Setting up service on your new phone is quick and easy. This section walks you through the necessary steps to unlock your phone, set up your voicemail, and contact your service provider for assistance with your wireless service.

## Getting Started

## Unlocking Your Phone

To unlock your phone, follow these easy steps:

1. Press and hold ©END to turn the phone on.
2. Press Unlock ( Lsotkey ).

Note: To select a softkey, press the button directly below the softkeytext that appears at the bottom left and bottom right ofyour phone's display screen. Softkey actions change according to the screen you're viewing and will not appear ifthere is no corresponding action available.
3. Enter your four-digit lock code. (For security purposes, the code is not visible as you type.)

Tip: Ifyou can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of your wireless phone number, or try "0000". If neither of these work, call your service provider.

## Setting Up Your Voicemail

All unanswered calls to your phone are automatically transferred to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. Therefore, you will want to set up your voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated.

## To set upyour voicemail:

1. From standby mode, press and hold 1 -
2. Follow the system prompts to:

- Createyour passcode
- Record your name announcement
- Record your greeting
- Choose whether or not to activate One-Touch Message Access (a feature that lets you access messages simply by pressing and holding $1 \square$, bypassing the need for you to enter your passcode)

Voicemail Passcode
Ifyou are concerned about unauthorized access to your voicemail account, it
is recommended that you enable your voicemail passcode.
```

## Voicemail Password

You'll create your voicemail password (or passcode) when you set up your voicemail. For more information or to change your voicemail password, please contact your service provider.

## Getting Help

## Directory Assistance

Call 4 cH 1 - 1 TALK from your phone and you'll have access to a variety of services and information through Directory Assistance, including residential, business, and government listings; movie listings or showtimes; driving directions, restaurant reservations, and major local event information. There is a per-call charge, and you will be billed for airtime.

To call Directory Assistance:
$\rightarrow$ Press 4 बHI $1 \boxtimes 1 \boxtimes$ TALK.

## Operator Services

Operator Services provides assistance when placing collect calls or when placing calls billed to a local telephone calling card or third party.

To access Operator Services:

- Press 0 + TALK.

Your phone is packed with features that simplify your life and expand your ability to stay connected to the people and information that are important to you. This section will guide you through the basic functions and calling features of your phone.

## Front View of Your Phone



## Key Functions

1. Softkey Buttons let you select softkey actions or menu items corresponding to the bottom left and right lines on the display screen.
2. Headset Jack allows you to plug in an optional headset for convenient, hands-free conversations. CAUTION! Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack may damage the phone.
3. Volume Control allows you to adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (with the flip open) or adjust the voice volume during a call. The volume key can also be used to scroll up or down to navigate through the different menu options. To mute the ringer during an incoming call, press the volume key up or down.
4. Talk allows you to place or receive calls, answer Call Waiting, use Three-Way Calling, or activate Voice Dial.
5. Back deletes characters from the display in text entry mode. When in a menu, press the Back key to return to the previous menu.
6. Microphone allows other callers to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
7. Accessory Jack allows you to connect optional accessories, such as a USB cable. CAUTION! Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack may damage the phone.
8. Charger Jack connects the phone to the battery charger.
9. Navigation Key scrolls through the phone's menu options and acts as a shortcut key from standby mode.

- Press Upto access Messaging.
- Press Down to view your My Contents.
- Press Right to access Contacts.
- Press Left to access Pictures.

10. End (Power) ends a call. Press and hold this key for two seconds to turn your phone on or off. While in the main menu, it returns the phone to standby mode and cancels your input. When you receive an incoming call, press to enter silent mode and mute the ringer.
11. Menu/OK displays the phone's main menu from standby mode. It also selects the highlighted choice when navigating through a menu.
12. Display Screen displays all the information needed to operate your phone, such as the call status, the Contacts list, the date and time, and the signal and battery strength.
13. Earpiece lets you hear the caller and automated prompts.
14. Side Camera Key lets you launch the built-in camera and capture pictures in camera mode.

## Viewing the Display Screen

Your phone＇s display screen provides a wealth of information about your phone＇s status and options．This list identifies the symbols you＇ll see on your phone＇s display screen：

Note: Display indicators help you manage your roaming charges by letting you know when you're off the home network and whether you're operating in digital or analog mode. (For more information, see page 42.)

## Features of Your Phone

Congratulations on the purchase of your phone. The PLS-7075 is lightweight, easy-to-use, and reliable, and it also offers many significant features and service options. The following list previews some of those features and provides page numbers where you can find out more:

- Dual-band/tri-mode capability allows you to make and receive calls while on the home network and to roam on other analog and 1900 and 800 MHz digital networks where roaming agreements have been implemented
- Messaging provides quick and convenient messaging capabilities.
- Your Contacts list allows you to store up to 500 entries, with up to five phone numbers per entry (page 81).
- The built-in Calendar offers several personal information management features to help you manage your busy lifestyle (page 96).
- Your phone is equipped with a Location feature for use in connection with location-based services that may be available in the future (page 47).
- T9 Text Input lets you quickly type messages with one key press per letter (see page 30).
- Speed dial lets you dial phone numbers with one or two key presses (see page 28).


## Turning Your Phone On and Off

## Turning Your Phone On

Toturn your phoneon:

- Press and hold ©END for approximately two seconds.

Once your phone is on, it may display "Looking for Service," which indicates that your phone is searching for a signal. When your phone finds a signal, it automatically enters standby mode. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls.

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to standby mode.

In Power Save mode, your phone searches for a signal periodically without your intervention. You can also initiate a search for service by pressing any key (when your phone is turned on).

Tip: The Power Save feature helps to conserve your battery power when you are in an area where there is no signal.

## Turning Your Phone Off

## To turn your phone off:

- Press and hold ©END for two seconds untilyou see the powering down animation on the display screen.

Your screen remains blank while your phone is off (unless the battery is charging).

## Using Your Phone's Battery and Charger

WARNING: Use only manufacturer-approved batteries and chargers with your phone. The failure to use a manufacturer-approved battery and charger may increase the risk that your phone will overheat, catch fire, or explode, resulting in serious bodily injury, death, or property damage.

Manufacturer-approved batteries and accessories may be located online at www.buywirelessnow.com/utstarcom.

## Battery Capacity

Your phone is equipped with a Lithium-Ion (Li-Ion) battery.It allows you to recharge your battery before it is fully drained. The battery provides up to 3.5 hours of continuous digital talk time (up to 1.5 hours in analog).

When the battery reaches $5 \%$ of its capacity, the battery icon blinks. When there are approximately two minutes of talk time left, the phone sounds an audible alert and then powers down.

Note: Long backlight settings, searching for service, vibrate mode, and browser use affect the battery's talk and standbytimes.

Tip: Be sure to watch your phone's battery level indicator and charge the battery before it runs out of power.

## Installing the Battery

## To install the Li-Ion battery:

- To install, insert the battery into the opening on the back of the phone and gently press down until the latch snaps into place.



## Removing the Battery

WARNING: Do not handle a damaged or leaking Li-Ion battery as you can be burned.

## To remove your battery:

1. Make sure the power is off so that you don't lose any stored numbers or messages.
2. Press the battery release latch up and remove the battery from the phone at a 45-degree angle.


## Charging the Battery

Your phone's Li-lon battery is rechargeable and should be charged as soon as possible so you can begin using your phone.
Keeping track of your battery's charge is important. If your battery level becomes too low, your phone automatically turns off and you will lose all the information you were just working on. For a quick check of your phone's battery level, glance at the battery charge indicator located in the upper-right corner of your phone's display screen. If the battery charge is getting too low, the battery icon ( $\square$ ) blinks and the phone sounds a warning tone.

Always use a manufacturer-approved desktop charger, travel charger, or vehicle power adapter to charge your battery.

## Using the Charger

To use the travel charger provided with your phone:
It takes approximately 2.5 hours to fully recharge a completely rundown battery. With the approved Li-Ion battery, you can recharge the battery before it becomes completely run down.

1. Plug the travel charger into a wall outlet.
2. Plug the other end of the travel charger into the bottom of your phone, with the battery installed. You can monitor the battery status by checking the battery level indicator.


## Navigating Through Phone Menus

The navigation key on your phone allows you to scroll through menus quickly and easily. The scroll bar at the right of the menu keeps track of your position in the menu at all times.

To navigate through a menu, simply press the navigation key up or down. If you are in a first-level menu, such as Settings, you may also navigate to the next or previous first-level menu by pressing the navigation key right or left.
For a diagram of your phone's menu, please see "Your Phone's Menu" on pageii.

## Selecting Menu Items

As you navigate through the menu, menu options are highlighted. Select any numbered option by simply pressing the corresponding number on the phone's keypad. You may also select any item by highlighting it and pressing ME⿰訁 For example, if you want to view your last incoming call:

2. Select Call History by highlighting it and pressing MEND . (It may already be highlighted.)
3. Select Incoming Calls by pressing 2 ABS or by highlighting it and pressing MEND (Ifyou have received any calls, they are displayed on the screen.)

## Backing Up Within a Menu

To go to the previous menu:

## - Press BACK.

To return to standby mode:

- Press ©END.


## Displaying Your Phone Number

Just in case you forget your phone number, your phone can remind you.

To display your phone number:

- Select Menu > Settings > Phone Info > Phone Number.
(Your phone number and other information about your phone and account will be displayed.)

> Note: To select Menu, press MEND . To select menu options (such as Settings, above), highlight the option and press $\operatorname{mex}{ }^{\circ}$. (Ifthe menu options are numbered, you may also select an option simply by pressing the corresponding number key.)

## Making and Answering Calls

## Making Calls

Placing a call from your phone is as easy as making a call from any landline phone. Just enter the number and press (TALK , and you're on your way to clear calls.
To make a call using your keypad:

1. Make sure your phone is on.
2. Enter a phone number from standby mode. (If you make a mistake while dialing, press BACK to erase one digit at a time. Press and hold BACK to erase the entire number and return to standby mode.)
