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1. Getting started

WARNING

- Do not place your phone in the bathroom or other humid areas.

Location

When choosing a location for your new phone, here are some important guidelines you should consider:

- Avoid sources of noise and heat, such as motors, fluorescent lighting, microwave ovens, heating appliances and direct sunlight.
- Avoid areas of excessive dust, moisture and low temperature.
- Avoid other cordless telephones or personal computers.
- Never install telephone wiring during a lightning storm.
- Never install telephone jacks in wet locations unless the jack is specifically designed for wet locations.

- Never touch non-insulated telephone wires or terminals unless the telephone line has been disconnected at the network interface
- · Use caution when installing or modifying telephone lines.

HANDSET RANGE

Optimal range is reached when there are no other electrical appliances working within the range area. Any obstruction between the base and handset will also reduce the range significantly.

SIGNAL STRENGTH

When out of range of the base, the screen shows SEARCHING FOR BASE. If you are on a call, the line will hang up. Move back within in range. The handset will automatically re-connect to the base.

Setting up

The base must be plugged into the electrical outlet at all times. Do not connect the telephone line cord into the wall jack until the handset is fully charged. Only use the power adapter and telephone line cord supplied with the product.


WHICH POWER ADAPTER

The power adapter with the smaller pin plug is for the base unit and the power adapter with the bigger pin plug is for the charger unit.

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Connecting the base



- Plug the power adapter with smaller pin plug & telephone line cord into the base. Power adapter with bigger pin plug is for charger (for multi-pack only).
- 2. Plug the other end of the power adapter & telephone line cord into the wall jack.
- 3. Always use the telephone line cord provided in the box.
- 4. Use only the provided power adapter.

Install and charge the handset battery pack



- 1. Slide out the battery compartment cover.
- Place the supplied rechargeable battery pack in the battery compartment, with the battery connector plugged in, as shown.
- 3. Slide the battery compartment cover back.
- Put the handset on the base to charge for at least 24 hours.
 The will indicate when the handset is fully charged.

5. Use only the rechargeable battery pack provided.

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BATTERY LOW WARNING

If the \(\bigcap \) flashes in the display, you will need to recharge the handset before you can use it again. During charging, the \(\bigcap\) will scroll in the display.

BATTERY PERFORMANCE

In ideal conditions, a fully charged battery pack should give up to 8 hours talk time or up to 100 hours standby time on a single charge.

Note that new battery packs do not reach full capacity until they have been in normal use for several days.

To keep your battery packs in the best condition, leave the handset off the base for a few hours at a time.

Running the battery packs all the way down at least once a week will help them last as long as possible.


The charge capacity of rechargeable battery packs will reduce with time as they wear out, giving the handset less talk/standby time. Eventually they will need to be replaced.

After charging your handset for the first time, subsequent charging time is about 6-8 hours a day. The battery pack and handset may become warm during charging. This is normal.

2. Getting to know your phone Overview of your handset



1 Earpiece

2 Scroll up/ Volume up/ Phonebook

In idle mode: press to access the phonebook.
In menu mode: press to scroll up.
In editing mode: press to move the cursor to the right.
During a call: press to increase volume.
In call list/phonebook/redial list entry: press to scroll up the list.

3 Menu/Select

In idle mode: press to access main menu. In menu/editing mode: press to confirm and save the settings. During a call: press to access the sub-menu list. In phonebook/call list entry: press to edit the entry.

4 Right/ Clear/ Mute

In pre-dial/editing mode: press to delete one character/digit. Press and hold to delete all characters/digits. During an incoming call: press to silent the ringer temporarily. During a call: press to mute/unmute the call. In call list/phonebook/redial list entry: press to delete the entry.

5 Scroll down/ Volume down/ Call List

In idle mode: press to access the call list.

In menu mode: press to scroll down.

In editing mode: press to move the cursor to the left.



During a call: press to decrease volume.

Call list/phonebook/redial list entry: press to scroll down the list.

6 Talk off/ Back

In menu/editing mode/phonebook entry: press to exit to previous level.

In pre-dial mode/call list/redial list entry: press to exit to idle. During a call: press to end a call, either home call or cellular call.

Alphanumeric keypad

In idle/pre-dial/editing mode/during a call: press to enter characters/ numbers.

8 #/ Format

In idle/pre-dial/during a call mode: press to insert a "#". In phonebook entry view mode: press to view the previous digits when the number is longer than a line to display. In call list entry: press to toggle Caller ID display format among 7, 8, 10 and 11 digits.

9 Cellular

In idle mode: press to make a cellular call. During an incoming cellular call: press to answer the cellular call. Flashes rapidly when there is an incoming cellular call. Flashes slowly when a cellular call is on hold.

10 Microphone

11 Speaker

In idle/menu/pre-dial mode/during a call: press to turn on/off the speakerphone.

Call List/phonebook/redial list entry: press to make a call with speakerphone.

In idle/pre-dial/during a call mode: press to insert a "*". In phonebook entry view mode: press to view the next digits when the number is longer than a line to display.

13 Talk on/ Flash

In idle/menu/pre-dial mode: press to make a home call.

Call List/phonebook/redial list entry: press to make a home call to the selected entry.

During an incoming home call: press to answer the home call. During a call: press to make a flash.

Flashes rapidly when there is an incoming home call. Flashes slowly when a home call is on hold.

14 Left/ Redial List/ Pause

In idle/pre-dial mode/during a call: press to access the redial list. In editing mode: press and hold to insert a dialing pause.

15 Hold

During a call: press to put the call on hold.



Overview of the base



1 CHARGING LED - GREEN

Steadily ON: When the handset is put into base cradle for charging.

