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### **Environment and Safety**

#### Warning:

Skype is not a telephony replacement service. Any VoIP service used in conjunction with the Cordless Skype Dual Phone cannot be used for calls to emergency services or emergency telephone numbers (311, 911, 112, 999, etc.). Use a landline for calls to emergency services, such as police, fire, or ambulance.

If the base station of your Cordless Skype Dual Phone is connected to a PSTN (Public Switched Telephone Network) landline, you can make emergency calls using the handset connected to the base station.

**Power Requirements:** The product requires an electrical supply of 110–120 volts in North America and 220–240 volts outside North America, single phase alternating current, excluding IT installations defined in standard EN/IEC 60950.

Caution: Use only the mains adapter supplied with this telephone. Incorrect adapter polarity or voltage can seriously damage the unit.

Base adapter Input: 120 VAC 60 Hz Output: 9 VDC 300 mA Charger adapter Input: 120 VAC 60 Hz Output: 9 VDC 150 mA

**Battery Requirements:** The handset requires power source of two rechargeable NiMH batteries, size AAA 1.2V 650mAh (HR10/44).

#### Warning:

**RISK OF EXPLOSION IF BATTERY IS REPLACED BY AN INCORRECT TYPE.** Never use nonrechargeable batteries; use recommended type supplied with this telephone. NiMH batteries must be disposed of in accordance with the applicable waste disposal regulations.

#### Warning:

The electrical network is classified as dangerous according to criteria in the standard EN/IEC 60950. The only way to power down this product is by unplugging the power adapter from the electrical outlet. Ensure the electrical outlet is located close to the apparatus and is always easily accessible.

### Important Safety Instructions

Some of the following information may not apply to your particular product; however, when using telephone equipment, basic safety precautions should always be followed to reduce the risk of fire, electric shock, and injury

to persons, including the following:

- 1. Read and understand all instructions.
- 2. Follow all warnings and instructions marked on the product.
- 3. Unplug this product from the wall outlet before cleaning. Do not use liquid cleaners or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.
- 4. Telephones should not be used while you are in a bathtub, shower, or pool. Immersion of the telephone or handset in water could cause an electrical shock.
- 5. Slots and openings in the cabinet back or bottom are provided for ventilation, to protect it from overheating. These openings must not be blocked or covered. The openings should never be blocked by placing the product on the bed, sofa, rug, or other similar surface. This product should not be placed in a built-in installation unless proper ventilation is provided.

- 19. Do not allow the charging contacts of the charger or the battery to come into contact with extraneous conductive materials.
- 20. There is a slight chance that the telephone could be damaged by an electrical storm. It is recommended that users unplug the phone from the USB socket during a storm.
- 21. Do not use the handset in an explosive hazard area such as where there is gas leaking.
- 22. Young children should be supervised to ensure that they do not play with the telephone.
- 23. We advise that this phone should not be used near intensive care medical equipment or by persons with pacemakers.

Your phone can interfere with electrical equipment such as answering machines, TV and radio sets if placed too close. It is recommended that you position the base station at least one meter from such appliances.

Privacy of communications may not be ensured when using this telephone.





# System Requirements

To install and use the Cordless Skype Dual Phone and Skype<sup>™</sup> Internet telephony service, your computer must meet the following minimum requirements:

- Windows® XP or 2000
- 400 MHz processor
- 128 MB RAM
- USB port (USB 2.0 or USB 1.1)
- Internet Connection (broadband recommended)
- CD-ROM drive or DVD drive

### Installation

This section covers both the initial installation of your Cordless Skype Dual Phone and expanding your system with additional handsets.

# Initial Installation

### Step One: Installing the Phone

1. Insert the USRobotics Installation CD-ROM into your computer's CD-ROM or DVD drive.

If the CD doesn't start automatically, start it manually as follows:

- A. Windows XP: Click Windows Start > My Computer. Windows 2000: Click Windows Start > Settings > My Computer.
- B. Double-click the CD drive.
- C. Double-click setupwizard.exe.
- 2. Select your preferred language and click NEXT.
- 3. Select the first option on the installation menu.

If you need to install or update Skype, the first option is Install Skype. Otherwise, the first option is Install Phone.


Note: The installation program will not let you install the Cordless Skype Dual Phone software if Skype is not installed or needs to be updated.

The installation program leads you through all of the steps required to install the Cordless Skype Dual Phone for use with Skype. At the end of the phone installation process:

• The Cordless Skype Dual Phone icon appears in your system tray:



• Your hardware setup should look similar to this:



#### **Step Two: Select Your Country**


- 1. Turn on the handset by pressing 🖾 until text appears on the screen.
- 2. When the handset indicates that it has established a link with the base station  $\Upsilon$ , press any key on the handset.
- 3. Select your country and press **OK** (the Menu key).

Once the handset detects both Skype and the base station, your Skype online status appears on the phone's display. Your phone is now ready for use.


### Understanding the System Tray Icon

When the phone's application program is running, it displays an icon in your system tray. When the base station is connected to the computer, the icon is green. When there is trouble with the connection, the icon is red.



To display text describing the connection status, double-click the icon.

When you right-click the icon, the application menu appears:



- About displays text describing the connection status of the base station and the application version number.
- **PC Inititated Calls** lets you use Skype on your computer to make a call and then pick up the handset. For more information, see <u>Initiating Skype Calls through Your Computer</u>.
- More Products gives you information about related products from the USRobotics website.
- Exit stops the application program and closes the menu.

#### Stopping the Phone Program

You can stop the phone program as follows: right click the icon in the system tray and select Exit.

#### Starting the Phone Program

If you stop the program, you can restart it as follows: click Windows Start > Programs > USRobotics Cordless Skype Dual Phone.

### Additional Handset

The Cordless Skype Dual Phone base station can support up to four handsets. To add a handset, you first need to charge the batteries. Once the batteries are charged, you must register the handset to the base station.

