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## Section 1: Getting Started

This section explains how to start using your phone by first configuring your hardware, activating your service, and then setting up your voice mail.

## Activating Your Phone

When you subscribe to a cellular network, you are provided with a plug-in SIM card loaded with your subscription details, such as your PIN, available optional services, and many others features.

## Installing the SIM Card

2. Carefully lift the battery cover away from the bottom of the phone.
3. Carefully slide the SIM card under the metal bracket and into the SIM card socket until the card locks into place. Make sure that the card's gold contacts face into the phone and that the upper-left angled corner of the card is positioned as shown below.


Note: If the card is not inserted correctly, the phone does not detect the SIM card. Remove the battery and re-orient the card back into the slot.


## Inserting the Memory Card

Your phone supports an optional memory card (microSD ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ ) for data storage of such things as music, pictures, video or other files. This type of memory card is designed for use with this mobile phone and other devices.

Note: The Samsung Katalyst ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ supports up to a 2 Gigabyte memory card.

1. To unlock the memory cover, use your thumb to slide the memory card cover to the Unlock position (as indicated) until you hear a slight clicking sound.

2. Gently lift upward on the edge of the memory card cover.

3. Place the microSD card into the slot (as shown below). Ensure the microSD's gold contact pins face downward and the card is placed so that the indentations on the card face the same direction as those illustrated.

4. Close and lock the memory card cover:

- (1) close the memory card cover using your thumb to push the cover down (as shown below).
- (2) slide the memory card cover back into the Lock position.



## Removing the memory card

1. Repeat steps 1 and 2 (page 7 ).
2. Carefully remove the memory card.
3. Close and lock the memory card cover:

- (1) close the memory card cover using your thumb to push the cover down (as shown below).
- (2) slide the memory card cover back into the Lock position.


## Installing the Battery

1. With the cover removed, verify the SIM card is securely inserted.
2. Install the battery by aligning its 3 brass tabs to those located at the bottom of the battery compartment (1). The arrow on the battery should be pointing towards the prongs.
3. Press the battery down until it clicks into place (2).

4. Make sure that the battery is properly installed before switching on the phone.
5. Reinstall the battery cover by sliding it back onto the phone until you hear it securely click. Make sure the battery is properly installed before switching on the phone.


## Charging a Battery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable Li-ion battery. A travel adapter, which is used for charging the battery, is included with your phone. Use only approved batteries and chargers. Ask your local Samsung dealer for further details.

You can use the phone while the battery is charging, but doing so requires additional charging time.

Note: You must fully charge the battery before using your phone for the first time. A discharged battery recharges fully in approximately 4 hours.

1. With the battery installed, temporarily remove the plastic cover on the left side of the phone and plug in the travel adapter's connector into the jack.

Important!: Verify that the handset battery is installed prior to connecting the travel adapter. If the battery is not installed and the travel adapter is connected the handset continuously power cycles and prevents proper operation.


Note: The following illustration is the incorrect method for connecting the charger. If attempted, damage to the accessory port occurs therefore voiding the phone's warranty.

2. Plug the adapter into a standard AC wall outlet.

Note: For connection to an electrical supply not located in the U.S., you must use an adaptor of the proper configuration for the power outlet. Use of the wrong adapter could damage your phone and void your warranty.
3. When charging is finished, unplug the Travel Adapter from the power outlet and then disconnect it from the phone.

4. Resecure the plastic cover over the interface jack on the phone.

> Warning!: You must unplug the Travel Adapter before you remove the battery from the phone during charging; otherwise, the phone could be damaged.

## Low Battery Indicator

When the battery is weak and only a few minutes of talk time remain, a warning tone sounds and the "Warning low battery" message repeats at regular intervals on the display. When this happens, your phone turns off the backlight to conserve the remaining battery power.
When the battery level becomes too low, the phone automatically turns off.

## Switching the Phone On or Off

1. Press and hold the key until the phone switches on.
2. If the phone asks for a PIN, enter the PIN and press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key or the © Key. For more information, refer to "Change password" on page 109.
3. If the phone prompts "View Tutorial and connect to Wi-Fi?" press the Yes softkey, or otherwise press the No soft key to continue.

Note: For more information, refer to "Connecting to Wi-Fi Networks" on page 27.
The phone searches for your network and after finding it, the T-Mobile icon "T" displays on the lower right half of your screen. Now you can make or receive calls.

Note: The display language is preset to English at the factory. To change the language, use the Language menu. For more information, refer to "Language" on page 95.
4. When you wish to switch off the phone, press and hold the key until the power-off image displays.

## Setting Up Your Voice Mail

For new users, follow the instructions below to set up voice mail:

1. In Idle mode, press and hold the 1.0 key on the keypad.

You may be prompted to enter a password.
2. Follow the tutorial to create a password, a greeting, and your name.

Note: These steps may be different depending on your network.

## Accessing Your Voice Mail

You can press and hold the $1 .:$ key on the keypad or use the phone's menu to access your voice mail. To access voice mail using the menu:

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key.
2. Highlight Messages and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
3. Highlight Voice mail and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Highlight Call voice mail and press the Select soft key or the © key. Your phone dials the specified voice mail number.
5. When connected, follow the voice prompts from the voice mail center.

## Changing the Voice Mail Number

Your SIM card gives you the default service number of the voice mail center. However, should you need to change the number, use the following procedures:

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Highlight Messages and press the Select soft key or the © key.
3. Highlight Voice mail and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Highlight Voice server number and press the Select soft key or the © key.
5. Highlight Voice Mail and press the Options soft key.
6. Highlight Edit and press the Select soft key or the © key.
7. Edit the name if desired, and then press the Down Navigation key to edit the number. Editing can be done by using the $c$ key to delete numbers and then using the keypad to enter a new number.
8. Press the Options soft key, highlight the Save option, and press the Select soft key or the © key.
9. Press the key to return to Idle mode.

## Features of Your Phone

Your phone is lightweight, easy-to-use and offers many significant features. The following list outlines a few of the features included in your phone.

## Open View of Your Phone

The following illustrations show the main elements of your phone:


## Keys

The following list correlates to the illustrations.

1. Earpiece allows you to hear the other caller and the different ring tones or sounds offered by your phone.
2. Volume keys allow you to adjust the ring volume in standby mode (with the phone open) or adjust the Speaker volume during a call. When receiving an incoming call, if you press the volume key, you can mute the ring tone. If you press and hold the volume key, you can reject the call.
3. Left Soft key allows you to select soft key actions or menu items corresponding to the bottom left line on the display screen.
4. Send key allows you to make or answer a call. In Idle mode, recalls the last number dialed or received when held down.
5. Cancel/Clear key deletes characters from the display. In Menu mode, this key returns you to the previous menu level.
6. Voice mail key allows you to quickly access your voice mail. Press and hold this key for two seconds to automatically dial your voice mail's phone number.
7. Alphanumeric keys allow you to enter numbers, letters, and some special characters.
8. Special function keys allow you activate unique features while in Idle mode. In Idle mode, if you press and hold the $\sqrt{\#^{*+}}$ key, you can turn on the Silent Mode. In Idle mode, if you press and hold the $*_{* ; 6}$ key, you can turn on the Voice Command application.
9. Microphone is used during phone calls and allows other callers to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them. It is also used in making voice note recordings.
10. Power On/Off (Exit) key ends a call. Press and hold this key for two seconds to turn your phone on or off. While in the Menu mode, it returns the phone to Idle mode and then cancels your input.
11. OK (Select) key allows you to accept the choices offered when navigating through a menu.
12. Right Soft key allows you to select soft key actions or menu items corresponding to the bottom right line on the display screen. It also provides quick access to your t-zones.
13. Navigation key scrolls through the phone's menu options and acts as a shortcut key from standby mode.
In Menu mode, scrolls through the phone's menus and Phonebook.
In Idle mode:

- Down key: allows you to directly access your Contact list.
- Up key: allows you to directly access the Call records feature.
- Left key: allows you to directly access Text messaging (New Message).
- Right key: allows you to directly access Voice note.

Note: SIM-dependent features may alter the functionality of the Navigation keys.

Tip: When entering text, use the Left or Right Navigation key to mark the position of the cursor.
14. Display shows all the information needed to operate your phone, such as the received signal strength, phone battery level, and time.

## Closed View of Your Phone

The following illustrations show the external elements of your phone


1. Power/Accessory Interface connector allows you to connect a power cable or optional accessories, such as a USB/data cable or a hands-free headset for convenient, hands-free conversations.
2. Camera key allows you to take pictures when you are in camera mode. Launches the camera with a press.
3. External display shows the received signal strength, phone battery level, and the time and date.

## Rear View of Your Phone

The following illustrations show the camera lens.


1. Camera lens is used to take pictures.
2. External Speaker allows you to hear the different ring tones/sounds, work with the speakerphone, and to hear audio during a video playback.

## Display Layout

Your phone's display screen provides a wealth of information about your phone's status and options. When the backlight turns on, both the display turns on and the keypad is illuminated. This display indicates when you receive either an incoming call or message and also displays any alarms for the specified time. The display also shows the date and current time as a digital clock. The display has three main areas:


## Icons

This list identifies the symbols you＇ll see on your phone＇s display screen：

Displays the received signal strength．The greater the number of bars，the stronger the signal．

Displays the UMA signal strength．The greater the number of bars，the stronger the signal．
$=$ Displays when a microSD card is detected．


Displays when a new text message was received．
Displays when a new multimedia message was received．
Displays when you set an alarm to ring at a specified time．For more details， see＂Alarm＂on page 129.

Displays when you are out of your service area．

Displays when a call is in progress．

Displays when the Call Forwarding feature is active．For more details，see ＂Call forwarding＂on page 106.

Displays when Alert type is vibration or you set the phone to vibrate when you receive a call．

Displays when the speaker is enabled during an active call．

Displays when Mute is enabled during an active call．

Displays when Silent Mode is active．
Displays while your phone is synchronizing data with the network．

Shows the level of your battery．The more bars you see，the more power remains．

Displays when Bluetooth wireless technology is active．

## Backlight

A backlight illuminates the display and the keypad. When you press any key, the backlight comes on. It goes off when no keys are pressed within a given period of time, depending on the setting within the Backlight menu. The display turns off after one minute to conserve battery power.
The $\mathbf{O n}$ setting is how long the keypad backlight is on. The Dim option is how much longer after the keypad backlight goes off that the display remains lit.
To specify the length of time the backlight is active, access the Backlight menu:

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Settings icon. Press the Select $\theta$ soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Display settings option and press the Select $\square$ soft key or the © key.
4. Highlight the Backlight option and press the Select $\square$ soft key or the (or) key.
5. Highlight the On option. Use the Left or Right Navigation key to select the time the backlight is on. You may choose between $15 \mathrm{sec}, \mathbf{3 0} \mathbf{~ s e c}, 1 \mathrm{~min}$, 3 min , or 10 min .
6. Press the Down key to take you to the Dim option. Use the Left or Right Navigation key to select the time the Dimming mode is on. You may choose between $\mathbf{0 f f}, \mathbf{1 5 ~ s e c , ~} \mathbf{3 0} \mathbf{~ s e c}, 1 \mathrm{~min}, \mathbf{3} \mathbf{~ m i n}$, or 10 min .
7. Press the Save soft key to retain your new settings.

## Help

Help is designed to work with t-zones to show you some of the unique features of your phone. You can search help files on the fly while traveling, at home or anywhere, using help.wap.t-mobile.com.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Help icon. Press the Select $\theta$ soft key or the orey.
3. The T-Mobile Help menu displays with the following options available:

- Browse Help Topics: this option gives you a list of different topics from which you can select.
- Enter a Search: this option allows you to search based on a keyword.
- My Account: this option provides you with account specific information such as your current status, current activity, Bill Summary, Plan \& Services, Voicemail Settings, Find a Retail Store, and FAQ's \& Info.
- About: this option offers general information about T-Mobile Help including concept and site design, copyright information, and contact email address.
To access the browser options menu:
- Press the Options soft key.
- Or -

Highlight the Openwave icon at the top left of the page by pressing the
Up or Down keys and then press the © key.

This section introduces you to T-Mobile Wi-Fi compatibility and provides information on Wi-Fi and instructions on how to use this type of connection with your phone.

## Introducing Your T-Mobile HotSpot @Home Capable Phone

Your phone is capable of connecting to T-Mobile via Wi-Fi (wireless Internet broadband) and GSM (cellular towers). When making voice calls or using data connections, your phone seamlessly transfers between Wi-Fi and GSM connections, always using the network with the best signal strength.
Your T-Mobile Wi-Fi compatible phone is capable of the following:

- Connect to Wi-Fi at Home

Connect to T-Mobile through Wi-Fi if you have a wireless router set up in your home. Refer to the Get Started Poster (provided with your phone) and the User Guide for your wireless router for more information.

- Connect to Wi-Fi while you're on the go (hotspots)

Connect to T-Mobile HotSpot locations all across the U.S. without needing a T-Mobile HotSpot username and password as well as any open Wi-Fi access point.

- Connect to GSM

Connect to the GSM network when Wi-Fi is not available or if you are not interested in connecting to Wi-Fi.

## Here's How it Works

Rather than using GSM radio as your phone normally would to connect to cellular towers, your T-Mobile Wi-Fi compatible phone uses UMA (Unlicensed Mobile Access) technology to use a wireless broadband Internet connection for your mobile phone services. This includes voice calls, mobile browsing, e-mail, Picture Messaging, Text Messaging, and basically any mobile service for which your phone uses a network connection.

UMA technology offers fast, reliable connectivity using your mobile phone for virtually all of your communications. UMA connects your mobile phone to your GSM/ GPRS services through WLAN (802.11) and allows you to handle calls, send and receive messages, and check your e-mail. This technology allows you to use your mobile phone in all of the ways you normally do. The only difference with using UMA technology is that you are connecting through a wireless broadband Internet connection (Wi-Fi).

## What is Wi-Fi?

Wi-Fi, or Wireless Fidelity, is a term that is used generically to refer to any product or service using any type of 802.11 technology. Wi-Fi networks operate in the unlicensed 2.4 GHz radio bands, operating at up to an 11 Mbps (802.11b) or 54 Mbps (802.11g) data rate.
Wi-Fi enabled devices (laptops and PDAs as well as UMA phones) can send and receive data wirelessly from any location equipped with Wi-Fi access. This is accomplished using wireless routers, installed within a Wi-Fi location. A wireless router transmits an RF signal to Wi-Fi enabled devices that are within range of the router. Depending on the particular router, its range is usually about 300 feet. The speed of the transmission is governed by the speed of the internet connection fed into the wireless router.

## What This Means to You

When you are not in range of a Wi-Fi connection, your normal cellular network takes over and keeps you connected. Your phone switches automatically from Wi-Fi to cellular whenever it's necessary to maintain your connection, whether your phone is in Idle mode or in the middle of an active call. The switching process is virtually unnoticeable.

Warning!: 9-1-1 Emergency Service available over Wi-Fi may be limited (it won't work during electrical power or broadband outages). Before using this phone to make calls over Wi-Fi, you MUST provide us with the primary street address where you will use HotSpot @Home service, and you must furnish us with any address changes. Refer to T-Mobile's Terms and Conditions for other limitations and information.

## Connecting to Wi-Fi for the First Time

Important!: You must set up your wireless router first before using your phone to connect to Wi-Fi. For T-Mobile routers, run the CD that comes with the router and follow its instructions. If you have a different router, follow its installation procedures and confirm the router is set up properly.

1. Press and hold the $\square$ key to power on your phone.
2. Your phone displays a tutorial prompt. Select Yes to run the brief tutorial.

3. At the end of the tutorial, your phone detects a Wi-Fi network and attempts to connect to it. If your router requires a security key, it prompts you to enter it. For T-Mobile routers, select Get Security Key, which automatically provides security keys for T-Mobile routers (see "Get Security Key" on page 33.)

If you have a T-Mobile router, select Yes. This action acquires the security key or passphrase so that you are not required to manually type it into your phone.
If you do not have a T-Mobile router, select No. You are then required to enter your key or passphrase.

If you are not sure what your key or passphrase (WEP or WPA encryption) is, please refer to your router documentation. (For T-Mobile routers see "Get Security Key" on page 33.
4. Save the network when prompted. After the network saves to your Saved Networks list, you automatically connect to that network each time you are within range. For more information, refer to "Saved Networks" on page 30.

You are connected to your first Wi-Fi network and can begin making calls using Wi-Fi or your regular T-Mobile GSM network.

To access all of the Wi-Fi features on your phone, go to Menu $>$ Settings $>$ Wi-Fi. If the Tutorial does not display on your phone, see "Connecting to Wi-Fi Networks" on page 27.

## Using Wi-Fi

Once set up for Wi-Fi connectivity, your phone automatically uses Wi-Fi, when available, for all your mobile phone services. You simply use your phone in a normal manner; there is nothing special you need to do. Your phone switches automatically between Wi-Fi and cellular whenever it's necessary to maintain your connection, whether your phone is idle or on an active call. When connected to Wi-Fi, the signal bars change and the wireless network name displays in the upper left of the idle screen as shown in the following illustration.


The signal bars are always visible when a call is active. The bars change correctly when you are on a call to indicate which network you are on. The name of your network displays on the idle screen as seen here.

## Connecting to Wi-Fi Networks

Connecting to Wi-Fi networks with your phone allows you to make calls using Wi-Fi. The following features were designed to keep you connected to the networks you want:

- View available networks
- View saved networks that you use often
- Find open networks quickly (Quick Connect)


## Available Networks

This list of available networks displays all the available Wi-Fi networks to which you can connect. The networks are listed in the order of their signal strength, from the strongest signal to the weakest.

Note: If you want to connect to a secure network (marked by a key icon), you are prompted to provide the security key for that network. If you change the router settings, you can edit the phone's profile with the new setting or you can create a new phone profile.

Note: Set up your wireless router first. For T-Mobile routers, run the CD that comes with the router and follow its instructions. If you have a different router, follow its installation procedures and confirm the router is set up properly.

## Connect to Wi-Fi from the Available Networks

1. From the idle screen, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, highlight Settings and press the Select soft key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Wi-Fi option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
4. Highlight the Available Networks option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
5. The phone searches for all available networks and then displays a list of available networks.

6. Highlight the network to which you want to connect and press the Options soft key. Highlight the Connect option, and press the Select soft key or the © key. Once you have established an active connection, you are prompted to save the network.

7. When prompted, press the Yes soft key to save the network to your Saved Networks list.
8. Create a profile name for your network, press the Options soft key, select Save and press the Select soft key or the © key.

After the network saves to your Saved Networks list, you automatically connect to that network each time you are within range (see "Saved Networks" on page 30.)

On the Available Networks list, a checkmark indicates a network to which you are currently connected, a star indicates a saved network, and a key indicates a network is protected with a security key.

Note: Press the Back soft key from the Available Networks list to return to the Wi-Fi menu.

## Available Networks Options

From the Available Networks menu, press the Options soft key to use the following options:


- Connect: Connects your phone to the currently highlighted network. This option will not be available if your phone is currently connected to a Wi-Fi network. Alternatively, you can connect to a network on the Available by highlighting the network Networks list by highlighting the network and pressing the Select soft key.
- Refresh: Refreshes the list of available networks to include any recent changes, for example new Wi-Fi networks recently set up or others that were removed from service.
- View details: Displays the details for the currently highlighted Wi-Fi network. This also includes the MAC address of the phone if needed for MAC address filtering.
- Save: Saves the selected network to your Saved Networks List. This option displays only if the network is not already saved.


## Saved Networks

The Saved Networks list displays all of the Wi-Fi networks that are saved on your phone. If you set up your phone for automatic connections, you automatically connect to a Wi-Fi network on your Saved Networks List each time you are within range of that network. On the Saved Networks List, a indicates a network to which you are currently connected.

## Important!: Networks displayed on the Saved Networks List are networks that are saved and not necessarily those that are in range and available. Editing a saved network's profile name will not affect the ability to connect to that network. However, changing the SSID field or security settings will impact the ability to connect. <br> If you change the router settings, you can edit the phone's profile with the new setting or you can create a new phone profile.

Note: The Samsung phone has 2 Default profiles on the Saved Networks list: HotSpot and @Home. This will allow the phone to automatically connect at the T-Mobile HotSpot locations and out-of-the-box to your unsecured T-Mobile router.

## Connect to a Specific Saved Network

1. From the idle screen, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to Settings. Press the Select soft key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Wi-Fi option and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Highlight the Saved Networks option and press the Select soft key or the © Key. The phone displays your Saved Networks list.
5. Highlight the network to which you want to connect and press Options > Connect. Your phone connects to the Wi-Fi network if it is available.
6. On the Saved Networks list, a checkmark then indicates a network to which you are currently connected.

- Edit Details: Allows you to edit the highlighted Wi-Fi network's parameters. Note that this option is not available for your T-Mobile-designated Wi-Fi network profiles.
- Connect: Connects your phone to the currently highlighted network. This option will not be available if your phone is currently connected to a Wi-Fi network. Alternatively, you can connect to a network on the Saved Networks list.
- Delete: Deletes the selected network from the Saved Networks list. Note that this option is not available for your T-Mobile-designated Wi-Fi network profiles.
- Forward Settings: Sends the highlighted network's settings to another user. Note that this option is not available for your T-Mobile designated Wi-Fi network profiles.
- Change Priority: Lets you change the order of the Wi-Fi networks to which your phone attempts to connect. Connections to networks with a higher priority are tried first.
- Add new: Adds a new network to your Saved Networks list. This option also allows you to manually add settings for the new network. The submenu items for the Add New menu are as follows:
- From Available Networks: Allows you to add a new network from the list of Available Networks.
- Create Manually: Allows you to manually enter the new network's settings. You'll need the following information: Wi-Fi name, SSID, and Security (encryption) Type used.


## Quick Connect

Select the Quick Connect option from the Wi-Fi menu to scan for any available preferred or open Wi-Fi network and connect to the network with the best signal strength. This feature allows you to make a quick Wi-Fi connection in instances where you know you are within range of an open Wi-Fi network.

## Note: Quick Connect will not attempt to connect to closed or secured wireless networks that are not part of the Saved Networks List.

## Use Quick Connect

- From the Idle screen, press and hold the $\square$ key. Your phone connects to the strongest Wi-Fi network within range.
Use the following steps for another method to access the Quick Connect option:

1. From the Idle screen, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode and proceed through the following steps:
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to Settings. Press the Select soft key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Wi-Fi option and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Highlight the Quick Connect option and press the Select soft key or the (o) key.
5. Your phone connects to the strongest Wi-Fi network available.

## Turn Wi-Fi OnlOff

Select the Turn Wi-Fi ON/OFF option from the Wi-Fi menu to activate/deactivate the Wi-Fi feature. Your phone's default state is Wi-Fi On (Active Mode). Wi-Fi should be left on to take advantage of the seamless transfer between regular cellular networks.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to Settings. Press the Select soft key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Wi-Fi option and press the Select soft key.
4. Highlight the Turn Wi-Fi ON/OFF option and press the Select soft key.

Note: If the Quick Connect option is selected when your phone is in Sleep mode (Wi-Fi OFF), the phone automatically switches to Active mode (Wi-Fi ON) before attempting to make the connection.

## Get Security Key

Get Security Key option can only be used with a T-Mobile wireless router. Select the Get Security Key option from the Wi-Fi menu to acquire the security key for a T-Mobile Wi-Fi compatible phone from a T-Mobile wireless router. This feature is about exchanging security information between a T-Mobile router and a T-Mobile Wi-Fi phone.

When used with an open network, the Get Security Key process creates a WPA key on the router. This key is automatically transferred to the phone. Manually configure all laptops and devices connected wirelessly for the new security. When used on an already secured network, the key configured on the router is transferred to the phone. For the duration of the process (for example, while the -0 on the router is blinking), all laptops and devices using the wireless network lose their connection.

For T-Mobile routers without encryption enabled, following this sequence turns on WPA and sends the security key to your T-Mobile phone. If encryption is enabled, the light is constantly lit on the T-Mobile router, and the current router settings are sent to the phone.

Note: If you change the router settings, you can edit the phone's profile with the new setting or you can create a new phone profile.

Get Security Key option can only be used with a T-Mobile wireless router. Select the Get Security Key option from the Wi-Fi menu to acquire automatic security keys for a T-Mobile Wi-Fi compatible phone from a T-Mobile wireless router.

## Use Get Security Key

1. From the Idle screen, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to Settings. Press the Select soft key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Wi-Fi option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Highlight the Get Security Key option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
5. Follow the on-screen prompts to step through the process of acquiring security keys.

This process involves pressing the secure button on the front of the router. You can identify the secure button by the ( ( -0 on, or adjacent to the button. The key / passphrase is stored with the profile on your Saved Networks list. The phone tries to connect to a network after successfully securing the key.

You can also enter a security key manually in the phone. If connecting via available networks, the phone prompts you to enter the key for WEP or passphrase for WPA. You can also follow the steps for manually adding a network seen in a subsequent section of the manual. When entering a security key, if numbers are part of the key, press and hold the desired key to quickly access the number, this bypasses the multi-tap text entry mode.

In order to view the security key, you may need to log into your wireless router's administrative site. If you printed or saved your settings when setting up your router, you may reference this as well.

## Add New Network

By adding a network to your phone, you can automatically connect to the network when you are in range. If it requires a security key or passphrase, you can enter the key and the phone stores the key or passphrase with the profile.

You can add a new network using one of the following methods:

- When connecting to a network from Available Networks, select to save when prompted
- Select Add New Network > From Available Networks
- Select Add New Network > Create Manually

## Add From Available Network Option

To add a new network to your Saved Networks list from your list of available networks:

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to Settings. Press the Select soft key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Wi-Fi option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Highlight the Add New Network option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
5. Highlight the From Available Networks option and press the Select soft key. The phone searches for available networks and displays a list of networks in signal-strength order.
6. Highlight the network you want and press the Save soft key. To give the network a new name before saving it, use the Cancel $\tau$ key to delete the name and then type a new network name.
7. Press the or key to save the new network.

## Add Manually

To manually add a new network to your Saved Networks list:

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to Settings. Press the Select soft key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Wi-Fi option and press the Select soft key.
4. Highlight the Add New Network option and press the Select soft key.
5. Highlight the Create Manually option and press the Select soft key.
6. Type your desired profile name for the network.
7. Press the Down key to highlight the SSID option. Enter the new network's SSID: option.
The SSID (Service Set Identifier), is the actual name of the wireless network, not the profile name you entered. The profile name is simply a name to help you keep track of which network is which. The SSID is a key piece of information needed to locate and connect to a wireless network.
8. Press the Down key to highlight the Security Type option. Press the Left or Right key to set to KEY NONE, WEP 64 bit, WEP 128 bit, WPA-PSK, or WPA2-PSK. The Key field only becomes active if you choose an option other than None.

[^3]9. Press the Down key to highlight the Key: option. For information on the key required, see "Use Get Security Key" on page 34.
10. Press the Down key to highlight Connection Settings. Press the Left or Right key to set to Automatically Connect, or Don't automatically connect.
11. Press the Down key to highlight the Non-Broadcast SSID option. Press the © key to place a checkmark in this box if your router does NOT broadcast its SSID. In general, the default setting for most routers will broadcast the SSID.
12. Press the Down key to highlight the Inter AP handovers option.
13. Press the Key to place a checkmark in this box if you want your phone to perform a fast handoff (for quicker authentication).
14. Press the Down key to highlight the IP setting option. Press the Left or Right key to set to Dynamic or Static. Dynamic is the standard and recommended setting.
If you select Static in this step, press the Down key to highlight the IP address option. Press the or key to enter the IP address menu. If you are using a T-Mobile Router, copy the information regarding the Subnet Mask, DNS Server, and Gateway from your router into your phone. The IP address you input must be different from the one you use to access the router. If you are connected to a Wi-Fi network that requires Static IP addresses (usually in a corporate environment), please see your System Administrator to get the required information.
15. When finished, press the Save soft key.

Use the following steps to select the Wi-Fi Help option from the Wi-Fi menu and get specific Wi-Fi assistance.

2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to Settings. Press the Select soft key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Wi-Fi option and press the Select soft key.
4. Highlight the Wi-Fi Help option and press the Select soft key.

This section describes how to make or answer a call. It also explains the features and functionality associated with making or answering a call. For more information on Ringtones see "Ring tone" on page 101. For more information on Call Forwarding see "Call forwarding" on page 106.

## Making a Call

When the idle screen displays, enter the number you wish to dial and press the

$$
\text { [ } \text { key. }
$$

Note: When you activate the Auto redial option in the Extra settings menu, the phone automatically redials up to 10 times when the person does not answer the call or is already on the phone, provided your call is not sent to voice mail. For more information, refer to "Extra settings" on page 96.

## Making an International Call

Note: Contact your service provider to determine if this service is activated.

1. Press and hold the $\square_{ \pm}$key. The + character displays.
2. Enter the country code, area code, and phone number.
3. Press the $\boxed{\square}$ key to make the call.

## Correcting the Number

1. To clear the last digit displayed, press the $\square$ key.
2. To clear any other digit in the number, press the Left or Right Navigation key until the cursor is immediately to the right of the digit to be cleared and then press the $\square$ key. You can also enter a missing digit.
3. To clear the whole display, press and hold the $\square$ key.

## Ending a Call

- When you want to finish your call, briefly press the key.


## Redialing the Last Number

The phone stores the numbers of the calls you've dialed, received, or missed if the caller is identified.

To recall any of these numbers:

1. Press the 0 key to return to Idle mode (if you typed characters on the display).
2. Press the $\llbracket$ key to display a list of the most recent numbers used in the order you dialed or received them.
3. Use the Up and Down Navigation keys to scroll through the numbers and highlight the number you want.
4. To view details of the number, such as Caller ID and call logs, press the (o) key.
Before you dial the number, press the Options soft key to display the following options:

- Call back: Places a call back to the number.
- Send message: Allows you to send a Text message, Picture message, or Voice note to the number.
- Save to Phonebook: Stores the number in your Phone memory, onto your SIM card, or your SIM card(FDN).
- Delete: Allows you to delete the Selected number or All call records.
- Add to block list: Allows you to block the selected number from being received as an incoming call.

5. To dial the number, press the $\llbracket$ key.

## Making a Call from the Phonebook

You can store regularly used phone numbers into the phone's memory or onto your SIM card. These entries are collectively called the Phonebook.
Once you store a number in the Phonebook, you can press only a few key to dial the stored number. By using the Speed Dial feature you can also assign your most frequently-used numbers to number keys.

For more information, refer to "Understanding Your Phonebook" on page 65.

## Adjusting the Call Volume

During a call, use the Volume keys on the left side of the phone, to adjust the speaker volume.

- Press the key to increase the volume level and the key to decrease the speaker volume level.
In Idle mode, you can also adjust the ring volume using these keys.
- These keys can also be used to scroll up or down a listing of items such as a menu list, contacts list, etc.


## Answering a Call

When somebody calls you, the phone rings and displays the incoming call image.
The caller's phone number, or name if stored in Phonebook, is displayed.

1. Press the $\llbracket$ key or the Accept soft key to answer the incoming call.

If the Anykey answer option in the Extra Settings menu is activated, you can press any key to answer a call except for the $\square$ key.

Note: To reject an incoming call, press the Reject soft key or key.
2. Press the key to end the call.

Note: You can answer a call while using the Phonebook or menu features. After ending the call, the phone returns to the function screen you were previously using.

## Call Records

All incoming, outgoing and missed calls are listed in the Call Records. You can also view Call time records.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Call records icon and press the Select soft key or the or key to enter the menu.

Note: While in Idle mode, press the $\Omega$ key to access your call records (All calls, Missed calls, Incoming calls, and Outgoing calls).

The following Call Record options are available:

## All calls

This menu lets you view the 90 most recent calls you received, dialed, and missed.
The name or number, if already stored in your Phonebook, displays with the number of occurrences for each number.

## Note: At any time while you are in Call Records, you may use the Left or Right Navigation keys to scroll between All calls, Missed calls, Incoming calls, and Outgoing calls.

## Missed calls

This menu lets you view the 30 most recent calls you received, but did not answer. The name and number, if already stored in your Phonebook, displays with the number of occurrences for each number.

## Viewing Missed Calls

When you are unable to answer a call for any reason, you can find out who is calling you, if this service is available, so that you can call the person back.

The number of calls you missed displays on the idle screen immediately after a call is missed.

To view a missed call immediately:

1. If the display is off, press the volume key to turn the display on. The Missed call tab appears on the display.
2. Press the View soft key.

The number corresponding to the most recently missed call is displayed first (top of list).
3. To scroll through these missed calls, press the Up or Down Navigation key.
4. To call a particular number, highlight the entry and press the $\llbracket$ key. - Or -

Highlight a number from the list and press the Options soft key for the following options:

- Details: Displays details of the missed call including name, number, dates and times of the calls.
- Call back: Places a call back to the number.
- Send message: Allows you to send a Text message, Picture message, or Voice note back to the missed number.
- Save to Phonebook: Stores the number in your Phone memory onto your SIM card, or your SIM card(FDN).
- Delete: Allows you to delete the selected number or delete all call records.
- Add to block list: Allows you to block the selected number from being received as an incoming call.

Note: You can press the key at any time to exit the Missed Call feature.

## Incoming calls

This menu lets you view the 30 most recent calls you received.
The name and number, if already stored in your Phonebook, is then displayed with the number of occurrences for each number.

## Outgoing calls

This menu lets you view the 30 most recent calls you dialed.
The name and number, if already stored in your Phonebook, is then displayed with the number of occurrences for each number.

## Delete all

This menu allows you to delete all of the records in each call type separately, or you can delete all of your call types at one time.

1. Highlight the type of calls you want to delete (All calls, Missed calls, Incoming calls, or Outgoing calls) and press the © key to place a check mark adjacent to an category entry.

Note: Selecting the All calls check box automatically selects all the entries in the Delete all menu.
2. Press the Delete soft key to delete the calls.
3. When a confirmation message displays, press the Yes soft key or © key to confirm.

## Call time

This menu lets you view the time log for calls both made and received.

## Note: The actual time invoiced by T-Mobile may differ from times displayed due to network features and service plan.

The following time logs are available:

- Last call time: shows the length of your last call.
- Total outgoing: shows the total length of all calls made since the timer was last reset.
- Total incoming: shows the total length of all calls received since the timer was last reset.
- Life time is: shows the total length of time for both incoming and outgoing calls. The length of call time must be at least 1 minute to increment this field. You cannot clear this information.


## Silent Mode

Silent Mode is convenient when you wish to stop the phone from making any noise, (in a theater for example).
In Idle mode, press and hold the $\#$ \#* $^{\infty+}$ key until the "Silent Mode On" message and the Silent Mode icon ( ) display. In Silent Mode, instead of sounds, your phone vibrates.
To exit and reactivate the previous sound settings, press and hold the \#** key again until the "Exit Silent Mode" message displays. The Silent Mode icon ( no longer displayed.

## Selecting Functions and Options

Your phone offers a set of customizable functions. These functions are arranged in menus and sub-menus, and accessed using the two soft keys. Each menu and submenu allows you to view and alter the settings of a particular function.

## Soft Keys

The roles of the soft keys vary depending on the function you are currently using.
The labels on the bottom line of the display just above each key indicate their current role.


## Selecting Options

To view the various functions and options available, you must select the one you want by:

1. Press the appropriate soft key.
2. To select the function displayed or the option highlighted, press the Select soft key or the © key.
3. To view the next function or highlight the next option on a list, press the Down Navigation key.
4. To move back to the previous function or option on a list, press the Up key.
5. To move back up one level in the menu structure, press the Back soft key.
6. To exit the menu structure without changing the settings, press the
 key.

In some functions, you are asked for a password or PIN. Enter the correct code and press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key or the © key.

When you access a list of options, your phone highlights the currently active option. If, however, there are only two options, such as On/Off or Enable/Disable, your phone highlights the option that is not currently active, so that you can select it.

## Options During a Call

Your phone provides a number of control functions that are available for use during a call.

## Switching off the Microphone (Mute)

You can temporarily switch your phone's microphone off, so that the other person cannot hear you.

Example: You wish to say something to a person in the room but do not want the person on the phone to hear you.

To switch the microphone off temporarily:

1. Press the Options soft key.
2. Select the Mute option and press the Select soft key or the or key. The other person can no longer hear you. The Mute icon ( 5 哥) is then displayed at the bottom left of the screen.

To switch the microphone back on:

- Press the Options soft key. Select the Unmute option and press the Select soft key or the ok key. The other person can hear you again. The $b \in$ icon is then displayed at the bottom left of the screen.


## Putting a Call on Hold

You can place the current call on hold whenever you want. If your network supports this service, you can also make another call while a call is in progress.

To place a call on hold:

1. Press the Options soft key, highlight the Hold option, then press the Select soft key or the © key.
2. Press the Resume soft key to reactivate the call.

To make a new call while a call is in progress:

1. Enter the new phone number that you wish to dial or look it up in the Contact list.
2. Press the $-\sim$ key to dial the second call.

The first call is then automatically put on hold.

- Or -

1. Press the Options soft key, select Hold, and press the © key. This places the currently active call on hold and allows you to make a new call.
2. Make the second call in the normal way.

When there is an active call and a call on hold, you may switch between the two calls by placing the current held call to active and then placing the other call on hold.
To switch between the two calls:

1. Press the Options soft key, select Swap, and press the © key. The current active call is placed on hold and the call on hold is then reactivated so that you can continue conversing with that person.
2. Press the -0 key when you are finished or want to end the call.

## Using the Speakerphone

While on a call, you can use your Speakerphone by following these steps:

1. Press the Spkr on soft key.
2. To turn the Speakerphone off, press the Spkr off soft key.

## Muting or Sending Key Tones

These options allow you to turn the key tones off or on. If the Keypad tone option is Off, your phone does not transmit the DTMF (Dual Tone Multi-Frequency) tones of the keys, which then allows you to press keys without hearing annoying key tones during a call.

## Searching for a Number in Phonebook

You can search for a number in Phonebook during a call.

1. Press the Options soft key.
2. Press the Down Navigation key to highlight Phonebook and press the (or) key.
3. Press the Down Navigation key to highlight the Contact list option and press the Select soft key or the © key.

With the Phonebook entries then listed:
4. Enter the name that you wish to find in the textbox located above the entries. If you enter the first few letters of the name, the Phonebook entries are listed starting with the first entry matching your input.

- Or -

Use the Up or Down Navigation key to highlight the contact that you desire.
5. To view the highlighted entry, press the Options soft key.
6. Highlight the View option and press the Select soft key or the © Key. The Contact information displays.

For further details about the Phonebook feature, see "Finding a Phonebook Entry" on page 69.

## Call Waiting

The Call waiting option must be set to Activate before you can answer an incoming call while another call is in progress. For more information, refer to "Call waiting" on page 107.

You are then notified of an incoming call with a call waiting tone.
To answer a new call while another call is in progress:

1. Press either the Accept soft key or the $-\checkmark$ key to answer the incoming call. The first call is automatically put on hold.
2. To switch between the two calls, press the Options soft key, highlight Swap and press the Select soft key or the orey.
3. To end a call on hold, press the Options soft key and select the End held call option. Then press the Select soft key or the orey.
4. To end the current/remaining call, press the -00 key.

## Making a Multi-Party Call

A multi-party call is a network service that allows up to six people to take part simultaneously in a multi-party or conference call.

For further details about subscribing to this service, contact T-Mobile customer service.

## Setting up a Multi-Party Call

1. Call the first participant in the normal way.
2. Press the Options soft key and select the New call option.
3. Call the second participant in the normal way. The first call is automatically placed on hold.
4. To join the first participant to this multi-party call, press the Options soft key and select Join. Press the Select soft key or the © key.

Note: These first two calls are then grouped together on screen and displayed with an adjacent number corresponding to the order in which the calls were made.
5. Press the Options soft key and then select the New call option to add a new person to a second multi-party call group.
6. Press the Options soft key or the key. Select the Join option and press the Select soft key or the or key.

Note: There are a maximum of two callers that can be joined to a single multi-party line. Additional callers would participate in a new Multiparty session which can be held in conjunction with the previous multiparty call. Each of these multi-party calls can then be placed on hold or swapped.

## Having a Private Conversation With One Participant

When there are two participants in a multi-party session, it might be necessary to place one of those participants on hold so that a private conversation can be held with a single caller. While you are in a multi-party call:

1. Press the Options soft key and choose the Split option. Press the Select soft key or the © key.
The short list of call participants then displays with the first caller selected.
2. Press the Up or Down Navigation key to highlight the person with which you want to talk privately, and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.

Note: You can now talk privately to that person while the other participants can continue to converse with each other. If there is only one other participant, that person is then placed on hold.
3. To return to the multi-party call, press the Options soft key and select Join. Press the Select soft key or the ©ey. All of the multi-party call participants can now hear each other again.

## Dropping One Participant

1. Highlight the number you want to drop, press the Options soft key and select End held call.

This option allows you to continue talking to the other participants.
2. Press the key to end the multi-party call.

## Section 5: Menu Navigation

Topics Covered

This section explains the menu navigation for your phone. It also includes an outline of all the available menus associated with your phone.

## Menu Navigation

You can tailor the phone's range of functions to your needs using menus and sub-menus. Menus and sub-menus can be accessed by scrolling using the Navigation keys or by using the shortcuts.

## Accessing a Menu Function by Scrolling

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Scroll using the Navigation keys to reach a main menu (for example: Settings). Press the Select soft key or the or key to enter the menu.
3. If the menu contains sub-menus, (for example, Security), after highlighting the sub menu, press the Select soft key or the © key to access it.
If the menu you selected contains further options, repeat this step.
4. To scroll through the menus, press the Up or Down Navigation keys.
5. To confirm the chosen setting, press the Select soft key, or the orey.
6. To return to the previous menu level, press the Back soft key, or the $\square$ key.
7. To exit the menu without changing the settings, press the key.

## Using Shortcuts

The menu items, such as menus, sub-menus, and options, are numbered and can be accessed quickly by using their shortcut numbers. For the main menus, press the corresponding number keys ( 1 to 0 ) to access any one of the shortcuts.

## Example: Accessing the Security menu.

1. Press the Menu soft key.

This section outlines how to select the desired text input mode when entering characters into your phone. This section also describes how to use the T9 predictive text system to reduce the number of key strokes associated with entering text.

## Changing the Text Input Mode

When using your phone, you often need to enter text, such as when storing a name in your Phonebook, creating your personal greeting or scheduling events on your calendar. You can enter alphanumeric characters by using your phone's keypad.

Your phone has the following text input modes:

- T9 mode: this mode allows you to enter words with only one keystroke per letter. Each key on the keypad has more than one letter; for example, you press 5 w to enter J, K, or L. However, the T9 mode automatically compares the series of keystrokes you make with an internal linguistic dictionary to determine the most likely word, thus requiring fewer keystrokes than the traditional ABC mode.
- ABC mode: this mode allows you to enter letters by pressing the key labeled with the corresponding letter.
- Number mode: this mode allows you to enter numbers.
- Symbol mode: this mode allows you to enter symbols, such as punctuation marks.

When you are in a field where you can enter characters, the text input mode indicator displays at the bottom right of the screen.

1．Press the Right soft key $(\exists)$ to change the text input mode．

2．Enter text in the text message box using the selected text input mode when the Text input mode indicator that you desire displays．

## Using T9 Mode

T9 is a predictive text input mode that allows you to key in any character using single keystrokes．This text input mode is based on a built－in dictionary．

To enter a word in T9 mode：
1．When you are in T9 mode，press the $\mathbf{2}$ to $\mathbf{9}$ keys to enter a word．Press each key only once for each letter．

[^7]The word that you type displays on the screen. The word may change with each consecutive key that you press.
2. Enter the whole word before editing or deleting the keystrokes.
3. When the word correctly displays, go to step 4.

If the word doesn't display correctly, press the ${ }^{*}$, key to display alternative word choices for the keys that you pressed.

Example: Both the words "Of" and "Me" use the 6 and 3 keys. The phone displays the most commonly used choice first.
4. Press the $\square \pm$ key to insert a space and begin entering the next word. To add a new word into the T9 dictionary:

1. Press the keys that correspond to the word you want to add and press the $*_{\infty}{ }^{\circ}$ key to display any alternative words.
2. Press the ${ }^{* *}$ 的 key after the last alternative word displays. The word Spell displays on the bottom right portion of the screen.
3. Press the Spell soft key or the or key.
4. Enter the word you want to add using ABC mode. For more information, refer to "Changing the Text Input Mode" on page 60.
5. Press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key or the © key after you finish entering the new word.
The word is added to the T9 dictionary and becomes a word for the associated keypress series.

Note: This feature may not be available for some languages. The 1.0 key has some emoticons associated with it. To enter other special characters within the T9 mode, press and hold the key to cycle through these characters.

To enter periods, hyphens, apostrophes, and other special characters:

- Press the 1.0 key and then press the $*_{m}$ key to cycle through these available characters.
T9 mode applies grammar rules to ensure that correct punctuation is used.
To shift case in T9 mode:
- Press the \#®t key

There are 3 cases: Initial capital, Capital lock, and Lower case.

[^8]To delete characters:

- Press the $\square$ key. Press and hold the $\square$ key to clear the display.


## Using ABC Mode

To use ABC mode, use the $\mathbf{2}$ to $\mathbf{9}$ keys to enter your text.

1. Press the key labeled with the letter you want:

- Once for the first letter
- Twice for the second letter
- And so on

2. Select the other letters in the same way.

- To enter periods, hyphens, apostrophes, and other special characters, press the 1.0. key. ABC mode applies grammar rules to ensure that correct punctuation is used.
- To shift case in ABC mode, use the \#\#+ key. There are 3 cases: Initial capital, Capital lock, and Lower case.

Note: You can move the cursor by using the Navigation keys.

## To delete letters:

- Press the $a$ key. Press and hold the $\square$ key to clear the display.

Note: The cursor moves to the right when you press a different key. When entering the same letter twice or a different letter on the same key, just wait for a few seconds for the cursor to automatically move to the right, and then select the next letter.

## Keys

By default, the first letter of an entry is capitalized and all consecutive letters are kept in lowercase (unless the Shift key is used). After a character is entered, the cursor automatically advances to the next space after two seconds or when you enter a character on a different key.

Characters scroll in the following order (lowercase characters shown in parentheses):

## Using Number Mode

The Number mode enables you to enter numbers into a text message.

- Press the keys corresponding to the digits you want to enter.


## Using Symbol Mode

Symbol mode enables you to insert symbols and punctuation marks into text. To display a list of symbols press and hold the $*_{\infty}$ key.

1. To select a symbol, press the corresponding number key.
2. To display more symbols, press the Up or Down Navigation key.
3. To clear the symbol(s), press the $\square$ key. When the input field is empty, this key returns the display to the previous mode.
4. To insert the symbol(s) into your message, press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key or the (or) key.

## Using Contacts List

The Contacts List displays all the phone numbers and contact information stored on both the phone's memory and the SIM card. From this list you can manage your phonebook entries by adding a new contact, storing a number in the phone's memory or on the SIM card, quickly locate and dial a contact phone number, edit a caller group, or delete all of the numbers stored on the phone or SIM.

## Adding a New Contact

Use the following procedures to store a new contact to your Phone or SIM Card.

## Storing a Number in the Phone's Memory

The default storage location for saving phone numbers to your phonebook is your phone's built-in memory. You can also save your numbers to your SIM card or setup a default location so that whenever a new phonebook entry is created, you are prompted to choose between Phone or SIM card. For information on how to change this setting, see "Default Saving" on page 74.

[^10]1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Phonebook icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter your Phonebook.
3. Scroll to Add new contact by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
4. Enter a first name in the First Name text box. Press the Down key to tab to the next text box.
For further details about how to enter characters, see "Using ABC Mode" on page 63.
5. Enter a last name in the Last Name text box. Press the Down key to tab to the next text box.
6. Highlight a number Type by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key, then enter a number in the text box.

The following types are available:

- Mobile: assigns the number entered to the Mobile entry.
- Home: assigns the number entered to the Home entry.
- Office: assigns the number entered to the Office entry.
- Fax: assigns the number entered to the Fax entry.
- Other: allows you to enter more detailed information for the entry.
- Email: allows you to enter the email address for the contact.
- Picture ID: allows you to add a Picture ID assigned to the contact.
- Ringtone: allows you to assign a Ringtone by choosing from one of the following locations: Default melodies, Voice list, Sounds, Music, or Do not assign (no ringtone assigned to entry).
- Group: allows you to assign this contact to a group.
- Notes: allows you to enter additional information about the contact. Up to 50 characters.

7. Press the Save soft key or press the Options soft key and highlight the Save option and press the Select soft key or the © key. The number saves to your phone and the new contact information displays.
8. To return to the Idle screen, press the $\sim 0$ key.

## Storing a Number in the SIM Card

The default storage location for saving phone numbers to your phonebook is your phone's built-in memory. To save a number to your SIM card, you need to change the Default Saving option first. For information on how to change this setting, see "Default Saving" on page 74.

Note: When storing a Phonebook entry into your SIM card, note that only the Name, and Number are saved. To save additional information for a particular contact, such as notes, e-mail, dates, etc., it is important to save that Contact into your phone's onboard memory.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Phonebook icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter your Phonebook.
3. Scroll to Management by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Highlight Default saving and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
5. Highlight SIM card and press the Select soft key or the or key.

[^11]6. Press the Back soft key until you return to the main screen (Idle mode) or press the -0 key.

Now that your phone is set up to store contacts to your SIM card, follow this procedure to store a number.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Phonebook icon. Press the Select soft key or the or key to enter your Phonebook.
3. Highlight the Add new contact option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
4. Enter a name for your contact into the Name field. A SIM card entry only has one available name field. Press the Down key to tab to the next text box.

For further details about how to enter characters, see "Using ABC Mode" on page 63.
5. Use the keypad to enter a number into the contact Phone Number field. Press the Save soft key or the © key. The number saves in your SIM card. After storing, the phone displays the Phonebook entry you just created.
6. To use the entry options after saving the number, highlight the Name field and press the Options soft key.
The following options are available:

- Edit: allows you to edit the name and number fields in the entry.
- Send message: allows you to send a Text or Picture message, or send a Voice note to the recipient.
- Call: allows you to call the newly created recipient.
- Copy to phone: allows you to copy the selected contacts' information from the SIM to the phone.
- Assign speed dial: allows you to assign the newly created SIM entry to a speed dial location.
- Send name card: allows you to send your name card as an attachment to a Text or Picture message.
- Delete: allows you to delete the name and number from the SIM card. You are asked to confirm the name and number deletion by pressing the Yes soft key. To cancel, press the No soft key.
- Add to block list: allows you to add the currently created contact entry to a list of blocked numbers. These numbers are rejected by the phone.

7. Press the -0 key to return to the Idle mode.

## Dialing a Number from the SIM Card

1. In Idle mode, press and hold the keypad corresponding to the speed dial location number for the desired phone number you want to dial.
2. If you don't know the location number, press 1.0 . location number is displayed.
Press the Left or Right key to find other phone numbers stored in the SIM card's list.
3. Press either the Dial soft key, the $\llbracket$ key, or the © key once you select the number you want to dial.

## Finding a Phonebook Entry

You can store phone numbers and their corresponding names onto either your SIM card or phone's built-in memory. They are physically separate but are used as a single entity, called Phonebook.

Depending on the storage size of the particular SIM card, the maximum number of phone numbers the card can store may differ.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Phonebook icon and press the Select soft key or the © key to enter your Phonebook.
3. Highlight Contact list and press the Select soft key or the © key.

Note: Any contacts that were stored on the SIM card are displayed with a SIM card icon ( ) to the left of the entry. Contacts that were stored on the phone display with a Phone icon (回)to the left of the entry.
4. Enter the first few letters of the name in the text box.

The Phonebook entries are listed, starting with the first entry matching your input.
5. If needed, press the Up or Down Navigation key until the entry you want is highlighted.
6. Once you locate the entry, press the $\approx$ key to dial the number, or press the Options soft key to access the following Phonebook entry options:

- View: shows details of the Phonebook entry.
- Edit: allows you to edit the Name and number for the selected contact.
- Send message: allows you to send a message to the selected number. You may choose between Text message, Picture message, or Voice note.
- New contact: takes you to the Add new contact menu.
- Call: allows you to call the currently selected contact.
- Copy to: allows you to copy the selected content entry or all contact entries to the Phone, SIM or FDN list.
- Assign speed dial: allows you to assign a speed dial key number to the selected Phonebook entry.
- Send name card via: allows you to send your name card via Text message or Picture message.
- Delete: allows you to delete the selected name and number from your Phonebook or delete multiple numbers. You are asked to confirm your name and number deletion by pressing the Yes soft key. To cancel, press the No soft key.
- Select language: allows you to select between English, Français, and Español.

7. Pressing the View option, from the above listing, displays the entry's information.
8. Press the Options soft key after the contact information is displayed, for these additional options:

- Edit: allows you to edit the name and number fields in the entry. You can also add an email address and notes.
- Send message: allows you to send a message to the selected number. You may choose between Text message, Picture message, or Voice note.
- Call: places the call to the selected phone number.
- Copy to phone/SIM card: allows you to copy the selected contacts' information to the Phone or SIM card.
- Assign speed dial: allows you to assign a speed dial key number to the selected Phonebook entry.
- Send name card via: allows you to send your name card via Text message or Picture message.
- Delete: allows you to delete the selected name and number from your Phonebook. You are then asked to confirm the name and number deletion by pressing the Yes soft key. Press the No soft key to cancel the deletion.
- Add to block list: allows you to add the currently created contact entry to a list of blocked numbers. These numbers are rejected by the phone.


## Dialing a Number from Phonebook

Once you store phone numbers in the Phonebook, you can dial them easily and quickly by using the location numbers assigned to them and listed in the Phonebook.

Note: If you cannot remember a location number, you must go into the Contact list menu in the
Phonebook menu to search for the entry by name. For more information, refer to "Finding a Phonebook Entry" on page 69.

## Speed Dialing

Once you store phone numbers from your Phonebook list, you can set up to 8 speed dial entries and then easily dial them whenever you want, by pressing the associated numeric key.

- In Idle mode, to speed dial the numbers assigned to keys (2 to 9), press and hold the appropriate key.


## Setting Up Speed Dial Entries

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Phonebook icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter your Phonebook.
3. Scroll to Speed dial by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Use the Up or Down Navigation key to select the keypad number key to where you wish to assign the new speed-dialing number and press the Add soft key or the © key.

- Select from the $\mathbf{2}$ to $\mathbf{9}$ keys, and press the $\mathbf{A d d}$ soft key.
- The $\mathbf{1}$ key is pre-reserved for quick dialing your voice mail.

5. Highlight a contact entry number from the contact list and press the Select soft key or the © key.
6. Highlight the Select option and press the ©ey.
7. You receive a Saved confirmation and the Speed dial menu displays the number assigned to the number key you selected.
8. To return to the Idle screen, press the 20 key.

Note: Memory location 1 is reserved for your Voice mail server number and this speed dial location can not be changed. The voice server number can be altered via the Messages > Voice mail > Voice server number menu.

## Editing a Caller Group

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Phonebook icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter your Phonebook.
3. Highlight the Groups option and press the Select soft key or the oey.
4. Scroll through the group list by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key.
5. Highlight the group you want and press the Options soft key.
6. Highlight the Edit option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
7. To edit the Caller group name, modify the text in the Name text box.
8. To change the image associated with the Caller group, press the Down navigation key to highlight the Picture ID icon. Press the © key.

The following options are available:

- Take picture: allows you to take a picture with your camera.
- Photos: allows you to choose a photo from Photos folder.
- Downloaded images: allows you to choose a photo from your Downloaded images folder.
- Icons: allows you to choose from pre-defined icons.

9. To change the ringtone associated with the Caller group, press the Down key to highlight the Ringtone icon. Press the key.
The following options are available:

- Default melodies: allows you to choose between 11 different melodies.
- Voice list: allows you to assign a voice clip to this group.
- Sounds: allows you to choose a sound from your Sounds folder.
- Music: allows you to choose a music file from your Music folder.

10. Press the Save soft key when you are finished. Your Caller group settings save.
11. Press the $\approx 0$ key to return to Idle mode.

## Block List

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Phonebook icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter your Phonebook.
3. Select the Block list option by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Press the Options soft key, press the Right Navigation key to go from the Add new option and select a block criteria from one the following categories:

- Number: blocks a specific number.
- Contacts: blocks selected contact entries.
- Group: block numbers associated with a specific caller Group
- FDN contacts: blocks selected FDN contact entries.
- Recent contacts: blocks selected numbers which are selected from the recent calls list.
- Unknown numbers: blocks incoming calls from unknown numbers.

5. Press the Save soft key to add the selected number to your block list.

## Deleting all of the Phonebook Entries

You can delete all your entries from your phone's memory, your SIM card, FDN, or All.

Important!: Once Phonebook entries are deleted, they cannot be recovered.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Phonebook icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter your Phonebook.
3. Highlight Management and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Scroll to Delete all by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the © key.
5. Press the $\mathbf{O K}$ key to place a check mark by the memory location you want to empty (All, Phone, SIM card, or SIM card(FDN)) and press the Delete soft key.

Tip: Press the OK key to remove the check mark.
6. When the Delete? confirmation message displays, press the Yes soft key or the © key.
7. Press the No soft key to cancel.
8. Press the
key to return to Idle mode.

## Management

The Management menu allows you to select where your contacts are saved, copy your SIM contacts to your phone, delete your contacts, sort by contacts, or check your memory status.

## View Contacts

This option allows you to view all the contacts stored on the Phone or the Phone and SIM.

## Default Saving

The Default Saving option allows you to choose where your contacts are saved. The following options are available:

- Phone: new phonebook contacts are saved to your phone. Your phone comes with the default set to Phone memory.
- SIM card: new phonebook contacts are saved to your SIM card.
- Ask on saving: you are prompted to choose between Phone or SIM Card whenever you save a new contact.


## Copy all to

The Copy all to option allows you to copy all the contact information to your Phone or SIM card.

## Sort by contacts

The Sort by contacts menu option allows you to set the sort function to alphabetize the contacts by First name or Last name.

## Delete AII

Important!: Once contact entries are deleted, they cannot be recovered.
This option allows you to delete all your contacts from the Phonebook. For more information, refer to "Deleting all of the Phonebook Entries" on page 73.

## Memory Status

You can check how many names and numbers are stored in the Phonebook, within both the SIM card, Phone memory, and the FDN. You can also see the current storage capacity of both memories.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Scroll to the Phonebook icon using the Navigation keys. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter your Phonebook.
3. Highlight Management and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Select the Memory status option by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the © key.
5. Press the $\square$ key or the Back soft key when you are finished.

## Own Number

This function is a memory aid, which you can use to check your own phone number if you need to do so.
You can assign a name to each of your own phone numbers registered on your SIM card. You can also edit the names and numbers. Any changes made here do not in any way affect the actual subscriber numbers on your SIM card.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Phonebook icon. Press the Select soft key or the ©ey to enter your Phonebook.
3. Select the Own number option by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Highlight the Number 1 entry to reveal a drop down containing your current number.

To edit your number information:

1. Press the © key. This makes the phone number field accessible.
2. Highlight the Phone Number field and press the $\square$ to backspace and erase the existing number.
3. Enter the new number information and press the Save soft key.

## FDN List

FDN (Fixed Dial Number) mode, if supported by your SIM card, allows you to restrict your outgoing calls to a limited set of phone numbers.
The FDN List allows you to set up a list of numbers that your phone may dial.
FDN mode must first be enabled in the Security settings. For more information on changing this setting, see "FDN mode" on page 110.

To enable FDN mode, a PIN2 number is required. You can obtain your PIN2 from T-Mobile customer service.

This section describes how to send or receive different types of messages. It also explains the features and functionality associated with messaging.

## Types of Messages

Your phone provides the following message types:

- Text Messages
- Picture Messages
- Voice Notes
- Voice Mail
- Broadcast Messages (SIM Dependent)
- Instant Messaging


## Text Messages

Short Message Service (SMS) allows you to send and receive short text messages to and from other mobile phones. In addition, your phone supports the Enhanced Messaging Service (EMS), which enables you to include simple graphics, melodies, and animated images in your messages. To use this feature, you must subscribe to T-Mobile's message service.

The Message icon ( $\sqrt{\overline{7}}$ ) displays when you receive a new text message. When the memory is full, the message icon flashes on your phone and you cannot receive any new messages. You must delete a message before you can receive additional messages.

- Use the Delete option in each message box to erase obsolete messages.


## Create new

In this menu, you can write and send a text message.

## Creating a Simple Text Message

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Messages icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Create new option and press the Select soft key or the (O) key.
4. Highlight the Text message option and press the Select soft key or the (o) key.
5. Create your message.

[^13]6. When you finish entering your message, press the Options soft key. The following options are available:

- Insert from: allows you to insert from the Text templates, Phonebook, or Bookmarks. The Text messages template allows you to apply one of the preset message templates to the text. Select one of the 10 items stored in the Text messages Text templates menu. Phonebook allows you to add names and phone numbers to your message. Bookmarks allows you to add Internet addresses to your message.
- Add content: allows you to add a picture, animation, or melody to your message.
- Attach: allows you to attach a Name card, Schedule, Anniversary item, Miscellaneous item, or Task to your message.
- Save to Drafts: save the message to your Phone or SIM card.
- Select language: allows you to set the language to English, Français, and Español.
- Text style: allows you to format the style of the text.

For the Text size, Large, Medium, and Small size are available. Text mode options are Normal, Underline, and Strikethrough. The options for Bold and Italic are set by using the er key to place a checkmark next to the style attribute. Alignment options are Left, Center, and Right.

- Back: allows you save to your draft folder without sending.

7. Press the Send © key.
8. Highlight one of the following send options:

- Recent recipients: allows you to select a number or an address from the last 20 destinations you entered.
- Phonebook: allows you to enter the phone number you want from your phonebook.
- Phone number: allows you to enter a new phone number.

9. Enter a New number then press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key. The number you selected is entered in the To text box.
10. Press the Add soft key for the following options:

- Recent recipients: allows you to select from recipients of your previous messages.
- Phonebook: allows you to enter the phone number you want from your phonebook.
- Phone number: allows you to enter a new phone number.
- Group: allows you to send the text message to an entire group such as Family, Work, or Friends.
- FDN list: allows you to enter a contact from your FDN list.

11. When you finish entering the destinations, press the Send key to send the message.

## Picture Messages

This menu allows you to use the Multimedia Message Service (MMS).
Picture Messaging is a messaging service that provides delivery of personal picture messages from phone to phone or from phone to email. The Picture Message icon

displays on an on-screen tab when you receive a new picture message. In addition to the familiar text content available via traditional text messages, picture messages can contain images, graphics, voice, and audio clips.

Note: A Picture Messaging message is a multimedia presentation contained in a single file. It is not a text file with attachments.

You must first retrieve a picture message from T-Mobile's network before you can view the message. The displays in your Inbox list to indicate any not yet retrieved Picture messages. The Retrieved Multimedia Message icon (聞 $乙$ ) displays once you successfully retrieve a new picture message from the network.
Using the Picture Messaging feature, your phone can receive and send messages that contain multimedia files, such as photos, sounds and images that you downloaded from the Internet, audio or sounds you recorded, and voice lists. This function is available only if it is supported by your service provider. Only phones that offer picture messaging features can receive and display picture messages.

## Create new

This menu allows you to create a new picture message and then send it to one or more destinations.

## Creating and Sending a Picture Message

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Messages icon and press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Create new option and press the Select soft key or the (o) key.
4. Highlight the Picture message option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
5. Highlight Subject and press the or key.
6. Enter the subject of your message and press the © key.

Note: For more information about entering characters, see "Using ABC Mode" on page 63.
7. Highlight the Image \& Video option and press the © key.
8. Highlight one of the following options and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.

- Take picture: launches the camera for you to take a picture.
- Downloaded images: allows you to select a previously downloaded image to send in the picture message.
- Photos: allows you to select a picture from your photos folder.
- Record video: launches the camcorder for you to shoot video.
- Downloaded videos: allows you to select a previously downloaded video file to send in the picture message.
- Videos: allows you to select a video from your videos folder.
- Memory card: allows you to select an image or video from the memory card.

9. Select an image/video and press the Options soft key.
10. Highlight the Add option and press the Select soft key or the © key to add it to your message.
11. Highlight the Sound option and press the $\odot$ key.
12. Highlight one of the following options and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.

- Record audio: allows you to record a new voice message.
- Sounds: allows you to select a sound from your Sounds folder.
- Voice list: takes you to the Voice list (Recorded audio) folder to select a voice note to add.
- Memory card: allows you to select a sound file from your memory card.

13. Select an audio file and press the Options soft key.
14. Highlight the Add option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey to add the sound to your message.
15. Highlight Message and press the ©ey.
16. Enter your message and press the © key.
17. To change the Subject or Message, select a category and press the Options soft key. Highlight Edit to edit the item.
18. To change the image or sound with another one, select a category and press the Options soft key. Depending on the category selected, highlight Remove media to remove or replace the item.
19. When you finish creating the message, press the Send to soft key.
20. Highlight one of the following send options, press the Send soft key or the (or) key:

- Recent recipients: allows you to select a number or an address from the last 20 destinations you entered.
- Phonebook: allows you to enter the phone number you want from your phonebook.
- New recipient: allows you to manually enter a phone number or email address.
- My Album: allows you to send the message to My Album.
- My Journal: allows you to send the message to My Journal.

The number or address selected displays in the To text box.
21. If you selected more than one recipient, press the Options soft key for the following options:

- Add recipients: allows you to add additional recipients to this message.
- Change recipient: allows you to change the $\mathbf{T o}, \mathbf{C c}$, or $\mathbf{B c c}$ additional numbers.

22. Press the Send © key. Your phone sends the Picture message.

## Voice Notes

In this menu, you can record a voice note of up to one minute long and then immediately send it via Picture Messaging. The Voicemail Message icon ( ) displays when you receive a new voice note message.

## Creating and sending a Voice Note

When you access this menu, a timer displays on the screen.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access the Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Voice note icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.

- This menu can also be accessed by:
- Scrolling to the Messages icon and press the Select soft key or the or key to enter the menu.
- Highlight the Create new option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
- Highlight the Voice note option and press the Select soft key or the © key.

3. Press the Record soft key to begin recording.
4. Record a memo by speaking into the phone's microphone.

The display simultaneously shows the elapsed time and the remaining time.
5. Press the Stop soft key when you are finished recording. Or, when the recording time is expired, the display advances to the next screen.

Note: Your voice note automatically saves in the Voice list.
6. Press the Options soft key for the following options:

- Send to: allows you to send the Voice note.
- Play: plays back your Voice note.
- Re-record: discards the previous Voice note and enables you to record a new voice note.
- Set default destination: allows you to remove or edit the default destination.
- Set as: allows you to assign the new voice note file as either a Default Ringtone, Caller ringtone, or Alarm tone.
- Save: allows you to save the Voice Note in the Voice list.

7. Highlight the Save option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
8. To send the Voice note, press the Send soft key or select the Send to option in the Options menu.
9. Highlight one of the following send options:

- Recent recipients: allows you to select either a number or an address from the last 20 destinations you entered.
- Phonebook: allows you to enter the phone number you want from your phonebook.
- New recipient: allows you to manually enter a phone number or email address.
- My Album: allows you to send the message to My Album.
- My Journal: allows you to send the message to My Journal.

10. Highlight the selection and press the $\circledast$ key.
11. Follow the instructions depending on which option was selected.
12. If you selected more than one recipient, press the Options soft key for the following options:

- Add recipients: allows you to add additional recipients to this Voice note.
- Change recipient: allows you to select To, Cc or Bcc additional numbers.

13. Press the Send or soft key to send this voice note.

Your phone sends the message. The message saves to the Outbox after it successfully sends.

## Inbox

The Inbox stores received messages. You can tell what kind of message was received by the icon displayed. If the icon envelope is open then the message was read, otherwise a closed envelope displays.
The following types of messages may display in your Inbox list:
Voice note
Text messages
Push messages

When you enter the Inbox, the list of messages displays with the sender's phone numbers, or names, if available in your Phonebook. After you read the message, the open envelope icon displays.

Tip: Press the Left or Right Navigation keys to scroll between Inbox, Outbox, and Drafts.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Messages icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Inbox option and press the Select soft key or the © key.

## Viewing a Text Message from the Inbox

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Messages icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Inbox option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
4. Select a text message from the list and press the Options soft key.

The following options display:

- Reply via: allows you to send a reply to the sender by sending a Text message, Picture message, or Voice note.
- Call back: allows you to call the sender of the text message.
- Forward: allows you to forward the text message to another person.
- Delete: deletes the selected text message or multiple messages.
- Move to phone: allows you to move the message from the SIM card into the phone's memory. This option is only available for messages stored in the SIM card. Depends on where the current message was saved.
- Sort by: allows you to sort messages by Read/Unread, Date, Name, Type, Size, or Subject.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to protect the message from deletion or unlock the message for deletion.

5. Press the View Key (from the main listing) to read the message contents.
6. To scroll through the text, press the Up or Down Navigation key.

Press the Options soft key while reading a text message to display the following:

- Reply via: allows you to send a reply to the sender by sending a Text message, Picture message, or Voice note.
- Call back: allows you to call the sender of the text message.
- Forward: allows you to forward the message to another number.
- Save address: allows you to extract the sender's number and URL, email addresses or phone numbers from the message text, so that you can save them in your phone's memory.
- Delete: allows you to delete the message.
- Move to phone: allows you to move the message from the SIM card into the phone's memory. This option is only available for messages stored in the SIM card. Depends on where the current message was saved.
- Move to SIM card: allows you to move the message from the Phone's memory into the SIM card. This option is only available for messages stored in the Phone's memory. Depends on where the current message was saved.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to protect the message from deletion or unlock the message for deletion.


## Viewing a Picture Message from the Inbox

1. Highlight a retrieved picture message 䁅 from the list and press the Options soft key. The following options display:

- Reply via: allows you to send a reply to the sender by sending a Picture message, Text message, or Voice note.
- Reply all via: allows you to send a reply to the sender by sending a Picture message or Voice note.
- Call back: allows you to call the sender back.
- Forward: allows you to forward the message to another number.
- Delete: deletes either a selected or multiple picture messages.
- Sort by: allows you to sort messages by Read/Unread, Date, Name, Type, Size, or Subject.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to protect the message from deletion or unlock the message for deletion.
- Properties: shows you information about the message, such as time and date the message was received, the sender's email address or phone number, recipient's email address or phone number, Cc, message size, priority, and class.

2. Press the View or soft key (from the main listing) to begin the retrieval process and view the message contents.
3. Press the Options soft key while viewing the Picture message. The following options display:

- Reply via: allows you to send a reply to the sender by sending a Picture message, Text message, or Voice note.
- Reply all via: allows you to send a reply to the sender by sending a Picture message or Voice note.
- Call back: allows you to call the sender back.
- Forward: allows you to forward the message to another number.
- Replay: allows you to redisplay the picture.
- Save address: allows you to save the phone number or email address of the person who sent this Picture message.
- Save media: allows you to save the media to the appropriate folder.
- Delete: deletes the selected picture message.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to protect the message from deletion or unlock the message for deletion.
- Properties: shows you information about the message, such as time and date the message was received, the sender's email address or phone number, recipient's email address or phone number, Cc, message size, priority, and class.

4. To scroll through the contents, press the Up or Down Navigation keys.
5. Press the Back soft key or the when you are finished viewing the message.

## Listening to a Voice Note from the Inbox

1. Select a Voice Note from the list and press the Options soft key.

The following options display:

- Reply via: allows you to send a reply to the sender by sending a Voice note, Text message, or Picture message.
- Reply all via: allows you to send a reply to the sender by sending a Voice note or Picture message.
- Call back: allows you to call the sender back.
- Forward: allows you to forward the message to another number.
- Delete: allows you delete either a selected or multiple saved voice notes.
- Sort by: allows you to sort messages by Read/Unread, Date, Name, Type, Size, or Subject.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to protect the message from deletion or unlock the message for deletion.
- Properties: shows you information about the message, such as time and date the message was received, the sender's email address or phone number, recipient's email address or phone number, Cc, message size, priority, and class.

2. Press the Play © key (from the main listing) to listen to the message contents.
Press the Options soft key while listening to the message and choose from the following:

- Reply via: allows you to send a reply to the sender by sending a Voice note, Text message, or Picture message.
- Reply all via: allows you to send a reply to the sender by sending a Voice note or Picture message.
- Call back: allows you to call the sender back.
- Forward: allows you to forward the message to another number.
- Replay: allows you to replay the voice note.
- Delete: allows you to delete the selected message.
- Save address: allows you to cut and paste the address to send a text message, or picture message.
- Save media: allows you to save message media to your Voice list.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to protect the message deletion.
- Properties: shows you information about the message, such as time and date the message was received, the sender's email address or phone number, recipient's email address or phone number, Cc, message size, priority, and class.


## Viewing a Picture Message After You Receive It

When a new picture message comes in, the display shows the Picture Messaging Message icon (

1. Press the View soft key to view the message.

Press the Exit soft key if you want to view the message later in the Inbox.
2. Press the Options soft key to access the various options described above.
3. Press the $\approx 0$ key when you are finished.

## Outbox

This message box stores messages that you sent.
When you enter this menu, the list of messages in the Outbox displays with the recipients' phone numbers or names, if available in your Phonebook.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Messages icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Outbox option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.

Note: Press the Left or Right Navigation keys to scroll between Inbox, Outbox, and Drafts.
4. Select a message from the list and press the View ©ey to view the message contents.

Tip: Press the Options soft key while reading a message to select alternate options.

## Drafts

This message box stores messages that you may want to edit or send at a later time. When you enter this menu, the list of messages in the box displays.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Messages icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Drafts option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.

Note: Press the Up or Down Navigation keys to scroll between Inbox, Outbox, and Drafts.
4. Select a message from the list and press the Options soft key.
5. Highlight the Edit option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey to edit the message contents.
6. Press the Send or soft key (while viewing the message) to send the message.

Tip: Press the Options soff key while reading a message to select alternate options.

## Templates

Besides entering message text using the keypad keys, you can speed up message composition by including copies of stored text or picture (Templates) in your message.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Messages icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Templates option and press the Select soft key or the © key.

## Voice Mail

This menu provides you with a way of accessing your voice mailbox, if provided by your network.

3. Highlight the Voice mail option and press the Select soft key or the © key.

Note: Before you can use the Voice Mail feature, you must obtain the voice server number from T-Mobile customer service.

The following options display:

- Call voice mail: pressing the Select soft key or the ©ey to listen to your messages.

Tip: In Idle mode you can also press and hold the Tix key to connect to the voice server.

- Voice server number: allows you to change the voice mail server number, if necessary.

Note: Voice mail is a network feature. Please contact T-Mobile customer service for further details.

## Delete all

This menu allows you to delete all of the messages in each message box. Or, you can also delete all of your messages in all message boxes at one time.

[^14]1. Press the Up or Down Navigation key to select a message box to clear. To delete all of your messages, select the All option.
2. Press the key to place or remove a check mark.
3. Press the Delete soft key to delete the marked objects.
4. After you receive the Delete? confirmation, press the Yes soft key to delete or press the No soft key to cancel.

## Settings

In this menu, you can set up a default text message or a picture message. The last setting you accessed is automatically activated for sending subsequent messages.

## Text message

- Service center: allows you to store or change the number of your message center, which is required when sending messages. You must obtain this number from T-Mobile customer service.
- Destination address: allows you to enter a number that you would like to send all messages to. You can still message others, but this number always displays in the Recipient list.
- Validity period: allows you to set the length of time your text messages are stored at the message center while attempts are made to deliver them.
- Reply path: allows the recipient of your message to send you a reply message using your message center, if your network supports this service.
- Delivery report: allows you to activate or deactivate the report function. When this function is activated, the network informs you whether or not your message was delivered.


## Picture message

Use the following options to set Send and Receive settings for Picture messages.

## Send Settings

- Delivery report: when this option is enabled, the network informs you whether or not your message was delivered.
- Read reply: when this option is enabled, your phone sends a request for a reply along with your message to the recipient.
- Priority: you can select the priority level of your messages.
- Expiry: set the length of time your messages are stored in the message center while the network attempts to deliver them.
- Delivery after: you can set a delay time before the phone sends your messages.


## Receive Settings

- Anonymous reject: you can set your phone to automatically reject anonymous messages.
- Ads allowed: you can set your phone to automatically receive advertising messages.
- Report allowed: you can set the option to receive a delivery report.


## Memory Status

You can view the amount of the allocated memory and the memory available for picture messages.

The display shows the total space including the used and free space. You can also view how much space and the number of messages currently occupying each message box type:

- Text Message (saved on the phone) ( $\square$ )
- Text Message (saved on the SIM card) (回)
- Inbox
- Outbox
- Draft
- Picture message
- Inbox
- Outbox
- Draft
- Template
- Push messages


## Broadcast Messages (SIM Card Dependent)

This network service allows you to receive text messages on various topics, such as the weather or traffic.

Please contact T-Mobile's customer service center for further details.

## Instant Messaging (IM)

Instant Messaging is a way of sending short, simple messages that are delivered real time to users online.

Before using this feature, you need to subscribe to a messenger service. Your handset has 4 pre-loaded Messaging services (AIM, ICQ, Windows Live, and Yahoo!).

Note: Contact T-Mobile customer service for further details.

## Starting your Instant Messaging

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the IM icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the messenger service to which you have previously subscribed to by using the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Highlight the Sign on, Connect, or Sign in option, depending on your messenger service and press the Select soft key or the © key.
5. Enter the required sign on information such as ID and password, then press the Down Navigation key.

Note: The information required for sign on varies depending on the Instant Messaging provider you use.
6. Fill in all the appropriate fields and press the Sign in soft key or the
(o) key.
7. Agree to the terms and conditions of use for this service and press the I agree soft key or the ok key.
8. Follow the on-screen instructions to read, reply to, compose, send, and manage your Instant Messaging account.

## Using the Instant Messenger Options

After selecting an Instant Messaging service, the following options display:

- Sign on/Connect/Sign in: allows you to login to your Instant Messaging account.
- Saved conversations: displays permanent records of your Instant Messaging conversations.
- Offline conversations: displays a listing of any conversations made while you were offline (this options applies only to AIM and ICQ messenger).
- Preferences: allows you to change your Preferences.
- Help: provides helpful information about IM providers such as: Sign up, Sign on, Buddies, Sending IMs, Receiving IMs, Privacy, and Away.

This section explains the sound and phone settings for your phone. It includes such settings as: display, security, memory, and any extra settings associated with your phone.

## Wi-Fi Settings

Once set up for Wi-Fi connectivity, your phone automatically uses Wi-Fi, when available, for all your mobile phone services. For more information, refer to "Wi-Fi" on page 23.

## Time \& Date

This menu allows you to change the current time and date displayed.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Settings icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Time \& date option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
The following options are available:

- Time zone updating: allows you to set the parameter for updating the on board time to either: Automatic (via carrier sync up), Manual only (user-defined), Prompt first (User is prompted for time change, if available).
- Home zone: allows you to set your primary time zone.
- Time: allows you to change the hour and minute.
- AM/PM: allows you to set either AM or PM.
- Time format: allows you to select whether your time displays in either a 12 hours or 24 hours format.
- Date: allows you to enter the month, day, and year.
- Date format: allows you to select MM/DD/YYYY, DD/MM/YYYY, or YYYY/MM/DD format.
- Week start day: allows you to select the day of the week you wish to set as a start day. Choose from Sunday or Monday.

To change your time and date settings:

1. Use the Up or Down Navigation key to select the option you wish to change.
2. Use the Left or Right key to position the cursor over the number you wish to change.
3. Enter the desired number.
4. To change other options, use the Navigation keys to select the desired setting.
5. Press the Save soft key when you are finished changing your settings; otherwise press the Cancel soft key.

## Phone Settings

You can customize various phone settings.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Settings icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Phone settings option and press the Select soft key or the © Key. The following options display:

## Language

This menu allows you to select a display language for Text language and Input mode. Choose from Automatic, English, Français, and Español.

## Greeting message

This menu allows you to set a text greeting to be displayed briefly when the phone is switched on.

For details about entering characters, see "Entering Text" on page 60.

## Slide settings

You can configure what action the phone will take when a particular sliding action is taken. The top portion of the phone can either slide open or closed.

1. Highlight the Up option and then use the Left or Right Navigation key to select the action the phone will take when the cover slides up: Accept call or None.

- When the Accept call option is selected, you can simply slide open the phone to answer an incoming call. When None is selected, you must press a key to answer the incoming call, depending on the answer setting.

2. Highlight the Down option and then use the Left or Right Navigation key to select the action the phone will take when the cover slides down: Stop operation or Continue operation.
3. Press the Save soft key when you are finished changing your settings; otherwise press the Cancel soft key.

## USB settings

This menu selects the method of communication for the USB port, the options include:

- Modem: allows you to use the phone as a wireless modem for communication between a computer and the Internet.
- Mass storage: allows you to utilize the onboard storage capacity of the phone to store and upload files. This option allows your computer to detect the phone as a removable storage drive.

Note: You must select Modem to connect to PC Studio.

## Extra settings

You can turn the automatic redialing or answering features on or off.

1. To turn a feature on, highlight the feature and press the oey. A check mark displays in front of the option.
2. To turn a feature off, highlight the checked feature and press the ©ey. The check mark no longer displays.

The following options are available:

- Auto redial: when this option is checked, the phone makes up to ten attempts to redial a phone number after an unsuccessful call.

Note: The interval between call attempts varies.

- Anykey answer: when this option is checked, you can answer an incoming call by pressing any key, except the $-0^{\circ}$ key or the Reject soft key. To reject the call, press the $\rightarrow 0$ key or the Reject soft key. When this option is unchecked, you must press the $\backsim$ key or the Accept soft key to answer a call.

3. When you finish changing your settings, press the Save soft key to save your settings. Otherwise press the Cancel soft key.

## Airplane mode

Airplane Mode allows you to use many of your phone's features, such as Games, Voice Notes, etc., when you are in an airplane or in any other area where making or receiving calls or data is prohibited. When your phone is in Airplane Mode, it cannot send or receive any calls or access online information.

1. To turn a feature on, highlight the Airplane mode option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
2. Highlight On or Off and press the Save soft key.

## Display Settings

In this menu, you can change various settings for the display or backlight.

## Wallpaper

This menu allows you to change the background image to be displayed in Idle mode.

1. Highlight the Wallpaper option and press the © key to open the following options:

- Browse wallpapers: allows you to download additional wallpapers from tzones.
- Default wallpapers: allows you to choose from a list of wallpapers included with your phone.
- Downloaded images: allows you to choose a photo from your downloaded images folder.
- Photos: allows you to choose a photo from Photos folder.

To change the background image:

1. Press the Navigation keys to scroll through the list and select a wallpaper.
2. Place a checkmark on the Menu background option by pressing the (or) key.
3. Highlight the Transparency option and press the Left or Right Navigation key to determine the amount of transparency for the background.
4. Make a selection and press the Save soft key or the © key.

## Info display

You can select the text style and text color of the informational text displayed on the Main LCD.

1. Highlight an option and press the Left or Right Navigation keys to change the settings.
2. Press the Save soft key to apply your changes, or the Cancel soft key to cancel.

## Skin

You can select the background color of the menus displayed on the Main LCD. There are two different patterns (Black or White) from which to choose.

1. Press the Up or Down Navigation keys to change the settings.
2. Press the Save soft key to apply your changes, or the Cancel soft key to cancel.

