



Installation


20) Never place items such as vases, aquariums, or candles on top of the TV.



- 21) Never block or cover the slots or openings in the TV cabinet back, bottom, and sides. Never place the TV:
 - on a bed, sofa, rug, or similar surface;
 - too close to drapes, curtains, or walls; or
 - in a confined space such as a bookcase, built-in cabinet, or any other place with poor ventilation.

The slots and openings are provided to protect the TV from overheating and to help maintain reliable operation of the TV.





- 22) Never allow anything to rest on or roll over the power cord, and never place the TV where the power cord is subject to wear or abuse.
- 23) Never overload wall outlets and extension cords.




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24) Always operate this equipment from a 120 VAC, 60 Hz power source only.



25) Always make sure the antenna system is properly grounded to provide adequate protection against voltage surges and built-up static charges (see Section 810 of the National Electric Code).

• Use extreme care to make sure you are never in a position where your body (or any item you are in contact with, such as a ladder or screwdriver) can accidentally touch overhead power lines. Never locate the antenna near overhead power lines or other electrical circuits.



Care

For better performance and safer operation of your TOSHIBA TV, follow these recommendations and precautions:

- 27) Always sit approximately 10–25 feet away from the TV and as directly in front of it as possible. The picture can appear dull if you sit too far to the left or right of the TV, or if sunlight or room lights reflect on the screen. Turn the TV off to check for reflections on the screen, and then remove the source of reflections while viewing the TV.
- 28) Always unplug the TV before cleaning. Never use liquid or aerosol cleaners.



WARNING: RISK OF ELECTRIC SHOCK!

Never spill liquids or push objects of any kind into the TV cabinet slots.

- 30) [*This item applies to projection TVs only*.] If the air temperature rises suddenly (for example, when the TV is first delivered), condensation may form on the lenses. This can make the picture appear distorted or the color appear faded. If this happens, turn off the TV for 6 to 7 hours to allow the condensation to evaporate.
- 31) For added protection of your TV from lightning and power surges, always unplug the power cord and disconnect the antenna from the TV if you leave the TV unattended or unused for long periods of time.
- 32) During normal use, the TV may make occasional snapping or popping sounds. This is normal, especially when the unit is being turned on or off. If these sounds become frequent or continuous, unplug the power cord and contact a Toshiba Authorized Service Center.
- 33) Possible Adverse Effects on TV Picture Tube: If a fixed (non-moving) pattern remains on the TV screen for long periods of time, the image can become permanently engrained in the picture tube and cause subtle but permanent ghost images. This type of damage is NOT COVERED BY YOUR WARRANTY. Never leave your TV on for long periods of time while it is displaying the following formats or images:
 - **Fixed Images**, such as PIP/POP windows, stock tickers, video game patterns, TV station logos, and websites.
 - **Special Formats** that do not use the entire screen. For example, viewing letterbox style (16:9) media on a normal (4:3) display (gray bars at top and bottom of screen); or viewing normal style (4:3) media on a widescreen (16:9) display (gray bars on left and right sides of screen).

Important Safety Precautions for Split Cabinet Feature (Models 57HX83 and 65HX83 only)

Toshiba TV models 57HX83 and 65HX83 have a split cabinet feature that allows disassembly of the cabinet into two sections during installation.

For details, please refer to the insert titled "Disassembly/ Reassembly Instructions for Split Cabinet Feature" that accompanied this owner's manual in the accessory pack. If you do not have the insert, you can download a copy of it from our Web site (www.toshiba.com/tacp in the U.S.A. or www.toshiba.ca in Canada). WARNING: If you split the cabinet for any purpose, NEVER energize the bottom section until it is completely and properly installed. Energizing the disassembled bottom section and

subjecting it to intentional misuse (for example, exposing it to a foreign object) creates the potential for an electrical shock hazard that could result in death or serious injury.

CAUTION: If you use the split cabinet feature, ALWAYS handle and treat the top section of the TV cabinet, which contains a glass mirror, with great care. If subjected to excessive mechanical abuse (for example, if bumped or dropped), the mirror may break, creating exposed glass fragments with sharp edges. Contact with these glass fragments may result in injury.

