



Use and Care

To care for your Motorola phone, please keep it away from:



liquids of any kind

Don't expose your phone to water, rain, extreme humidity, sweat, or other moisture. If it does get wet, don't try to accelerate drying with the use of an oven or dryer, as this may damage the phone.



extreme heat or cold

Avoid temperatures below $0^\circ\text{C}/32^\circ\text{F}$ or above $45^\circ\text{C}/113^\circ\text{F}.$



microwaves

Don't try to dry your phone in a microwave oven.



dust and dirt

Don't expose your phone to dust, dirt, sand, food, or other inappropriate materials.



cleaning solutions

To clean your phone, use only a dry soft cloth. Don't use alcohol or other cleaning solutions.

Don't drop your phone.

This guide shows how to locate a menu feature as follows:

SIM card




Your *Subscriber Identity Module* (SIM) card contains personal information such as your phone number and phonebook entries.





battery

install battery



remove battery



Note: Your phone's battery fits tightly on purpose to ensure consistent connection.

charge battery

New batteries are not fully charged. Before you can use your phone, install and charge the battery as shown in the battery installation and battery charging sections. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

- Insert the charger into the connector on your phone.
- 2 Plug the other end of the charger into



an appropriate electrical outlet.

3 When your phone displays **Charge Complete**, remove the charger.

Note: Charging the phone from a computer's USB port is not supported.

Battery Use & Battery Safety

- Motorola recommends you always use
 Motorola-branded batteries and chargers.
 The warranty does not cover damage caused by non-Motorola batteries and/or chargers.
 Caution: Use of an unqualified battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard. Improper battery use, or use of a damaged battery, may result in a fire, explosion, or other hazard.
- Battery usage by children should be supervised.

- Important: Motorola mobile devices are designed to work best with qualified batteries. If you see a message on your display such as Invalid Battery or Unable to Charge, take the following steps:
 - Remove the battery and inspect it to confirm that it bears a Motorola "Original Equipment" hologram;
 - If there is no hologram, the battery is not a qualified battery;
 - If there is a hologram, replace the battery and retry charging it;
 - If the message remains, contact a Motorola Authorized Service Center.
- New batteries or batteries stored for a long time may take more time to charge.
- Charging precautions: When charging your battery, keep it near room temperature. Never

expose batteries to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 45°C (113°F) when charging. Always take your mobile device with you when you leave your vehicle

- When storing your battery, keep it in a cool, dry place.
- It is normal over time for battery life to decrease, and for the battery to exhibit shorter runtime between charges or require more frequent or longer charging times.
- Avoid damage to battery and mobile device. Do not disassemble, open, crush, bend, deform, puncture, shred, or submerge the battery or mobile device. Avoid dropping the battery or mobile device, especially on a hard surface. If your battery or mobile device has been subjected to such damage, take it to a Motorola Authorized Service Center before using. Do not attempt to dry it with an

turn it on & off

To turn on your phone, press and hold for two seconds. If prompted, enter your four-digit SIM PIN code and/or four-digit unlock code.



Caution: If you enter an incorrect SIM PIN code three times in a row, your phone will prompt you to enter your PUK1 password. If you don't know your PUK1 password, contact your service provider.

To turn off your phone, press and hold is for five seconds.

make a call

To make a call, enter a phone number and press .

To hang up, press 🔝.

answer a call

When your phone and/or vibrates, press 💷 to answer.

To hang up, press 题.

adjust volume

Press $\hat{\mathbf{Q}}$ up or down to increase or decrease the earpiece volume during a call.

Tip: To mute a call, press 🔶 and select MUTE.

change call alert

Find it: $\hat{•} > \bigotimes$ Ring Styles > Style

Available options are Loud Ring, Soft Ring, Vibrate, Vibe and Ring, Vibe then Ring, and Silent.

store a phone number

To store a number in your Phonebook:

- 1 Enter a number in the home screen.
- 2 Press STORE.
- 3 Enter a name and other details for the phone number. To select a highlighted item on the entry screen, press CHANGE.

To edit or delete an entry, see page 41.

call a stored phone number

Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{Phonebook}$

- 1 Scroll to the entry you want to call.
- 2 Press SEND.

tips & tricks

From the home screen (see page 17), you can use these shortcuts:



Press $\hat{\boldsymbol{\phi}}$ up, down, left, or right to open the menu for that icon.

To change the menu icons that appear in the home screen:

To set your phone not to display the home screen icons:

select by number

You can set your phone to display the menu as a list of features:

create menu shortcut

To create a shortcut to a menu:



text entry

Some features let you enter text.


Your phone may not contain all of the languages listed above.

iTAP[™] method

The iTAP software combines your key presses into common words, and predicts each word you enter.

For example, if you press **2 7 5**, your phone displays a list of word combinations such as **Appl**, **Aspj**, an **Aspk**.

When you enter three or more characters in a row, your phone will guess the rest of the word. For example, if you enter **Prog**, your phone might display:



To insert a letter combination from the bottom of the screen, press $\hat{\mathbf{Q}}$ right or left to highlight the combination you want, and press **SELECT**.

