** dialog box, select the page size you want and click **OK**.
5. Return to your application. If you open the **Print Setup** dialog box again from within your application, the page size selection may be blank. The page size you just selected in the driver is still selected, it is just not visible in the list.
6. Print as usual.

If you open the **Print Setup** dialog box from within an application, and the page size selection is blank, the blank represents the page size last selected from the printer driver through the **Control Panel**. You can leave the page size selection blank and print as usual, or you can select another page size from the list.

Windows 95

1. Click the **Start** icon in the taskbar on your screen; a menu appears.
2. Move the cursor over **Settings**; another menu appears.
3. In the menu, click **Printers**; the **Printers** window appears.
4. In the **Printers** window, select the **Phaser 350** printer icon, then select **Properties** from the **File** menu.
5. Click the **Paper** tab.
6. Choose your page size, and click **OK**.
7. Return to your application.

Fonts printing incorrectly from Windows

If fonts are printing incorrectly from Windows, make sure you installed the correct printer with either the Adobe PS3 driver for Windows 3.1, or with the Windows 95 PostScript driver.

- If you have the standard version of the printer, you should have installed **Tektronix Phaser 350**.
- If you have the printer's Extended Features option, you should have installed **Tektronix Phaser 350 600x300** for Windows to recognize and use all of the printer's fonts.

If you select *Tektronix Phaser 350 600x300* and you have only the standard version of the printer with 17 fonts, any of the additional fonts selected within an application are printed in the Courier typeface.

If you are not sure which version of the printer you have, print a copy of the printer's startup page. The standard configuration has 17 fonts and 8 Mbytes of memory; the Extended Features option has 69 fonts and 24 Mbytes of memory. Refer to "Printing Help Pages from the front panel" on page 2-29 for instructions on printing a startup page.

Refer to Chapter 2 for instructions on installing the printer and drivers.

Sharing the printer on a network

Driver, utility files, and front panel interactions

If your Phaser 350 printer is shared by other users on a network, using the downloadable utility files or the printer's front panel to change the printer's default color correction setting can affect prints made by other users.

- When you print from a supported driver with any TekColor color correction selection *except Use Printer Setting*, the driver selection *overrides* the following selections *for prints made from the driver*:
 - A color correction utility file, if one has been downloaded to the printer.
 - The selection on the printer's front panel *TekColor Corrections* menu.
- When you print from a supported driver with the **Use Printer Setting** option, your images are printed with one of the following selections:
 - A color correction utility file, if one has been downloaded to the printer.
 - The selection on the printer's front panel *TekColor Corrections* menu.

- When you print from a non-supported driver, your images are printed with one of the following selections:
 - A color correction utility file, if one has been downloaded to the printer.
 - The selection on the printer's front panel *TekColor Corrections* menu.
- If the colors on your prints are not what you expected, and your system administrator has disabled some of the printer's front panel menus, ask them what settings are in effect and whether a color correction utility file has been downloaded to the printer. You can also print a configuration page to see the current color correction selection; see "Printing Help Pages from the front panel" on page 2-29 for instructions.

If the LaserWriter Utility does not work

The *LaserWriter Utility* cannot be used if the printer is connected to a print server. See your system administrator to temporarily remove the printer from the print server to download any of the PostScript utility files.

If you are using PC/NFS and Windows 3.1

If you have PC/NFS software installed on your computer, you need to make the following selection in the **Network Options** dialog box:

1. From the **Main** window, double-click the **Print Manager** icon.
2. From the **Options** menu in the **Print Manager**, select **Network Settings**.
3. In the **Network Options** dialog box, uncheck the **Print Net Jobs Direct** box.
4. Click **OK**.

Using the Front Panel

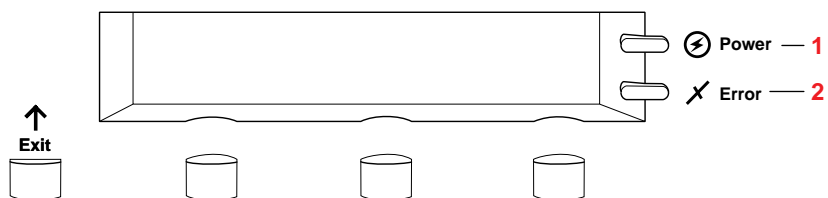
Front panel overview

The printer's front panel provides you with information about the printer's operation, as well as buttons for accessing printer menus.