Installation, Care, and Service

CAUTION: The split cabinet feature (models 57HX83 and 65HX83 only) allows disassembly of the cabinet into two sections during installation. If you use the split cabinet feature, follow these precautions while the two sections of the TV cabinet are disassembled:

- Always handle and treat the top section of the TV cabinet (with the viewing screen), which contains a glass mirror, with great care. If subjected to excessive mechanical abuse (for example, if bumped or dropped), the mirror may break, creating exposed glass fragments with sharp edges. Contact with these glass fragments may result in injury.
- 2) Never temporarily locate the disassembled bottom section in an area where it may be exposed to foreign objects or abuse (for example, areas where children may be playing, where items may fall on top of the unit, or where liquids may spill into the unit). Failure to follow this instruction may result in damage to the optic components of the TV. SUCH DAMAGE IS NOT COVERED UNDER THE TOSHIBA LIMITED WARRANTY.
- 3) Always keep the top and bottom sections of the TV cabinet in an upright position while disassembled. Failure to follow this instruction may result in damage to the TV, including but not limited to the optic components, cabinet, bezel, and glass mirror. SUCH DAMAGE IS NOT COVERED UNDER THE TOSHIBA LIMITED WARRANTY.
- 4) Never energize the bottom section of the TV cabinet while disassembled. Failure to follow this instruction could result in death or serious injury.
- Never place anything on top of the bottom section of the TV cabinet. Failure to follow this instruction may result in damage to the optic components. SUCH DAMAGE IS NOT COVERED UNDER THE TOSHIBA LIMITED WARRANTY.
- 6) Never store or transport the unit while it is disassembled. Failure to follow this instruction may result in damage to the TV, including but not limited to the optic components, cabinet, bezel, and glass mirror. SUCH DAMAGE IS NOT COVERED UNDER THE TOSHIBA LIMITED WARRANTY.

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Introduction

Welcome to Toshiba

Congratulations! You have purchased one of the finest projection TVs on the market. The goal of this manual is to guide you through setting up and operating your Toshiba TV as quickly as possible.

This manual applies to models 46HX83, 51HX83, 57HX83, and 65HX83. Before you start reading, check the model number on the back of your TV.

Instructions in this manual are based on using the remote control. You can also use the controls on the TV if they have the same name as those on the remote control.

Please read all the safety and operating instructions carefully, and keep the manual for future reference.

Exploring your new TV

You can operate your TV using the buttons on the front panel or the remote control. The back panel and front panel (behind the door) provide all the terminal connections you will need to connect other equipment to your TV. See "Connecting your TV" on page 8.


Model 57HX83 is used in this manual for illustration purposes.

Note regarding Quick Connect Guide

The **Quick Connect Guide** automatically appears on-screen the first time the TV is turned on. This feature provides on-screen instructions to guide you through initial setup of your TV.

To stop the **Quick Connect Guide**, either press EXIT or turn off the TV.

Connecting your TV

Note: Cables are not supplied with your TV.

- **Coaxial cable** is the cable that comes in from your antenna, cable TV service, or cable converter box. Coaxial cable uses "F" connectors.
- Standard A/V (audio/video) cables usually come in sets of three, and are typically color-coded according to use: yellow for video, red for stereo right audio, and white for stereo left (or mono) audio. On your TV's back panel, the standard A/V connectors are color-coded in the same manner as the cables.
- S-Video cable is for use with video equipment with S-Video.
- **Component video cables** come in sets of three, and are for use with video equipment that has component video. (ColorStream[®] is Toshiba's brand of component video.)
- **DVI-D digital double-link cable** is for use with video equipment that has a DVI-D digital double-link connector (see page 15).