3. Press TALK . (To make a call when you are roaming and Call Guard is enabled, highlight Roam Call and press TALK . See "Call Guard" on page 46.)
4. Press ©END or close the phone when you are finished.

Tip: To redial your last outgoing call, press TALK twice.
Tip: When making calls off the home network, always dial using 11 digits ( $1+$ area code + phone number).

You can also place calls from your phone by speed dialing numbers from your Contacts (page 28) and using your Call History listings (page 79).

## Dialing Options

When you enter numbers in standby mode, a variety of dialing options are available by pressing the "Options" softkey button.

To initiate an option, press the corresponding softkey button.

- Roam Call:To dial the phone number.
- SpeakerOn:To dial the phone number in speakerphone mode.
- Send Picture:Send picture in My Pictures.
- SendMsg.:Send message.
- Save: Enter a seven- or ten-digit number (phone number and area code) and press Options ( SSotitey). Select Save ( 5 JkL ) to save the phone number in your Contacts. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on page 25.)
- PHard Pause:To insert a hard pause.
- T2-sec Pause: To insert a two-second pause.


## Answering Calls

To answer an incoming call:

1. Make sure your phone is on. (If your phone is off, incoming calls go to voicemail.)
2. Press TALK to answer an incoming call. (Depending on your phone's settings, you may also answer incoming calls by opening the phone or by pressing any number key. See "Call Answer Mode" on page 59 for more information.)

Your phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings or vibrates.
- The indicator light flashes.
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays an incoming call message.

If the incoming call is from a number stored in your Contacts, the entry's name is displayed. The caller's phone number may also be displayed, if available.
If Call Answer is set to TALK, the following options are also displayed. To select an option, press the corresponding softkey button.

- Press Mute (LSofitiky) to mute the call voice.
- Press ©eND twice to send the call to your voicemail box.

## Answering a Roam Call With Call Guard Enabled

Call Guard is an option that helps you manage your roaming charges when making or receiving calls while outside the home network.

To answer a call when you are roaming and Call Guard is enabled:

- Select Answer to answer the call. (See "Call Guard" on page 46 for additional information.)


## Ending a Call

To disconnect a call when you are finished:

- Close the phone or press ©END.


## Missed Call Notification

When an incoming call is not answered, the Missed Call log is displayed on your screen.

To display the Missed Call entry from the notification screen:

- Highlight the entry and press View (LSotiky).

To display a Missed Call entry from standby mode:

1. Select Menu > Call History > Missed Calls.
2. Highlight the entry you wish to view and press

MERV

## Calling Emergency Numbers

You can place calls to 911 (dial $Q^{\text {WXXV }} 1 』 1 』$ (TALK), even if your phone is locked or your account is restricted.

Note: When you place an emergency call, your phone automatically enters Emergency mode.

During the call press Options（RSotiteq）to display your options． To select an option，highlight it and press ME⿰耳又⿱人⿱一⿻口人丨又土刂．
－Speaker On to activate speakerphone mode．（Ifyou are in speakerphone mode，the option will appear as Speaker Off to deactivate speakerphone mode．）
－Unlock Phone to unlock your phone（appears only ifthe phone is locked）．
－Close Menu to close the pop－up menu（appears only if the phone is unlocked）．

Tip：Press My Phone（Lsorikey）to display your phone number during an emergency call．

To exit Emergency mode：
1．Press ©END to end a 911 call．
2．Press Options（ BSoftey）to display the options menu．
3．Highlight Exit Emergency and press MEND
Note：When you are in Emergency mode，you can exit only from the options menu．

## To select Emergency mode options：

1．Press ©END to end a 911 call．
2．Press Options（RSofthey）．
－Call911 to call 911.
－Call 911：Speaker to call 911 in speakerphone mode．
－Exit Emergency to exit Emergency mode．
3．Highlight an option and press MEND

## In-Call Options

Pressing Options (R.Sonkey) during a call displays a list of features you may use during the course of a call. To select an option, press the corresponding keypad number or highlight the option and press MENO . The following options are available through the Options menu:

- SpeakerOn (1』) to activate or deactivate speakerphone mode.
- 3-Way Calls (2ABC) to initiate a 3-Way Calls.
- Voice Memo (3 ${ }^{\text {DEF }}$ ) to access the Voice Memo.
- Call History (4 cwl ) to access the Call History menu.
- Contacts ( 5 JkL ) to access the Contacts menu.
- Messaging ( 6 MNO $)$ to access the Messaging menu.
- Phone Info ( $\boldsymbol{7}_{\text {Pors }}$ ) to access the Phone Info menu.

During a call, the left softkey button functions as the Mute button. Press it to mute the phone's microphone for privacy. Press it again to Unmute the phone.

## End-of-Call Options

After receiving a call from or making a call to a phone number that is not in your Contacts, the phone number and the duration of the call are displayed. If you wish to add the new number to your Contacts, press the " Options" softkey then select Save. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on the next page.)

## Saving a Phone Number

Your phone can store up to five phone numbers in each of 500 Contacts entries. Each entry's name can contain 16 characters. Your phone automatically sorts the Contacts entries alphabetically. (For more information, see Section 2F: Using Contacts on page 80.)
To save a number from standby mode:

1. Enter a phone number and press Options ( 8 Sontiky). Select Save ( 5 JkL ).

2. Select the type of number then press $\mathrm{ME}_{\mathrm{O} \mathrm{K}^{\circ} \mathrm{D}}$.
3. Use the keypad to enter the new contact name. Press the Navigation Key down to access the other fields. Press Save (LSotitey) to save the new entry.

- or -

If you select "Existing Entry," your contact list is displayed. Choose the entry to add the number to, then press Next (LSofitkey) Press the Navigation Key down to access the other fields. Press Save (LSoithey) to save the new entry.

## Finding a Phone Number

You can search Contacts entries for phone numbers that contain a specific string of numbers.

To find a phone number:

1. Enter four or more digits in standby mode. (The more numbers you enter, the more specific the search becomes.)
2. Select Find (LSofitey). (All Contacts entries matching the entered numbers will be displayed.)
3. To display the Contacts entry that contains the phone number you entered, highlight the entry and press MEF앙 . To dial the number, press TALK.

## Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers With Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as voicemail or credit card billing numbers.

There are two types of pauses available on your phone:

- PHard Pause sends the next set of numbers when you press TALK.
- T2-sec Pause automatically sends the next set of numbers after two seconds.

> Note: You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine two-second and hard pauses.

## To dial or save phone numbers with pauses:

1. Enter the phone number.
2. Press Options (RStitey) and select either P Hard Pause (TALK) or T2-sec Pause (TALK). (Hard pauses are displayed as a " P" and two-second pauses as a "T".)
3. Enter additional numbers.
4. Press TALK to dial the number.

- or -

Press Options (SSoftey). Select Save (5 JkL) to save the number in your Contacts.

## 4-Digit Calling

## To make a call using 4-Digit Calling:

1. Dial the last four digits of a Contacts entry's phone number.
2. Press TALK . (The matching Contacts entry/entries will be displayed.)
3. Highlight the correct entry and press TALK.

Shortcut: Dial the last four digits of a Contacts entry's phone number and press (ALLD to place the call. Ifthe digits match more than one entry, a list will appear; select the correct entry and press (ALK) again.

## Plus (+) Code Dialing

When placing international calls, you can use Plus Code Dialing to automatically enter the international access code for your location (for example, 011 for international calls made from the United States).

## To make a call using Plus Code Dialing:

1. Press and hold $0+$ untila " + " appears on your phone display.
2. Dial the country code and phone number you're calling and press TALK . (The access code for international dialing will automatically be dialed, followed by the country code and phone number.)

## Dialing From the Contacts List

## To dial directly from a Contacts entry:

## 1. Select Menu >Contacts > Find Name.

## Shortcut: Press and then select Find Name to list entries.

2. Highlight the entry you want to call and press TALK to dial the entry's default phone number.

- or -

To dial another number from the entry, highlight the name and press MENO , and then highlight the number you wish to call and press TALK.

## Using Speed Dialing

You can store up to 99 numbers in your phone's speed dial memory to make contacting friends and family as easy as pressing a button or two. With this feature, you can dial speed dial entries using one keypress for locations 2-9 or two keypresses for locations 10-99.

To use One-Touch Dialing for speed dial locations 2-9:

- Press and hold the appropriate key for approximately two seconds. The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows " Calling..." .

To use Two-Touch Dialing for speed dial locations 10-99:

1. Press the first digit.
2. Press and hold the second digit for approximately two seconds. The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows " Calling..." .

## Entering Text

## Selecting a Character Input Mode

Your phone provides convenient ways to enter words, letters, punctuation, and numbers whenever you are prompted to enter text (for example, when adding a Contacts entry or when using SMS Text Messaging).

## Entering Characters Using T9 Text Input

T9 Text Input lets you enter text in your phone by pressing keys just once per letter. (To select the T9 Word mode when entering text, see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 29.)

T9 Text Input analyzes the letters you enter using an intuitive word database and creates a suitable word. (The word may change as you type.)

To enter a word using T9 Text Input:

1. Select the T9 Word character input mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 29.)
2. Press the corresponding keys once per letter to enter a word. (For example, to enter the word " Bill," press
2 ABO 4 ch 5 JkL 5 JkL .) (If you make a mistake, press BACK to erase a single character. Press and hold BACK to delete an entire entry.)
If the word you want is not displayed after you have entered all the letters, press $0+$ to scroll through additional word selections. To accept a word and insert a space, press \#space

## Adding a Word to the T9 Database

This section describes how you can change your phone's settings to best suit your needs. Take a few moments to review these options and to adjust or add settings that are right for you.

## Sound Settings

## Ringer Types

Ringer types help you identify incoming calls and messages. You can assign ringer types to individual Contacts entries, types of calls, and types of messages or others.

- Preprogrammed Ringers include a variety of standard ringer types and familiar music.
- Vibrating Ringer alerts you to calls or messages without disturbing others.