To insert a suggested word, press $\hat{\mathbf{Q}}$ up.

tap & tap extended methods

To enter text using the Tap and Tap Extended methods, press a key repeatedly to cycle through the letters and numbers on that key. Repeat this step to enter more letters. Tap Extended increases the number of characters on each key.

numeric method

Press the keypad keys to enter the numbers you want.

symbol method

When using the **Symbol** method, press a key repeatedly to display its symbols at the bottom of the screen. Highlight the symbol you want and press **SLECT**.

text entry tips

To enter a space, press Ӿ.

To change text case, press ① in a text entry screen.

To enter punctuation while entering text, press

repeatedly to enter a punctuation mark or other character.

To edit or delete text while entering text, press $\hat{\mathbf{Q}}$

to move the cursor to the right of text you want to edit. Press **DELETE** (the right soft key) to delete the character left of the cursor. Press and hold **DELETE** to delete all text to the left of the cursor.

handsfree speaker

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

You can use your phone's **handsfree speaker** to make calls without holding the phone to your ear.

To turn on the handsfree speaker during a call, press SPKR ON. To turn the speaker off, press SPKR OFF.

You can also use an optional wired headset to go handsfree.



Note: The send/end key on wired headsets is not supported on this phone. Use the end and keys on the phone to answer and end calls.

codes & passwords

Your phone's four-digit **unlock code** is originally set to **1234** or to the last four digits of your phone number. The six-digit **security code** is originally set to **000000**. Your service provider may reset these codes before you get your phone.

If your service provider didn't change these codes, you should change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain four digits. The security code must contain six digits.

You can also change your **SIM PIN** codes or call barring password.

To change a code or password:

Find it: $\hat{\phi} > B$ Settings > Security > New Passwords

Select the type of code you want to change, enter the old code when prompted, then enter the new code.

If you forget your unlock code: At the Enter Unlock Code:

prompt, try entering 1234 or the last four digits of your phone number. If that doesn't work, contact your service provider.

If you forget other codes: If you forget your security code, SIM PIN code, PIN2 code, or call barring password, contact your service provider.

lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it. You can lock your phone manually or set it to lock automatically whenever you turn it off. To lock or unlock your phone, you need the four-digit unlock code.

A locked phone still rings or vibrates for incoming calls or messages, **but you have to unlock it to answer**.

Note: You can make emergency calls even when your phone is locked (see page 32).

To lock your phone:

Find it: $\mathbf{\hat{e}} > \mathbf{B}$ Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Lock Now or Automatic Lock

To unlock your phone: When you see Enter Unlock Code, enter your four-digit unlock code and press OK. check battery meter Find it: •♠• > B♥ Settings > Phone Status > Battery Meter

tty operation



You can use an optional TTY device with your phone to send and receive calls. You must plug the TTY device into the phone's headset jack (see page 2) and set the phone to operate in one of three TTY modes.

Note: Use a TSB-121 compliant cable (provided by the TTY device manufacturer) to connect the TTY device to the phone.

Note: Set the phone volume to level 4 (middle setting) for proper operation. If you experience a high number of incorrect characters, adjust the volume as needed to minimize errors.

Note: For optimal performance, your phone should be at least 12 inches (30 centimeters) from the TTY

device. Placing the phone too close to the device may cause high error rates.

set TTY mode

When you set your phone to a TTY mode, it operates in that mode whenever the TTY device is connected:

Find it: $\hat{\phi} > B$ Settings > Initial Setup > TTY Setup

Scroll to one of the following options and press SELECT:

TTY option	
Voice	Set to standard voice mode.
ΠΥ	Transmit and receive TTY characters.
VCO	Receive TTY characters but transmit by speaking into the microphone.

TTY option	
HCO	Transmit TTY characters but
	receive by listening to the phone
	earpiece.

return to voice mode

To return to standard voice mode, select $\ensuremath{\textit{Voice}}$ from the $\ensuremath{\textit{TTY}}$ Setup options.

customize

ring styles & alerts

Your phone rings and/or vibrates to notify you of an incoming call or another event such as a new message. This ring or vibration is called an *alert*.

set a style

Find it: ♠ > ۞ Ring Styles

- Scroll to Style and press CHANGE or the center key .
- Scroll to the style you want (see page 19) and press SELECT or the center key .

set alerts

Your phone includes alerts for In Call, Message Tone, Alarms, Voicemail, Reminder, and Info Services. You can specify a detailed setting (ringtone) for each alert.

Note: You can't specify detailed settings for alerts if Style is set to Silent.

Find it: ♠ > 🖏 Ring Styles

- Scroll to style Detail and press CHANGE or the center key .
- Scroll to an alert type and press CHANGE or the center key .
- Scroll to the setting you want and press SELECT or the center key .

As you scroll through settings, your phone plays a sample of each one you highlight.

my tones

You can create your own alert tones for your phone. The tones you create are automatically included in the *style* **Detail**ist for alerts.