#### **Charge the Batteries**

The batteries must be charged for 14 hours before you use the handset for the first time. Use only the batteries that came with the handset.

- 1. Connect the charger adapter to an electrical outlet.
- 2. Remove the battery compartment cover by sliding it toward the bottom of the handset.
- 3. Insert the batteries, observing their polarities, into the battery compartment and replace the cover.
- 4. Set the handset in the charger and let the batteries charge for 14 hours.

The handset may become warm during initial charging.

### **Register the Handset**

If the handset displays UNREGISTERED, you need to register the handset with the base station as follows:

1. Press MENU.

The handset displays ADVANCED SET > REGISTRATION.

- 2. Press and hold the paging key on the base station until the In Use LED starts blinking.
- 3. The base station is now in registration mode. Press **OK**.
- 4. If the handset prompts you for a PIN, enter the PIN and press OK.

The default PIN is 0000.

During the registration period, the handset displays **SEARCH BASE**. At the end of the registration period, the handset indicates whether the registration was successful or not:

• Successful registration—You will hear a confirmation tone, and the <sup>↑</sup> icon stops flashing. The handset displays its label, number, and clock.

#### **Select Your Country**

The COUNTRY option selects the correct telephone network settings and the default language for the country that you select. If your phone does not have a COUNTRY option, the handset already is configured for the country in which it was sold. Follow the steps below to determine whether you have a COUNTRY option and, if so, to set it.

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Press **a** to scroll to the **COUNTRY** option and press **OK**.

If there is no COUNTRY option, you are finished installing your handset.

4. Select the country in which you are using the phone and click **OK**.

# Navigating the Menus

The phone's menus provide options that let you change settings and review call history; they also provide access to both your Skype Contacts list and your landline phonebook.

To use the menus,

1. If the handset name is displayed, press MENU.

OR

If the handset name is not displayed, press \_, then press MENU.

The phone displays SKYPE.

2. To select Skype, press the OK soft key (the MENU key).

OR

To display the next option, press  $\blacktriangle$  or  $\blacktriangledown$  repeatedly until the option that you want is displayed. Then press **OK**.

Depending on the option you chose, you may be at a point where you can use a specific feature, or you may have to choose an option from a sub-menu in order to find the feature. As long as you see  $\blacktriangle$  and  $\blacktriangledown$ , you can scroll through the options until you find the one that you want. When you do, press **OK**.

To help you get acquainted with the menu structure, the following table lists the menus and the options available in each.

## Entering Text

Some functions, such as adding an entry to your phonebook, require that you enter text.

To enter text, repeatedly press the key labelled with the letter that you want until the letter appears in the phone's display. For example, the 2 key also enters the letters A, B, and C; to enter the letter C, press the 2 key three times.

You can also enter special symbols:

Symbol	Кеу	Action
space	1	While in an alphanumeric mode, such as entering a name, press once.
pause	#	While entering a phone number, press and hold
+	0	While entering a phone number, press and hold

To switch between upper and lower case while entering text, press #.

### **Basic Call Functions**

This section tells you how to make and end calls and how to change volume settings while you are on a call.

### Making a Skype-to-Skype Call

To call a Skype user, the user must appear in your Skype Contacts list. If your contacts list is empty, add a contact as follows:

- 1. In the system tray, double-click the Skype icon.
- 2. Click Add Contact and follow the on-screen prompts.

After the contact has been added to the Contacts list, you can use your Cordless Skype Dual Phone keypad to call the contact as follows:

- 1. Press 💿
- 2. Scroll up or scroll down until you reach the contact that you want to call.

A Skype presence icon before each contact lets you know whether the user wants to be called. The table

below shows the meaning of each icon.

3. Press 💿

OR

Press 🝸

#### Making a Skype-to-Landline Call

To call a landline phone via Skype, you must subscribe to SkypeOut™. You can subscribe as follows:

- 1. In the system tray, double-click the Skype icon.
- 2. From the Tools menu, select SkypeOut and follow the on-screen prompts.

Once you have SkypeOut credit, you can use your Cordless Skype Dual Phone to place the call as follows:

1. Use the number keys to enter the number that you want to call.

When calling a landline from Skype, you must always use international dialling format, even if you are calling a number in the same country. The format of the call is one of the following, depending on the country from which you are calling.

- 00 + country code + phone number
- 011 + country code + phone number

OR

```
+(plus sign) + country code + phone
```

2. Press 🕒

If you add the landline number to your Skype Contacts list, you can call the landline by scrolling your contacts list and pressing the Skype key.

### Making a Call through Your Landline

#### **Direct Dialling**

1. Enter the number that you want to call, up to 20 digits.

The number appears on the display.

2. Press 🚩

#### **Dialling through Your Phonebook**

#### To store a number in your phonebook:

- 1. Go to the PHONEBOOK menu.
- If you want the phone number to be available to all handsets, scroll to the SHARED option; otherwise, scroll to the PRIVATE option.
- 3. Press OK.
- 4. Scroll until you see ADD; then press OK.
- 5. Enter a name for the phone number; then press **OK**.
- 6. Enter the phone number; then press OK.

The phone confirms addition of the number to your phonebook.


#### To call a number that has been saved in your phonebook:

- 1. Go to the PHONEBOOK menu.
- 2. Scroll to the list, either private or shared, in which you saved the number; then press OK..
- 3. Scroll until you see the View option, then press OK.
- 4. Scroll until you see the name associated with the number that you want to call.
- 5. Press 🝸 .
- 6. For more information about managing your phonebook, see <u>Phonebook</u>.

