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Preface

This maintenance manual describes how to perform hardware service maintenance for the Toshiba Personal Computer PORTEGE A600

The procedures described in this manual are intended to help service technicians isolate faulty Field Replaceable Units (FRUs) and replace them in the field.

SAFETY PRECAUTIONS

Four types of messages are used in this manual to bring important information to your attention. Each of these messages will be italicized and identified as shown below.

DANGER: "Danger" indicates the existence of a hazard that could result in death or serious bodily injury, if the safety instruction is not observed.

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1.1 Features 1 Hardware Overview

1.1 Features

The Toshiba PORTEGE A600 Personal Computer uses extensive Large Scale Integration (LSI), and Complementary Metal-Oxide Semiconductor (CMOS) technology extensively to provide compact size, minimum weight, low power usage and high reliability. This computer incorporates the following features.

There some models and options. Refer to the Parts List for the configuration of each model and options.

■ Microprocessor

The Toshiba PORTEGE A600 computer is equipped with an Intel[®] CoreTM 2 Duo ULV Processor. These processors incorporate a math co-processor, a 3MB L2 cache memory.

- SU9400 (1.40GHz)
- SU9300 (1.20GHz)

These processors operate at 800MHz bus clock (FSB).

The PORTEGE A600 is Equipped with Intel Cantiga GS as North Bridge, Intel ICH9M SFF as South Bridge and RICHO R5C847 Card Controller.

An internal Graphics Controller in North Bridge is used.

Batteries
The computer has two batteries: a rechargeable Lithium-Ion main battery pack and RTC battery (that backs up the Real Time Clock and CMOS memory.
Universal Serial Bus (USB2.0)
Two USB ports are provided. The ports comply with the USB2.0 standard, which enables data transfer speeds 40 times faster than USB1.1 standard. USB1.1 is also supported.
eSATA/USB combo
One eSATA/USB combo port, which complies to. The USB 2.0 standard is provided. This port has eSATA (External Serial ATA) function. A power supply is always supplied to one USB ports on the left side of a computer.
External monitor (RGB) port
The port enables connection of an external monitor, which is recognized automatically by Video Electronics Standards Association (VESA) Display Data Channel (DDC) 2B compatible functions.
ExpressCard slot
The internal ExpressCard slot is a Universal slot. This slot supports ExpressCard/54 and ExpressCard/34 modules.

The RJ11 modem jack is used to accommodate a telephone line. Both of V.90 and V.92 are supported only in USA, Canada and Australia. Only V.90 is available in other regions.

The computer is equipped with LAN circuits that support Gigabit Ethernet LAN (1000 megabits per second, 1000BASE-T). It also supports Wakeup on LAN (WOL), Magic Packet and LED.

Wireless LAN
The computer is equipped with PCI-Ex MiniCard type wireless LAN board that supports 802.11 b/g, 802.11 a/b/g or 802.11 a/b/g/n in the PCI-Ex MiniCard slot. This function can be switched on and off by a switch on the computer.
Bluetooth
Depending on the model, the computer is equipped with a dedicated Bluetooth module. This enables a communication to devices that support Bluetooth This Bluetooth Stack is based on the Bluetooth Version 1.1/1.2/2.0+EDR/2.1+EDR specification.
Web Camera is a device that allows you to record video or take photographs with your computer. Enables the transmission of video and use of video chat via the internet using specialized applications. The effective pixel count for this web camera is 0.3 million (maximum photograph size: 640x480 pixels).
Intel Turbo Memory (Robson): PCI Express Mini Card slot (Not Used) This computer (Some models) is Intel Turbo Memory loading.




Figure 1-1 Front of the computer




Figure 1-2 System unit configuration




Figure 1-3 System unit block diagram




Figure 1-4 3.5-inch FDD (USB External)

The FDD is shown in figure 1-4. The specifications for the FDD are listed in Table 1-1.




Figure 1-5 2.5-inch HDD

The HDD is shown in figure 1-5. Specifications are listed in Table 1-2.

1.7 Keyboard

The keyboard is mounted 85(US)/87(UK) keys that consist of character key and control key, and in conformity with JIS. The keyboard is connected to membrane connector on the system board and controlled by the keyboard controller.




Figure 1-6 Keyboard

1.8 TFT Color Display

The TFT color display consists of 12.1-inch WXGA LCD module.

1.8.1 LCD Module




Figure 1-7 LCD module

The LCD module used for the TFT color display uses a white LED backlight as the light source and can display a maximum of 16M colors with 1,200 x 800 resolutions. The VGA in North Bridge can control internal and external WXGA support displays simultaneously. Figure 1-7 shows a view of the LCD module and Table 1-5 lists the specifications.

1.9 Power Supply 1 Hardware Overview

1.9 Power Supply

The power supply supplies many different voltages to the system board and performs the following functions:

- 1. Judges that the DC power supply (AC adapter) is connected to the computer.
- 2. Detects DC output and circuit malfunctions.
- 3. Controls the battery icon, and DC IN icon.
- 4. Turns the battery charging system on and off and detects a fully charged battery.
- 5. Turns the power supply on and off.
- 6. Provides more accurate detection of a low battery.
- 7. Calculates the remaining battery capacity.
- 8. Controls the transmission of the status signal of the main battery.

The power supply output rating is specified in Table 1-8.

1.10.1 Main Battery

The removable main battery pack is the computer's main power source when the AC adaptor is not attached. The main battery maintains the state of the computer when the computer enters in sleep mode.

1.10.2 Battery Charging Control

Battery charging is controlled by a power supply microprocessor. The microprocessor controls whether the charge is on or off and detects a full charge when the AC adaptor and battery are attached to the computer. The system charges the battery.

Battery Charge

When the AC adaptor is attached, there are two types of charge: When the system is powered off and when the system is powered on. Table 1-8 lists the charging time required for charges.

NOTE: The time required when the system is powered on is affected by the amount of power the system is consuming. Use of the fluorescent lamp and frequent disk access diverts power and lengthens the charge time.

If any of the following occurs, the battery charge process stops.

- 1. The battery becomes fully charged.
- 2. The AC adaptor or battery is removed.
- 3. The battery or output voltage is abnormal.

☐ Detection of full charge

A full charge is detected only when the battery is charging at charge. A full charge is detected under any of the following conditions:

- 1. The current in the battery charging circuit drops under the predetermined limit.
- 2. The charging time exceeds the fixed limit.

☐ Data preservation time

When turning off the power in being charged fully, the preservation time is as following Table 1-9.