2 IN USE LED – RED

Steadily ON: When the handset is in use, when the answering machine is answering an incoming call or when you are registering a handset.



Flashes when another telephone is in use on the same line, or when you are de-registering handset(s) from the base. Flashes rapidly when there is an incoming call.

3 BLUETOOTH LEDs - BLUE

Steadily ON: Bluetooth device is paired to the base. Flashes: Bluetooth device is during the pairing up process. (Only one LED corresponding to the Bluetooth key will behave as above at the same time.)

OFF: If Bluetooth device is disconnected.

4 VOLUME +

Increase the loudspeaker volume by one level (1 to 8) volume during message playback.

In Idle or during call screening: Base speaker volume levels 1 to 8 are available. (Level 1 means speaker volume off)

5 DELETE

During message playback: Delete the current message. In Idle: Press and hold to erase all read messages (applicable only when messages in answering machine are all read)

SKIP FORWARD/ MEMO

During message playback: Press to skip to play the next message.

In Idle: Press and hold to start recording a memo after hearing a long beep. Release key to stop memo recording.

7 PLAY/ STOP

In message playback mode: Press to playback or stop playing messages.

8 VOLUME -

Decrease the loudspeaker volume by one level (1 to 8) during message playback.

In Idle or during call screening: Base speaker volume levels 1 to 8 are available. (Level 1 means speaker volume off)

9 SKIP BACKWARD

During message playback: Press once to repeat the currently playing message. Press twice to playback the previous message.

10 ANNOUNCE

In Idle: Short press to play the current announcement. Press and hold to start recording the personalized announcement of the current answer mode after hearing a long beep. Release key to stop recording.

- 11 ANSWER ON/OFF/ ANNOUNCE MODE
 Toggle among: Switch the answering machine on/off.
- 12 CHARGING CRADLE



13 BLUETOOTH KEYS

In Idle, to pair up Bluetooth cellular: Press any one for 2s to initiate cellular pairing mode, the 7-seg LED will display and flash "C x" to initiate cellular pairing mode. X can be 1 or 2 and it depends on which key user pressed.

In idle, to pair up Bluetooth headset: Press and hold for more than 5 sec, the 7-seg LED will display and flash "H" to initiate headset pairing mode.

Press to find/page all registered handsets.

Paging

Paging is useful if you misplace your handset(s).

To start the paging tone:

- Press (ND) on the base.
 - This starts the paging tone on the handset(s) for 60 seconds.

NOTE

When paging, if you press or on a handset, the ringer of the handset will be silent but the handset paging feature will not be canceled.

To stop the paging tone:

Press ∑, 益, or any keypad key (□--s, ★, or -s) on the handset(s),

OR

Press (ND) again on the base.

NOTE

The handset ringer volume also determines the level of the paging tone. If the handset ringer volume level is set to off, that handset will be silent for all calls and paging.

Navigating the menus

- 1. Press 🖸
- 2. Press (a) to scroll through the menu.
- 3. Press \Box to open a sub-menu or validate an option.
- Press
 to go back to previous menu level or cancel an action.

If you do not press any button for 30 seconds the display will automatically return to standby.

3. Using the phone

3.1 Introducing Bluetooth

Your new telephone system with Bluetooth wireless technology has the following features:

- Pair Bluetooth enabled mobile phone and (or) headset with the telephone base. Two Bluetooth devices can be paired up in maximum, and they can be two Bluetooth enabled mobile phones or one mobile phone plus one headset.
- Connect a mobile phone to make and receive CELLULAR calls, or connect a headset to receive CELLULAR calls. Two mobile phones can be paired but only one paired mobile phone can be connected on a call at a time.
- Make and receive calls using your mobile phone plan while benefiting from the ease and comfort of your home telephone system.

Glossary of terms

Below are some terms used in this user's guide to help you become familiar with using your Bluetooth devices and your new telephone system.



Bluetooth mobile phone - Refers to a Bluetooth enabled mobile telephone.

CELLULAR line - The communications service provided through your Bluetooth enabled mobile telephone.

HOME line - Your conventional telephone land line.

Connected - A Bluetooth device can only be used when it is connected to the telephone base.

Paired Devices - Once a Bluetooth device has been paired with the telephone base, it will be identified as registered to the telephone base.

Pairing - This refers to the process of two Bluetooth devices registering device information with each other. The telephone base must be paired with a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone before the Bluetooth device can be used. Depending on the manufacturer, this may also be referred to as **Bonding**.

PIN - By default, the PIN is 0000 for the base and for most Bluetooth devices. PIN information must be exchanged between Bluetooth devices before they can be used. This is also known as a passkey or passcode.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- Refer to your mobile phone user's guide for more information about its Bluetooth function.
- Make sure that your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is between one to 12 feet away from the telephone base in order to maintain a clear and consistent connection between your Bluetooth mobile phone, telephone base and cell tower.
- Make sure that your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone has sufficient signal strength. You may need to move the Bluetooth enabled mobile phone and telephone base to a location where the cellular signal may be stronger.
- Charge your Bluetooth mobile phone while it is connected to the telephone base because your mobile phone's battery will discharge faster while it is connected wirelessly to the telephone base.
- Monitor your mobile phone's usage because airtime is deducted from your cellular plan for the duration of the CELLULAR calls.

Refer to the "Bluetooth setup" section to learn how to set up your Bluetooth device. Refer to the "Pairing a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone" section on how to operate your



Bluetooth devices with your new telephone system with Bluetooth wireless technology.

3.2 Bluetooth setup

To use a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone with your telephone, you must first pair and connect your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone with the telephone base.

Pairing a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone Before you begin, make sure that your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is not connected to any other Bluetooth device.

