Turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and hold Power () (on top of the phone).



To turn off your phone, press and hold Power ①, then tap **Power off**.

Set up & go

The first time you turn on your phone, a setup wizard guides you through signing in to your existing Google™ account. If you don't have a Google account, you can create one using the wizard.

Note: To ensure that certain key features work on your phone, be sure to enter the date and time

Tip: Remember to write down your username and password, and keep them in a safe place.

Make & answer calls

To make a call, tap **C** Phone, enter a number, then tap **C**.

To answer a call, drag 🦨 to the right.

To end a call, tap **End**.

To ignore a call, drag 🌈 to the left.

Wi-Fi connect

If you want to use a Wi-Fi computer network for even faster Internet access, press Menu 🔳 > Settings > Wireless & networks > Wi-Fi settings.

Touchscreen & keys

a few essentials

Touch tips

Here are some tips on how to navigate around your phone.

Тар

To choose an icon or option, *tap* it.



Tap & hold

To open special options, tap and hold an icon or other item. Try it: In the home screen, tap **Contacts**, then tap and hold a contact to open options.



Drag

To scroll through a list or move slowly, *drag* across the touchscreen. Try it: In the home screen, tap **Contacts**, then drag your contacts list up or down.

Tip: When you drag or flick a list, a *scroll bar* appears on the right. Drag the scroll bar to move the list to a letter A - Z.



Flick

To scroll through a list or move quickly, *flick* across the touchscreen (drag quickly and release).

Tip: When you flick a long list, tap the screen to stop it from scrolling.

Zoom

You can zoom in for a closer look when you view maps or web pages on your phone. To zoom in, *double-tap* the screen, or *tap* the screen with two fingers and then slide them apart. To zoom out, *double tap* the screen again, or *drag* your fingers together.

My Sign

Draw on your screen to get to your favorite apps. To open **My Sign**, tap the **My Sign** in the Applications tab.

Draw the sign for the action you want. For example, draw a "V" to go to voicemail.

To see which actions are already assigned to signs, press Menu 🗐 > List gesture. You'll also see several signs that are unassigned.

To assign an action to a sign, press Menu 🗐 > Add gesture, tap the unassigned sign, then tap an app from the list.



Sleep & wake up

To save your battery, prevent accidental taps, or when you want to clean your touchscreen, put the touchscreen to sleep by quickly pressing Power ①. To wake up



the touchscreen, just press Power 0 again, or open the slider.

To change how long your phone waits before the screen goes to sleep automatically,

press Menu 🔳 > Settings > Sound & display > Screen timeout.

Spin the screen

The touchscreen can rotate 90 degrees to stay right-side up when you rotate your phone:

Home screen

quick access to the things you need most

The *home screen* gives you all your latest information in one place. It's what you see when you turn on the phone or press Home from a menu. It's basically like this:



The home screen extends beyond what you see on the screen to give you more room for adding shortcuts, widgets, and more. Flick the home screen left and right to see more panels.



Tip: Customize your home screen in "Personalize" on page 36.

Widgets

In your home screen, add a *widget* such as a clock, music player, or a calendar that shows upcoming appointments.

To open a widget, tap it. To add widgets, press Menu 🗐 > Add > Widgets.

Note: If you install apps from Android Market that have widgets, those widgets appear on the home screen.

Shortcuts

The shortcut icons at the bottom of your home screen are the first apps in your home screen.

You can add more shortcuts to the home screen. Just open the Applications tab and drag the apps you want to the home screen. Or, press Menu 🗐 > Add > Shortcuts.

Applications tab

All the apps on your phone, including the apps that came with your phone, and the ones you download and install, are listed in alphabetical order in your *Applications tab*.

To open the Applications tab, tap **man** or drag up.



Phone status & notifications

The status bar at the top of the screen contains icons that tell you about messages and phone status. To view your notifications, tap the status bar and drag it down.

In-call options

During a call, press Menu \equiv to use **Bluetooth**, or to put the call on **Hold**.

Tip: You can press Home 🙆 or Back 🕤 to hide the active call display. To reopen it, tap 🧹 Phone.

Emergency calls

Note: Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers (such as 911 or 112) that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked. Emergency numbers vary by country. Your pre-programmed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- 1 Press Home 🛆 > 🌠 Phone.
- 2 Enter the emergency number.
- 3 Tap 🌈 to call the emergency number.

Web

Connect

Your phone uses the mobile phone network (over the air) to automatically connect to the Web.

Note: Your service provider may charge to surf the Web or download data.

To use a wireless network, press Menu 🗐 > Settings > Wireless controls. Tap Wi-Fi to turn it on and tap Wi-Fi settings to search for nearby wireless networks. Tap a network to connect.

Select web links

When you tap a link, your phone outlines it and goes to that page. If you tap and hold the link, your



phone shows options, like **Open in new window** or **Bookmark link**.

Manage, sync, & backup phone content

Motorola Media Link (MML) and Moto Phone Portal bridge your digital world by connecting your phone, computer, and the Web, so you can manage the media on your phone and back up your media to your computer. The Moto Phone Portal lets you access your phone from any Wi-Fi-enabled computer. You can edit, customize, and back up contacts, and share your phone's content, all while you're on the go.

To install MML, use the CD that came with your phone. When you insert the CD into your computer, an installation wizard automatically begins, guiding you through the quick and easy installation. When installation is complete, the MML icon appears on your computer's desktop.

To use MML:

1 With a memory card inserted in your phone, and your phone showing the home screen, connect a Motorola micro USB data cable from your phone's micro USB port to a USB port on your computer. Your phone should show **w** in the status bar.

Note: Make sure to connect the phone to a high power USB port. Typically, these are located directly on you computer.