Troubleshooting Procedures

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2.1 Troubleshooting

Chapter 2 describes how to determine which Field Replaceable Unit (FRU) in the computer is causing the computer to malfunction. (The "FRU" means the replaceable unit in the field.) The FRUs covered are:

- 1. Power supply
- 2. System Board
- 3. USB FDD
- 4. Hard Disk Drive
- 5. Keyboard
- 6. Touch pad
- 7. Display

- 8. Optical Disk Drive
- 9. Modem
- 10. LAN
- 11. Wireless LAN
- 12. Bluetooth
- 13. Sound
- 14. 3G

- 15. SD Card Slot
- 16. Fingerprint Sensor
- 17. Web camerta
- 18. Intel Turbo Memory

The Test Program operations are described in Chapter 3. Detailed replacement procedures are described in Chapter 4.

NOTE: Before replacing the system board, it is necessary to execute the subtest 03 DMI Information save of the 3.4 Setting of the hardware configuration in Chapter 3.

After replacing the system board, it is necessary to execute the subtest 04 DMI Information recovery and subtest 08 System configuration display of the 3.4 Setting of the hardware configuration in Chapter 3. Also update with the latest EC/KBC as described in Appendix H "EC/KBC Rewrite Procedures".

After replacing the LCD, update with the latest EC/KBC as described in Appendix H "EC/KBC Rewrite Procedures" to set the SVP parameter.

The implement for the Diagnostics procedures is referred to Chapter 3. Also, following implements are necessary:

- 1. Phillips screwdrivers (For replacement procedures)
- 2. Implements for debugging port check
 - Toshiba MS-DOS system FD
 - RS-232C cross cable
 - Test board with debug port test cable
 - PC for displaying debug port test result

There are following two types of connections in the figure of board and module connection in and after 2.3 Power Supply Troubleshooting.

- (1) Cable connection is described in the figure as line.
- (2) Pin connection is described in the figure as arrow.
- <e.g> Connection of modem

2.2 Troubleshooting Flowchart




Figure 2-1 Troubleshooting flowchart (1/2)

Use the flowchart in Figure 2-1 as a guide for determining which troubleshooting procedure to execute. Before going through the flowchart steps, verify the following:
☐ Ask him or her to enter the password if a password is registered.
☐ Verify with the customer that Toshiba Windows is installed on the hard disk. Non-Windows operating systems can cause the computer to malfunction.
☐ Make sure all optional equipment is removed from the computer.




Figure 2-1 Troubleshooting flowchart (2/2)

If the diagnostics program cannot detect an error, the problem may be intermittent. The Test program should be executed several times to isolate the problem. Check the Log Utilities function to confirm which diagnostic test detected an error(s), then perform the appropriate troubleshooting procedures as follows:

- 1. If an error is detected on the system test, memory test, display test, CD-ROM/DVD-ROM test, expansion test, real timer test, sound test or Modem/LAN/Bluetooth /IEEE1394 test, perform the System Board Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.4.
- 2. If an error is detected on the floppy disk test, perform the USB FDD Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.5.
- 3. If an error is detected on the hard disk test, perform the HDD Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.6.
- 4. If an error is found on the keyboard test (DIAGNOSTICS TEST) and pressed key display test (ONLY ONE TEST), perform the Keyboard Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.7.
- 5. If an error is found on the touch pad test (ONLY ONE TEST), perform the touch pad Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.8.
- 6. If an error is detected on the display test, perform the Display Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.9.
- 7. If an error is detected on the CD-ROM/DVD-ROM test, perform the Optical Disk Drive Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.10.
- 8. If an error is detected on the modem test, perform the Modem Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.11.
- 9. If an error is detected on the LAN test, perform the LAN Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.12.
- 10. If an error is detected on the wireless LAN test, perform the Wireless LAN Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.13.
- 11. If an error is detected on the Bluetooth test, perform the Bluetooth Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.14.
- 12. If an error is detected on the sound test, perform the Sound Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.15.
- 13. If an error is detected on the 3G, perform the 3G Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.16.
- 14. If an error is detected on SD card, perform the SD Card Slot Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.17.

- 15. If a malfunction is detected on the fingerprint sensor, perform the Fingerprint Sensor Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.18.
- 16. If a malfunction is detected on the Web camerta, perform the Web camerta Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.19.
- 17. If a malfunction is detected on the Intel Turbo Memory, perform the Intel Turbo Memory Troubleshooting Procedures in Section 2.20.

2.3 Power Supply Troubleshooting

The power supply controller controls many functions and components. To determine if the power supply is functioning properly, start with Procedure 1 and continue with the other Procedures as instructed. The procedures described in this section are:

Procedure 1: Power Status Check
Procedure 2: Error Code Check
Procedure 3: Connection Check
Procedure 4: Charging Check
Procedure 5: Replacement Check

Procedure 1 Power Status Check

The following icons indicate the power supply status:

□ Battery icon□ DC IN icon

The power supply controller displays the power supply status with the Battery icon and the DC IN icon as listed in the tables below.

Lights orange	Battery is charged and the external DC is input. It has no relation with ON/OFF of the system power.





Procedure 3 Connection Check

The wiring diagram related to the power supply is shown below:



Any of the connectors may be disconnected. Perform Check 1.

- Check 1 Make sure the AC adapter and the AC power cord are firmly plugged into the DC IN jack and wall outlet. If these cables are connected firmly, go to Check 2.
- Check 2 Replace the AC adapter and the AC power cord with new ones.
 - If the DC IN icon does not light, go to Procedure 5.
 - If the battery icon does not light, go to Check 3.
- Check 3 Make sure the battery pack is installed in the computer correctly. If the battery is properly installed and the battery icon still does not light, go to Procedure 4.

Procedure 4 Charging Check

Check if the power supply controller charges the battery pack properly. Perform the following procedures:

- Check 1 Make sure the AC adapter is firmly plugged into the DC IN jack.
- Check 2 Make sure the battery pack is properly installed. If it is properly installed, go to Check 3.
- Check 3 The battery pack may be completely discharged. Wait a few minutes to charge the battery pack while connecting the battery pack and the AC adapter. If the battery pack is still not charged, go to Check 4.
- Check 4 The battery's temperature is too high or low. Leave the battery for a while to adjust it in the right temperature. If the battery pack is still not charged, go to Check 5.
- Check 5 Replace the battery pack with a new one. If the battery pack is still not charged, go to Procedure 5.

Procedure 5 Replacement Check

The power is supplied to the system board by the AC adapter. If either the AC adapter or the system board was damaged, perform the following Checks.

To disassemble the computer, follow the steps described in Chapter 4, *Replacement Procedures*.

When AC adapter is connected:

- Check 1 AC adapter may be faulty. Replace the AC adapter with a new one. If the problem still occurs, perform Check 2.
- Check 2 System board may be faulty. Replace the system board with a new one.