## Selecting Ringer Types for Voice Calls

Your phone provides a variety of ringer options that allow you to customize your ring and volume settings. These options allow you to identify incoming calls by the ring.

To select a ringer type for voice calls:

1. Select Menu > Settings > Sounds > Ringer Type > Voice Calls.
2. Select With Caller ID or No Caller ID. (The list of preprogrammed ringers is displayed.)
3. Use your navigation key to scroll through the available ringers. Press Play (RSofikey) to preview a sound.
4. Press MENO or Done (LSotkey) to save the setting.
5. To return to the previous page, press BACK

## Selecting Ringer Types for Messaging

To select a ringer type for messaging:

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Ringer Type $>$
Messaging.
2. Select Text Message, Picture Messaging, or Voicemail and press MEND
3. Use your navigation key to scroll through the available ringers. Press Play (BSoftey) to preview a sound.
4. Press MENX or Done (LSSoftkey) to save the setting.

## Selecting Ringer Types for Alarms

- Ringer to select a volume level. (Silence All, Vibrate
 select "Always Vibrates".)
- Speakerphone, Receiver, Headset to select a volume level (Level $1 \sim$ Level 5).
- Key Beep to select a volume level (Volume Off, Level 1 ~ Level 5).
- Advanced to select Messaging, Voicemail, Alarms Applications, or Power On/Off. Select Use Ringer or Separate using the navigation key, or press wè to select "Always Vibrates".

> Tip: Use Ringer. Plays the text message alert at the same volume as the voice ringer and allows the side volume keys to change the text message alert volume at the same time as the voice ringer.
> Separate. Plays the text message alert at the selected volume level. Alerts will always play at this level unless the ringer volume is set to "Vibrate All" or "Silence All."
> Always Vibrate. Phone is set to vibrate regardless of volume level of ringer. This setting works only with "Separate Volume."
3. Using the navigation key, choose a volume level and press Done (LSofthey).

Tip: You can adjust the ringer volume in standby mode (or the earpiece volume during a call) by using the volume key on the left side of your phone.

## Alert Notification

Your phone can alert you with an audible tone when you change service areas，once a minute during a voice call，or when a call has been connected．

To enable or disable alert sounds：
1．Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Alerts．
2．Select Minute Beep，Connect Tone，Service Tone，or Fade Tone and press MENO

## Changing the Screen Savers

You new phone offers options for what you see on the display when in standby mode.

To change the screen saver on the standby screen:

- Image to select a screen saver image. (You can choose from preset images, my pictures, or my contents)

## Changing the Backlight Time Length

The backlight setting lets you select how long the display screen and keypad are backlit after any keypress is made.

To change the backlight setting:

3. Select a time setting and press MEND

- Main Display Time Setting: $10 \mathrm{sec}, 20 \mathrm{sec}, 30 \mathrm{sec}$, Flip Open, Always Dim.
- KeypadTime Setting: $10 \mathrm{sec}, 20 \mathrm{sec}, 30 \mathrm{sec}$, Flip Open, Always Off.
 ( 1 Sortike) ).

Note: Long backlight settings affect the battery's talk and standby times.

## Changing the Text Greeting

The text greeting can be up to 16 characters and is displayed on your phone's screen in standby mode. You may choose to keep the phone's default greeting, or you may enter your own custom greeting.

To display or change your greeting:

1. Select Menu > Settings > Display > Greeting. (The default greeting is displayed.)

## Understanding Roaming

## Recognizing the Roaming Icon on the Display Screen

Your phone's display screen always lets you know when you're off the home network. Any time you are roaming, the phone displays the roaming icon ( $\Omega$ ). If you are roaming on a digital system, the roaming icon will be displayed along with the text - Digital Roam -. If you are roaming on an analog system, the roaming icon will be displayed along with the text - Analog Roam-.

## Roaming on Other Digital Networks

When you're roaming on digital networks, your call quality and security will be similar to the quality you receive when making calls on the home network. However, you may not be able to access certain features, such as data services.

> Note: Ifyou're on a call when you leave the home network and enter an area where roaming is available, your call is dropped. If your call is dropped in an area where you think network service is available, turn your phone off and on again to reconnect to the network.

## Roaming on Analog Networks

When you roam on analog networks, you will experience a similar quality provided by other analog carriers today. Although some features, such as data service, will be unavailable, you can still make and receive calls and access voicemail. If you are accustomed to network, you may notice some of the following differences when using analog service:

- You are more likely to experience static, crosstalk, fade-out, and dropped calls.
- Some features which are standard on the home network, such as call waiting, data services, and direct international dialing, may be unavailable.
- Though callers can leave voicemail messages while you are roaming, you will not receive notification until you return to the home network. (See "Checking for Voicemail Messages While Roaming" on page 44.)
- There are security and privacy risks (eavesdropping and cloning) that exist with conventional analog services today.
- Your battery's charge will deplete more quickly and you will need to recharge it more often when you use your phone for analog roaming.

Note: When usingyour phone in analog mode, the phone may feel warm. This is normal for analog operation.

## Checking for Voicemail Messages While Roaming

When you are roaming off the home network, you will not receive on-phone notification of new voicemail messages. Callers can still leave messages, but you will need to periodically check your voicemail for new messages if you are in a roaming service area for an extended period of time.

## To check your voicemail while roaming:

1. Dial $1+$ area code + your phone number.
2. When you hear your voicemail greeting, press $*_{\text {shit }}$.
3. Enter your passcode at the prompt and follow the voice prompts.

When you return to the home network, voicemail notification will resume as normal.

## Setting Your Phone's Roam Mode

Your phone allows you to control your roaming capabilities. By using the Roaming menu option, you can determine which signals your phone accepts.

## Set Mode

Choose from three different settings on your tri-mode phone to control your roaming experience.

To set your phone's roam mode:

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Roaming $>$ Set Mode.
2. To select an option, highlight it and press MEND

- Home Only allows you to access the home network only and prevents roaming on other networks.
- Automatic seeks network service. When net service is unavailable, the phone searches for an alternate system.
- Roaming Only forces the phone to seek a roaming system. The previous setting (home Only or Automatic) is restored the next time the phone is turned on.

3. To return to the previous page, press 解 ${ }^{\circ}$ or Close (BSotikey).

## Using Call Guard

Your phone has two ways of alerting you when you are roaming off the home network the onscreen roaming icon and Call Guard．Call Guard makes it easy to manage your roaming charges by requiring an extra step before you can place or answer a roaming call．（This additional step is not required when you make or receive calls while on the home network．）

Toturn Call Guard on or off：
1．Select Menu＞Settings＞Roaming＞Call Guard．
2．Highlight On or Off and press W唇
3．To return to the previous page，press（me⿰訁 or close （ 8 sotitey）．

Note：Voice dialing and speed dialing are not available when you are roaming with Call Guard enabled．

## To place roaming calls with Call Guard on：

1．From standby mode，dial 1 ＋area code＋the seven－digit number and press TALK．（You can also initiate a call from the Contacts，Call History，or Messaging．）

2．Select Roam Call．
To answer incoming roaming calls with Call Guard on：
1．Press TALK．（A message will be displayed notifying you that roaming charges will apply．）

2．Select Answer．
Note：If the Call Guard feature is set to On，you need to take extra steps to make and receive roaming calls．

## Roaming Help

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Roaming $>$ Help.
2. A help message will be displayed. To return to the previous page, press ME्रें or Done (LSofitey).

## Location Settings

Your phone is equipped with a Location feature for use in connection with location-based services that may be available in the future.

The Location feature allows the network to detect your position. Turning Location off will hide your location from everyone except 911.


#### Abstract

Note: Turning Location on will allow the network to detect your position using GPS technology, making some applications and services easier to use. Turning Location off will disable the GPS location function for all purposes except 911, but will not hide your general location based on the cell site servingyour call. No application or service may use your location without your request or permission. GPS-enhanced 911 is not available in all areas.


To enable your phone's Location feature:

1. Select Menu $>$ Setting $\gg$ Location.
2. Read the message and press Next (SSoikey).
3. Select On or Off and press MEXV
 Close (LSotikey).

When the Location feature is on, your phone's standby screen will display the $\oplus$ icon. When Location is turned off, the icon will be displayed.

## Messaging Settings

Staying connected to your friends and family has never been easier. With your phone's advanced messaging capabilities, you can send and receive many different kinds of text messages without placing a voice call.

Your phone's messaging settings make text messaging even faster and easier by letting you decide how you would like to be notified of new messages, create a signature with each sent message, and create your own preset messages, to name just a few.

## Displaying Pop-up Messages

When you receive a text message, your phone notifies you by displaying an icon on your display screen. You can also choose to be notified with a larger pop-up message on your display screen.

To display pop-up messages:

1. Select Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Messaging $>$ Notification.
2. Select Icon Only or Message \& Icon and press M歌
3. To return to the previous page, press 唇 ${ }^{\circ}$ or Close (BSotikey).

## Setting Sending Options

- Under "Priority," select Urgent or Normal then press Mgeरi Under "Callback \#" , select None, My Phone\#, or Other, then press MEND


## Managing Preset Messages

Your phone is loaded with 20 preset messages to help make sending text messages faster and easier. These messages, such as "Where areyou?," "Let's get lunch," and " Meet meat," can be customized or deleted to suit your needs. You can even add your own preset messages to the list.

To edit a preset message:

1. Select Menu > Settings > Messaging >Preset Msg.. (The list of preset messages is displayed.)
2. To edit a preset message, highlight it and press Edit (LSotikey).
3. Edit the selected message (see "Entering Text" on


To erase a preset message:

1. Select Menu >Settings > Messaging >Preset Msg.. (The list of preset messages is displayed.)
2. To erase a preset message, highlight it, press Options ( 1 Soliticy), and then select Erase or Erase All.
3. Select Yes or No and press mego to delete the message.

To add a new preset message:

1. Select Menu >Settings > Messaging >Preset Msg.. (The list of preset messages is displayed.)
2. To add a new preset message, press Options (BSofitee)), and then select Add New.
3. Enter your message (see "Entering Text" on page 29), and press MESV or Done (LSotitey). (Your new message will be added to the beginning of the list.)