2 When you see the MML screen, select the appropriate tab to manage Photos, Videos, or Music.

Safeguard your phone's important information by using the Synch button, or simply drag and drop content from your phone to you computer. For more information on MML features and support, visit <u>http://</u> www/motorola.com/medialink.

Moto Phone Portal

The Moto Phone Portal is a phone-resident application that allows you to use a browser on a Wi-Fi-enabled computer as a window into your phone. To use Moto Phone Portal, you must connect your phone to the Wi-Fi network that your computer uses.

Once your phone is connected to the Wi-Fi network, press Home \bigcirc > \bigcirc Phone Portal > Connect with Wi-Fi and follow the onscreen instructions. On your Wi-Fi-enabled computer, enter the URL provided by the Moto Phone Portal.

1 Make sure the device you are pairing with is in discoverable mode.

2 Press Menu = > Settings > Wireless & networks.

- 3 Tap Bluetooth to turn on and scan. If Bluetooth is already on, tap Bluetooth settings > Scan for devices to search for Bluetooth devices.
- 4 Your phone lists the devices it finds within range. Tap a device to connect.
- 5 If necessary, tap **OK**, or enter the device passkey (like **0000**) to connect to the device. When the device is connected, the Bluetooth indicator (*) appears in the status bar.

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

Reconnect devices

To automatically reconnect your phone with a paired device, simply turn on the device.

To manually reconnect your phone with a paired device, tap the device name in the **Bluetooth devices** list.

Disconnect devices

To automatically disconnect your phone from a paired device, simply turn off the device.

To manually disconnect your phone from a paired device, tap the device name in the devices list, then press Menu $\overline{\blacksquare} >$ **Disconnect**.

Edit properties

Press Menu 🗐 > Settings > Wireless & networks > Bluetooth settings > Device name. Enter a name and tap OK.

Battery Use & Safety

Important: Handle and store batteries properly to avoid injury or damage. Most battery issues arise from improper bandling of batteries, and particularly from

Most battery issues arise from improper handling of batteries, and particularly from the continued use of damaged batteries.

DON'Ts

- Don't disassemble, crush, puncture, shred, or otherwise attempt to change the form of your battery.
- Don't let the phone or battery come in contact with water. Water can get into the phone's circuits, leading to corrosion. If the phone and/or battery get wet, have them checked by your service provider or contact Motorola, even if they appear to be working properly.*
- Don't allow the battery to touch metal objects. If metal objects, such as jewelry, stay in prolonged contact with the battery contact points, the battery could become very hot.
- Don't place your battery near a heat source. Excessive heat can damage the phone or the battery. High temperatures can cause the battery to swell, leak, or malfunction. Therefore:
- Do not dry a wet or damp battery with an appliance or heat source, such as a hair dryer or microwave oven.
- Avoid leaving your phone in your car in high temperatures.*
 DOs
- Do avoid dropping the battery or phone. Dropping these items, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage.*
- Do contact your service provider or Motorola if your phone or battery has been damaged from dropping or high temperatures.

* Note: If the product guide expressly states that your phone is designed to resist damage from exposure to certain rugged conditions, such as water immersion, rain, dust, high and low temperatures, shock, or other conditions, do **not** exceed the stated limits, and ensure the stated precautions are taken. Always make sure that the battery compartment is closed and secure to avoid direct exposure of the battery to any of these conditions.

Important: Use Motorola Original products for quality assurance and safeguards. To aid consumers in identifying authentic Motorola batteries from non-original or counterfeit batteries (that may not have adequate safety protection), Motorola provides holograms on its batteries. Consumers should confirm that any battery they purchase has a "Motorola Original" hologram.

Motorola recommends you always use Motorola-branded batteries and chargers. Motorola mobile devices are designed to work with Motorola batteries. If you see a message on your display such as Invalid Battery or

Unable to Charge, take the following steps:

- Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it has a "Motorola Original" hologram;
- If there is no hologram, the battery is not a Motorola battery;
- If there is a hologram, replace the battery and retry charging it;
- If the message remains, contact a Motorola authorized service center.

Important: Motorola's warranty does not cover damage to the phone caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.

Warning: Use of a non-Motorola battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard.

Proper and safe battery disposal and recycling: Proper battery disposal is not only important for safety, it benefits the environment. Battery Charging Notes for charging your phone's battery:

- When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never expose batteries to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F) when charging.
- New batteries are not fully charged.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Motorola batteries and charging systems have circuitry that protects the battery from damage from overcharging.

Specific Absorption Rate (IEEE)

Your model wireless phone meets the governmental requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The quidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed for the safety of all persons. regardless of age or health, and to account for any variations in measurements. The exposure standard for mobile devices employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The IEEE SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 watts per kilogram (W/kg), averaged over one gram of tissue. Tests for SAR are conducted using procedures accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the mobile device transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequencies. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the mobile device while operating can be below the maximum value. This is because the mobile device is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a mobile device is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) submitted to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. The highest SAR value for this mobile device when tested for use at the ear is 1.10 W/kg, and when worn on the body, as described in this guide, is 0.89 W/kg. Body-worn measurements can differ, depending upon available accessories and regulatory requirements. The SAR information includes the Motorola testing protocol, assessment procedure, and measurement uncertainty range for this product.

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various mobile devices and at various positions, they meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.

Specific Absorption Rate (ICNIRP)

Your model wireless phone meets international guidelines for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed to not exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent scientific organization ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health, and to account for any variations in measurements. The guidelines use a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The ICNIRP SAR limit for mobile devices used by the general public is 2 watts per kilogram (W/kg), and the highest SAR value for this mobile device when tested at the ear is 0.55 W/kg.