Refer to your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone user's manual to learn how to search for or add new Bluetooth devices.

- 1. Press and hold either of the Bluetooth buttons on the telephone base until the corresponding Bluetooth LED is flashing, and the 7-seg LED on base will display and flash "C1" or "C2" (for pairing Bluetooth enabled mobile phone), depending on which button you would like to use first. Or it will display and flash "H" (for pairing Bluetooth headset). The Bluetooth feature is activated.
- Using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, turn on the Bluetooth feature and search for a new device.

- Once your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone has found the Motorola B801/B802/B803/B804/B805 telephone base, select it.
- Using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, enter the PIN of the telephone base (the default PIN is 0000) to continue the pairing process.

Pairing a Bluetooth headset

- 1. Follow step 1 as in section "Pairing a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone".
- 2. Using your Bluetooth headset, turn on the Bluetooth feature and search for a new device.
- **3.** Follow the user's guide of your Bluetooth headset to finish the pairing process.

NOTE

Only Bluetooth headsets with passkey 0000 can be paired with the telephone base system.

Bluetooth headset application supports incoming HOME calls only.

When a device is successfully connected, the light of the **Bluetooth** button you just pressed and held on the telephone base will be on steadily. And the Bluetooth status icon will display on the handset screen. If Bluetooth enabled



mobile phone(s) paired up, sequence number or (depending on which Bluetooth button you just pressed and held) will also be displayed.

If you would like to pair another Bluetooth device, please repeat the steps above. Be sure to activate a Bluetooth button which is NOT paired to another Bluetooth device (indicated by the Bluetooth LED light on the base being OFF). If you activate a Bluetooth button which is already paired to another Bluetooth device (indicated by the Bluetooth LED light on the base being ON) this will terminate the connection of the Bluetooth device that was attached and start the process to connect a new Bluetooth device.

Auto connection

Once you have paired a device with the telephone base, the pairing information is stored in the telephone base. If the paired device becomes disconnected, the telephone base will automatically search and re-connect to that device. If the connection does not resume in a minute, you will need to reconnect to that device manually, refer to the section below for details.

Manual connection

To manually re-connect a paired device, make sure the Bluetooth feature is turned on in your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, select Motorola B801/B802/B803/B804/B805 from the paired device list in your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone. Once the connection is established again, the corresponding Bluetooth button which you used to pair up the Bluetooth device on the telephone base will turn back on.

Turning off the auto connection

If you do not want the telephone base to re-connect to a paired device automatically after it is disconnected, you can turn off the auto connection feature manually. In order to turn off the auto connection, you will need to initiate a disconnection from the paired Bluetooth enabled mobile phone; this will transmit a signal to the telephone base and disable the auto connection.

While the Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is connected to the telephone base, find the Bluetooth enabled mobile phone's Bluetooth device list and select **Motorola B801/B802/B803/B804/B805** to manually disconnect the device. (If disconnection is not an option on your Bluetooth enabled



mobile phone, you may need to disable Bluetooth or unpair the telephone base.) Refer to your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone's user's guide for instructions. The telephone base will not search and re-connect to this Bluetooth enabled mobile phone until this feature is activated again.

To resume the auto connection

To resume the auto connection between the paired device(s) and the telephone base, you will need to connect the device(s) manually. Make sure the Bluetooth feature is turned on in your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone. Select Motorola B801/B802/B803/B804/B805 from the paired device list in your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone to reconnect. If the connection is successfully resumed, the status icon will display on the handset screen, and the Bluetooth LED of the corresponding Bluetooth button on the telephone base will be on steadily.

NOTE

If the connection between the paired device and the telephone base does not resume by manually connecting the device on the paired device list, you will need to unpair or de-register the device from the Bluetooth enabled mobile

phone. Make sure the device is no longer on the paired list after de-registration; then follow the steps in section "Pairing a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone" or "Pairing a Bluetooth headset" as above to start the pairing procedures again.

Replace a paired device

If you want to pair and connect a new device when there are already two devices paired with the telephone base, press and hold the **Bluetooth** button (which you want to terminate the corresponding connection) on the telephone base until the corresponding Bluetooth LED is flashing, the connection via this Bluetooth button will be terminated automatically, then start with step two of section "Pairing a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone" or "Pairing a Bluetooth headset". If you do not pair a new device within two minutes, the Bluetooth LED flashes on the telephone base will turn off and the system will return to idle mode.

3.3 Calls

3.3.1 Make a HOME call

Press or , then enter the telephone number.



3.3.2 On-hook dialing (pre-dialing)

- 1. Enter the telephone number. Press 😏 or 🖃 to make corrections when entering the phone number.
- 2. Press 🕒 or 🍱 to dial.

3.3.3 Answer a HOME call

• Press or ...

3.3.4 End a HOME call

 Press
 or return the handset to the telephone base or charger.

The screen displays the elapsed time as you talk (in hours, minutes and seconds).

3.3.5 Call waiting on the HOME line

If you subscribe to call waiting service with your local telephone service provider, you will hear a beep if someone calls while you are already on a call.

Press \(\subseteq \) to put your current call on hold and take the new call. You can press \(\subseteq \) at any time to switch back and forth between calls.

3.3.6 Receive a CELLULAR call while on a HOME call

While on a **HOME** call and there is an incoming **CELLULAR** call, an on the handset will flash and you will hear a short beep.

To answer the incoming CELLULAR call:

 Press on the handset. The HOME call will automatically be placed on hold and will start flashing.

To end the CELLULAR call:

To resume the **HOME** call already on hold:

Press on the handset.

NOTE

If you have voicemail service active on your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, and you do not answer the incoming **CELLULAR** call, the call will be answered by your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone's voicemail. Contact your cellular service provider for more information about voicemail service.