## To send a preset message:

To lock your phone:

## Unlocking Your Phone

To unlock your phone:

Special numbers are important numbers that you have designated as being " always available". You can call and receive calls from special numbers even if your phone is locked.
You can save up to 3 special numbers in addition to your Contacts entries (the same number may be in both directories).

To add or replace a special number:

1. Select Menu >Settings > Security, and then enter your lock code. (The Security menu is displayed.)

## Restoring Default Settings

You can easily restore all the factory defaults, including the ringer types and display settings. The Contacts, Call History, Scheduler, and Messaging are not affected.

2. Select Default Settings. (A warning message is displayed.)
3. If you are certain that you would like to restore your phone to its default settings, select Yes.

## Resetting Your Phone

Your phone's built-in camera gives you the ability to take fullcolor digital pictures, view your pictures using the phone's display, and instantly send them to family and friends. It's fun and as easy to use as a traditional point-and-click camera: just take a picture, view it on your phone's display, and send it from your phone to up to 16 people.

This section explains the features and options of your phone's built-in camera.

## Taking Pictures

Taking pictures with your phone's built-in camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the lens, and pressing a button.

Totake a picture:

1. Select MENOD > Pictures > Camera to activate camera mode. (Additional camera options are available through the camera mode Options menu. See " Camera Mode Options"on page 64 for more.)

> Shortcut: To activate camera mode, you can also press the camera button (6) twice or press and hold the side camera key. (See illustration on page 9.)
2. Using the phone's Main LCD as a viewfinder, aim the camera lens at your subject.
3. Press Capture (LSotiky), MEND , or the side camera key until the shutter sounds. Press Accept (LSSotkey) to save the picture in the in Camera folder.

- To return to camera mode without saving the picture, press Cancel (RSoftey).

4. Press Next (RSofticy) for more options:

- Send Pictures to send the picture to up to 16 contacts at one time. (See page 71 for details.)
- Upload to Album to upload the picture you just took to the picture messaging Web site (www.plspictures.com).
- Exit Text Caption to edit the selected picture's caption.
- Assign to assign the selected picture to display for specific tasks: (Picture ID, Screen Saver, Incoming Call)
- Take a Picture to return to camera mode to take another picture.
- Thumbnail to switch to the thumbnail view mode.
- Erase to delete the picture you just took.


## Creating Your Picture Messaging Password

> The first time you use any of the picture management options involving the picture messaging Web site, you will need to establish a password through your phone. This password will also allow you to sign in to the picture messaging Web site at www.plspictures.com to access and manage your uploaded pictures and albums.

To create your picture messaging password:

1. Select MEND $>$ Pictures $>$ Online Albums $>$ View Albums.
(You will be prompted to create a picture messaging password.)
2. Enter your password and press MEND. (You will be prompted to confirm your password.)
3. Please wait while the system creates your account.

Tip: Write down your picture messaging password in a secure place.
Once you have received confirmation that your account has been successfully registered, you may upload and share pictures and access the picture messaging Web site.

## Camera Mode Options

When the phone is open and in camera mode, press Options
(RSoltey) to display additional camera options:

- Self-Timer to activate the camera's timer. (See " Setting the Self-Timer" on page 65 for details.)
- Fun Frame to select your favorite fun picture frame to decorateyour picture.
- Image Effect to effect on the screen.
- Mirror to select vertical or horizontal.
- Settings to select your settings. (See" Selecting Camera Settings" on page 66 for details.)


## Setting the Self-Timer

To activate the self-timer:

1. From camera mode, select Options > Self-Timer.
2. Highlight the length of delay you want the timer to use ( 5 Seconds, 10 Seconds or Off) and press MENU .
3. Select Capture (LSoftkey) when you are ready to start the timer. (appears on the upper right portion of the Main LCD during the selftimer countdown.)
4. Get ready for the picture. (When the timer is down to three seconds, the self-timer icon will turn red and the phone will begin to beep.)

To cancel the self-timer after it has started:

- Press Cancel (RSotitey).

Note:While the self-timer is active, all keys are disabled except BACK , ©END, and Cancel (ssotite9) ).

## Using the Zoom

This feature allows you to zoom in on an object when you take a picture. Depending on your resolution settings, you can adjust the zoom from $1 \times$ to $5 \times$ for $320 \times 240$, and $1 x$ to $8 x$ for $128 \times 160$ (not available for high resolution).

## To use the zoom:

1. From camera mode, press the navigation key right or left, or the Side Volume key up or down to adjust the zoom. (The gauge bar appears.)
 take the picture. (The picture will automatically be saved in the In Camera folder.)

## Selecting Camera Settings

To select your camera settings:

1. From camera mode, select Options > Settings

- Resolution to select a picture's file size (High-640x480, Medium-320x240, or Low-128x160).
- Quality to select the picture quality setting (Economy, Normal, or Fine).
- Shutter Sound to select a shutter sound (Default, Say "Cheeze," Off, or Record Own).
- Auto Delete to select on or off. (See page 66.)


## Using the Settings \& Info Menu

The "Settings \& Info" menu allows you to set Auto Delete or to view your account information.

## Setting Auto Delete

With this feature, pictures that have been uploaded to your online picture messaging account will be erased automatically from your phone. (The default setting is Off.)

To set Auto Delete:
 Settings >Auto Delete.
2. Select On or Off.

## Viewing Your Account Information

To view your account information:

## - Select ${ }^{\text {MEND }}{ }^{\circ}>$ Pictures > Account Info.

## Storing Pictures

Your phone's picture storage area is called My Pictures. There are two types of folders in My Pictures that can be used separately according to your needs:

- In Camera (see below)
- Saved to Phone (see page 68)


## In Camera Folder

The storage area of your phone is called the In Camera folder. From the In Camera folder, you can view pictures saved in your phone, send them to the picture messaging Web site (www.plspictures.com), delete images, and access additional options.

To review your pictures saved in the In Camera folder:

1. Select MEND > Pictures > My Pictures > In Camera. (Thumbnails will be displayed, up to nine at a time.)
2. Use your navigation key to view and scroll through the pictures.

## In Camera Folder Options

When you are viewing the In Camera folder, press Options (BSofthey) to display the following options:

- Upload to upload pictures from the In Camera folder to the picture messaging Web site (www.plspictures.com). Depending on your settings, you may be prompted to accept a data connection. Choose from the following options:

- Slide Show to view your pictures the SlideShow view mode.
- Save to Phone to save the selected pictures in the Saved to Phone folder.
- Erase to erase pictures in the In Camera folder. Select Erase Selection or Erase All.
- Picture Info to view your picture info.


## Saved to Phone Folder

When you assign a picture, it will automatically be saved in the Saved to Phone folder. The folder allows you to store copies of pictures on your phone and to assign pictures to various phone tasks.

To save multiple pictures to the Saved to Phone folder:

1. From the In Camera folder, select pictures by highlighting them and pressing MENO . (Multiple pictures can be selected.)
2. Press Options ( (RSorikey) > Save to Phone.

To view pictures stored in the Saved to Phone folder:

1. Select MEND $>$ Pictures $>$ My Pictures $>$ Saved to Phone. (Thumbnails will be displayed, up to nine at a time.)
2. Use your navigation key to view and scroll.

## Sending Pictures

Once you've taken a picture, you can use the messaging capabilities of your phone to instantly share your picture with family and friends. You can send pictures to up to 16 people at a time using their email addresses or their wireless phone numbers.

## Sending Pictures From the In Camera Folder

To send pictures from the In Camera folder:

The Call History keeps track of incoming calls, calls made from your phone, and missed calls. This section guides you through accessing and making the most of your Call History.

## Viewing History

Youll find the Call History feature very helpful. It is a list of the last 20 phone numbers (or Contacts entries) for calls you placed, accepted, or missed. Call History makes redialing a number fast and easy. It is continually updated as new numbers are added to the beginning of the list and the oldest entries are removed from the bottom of the list.

Each entry contains the phone number (if it is available) and Contacts entry name (if the phone number is in your Contacts). Duplicate calls (same number and type of call) may only appear once on the list.

## To view a Call History entry:

> 1. Press Menu > Call History, and then select Outgoing Calls, Incoming Calls, Missed Calls, Recent Calls, or Erase Calls.
2. Highlight the entry you wish to view and press

Note: Call History records only calls that occur while the phone is turned on. If a call is received while your phone is turned off, it will not appear in the phone's Incoming or Missed call logs.

## Call History Options

For additional information and options on a particular call, highlight a Call History entry and press $\operatorname{MENF}^{\circ}{ }^{\circ}$. This feature displays the date and time of the call, the phone number (if available), and the caller's name (if the number is already in your Contacts). By pressing Options (RSotitey), you can select from the following options:

- Send Picture to send a picture.
- Send Msg.to send a text message.
- Save (No Caller ID) to save the phone number.
- Prepend to add numbers to the beginning of the selected number. (See " Prepending a Phone Number From Call History" on page 79.)
- Erase to delete the entry.
- Erase All to delete all Call History entries.

## Finding Contacts Entries

There are several ways to display your Contacts entries: by name, by speed dial number, by group, and by voice dial tags. Follow the steps outlined in the sections below to display entries from the Contacts menu.

## Assigning Speed Dial Numbers

Your phone can store up to 99 phone numbers in speed dial locations. For details on how to make calls using speed dial number see page 28.

Speed dial numbers can be assigned when you add a new Contacts entry, when you add a new phone number to an existing entry, or when you edit an existing number.

To assign or unassign a number to a speed dial location:

1. Select Menu >Contacts > Speed Dial\#'s.
2. To assign a phone number to a location, select the location, and then press Mejov or Assign (LSoitice).
3. Select the contact with the navigation key.
4. To save the number, press MENO or Done (LSotitey).
5. To unassign a location, press Options ( (Rsotikey), and then select "Unassigned" or "Unassigned All".


#### Abstract

Note: Ifyou attempt to assign an already in-use speed dial location to a new phone number, a dialog will appear asking ifyou wish to replace the existing speed dial assignment. Select Yes to assign the location to the new phone number and delete the previous speed dial assignment.