#### **Initiating Skype Calls through Your Computer**

You can initiate calls on your computer, then pick them up on the handset. To enable this feature:

- 1. Right-click the phone application's icon in the sytem tray.
- 2. Select PC Initiated Calls as illustrated below:



When you use the Skype program on your computer to place a call, the handset rings. You have two minutes to

pick up the call on the handset by pressing 🔛 . If you do not pick up the call on the handset within two minutes, the audio from the call remains on the computer and cannot be rerouted to the handset. Until you pick up the call on the handset, the answering party hears the audio from the audio device selected on your computer.

**PC Initiated Calls** does not require that you make all calls from your computer. You can still use the handset to place calls.

### Answering a Call

To answer a call:

When the Skype icon flashes, the caller's full name or Skype name is shown on the display.

If the landline icon flashes, press Y

You have to subscribe to caller ID service from your local service provider in order to see the caller's name and number on the display.

You can also distinguish between the two kinds of calls by setting different ring tones as described in <u>Select your</u> <u>handset's ringing melody</u>.

### Ending a Call

To end a call:

• Press 🔂

OR

Place the handset in the charger.

#### Adjusting Call Volume

You can increase or decrease the volume of the other party's voice during a call. There are 5 volume levels for selection.

To adjust the volume, during a call:

1. While the phone is off hook (i.e. dial tone is heard), press  $\blacktriangle$  or  $\blacktriangledown$ .

The display shows the current volume level.

2. Press press ▲ or ▼ again to adjust the volume.

If you still cannot find a comfortable volume on a Skype call, you might need to adjust the volume on your computer as follows:

Windows XP

- 1. Click Windows Start > Control Panel.
- 2. Click Sound and Audio Devices.
- 3. In the Audio tab's Sound playback, select USR Cordless Skype Dual Phone and click Apply.
- 4. Click the sound playback Volume button.
- 5. Adjust the volume by dragging the slider. When finished, close the volume control window.
- 6. In Sound playback, select your original sound device.
- 7. Click OK.

Windows 2000

- 1. Click Windows Start > Settings > Control Panel.
- 2. Double-click Sounds and Multimedia.
- 3. In the Audio tab's Sound playback, select USB Audio Device and click Apply.
- 4. Click the sound playback Volume button.
- 5. Adjust the volume by dragging the slider. When finished, close the volume control window.
- 6. In **Sound playback**, select your original sound device.
- 7. Click OK.

#### **Muting Your Voice**

During a call, if you wish to speak to someone privately without having the caller hear your conversation:

1. Press 🙀 .

The phone displays MUTE. The caller cannot hear you, but you can hear the caller.

2. Press again to speak with the caller.

### **Skype Features**

# Emergency Calling

Although you cannot use Skype to make emergency calls, the Cordless Skype Dual Phone recognises emergency phone numbers for some countries. If you dial the emergency number and accidentally press (s)

instead of 💓 , the phone overrides your choice of lines and uses the landline to complete the emergency call. The emergency numbers are associated with the country that is selected on your phone. For a list of countries and their emergency numbers, see <u>Selecting Country</u>.

# Using Skype Speed-Dial

#### Assigning a Speed-Dial Number

Use your computer to set a Skype speed-dial number.

1. Double-click the Skype icon in your system tray to open the Skype program.



- 2. In your Contacts list, right-click a contact and select Set Speed-Dial.
- 3. Enter a 1- or 2-digit speed-dial number for the contact and click **OK**.

### **Speed-Dialling**

To call a contact using the Skype speed-dial number:

- 1. On the handset, press #.
- 2. Enter the speed-dial number that you set in the Skype program.
- 3. Press 🕒.

Skype calls the contact associated with the speed-dial number.

Note: If you omit pressing 🚮 when speed-dialling, the call may still go through Skype. However, in some countries, if the speed-dial number matches an emergency number, an emergency call will be made instead of a Skype call. It is always a good practice to press 🚮 before entering the speed dial number.

# Making a Skype Conference Call

To start a Skype conference call:

- 1. Make a Skype call to the first party.
- 2. After the first party answers the call, press 💟 .
- 3. Make a Skype call to the second party.
- 4. When the second party answers the call, press and hold 📰 to join the two parties.

### Changing Your Skype Presence

You can use your handset to change your Skype presence. Your presence icon lets other Skype users know whether you are accepting calls. To change your Skype presence:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select SKYPE and press OK.
- 3. Select USER STATUS and press OK.
- 4. Select the status that you want other Skype users to see.

5. Press **OK** to save the status.

# Voicemail

If you have Skype Voicemail, you can use your handset to manage your messages. To purchase Skype Voicemail, go to www.skype.com/products/skypevoicemail.

### **Retrieving Voicemail**

If you see 🗹 on the handset display, you have a message waiting. To retrieve it:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select SKYPE and press OK.
- 3. Select VOICEMAIL and press OK.
- 4. Scroll to the message you want to hear and press MENU.

An asterisk (\*) indicates that the message is new.

5. Select PLAY and press OK.

#### **Deleting Voicemail**

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select SKYPE and press OK.
- 3. Select VOICEMAIL and press OK.
- 4. Scroll to the message you want to delete and press MENU.
- 5. Select DELETE and press OK.

# SkypeOut Credits

SkypeOut lets you use Skype to call landlines and mobile phones. If you have SkypeOut, you can use your handset to check your SkypeOut credit balance as follows:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select SKYPE and press OK.
- 3. Select CREDITS and press OK.

Your credit balance is displayed in euros.

### Phonebook

The phonebook stores numbers that you call from your landline. It does not store Skype numbers; those are stored in the Skype contacts list. Your phone has one or more private phonebooks and one shared phonebook.

A private phonebook is stored in the handset. If you have more than one handset, each has its own private phonebook. A private phonebook can store 50 entries.

The shared phonebook is stored in the base station and is available to all handsets registered with the base station. The shared phonebook can store 10 entries.