3.3.7 Make a CELLULAR call

- 1. Enter the telephone number, and then press
- Press to make corrections when entering the phone number.
- 3. If there is only one Bluetooth enabled mobile phone paired up, press \(\bar{\cute} \) or \(\bar{\cute} \) again to dial out. Or if there are two Bluetooth enabled mobile phones paired up, press \(\bar{\cute} \) to select the desired one, and then press \(\bar{\cute} \) or \(\bar{\cute} \) in dial out

OR

- Press . If there is only one Bluetooth enabled mobile phone paired up, press . or . again to enter dial mode. Or if there are two Bluetooth enabled mobile phones paired up, press . to select the desired one. And then press . or .
- Enter the telephone number. Press to make corrections when entering the phone number.
- 3. Press 🖭 to dial out.

NOTES

 Some Bluetooth enabled mobile phones may have a default setting that disables the feature of making a call

- through the Bluetooth connection. Make sure this setting is enabled before making a **CELLULAR** call.
- 2. You may hear interference if your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is too close to the telephone base during a CELLULAR call. Make sure that your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is between one to 12 feet away from the telephone base in order to maintain a reliable connection between your Bluetooth mobile phone, telephone base, and cell tower.

3.3.8 Answer a CELLULAR call

Press or ...

3.3.9 End a CELLULAR call

- **3.3.10** Call waiting on the CELLULAR line
 If you subscribe to call waiting service provided by your
 cellular service provider, you will hear one or more beeps if
 you have an incoming CELLULAR call while already on a
 call. Press to put your current call on hold and take the
 new call. You can press at any time to switch back and
 forth between calls.



3.3.11 Receive a HOME call while on a CELLULAR call

While on a **CELLULAR** call and there is an incoming **HOME** call, $\[\]$ will flash on the handset and you will hear a short beep.

To answer the incoming **HOME** call:

Press
 on the handset. The CELLULAR line call will
 automatically be placed on hold and
 will start flashing.

To end the HOME call:

Press
 on the handset. The CELLULAR line will still
be on hold. CELL LINE HELD will appear on the display.

To resume the CELLULAR call on hold:

Press on the handset.

NOTE

If the answering system is on and you do not answer an incoming **HOME** call while on the **CELLULAR** line, the incoming **HOME** line call will be answered by the answering system.

3.3.12 Handset speakerphone

During a call, you can press to alternate between handsfree speakerphone and normal handset use. Press to

hang up. For increased sound quality while using the speakerphone, place the handset on a flat surface with the keypad facing up.

NOTES

- When the battery is low, the speakerphone will be disabled. However, if the handset enters low battery mode while you are using the speakerphone, the call will remain in speakerphone mode until you hang up.
- 2. When the battery is low, you cannot switch a call from normal handset use to speakerphone mode.

3.3.13 Call from the redial list

To view the five most recently dialed numbers:

- Press to display the most recently called number (up to 30 digits).
- 2. Press (a) or (b) repeatedly to view up to five recently called numbers

The handset will beep twice at the beginning and at the end of the list. Press 🖾 to exit.



To redial a number:

Press \(\subseteq \) or \(\subseteq \) to dial the displayed number from the HOME line.

OR

Press
 to dial the displayed number from the CELLULAR line.

OR

Press
 or
 , then to call the most recently called number (up to 30 digits).

While reviewing the redial memory, press o to delete the displayed number.

3.3.14 Call from the phonebook

Press (a) to access the phonebook. To dial a displayed number from the directory, press (b) or (a) to dial from the **HOME** line; or press (b) to dial from the **CELLULAR** line.

3.3.15 Call from the call list

Press (a) to access the call list. To dial a displayed number from the caller ID history, press (b) or (a) to dial from the **HOME** line, or press (b) to dial from the **CELLULAR** line.

OR

331-3383 1-331-3383 888-331-3383 1-888-331-3383

You may also press repeatedly to add or remove a 1 in front of the telephone number before dialing or saving the telephone number in the directory. See the examples as below:

331-3383 1-331-3383 Or 888-331-3383 1-888-331-3383

When the number displayed is in the correct format for dialing, following the above step to dial the number.



3.3.16 Volume control

To adjust the listening volume on a handset: Press (a) to adjust the listening volume when on a call. Each press of the button increases or decreases the volume level by one increment.

NOTES

- All volume settings (handset and speakerphone) are independent.
- When the volume reaches the minimum or maximum setting, you will hear two beeps.

3.3.17 Multiple handset use

You can conference with another system handset while you are on a HOME or CELLULAR call. However, you cannot conference between a HOME call and a CELLULAR call. A maximum of two handsets can be used on an outside call. If a handset is already on a HOME call and you would like to join the call, press \(\sigma\) or \(\sigma\) on another system handset.

OR

If a handset is already on a **CELLULAR** call and you would like to join the call, press ⓐ on another system handset. Press ② or place the handset in the telephone base or

charger to end the call. The call will not be terminated until all handsets hang up.

NOTE

A maximum of four handsets can be used at a time. When two handsets are being used on either the **HOME** or **CELLULAR** call, the other two system handsets can be used for a call on the line that is not being used.

3.3.18 Mute

The mute function allows you to turn off the microphone. You can hear the caller, but the caller will not be able to hear you.

To mute a call:

 Press to turn off the microphone. When mute is on, the handset screen will show MUTED for a few seconds and the MUTE icon will be shown until mute is turned off.

To un-mute a call:

 Press again and resume speaking. When mute is turned off, MICROPHONE ON will display temporarily on the handset screen.