NOTE REGARDING PICTURE QUALITY

When connecting video equipment to your Toshiba TV:


- For GOOD picture quality: Use a standard yellow video cable.
- For BETTER picture quality: If your equipment has S-video, use an S-video cable *instead of* a standard yellow video cable. (You still must connect the standard red and white audio cables for full system connection, but *do not connect the standard yellow video cable at the same time*, or the picture performance will be unacceptable.)
- For BEST picture quality: If your equipment has component video (or DVI), use either component video cables (or a DVI cable) *instead of* a standard video or S-video cable. (You still must connect the standard red and white audio cables for full system connection.


Connecting a VCR

This connection allows you to watch local channels and video programs, play or record on the VCR while watching TV, and record from one channel while watching another channel.

You will need:

- two coaxial cables
- one set of standard A/V cables





CAUTION:

Do not plug in any power cords until you have finished connecting all equipment.

Note:

If you have a mono VCR, connect L/Mono to VCR Audio OUT using only one audio cable.

If you have a VCR with S-video, use an S-video cable instead of a standard video cable.

Do not connect a standard video cable and an S-video cable to VIDEO 1 (or VIDEO 2) at the same time, or the picture performance will be unacceptable.



To watch basic cable and use the TV's features, select ANT-1. To view premium channels, select ANT-2, tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 (whichever channel is vacant in your area), and use the converter box to change channels.

• three coaxial cables



Connecting a cable converter box and VCR


This connection allows you to watch and record basic and premium cable channels, watch videotapes, and record one channel while watching another channel. To watch basic cable and use the TV's features, select ANT-1.

To view premium channels or record with the VCR, select ANT-2, tune the TV to channel 3 or 4 (whichever channel is vacant in your area), and use the converter box to change channels.

Connecting a DVD player or satellite receiver without component video and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DVD/satellite, VCR, and TV programs, and record one TV channel while watching another channel.

You will need:

- two coaxial cables (three if satellite receiver is used)
- one set of standard A/V cables (between the TV and VCR)
- one pair of audio cables (between the TV and DVD player/ satellite receiver)
- one S-video cable (between the TV and DVD player/satellite receiver)

For the highest possible picture quality from a DVD player/satellite receiver without component video or DVI/HDCP, use an S-video cable. (If your DVD player/satellite receiver has component video, see page 11. If your DVD player/satellite receiver has DVI/HDCP, see page 14).

Do not connect both an S-video cable and a standard video cable to VIDEO 1 (or VIDEO 2) at the same time or the picture performance will be unacceptable.

Do not connect the DVD player/satellite receiver and VCR to the same set of A/V inputs on the TV. (See the illustrations, which show the DVD player/satellite receiver connected to VIDEO 1 on the TV, and the VCR connected to VIDEO 2 on the TV.)

Connecting a DVD player with component video and a VCR


This connection allows you to watch DVD, VCR, and TV programs, and record TV programs. You can record one channel while watching another channel.

Your TV has ColorStream[®] (component video) inputs. Connecting a DVD player with component video outputs (such as a Toshiba DVD player with ColorStream[®]) can greatly enhance picture quality and realism.

- To record one TV program while watching another TV program, tune the VCR to the channel to record and tune the TV to the channel to watch.
- To record a TV program while watching a DVD, tune the VCR to the channel to record and select ColorStream HD-1 on the TV (see "Selecting the antenna input" on page 27).

You will need:

- two coaxial cables
- one set of standard A/V cables
- one pair of audio cables
- one set of component video cables



DVD Player with component video

Note:

For the highest possible picture quality, use component video cables (or a DVI-D digital single-link cable) between the TV and DVD player.

You can connect component video cables from the DVD player to either ColorStream jack on the TV (HD-1 or HD-2).

The ColorStream HD-1 and HD-2 jacks can be used with Progressive (480p) and Interlaced (480i, 1080i) scan systems. A 1080i signal will provide the best picture performance.

If your DVD player is not compatible with component video (or DVI/HDCP), use an S-video cable (plus the standard audio cables) instead.

Do not connect both S-Video and standard video cables to VIDEO 1 (or VIDEO 2) at the same time or the picture performance will be unacceptable. See page 10.

Connecting a DTV receiver/set-top box with component video and a VCR

This connection allows you to watch DTV (digital TV), VCR, and TV programs, and record DTV and TV programs.