When AC adapter is not connected: (When driving with battery pack)

- Check 1 Battery pack may be faulty. Replace it with a new one. If the problem still occurs, perform Check 2.
- Check 2 System board may be faulty. Replace it with a new one.

2.4 System Board Troubleshooting

This section describes how to determine if the system board is malfunctioning or not. Start with Procedure 1 and continue with the other procedures as instructed. The procedures described in this section are:

Procedure 1: Message Check

Procedure 2: Debugging Port Check

Procedure 3: Diagnostic Test Program Execution Check

Procedure 4: Replacement Check

Procedure 1 Message Check

When the power is turned on, the system performs the Initial Reliability Test (IRT) installed in the BIOS ROM. The IRT tests each IC on the system board and initializes it.

- ☐ If an error message is shown on the display, perform Check 1.
- ☐ If there is no error message, go to Procedure 2.
- ☐ If MS-DOS or Windows OS is properly loaded, go to Procedure 4.
- Check 1 If one of the following error messages is displayed on the screen, press the **F1** key as the message instructs. These errors occur when the system configuration preserved in the RTC memory (CMOS type memory) is not the same as the actual configuration or when the data is lost.

If you press the **F1** key as the message instructs, the SETUP screen appears to set the system configuration. If error message (b) appears often when the power is turned on, replace the RTC battery. If any other error message is displayed, perform Check 2.

 Check system. Then press [F1] key
- (b) *** Bad RTC battery ***
 Check system. Then press [F1] key
- (c) *** Bad configuration ***





Figure 2-2 Debug port (Boot mode) error status



- 2. Connect the debug port test cable and RS-232C cross-cable to the test board.
- 3. Connect the RS-232C Cross-cable to the PC that displays the test results.



- 4. Boot the computer in MS-DOS mode.
- 5. Execute GETDPORT.COM in the text menu in CPU REAL mode. (Insert the FD for starting D port into FDD and input "FD starting drive:>dport".)

The D port status is displayed in the following form;



- 6. When the D port status is FFFFh (normal status), go to Procedure 4.
- 7. When the D port status falls into any status in Table 2-4, execute Check 1.

Procedure 1 USB FDD Head Cleaning Check

USB FDD head cleaning operation details are given in Chapter 3, Tests and Diagnostics.

Insert the Diagnostics Disk in the computer's floppy disk drive, turn on the computer and run the test. Clean the USB FDD heads using the cleaning kit. If the USB FDD still does not function properly after cleaning, go to Procedure 2.

If the test program cannot be executed, go to Procedure 3 and Procedure 4.

Procedure 2 Diagnostic Test Program Execution Check

Insert the Diagnostics Disk in the USB FDD, turn on the computer and run the test. Refer to Chapter 3, *Tests and Diagnostics*, for more information about the diagnostics test procedures.

Make sure the floppy disk is formatted correctly and that the write protect tab is disabled. Floppy disk drive test error codes and their status names are listed in Table 2-7. If any other errors occur while executing the FDD diagnostics test, go to Check 1.



- Check 1 Check the connection of the USB FDD. If the USB FDD is still not functioning properly, perform Check 2.

Procedure 4 Replacement Check

The USB FDD or USB FDD cable may be defective or damaged. Replace it with a new one. If the USB FDD is still not functioning properly, perform the following.

- ☐ If USB port 0 does not work properly, perform check 1.
- ☐ If USB port 6 does not work properly, perform check 3.
- ☐ If eSATA/USB port 4 does not work properly, perform check 5.
- Check 1 USB board may be faulty. Replace it with a new one following the steps in Chapter 4, *Replacement Procedures*. If the problem still occurs, perform Check 2.
- Check 2 USB board FFC may be faulty. Replace it with a new one following the steps in Chapter 4, *Replacement Procedures*. If the problem still occurs, perform Check 5.
- Check 3 Jack board may be faulty. Replace it with a new one following the steps in Chapter 4, *Replacement Procedures*. If the problem still occurs, perform Check 4.
- Check 4 Jack board FFC may be faulty. Replace it with a new one following the steps in Chapter 4, *Replacement Procedures*. If the problem still occurs, perform Check 5.
- Check 5 System board may be faulty. Replace it with a new one following the instructions in Chapter 4, *Replacement Procedures*.

To check if the HDD/SSD is malfunctioning or not, follow the troubleshooting procedures below as instructed.

Procedure 1: Partition Check

Procedure 2: Message Check

Procedure 3: Format Check

Procedure 4: Diagnostic Test Program Execution Check

Procedure 5: Connector Check and Replacement Check

CAUTION: The contents of the hard disk will be erased when the HDD troubleshooting procedures are executed. Transfer the contents of the hard disk to floppy disks or other storage drive(s). For the backup, refer to the User's Manual.

Procedure 1 Partition Check

Insert the Toshiba MS-DOS system disk and start the computer. Perform the following checks:

- Check 1 Input **C:** and press **Enter**. If you cannot change to drive C, go to Check 2. If you can change to drive C, go to Procedure 2.
- Check 2 Input **FDISK** and press **Enter**. Choose Display Partition Information from the FDISK menu. If drive C is listed in the Display Partition Information, go to Check 3. If drive C is not listed, return to the FDISK menu and choose the option to create a DOS partition or a logical DOS drive on drive C. If the problem still occurs, go to Procedure 2.
- Check 3 If drive C is listed as active in the FDISK menu, go to Check 4. If drive C is not listed as active, return to the FDISK menu and choose the option to set the active partition for drive C. Then go to Procedure 2.
- Check 4 Remove the system disk from the FDD and reboot the computer. If the problem still occurs, go to Procedure 2. Otherwise, the 2.5" HDD is operating normally.

Procedure 2 Message Check

When the power is turned on, the system performs the Initial Reliability Test (IRT) installed in the BIOS ROM. When the test detects an error, an error message is displayed on the screen.

Make sure no floppy disk is in the FDD. Turn on the computer and check the message on the screen. When an OS starts from the 2.5" HDD, go to Procedure 3. Otherwise, start with Check 1 below and perform the other checks as instructed.

Check 1 If any of the following messages appear, go to Procedure 3. If the following messages do not appear, perform Check 2.

HDC ERROR

or

HDD #X ERROR (After 5 seconds this message will disappear.)

Check 2 If either of the following messages appears, go to Check 3. If the following messages do not appear, perform Check 4.

Insert system disk in drive Press any key when ready .....

or

Non-System disk or disk error Replace and press any key when ready

Check 3 Using the SYS command of the DOS, transfer the system to the 2.5" HDD. If the system is not transferred, go to Procedure 3. Refer to the DOS Manual for detailed operation.

If the following message appears on the display, the system program has been transferred to the HDD.

System Transferred

If an error message appears on the display, perform Check 4.