## Selecting a Ringer Type for an Entry

To select a ringer type for an entry:

Your phone is equipped with several personal information management features that help you manage your busy lifestyle. This section shows you how to use these features to turn your phone into a time management planner that helps you keep up with your contacts, schedules, and commitments. It takes productivity to a whole new level.

## Using Your Phone's Voice Services

## Using Voice-Activated Dialing

You can use a voice dial tag to automatically dial a phone number in your Contacts. (A voice dial tag is a command you record and use to place calls without using the keypad.) Your phone can store up to 20 voice dial tags.

## Making a Call Using Voice-Activated Dialing

To use a voice dial tag to call a phone number:

1. Press and hold TALK .
2. Follow the voice prompts and recite the entry's voice dial tag into your phone's microphone.

Tip: Record voice dial tags in a quiet environment and without the aid of an accessory (for example, a headset or hands-free car kit).

## Voice Recognition

Voice recognition allows you to say commands to perform common functions supported by your phone. There is no voice training required to use the voice recognition feature. You simply say the predesignated command displayed on your screen in a normal tone of voice to perform the desired function.

To activate voice recognition:

1. Select Menu > Tools > Voice > Voice Command.
2. When prompted, say one of the following commands:

- Call
- Digit Dial
- Voicemail
- MyPhone\#
- Status
- Help
(When it recognizes one of these commands, the phone launches the associated application. You may be asked to repeat a command if the command is not recognized by voice recognition.)


## Voice Tools Options

## To set voice tools options:

1. Select Menu > Tools > Voice > Voice Command.
2. Press Set (RSolthey)

- VRResults: One or Three Best.
- Train Voice: Train Words or Train Digits. (Train your phone to recognize words or numbers.)
- Prompts:Mode (Prompts or Tones Only) or Timeout ( 5 sec . or 10 sec .).
- Number Format : Accept Any or North America.

3. To return to the previous page, press meñ or Close (BSotikey).

## Managing Voice Memos

You can use your phone's Voice Services to record brief memos to remind you of important events, phone numbers, or grocery list items.

## Recording Voice Memos

To record a voice memo:

1. Select Menu > Tools > Voice > Voice Memo.
2. Press Record (LSofitey) to record a new voice memo.
3. Press Stop (LSofikey) to stop recording and save the voice memo.

To cancel recording a memo:

- Press back or ©end.

Note: Your phone can store a total of four minutes of memos.

## Voice Memo Options

To play voice memos you have recorded:

1. Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Voice $>$ Voice Memo.
2. Select the voice memo you want to play, and press Play (LSofitey). Press Stop (LSotitey) to stop playing a voice memo.

## Erasing Voice Memos

To erase all voice memos:

1. Select Menu $>$ Tools $>$ Voice $>$ Voice Memo.
2. Select the voice memo you want to erase.
3. Press Options ( (BSofitey)), and then select Erase.
4. Select Yes with the navigation key, and then press MEEXD if you are sure you want to erase the voice memo.
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## Using Your Phone's Alarm Clock

Your phone comes with a built-in alarm clock with multiple alarm capabilities.

To use the alam clock:

1. Select Menu > Tools > Alarm Clock.
2. Select Alarm \#1, Alarm \#2, or Alarm \#3.

Press MEND or Set (LSofikey).
3. Turn the alarm on or off by highlighting the activation field and pressing the left or right navigation key.
Press $\quad 5$ to move to the next field.
4. Highlight the time field and use the keypad to enter a time for the alarm. (Use the RSoftey to change from AM to PM.)
5. Select a repeat status(Once, Daily, Mon-Fri, or

Sat \& Sun) for the alarm by highlighting the Repeat field and using the left or right navigation key.
6. Select a snooze interval(5Min, 10Min, 15Min, or 20Min) for the alarm by highlighting the Snooze field and using the left or right navigation key.
7. Press Change (\&Softey). Use your navigation key to scroll through available ringers, and press MEND. (When you highlight a ringer type, a sample ringer will sound.) To save a ringer, press MEND or Done (LSofikey).
8. To save the alarm, press Save (LSofitey).

## Using Your Phone's Calendar

## Adding an Event to the Calendar

Your phone has a built-in calendar that helps you to organize time and reminds you of important events.

To add an event:

1. Select Menu > Tools > Schedule.
2. Using your navigation key, highlight the day to which you would like to add an event and press Add (LSofikey).
3. Enter the event title, and then press Done (LSofikey).
4. Press $\quad$ to edit the From field. The date and time can be edited by pressing the navigation key left or right and using the keypad to change the numbers for the date and time. Press BSofitey to select AM or PM.
5. Press $\quad 5$ to edit the To field. Follow instructions for the From field.
6. Press $\quad$ to edit the Contents field. Enter the description of the event, and then press Done (LSoftkey).
7. Press $\quad$ to edit the Schedule Notice field. Press the navigation key left or right to choose from On Time, Before $\mathbf{1 0}$ min, Before $\mathbf{2 0}$ min, or Before $\mathbf{3 0}$ min.
8. Press $\quad$ to edit the Snooze field. Press the navigation key left or right to choose from $\mathbf{5} \mathbf{~ M i n}, \mathbf{1 0} \mathbf{~ M i n}, \mathbf{1 5} \mathbf{~ M i n}$, or 20 Min.
9. Press $\quad$ to edit the Ring Type field. Press Change ( 8 SSofitey) and scroll through the list of ringers. To select the highlighted ringer, press MENO .Then press MEND or Done (LSofitky).
10. Press Save (LSothey) to save the event or BACK to return to the calendar. The date of the event will be marked on your calendar.

## Viewing Events

To view your scheduled events.

1. Select Menu > Tools > Schedule.
2. Using your navigation key, highlight the day for which
 have events scheduled for the selected day, they will be listed in chronological order.)

Tip: In the calendar view, days with events scheduled are highlighted green.
3. To display the details of an event listed in the schedule, highlight it and press MENO .

## Using Your Phone's Notepad

Your phone comes with a notepad that can be used to compose and store reminders and notes to help keep you organized.

To compose a note (there is an 80-letter limit):

1. Select Menu > Tools > Memo Pad.
2. If you don't have any saved memos, press Add 【Softkey to add a new memo.
3. If you already have a stored memo, press Options (RSoftkey) to 1. Add, 2. Edit, 3. Erase or 4. Erase All.
4. Press MENU or Save (LSoftiky) to save the note.

## To view a saved note:

1. Select Menu > Tools > Memo Pad.
2. Select a note and then press MENO.
3. To edit the note, press Edit (LSoftkey), make any desired changes, and then press MENO or Save (LSoftiky) to save the note.

To delete saved notes:

1. To erase a single note, press Options (R.Sotitey), select Erase, and select Yes.
2. To erase all notes, press Options (BSotkey), select Erase All, and select Yes.

## Using Your Phone's World Clock

To view the time in over 50 different locations:

1. Select Menu > Tools $>$ World Time.
2. A world map displays a city showing its current date and time. Press the navigation key left or right to scroll though different time zones.

- Press Options (RSoftkey) > Set DST to turn Daylight Saving Time on or off.
- Press Options (RSofikey) > Set Dual Time.

3. To return to the previous page and save the currently viewed city, press BACK .

## Using Your Phone's Countdown Timer

Your phone has a built-in countdown timer to alert you when a specified time has elapsed.

## Set a Timer Event

To set a new timer event:

2. Press Options (RSoftiky) and then select Add or press Add (LSoftikey) to add new countdown.
Press the navigation key down to set the schedule options.

- Title: Use the keypad to enter a countdown title.
- Date: Use the keypad to set a date .

## View Timer Events

1. Select Menu > Tools $>$ Others $>$ Countdown.

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## Using Your Phone's Conversion Tool

## Using Voicemail

## Setting Up Your Voicemail

All unanswered calls to your phone are automatically transferred to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. Therefore, you will want to set up your Svoicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated.

## To set upyour voicemail:

## 1. Press and hold 1 ®

2. Follow the system prompts to:

- Createyour passcode
- Record your name announcement
- Record your greeting
- Choose whether or not to activate One-Touch Message Access (a feature that lets you access messages simply by pressing and holding 1 bypassing the need for you to enter your passcode)


## Voicemail Passcode

Ifyou are concerned about unauthorized access to your voicemail account, it is recommended that you enable your voicemail passcode.

## Voicemail Notification

There are several ways your phone alerts you to a new message:

- By displaying a message on the screen.
- By sounding the assigned ringer type.
- By the LED blinking red.
- By displaying 逈 at the top of your screen.


## New Voicemail Message Alerts

When you receive a new voice message, your phone alerts you and prompts you to callyour voicemail.
To call your voicemail:

- Press and hold 1 .

To display your Missed Log:

- Press Detail (BSofikey).


#### Abstract

Note: When you are roaming offthe home network, you may not receive notification of new voicemail messages. It is recommended that you periodically check your voicemail by dialing 1+ area code + your phone number. When your voicemail answers, press * shit and enter your passcode. You will be charged roaming rates when accessing voicemail while roaming off the home network.


Note: Your phone accepts messages even when it is turned off. However, you are only notified of new messages when your phone is turned on and you are in a network service area.

## Retrieving Your Voicemail Messages

You can review your messages directly from your phone or from any other touch-tone phone. To dial from your wireless phone, you can either speed dial your voicemail or use the menu keys.

## Using One-Touch Message Access

- Press and hold (Your phone will dial your voicemail box.)


## Using the Menu Keys on Your Phone to Access Your Messages

# 1. Press Menu > Messaging > Voicemail. <br> 2. Press 1 Call Voicemail. 

Note: You are charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your voicemail from your wireless phone.

## Using Another Phone to Access Messages

1. Dial your wireless phone number.
2. When your voicemail answers, press $\boldsymbol{*}_{\text {shit }}$
3. Enter your passcode.

Tip: When you call into voicemail, you first hear the header information (date, time, and sender information) for the message. To skip directly to the message, press 4 cm during the header.

## Voicemail Options

Your phone offers several options for organizing and accessing your voicemail.

## Using Expert Mode

Using the Expert Mode setting for your personal voicemail box helps you navigate through the voicemail system more quickly by shortening the voice prompts you hear at each level.

## Toturn Expert Mode on or off:

1. Press and hold 1 to access your voicemail. (Ifyour voicemail box contains any new or saved messages, press * suif to access the main voicemail menu.)
2. Press $3^{\text {DEF }}$ to change your Personal Options, following the system prompts.
3. Press 4 chl for Expert Mode.
4. Press 1 Eto turn Expert Mode on or off.

## Setting Up Group Distribution Lists

Create up to 20 separate group lists, each with up to 20 customers.

1. Press and hold $1 \boxminus$ to access your voicemail. (If your voicemail box contains any new or saved messages, press * snit to access the main voicemail menu.)
2. Press $3^{\text {DEF }}$ to change your Personal Options, following the system prompts.
3. Press 2ABO for Administrative Options.
4. Press 5 JkL for Group Distribution Lists.
5. Follow the voice prompts to create, edit, rename, or delete group lists.

## Callback

Return a call after listening to a message without disconnecting from voicemail.

- Press 8 Tuv after listening to a message. (Once the call is complete, you're returned to the voicemail main menu.)


## Voicemail-to-Voicemail Message

Record and send a voice message to other voicemail users.

1. From the main voicemail menu, press 2ABC to send a message.
2. Follow the voice prompts to enter the phone number.
3. Follow the voice prompts to record and send your voice message.

## Voicemail-to-Voicemail Message Reply

Reply to a voice message received from any other voicemail user.

1. After listening to a voice message, press 2 2 ABC .
2. Follow the voice prompts to record and send your reply.

## Voicemail-to-Voicemail Message Forwarding

Forward a voice message, except those marked "Private," to other voicemail users.

1. After listening to a message, press $6^{\mathrm{MNO}}$.
2. Follow the voice prompts to enter the phone number.
3. Follow the voice prompts to record your introduction and forward the voice message.

## Voicemail-to-Voicemail Receipt Request

Receive confirmation that your voice message has been listened to when you send, forward, or reply to other users.

1. After you have recorded a message, press $1 \boxminus$ to indicate you are satisfied with the message you recorded.
2. Press 4 GHI to mark receipt requested.
3. Press 1 to send your voicemail message.

## Continue Recording

When leaving a voice message, you can choose to continue recording even after you've stopped.

- Before pressing 1 - to indicate that you are satisfied with the message you recorded, press 4 cm to continue recording.


## Extended Absence Greeting

When your phone is turned off or you are off the home network for an extended period, this greeting can be played instead of your normal personal greeting.

1. From the main voicemail menu, press $3^{\text {DEF }}$ for Personal Options.
2. Press $3^{\text {DEF }}$ for Greetings.
3. Press $3^{\text {DEF }}$ to record an Extended Absence Greeting.

## Clearing the Message Icon

Your phone may temporarily continue to display the message icon after you have checked your voice and text messages.

To clear the icon from the display screen:

1. Select Menu > Messaging > Voicemail >Clear Icon.
2. Select Yes or No and press (既

## Using SMS Text Messaging

With SMS Text Messaging, you can use other caller's wireless phone numbers to send instant text messages from your phone to their messaging-ready phones - and they can send messages to you. When you receive a new message, it will automatically be displayed on your phone's screen.
In addition, SMS Text Messaging includes a variety of preset messages, such as "I'm running late, I'm on my way," that make composing messages fast and easy. You can also customize your own preset messages (up to 160 characters) from your phone.

## Composing SMS Text Messages

## To compose an SMS Text message:

1. Press Menu > Messaging > Send Message > Text Message.
2. Under "Recipients", input the phone number and press Next (LSotitey) to save the recipient. (To include additional recipients, select Enter Addr 2, Enter Addr 3, etc., after each entry. You may include up to 10 recipients per message.) Press Options (RSofikey) to choose from the following:

- Find to find and select a recipient from your internal Contacts list.
- Recent List to select a recipient from your recent messages.

3. Select Enter Msg. and compose a message; or use the preset messages or smileys; and press Next (LSotikey)

- To type a message, use your keypad to enter your message. Use the right softkey to select a character input mode. (See "Entering Text" on page 29.)
- To use a preset message or a smiley, press the BSoriteren, select Smiley or Preset Msg., highlight your desired message or smiley, and then press MEस्रें .

4. Review your message and press Send (LSofitey). (You may also select additional messaging options, such as saving the message to a drafts folder, by pressing Options [ 8 Sostitey $]$.)

## Accessing SMS Text Messages

## To read an SMS Text message:

- When you receive a text message, it will automatically appear on your phone's main display screen. Use your navigation key to scroll down and view the entire message.

To replyto an SMSText message:

1. While the message is open, select Reply (LSotikey).
Press Options (RSotitey) to choose from the following:

- Call to place a call to a received message number.
- Forward to forward a text message.
- Save \#to save the phone number which is stored in the recent received message list.
－Save Email to save the email address which is stored in the recent received message list．
－Lock／Unlock to lock or unlock a text message．
－Erase to erase a message．
－Erase Allto erase all messages．
2．Compose your reply or use the preset messages or icons．
－To type a message，use your keypad to enter your message．Use the Brontray to select a character input mode．（See＂Entering Text＂on page 29．）
－To use a preset message or a smiley，press the Rositiey， select Smiley or Preset Msg．，highlight your desired message or smiley，and press ME⿰訁又欠）．

3．Review your message and press Send（Lsoitkey）．（You may also select additional messaging options by pressing Options［ 8 Sostiter $]$ ］．）

## Using Caller ID

Caller ID allows people to identify a caller before answering the phone by displaying the number of the incoming call．If you do not want your number displayed when you make a call， just follow these easy steps．

To block your phone number from being displayed for a specific outgoing call：

1．Press $*$ snirit $6{ }^{\mathrm{MNO}} 7$ pars ．
2．Enter the number you want to call．
3．Press TALK
To permanently block your number，contact your service provider．

## Responding to Call Waiting

When you're on a call, Call Waiting alerts you of incoming calls by sounding two beeps. Your phone's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if it is available and you are in digital mode).

To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

- Press TALK . (This puts the first caller on hold and answers the second call.)

To switch back to the first caller:

- Press TALK again.

## Making a Three-Way Call

With Three-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.

## To make a Three-Way Call:

1. Enter a number you wish to call and press TALK
2. Once you have established the connection, enter the second number you wish to call and press TALK . (This puts the first caller on hold and dials the second number.)
3. When you're connected to the second party, press TALK again to begin your three-way call.
If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all other callers are disconnected.

## Using Call Forwarding

Call Forwarding lets you forward all your incoming calls to another phone number - even when your phone is turned off. You can continue to make calls from your phone when Call Forwarding is activated.

## To activate Call Forwarding:

## 1. Press * shift $7_{\text {pars }} 2 \mathrm{abc}$.

2. Enter the area code and phone number to which your future calls should be forwarded.
3. Press TALK. (You will see a message and hear a tone to confirm the activation of Call Forwarding.)

## To deactivate Call Forwarding:

1. Press $*$ shit $7_{\text {Pars }} 2$ abc $0+$.
2. Press TALK. (You will see a message and hear a tone to confirm the deactivation.)

Note: You are charged a higher rate for calls you have forwarded.

Data services offers easy and amazing features you will really use. These features -including messaging, games, downloadable ringers and screen savers, and portable Web access - let you have fun, stay in touch, and stay informed no matter where you go on the home network.

This section introduces these advanced services and walks you through the necessary steps to start taking advantage of your phone's data services.

## Data Services Applications

Here is a brief list of the applications available through your phone.

Picture Messaging-Instantly shoot, share, and print sharp, high resolution digital pictures with your phone.

Messaging-Send and receive emails and chat on your phone.
Games - Play exciting games with full-color graphics, sound, and vibration. Choose from hundreds of games to play anytime.

Ringers-Personalize your phone by downloading and assigning different ringers to numbers in your Contacts.

Screen Savers - Download unique images to use as screen saversor make it easy to tell who's calling by assigning specific images to numbers in your Contacts.

Web-Experience full-color graphic versions of popular Web sites from your phone.

## Getting Started With Data Services

With your wireless phone and service, you are ready to start enjoying the advantages of data services. This section will help you learn the basics of using your data services, including managing your user name, launching a data connection, and navigating the Web with your phone.

## Your User Name

When you buy a compatible phone and sign up for service, you're automatically assigned a user name, which is typically based on your 10-digit wireless phone number.

When you use data services, your user name is submitted to identify you to the home network. The user name is also
useful as an address for email, as a way to personalize Web services, and as an online virtual identity.

Your user name will be automatically programmed into your phone. You don't have to enter it.

## Updating Your User Name

When you change the programmed user name and select a new one, you have to update your user name through your phone.

To update your user name:

- Select MEND > Settings > Web > Update Profile.
- If you want to cancel, press ©END while processing.


## Finding Your User Name

If you aren't sure what your user name is, you can easily find it on your phone.

To find your user name:

- From standby mode, select MENO $\begin{gathered}\text { OK } \\ \text { > Settings }>\text { Phone }\end{gathered}$ Info > Phone Number/User Name.


## Launching a Data Connection

To launch a data connection:
Select MENV > Web. (Your data connection will start and the home page will be displayed.)

Note:If Net Guard is enabled and displayed (see below), press OK (8sontiey) to continue and access the Web.

While connecting, the following will appear on the screen:

## Connecting...Please wait.

If you had a previous data connection, the last page you visited will be displayed when you launch your browser. When this occurs, you may not see the "Connecting..." message when you launch the session. Though the browser is open, you are not currently in an active data session-that is, no data is being sent or received. As soon as you navigate to another page, the active session will start and you will see the "Connecting..." message.