Your TV has ColorStream (component video) inputs. Connecting a DTV receiver with component video can greatly enhance picture quality and realism.

- To record and watch a DTV program, select LINE IN on the VCR, and select ColorStream HD-2 on the TV (see "Selecting the antenna input" on page 27).
- To record a TV program while watching a DTV program, tune the VCR to the channel to record, and select ColorStream HD-2 on the TV.
- To record and watch the same TV program, tune the VCR to the channel to record, and select VIDEO 1 on the TV.
- To record one TV program while watching another TV program, tune the VCR to the channel to record, and tune the TV to the channel to watch.

You will need:

- three coaxial cables
- two sets of standard A/V cables
- one pair of audio cables
- one set of component video cables

Stereo VCR Image: Stereo VCR

Note:

For the highest possible picture quality, use component video cables (or a DVI-D digital single-link cable) between the TV and DTV receiver/set-top box.

You can connect component video cables to either set of ColorStream jacks on the TV (HD-1 or HD-2).

The ColorStream HD-1 and HD-2 jacks can be used with Progressive (480p) and Interlaced (480i, 1080i) scan systems. A 1080i signal will provide the best picture performance.

For DVI/HDCP connection, see page 14.

If your DTV receiver or set-top box is not compatible with component video (or DVI/ HDCP), use the S-video connection (plus the standard audio connections) instead.

Do not connect both S-Video and standard video cables to VIDEO 1 (or VIDEO 2) at the same time or the picture performance will be unacceptable.


To record from the DTV receiver, set the VCR to Line IN. To monitor recording from the DTV receiver, set the VCR to Line IN and set the TV to VIDEO 1.

Connecting

This connection allows you to record (dub/edit) from one VCR to another VCR while watching a videotape. You also can record from one TV channel while watching another TV channel.

You will need:

- two coaxial cables
- two sets of standard A/V cables




Connecting a camcorder

This connection allows you to watch video materials recorded on a camcorder.

You will need:

• one set of standard A/V cables

Note:

If VCR1 has S-video, you can use an S-video cable instead of a standard video cable for better picture performance. Do not connect both a standard video cable and an S-video cable to VIDEO 1 (or VIDEO 2) at the same time or the picture performance will be unacceptable.

Do not connect the same VCR to the output and input jacks on the TV at the same time.

To dub or edit, VCR 2 must select Line IN, and the TV must select VIDEO 1 (see "Selecting the antenna input" on page 27).

- * The Video OUT jack does not output the POP picture.
- ** The Audio OUT jacks can output the sound of either the Main or POP picture (see "Selecting the Audio OUT sound" on page 65).

Note:

Connecting a device to the DVI/HDCP input

The DVI/HDCP¹ input on your TV is designed to accept HDCP program material in digital form from EIA/CEA-861–compliant² consumer electronic devices, such as a set-top box or DVD player with a DVI-D digital single-link output connection.³

The DVI/HDCP input is designed for best performance with 1080i high-definition video signals. The DVI/HDCP input also will accept and display 480p and 480i picture signals.

Note: This TV is not intended for connection to and should not be used with a PC (personal computer).


You will need:

- one coaxial cable
- one DVI-D digital single-link cable

Note: For proper operation, the DVI-D cable length should not exceed 3m (9.8 ft). The recommended length is 2m (6.6 ft).

• one pair of standard audio cables

DVI/HDCP device



Note:

- ¹ DVI/HDCP = Digital Visual Interface/ High-bandwidth Digital Content Protection.
- ² EIA/CEA-861 compliance covers the transmission of uncompressed digital video with high-bandwidth digital content protection, which is being standardized for future reception of high-definition video signals.
- ³ Consult your consumer electronics dealer for availability.

Caution:

To ensure that the DVI/HDCP device is reset properly, it is recommended that you follow these procedures:

- When turning on your electronic components, turn on the TV first, and then the DVI/HDCP device.
- When turning off your electronic components, turn off the DVI/HDCP device first, and then the TV.