The following operations let you manage and use your phonebook:

- Storing a Name and Number
- Dialling from the Phonebook
- Editing Phonebook Entries
- Deleting Phonebook Entries
- <u>Copying Phonebook Entries</u>
- <u>Viewing Storage Availability</u>
- Using Quick Dial

### Storing a Name and Number

Each entry can store a name of up to 10 characters and a number of up to 20 digits. You can store an entry through the phonebook menu or from a list of recently called numbers.

#### Store by Using the Phonebook Menu

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PHONEBOOK and press OK.
- 3. Select the phonebook, PRIVATE or SHARED, and press OK.
- 4. Select ADD and press OK.

If your phonebook is full, the handset displays FULL. You have to delete an entry before you can add a new one.

5. Enter a name and press **OK** to continue. Note that each name must be unique within the phonebook.

If you make a mistake, press BACK to delete the last character entered.

6. Enter the phone number and press OK.

If you need a dialling pause in the number, enter the pause by pressing and holding **#** until the handset displays P.

If you entered a duplicate name, the display asks whether to replace the entry. To replace the entry, press **DK**; to change the name of the new entry, press **BACK**.

#### Store from a Recent Call

You can retrieve either the number of a caller or a number that you have dialled and save it to your phonebook. For more information, see <u>Save a Call Record to Your Phonebook</u> and <u>Save a Dial Record to Your Phonebook</u>.

### Dialling from the Phonebook

#### **Using Menus**

To view your phonebook entries and select one for dialling:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PHONEBOOK and press OK.
- 3. Select the phonebook, PRIVATE or SHARED, and press OK.
- 4. Select VIEW and press OK.
- 5. Scroll to the number that you want to call

OR

Search by letter: to display names starting with a specific letter, press the key that has that letter on it.

6. Press TALK.

#### Using the Phonebook Key

The Phonebook key is a shortcut to your private phonebook, saving you the time of navigating menus. To use the phonebook key:

- 1. Press 😐 .
- 2. Scroll to the number that you want to call

OR

Search by letter: to display names starting with a specific letter, press the key that has that letter on it.

3. Press TALK.

### Editing Phonebook Entries

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PHONEBOOK and press OK.
- 3. Select the phonebook, PRIVATE or SHARED, and press OK.
- 4. Select EDIT and press OK.
- 5. Scroll to the entry that you want to edit.

OR

Search by letter: to display names starting with a specific letter, press the key that has that letter on it.

- 6. Press OK.
- 7. Edit the name and number using the keypad and press OK.

To erase a character, press BACK.

8. Press OK to save your changes.

### Deleting Phonebook Entries

#### **Delete a Single Entry**

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PHONEBOOK and press OK.
- 3. Select the phonebook, **PRIVATE** or **SHARED**, and press **OK**.
- 4. Select DELETE and press OK.
- 5. Select the entry that you want to delete the entry and press OK.

The phone displays CONFIRM?

6. Press OK to confirm that you want to delete the entry.

#### **Delete All Entries**

- 1. Press MENU.
- 1. Select PHONEBOOK and press OK.
- 2. Select the phonebook, PRIVATE or SHARED, and press OK.
- 3. Select DELETE ALL and press OK.

The phone displays CONFIRM?

4. Press **OK** to confirm that you want to delete all entries.

# Copying Phonebook Entries

You can copy your shared phonebook entries to your personal phonebook and vice-versa.

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PHONEBOOK and press OK.
- 3. Select the phonebook, **PRIVATE** or **SHARED**, and press **OK**.
- 4. Select TO SHARED or TO PRIVATE and press OK.

The phone displays CONFIRM?

5. Scroll to the entry that you want to copy to the other phonebook and press **OK**.

The phone displays the name.

6. Press OK.

The phone displays the number.

7. Press OK.

If the entry is already in the other phonebook, the display asks whether to replace the entry. To replace the entry, press **OK**; to leave the other phone book as is, press **BACK**.

# Viewing Storage Availability

Your phone keeps track of how many entries you have added to your phonebooks and how many you can still add. To see these counts:

1. Press MENU.

- 2. Select PHONEBOOK and press OK.
- 3. Select the phonebook, **PRIVATE** or **SHARED**, and press **OK**.
- 4. Select STATUS and press OK.

The phone displays the number of free and used phonebook entries.

### Using Quick Dial

The quick dial feature lets you dial private phonebook entries by pressing and holding one key. You can assign 9 quick dial keys, keys 1–9.

Note: If the BABY CALL feature is turned on, pressing any key will dial the BABY CALL number, not the quick dial number. For more information about BABY CALL, see <u>Baby Call</u>.

#### Assigning a Quick Dial Key

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PHONEBOOK and press OK.
- 3. Select **PRIVATE** and press **OK**.
- 4. Select QUICK DIAL and press OK.
- 5. Scroll to the key entry that you want to set and press **OK**.

The phone displays the first entry in your private phonebook.

6. Scroll to the phonebook entry that you want to assign to the selected key and press OK.

#### **Quick Dialling**

Press and hold the key assigned to the number that you want to call, and release the key when the phone displays the number. It usually takes about 2 seconds from the time you first press the key until the phone starts dialling the number.

#### **Changing a Quick Dial Key**

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PHONEBOOK and press OK.
- 3. Select PRIVATE and press OK.

- 4. Select QUICK DIAL and press OK.
- 5. Scroll to the key entry that you want to change and press **OK**.
- 6. Select EDIT and press OK.
- 7. Scroll to the phonebook entry that you want to assign to the selected key and press OK.

#### **Deleting a Quick Dial Key**

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PHONEBOOK and press OK.
- 3. Select PRIVATE and press OK.
- 4. Select QUICK DIAL and press OK.
- 5. Scroll to the key entry that you want to change and press **OK**.
- 6. Select DELETE and press OK.

The phone displays CONFIRM?