Front panel indicators

The front panel also includes two indicator lights:

1. **Power** (green LED)
2. **Error** (red LED)

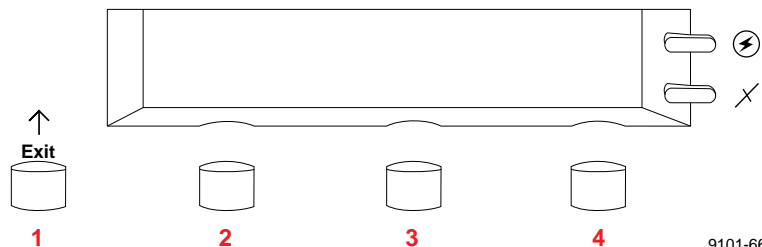


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Indicator	On	Blinking	Off
1. Power	The printer is on and ready for operation.	The printer is processing or printing an image. The printer is in interactive mode: you have pressed the Menu button.	The printer is not ready, or there is an error.
2. Error	If the indicator is on after the power-up sequence, the printer's controller board detects an error that is not user-correctable; the printer requires service.	The printer requires attention: ink is low, for example.	Normal operation: there are no print engine or controller board errors.

Front panel buttons

1. The **Exit** button allows you to perform these menu functions:
 - Back up a level of the menu without making a selection.
 - Exit the menu.
2. Button 2, labeled **Info** lets you cycle through information such as the printer's name, print server name, and the printer's IP address. Pressing **Info** during a print job displays the job name and job source. When you enter the front panel menu by pressing **Menu**, Button 2 lets you:
 - **<-----** Scroll backward through the available selections.
3. Button 3, labeled **Clean** during normal operation, lets you access the cleaning menus. When you enter the front panel menu by pressing **Menu**, Button 3 changes meaning as you select sub-menus:
 - **---->** Scroll forward through the available selections.
 - **Cancel** Cancel a print job or selection.
 - **Confirm** Confirm an address change (IP, Broadcast, Gateway).
4. Button 4, labeled **Menu** during normal operation, lets you enter the front panel menu. After entering the menu, Button 4 changes meaning as you select sub-menus:
 - **Menu** Provides access to sub-menus.
 - **Print** Executes the selected print.
 - **OK** Accepts the selected value.



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Two-line display

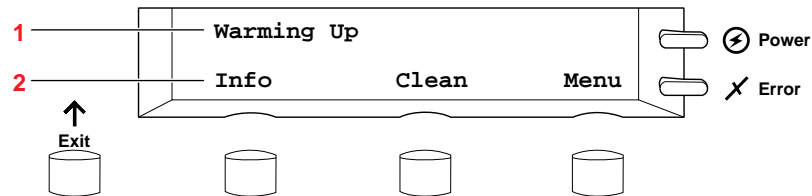
The two lines of the display have the following functions:

Line 1

- Displays status messages such as *Ready*, *Printing* or the printer's name.
- Displays operation errors and warnings such as *Out Of Ink*.
- Displays the names of menus and parameters you can set.

Line 2

- Displays button labels such as *<--* for *previous*, *-->* for *next*, **Info** for displaying printer information, **Menu** for access to a menu of selections, **Clean** for access to cleaning menus, and **Print** and **OK** to make selections.

Enabling and disabling the front panel menu

The printer allows a system administrator to lock the front panel menu by downloading a utility file. In this protected mode, you can print the pages in the Help Pages menu, but *cannot modify any settings in the rest of the menu*. For more information on enabling and disabling the front panel menu, refer to the printer's CD-ROM or the World Wide Web.

When the front panel is enabled, all front panel menu selections are available.