Connecting

The TheaterLink IR (infra-red) pass-through feature allows you to remotely operate (through the TV) many infrared-controlled devices (such as a Toshiba infrared-controlled VCR or DVD player) enclosed within an entertainment center or similar cabinet. Without the TheaterLink connection, the device typically would need to be visible to operate it remotely.

You can use the TV's remote control (programmed to operate the device; see pages 18–24) or the device's remote control. Point the remote control at the front of the TV and press the button for the desired function. The signal passes from the remote control through the TV to the device via the TheaterLink cable (included with your TV).


To connect, align the TheaterLink cable's infrared "eye" with the device's infrared sensor and attach it using double-sided mounting tape. Plug the other end of the TheaterLink cable into the TV's TheaterLink OUT jack. You can connect up to two devices with the TheaterLink cable included in the TVs original packaging.



Connecting an audio system

This connection allows you to use an audio amplifier to adjust the audio level. This also allows you to use external speakers.

To control the audio, turn on the TV and the stereo amplifier, and turn off the built-in speakers (see "Turning off the built-in speakers" on page 65).

You will need:

• one pair of audio cables

Note:

To hear sound when using an external audio amplifier, the volume of both the TV and the amplifier must be set above 0 (zero).

For example, if the volume of the TV is set to 0, you will not be able to hear any sound, even the volume of the amplifier is at its highest level.

Connecting an A/V receiver


This connection allows you to use an audio/video (A/V) receiver to enhance your TV's sound.

If you have a sound system with "Dolby Surround Pro Logic," you can add to the realism of the sound by using the TV's internal speakers as center channel speakers.

You will need:

- one set of standard A/V cables
- one single audio cable for the audio center channel




To use the TV speakers as normal speakers, set the Audio Center Channel ON/OFF switch to the OFF position.




Installing the remote control batteries

To install the batteries:


1. Slide the battery cover off the back of the remote control.



2. Install two "AA" size alkaline batteries. Match the + and - signs on the batteries to the signs on the battery compartment.



3. Slide the battery cover back on to the remote control until the lock snaps.



Caution:

- Dispose of batteries in a designated disposal area.Do not throw batteries into a fire.
- · Do not mix battery types or combine used batteries with new ones.
- If the remote control does not operate correctly, or if the operating range becomes reduced, replace both batteries with new ones.

Programming the remote control for use with your audio/video devices

Device code setup

1. Refer to the multi-brand remote control device code table on pages 22–23 to find the code for the brand of your device.

If more than one code is listed, try each one separately until you find the one that works.

- 2. Press MODE until the Mode indicator for the device (CABLE/ SAT, VCR, DVD, AUDIO1, AUDIO2) lights up.
- 3. While holding down the RECALL button, press the Channel Number buttons to enter the four-digit code for your brand of device. If a valid code is entered, the mode indicator will blink twice. If an invalid code is entered, the mode indicator will blink one long blink.
- 4. Point the remote control at the device and press POWER to test the code.

If the device turns on, you have entered the correct code.

If the device does not respond to the remote control, you may have entered the wrong code. Repeat steps 3 and 4 using another code.

Note: In addition to POWER, confirm that all necessary keys on the TV remote control operate your device. If some keys are not operational, repeat the device code setup using another code (if other codes are listed for your device). If, after trying all listed codes, the necessary keys do not operate your device, use the device's original remote control.

5. Press MODE to select the TV mode to control the TV.

Searching and sampling the code of a device (8500)

If you do not know the device code for a particular device, you can cycle the remote control through the available codes for that device mode and sample the functions to find the code that operates the target device. The keys available to be sampled, provided they are applicable to that mode, are POWER, 1, VOL \blacktriangle , CH \bigstar , and PLAY. Invalid keys will be ignored while in program mode.

To cycle through each available device code and sample its functions:


- 1. Press MODE to select the mode you want to set up.
- 2. While holding down the RECALL button, press 8-5-0-0. The remote control will enter program mode.
- 3. Point the remote control at the target device and press POWER (or other function buttons that are available to be sampled).
- If the device responds to the remote control: Press RECALL to store the device code. The mode indicator will blink twice and the remote control will exit the program mode.