3.3.19 Hold

You can place a **HOME** or **CELLULAR** call on hold. You will hear an alert tone if you have not taken the call off of hold after 14 minutes. You will hear another alert tone 30 seconds later. At 15 minutes on hold, the call will automatically disconnect.

To place a HOME call on hold:

To resume a **HOME** call that is on hold:

Press \(\sigma\) again.

To place a CELLULAR call on hold:

Press the key on the handset. CELL LINE HELD will appear on the display and will flash.

To resume a CELLULAR call that is on hold:

Press the again.

3.3.20 Temporary ringer silencing

Press \square or \bigcirc while the telephone is ringing to silence the ringer temporarily. This will silence the ringer without

disconnecting the call. The next incoming call will ring normally at the preset volume.

NOTE

Each handset will ring when there is an incoming call unless the ringer volume is turned off. Pressing 🖾 or 💮 on one handset will only silence the ringer of that particular handset.

3.3.21 Chain dialing

This feature allows you to initiate a dialing sequence from numbers stored in the directory, caller ID history or redial list while you are on a call. This feature is available only when you are making a **HOME** call.

Chain dialing can be useful if you wish to access numbers other than phone numbers (such as bank account information or access codes) from the directory, caller ID history or redial list.

Directory

- 1. Press Ti twice.
- 2. Press (2) to scroll to the desired number.
- **3.** Press \boxdot to dial the displayed number.



Caller ID history (call log)

- 1. Press
- 2. Press (a) to scroll to >CALL LOG.
- 3. Press 🖳
- 4. Press (to scroll to the desired number.
- **5.** Press \boxdot to dial the displayed number.

Last number redial (redial list)

Press to display and dial the most recently dialed number. If you press again within two seconds, the number will not be dialed.

NOTES

- 1. You cannot edit a directory entry while you are on a call.
- 2. You cannot copy a caller ID entry into the directory while you are on a call.
- 3. While on a call, only the most recently called number can be reviewed, and erasing the entry is not allowed.
- 4. Press To exit redial, directory or caller ID history when you are on a call.

3.4 Intercom

Use the intercom feature for conversations between handsets. You can buy additional expansion handsets for this telephone base. Up to 5 handsets can be registered to the telephone base.

The first five handsets that you register will be named Handset 1-5. Use the handset number to intercom and transfer calls.

3.4.1 Call another handset

- 1. Press when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.
- 2. Use (a) to scroll to >INTERCOM, then press \(\bar{\cup}\).
- The screen will show CALLING OTHER HANDSET. The called handset will ring, and its screen will show OTHER HANDSET IS CALLING.

To end the intercom call:

- Press
 on either handset.
 OR
- · Place either handset in the charger or telephone base.



NOTES

- 1. Before the intercom call is answered, you can cancel the intercom call by pressing
 a on the calling handset.
- If the called handset is not answered within 100 seconds, or if it is in the directory or caller ID history mode, or on a call, or out of range, the calling handset will show the message UNABLE TO CALL TRY AGAIN.
- Pressing a or will temporarily silence the intercom ringer.
- **3.4.2** Transfer an external call to another handset Use the intercom feature to transfer an outside call to another system handset.
- Use to scroll to >TRANSFER, then press . The
 outside call is automatically placed on hold. The
 transferring handset's screen will show CALLING OTHER
 HANDSET. The called handset will ring, and its screen will
 show OTHER HANDSET IS CALLING.

- On the ringing handset, press \(\subseteq \) or \(\subseteq \) to answer the intercom call. You can now talk without the outside caller hearing the conversation.
- 4. Press an on the transferring handset or place it in the telephone base or handset charger to complete the transfer. The transferring handset's screen will show CALL TRANSFERED and the other handset will automatically be connected to the outside call.

OR

Press \(\subseteq \) or \(\begin{align*} \text{depending on which call is being transferred)} \) on the called handset to let both parties conference with the external line.

NOTES

- Before the intercom call is answered, you can cancel the transfer and return to the outside call by pressing and holding <a>[
- If the called handset does not answer the intercom call within 100 seconds, is in directory or caller ID history mode, or is out of range, the transferring handset will show UNABLE TO CALL TRY AGAIN on its screen and



 You can end the intercom call and return to the outside call by pressing or (depending on which call is being transferred) on the transferring handset, or pressing on the called handset.

4. Phonebook

The directory is stored in the telephone base, and is shared by all handsets. Changes made to the directory on any one handset will apply to all.

NOTE

Only one handset can review the directory at a time. If another handset attempts to enter the directory, the screen will display NOT AVAILABLE AT THIS TIME.

The directory can store up to 100 entries, with a maximum of 15 alphanumeric characters (including spaces) for the names and 30 digits for the telephone numbers. A convenient search feature can help you find and dial numbers quickly. If there are already 100 entries, the screen will display LIST FULL. You will not be able to store a new number until an existing one is deleted.

4.1 View an Entry

 Press when in idle mode to display the first entry in the directory. DIRECTORY EMPTY will be displayed if there are no directory entries.

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OR

You can also display the first entry in the directory by pressing \boxdot twice, then pressing \boxdot again to choose >REVIEW

Press to browse through the directory. Entries will be displayed alphabetically by the first letter in the name.

4.2 Add an Entry

- . Press $\overline{\ }$ when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.
- 2. Press again to enter >DIRECTORY menu.
- 3. Press (a) to select >STORE.
- 4. Press 🗀.
- 5. Enter the telephone number when prompted.
 - Use the keypad to enter up to 30 digits.
 - Press () to move the cursor to the right or left.
 - Press o to erase digits.
 - Press and hold o to erase all digits.
 - Press and hold on to enter a three-second dialing pause.