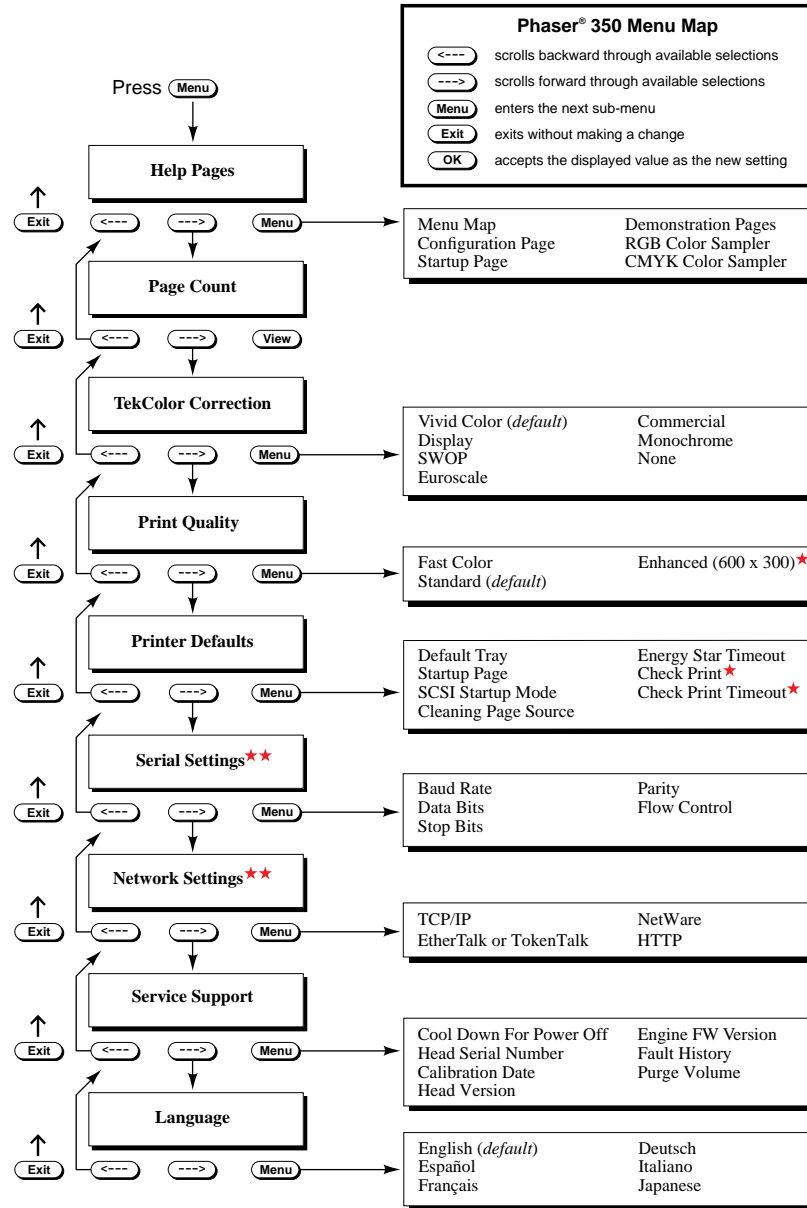

Menu Map

The menu map provides a graphical view of the front panel menus. The menu map can be used as a convenient navigation aid for quickly determining the location of menu items. An online version of the menu map is also available on the World Wide Web.

Configuration Page

The configuration page lists information on the printer's hardware and software configuration and current settings. This page is especially useful during network installation and troubleshooting. You can print the configuration page through the front panel, by sending a PostScript language file to the printer (refer to the printer's CD-ROM), or through the World Wide Web (refer to the *PhaserShare Status Software User Manual*).

Startup Page

The startup page lists the number of pages printed, installed interface ports, software version numbers, installed RAM memory, the number of fonts in memory, and other useful information. By default, printing of the startup page is enabled on power up.

Printing of the startup page can be enabled and disabled through the front panel menu, by sending a PostScript language utility file to the printer, through the *LaserWriter utility* on the Macintosh, or through the World Wide Web (refer to the *PhaserShare Status Software User Manual*). If the printer detects a non-fatal failure, it automatically prints a startup page containing diagnostic information regardless of the startup page setting in the front panel menu.

Demonstration Pages

These pages are sample demonstration pages you can print through the front panel or through the World Wide Web (refer to the *PhaserShare Status Software User Manual*.)

RGB and CMYK Color Samplers

The RGB and CMYK color samplers provide multi-page charts containing color samples and their corresponding color values based on the RGB and CMYK color models. Print these charts to help you select colors for use in your documents. You can print the color sampler charts through the front panel or from the printer's CD-ROM.

Printer standby modes

You can change the Energy Star mode through the front panel or through the World Wide Web (refer to the *PhaserShare Status Software User Manual*.)

Idle for 4 hours When the printer is idle for more than 4 hours, it goes into a standby mode that keeps the printer ready to use yet reduces energy consumption.

The printer exits standby mode when you send a file to the printer, press any front panel button, install or remove a media tray, or open any cover. For example, adding ink causes the printer to exit standby mode. When the printer exits this standby mode, it is ready to print in about 5 minutes.

Energy Star mode When the printer is idle for the time set in the Energy Star front panel menu, it cools down completely. When the printer exits the Energy Star mode, it is ready to print in about 10–15 minutes.

For printers ordered with the Energy Star option, the Energy Star default is set to one hour. After an hour of inactivity, the printer begins a cool-down cycle that requires a 10–15 minute warm-up period before being ready to use again. Increasing the Energy Star value from one hour keeps the printer ready for printing and eliminates the warm-up period. In the printer's standard configuration, the Energy Star default is set to 999 hours.

Since the printer uses ink during warm-up from a power-off condition and when exiting Energy Star mode, you can reduce ink consumption by leaving the printer on. To ensure optimum printing performance and best ink economy, leave the printer turned on overnight and during weekends.

Selecting the cleaning page source

The printer picks sheets of paper from a designated media tray as part of its self-maintenance and jam recovery routines. The default cleaning page source for the printer is the upper tray. When the Lower Paper Tray Assembly is installed, you can change the source of the cleaning page to the lower tray to prevent the printer from using transparencies or letterhead loaded in the upper paper tray.

You can change the cleaning page source through the front panel, by sending a PostScript language file to the printer (refer to the printer's CD-ROM), or through the World Wide Web (refer to the *PhaserShare Status Software User Manual*).

To change the cleaning page source from the printer's front panel, follow these steps:

1. While the **Ready** message is displayed, press the **Menu** button. The printer displays the first item in the setup menu:
