
Telephone base installation

It is recommended to install the telephone base away from any electronic equipment and appliances such as personal computers, computer routers, television sets, microwave ovens, and refrigerators. Avoid excessive heat, cold, dust or moisture. When a location is selected, install the telephone base and the charger as shown below.

- Plug the connector into the power jack at the bottom of the telephone base and chargers. Route cords through slots and plug the power adapter into an electrical outlet not controlled by a wall switch.
- Plug one end of the telephone line cord into the telephone line jack at the bottom of the telephone base. Route the telephone line cord through slot, then plug the other end of the cord into the modular wall telephone outlet.

Your telephone base comes with the bracket installed for desktop use. If you prefer to mount your telephone on the wall, plug in the telephone line cord and the power adapter to the telephone base as instructed above before changing it to a wall mount position (see page 7 for bracket installation).

Plug the telephone line cord into a telephone jack.



Plug power adapter into an electrical outlet not controlled by a wall switch.



note

- Use only the AC power adapter supplied with this telephone.
- This power unit is intended to be correctly oriented in a vertical or floor mount position. The prongs are not designed to hold the plug in place if it is plugged into a ceiling or an under-thetable/cabinet outlet.

- If the handset will not be used for a long period, remove the battery to prevent possible leakage.
- To order a replacement battery go to www. vtechphones.com or call VTech Communications, Inc. at 1 (800) 595-9511 in the United States. In Canada, go to www. vtechcanada. com. or call 1 (800) 267-7377.
- After you install the battery, there may be enough power for short calls.

Installation


Install handset battery


- Align the two holes of the battery plug with the socket pins in the handset battery compartment, matching the red and black wires to the color-coded label.
- Place the battery in the compartment with the wires in the upper left corner.
- Position the battery compartment cover and slide it towards the unit until it clicks into place.
- For optimal performance, we recommend that you charge the handset for 16 hours.

You can keep the battery charged by returning the handset to the telephone base after each use. When the battery power is fully depleted, a full recharge takes about 16 hours.









Belt clip & headset (optional)


For hands-free telephone conversations, use any industry standard 2.5mm headset (purchased separately). For best results, use a VTech 2.5mm headset.

Headset

Plug the 2.5 mm headset into the jack on the side of the handset (beneath the small rubber flap).







Belt clip

Align the pins on the inside edge of the clip with the notches on the sides of the handset.

- Whenever a compatible headset is connected to the cordless handset. the microphone on the handset will be muted. This reduces background noise and improves the sound quality.
- If the sound quality of the headset is poor. try unplugging it, and firmly plugging it in again.

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About caller ID

The caller ID with call waiting features in this telephone lets you see the name and telephone number of the caller before answering the call, even when you're already on a call. These features require services provided by your local telephone company.

Contact your telephone company if:

- You have both caller ID and call waiting, but as separate services (you may need combined service),
- · You have only caller ID service, or only call waiting service, or
- You do not subscribe to any caller ID or call waiting services but wish to try these services.

You can use this telephone with regular caller ID service, and you can use its other features without subscribing to either caller ID or combined caller ID with call waiting service. There may be fees for these services, and they may not be available in all areas.


The caller ID features will work only if both you and the caller are in areas offering caller ID service, and if both telephone companies use compatible equipment.

Voicemail service

If you subscribe to voicemail service provided by your telephone company, you can receive voicemail left by the caller. When you have new voicemail, the handset will display **NEW VOICE MAIL** \square .

If you subscribe to DSL service

If you receive high speed internet through your telephone line (commonly referred to as DSL), and you are experiencing interference during telephone conversations and/or your caller ID features are not functioning properly, install a DSL filter to the telephone line between the telephone base and the telephone wall jack. To obtain a DSL filter and more information about DSL interference, contact your DSL service provider.




note

 Most DSL providers recommend installing a DSL filter in every telephone jack. Your DSL service provider may provide more information regarding telephone interference.

Wall mounting bracket installation (optional)

Your telephone base comes with the wall mounting/desktop bracket installed, ready for desktop use. If you prefer to mount your telephone on the wall (optional), it is designed to mount on a standard telephone wall plate. For wall mounting, follow these instructions:

- First, insert the lower portion tabs of the wall mounting/desktop bracket into the lower grooves in the telephone base, then snap the upper portion tabs of the bracket into place.
- Mount the telephone base on the wall by positioning it so the mounting studs will fit into the holes on the telephone base and wall mounting/desktop bracket. Slide the telephone base down on the mounting studs until it locks into place.
- To remove the bracket, press both upper portion tabs firmly inward and pull the bracket downward until it release from the grooves.







To place your telephone base on a desk or table, insert the wall mounting/desktop bracket.


- Insert the lower portion tabs of the bracket into the upper grooves of the telephone base.

- To remove the bracket, press both upper portion tabs firmly inward and pull the bracket upward until it is released from the grooves.






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Handset layout



Telephone settings

Ringer volume

Your telephone has seven volume levels to choose from. You can adjust ringer volume either by the volume control on the right side of the handset, or in the handset menu. To change the ringer volume:

- Make sure the handset is in idle mode.
- Press the volume button to display the current volume level on the screen.
- Press VOL ▲ or ▼ to choose the desired volume level. When finished, the new volume level will be saved.

-OR-

- Press the center NavKey (1) in idle mode to display the menu.
- Press the left or right NavKey (2) or (2) to adjust the volume. A sample of each ringer volume will be played when scrolling through the choices.



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When the telephone is in pulse dial mode. it is possible to switch to temporary tone dial mode during an ongoing call by pressing *TONE. Once pressed, tone dial mode will be used for the rest of the call. After you hang up, the telephone will return to pulse dialing for the next call.

Telephone settings

Key tone

The key tone is programmed to be on. When the key tone option is enabled, a tone will sound when any key is pressed on the handset.

- Press the center NavKey (1) in idle mode to display menu.
- Press the up or down NavKey () or () to reach SOUNDS then press the center NavKey ().
- Press the up or down NavKey (2) or (2) to reach KEY TONE then press the center NavKey (2).
- Press the up or down NavKey (2) or (2) to select ON or OFF then press the center NavKey (2).

Settings menu

In the settings menu, you can change the language, dial type, clock, and clear voicemail. To enter the settings menu, press the center NavKey () in idle mode. Then press the up or down NavKey () or () to reach **SETTINGS**, then press the center NavKey () to confirm.

Language

The language menu allows you to select between **ENGLISH**, **FRANÇAIS** or **ESPAÑOL** to be used in all menus and screen displays. To change the language:

- When in the SETTINGS menu, press the center NavKey (1) to select LANGUAGE.
- Press the up or down NavKey (2) or (2) to scroll through the choices, then press CENTER NavKey (2) to save your selection.

Dial type

The dial type is preset to touch tone. If you would like to change this setting to dial pulse (rotary):

- When in the SETTINGS menu, press the down NavKey to choose DIAL TYPE. Press the center NavKey (a).
- Press the up or down NavKey (2) or (2) to choose TONE or PULSE, then press the center NavKey (2).

Clock setting

In this menu, you can set the clock for the handset.

- When in the CLOCK SETTING menu the digit keys on the handset can also be used to change the hour and minute.
- If you subscribe to caller ID services, the clock will be set automatically with the next incoming call.
- If the date and time on one handset are changed, they will not be automatically updated on all other handsets.
- Clear voicemail is a temporary function. The light will turn on again after a new message is left.

Display menu

In the display menu, you can change the wallpaper and contrast. To enter the display menu, press the center NavKey (a) in idle mode. Then press the up or down NavKey (b) or (c) to reach **DISPLAY**, then press the center NavKey (c) to confirm.

Wallpaper

The handset is preset with background pictures (wallpaper) that will display when the handset is in idle mode. To change the wallpaper:

- Press the center NavKey () in idle mode to display the menu.
- Press the up or down NavKey (1) or (1) to reach DISPLAY, then press the center NavKey (1).

Make, answer, and end calls with the handset

To make a call press [™]/FLASH or [■])/SPEAKER, then dial the number.

- Dial the number, then press **TALK**/FLASH or **SPEAKER**.
- To answer a call, press TALK/FLASH, W/SPEAKER or any of the dial pad keys (0-9, #, *).

Handset speakerphone

 During a call, press I)/SPEAKER to select between speakerphone and normal handset use.


Mute

The mute function allows you to hear the other party, but they will not be able to hear you. To use the mute function:

- The screen will display the MUTE icon.
- Press MUTE/REMOVE again to return to normal conversation.

Volume

Intercom

The intercom feature allows conversation between handsets.

- Press INT to display menu while in idle mode.
- The screen will display INTERCOM TO:
- Use the dial pad to select the destination handset.
- The screen of the originating handset will display CALLING HANDSET X.
- The destination handset will ring, and the screen will display **HANDSET** X IS CALLING.

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To answer the intercom call on the handset, press TALK/FLASH,

(**J**)/SPEAKER, INT or any dialing keys (0-9,#,*) on the handset.

• To end an intercom call, press **INT**, **OFF/CLEAR**, or place the handset back in the telephone base or charger.

Conference call

You can conference up to two registered handsets on an external line. If one handset is on the line, press **TALK**/FLASH or **SPEAKER** on another handset to join the call.

Transfer an external call

Your phone allows you to transfer an external call from one handset to any other handset.

- During a call, press **INT** to put the call on hold at the originating handset. The screen will display **TRANSFER TO:**

Answering intercom and external calls

When on an external call and you wish to intercom another handset without dropping the external call:

- Press INT.
- Press the handset number you wish to reach. The screen will display CALLING HANDSET X.
- After the destination handset has answered the intercom call, press INT on the originating handset to select between the external call (outside) and intercom call.

Answer an incoming call during an intercom call

- During an intercom call, there will be an alert tone signaling an incoming call.
- To answer the incoming call, press ^{TALK}/FLASH or [■])/SPEAKER on the handset, and the intercom call will end automatically.
- To end the intercom call without answering the incoming call, press **OFF/CLEAR** on the handset.



Voicemail

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Directory

The directory on the handset can store up to 50 entries, with each entry consisting up to 32 digits and 16 characters.

- Press OFF/CLEAR to exit the menu without saving any changes.
- DIRECTORY EMPTY is displayed on screen when there are no entries in the directory.

Store a directory entry

- From the directory menu, press the center NavKey (a) twice then press the up or down NavKey (a) or (a) to choose STORE. Press the center NavKey (a).
- The screen displays ENTER NUMBER. Use the dial pad to enter the number.
- Press MUTE/REMOVE to backspace, or press and hold REDIAL/ PAUSE for at least three seconds to insert a pause. Press the center NavKey (1) to save.
- The screen displays ENTER NAME. Use the dial pad (see the Chart of characters on page 19) to enter the name.
- Press **MUTE/REMOVE** to backspace, or press **#** to insert a space. Press the center NavKey **(a)**.
- When the directory is full and you attempt to save an entry, LIST FULL will display.
- If you attempt to save a number already stored in the directory, **ALREADY SAVED** will display.

- Since the directory is shared by all the handsets, only one handset can review the directory at a time.
- If a handset attempts to enter the directory while the other handset is in the directory, NOT AVAILABLE AT THIS TIME will be displayed.

 When entering characters, press MUTE/REMOVE to backspace. To remove the entire name or number, press and hold MUTE/REMOVE.

• To insert a dialing pause when entering a telephone number, <u>press and hold</u> **REDIAL/PAUSE** for at least three seconds until a **p** appears on the handset screen.

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Directory

Search the directory

Entries are sorted alphabetically, and names beginning with numbers are presented first. An alphabetical search can be done after entering the directory.

For example, press ${\bf 5}~({\bf JKL})$ once to find Jenny, twice to find Kristen, or three times to find Linda.

- Press № to enter the directory, or press the center NavKey (when in the directory to choose **REVIEW**.
- Use the dial pad to display the first name beginning with a letter associated with that key.

Dial a directory entry

- Press № to enter the directory, or press the center NavKey (a) when in the directory to choose **REVIEW**.
- Press the up or down NavKey (2) or (2) to scroll to the desired entry, or use the alphabetical search to find it.
- Press **TALK/FLASH** or **W/SPEAKER** to dial the entry.

Edit a directory entry

- Press ☺ to enter the directory, or from the directory press the center NavKey () then press the up or down NavKey () or () to choose REVIEW. Press the center NavKey ().
- Press the up or down NavKey (2) or (2) to scroll to the desired entry, or use the alphabetical search to find the number. Press the center NavKey (2).
- The screen displays EDIT NUMBER. Use the dial pad to enter the number.

Call log

If you subscribe to caller ID service, information about each caller will be displayed after the first or second ring.


- The call log can store up to 50 entries.
- You can review, redial, and copy the entry into the directory.
- Entries are displayed in order from the most recent entry to the oldest entry.
- When the call log is full, the oldest entry is deleted to make room for new incoming call information.
- XX MISSED CALL and the NEW icon will be displayed on the handset screen if there are new call log entries, i.e. missed calls (including missed call waiting records) and un-reviewed calls.
- CALL LOG EMPTY will display on the handset screen if there are no call log entries.

The call log can be accessed on the handset by pressing CID, or pressing the center NavKey (a) then \checkmark , then press the center NavKey (a) again.

Review the call log

- When in the call log, press the up or down NavKey (or (to scroll through the handset call log.
- The name, number, date and time of all incoming calls will be displayed on the handset screen.
- There will be an error tone when the list reaches the top or the end of the call log.





note

- Due to regional service differences, caller ID information may not be available for every incoming call. In addition, the callers may intentionally block their name and/or telephone number.
- The time of all handsets is automatically set and updated with incoming caller ID information if you subscribe to this service.
- If the telephone number of the caller matches the exact telephone number in the directory, the name of the entry will be shown, otherwise, the name will be shown as delivered by the telephone company.

When saving or deleting a number on one handset, it will automatically update all other handsets.

 Only one handset can review the directory or call log at a time. If another handset attempts to enter the call log, it will display NOT AVAILABLE AT THIS TIME.

Advanced operation

Call log

Make CID entries ready to dial

Although the call log entries you receive are 10 digits, (the area plus the 7-digit number,) in some areas, you may need to dial only the seven digits, or a 1 plus the seven digits, or a 1 plus the seven digits, or a 1 plus the area code plus the seven digits. You can change the number of digits that you dial or store from the call log.

While reviewing the call log, press **#** repeatedly to display these dialing options for local and long distance numbers before dialing or saving the telephone number. See an example at right.

Dial a call log entry

- When in the call log, press the up or down NavKey (2) or (2) to scroll to the desired entry.
- If necessary, press # repeatedly until you see the correct dialing option.
- Press [™]/FLASH or ■)/SPEAKER to dial the entry.

Save an entry to the directory

- When in the call log, press the up or down NavKey (2) or (2) to scroll to the desired entry.
- If necessary, press # repeatedly until you see the correct dialing option.
- Press the center NavKey () to save the entry.
- If the entry has a name and a number, the screen displays SAVED.
- If the entry only has a name or a number, EDIT NAME or EDIT NUMBER will display on screen. Use the dial pad to enter the name or number, and press the center NavKey (a) to save the entry.
- If the entry does not have a name and a number, UNABLE TO SAVE will display on screen.

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Call log

Delete one or all entries

- While in the call log, press the up or down NavKey (2) or (2) to scroll to the desired entry.
- Press MUTE/REMOVE to delete an entry. <u>Press and hold MUTE/</u> REMOVE to delete all entries, the screen display DELETE ALL CALLS? then press the center NavKey (), there will be a confirmation tone.

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Redial list

The telephone stores the five most recently dialed numbers in the redial list. You can review, redial, or save numbers into the directory.

- Entries are displayed in order from the oldest entry to the most recent entry.


The redial list can be accessed on the handset by pressing $\ensuremath{\textbf{REDIAL/PAUSE}}$ while in idle mode.

Dial from redial

- While in the redial list, press **REDIAL**, or press the up or down (2) or (2) to scroll to the desired number.
- Press TALK/FLASH or SPEAKER to dial the number.
- To change the number before dialing, press the center NavKey () to select the number, and use the keypad to change the number.



Message capacity

The answering system can record up to 99 messages, depending on the length of each message. Individual messages can be up to four minutes in length, but the total maximum recording time is approximately 15 minutes. Messages will remain available for replay until they are deleted.



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Press and hold /SKIP or (REPEAT during setting the minutes or year by

minutes or year by increments of ten.

- Incoming caller ID data sets the time and date. You'll need to set the year so the day of the week can be determined from the caller ID information. The time will be set automatically only if you subscribe to caller ID service provided by your local telephone company.


The answering system must be turned on to answer and record messages. If the answering system is turned off, the telephone base **ANS ON/OFF** light will be off.


• To turn the answering system on or off, press ANS ON/OFF.

Set the clock

Before playing each message, the answering system announces the day and time the message was received. You should set the day and time before using the answering system so messages are dated correctly. If the clock has not been set before you receive messages on your answering system, it will announce *"Time and day not set."* To set the clock:

- Press CLOCK, the system will announce the current clock setting. The system will then announce "To set the clock, press CLOCK."
- Press CLOCK again and the system will announce the year.
- Press >/SKIP or
 /REPEAT until the system announces the correct year, then press CLOCK. The system will announce the hour.
- Press ➤ /SKIP or ≪/REPEAT, until the system announces the correct hour, then press CLOCK. The system will announce the minute.







Answering system setup

Set remote access code

A two-digit security code is required to access the answering system from any touch tone telephone. The factory default code is **19**. To set the remote access code:

- Press **SETUP** in idle mode until the system announces the remote access code setting.
- Press >/SKIP or
 /REPEAT to change the remote access code by one, or press and hold >/SKIP or
 /REPEAT to change by increments of 10. Press SETUP to save the setting and go to the next setting or press
 /PLAY/STOP to save and return to idle mode.

Set message alert tone

This feature programs the system to beep every 10 seconds to alert you of new messages. The beeping will stop when all new messages have been reviewed. To set the message alert tone:


Memos are your own recorded messages used as a reminder for yourself or other household members who use the same answering system. They are saved, played back and deleted the same way as incoming messages.

Record a memo

- While in idle mode, press RECORD. The system announces "*Record after* the tone, press STOP when you are done." After the tone, speak towards the microphone at the right front of the telephone base from about nine inches away.
- Press ▶/■ /PLAY/STOP when you finish recording.

Memo playback

- While in idle mode, press ▶/■ /PLAY/STOP.

- Memos less than one second will not be recorded.

Make sure the telephone line cord is plugged firmly into the telephone base and the modular wall jack. Unplug the unit's electrical power. Wait for approximately 15 seconds, then plug it back in. Allow up to one minute for the cordless handset and base to synchronize. Charge the battery in the cordless handset for at least 16 hours. Remove and re-insert the battery. If that still does not work, it may be necessary to purchase a new battery. Disconnect the telephone base from the modular jack and plug in a working telephone. If this telephone does not work, the problem is probably in the wiring or the local service. Call the local telephone company.
LOW BATTERY is displayed on screen.	 Place the handset in the telephone base or charger for recharging. Remove and re-install the battery and use it normally until fully discharged, then recharge the handset on the telephone base or charger for 16 hours. If the above measures do not correct the problem, the battery may need to be replaced.

Problem	Suggestion
The battery does not charge in the handset or the handset battery does not accept charge.	 Make sure the handset is placed in the charger correctly. The CHARGE light on the telephone base or charger should be on. Remove the battery from the handset. Then re-install the battery and let it charge for 16 hours. If the cordless handset is in the charger or in the telephone base but the CHARGE light is not on, refer to The CHARGE light is off in this section. It may be necessary to purchase a new battery. Make sure the telephone is set to the correct dial mode (pulse dial or tone dial) for the service in your area. Refer to the Dial type section of this user's manual (page 12) to set the dial mode. Problem

Suggestion

There is noise or interference during a telephone conversation.

My calls fade out or cut in and out when I am using the cordless handset.

- The handset may be out of range. Move it closer to the telephone base.
- Appliances or other cordless telephones plugged into the same circuit as the telephone base can cause interference. Try moving the appliance or telephone base to another outlet.
- Other electronic products can cause interference to your cordless telephone. Try installing

My caller ID features are not working properly.	 Caller ID is a subscription service. You must subscribe to this service from your local telephone company for this feature to work on your telephone. The caller may not be calling from an area which supports caller ID. Both you and the caller's telephone companies must use equipment which are compatible with caller ID service. You can change the number of digits that you dial or store from the call log. While reviewing the call log, press # repeatedly to display these dialing options for local and long distance numbers before dialing or saving the telephone number.
CONNECTING is shown in the handset display window. Why don't I get a dial tone when I try to use this telephone?	 De-register all handsets and then register the handsets again (only one handset can be registered at a time). To de-register all handsets: <u>Press and hold FIND HANDSET</u> on the main telephone base for four seconds. When the IN USE light starts to flash, release the FIND HANDSET button. The answering system does not answer after the correct number of rings.	 Make sure the answering system is on. When the answering system is on, the red light on the ANSWER ON/OFF key should be lit. If Toll Saver is activated, the number of rings changes to two when there are new messages waiting (see page 28). If the memory is full or if the answering system is off, the system will answer after ten rings. In some cases, the answering system be affected by the ringing system used by the local telephone company.
The announcement message is not clear.	 When recording the announcement, make sure you speak in a normal tone of voice about nine inches from the telephone base. Make sure there is no background noise (television, music, traffic, etc.) when recording.