Check 4 2.5" HDD(s) and the connector(s) of system board may be defective (Refer to the steps described in Chapter 4, *Replacement Procedures* for disassembling.). Insert HDD(s) to the connector(s) firmly. If it is (or they are) firmly connected, go to Procedure 3.

Procedure 3 Format Check

The computer's HDD is formatted using the DOS FORMAT program or the physical format program of the test program. To format the HDD, start with Check 1 below and perform the other steps as required.

Refer to the DOS Manual for the operation of DOS. For the format by the test program, refer to the Chapter 3.

- Check 1 Format the 2.5" HDD using DOS FORMAT command. Type as **FORMAT C:** /S/U.
 - If the 2.5" HDD can not be formatted, perform Check 2.
- Check 2 Using the DOS FDISK command, set the 2.5" HDD partition. If the partition is not set, go to Check 3. If it is set, format the 2.5" HDD using MS-DOS FORMAT command.
- Check 3 Using the Diagnostic Disk, format the 2.5" HDD with a format option (physical format). If HDD is formatted, set the 2.5" HDD partition using DOS FDISK command.

If you cannot format the 2.5" HDD using the Tests and Diagnostic program, go to Procedure 4.

Procedure 4 Diagnostic Test Program Execution Check

The HDD test program is stored in the Diagnostics Disk. Perform all of the HDD tests in the Hard Disk Drive Test. Refer to Chapter 3, *Tests and Diagnostics*, for more information about the HDD test program.

If an error is detected during the HDD test, an error code and status will be displayed. The error codes and statuses are described in Table 2-8. If an error code is not displayed but the problem still occurs, go to Procedure 5.





The SATA HDD/ SATA SSD may be disconnected, or the 2.5 SATA HDD/ 1.8 SATA SSD, 2.5HDD FPC/1.8 SSD FPC or system board may be damaged. Disassemble the computer following the steps described in Chapter 4, *Replacement Procedures* and perform the following checks:

Check 1 Make sure the SATA HDD/ SATA SSD is firmly connected to CN1900 on the system board.



In the case of 2.5 SATA HDD model



In the case of 1.8 SATA SSD model

If any of the connections are loose, reconnect firmly and repeat Procedure 1. If there is still an error, go to Check 2.

- Check 2 The 2.5 SATA HDD/ 1.8 SATA SSD may be damaged. Replace it with a new one following the instructions in Chapter 4, *Replacement Procedures* and check the operation. If the problem still exists, perform Check 3.











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3.1 The Diagnostic Test

This chapter explains how to use the Diagnostic Test programs to test the functions of the computer's hardware modules. The Diagnostics Programs are stored on some Diagnostic Disks. There are Service Program Modules (DIAGNOSTIC MENU) and the Test Program Modules (DIAGNOSTIC TEST MENU) on the Diagnostic Disk.

The Hardware Initial information Setting Tool consists of some programs that write the hardware information or displays the current information of the computer. It is also included in one of Diagnostic Disks.

The heatrun test is automatic test program that executes the some tests successively.

NOTE: Before starting the diagnostics, be sure to follow these steps:

- 1. Check all cables are connected firmly.
- 2. Exit any application and close Windows.
- 3. Check if [ALL Device] is selected in the "Device Config." in SET UP menu. After checking the diagnostics, be sure to select [Setup by OS] in the "Device Config."

3.3 Setting of the hardware configuration

To execute this program, input 1 in the startup menu. Then press **Enter** to select the (2)-Initial config set. The H/W initial information setting tool consists of four subtests. Input the number you want to execute and press **Enter**.

NOTE: Connect USB FDD, when you perform the Repair test program from the CD-ROM. DMI information on the subtest 02 is written in floppy disk.

Subtest 01 Initial configuration

This subtest executes the following items and shows their contents in the display. When an item ends normally, the program proceeds automatically to the next one. When an error is found, the program stops and waits for key input. (After solving the problem, the program executes the item again.)



3.6 System Test

To execute the System Test select **1** from the DIAGNOSTIC TEST MENU, press **Enter** and follow the directions on the screen. Move the highlight bar to the subtest you want to execute and press **Enter**.

Subtest 01 ROM checksum

This subtest executes a checksum test of the BIOS ROM (range: F0000h to FFFFFh, 64KB) on the System Board.

Subtest 02 Fan ON/OFF

This subtest turns on/off the fan motor by force with Fan ON/OFF commands.



- Press ← and → to move between the two columns. Press ↑ and ↓ to move between items in a column. Press Fn+↑ (PgUp) and Fn + ↓ (PgDn) to move between the two pages.
- 2. Press either the **Space bar** or **Back Space** to change the value.

Accepting Changes and Exiting the SETUP Window

1. Press **End** to accept the changes you made.

If the changed item does not require the system to reboot, the following message is displayed:

```
Are you sure? (Y/N)
```

If the changed item requires the system to reboot, the following message is displayed:

```
Are you sure? (Y/N)
The changes you made will cause the system to reboot.
```

- 2. To make other changes, press **N**. Repeat the steps above.
- 3. To accept the changes, press **Y**.

NOTE: You can press **Esc** to quit at any time without saving changes. SETUP asks you to confirm that you do not want to save your changes. When SETUP is displayed at the next time, the current configuration appears.

The Factory Preset Configuration

When you access SETUP, the current configuration is displayed.

- 1. To show the factory preset configuration, press **Home**.
- 2. To accept the default settings, press **End** and then press **Y**.

NOTE: When you execute the default setting, the following settings are not changed:

- (1) HDD Mode
- (2) Password
- (3) Write Policy

SETUP Options

The SETUP screen is divided into 14 functionally related groups. This section describes each group and its options.

1. Memory

This group of options displays the computer's memory.

This field displays the total amount of memory installed and is automatically calculated by the computer. You cannot change this value.

2. System Date/Time

Sets the date and time.

System Date Sets date.

System Time Sets time.

3. Password

(a) User Password

This option allows you to set or reset the user password for power on.

Registered A password has been registered.

Not Registered Change or remove the password. (Default)

(a) Supervisor Password

This setting, which is displayed on the first page of the setup screen, allows you to register a Supervisor Password of the computer.

Registered Supervisor Password has been registered.

Not Registered Supervisor Password has not been registered (Default).

For details on setting the password, refer to the Online Manual.

4. HDD Password

This option sets HDD password. HDD password is a security function to protect the built-in HDD.

(a) HDD

This item selects the hard disk to set HDD password.

Built-in HDD Sets HDD password for the built-in HDD

(b) HDD Password Mode

This item registers HDD password and can be selected only for registering HDD password. To change HDD Password Mode when HDD password is registered, delete the registered HDD password first, and then register new password.

User Only Sets only User HDD Password (Default)

Master+User Sets Master HDD Password and User HDD Password

(c) User Password

This item sets User password.

For details on setting user password, refer to the User's Manual.

(d) Master Password

This item sets the Master HDD password.

This can be set **Master**+**User** is set in the HDD password Mode. For details, refer to the User's Manual.

5. Boot Priority

(a) Boot Priority

Use this option to set the priority for booting of the computer and the priority for the HDD for booting.

HDD→FDD→CD-ROM→LAN: The computer looks for bootable files in

the following order: HDD, FDD, CD-

ROM and LAN. (Default)

FDD→HDD→CD-ROM→LAN: The computer looks for bootable files in

the following order: FDD, HDD, CD-

ROM (*1) and LAN

HDD→CD-ROM→LAN→FDD: The computer looks for bootable files in

the following order: HDD, CD-ROM,

LAN and FDD.

FDD→CD-ROM→LAN→HDD: The computer looks for bootable files in

the following order: FDD, CD-ROM,

LAN and HDD.

CD-ROM→LAN→HDD→FDD: The computer looks for bootable files in

the following order: CD-ROM, LAN,

HDD and FDD.

CD-ROM→LAN→FDD→HDD: The computer looks for bootable files in

the following order: CD-ROM, LAN,

FDD and HDD.

NOTE: CD-ROM refers to a DVD Super Multi drive.

(b) HDD Priority

Use this option to set the booting priority from HDD or USB (USB Memory stick).

Built-in HDD→ USB (Default)

USB →**Built-in HDD**

6. Others

Whether or not you need to configure the computer with these options depends primarily on the kind of software or peripherals you use.

(a) Core-Multi Processing

The Core Multi-Processing sets the CPU operating mode.

The configuration for the Core Multi - Processing is carried out in the BIOS setup program.

Enabled is Dual Core mode.

Disabled is Single Core mode.

Enabled Enables Core Multi-Processing functions. (Default)

Disabled Disables Core Multi - Processing functions.

(b) Dynamic CPU Frequency mode

Use this option to choose a setting from the followings.

Dynamically Switchable

Enables Intel[®] Core™ Duo processor featuring Intel

SpeedStep technology. (Default)

Always High Disables Intel[®] Core[™] Duo processor featuring Intel

SpeedStep technology and always runs the processor at

its maximum speed.

Always Low Disables Intel[®] Core[™] Duo processor featuring Intel

SpeedStep technology and always runs the processor at

its default speed.

(c) Execute-Disable Bit Capability

This option set the Execute-Disable Bit function of CPU to the operation system. Execute-Disable Bit gives higher security function preventing the PC from the computer viruses and buffer overflow problem on unauthorized access.

Available Enable the Execute-Disable Bit function.

Not Available Disable the Execute-Disable Bit function. (Default)

(d) Virtualization Technology

Virtualization Technology sets enable or disable of the Intel Virtualization Technology installed in the CPU.

Intel Virtualization Technology is the technique that allows one machine to operate as multiple virtual machines.

Enabled Enables Virtualization Technology.

Disabled Disables Virtualization Technology. (Default)

(e) Trusted Execution Technology

Permission/prohibition of Trusted Execution Technology are set up. Trusted Execution Technology is the security technology of making it cooperating with TPM using Virtualization Technology.

Disabled Trusted Execution Technology is set as prohibition.

(Default)

Enabled Trusted Execution Technology is set as permission.

When Trusted Execution Technology is set as permission, Please set both of "Virtualization Technology" of [6 "OTHERS"], and "TPM(s)" of [16 "SECURITY CONTROLLER"] as "Enabled" in advance.

(f) Auto Power On

Use this option to set a time and date for automatic power on and enable or disable the ring indicator feature. **Alarm Date Option** appears only when **Alarm Time** is enabled.

Wake-up on LAN	= Disabled
on Battery	= Disabled
on bactery	- Disabled
Critical Battery Wake-up	= Enabled

Set the parameters for the Auto Power On (automatic power on) function and the Wake-up on LAN in the "OPTIONS" window. To set the time, use **Space** or **BackSpace**. Press ↓ to move the cursor to the right and ↑ to move the cursor to the left when you set the date and time.

For the **Alarm Time**, set the time to turn on the power automatically. The "second" cannot be set. When it is set to "Disabled", the time to turn on automatically is not set.

The **Wake-up on LAN** is a function to turn on the power automatically by the call from the administrator. It can be set to "Enabled" only when "Built-in LAN" is set to "Enabled". To activate this function, use the AC adapter.

On Battery

The following settings can be changed when the Wake-up on LAN is Enabled.

DisabledWake-up on LAN function whenoperating from the battery.

Wake-up on LAN function whenoperating from the battery (Default).

NOTE:

- 1. Do not remove the AC adaptor and battery pack at the same time when you use this feature. If you do so, data saved by the resume function will be lost. You must also reset this option.
- 2. If you have set a password and the computer boots by the Auto Power On function and Standby is on, the computer will start with the instant security function enabled. The **password** = message is not displayed; however, you must enter the password to use the computer.
- 3. This option is enabled only once, the setting is reset, after booting up.

The operation of this function is dependent upon battery status.

(Default).

Disabled No action is taken even if the remaining battery power is

about to run out while the system is in Sleep Mode.

(g) Beep Volume

This Option sets up the volume of a Beep sound.

Medium→High→OFF→Low

(h) Diagnostic Mode

This option enables/disables the HW Diagnostic test function.

Enabled Disables the HW Diagnostic test function. (Default)

Disabled Enables the HW Diagnostic test function.

(i) USB Sleep and charge

This Option sets up whether a power supply is supplied to a USB device, when PC is in a Sleep mode state.

Disabled A power supply is not supplied in a Sleep mode state.

(Default)

Enabled (Mode1) A power supply is supplied in a Sleep mode

state.

Enabled (Mode2) A power supply is supplied in a Sleep mode

state.

Enabled (Mode3) A power supply is supplied in a Sleep mode

state.

Enabled (Mode4) A power supply is supplied in a Sleep mode

state.

7. Configuration

This option lets you set the device configuration.

All Devices BIOS sets all devices.

Setup by OS Initializes devices, which is needed to load an operating

system. Operating system initializes other devices.

(Default)

NOTE: 1. When using installed OS, selecting "Setup by OS" is recommended.

2. When executing test programs, be sure to select "ALL Device". And after the test end, select "Setup by OS".

8. Battery

(a) Battery Save Mode

This option is used to select **Full Power**, **Low Power** or **User Setting** of the battery save mode. When you select the battery save mode, the followings will appear.

9. Drives I/O

This option displays the address and interrupts level for hard disk drive and optical disk drive. It is for information only and cannot be changed.