## Net Guard

When you first connect to the Web, the Net Guard will appear to confirm that you want to connect. This feature helps you avoid accidental connections. You can disable the Net Guard in the future by selecting Always Auto-Connect when the Net Guard is displayed.

## To change your Net Guard settings:

> - Select MEND > Settings > Web > Net Guard and choose an option:

- On to activate the Net Guard.
- Off to deactivate the Net Guard.

> Note:When enabled,the Net Guard appears only once per session. The Net Guard does not appear ifthe phone is merely reconnecting due to a time-out.

## Connection Status and Indicators

Your phone's display lets you know the current status of your data connection through indicators which appear at the top of the screen. The following symbols are used:

11Your data connection is active (data is being transferred); the transmit/receive symbol will blink to indicate data transmission. Incoming voice calls go
directly to voicemail; outgoing voice calls can be made, but will terminate the data connection.

Your data connection is dormant. (No data is being sent or received.) Though not currently active, when dormant the phone can restart an active connection quickly; voice calls can be made and received.

thYour phone is not currently able to access data service features.

## Navigating the Web

Navigating through menus and Web sites during a data session is easy once you've learned a few basics. Here are some tips for getting around:

## Softkeys

During a data session, the bottom line of your phone's display contains one or more softkeys. These keys are shortcut controls for navigating around the Web, and they correspond to the softkey buttons directly below the phone's display screen.

Tip: Depending on which Web sites you visit, the labels on the softkeys may change to indicate their function.

## To use softkeys:

- Press the desired softkey button. (If an additional pop-up menu appears when you press the softkey button, select the menu items using your keypad [If they're numbered] or by highlighting the option and pressing MEFD.)


## Scrolling

As with other parts of your phone's menu, you'll have to scroll up and down to see everything on some Web sites.
To scroll line by line through Web sites:

- Press the navigation key up or down.

To scroll page by page through Web sites:

- Press the volume buttons on the side of the phone.


## Selecting

Once you've learned how to use softkeys and scroll, you can start navigating the Web.

## To select onscreen items:

- Use the navigation key to highlight the desired item, and


Tip: You'll find that the sey is used primarily for selecting items. This softkey is often labeled "Go."

> Tip: Ifthe items on a page are numbered, you can use your keypad (number keys) to select an item. (The tenth item in a numbered list may be selected by pressing the $0+$ key on your phone's keypad, even though the number 0 doesn't appear on the screen.)

Links, which appear as underlined text, allow you to jump to different Web pages, select special functions, or even place phone calls.

## To select links:

Highlight the link and press the appropriate softkey.

## Going Back

Togo back one page:

- Press the BACK key on your phone.

Note: The BACK key is also used for deleting text (like a BACKSPACE key) when you are entering text.

## Going Home

To return to the home page from any other Web page:

- Press and hold BACK
- or -

Press ©Soritey > Home > OK (LSositiky).

## Accessing Messaging

You can send and receive emails, text messages, and picture messages right from your phone. Messaging allows you to stay connected to friends, family, and coworkers 24 hours a day anywhere on the home network.

Note: For complete details on text messaging, see " Using SMS Text Messaging.

## Message Types

There are many types of text messaging available on your phone. These include SMS Text Messaging, Instant Messaging, and Email.

## Accessing Email Providers

With data services, you can use popular email services such as Yahoo! ${ }^{\circledR}$ Mail and EarthLink ${ }^{\circledR}$ to keep in touch, even while you're on the go.

## To access email providers from your phone:

1. From the home page, select Messaging > Email.
2. Select an email provider, such as Yahoo! Mail or EarthLink.
3. Use your keypad to enter the required sign-in information for the selected provider, such as user name, email address, and password, and select Sign In. (Your mailbox for the selected provider will be displayed.)

Note: The information required to sign in will vary depending on the email provideryou are accessing.
4. Follow the onscreen instructions to read, reply to, compose, send, and manage emails in your account.

## Accessing Instant Messaging

Data services also provides you with access to popular instant messaging (IM) clients, including AOL ${ }^{\circledR}$ Instant Messenger ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ and Yahoo! ${ }^{\circledR}$ Messenger.

To access instant messaging clients from your phone:

1. From the home page, select Messaging > Instant Messaging.
2. Select an email provider, such as AOL Instant Messenger or Yahoo! Messenger.
3. Use your keypad to enter the required sign-in information for the selected provider, such as user name and password, and select Sign In. (Your IM screen for the selected provider will be displayed.)

Note: The information required to sign in will vary depending on the instant messaging provider you are accessing.
4. Follow the onscreen instructions to read, reply to, compose, send, and manage messages in your IM account.

## Downloading Premium Services Content

With data services, you have access to a dynamic variety of Premium Service content, such as downloadable Games, Ringers, Screen Savers, and other applications. (Additional charges may apply.) The basic steps required to access and download Premium Service content are outlined below.

## Accessing the My Content Menus

To access the download menus:

## 1. Select MEND > My Content.

2. Select the type of file you wish to download (Games, Ringers, Screen Savers, or Applications), and then select Get New LSotikey . (The browser will start and take you to the corresponding download menu.)

To access the download menus from the Web browser:

- From the home page, select Downloads > Games, Ringers, Screen Savers, or other desired item to go to the corresponding download menu. (For more information on navigating the Web, see "Navigating the Web" on page 123.)


## Selecting an Item to Download

You can search for available items to download in a number of ways:

- Featured displays a rotating selection of featured items.
- Browse Category allows you to narrow your search to a general category, such as Country or Pop/Rock for Ringers or For the Ladies for Screen Savers. (There may be several pages of available content in a list. Select Next 9 to view additional items.)
- Search allows you to use your keypad to enter search criteria to locate an item. You may enter an entire word or title or perform a partial-word search.


## Downloading an Item

Once you've selected an item you wish to download, highlight
 page for the item including its title, the vendor, the download details, the file size, and the cost. Links allow you to view the License Details page, which outlines the price, license type, and length of license for the download, and the Terms of Use page, which details the Premium Services Terms of Use and your responsibility for payment.

To download a selected item:

1. From the information page, select Buy. (The item will download automatically. When the New Download screen appears, the item has been successfully downloaded to your phone.)

Note: If you have not previously purchased an item, you will be prompted
to create your purchasing profile.
2. Select an option to continue:

- Select Run/Open/Listen/Play/View to start the downloaded items, such as a game or application. Your data session will end and you will be redirected to the appropriate phone menu screen.
- Select Set as to assign a ringer or screen saver to a phone function.
- Select Settings to configure downloaded games or applications.
- Select Shop to browse for other items to download.
- Press ©END to quit the browser and return to standby mode.

Note: The option will vary depending on the items you are selecting.

## Exploring the Web

With Web access on your phone, you can browse full-color graphic versions of your favorite Web sites, making it easier than ever to stay informed while on the go. Follow sports scores, breaking news, and weather, and shop on your phone anywhere on the home network.
In addition to the features already covered in this section, the home page offers access to these colorful, graphically rich Web categories, including News, Weather, Entertainment, Sports, Money, Travel, Shopping, and Tools, as well as useful management options including Search. Many sites are available under more than one menu-choose the one that Arials most convenient for you.

## Using the Browser Menu

Navigating the Web from your phone using the home page is easy once you get the hang of it. For details on how to navigate the Web, select menu items, and more, see "Navigating the Web" on page 123.
Although the home page offers a broad and convenient array of sites and services for you to browse, not all sites are represented, and certain functions, such as going directly to specific Web sites, are not available. For these and other functions, you will need to use the browser menu. The
browser menu offers additional functionality to expand your use of the Web on your phone.

## Opening the Browser Menu

The browser menu may be opened anytime you have an active data session, from any page you are viewing.

Toopen the browser menu:

- Press the RSotikey key from any page during an active data session. (The browser menu will be displayed.)
Options available under the browser menu may include:
- Home. Returns the browser to the home page.
- Forward. Allows you to go forward to the pages you have visited.
- Mark this page. Allows you to create new bookmarks.
- View Bookmarks. Allows you to view and access bookmarked sites.
- Search. Launches a Web search.
- Send Page. Allows you to send a URL you're viewing through SMS Text Messaging.
- Go to URL...Allows you to navigate directly to a Web site by entering its URL.
- History. Displays the pages you have visited.
- Refresh this page. Reloads the current Web page.
- More... Displays the additional menu options.
- Show URL. Displays the URL (Web site address) of the site you're currently viewing.
- Restart Browser. Refreshes the current browser session.
- About Browser. Allows you to display your browser's information.
- Preferences. Allows you to configure and manage your browser settings (Edit Home Page, Revert Home Page, Launch Page, Font Size, Color Setting, Show Images, Delete Cookies, Send Referrer, Title Tag, and Sound Volume).


## Creating a Bookmark

Bookmarks allow you to store the address of your favorite Web sites for easy access at a later time.

To create a bookmark:

1. Go to the Web page you want to mark.
2. Press the (Softhey to open the browser menu.
3. Select Mark this page and press MeN⿱ bookmark.

> Note: Bookmarking a page does not store the page's contents, just its address. Some pages cannot be bookmarked. Whether a particular Web page may be marked is controlled by its creator.

## Accessing a Bookmark

To access a bookmark:

1. Press the right softkey to open the browser menu.
2. Select View Bookmarks.
3. Scroll to highlight the bookmark you'd like to access and press OK (LSoftkey ), or press the number corresponding to the bookmark you wish to access.

## Deleting a Bookmark

To delete a bookmark:

1. Press the Bofikey to open the browser menu.
2. Select View Bookmarks.
3. Scroll to highlight the bookmark you'd like to delete and press RSofthey.
4. Select Delete from the menu. (A confirmation screen will be displayed.)
5. Select Yes (RSoftkey) to remove the bookmark.

## Going to a Specific Web site

To go to a particular Web site by entering a URL (Web site address):

1. Connect to the Web and press RSoftey to display the browser menu.
2. Select Go to URL....
3. Select Address and press OK (LSootikey).
4. Use your keypad to enter the URL of the Web site you wish to go to and press OK (LSoftiky).

Note: Not all Web sites are viewable on your phone.