The messages on the answering system are incomplete.	 If a caller leaves a very long message, part of it may be lost when the system disconnects the call after 90 seconds. If the memory on the system becomes full during a message, the system stops recording and disconnects the call. If the caller's voice is very soft, the system may stop recording and disconnect the call.
The messages on the system are very difficult to hear.	 Press VOL▲/▼ on the side of the handset or on the telephone base to increase the speaker volume.

The answering system does not respond to remote commands.	 Make sure your remote access code is correct (see page 29). Make sure you are calling from a touch-tone telephone. When dialing a number, you should hear tones. If you hear clicks, then it is not a touch-tone telephone and cannot activate the answering system. The answering system may not detect the remote access code when your announcement is playing. Wait until the announcement is over before entering the code. There may be interference on the telephone line you are using. Press the dial pad keys firmly when dialing.
Common cure for electronic equipment.	 If the unit is not responding normally, trying putting the cordless handset in the telephone base or the charger. If it does not seem to respond, try the following (in the order listed): Disconnect the power to the telephone base. Disconnect the battery on the cordless handset. Wait a few minutes before connecting power to the telephone base. Re-install the battery and place the cordless handset into the telephone base or charger. Wait for the cordless handset to synchronize its connection with the telephone base. Allow up to one minute for this to take place.

Operating range

This cordless telephone operates with the maximum power allowed by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). Even so, this handset and telephone base can communicate over only a certain distance ----which can vary with the locations of the telephone base and handset, the weather, and the layout of your home or office.

When the handset is out of range, the handset will display Searching. The user can access the handset directory, and certain parts of the menu system, i.e. handset setting and registration, but not the time setting and base setting. Not possible will be displayed if access is tried.

If there is a call while the handset is out of range, it might not ring, or if it does ring, the call might not connect well when you press TALK/FLASH. Move closer to the telephone base, then press TALK/FLASH to answer the call.

If the handset moves out of range during a telephone conversation, there might be interference.

To improve reception, move closer to the base.

Maintenance

Taking care of your telephone

Your cordless telephone contains sophisticated electronic parts, so it must be treated with care.

Avoid rough treatment

Place the handset down gently. Save the original packing materials to protect your telephone if you ever need to ship it.

Avoid water

Your telephone can be damaged if it gets wet. Do not use the handset outdoors in the rain, or handle it with wet hands. Do not install your telephone base near a sink, bathtub or shower. Electrical storms

Electrical storms can sometimes cause power surges harmful to electronic equipment. For your own safety, use caution when using electric appliances during storms.

Cleaning your telephone

Your telephone has a durable plastic casing that should retain its luster for many years. Clean it only with a soft cloth slightly dampened with water or a mild soap. Do not use excess water or cleaning solvents of any kind.

Remember that electrical appliances can cause serious injury if used when you are wet or standing in water. If your telephone base should fall into water, DO NOT RETRIEVE IT UNTIL YOU UN-PLUG THE POWER CORD AND TELEPHONE LINE CORDS FROM THE WALL. Then pull the unit out by the unplugged cords.

About cordless telephones

- Privacy: the same features that make a cordless telephone convenient create some limitations. Telephone calls are transmitted between the base and the cordless handset by radio waves, so
 there is a possibility that your cordless telephone conversations could be intercepted by radio receiving equipment within range of the cordless handset. For this reason, you should not think
 of cordless telephone conversations as being as private as those on corded telephones.
- Electrical Power: The telephone base of this cordless telephone must be connected to a working electrical outlet. The electrical outlet should not be controlled by a wall switch. Calls cannot
 be made from the cordless handset if the telephone base is unplugged or switched off, or if the electrical power is interrupted.

If the Product failure is not covered by this limited warranty, or proof of purchase does not meet the terms of this limited warranty, VTech will notify you and will request that you authorize the cost of repair prior to any further repair activity. You must pay for the cost of repair and return shipping costs for the repair of Products that are not covered by this limited warranty.

What must you return with the Product to get warranty service?

- 1. Return the entire original package and contents including the Product to the VTech service location along with a description of the malfunction or difficulty; and