(a) Built-in HDD

This item displays the Serial ATA Port Number. It is for information only and cannot be changed.

Serial ATA Port0

(b) ODD

This item displays the Serial ATA Port Number. It is for information only and cannot be changed.

Serial ATA Port1

(c) eSATA

This item displays the Serial ATA Port Number. It is for information only and cannot be changed.

Serial ATA Port4

(d) SATA Controller Mode

This feature sets the SATA Controller Mode.

AHCI Sets AHCI which is the mode for VistaTM (default)

Compatibility Sets the mode for legacy OS. Use this mode when the

driver corresponding to AHCI is not used.

10. PCI Bus

This option displays the interrupt level for the Card Bus in the computer. It is for information only and cannot be changed.

PCI BUS = IRQ10, IRQ11

11. Display

This group of options configures the computer's display.

(a) Power On Display

This option is used to select the display when booting up.

Auto-Selected Selects an external monitor if one is connected.

Otherwise it selects the internal LCD. (Default)

LCD+**AnalogRGB** Selects both the internal LCD and the external monitor

for simultaneous display.

NOTE: Pressing **Fn+F5** changes the display setting in the order of internal LCD to simultaneous to external monitor.

12. Peripheral

Use this option to select the peripheral's mode.

(a) Internal Pointing Device

This option enables or disables the touch pad

Enabled Enables the touch pad. (Default)

Disabled Disables the touch pad.

(b) Web Camera

This option enables or disables the Web Camera

Enabled Enables the Web Camera (Default)

Disabled Disables the Web Camera

13. LEGACY EMULATION

(a) USB KB/Mouse Legacy Emulation

This option sets the Legacy support condition of the USB keyboard and the USB mouse.

Enabled Enables LEGACY support. (Default)

USB keyboard/USB mouse are available without the driver.

Disabled Disables LEGACY support

(b) USB-FDD Legacy Emulation

This option sets the Legacy support condition of the USB floppy disk drive. When a computer is FDD built-in model, this option is not displayed.

Enabled Enables LEGACY support. (Default)

USB floppy disk is available without the driver.

Disabled Disables LEGACY support

(c) USB Memory BIOS Support Type

A setup about the USB flash memory used for a startup of a computer.

HDD The priority as HDD turns into ranking of HDD in "BootPriority"

in a USB flash memory. The priority with other HDD can be set up

by "HDD Priority." (Default).

FDD A USB flash memory is treated as FDD. The priority as a drive to

start turns into ranking of FDD in "Boot Priority."

14. PCI LAN

This option sets the Enable / Disable of the built-in LAN or Wireless LAN functions.

(a) built-in LAN

Enabled Enables built-in LAN functions. (Default)

Disabled Disables built-in LAN functions.

(b) Wireless LAN

Enabled Enables Wireless LAN functions. (Default)

Disabled Disables Wireless LAN functions.

15. Security Controller

(a) TPM

Disables the security controller called TPM (Trusted Platform Module). When the cursor is on the **Enable** (**Disable**) and the **Space** is pressed, message is displayed and the PC waits **Y** or **N** key input by the user. When Y is pressed, it is sets to **Enable** (**Disable**). After changing, the cursor could not be moved on the **TPM** tem. This option can be changed after rebooting.

Disabled Disables the TPM. (Default)

Enabled Enables the TPM.

(b) Hide TPM

Yes It prevents from checking TPM on Windows.

No It enables it to check TPM on Windows (Default).

In order to set "TPM" as "Enabled", please set "Hide TPM" as "No" first. Moreover, if it is set as "Yes", TPM cannot be checked on Windows.

(d) Clear TPM Owner

This is not displayed when the **TPM** is set to **Disabled**. This is executed, when the PC is disposed or the owner of the PC changes.

When the cursor is on this item and the **Space** is pressed, message is displayed and the PC waits **Y**, **E**, **S** and **Enter** key inputs by the user.

When **Y**, **E**, **S** and **Enter** keys are pressed, the data is disposed.

After changing, the display of **TPM** item is changed to **Disabled** and this item becomes not displayed and the cursor could not be moved on the **TPM** item.

16. Intel(R)AMT

*AMT model only

(a) MEBx SETUP

This setting enables or disables the computer's MEBx SETUP Intel(R) AMT.

Enabled Enables the MEBx SETUP.

Disabled Disables the MEBx SETUP. (Default)

Chapter 4 Replacement Procedures

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
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4.1 Overview

CAUTION: The case and parts of this machine are delicate (thin) because this machine is lighter than a usual machine. Handle with care of installing/removing.

This chapter describes the procedure for removing and replacing the field replaceable units (FRUs) in the PC. It may not be necessary to remove all the FRUs in order to replace one. The chart below provides a guide as to which other FRUs must be removed before a particular FRU can be removed. The numbers in the chart indicate the relevant section numbers in this manual.

In all cases when removing an FRU, the battery pack must also be removed. When repairing an FRU that is the potential cause of a computer fault, use the chart to determine the order in which FRUs need to be removed.



Please prepare required parts in advance, when replacing the following items.

Safety Precautions

Please read the following safety instructions before disassembling the computer and always follow the instructions while working on the computer.

- **DANGER:** 1) Always use the genuine battery that is authorized by Toshiba or compatible with the unit. Since other battery packs have different specifications, they may be incompatible with the unit, and may burst or explode.
 - Never heat or disassemble the battery pack, as that could cause leakage of alkaline solution. Never throw the battery pack into a fire, as that could cause the battery pack to explode.
 - 2) The power supply, FL inverter and other components carry high voltages. If you need to turn on the power of a partially disassembled computer to check its operation, be very careful not to touch connectors or components, in order to avoid the risk of electric shock. Also, do not disassemble individual components in first-level maintenance.

- **WARNING:** 1) Turn off the power and disconnect the AC adaptor from the power source, to avoid exposure to electric shock.
 - 2) Batteries in the computer retain an electrical charge, so there is danger of electrical shock even when the computer is disconnected from an AC power source. Remove any metal jewelry or accessories such as necklaces, bracelets or rings, in order to reduce the risk of electric shock. Never work with wet or damp hands.
 - *3)* Be careful of edges and corners as these may cut.