7. Press OK to confirm that you want to delete the quick-key assignment.

# **Advanced Operations**

# Advanced Call Functions

## Redialling

#### From a List

Your phone records the last 10 numbers or contacts that you have called, storing the first 32 characters of each name and phone number. To redial one of those numbers or contacts:

- 1. Press 🗃 . The most recently dialled number appears.
- 2. Scroll to the number that you want to dial.
- 3. Press 🝸 .

#### **Last Number Dialled**

To redial the last number dialled:

- 1. Press 😭 .
- 2. Press 🛱 .

### **Quick Dialling**

You can assign the number keys 1–9 to frequently dialled numbers in your private phonebook. Once a key is assigned, you can call the phone number by pressing and holding the key.

For information on how to set and use quick dial numbers, see Using Quick Dial.

### Recall (Call Waiting)

While on a call, you can make or receive a second call. To use this feature while the landline, you must subscribe to the call waiting service from your local service provider.

You can only use one line at a time: if you are on a Skype call, you can make or answer a second Skype call only; if you are on a landline call, you can make or answer a second call on the landline only.

Note: The key sequence that you use to handle multiple calls depends on the requirements of your local telephone service. For example, in the United States, you need to press the recall key (♥) only, while in some European countries, you need to press the recall key followed by a number key (♥ +1, ♥ +2). If you are not sure which keys to use, check with your telephone service provider.

#### Make a Second Outgoing Call While on a Skype Call

To make a second Skype call:

1. While on a call, press 🝸 .

The first call is put on hold and you hear a dial tone.

2. To call a Skype user, press (6), select the contact to call and press 🝸 .

OR

To make a SkypeOut call, enter the number to call and press 🕎 .

3. To return to the first call or to toggle between calls, press ₩.

#### Make a Second Outgoing Call While on a Landline Call

To make a second landline call:

- 1. While on a call, press 🝸 .
- 2. The first call is put on hold and you hear a dial tone.
- 3. Enter the number to call and press 🕎 .

To toggle between the two landline calls, press 🕎 .

#### **Receive a Second Incoming Call**

When there is a second incoming call on the same line (through Skype if you are on a Skype call, or through your landline if you are on a landline call), you hear a call-waiting alert; when the second incoming call is on the other line, you hear two beeps.

If the second incoming call is on the same line,

- 1. Press it place the first call on hold and pick up the second call.
- To return to the first call or to toggle between calls, press Y

If the second incoming call is on the other line, you have to terminate the first call before you can pick up the second:

- 1. Press 🔄 to terminate the current call.
- 2. Pick up the incoming call by pressing 🝸 .

# **Chain Dialling**

Chain dialling lets you link the numbers in multiple phonebook entries to form a single dialled number. To use chain dialling:

- 1. Enter the first number as follows:
  - A. Press 😐 .
  - B. Select the first number that you want to dial.
  - C. Press 🝸 .
- 2. Enter the second number as follows:
  - A. Press and hold \_\_\_\_\_ for 2 seconds.

If you decide at this point to exit chain dialling, press and hold the 😐 key again for 2 seconds.

- B. Select the next number that you want to dial.
- C. Press OK.

There is no limit to the number of phonebook entries you can chain together.


### Making a Hands-free Call

Hands-free options provide the convenience of talking to a caller without having to hold on to the phone. The phone provides for hands-free calling with a built-in speaker and a headset jack.

#### Headset

The phone supports any headset that has a 2.5 mm plug. To use a headset:

1. Remove the phone's headset cover.



2. Plug the headset into the headset jack.

You can hear the caller from the earpiece of the headset, and you can speak via the headset's microphone.

#### Speaker

To use the built-in speaker:

1. While on a call, press <a>[]</a>.

You can hear the caller over the speaker and you can speak via the microphone; 📢 appears on the display.

2. Press  $\blacktriangle$  or  $\blacktriangledown$  to adjust the volume of the speaker.

If you cannot find a comfortable volume for Skype calls, you may need to adjust the volume setting on your computer. For instructions on setting your computer volume, see <u>Adjusting Call Volume</u>.

To turn the speaker off, press <a>[]</a>.

# Phone Settings

### **Time Settings**

#### Setting the Time of Day

The phone obtains the current time from your computer. You can also adjust the clock manually as follows:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select CLOCK/ALARM and press OK.
- 3. Select SET CLOCK and press OK.
- 4. Use the numeric keys to enter the time of day in 24-hour format.
- 5. Press OK to save the new time of day.

#### Setting the Alarm Clock

The phone has a built-in alarm clock. In addition to setting the alarm time and whether the alarm is on or off, you can select the alarm melody and volume. When the alarm rings, it rings for one minute.

Note: To turn off the alarm while it is ringing, press 💽 .

#### On, Off, and Time

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select CLOCK/ALARM and press OK.
- 3. Select SET ALARM and press OK.
- 4. Select ON or OFF and press OK.

If you select ON, the alarm time is displayed. Use the numeric keys to enter the alarm time in 24-hour format.

5. Press **OK** to save your alarm settings.

#### Melody

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select CLOCK/ALARM and press OK.
- 3. Select ALARM TONE and press OK.
- 4. Select **MELODY** and press **OK**.

The phone plays the melody that is selected.

5. Select the melody that you want and press OK.

#### Volume

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select CLOCK/ALARM and press OK.
- 3. Select ALARM TONE and press OK.
- 4. Select VOLUME and press OK.

The phone displays the volume setting and plays the alarm melody at that volume.

5. Select the volume that you want and press **OK**.

### **Personal Settings**

#### Display

#### Name Your Handset

Each handset has a unique name for easy identification. When the handset is idle, it displays the time of day. To see the handset's name, press **MENU**.

To change the name of a handset:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select **PERSONAL SET** and press **OK**.
- 3. Select HANDSET NAME and press OK.

The handset name is displayed.

4. Edit the handset name.

The name can be up to 10 characters long and can contain letters, numbers, and spaces.

5. Press OK to save your changes.

#### Adjust the Contrast

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PERSONAL SET and press OK.
- 3. Select CONTRAST and press OK.
- 4. Select your preferred contrast level and press OK.