To create an alert tone:

- 1 Scroll to Empty Ring and press SELECT.
- 2 With Notes highlighted, press CHANGE.
- **3** Enter the notes you want and press **0K** when finished.

Tip: To learn more about how to enter notes, press $\hat{•}$ and select **Help**.

- 4 With Name highlighted, press CHANGE.
- 5 Enter a name for the alert tone and press **OK**.
- 6 Press DONE to save the new alert tone.

To modify an existing tone:

- Scroll to the name of the tone and press the center key .
- 2 Scroll to Edit or Delete and press SELECT.

display appearance

To set the contrast level for your phone's screen:

Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{B}$ Settings > Initial Setup > Contrast

To conserve power, the phone's backlight turns off when you're not using your phone. The backlight turns on again when you press any key.

To set how long your backlight stays on:

Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{B}$ Settings > Initial Setup > Backlight

To select the colors used for indicators, highlights, and soft key labels:

Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{F}$ Personalize > Color Style

28 customize

To conserve power, you can set the phone to turn off the screen when the phone is not in use. The screen turns back on when you press any key. **To set how long the phone waits before turning off the screen**:

Find it: $\hat{\phi} > B$ Settings > Initial Setup > Display Timeout

answer options

You can use different ways to answer an incoming call. To turn on or turn off an answer option:

Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{B}$ Settings > In Call Setup > Answer Options

 options

 Multi-key on
 Answer by pressing any key.

 Multi-key off
 Answer by pressing Image.

wallpaper

You can select a picture to use as a wallpaper (background) image in your home screen:

Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{F}$ Personalize > Wallpaper

screen saver

You can set a picture or a clock as a screen saver image. Your phone displays the screen saver when no activity occurs for a specified time.

Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{B}$ Settings > Personalize > Screen Saver

Tip: Turn off the screen saver to extend battery life.

backlight

Set the amount of time the display and keypad backlights stay on:

Find it: $\hat{\phi} > B$ Settings > Initial Setup > Backlight

Note: This option requires you to enter your six-digit security code (see page 23).

features

master clear

Caution: Master Clear erases all information you have entered (including phonebook and calendar entries) and content you have downloaded (including photos and sounds) stored in your phone's memory. After you erase the information, you can't recover it.

 $\hat{\bullet} > B$ Settings > Initial Setup > Master Clear

Note: This option requires you to enter your six-digit security code (see page 23).

calls

redial

- 1 Press **FIND** from the home screen.
- 2 Scroll to the number you want to call and press .

emergency calls

Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers, such as 911 or 112, that you can call at any time, even when your phone is locked or the SIM card is not inserted.

Note: Check with your service provider, as emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or

interference issues. Do not solely rely on your wireless phone for essential communications such as medical emergencies.

To make an emergency call:

- 1 Press the keypad keys to enter the emergency numbers.
- 2 Press **EVD** to call the emergency number.

recent calls

Your phone keeps lists of incoming and outgoing calls, even for calls that didn't connect. The most recent calls are listed first. The oldest calls are deleted as new calls are added. Shortcut: Press \fbox in the home screen to see the Dialed Calls list.

Find it: ♠ > இ Recent Calls

- 1 Scroll to Received Calls or Dialed Calls and press SELECT or the center key . $\hat{•}$.
- 2 Scroll to a phone number.
- 3 Press **END** to call the number.

notepad

The most recent digits entered are stored in your phone's Notepad. To retrieve the digits stored on the Notepad:

Find it: $\mathbf{\Phi} > \mathbf{B}$ Recent Calls > Notepad

speed dial

Each entry you store in your phonebook is assigned a unique *speed dial* number.

To speed dial a number:

- Enter the speed dial number for the entry you want to call and press #.
- 2 Press **SEND** to call the number.

Tip: What's the speed dial number? To see the speed dial number for a phonebook entry, press the center key $\hat{•}$ from the home screen, select **Phonebook**, then scroll to the entry and press **VIEW**.





This model wireless phone meets the government's requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian regulatory authorities is 1.6 W/kg.¹ Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC and by Industry Canada with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR

level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public in the U.S. and Canada, it must be tested and certified to the FCC and Industry Canada that it does not exceed the limit established by each government for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) reported to the FCC and available for review by Industry Canada. Hearing Aid Compatibility with Mobile Phones

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. (Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.)

Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find results for your hearing device. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.

Information from the World Health Organization

Present scientific information does not indicate the need for any special precautions for the use of mobile phones. If you are concerned, you may want to limit your own or your children's RF

exposure by limiting the length of calls or by using handsfree devices to keep mobile phones away from your head and body.

- Position your mobile device within easy reach. Be able to access your mobile device without removing your eyes from the road. If you receive an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voice mail answer it for you.

- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that can divert your attention away from the road.
- Use your mobile device to call for help. Dial 911 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, or medical emergencies.*
- Use your mobile device to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress, or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 911 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.*
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.*