- **CAUTION:** 1) When you change a component, be sure the replacement component meets the required specifications. Never use foreign parts, to avoid any risk of damage to the computer.
 - 2) To avoid any risk of short-circuit, fire or other internal damage, never allow any metal objects such as screws or paper clips to fall into the unit. Be sure to replace screws with the same size as those removed. Make sure all screws are securely fastened. Loose screws can cause short circuits, resulting in heat, smoke or fire.
 - 3) Before lifting out an FRU or other component, make sure all cables to the component have been disconnected, in order to reduce the risk of accidental electric shock.
 - 4) If you use AC power, be sure to use the cable that came with the computer or one recommended by Toshiba.
 - 5) Make sure that all replacement components meet the specifications for the computer and that all cables and connectors are securely fastened, in order to avoid the risk of electric shock.
 - 6) Some parts inside the computer, such as the CPU and cooling module, become very hot during operation. Conduct repair work after they have cooled. Be careful around the CPU and cooling module to avoid burns.

Before You Begin

Take note of the following points before starting work. Always remove the AC adapter and battery pack before commencing any of the procedures. The procedure for removing the battery pack is described in section "4.2. Battery Pack".

- 1. Do not disassemble the computer unless it is operating abnormally.
- 2. Use the designated tools.
- 3. Ensure that the environment for working on and storing parts does not contain any of the following.
 - Dust or dirt
 - Static electricity
 - Extremely hot, cold, or humid conditions
- 4. Perform the diagnostic tests described in Chapter 2 to determine which FRU is the cause of the fault.
- 5. Do not perform any unnecessary work. Always work in accordance with the disassembly and re-assembly procedures in this manual.
- 6. Keep parts removed from the computer in a safe place away from the computer where they will not be damaged or interfere with your work.
- 7. Disassembling requires the removal of a large number of screws. Keep removed screws in a safe place such that you can determine which screws belong to which part.
- 8. When re-assembling, ensure that you use the correct screws and fit parts in the correct position. Screw sizes are noted in the text and figures.
- 9. As all parts have sharp edges and corners, take care not to cut yourself.
- 10. After replacing an FRU, check that the computer and replaced part operate correctly.

Disassembly Procedures

Four main types of cable connector are used.


- Pressure plate connector
- Spring connector
- Back flip connector
- Normal pin connector

For pressure plate connectors, slide the pressure plate holding tags on both sides of the plastic pressure plate on the connector and pull the cable out from the connector. When reconnecting the cable to the pressure plate connector, slide the pressure plate holding tags on both sides of the plastic pressure plate on the connector and insert the cable into the connector. Push both tags of the pressure plate such that the cable is fixed in the correct position. Pull the cable to ensure that it is securely connected.

For spring connectors, lift up the stopper frees the cable and allow it to be pulled out. To reconnect, hold the stopper in the up position and insert the cable, then lower the stopper to secure the cable. Pull the cable to ensure that it is securely connected.

For back flip connectors, lift up the flip plate frees the cable and allow it to be pulled out. To reconnect, hold the flip plate in the up position and insert the cable, then lower the flip plate to secure the cable. Pull the cable to ensure that it is securely connected.

Normal pin connectors are used for all other cables. Simply pull out or push in these connectors to disconnect or reconnect.

Assembly Procedures

After the computer has been disassembled and the part that caused the fault has been repaired or replaced, the computer must be reassembled.

Take note of the following general points when assembling the computer.

- Take your time and follow the instructions carefully. Hurrying the assembly work will only introduce new problems.
- Check that all cables and connectors are securely connected.
- Before fastening FRUs or other parts in place, ensure that no cables are caught on screws or the FRU.
- Check that all latches are securely closed.
- Ensure that you have installed all FRUs correctly and do not have any screws left over. Using an incorrect screw may damage the thread or screw head and result in the FRU not being securely fastened in place.

After installing FRUs, check that the computer operates correctly.

Tools and Equipment

The use of Electrostatic Discharge (ESD) equipment is very important for your safety and the safety of those around you. Proper use of these devices will increase the success rate of your repairs and lower the cost for damaged or destroyed parts. The following equipment is necessary to disassemble and reassemble the computer:

- One Philips screwdriver with type 0 bit (for S-THIN HEAD screws)
- One Philips screwdriver with type 1 bit (for screws other than above)
- Tweezers (for lifting screws)
- ESD mats (lay on work table or floor)
- An ESD wrist strap or heel grounder
- Anti-static carpet or flooring
- Air-ionizers in highly static sensitive areas
- Antenna coaxial cable disconnector

Screw Tightening Torque

When you fasten screws, be sure to follow the torque list below.

CAUTION: Overtightening can damage components and screws; undertightening can result in electrical shorts or other damage if screws or components come loose.

NOTE: Toshiba recommends that you use an electric screwdriver for quick and easy operations. (except a M1.4 screw)

Use a non electric screwdriver to fasten a M1.4 screw, because a boss for M1.4 screw maybe broken if the screw is driven with an electric screwdriver.





NOTE: To prevent damage to THIN HEAD screws, use type 0 bit philips screwdriver. Press along the axis of the screwdriver while turning the screw. This is because the contact area between the screw and driver is less than for a pan head screw (standard pan-shaped screw head).





Grip Color

Some screws have a colored grip area to help you determine the length of the screw.

[Normal grip]

- Even numbered length screws: Brown
- Odd numbered length screws: White
- Special length screw: Blue



[Special grip]

- Even numbered length screws: Yellow
- Odd numbered length screws: Pink
- Special length screw: Green

Screw Notation

To make maintenance of the computer easier, markings of the kinds of the screws including the types and lengths of the screws are indicated on the computer body.

[&]quot;Special length screw" means screws whose length is indicated in an integral number to the first decimal places such as 2.5 mm, 2.6 mm and so on.

4.2 Battery pack

Removing the Battery pack

CAUTION: When handling battery pack, be careful not to short circuit the terminals. Also do not drop, hit or apply impact, do not scratch, break, twist or bend the battery pack.

- 3. Turn the computer face down.
- 4. Release the **battery lock**. Pull out the **battery pack** while sliding the **battery latch** as shown in the following figure.




Figure 4-1 Removing the battery pack




Figure 4-2 Removing the SIM card




Figure 4-3 Removing the ExpressCard




Figure 4-4 Removing the SD/SDHC memory card




Figure 4-5 Removing the memory cover




Figure 4-6 Removing the memory module




Figure 4-7 Removing the base assembly




Figure 4-8 Removing the battery lock




Figure 4-9 Removing the wireless LAN card




Figure 4-10 Removing the SD board




Figure 4-11 Removing the Bluetooth module




Figure 4-12 Removing the optical disk drive (1)




Figure 4-13 Removing the optical disk drive (2)




Figure 4-14 Removing the optical disk drive (3)




Figure 4-15 Removing the MDC modem




Figure 4-16 Removing the ODD upper




Figure 4-17 Removing the 3G card




Figure 4-18 Removing the ExpressCard slot






Figure 4-19 Removing the HDD




Figure 4-20 Removing the SSD




Figure 4-21 Removing the RTC battery




Figure 4-22 Removing the sound board/MIC harness (1)