#### Auto Answer

Auto answer gives you the convenience of answering a call by just picking up the phone from the charger. You do not need to press the TALK key.

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PERSONAL SET and press OK.
- 3. Select AUTO ANSWER and press OK.
- 4. Select ON or OFF and press OK.

#### Turn the Backlight On and Off

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PERSONAL SET and press OK.
- 3. Select BACKLIT and press OK.
- 4. Select ON or OFF and press OK.

#### Set your phone's language

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PERSONAL SET and press OK.
- 3. Select LANGUAGE and press OK.

4. Select your preferred language and press OK.

#### Sounds

#### Select your handset's ringing melody

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PERSONAL SET and press OK.
- 3. Select HANDSET TONE and press OK.
- 4. Select the line for which you want to set the ringtone.

Choose from telephone, Skype, or internal. Internal is the ringtone for paging the handset from the base station and for using the intercom between handsets.

5. Select your preferred ringtone and press OK.

#### Selecting your handset's ringing volume

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PERSONAL SET and press OK.
- 3. Select HANDSET TONE and press OK.
- 4. Select VOLUME and press OK.
- 5. Select your preferred volume and press OK.

You can also turn off your ringer temporarily by using the handset keys. For more information, see Ringer On/Off

#### Turning the key beep on/off

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select PERSONAL SET and press OK.
- 3. Select HANDSET TONE and press OK.
- 4. Select KEY BEEP and press OK.
- 5. Select ON or OFF and press OK.

### **Advanced Settings**

#### **Recall or Flash**

(Flash on North American models)

You may know the recall function as "flash" or "switchhook". It is commonly used to manage call waiting. Your

phone comes with two recall duration values. If the recall or flash function is not working, switch to the other. To change the recall duration:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select RECALL TIME or FLASH TIME and press OK.
- 4. Select your preferred recall duration and press **OK**.

#### **Dial Mode**

Your phone is set to tone dialling. You can switch to pulse dialling if necessary.

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select DIAL MODE and press OK.
- 4. Select TONE or PULSE and press OK.

If the dialling mode is set to pulse, you can set it for temporary tone dialling by pressing and holding in after you have seized the line. The phone displays a D. All the subsequent digits are dialled as tones until you hang up.

#### Pause

You may need to enter a pause between digits in a phone number. For example, some systems require a pause after you dial a code to secure an outside line. You enter the pause by pressing the # key. The length of the pause is determined by the pause feature. To change the pause duration:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select PAUSE and press OK.
- 4. Select your preferred pause duration and press OK.

#### PABX

If your phone is on a PABX, you can set the PABX number:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select **PABX** and press **OK**.

- 4. Use the number keys to enter the PABX number.
- 5. Press OK.

#### Area Code

(On North American models only)

If you do not have to dial the area code for numbers within your area code, use this setting. With this setting, the handset ignores your area code on incoming calls so that when you save the number to your phonebook it is saved with only the 7 digits that you need to dial.

If you have to dial the area code to make outgoing calls within your area code, do not use this setting.

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select AREA CODE and press OK.

The current area code (if available) is displayed.

- 4. Enter or edit the number.
- 5. Press OK.

#### Baby Call

You can set the phone to dial a specified number when any key is pressed (except the OFF key), making it easy for someone with limited dialling ability to reach help. When BABY CALL is on, the phone acts as an emergency calling device and regular calling functions are not available.

#### Set the BABY CALL Number

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select BABY CALL and press OK.
- 4. Use the number keys to enter the BABY CALL number.
- 5. Press OK.

The phone displays BABY CALL.

#### Turn BABY CALL Off

- 1. Press OFF.
- 2. Select OFF and press OK.

#### **Voicemail Waiting Indicator**

If you have voice mail on your landline, the phone displays a voicemail waiting indicator. To clear the indicator:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select VMWI and press OK.

The phone displays DELETE.

4. Press OK.

# Additional Handset Features

### **Keypad Lock**

The keypad can be locked to prevent the accidental pressing of keys such as might occur if you put the handset in your pocket. When the keypad is locked, you can still answer an incoming call by pressing the TALK key. During the call, the keypad is active. When you end the call, the keypad is locked again.

To lock and keypad, press and hold 📰 until LOCKED appears on the display.

To unlock the keypad, press and hold 📰 until LOCKED disappears from the display.

### **Ringer On/Off**

Use these shortcuts to control the ringer:

To turn the ringer off, press and hold  $\blacksquare$  until the phone displays \$.

If the phone displays x, the ringer is off. To turn the ringer on, press and hold  $\mathbb{I}$  until x disappears.

### **Message Waiting Indicator**

If you subscribe to voicemail service from your local service provider or from Skype, the phone displays when you have a new message in either mailbox. After you've listened to all the new messages, the message waiting indicator turns off.

### Caller ID First Ring Suppression

If you subscribe to caller ID service, your phone suppresses the first ring on your landline ensuring that you can see who is calling as soon as you hear the phone ring. If you reset your phone to its default settings, first ring suppression is deactivated. When you receive your next landlinelandline call, your phone automatically detects whether you have caller ID service and, if so, restarts first ring suppression.

Note: Once first ring suppression is activated, the first ring will be suppressed even if you drop the caller ID service. If you have dropped caller ID service and do not wish to have the first ring suppressed, restart the base station by removing its power supply and then plugging it back in.

### **Finding a Handset**

To find a handset, press and release the PAGE key on the base station.

All handsets that are turned on, registered to the base station, and in standby mode produce the paging tone and display PAGING for 30 seconds. If an external call comes in, all the handsets stop the paging tone and play the external call melody.

To stop paging, press any key on each handset or press the PAGING key on the base station again.