OR

- Copy a number from redial by pressing ⊕ then press ⊕, or pressing ⊕ repeatedly to locate the number to copy. Press ⊡ to copy the number.
- 6. Press \(\subseteq \) to save the number in the display. The display will show ALREADY SAVED if the number is already in the directory. The same number cannot be saved twice.
- 7. Enter the name when prompted.
 - Use the keypad to enter a name (up to 15 characters). Each time a key is pressed, the character on that key will be displayed. Additional key presses will produce other characters on that key. Please refer to the character map in section 2 before.
 - Press (a) to move the cursor to the right or left.
 - Press of to erase letters.
 - Press and hold of to erase all letters.
- 8. Press \(\subseteq \text{to store your new directory entry.} \) The name and the telephone number will then be shown on the screen.

NOTE

The first letter of every word will be capitalized. The remaining letters in a word begin with lower case letters shown in the chart to the right.

4.3 Edit an Entry

When a directory entry is displayed:

- Press
 [□] to modify the entry. You will be prompted to EDIT NUMBER. Press the keypad keys to add digits.
 - Press 🗇 to erase digits.
 - Press to move the cursor to the right or left. Press and hold to add a three-second pause if desired.
 - Copy a number from redial by pressing ⊕ then press
 ⊕, or pressing ⊕ repeatedly to locate the number to copy. Press ⊡ to copy the number.
- 2. Press \(\subseteq \). You will be prompted to EDIT NAME.
 - \bullet Press the keypad keys to add characters.
 - Press of to erase characters.
 - Press (to move the cursor to the right or left.
- 3. Press $\overline{\ }$ to confirm.

4.4 Delete an Entry

When a directory entry is displayed, press to delete the displayed entry from the directory. Once deleted, an entry cannot be retrieved.

4.5 Directory search

To search by name

- Press when in idle mode to display the first listing in the directory. DIRECTORY EMPTY will be displayed if there are no directory entries.
- - The directory will display the first name beginning with the first letter associated with the keypad key if there is an entry in the directory that begins with that letter.
- To see other names that start with the letters on the same keypad key, keep pressing the key. The names will be shown in alphabetical order.
 - For example, if you have the names Jennifer, Jessie, Kevin and Linda in your directory:



- If you press -5- once, you will see Jennifer.
- If you press •5* twice, you will see Jessie.
- If you press three times, you will see Kevin.
- If you press -5 four times, you will see Linda.
- If you press -5- five times, you will see Jennifer again.

NOTES

- If there is no name matching the first letter of the key you press, you will see a name that matches the following letters of the key.
- If you press a key ([2m]) and no name starts with the letters on that key, the directory will show the entry that matches the next letter in the directory.

5. Caller ID

This product supports caller ID services provided by most local telephone service companies. Depending on your service subscription, you may see the caller's number or the caller's name and number which are sent by the telephone company after the first or second ring. Caller ID from the **HOME** line allows you to see the name, number, date and time of the incoming call. However, caller ID from the **CELLULAR** line only shows the number of the incoming call and the Bluetooth name of the paired Bluetooth enabled mobile phone; date and time of the call will not be shown.

Caller ID with call waiting lets you see the name and telephone number of the caller before answering the telephone, even when on another call. For incoming **HOME** calls, the time and date will also be sent by the telephone service provider along with the caller ID information. For incoming **CELLULAR** calls, only the caller's number and the Bluetooth name of the paired Bluetooth enabled mobile phone will be provided.

These services are available only if both you and the caller

are in areas offering caller ID service, and if both telephone companies use compatible equipment. Contact your local telephone company and cellular service provider if:

- You have both caller ID and call waiting, but as separate services (you may need to combine these services).
- You have only caller ID service, or only call waiting service.
- You don't subscribe to any caller ID or call waiting services.

You can use this product with regular caller ID service, or you can use this product's other features without subscribing to either caller ID or combined caller ID with call waiting service.

5.1 Caller ID history information

If you subscribe to caller ID services, provided by your local telephone company and/or cellular service provider, caller ID history stores information about the last 50 incoming calls for both the HOME and CELLULAR lines.

Although the caller ID history records the caller ID information of both lines, caller ID entries from the **CELLULAR** line only provide the incoming telephone

number and the Bluetooth name of the Bluetooth enabled mobile phone. If the number on the incoming **CELLULAR** call matches a number in the directory, the name will be retrieved from the matched directory entry. However, if the caller's number is not provided from the **CELLULAR** line, the screen will only display **INCOMING CALL** without showing the Bluetooth name of the device.

Review the caller ID history to find out who called, to easily return the call, or to copy the caller's name and number into your directory. The phone deletes the earliest entry when the log is full to make room for new calls. If you answer a call before the information appears on the screen, it will not be saved in the caller ID history. The caller ID history is stored in the telephone base, and is shared by all handsets. Changes made on any one handset will be reflected in all.

NOTE

Only one handset can review the caller ID history at a time. If another handset attempts to enter the directory or caller ID history, it will display NOT AVAILABLE AT THIS TIME.

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5.2 Memory match

If the the last 7 digits of the incoming telephone number match that of a number stored in your directory, the name that appears on the screen will match the corresponding name in your directory. For example, if Christine Smith calls, her name will appear as Chris if this is how you entered into your directory.

There are also occasions when other information or no information is displayed for various reasons:

PRIVATE NUMBER: The caller's number has been set as private.

PRIVATE NAME: The caller's name has been set as private.

PRIVATE CALLER: Caller's name and number are not revealed at caller's request.

UNKNOWN NUMBER: Your local telephone company is unable to determine the caller's number.

UNKNOWN NAME: Your local telephone company is unable to determine the caller's name.

UNKNOWN CALLER: Your local telephone company is unable to determine the caller's name and number. Calls from other countries may also generate this message.