## Reloading a Web Page

To reload (refresh) a Web page:

1. Press the RSoftey to open the browser menu.
2. Select Refresh this page. (The browser will reload the current Web page.)

## Restarting the Web Browser

If the Web browser appears to be malfunctioning or stops responding, you can usually fix the problem by simply restarting the browser.

## To restart the Web browser:

1. From an active data connection, press the RSortice: to display the browser menu.
2. Select More... > Restart Browser.

## Adjusting the Browser Sound Volume

To adjust the browser sound volume:

1. From an active data connection, press the Soritey to display the browser menu.
2. Select More... >Preferences >Sound Volume.
3. Select the desired volume level by pressing the

## Data Services FAOs

How will I know when my phone is ready for data service? When your phone is ready, your User Address will be displayed in the Phone Number menu. Go to Settings >Phone Info > Phone Number.

## How do I sign in for the first time?

You are automatically signed in to access data services when you turn on your phone.
How do I know when my phone is connected to data services? Your phone automatically connects when data service is used or an incoming message arrives. Your phone will also display the 佔icon.

Can I make calls and use data services at the same time? You cannot use voice and data services simultaneously. If you receive a call while data services are active, the call will be forwarded to voicemail. You can place an outgoing call anytime, but it will interrupt any in-progress data session.

## When is my data connection active?

Your connection is active when data is being transferred. Outgoing calls are allowed; incoming calls go directly to voicemail. When active, the (sending) or (receiving) indicator flashes on your phone's display screen.

## When is my data connection dormant?

If no data is received for 10 seconds, the connection goes dormant. When the connection is dormant, voice calls are allowed. (The connection may become active again quickly.) If no data is received for an extended time, the connection will be terminated.

## Can I sign out of data services?

You can sign out without turning off your phone; however, you will not be able to browse the Web or use other data services. While signed out, you can still place or receive phone calls, check voicemail, and use other voice services.
You may sign in again at any time.
To sign out, go to Settings > Web > Disable Web in your phone's menu.

This phone guide contains important operational and safety information that will help you safely use your phone. Failure to read and follow the information provided in this phone guide may result in serious bodily injury, death, or property damage.

## General Precautions

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- Hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended, and over your shoulder.
- Try not to hold, bend, or twist the phone's antenna.
- Don't use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- Speak directly into the mouthpiece.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery.
- Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending, or sitting on it.
- Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment and void your authority to operate this equipment.

Note: For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Failure to do so may be dangerous and void your warranty.

## Maintaining Safe Use of and Access to Your Phone

## Do Not Rely on Your Phone for Emergency Calls

Mobile phones operate using radio signals, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore you should never rely solely upon any mobile phone for essential communication (e.g., medical emergencies). Emergency calls may not be possible on all cellular networks or when certain network services and/or mobile phone features are in use. Check with your local service provider for details.

## Using Your Phone While Driving

Talking on your phone while driving (or operating the phone without a hands-free device) is prohibited in some jurisdictions. Laws vary as to specific restrictions. Remember that safety always comes first.

## Following Safety Guidelines

To operate your phone safely and efficiently, always follow any special regulations in a given area. Turn your phone off in areas where use is forbidden or when it may cause interference or danger.

## Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radiofrequency (RF) signals. However, RF signals from wireless phones may affect inadequately shielded electronic equipment.

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic operating systems and/or entertainment systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or their representative to determine if these systems are adequately shielded from external RF signals. Also check with the manufacturer regarding any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Consult the manufacturer of any personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids, to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF signals.

Note: Always turn off the phone in health-care facilities and request permission before using the phone near medical equipment.

## Turning Off Your Phone Before Flying

Turn off your phone before boarding any aircraft. To prevent possible interference with aircraft systems, the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations require you to have permission from a crew member to use your phone while the plane is on the ground. To prevent any risk of interference, FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while the plane is in the air.

## Turning Off Your Phone in Dangerous Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn your phone off when in a blasting area or in other areas with signs indicating two-way radios should be turned off. Construction crews often use remote-control RF devices to set off explosives.
Turn your phone off when you're in any area that has a potentially explosive atmosphere. Although it's rare, your phone and accessories could generate sparks. Sparks can cause an explosion or fire, resulting in bodily injury or even death. These areas are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include:

- Fueling areas such as gas stations.
- Below deck on boats.
- Fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities.
- Areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust, or metal powders.
- Any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle's engine.

Note: Never transport or store flammable gas, flammable liquid, or explosives in the compartment of your vehicle that contains your phone or accessories.

## Restricting Children's Access to Your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Do not allow children to play with it as they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your invoice.

# Using Your Phone With a Hearing Aid Device 

Your phone has been tested for hearing aid device compatibility. When some wireless phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.
The wireless telephone industry has developed ratings for some of their mobile phones, to assist hearing device users in finding phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated will have the rating on the box.

> Your PLS-7075 has an M3 rating.

> Note: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and may generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. $M 4$ is the better/higher of the two ratings.

The M3/M4 ratings do not guarantee successful interoperation between your phone and hearing aid device. Results will vary depending on the level of immunity of your hearing device and degree of your hearing loss.
The more immune your hearing aid device is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from your wireless phone. Hearing aid devices should have ratings similar to phones. Ask your hearing health-care professional for the rating of your aids. Most new hearing aids have at least an M2 immunity level. Add the " $M$ " ratings of your hearing aid and your phone to determine probable usability:

- Any combined rating equal to or greater than six offers best use.
- Any combined rating equal to five is considered normal use.
- Any combined rating equal to four is considered usable.

Thus, if you pair an M3 hearing aid with an M3 phone, you will have a combined rating of six for " best use."

It is further suggested that you experiment with multiple phones (even those not labeled M3 or M4) while in the store to find the one that works
best with your hearing aid device. Should you experience interference after purchasing your phone, promptly return it to the store where purchased for exchange or refund.

## Getting the Best Hearing Device Experience With Your UTStarcom PLS-7075

One way to minimize interference is to set the phone's Display and Keypad backlight settings to ensure the minimum time interval.

To ensure the minimum interference for your Main Display's backlight, follow these steps:

1. Select Menu > Settings > Display > Backlight > Main Display.
2. Scroll and select the minimum time interval setting ( 10 seconds).

To ensure the minimum interference for the Keypad backlight, follow these steps:

1. Select Menu > Settings > Display > Backlight > Keypad.
2. Scroll and select the minimum time interval setting ( 10 seconds).

## Caring for the Battery

## Protecting Your Battery

The guidelines listed below help you get the most out of your battery's performance.

- Recently there have been some public reports of wireless phone batteries overheating, catching fire or exploding. It appears that many, if not all, of these reports involve counterfeit or inexpensive, aftermarket-brand batteries with unknown or questionable manufacturing standards. UTStarcom is not aware of similar problems with phones resulting from the proper use of batteries and accessories approved by UTStarcom. Use only manufacturer-approved batteries and accessories. They're also available online at
www.buywirelessnow.com/utstarcom. Buying the right batteries and accessories is the best way to ensure they're genuine and safe.
- In order to avoid damage, charge the battery only in temperatures that range from $32^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ to $113^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(0^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ to $\left.45^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$.
- Don't use the battery charger in direct sunlight or in high humidity areas, such as the bathroom.
- Never dispose of the battery by incineration.
- Keep the metal contacts on top of the battery clean.
- Don't attempt to disassemble or short-circuit the battery.
- The battery may need recharging if it has not been used for a long period of time.
- It's best to replace the battery when it no longer provides acceptable performance. It can be recharged hundreds of times before it needs replacing.
- Don't store the battery in high temperature areas for long periods of time. It's best to follow these storage rules:

Less than one month: $-4^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ to $140^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(-20^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ to $\left.60^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$ More than one month: $-4^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ to $113^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(-20^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ to $\left.45^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$

## Disposal of Lithium lon (Li-lon) Batteries

Do not handle a damaged or leaking Li-lon battery as you can be burned.
For safe disposal options of your Li-lon batteries, contact your nearest authorized service center.
Special Note: Be sure to dispose of your battery properly. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited.

## Radiofrequency (RF) Energy

## Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radiofrequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

## Knowing Radiofrequency Safety

The design of your phone complies with updated NCRP standards described below.

In 1991-92, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) joined in updating ANSI's 1982 standard for safety levels with respect to human exposure to RF signals. More than 120 scientists, engineers and physicians from universities, government health agencies and industries developed this updated standard after reviewing the available body of research. In 1993, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted this updated standard in a regulation. In August 1996, the FCC adopted hybrid standard consisting of the existing ANSI/IEEE standard and the guidelines published by the National Council of Radiation Protection and Measurements (NCRP).

## Body-Worn Operation

To maintain compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines, if you wear a handset on your body, use the supplied or approved carrying case, holster or other body-worn accessory. If you do not use a body-worn accessory, ensure the antenna is at least $7 / 16$ inch ( 1.5 centimeters) from your body when transmitting. Use of non-approved accessories may violate FCC RF exposure guidelines.

## Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) for Wireless Phones

The SAR is a value that corresponds to the relative amount of RF energy absorbed in the head of a user of a wireless handset.

The SAR value of a phone is the result of an extensive testing, measuring and calculation process. It does not represent how much RF the phone emits. All phone models are tested at their highest value in strict laboratory settings. But when in operation, the SAR of a phone can be substantially less than the level reported to the FCC. This is because of a variety of factors including its proximity to a base station antenna, phone design and other factors. What is important to remember is that each phone meets strict federal guidelines. Variations in SARs do not represent a variation in safety.
All phones must meet the federal standard, which incorporates a substantial margin of safety. As stated above, variations in SAR values between different model phones do not mean variations in safety. SAR values at or below the federal standard of $1.6 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{kg}$ are considered safe for use by the public.