If the device does not respond to the remote control: Press ▲, and then press POWER. Repeat this step until the device responds to the remote control, and then press RECALL.

Note: When a search cycle is completed, the mode indicator will blink three times. The remote control will begin to cycle through the available codes again. If no key is pressed within 10 seconds while programming, the remote control will exit the program mode and return to the previous code.

Using the volume lock feature (8000)

For the TV, CABLE/SAT, VCR, and DVD modes, the volume controls (VOL ▲▼ and MUTE) can be programmed (locked) to the selected device mode. This feature does not apply to the AUDIO1/2 modes.

For example, to lock the volume controls to always jump to the CABLE/SAT mode:

- 1. Repeatedly press MODE to select the CABLE/SAT mode.
- 2. While holding down the RECALL button, press 8 0 0 0.
- 3. Press VOL ▲. The Mode indicator will blink two times (locked).


Changing channels

- To change to a specific channel (programmed or unprogrammed): Press the Channel Number buttons (0–9 and 100). For channels 100 and higher, press the 100 button, and then the next two numbers. For example, to select channel 125, press 100, 2, 5.
- To change to the next programmed channel: Press Channel \blacktriangle or \triangledown on the TV or remote control.




This projection TV uses three separate TV tubes: red, green, and blue. The red, green, and blue images are projected onto the screen where they converge to form a full-color picture. You can see a clear picture only when the three images converge correctly. Convergence may drift over time or if you move the TV. If you can see clear images on your TV screen, skip this procedure.

This adjustment should be made only after the TV has been on for at least 30 minutes.

Switching between two channels using Channel Return


Labeling channels

Channel labels appear above the on-screen channel number display each time you turn on the TV, change a channel, or press RECALL. You can choose any four characters to identify a channel.


To create channel labels:





Using the game timer

Note:

Do not cover the ALS sensor on the front panel of the TV.




Using CableClear[™] DNR (digital noise reduction)

This feature allows you to reduce visible interference in your TV picture. This is useful when receiving a broadcast with a weak signal (especially a Cable channel) or playing back a video cassette or disc damaged by repeated use.

To turn on CableClear DNR:

- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the PICTURE menu appears.

Selecting stereo/SAP broadcasts

The multi-channel TV sound (MTS) feature allows you to listen to high-fidelity stereo sound while watching TV. MTS can also transmit a second audio program (SAP) containing a second language, music, or other audio information (when provided by individual stations).

When the TV receives a stereo or SAP broadcast, the word STEREO or SAP appears on-screen every time the TV is turned on, the channel is changed, or the RECALL button is pressed.

The MTS feature is not available when the TV is in VIDEO mode.

To listen to stereo sound:






You can leave your TV in STEREO mode because it will automatically output the type of sound being broadcast (stereo or monaural). The word "STEREO" or "SAP" displays in yellow in the menu when the TV receives the signal.

If the stereo sound is noisy, select MONO to reduce the noise.

- To listen to SAP (if available):
- 1. Press MENU, and then press ◀ or ▶ until the AUDIO menu appears.

A second audio program (SAP) can be heard only on those TV stations that offer it.

For example, a station might broadcast music as a second audio program. If you have SAP on, you will see the current program on the screen but hear music instead of the program's normal audio.

If you have SAP on and the station you are watching is not broadcasting a second audio program, the station's normal audio will be output.

However, occasionally there is no sound at all in this instance.

If this happens, set the MTS feature to STEREO mode.

Using the WOW[™] surround sound feature

WOW is a special combination of SRS audio technologies that creates a thrilling surround sound experience with deep, rich bass from mono or stereo sound sources. Your audio will sound fuller, richer, and wider.

To adjust the WOW feature:

- 1. Select STEREO mode (See "Selecting stereo/SAP broadcasts" on page 62).

Troubleshooting

Before calling a service technician, please check the following table for a possible cause of the problem and some solutions.