5.3 Missed (new) calls indicator

When a handset is in idle mode and has calls that have not been reviewed, its screen will show XX MISSED CALLS.

All entries which have not been reviewed will be counted as missed calls when the phone is idle. Each time an entry in the caller ID history marked NEW is reviewed, the number of missed calls decreases by one.

If you have too many missed calls and you do not want to review them one by one, but you still want to keep them in the caller ID history, you can press and hold \Box for four seconds when the handset is idle. All the entries in the caller ID history will be considered old (have been reviewed), and the missed calls counter is reset to 0.

5.4 View the call list

You can also review the caller ID history by pressing \boxdot , and using $\textcircled{\oplus}$ to scroll to >CALL LOG, and then press \boxdot .

2. Press it to scroll through the list.



5.5 Save a number from the call list to the phonebook

- 1. Follow steps 1 and 2 in section 5.4.
- 2. Press ⊡ to copy the entry into your directory. You can edit the name and the number.
- 3. Press To save.

NOTES

- You may need to change how a caller ID number will be dialed if the entry is not displayed in the correct format. Caller ID numbers may appear with an area code which may not be required for local calls, or without a 1 which may be needed for long distance calls.
- If neither the name nor number is provided, UNABLE TO SAVE will be displayed.

5.6 Delete one (all) call list entry (entries)

- Press of to delete the displayed entry from the caller ID history.
- 2. When an entry from the caller ID history is displayed, press and hold to delete all entries from the caller ID

history. When the screen displays <code>DELETE ALL CALLS?</code>, <code>press</code> $\[\]$ to clear the caller ID history of all entries, or <code>press</code> $\[\]$ to exit and leave all entries in the caller ID history intact.

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6. Personal settings

Using the feature menu, you can customize many of the telephone's settings.

- 1. Press \Box when in idle mode (when the phone is not in use) to enter the feature menu.
- Use (a) to scroll to the feature to be changed. When scrolling through the menu, the top menu item is always highlighted with a > symbol.
- 3. Press \(\subseteq \text{to select the highlighted item.} \)

NOTE

Press to cancel an operation, back up to the previous menu or exit the menu display. Press and hold to return to idle mode.

6.1 Set date and time

Provided you have subscribed to your network's caller ID service, the date and time will be set automatically with every incoming call, but you may still need to set the correct year so that the day of the week can be calculated from the caller ID information.

- 1. Press \supseteq when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.
- Press (to scroll to >DATE & TIME.
- 3. Press \supseteq and then edit the date.
- 4. Press Tand edit the time in 12hr format

TIPS

Press to move the cursor left or right. Press 1 to toggle AM/PM settings, wherever the cursor blinks.

5. Press To save.

6.2 Setup Handset

6.2.1 Ringer volume

Using this menu, you can set the ringer volume level (1-6), or turn the ringer off. When the ringer is turned off, appears on the handset screen. The volume setting applies to both **HOME** and **CELLULAR** calls.

To adjust the RINGER VOLUME:

- 1. Press \supseteq when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.
- 2. Press (a) to scroll to >SETUP HS.
- 3. Press

 i to select >RINGER VOLUME.

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- 4. Press (a) to sample each volume level. Level 1 to 5 and Ringer Off are available.
- 5. Press \(\tau \) to save your preference and return to the feature menu

NOTE

The ringer volume also determines the ringer volume of the intercom calls and the paging tone for the handset locator feature. If the handset ringer volume is set to off, that handset is silenced for all incoming calls and paging.

6.2.2 Ringer tone

You can select different ringer tones for the **HOME** and CELLULAR calls. You may choose one of 10 ringer tones.

To choose a ringer tone for the **HOME** line:

- Press \in \text{when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.}
- Press (2) to scroll to >SETUP HS. Press \(\tau \) and \(\bar{\omega} \) to select >RINGER TONE.
- Press To select >HOME TONE.
- Press \(\subseteq \) and \(\bar{\omega} \) to get to the next ringer tone and to hear a sample of it.

6.	Press	$\overline{}$ to save your preference and return to the
	feature	e menu.

To choose a ringer tone for the CELLULAR line:

- Press \(\cdot \) when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.
- Press (2) to scroll to >SETUP HS.
- Press in and in to select >RINGER TONE.
- Press and (a) to scroll to >CELLULAR TONE.
- **5.** Press \Box and 2 to get to the next ringer tone and to hear a sample of it.
- **6.** Press \(\subseteq \) to save your preference and return to the feature menu

6.2.3 Alert tones

To turn the alert tones on or off:

- 1. Press \infty when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.
- Press (2) to scroll to >SETUP HS.
- Press in and in to select >TONES.
- Press \(\cdot\) to select >KEY TONE.

Or

Press and to select >BATTERY LOW.



Or

4. Press \(\bar{\cup} \) and \(\bar{\cup} \) to select >OUT OF RANGE.

Press and to select 0N or 0FF.

6. Press \(\subseteq \) to save your preference and return to the feature menu.

6.2.4 Language

In this menu, you can select the language used for all screen displays. When the menu language is changed, the voice prompt language of answering machine will also be changed accordingly. Specific performance may be different from countries.

To select a language:

1. Press \bigcirc when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.

Press (2) to scroll to >SETUP HS.

 ☐ to select ENGLISH, FRANCAIS or ESPANOL.

Press ☐ to save your preference and return to the feature menu.

6.2.5 Handset reset

1. Press \(\subseteq \) when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.

Press (a) to scroll to >SETUP HS.

3. Press in and in to select >RESET.

Press \(\subseteq \) and RESET? will be prompted.