# Call Records

Your phone keeps a record of calls that you make, receive, or miss. You can view lists of the last 10 calls that you made, 5 calls that you received, and 15 calls that you missed. The lists include Skype calls and, if you subscribe to caller ID service from your local telephone service provider, landline calls.

Each record contains a name up to 12 characters long and a number or Skype contact up to 32 characters long.

If the caller's name is available, the first 12 characters are displayed with the date and time that the call was received. If the name is not available, the first 12 characters of the caller's number are displayed with the date and time.

If a caller's number matches a phone number stored in the phonebook, the phonebook name is displayed instead of the caller ID name.

Each handset has its own call record lists, so you can delete records on one handset while keeping them on another.

### Finding Out Who Called You (Call List)

#### Check Call Records

- 1. Press 🔁 .
- 2. Select MISSED or RECEIVED and press OK.

3. Scroll to a record and press **b** to view the number.

#### Call from a Call Record

When you are viewing a call record, you can return the call by pressing 😭 . If the call comes in from the landline, the return call uses the landline; if the call comes in from Skype, the return call uses Skype.

#### Save a Call Record to Your Phonebook

You can save the numbers from landline calls to your phonebook.

- 1. View the call record that you want to save and press MENU.
- 2. Select the phonebook, private or shared, in which you want the record saved, and press OK.
- 3. Enter a name for the entry and press **OK**.
- 4. Edit the number, if necessary, and press OK.

The call record is now saved in your phonebook. The call record is still in your call list, but it shows the new name that your entered in the phonebook.

#### **Delete a Call Record**

To delete a single call record:

- 1. View the call record that you want to delete and press MENU.
- 2. Select DELETE and press OK.
- 3. Press **OK** to confirm deletion.

#### **Delete All Call Records**

To delete all call records:

- 1. View any call record and press MENU.
- 2. Select DELETE ALL and press OK.
- 3. Press **OK** to confirm deletion.

### Finding Out Whom You Have Called (Dialled List)

#### Check Your Dialled Calls

1. Press 🔛 .

The phone displays your most recent outgoing call record.

2. Scroll to see the records of your last 10 outgoing calls.

#### Save a Dial Record to Your Phonebook

You can save dialled numbers to your phonebook.

- 1. View the dial record that you want to save and press MENU.
- 2. Select the phonebook, private or shared, in which you want the record saved, and press OK.
- 3. Enter a name for the entry and press OK.
- 4. Edit the number, if necessary, and press OK.

The record is now saved in your phonebook. The dial record is still in your dial list, but it shows the new name that your entered in the phonebook.

#### **Delete a Dial Record**

To delete a single dial record:

- 1. View the dial record that you want to delete and press MENU.
- 2. Select DELETE and press OK.
- 3. Press OK to confirm deletion.

#### **Delete All Dial Records**

To delete all dial records:

- 1. View any dial record and press MENU.
- 2. Select DELETE ALL and press OK.
- 3. Press **OK** to confirm deletion.

# Multi-Handset Functions

Your base station supports up to 4 handsets. For information about installing additional handsets, see <u>Additional</u> <u>Handset</u>. If you have multiple handsets, you can use the phone as an intercom, transfer a call from one handset to another, or use your handsets for conference calling.

### **Call Someone in the House**

#### Make an Intercom Call

- 1. Press 🔝 .
- 2. Press the number of the handset that you want to call.

OR

Select the handset you want to call and press OK.

#### Answer an Intercom Call

When you receive an intercom call, your handset plays the internal ringtone and displays the number of the calling handset.

To answer, press 🝸 .

#### **Interrupt an Intercom Call**

If an external call comes in while you are on an intercom call, you hear a call waiting signal. If you subscribe to caller ID service, the phone also displays the caller's information. To answer the external call:

- 1. Press 🔄 . to end the intercom call.
- 2. Press 😭 to answer the external call.

#### End an Intercom Call

To exit intercom, press 🔂 .

### Call Another Handset While You Are Talking on the Phone

While you are on an external call, you can put the external call on hold, call another handset, and return to the external call.

1. Press 🔝 .

The external call is on hold.

2. Press the number of the handset that you want to call.

OR

Select the handset you want to call and press OK.

3. Wait for the other handset to answer the call.

Use I to toggle between the intercom and external calls.

### **Transfer a Call to Another Handset**

- 1. While on an external call, press .
- 2. Press the number of the handset that you want to call.

OR

Select the handset you want to call and press OK.

3. When the other handset has answered, press 🝙 or place the handset on cradle.

The external call is transferred.

### Make a 3-Way Conference Call

You can invite another handset to join a call with the external line.

- 1. While on an external call, press 📰 .
- 2. Press the number of the handset that you want to call.

OR

Select the handset you want to call and press OK.

3. When the other handset answers, press and hold 📰 until the phone displays CONFERENCE.

You are now in a conference call. If either handset exits the call, the other handset will still be connected to the external call.

# **Base Station Functions**

### **Registering a Handset**

A handset must be registered with a base station in order to work. You can register a handset with up to four base stations, and the handset communicates with only one at any given time. To register a handset with a base station, see <u>Register the Handset</u>.

### Selecting a Base Station

If your handset is registered to more than 1 base station, you can select the base station that the handset will use.

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select BASE SELECT and press OK.
- 4. Select the base station to use and press OK.

### **Deleting a Handset**

You can register four handsets with a single base station. If the base station is full, you have to delete one handset from the registry before you can register another. To delete a handset:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select DELETE HS and press OK.
- 4. Select the handset that you want to delete and press **OK**.
- 5. Enter the PIN and press OK.

### **Changing the PIN**

(Not available on North American models)

The base station PIN is required when you are registering a handset. The default PIN is 0000. To change it:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select CHANGE PIN and press OK.
- 4. Enter the current PIN and press OK.
- 5. Enter the new PIN and press OK.
- 6. Repeat the new PIN and press OK.