Figure 4-23 Removing the sound board/MIC harness (2)





Figure 4-24 Removing the cooling module




Figure 4-25 Removing the DC-IN harness




Figure 4-26 Removing the USB board/WL SW holder (1)




Figure 4-28 Removing the USB board/WL SW holder (3)








Figure 4-29 Removing the system board (1)




Figure 4-30 Removing the system board (2)




Figure 4-31 Removing the speaker




Figure 4-32 Removing the cover assembly/LCD assembly (1)




Figure 4-33 Removing the cover assembly/LCD assembly (2)





Figure 4-34 Removing the SW board






Figure 4-35 Removing the touch pad/fingerprint sensor board (1)




Figure 4-36 Removing the touch pad/fingerprint sensor board (2)






Figure 4-37 Removing the keyboard




Figure 4-38 Removing the LCD mask




Figure 4-39 Removing the LCD






Figure 4-40 Removing the camera module




Figure 4-41 Removing the wireless LAN antenna/Bluetooth antenna/3G antenna






Figure 4-42 Removing the hinge

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

Appendix A Handling the LCD Module

Precautions for handling the LCD module

The LCD module can be easily damaged during assembly or disassembly. Observe the following precautions when handling the LCD module:

1. When installing the LCD module in the LCD cover, be sure to seat it so that it is properly aligned and maximum visibility of the display is maintained.



2. Be careful to align the holes at the four corners of the LCD module with the corresponding holes in the LCD cover before securing the module with screws. Do not force the module into place, because stress can affect its performance.

Also, the panel's polarized surface is easily scarred, so be careful when handling it.





3. If the panel's surface gets dirty, wipe it with cotton or a soft cloth. If it is still dirty, try breathing on the surface to create a light condensate and wipe it again.

If the surface is very dirty, we recommend a CRT cleaning agent. Apply the agent to a cloth and then wipe the panel's surface. Do not apply cleanser directly to the panel.




4. If water or other liquid is left on the panel's surface for a long period, it can change the screen's tint or stain it. Be sure to quickly wipe off any liquid.




5. Glass is used in the panel, so be careful not to drop it or let it strike a hard object, which could cause breakage or cracks.



6. CMOS-LSI circuits are used in the module, so guard against damage from electrostatic discharge. Be sure to wear a wrist or ankle ground when handling the module.




7. Do not expose the module to direct sunlight or strong ultraviolet rays for long periods.




8. Do not store the module at temperatures below specifications. Cold can cause the liquid crystals to freeze, lose their elasticity or otherwise suffer damage.



9. Do not disassemble the LCD module. Disassembly can cause malfunctions.



10. If you transport the module, do not use packing material that contains epoxy resin (amine) or silicon glue (alcohol or oxide). These materials can release gas that can damage the panel's polarization.




Figure B-1 System board(FMTXS*) layout (front)




Figure B-2 System board(FMTXS*) layout (back)




Figure B-3 Finger Sensor board (FMTFS*) layout (front/back)




Figure B-4 SW board FMTSW*) layout (front/back)




Figure B-5 Jack board (FMTJA*) layout (front/back)




Figure B-6 USB board (FMTUS*) layout (front/back)




Figure B-7 SD board (FSISD*) layout (front/back)




Figure B-8SD board (FMTSD*) layout (front/back)




Figure B-9Antenna board (FMTAT*) layout (front/back)




Figure B-8 PATA ODD FPC (FMTPO*) layout (front)




Figure B-11 SATA ODD FPC (FSISO*) layout (front/back)




Figure B-12 SATA HDD FPC (FMTSH*) layout (front/back)




Figure B-13 MDC interface FPC (FSIMD*) layout (front/back)




Figure B-14 PCIe MiniCard FPC (FMT3G*) layout (front)




Figure B-15 PCIe MiniCard FPC (FSI3G*) layout (front)




Figure E-1 UK keyboard




Figure E-2 US keyboard




Figure E-3 Thai keyboard




Figure E-4 Canadian French keyboard

F.1 RGB Monitor Loopback Connector




Figure F-1 RGB Monitor Loopback Connector




Figure F-2 LAN Loopback Connector

Tools


To rewrite the BIOS, you need the following tool:

☐ BIOS/EC/KBC rewriting disk

Rewriting the BIOS

- 1. Set the system to boot mode.
- 2. Turn off the power to the computer.
- 3. Remove the external cables and cards.
- 4. Connect an external FDD and insert the BIOS rewriting disk into the external FDD.
- 5. Turn on the power while holding down the tilde character key until a beep sounds.

For example



- 6. The BIOS rewriting starts.
- 7. When the process is completed, it beeps and the system automatically reboots.

NOTE: 1. Connect the AC adapter to the computer when you rewrite the BIOS.

- 2. Do not turn off the power while you are rewriting the BIOS. If the rewrite fails, it might be impossible to start up the computer.
- 3. If you fail to rewrite BIOS, then when you next turn on the power, a message may be displayed that the contents of the BIOS have been erased. In this case, insert the BIOS rewriting disk and the BIOS will be rewritten.

Appendix H EC/KBC Rewrite Procedures

This Appendix explains how to rewrite the EC/KBC system program when you update the EC/KBC system.

It is necessary to rewrite the EC/KBC system program when the following changes are made.

- 1. Replacing of system board
- 2. Replacing of LCD

Tools

To rewrite the EC/KBC, you need the following tool:

☐ EC/KBC rewriting disk for the computer

Rewriting the EC/KBC

- **NOTE:** 1. Rewrite the EC/KBC only when instructed by a diagnostic disk release notice.
 - 2. Connect the AC adaptor to the computer when you rewrite the EC/KBC.
 - 3. Do not turn off the power while you are rewriting the EC/KBC. If the rewrite fails, it might be impossible to start up the computer.
 - 4. If you fail to rewrite EC/KBC, then when you next turn on the power, a message may be displayed that the contents of the EC/KBC have been erased. In this case, insert the EC/KBC rewriting disk, and the EC/KBC will be rewritten.
 - 5. Normally it takes about 30 seconds to rewrite the EC/KBC. It may take 3 minutes (maximum), depending on the conditions of the computer or ICs. The computer is not hung up. Allow sufficient time. Never reboot or turn off the power to the computer before the rewriting is completed.
 - 1. Set the system to boot mode.
 - 2. Turn off the power to the computer.
 - 3. Remove the external cables and cards.
 - 4. Connect an external FDD and insert the EC/KBC rewriting disk into the external FDD.
 - 5. Turn on the power while holding down the **Tab** key. (Keep holding down the key until a beep sounds.) The EC/KBC rewriting starts.
 - 6. When the EC/KBC rewrite is completed, the system is automatically turned off.