5. Press \(\subseteq \) to confirm and reset all the personalized settings of handset to default.

6.3 Setup Base

6.3.1 Set the base ring volume

1. Press when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.

2. Press to scroll to >SETUP BS.

Press \(\subset \) to select >B\$ RING VOL.

 Press
 and
 to select RINGER OFF, RINGER LOW or RINGER HIGH.

Press ☐ to save your preference and return to the feature menu.

6.3.2 Visual message waiting (voicemail) indicator

If you subscribe to a voicemail service offered by your local telephone company, the voicemail waiting indicator feature

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will provide a visual indication when you have new voicemail messages.

NEW VOICEMAIL and the **icon** will appear on the handset screen(s).

NOTE

This feature does not indicate new answering system messages recorded on your phone.

6.3.2.1 Clear voicemail indication

Use this feature when the telephone indicates there is new voicemail but there is none (for example, when you have accessed your voicemail while away from home). This feature only turns off the displayed NEW VOICEMAIL message and icon; it does not delete your voicemail message(s). As long as you have new voicemail messages, your local telephone company will continue to send the signal to activate the visual message waiting indicator.

To manually turn off the new voicemail indicator:

- 1. Press when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.
- Press (2) to scroll to >SETUP BS.
- 3. Press ☐ and ⑤ to select >CLR VOICEMAIL. Press ⊡.

Press
 ☐ again to turn the voicemail indication off, or press
 ☐ to cancel the procedure.

NOTES

- Telephone company voicemail may alert you to new messages with stutter (broken) dial tone. Contact your telephone company for more details.
- 2. For information about using your voicemail service, contact your telephone company for assistance.

6.3.3 Home area code

If you dial seven digits to make a local call (no area code required), program your area code into the telephone as the home area code. After setting, if you receive a call from within your home area code, the caller ID history will only display the seven digits of the telephone number.

- 1. Press when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.
- Press (2) to scroll to >SETUP BS.
- 3. Press \boxdot and \$ to select >HOME AREA CODE. Press \boxdot .
- Press the keypad keys to enter a three-digit home area code. Press to delete digit while entering.
- 5. Press \boxdot to save and return to the main menu.



NOTE

If, in the future, your telephone service provider requires you to dial 10 digits to make a local call (area code + phone number), re-program the home area code by following the steps above. With the home area code displayed, press and hold to remove the contents. The home area code will now be restored to its default setting of

6.3.4 Base reset

Press \Box when in idle mode to enter the feature menu.

- 1. Press (a) to scroll to >SETUP BS.
- Press and to select >RESET.
- 3. Press in and RESET? will be prompted.
- Press
 ☐ to confirm and reset all the personalized settings of base to default.

7. Registration

Your new telephone system can accommodate up to 5 handsets. You can add new handsets to your telephone system, but each device must be registered with the telephone base before use.

7.1 Register a handset

Handsets purchased separately need to be registered to the telephone base before use. When first purchased, all expansion handsets will show NOT REGISTERED on the screen. The new handset(s) may need to be charged for five minutes before registering to the telephone base.

- Place the unregistered handset into the telephone base.
 If PRESS FIND FOR 4 SEC ON BASE does not appear on the handset screen after a few seconds, remove the handset and place it in the telephone base again.
- On the telephone base, press and hold for about four seconds (until the red IN USE light on the telephone base turns on and flashes slowly) and then release the button. The handset will show PLEASE WAIT... and it will

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take about 10 seconds to complete the registration. The handset will display HANDSET X REGISTERED, with X denotes the handset number (1-6). There will be a beep sound if the registration is successful.

NOTES

- If the registration is not successful, the display will show NOT REGISTERED. To reset the handset, remove the handset from the telephone base and place it back in. Try the registration process again.
- 2. You cannot register a handset if any other system handset is in use.

7.2 De-register all handsets

You may need to de-register your handsets if:

You have five registered handsets and need to replace a unit. OR

You wish to change the designated handset number of your registered handsets.

You must first de-register ALL the handsets, and then reregister each handset you wish to use. Please read carefully through all the instructions on this page before beginning the de-registration process.

- Press and hold end on the telephone base for about 10 seconds (until the IN USE light turns on and starts to flash quickly), then release the end button.
- 2. Immediately press and release again. You must press while the IN USE light is still flashing. (The light flashes for about seven seconds. If the light stops flashing, pick up the handset and place it back into the telephone base, then start again with step one above.)
- The handset(s) will show SEARCHING FOR BASE and it will take about 10 seconds to complete the de-registration process. ALL handsets will show NOT REGISTERED if deregistration was successful.
- To re-register the handset(s) to the telephone base, follow the registration instructions as section above.

NOTES

If the de-registration process was not successful, you
may need to reset the system and try again. To reset:
pick up the handset and press the button, then press



the 🗀 button and place the handset back into the telephone base. You may also reset by unplugging the power from the telephone base and plugging it back in.

You cannot de-register the handset(s) if any other system handset is in use.

8. USING YOUR ANSWERING MACHINE

The answering machine records unanswered calls when it is activated. It can store up to 99 messages within the maximum recording time of 14 minutes.

I cannot pair my mobile phone to the telephone base

- Make sure the Bluetooth function of your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is turned on. See your mobile phone user's manual for more information.

 When you dial a number, you should hear tones. If you hear clicks, the phone is not a touch-tone telephone and cannot activate the answering system.
- The answering system may not detect the remote access code while your announcement is playing. Try waiting until the announcement is over before entering the code.
- There may be interference on the phone line you are using. Press the keypad keys firmly.

System does not record message

- Make sure the answering system is on.
- Make sure the memory of the answering system is not full. Delete some messages to free space if memory is full.

Outgoing announcement is not clear