If the new PIN is not repeated correctly, you hear a rejection tone. Repeat step 3 through step 6.

### **Resetting to Default Values**

You can reset the display, sounds, and other settings of your phone to their default values.

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select **RESET** and press **OK**.
- 4. If the handset prompts you for a PIN, enter the PIN and press OK.

### **Selecting Country**

The correct country setting properly configures your phone for the local telephone network and sets the default language for the handset display. To change the country setting:

- 1. Press MENU.
- 2. Select ADVANCED SET and press OK.
- 3. Select COUNTRY and press OK.
- 4. Select the country in which you are using the phone and press **OK**.

The country that you select also determines the phone numbers that the Cordless Skype Dual Phone recognises

as emergency numbers. If you dial one of these numbers and accidentally press () instead of ), the phone overrides your selection of the Skype line and uses the landline to complete the emergency call.

The table below shows the numbers that the phone recognises as emergency numbers. Whether these numbers are in fact emergency numbers depends on the emergency systems implemented by your country and local governments.

# Troubleshooting

# Basic Procedure

This procedure addresses a number of symptoms that you might experience with your handset:

- 1. Verify that the batteries are properly installed. The inside of the battery case has a picture showing the proper positions for the batteries.
- 2. Check the battery indicator to be sure that the batteries have been charged. If you are charging the batteries for the first time, charge them for 14 hours.
- 3. Verify that the USB and phone cables are connected properly.
- 4. Ensure that the power outlet to which the base station is connected is a live outlet.
- 5. Verify that your handset is registered with the base station. If the phone is not registered, the handset displays UNREGISTERED. To register the handset with the base station, follow the instructions in <u>Register the</u> <u>Handset</u>.
- 6. Ensure that the handset is within the base station's cordless range by moving closer to the base station.
- 7. Ensure that the handset is turned on.

Note: This phone does not work during a power failure.

# Specific Problems

If following the basic procedure above does not help get your phone working, find the procedure below whose description best matches the symptom that you are observing.

# The battery icon remains empty although the handset has been on the charger for 14 hours.

- 1. Verify that the battery icon is scrolling while the handset is on the charger. If the icon is not scrolling, reseat the handset in the charger.
- 2. Contact your dealer to replace the rechargeable batteries.

### The handset does not beep when placed on the charger.

If the handset is turned off, it will not beep when you place it on the charger. If the handset is turned on and it does not beep:

- 1. Reseat the handset in the charger to make sure that the charging contacts are properly aligned.
- 2. Take the handset off the charger and clean the charging contacts with a clean, dry cloth.

### The handset has poor audio quality (such as crackling or echo).

- 1. If practical, move the computer to a different location.
- 2. Install the base station in a different room, in a higher location, or away from other electronic appliances.

## The speaker volume is too soft (or too loud).

- 1. Adjust the speaker volume on your handset by pressing Scroll Up or Scroll Down.
- 2. Adjust the speaker volume on your computer as follows:


#### Windows XP

- A. Click Windows Start and select Control Panel.
- B. Click Sound and Audio Devices.
- C. In the Audio tab's Sound playback, select USR Cordless Skype Dual Phone and click Apply.
- D. Click the sound playback Volume button.
- E. Adjust the volume by dragging the slide. When finished, close the volume control window.
- F. Return to **Sound playback** and select your original sound device.
- G. Click OK.

#### Windows 2000

- A. Click Windows Start > Settings > Control Panel.
- B. Double click Sounds and Multimedia.
- C. In the Audio tab's Sound playback, select USB Audio Device and click Apply.
- D. Click the sound playback Volume button.
- E. Adjust the volume by dragging the slide. When finished, close the volume control window.
- F. Return to **Sound playback** and select your original sound device.





G. Click OK.

# My system sounds are playing through the wrong device.

If your computer has multiple sound cards, you may need to reset the preferred sound device as follows:

### Windows XP

- 1. Click Windows Start and select Control Panel.
- 2. Click Sound and Audio Devices.
- 3. In the Audio tab's Sound playback, select the preferred device.
- 4. In the Audio tab's Sound recording, select the preferred device.
- 5. Click Apply.
- 6. Click OK.

### Windows 2000

- 1. Click Windows Start > Settings > Control Panel.
- 2. Double click Sounds and Multimedia.
- 3. In the Audio tab's Sound playback, select the preferred device.
- 4. In the Audio tab's Sound recording, select the preferred device.
- 5. Click Apply.
- 6. Click OK.

# The phone does not ring when a call comes in.

If the phone displays \$, the ringer is off. To turn the ringer on, press and hold 🚮 until the \$ icon disappears.

# I cannot place a Skype call using the phone's contact list.

Verify that your computer is on and that both Skype and the phone's application program are displaying green icons in your system tray.

# I cannot make a SkypeOut call.

- 1. Press 00, + (press and hold 0), or 011. Then enter the phone number and press 💟 .
- 2. Check your Skype account to make sure that you have enough SkypeOut credit.



### I cannot switch between two calls.

- 1. To switch between calls while the landline, you must subscribe to the call waiting service from your local service provider.
- 2. Instead of pressing only ♥ , try presssing ♥ +1 or ♥ +2.

The key sequence that you use to handle multiple calls depends on the requirements of your local telephone service. For example, in the United States, you need to press the recall key ( $\checkmark$ ) only, while in some European countries, you need to press the recall key followed by a number key ( $\checkmark$  +1,  $\checkmark$  +2). If you are not sure which keys to use, check with your telephone service provider.

3. Change the recall duration or flash duration on your handset as described in "Recall or Flash" on page 43.

# Reboot Procedure

If the above solutions do not help, reboot the phone as follows:

- 1. Remove and replace the handset batteries.
- 2. Disconnect the base station from power and reconnect it.
- 3. Exit and restart both Skype and the USRobotics Cordless Skype Dual Phone program.
- 4. Wait for 15 minutes and try again.