## Brightness

You can adjust the display brightness of the Main LCD to make it easier to see under different lighting conditions.

1. Press the Left or Right Navigation keys to change your settings.
2. Press the Save soft key to save your changes, or the Cancel soft key to cancel.

## Backlight

In this menu, you can select the length of time that the keypad backlight is on and how much longer the display is illuminated before going off.

The $\mathbf{O n}$ setting is how long the keypad backlight is on. You can select $\mathbf{1 5} \mathbf{s e c}$, $30 \mathrm{sec}, 1 \mathrm{~min}, \mathbf{3} \mathbf{~ m i n}$, or $\mathbf{1 0} \mathbf{~ m i n}$.

The Dim option is how much longer after the keypad backlight goes off that the display remains lit. You can select $\mathbf{0 f f}, \mathbf{1 5 ~ s e c , ~} \mathbf{3 0} \mathbf{~ s e c}, 1 \mathrm{~min}$, or $\mathbf{3} \mathbf{~ m i n}$.
For example, if you set $\mathbf{O n}$ for $\mathbf{3 0} \mathbf{~ s e c}$ and $\mathbf{D i m}$ for $\mathbf{1 5}$ sec, after 30 seconds the backlight on the keys would turn off and 15 seconds later the display light would turn off.

1. Press the Left or Right Navigation keys to change each field's settings.
2. Press the Save soft key to save your changes, or the Cancel soft key to cancel.

## Dialing display

This menu allows you to select the size and color of your dialing font and the background color.

To change the size of the font:

1. Highlight the Font size option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
2. Use the Left or Right key to select between: Large, Medium, or Small.
3. Press the Save soft key or the © key to save your change. Otherwise, press the Cancel soft key.

To change the color of the font:

1. Highlight the Font color option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
2. Use the Left or Right key to select either Basic (black), Rainbow, Monochrome or Gradation. If you select Monochrome or Gradation, you can select another option by using the Down Navigation key and then scrolling through the available choices.
3. Choose from up to 15 different options.
4. Press the Save soft key or the © key to save your change. Otherwise, press the Cancel soft key or the $\square$ key.
To change the background color:
5. Highlight the Background color option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
6. Use the Left or Right key to select between 20 different colors or None.
7. Press the Save soft key or the © key to save your change. Otherwise, press the Cancel soft key.

## Calendar

This option allows you to $\mathbf{0 n}$ (enable) or $\mathbf{0 f f}$ (disable) the calendar display for your background wallpaper.

## Show caller information

The Show Caller Information option, when turned On, displays information such as the caller name on your screen when your missed calls are listed. Caller must already be on your Contact list for additional information to display. Select the Off option to display only the phone number on the screen.

## Bluetooth

## About Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communications technology capable of exchanging information over a distance of about 30 feet without requiring a physical connection.

Unlike infrared, you don't need to line up the devices to beam information with Bluetooth. If the devices are within a range of one another, you can exchange information between them, even if they are located in different rooms.

The following Bluetooth options are available:

## Turn Bluetooth OnIOff

This option allows you to turn Bluetooth On or Off.

- Make a selection and press the Select soft key or the © key.


## My devices

This option allows you to search for new Bluetooth devices.

- Highlight the Search new device option and press the Select soft key or the © key. The phone then searches for available devices.


## Bluetooth services

Actually, the Bluetooth specification is a protocol that describes how the short-range wireless technology works, whereas individual profiles describe the services supported by individual devices. Profiles reduce the chance that different devices integrate.

The following Service profiles are available:

- Headset: The remote Bluetooth headset enables both incoming and outgoing calls.
- Handsfree: The remote Bluetooth car kit enables both incoming and outgoing calls.


## Help

Accesses the t-zones site for general help information.

## Sound Settings

You can customize various sound settings.

## Incoming call

## Browse MegaTones

Using the Browse MegaTones option on the sounds list, you can quickly access the T-Mobile website and download new sounds by using the $t$-zone browser.

- Press the Connect soft key to purchase additional sound files.


## Browse HiFi Ringers

Using the Browse HiFi Ringers option on the sounds list, you can quickly access the T-Mobile website and use the t-zone browser to download new HiFi Ringers.

- Press the Connect soft key to purchase additional ringtones.


## Ring tone

This menu allows you to select a ring melody.

1. Highlight Ring tone and press the © key.
2. Use the Up or Down key to highlight a ring tone or press the Left or Right key to select a file from either the Default melodies, Voice list, Downloaded sounds, or Music folders.
3. Press the Select soft key or the or key.

## Volume

This menu allows you to adjust the ring volume to one of 7 levels.
Use the Right or Left key to increase or decrease the volume.

## Alert type

This menu allows you to specify how you are to be informed of incoming calls.

- Use the Right or Left key to select a Alert type.

The following options are available:

- Melody: the phone rings using the ring melody selected in the Ring tone menu.
- Vibration: the phone vibrates but does not ring.
- Melody and vibration: the phone rings using the ring melody, and also vibrates.
- Vibration then melody: the phone vibrates 3 times and then starts ringing.
- Melody then vibration: the phone rings using the ring melody, then vibrates.


## Keypad tone

This menu allows you to select the key tone and volume that the phone sounds when you press a key.

1. Highlight the $\mathbf{O n} / \mathbf{O f f}$ field and use the Right or Left Navigation keys to make your selection.
2. Select On or Off to turn the sound on or off.
3. Highlight the Key Tone field and press the © key to display the Keypad tone options.
4. Highlight one of the following and press the Select soft key.

- Xylophone
- Beep
- Voice

5. Scroll to Volume using the Up or Down Navigation keys.
6. Press the Left or Right Navigation keys to adjust the volume (levels $1-7$ ).
7. Press the Save soft key or the © key to save your change. Otherwise, press the Cancel soft key or the $\sim 0$ key to return to Idle mode.

## Message tone

This menu allows you to set up the ringer for incoming messages. You can set the Tone, Alert type, and Repetition.

1. Highlight the Tone field and use the Key to display the options. Select Tone1, Tone2, Tone3, or Tone4, and press the Select soft key.
2. Highlight the Alert type field and use the Left or Right Navigation keys to highlight one of the following, and press the Select soft key.

- Melody: the phone rings using the ring melody selected in the Ring tone menu.
- Vibration: the phone vibrates but does not ring.
- Vibration then melody: the phone vibrates 3 times and then starts ringing.
- Off: turns off all message alert types.

3. Scroll to Repetition using the Up or Down Navigation keys.
4. Press the Left or Right Navigation keys to select how many times the tone is repeated: Once, Every 1 min, or Every 2 min.
5. Press the Save soft key or the © key to save your change.

Otherwise, press the Cancel soft key or the key to return to Idle mode.

## Power-onloff tone

This menu allows you to select the melody that the phone sounds when it is switched on and off.

- To turn off the sound, select Off.


## Slide tone

This menu allows you to choose from four tones, or Off when opening the slide of your phone.

## Silent mode

This menu allows you to select whether or not your phone vibrates while in silent mode. You may choose between Vibration and Mute.

## Extra tones

You can customize additional tones for the phone.

1. Press the © key to turn a selected tone $\mathbf{O n}$. A check mark displays in front of the option. Press the Save soft key to save the setting.
2. Press the © key twice to turn a selected tone Off. The check mark no longer displays in front of the option.

The following options are available:

- Indicative tone: generates a tone whenever a pop-up window displays on the screen.
- Minute minder: sets whether or not the phone beeps every minute during an outgoing call to keep you informed of the length of your call.
- Connection tone: sets whether or not the phone beeps when your call is connected to the system.
- Alerts on call: sets whether or not you receive tones when a message arrives while you are on a call.

3. Press the Save soft key to save the setting, otherwise press the Cancel soft key.

## Synchronization

The first time you access the synchronization feature the handset prompts with the following message:
"Would you like to store a copy of your contacts on My.T-Mobile.com so you can view and manage your contacts online?"

1. Press the or key to agree to the copying of the contact information.

Once the process is complete a new message appears:
"Synchronization complete! Phone will automatically sync on every phonebook edit you make. To change sync settings go to, Settings > Synchronization. To manage your contacts, go to: "t-mobile.com".

This feature allows you to back up (synchronize) Contact information, Calendar, and Tasks stored on your phone with your T-Mobile account on the network. Each time you edit contact information your phone automatically synchronizes with the web Address Book.
2. Press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key to complete the process and return to the idle screen.

Important!: Synchronization is a service offered to T-Mobile customers.

## Sync Now

Once you establish the information you want to synchronize (using the Data to Sync option), this feature allows you to synchronize with the T-Mobile network.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key.
2. Scroll to Settings and press the Select soft key or the © key.
3. Select Synchronization by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Highlight Sync Now and press the Select soft key or the © key. The information synchronizes with the T-Mobile network and a confirmation dialog displays when finished.
5. Press the $\approx 0$ key to return to Idle mode.

## Data to Sync

This feature allows you to synchronize your Contacts, Calendar events, and Task lists with your T-Mobile account on the network.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key.
2. Scroll to Settings and press the Select soft key or the © key.
3. Select Synchronization by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Highlight Data to Sync and press the Select soft key or the © key.
5. Highlight the type of data to synchronize (Contacts, Calendar or Task) and press the OK soft key to display a check mark next to the item to synchronize.
6. Press the Save soft key.
7. Select the Sync Now option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
8. When the "Synchronizing with my.t-Mobile.com" message displays, press the Continue soft key.
9. Press the key to return to the Idle mode.

## Viewing the synchronization log

This feature creates a log of the synchronization activity for viewing.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key.
2. Scroll to Settings and press the Select soft key or the © key.
3. Select Synchronization by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Highlight View Log and press the Select soft key or the © key.
5. The View Log screen displays the Start time, Status, Phone to server and Server to phone information.
6. Press the Back soft key when you are finished viewing the log.
7. Press thekey to return to Idle mode.

## About Sync

This feature displays information about how the synchronization feature works and provides a URL for more specific synchronization information.

## Synchronizing your Phonebook

This feature allows you to back up (synchronize) your Phonebook information stored on your handset with your T-Mobile account on the network.
Phonebook is wirelessly synchronized on your device using Microsoft Exchange Server and ActiveSync.

Note: For more information, refer to "Synchronization" on page 103.
To synchronize your Phonebook with the T-Mobile network:

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key.
2. Scroll to Fun \& Apps and press the Select soft key or the or key.
3. Select Organizer and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Highlight Synchronization by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the © key.
5. Highlight Data to Sync and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
6. Highlight Phonebook and press the ©ey to place a check mark next to the Phonebook selection.
7. Press the Save soft key to store this preference and return to the previous screen.
8. Select the Sync Now option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey. The data synchronizes with the T-Mobile network and a confirmation dialog displays when finished.
9. Press the key to return to the Idle mode, or the Back soft key to return to the Synchronization menu when the Sync Completed message displays.

## Network Services

## Call forwarding

This network service enables incoming calls to be re-routed to a secondary, pre-specified number.

> Example: Forwarding business calls to a colleague while on holiday.

To set your call forwarding options:

1. Select the Call forwarding option and then press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
2. Select a call forwarding option by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and then press the Select soft key or the © key.
The following options are available:

- Forward always: all calls are forwarded until this feature is cancelled.
- Busy: calls are forwarded when you are already on another call.
- No reply: calls are forwarded when you do not answer the phone. Select the length of time the network waits for before forwarding a call.
- Unreachable: calls are forwarded when you are not in an area covered by T-Mobile or when your phone is switched off.
- Cancel all: all call forwarding options are canceled.

3. Select the type of forwarded calls, Voice calls or Data calls, by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key to select the appropriate field, and then press the Select soft key or the © key.
The current status displays. If the option was already set, the number to which the calls are forwarded displays.
4. To activate call forwarding for the call type, select Activate by using the Left or Right key. The Forward to field then becomes available to input the number.

Select Deactivate by using the Left or Right key to deactivate call forwarding.
5. Enter the number to which the calls are to be forwarded in the Forward to text box and press the Select soft key or the © key.
To enter an international code, press and hold the $\square \pm \pm$ key until the + sign displays.
The phone sends your settings to the network and the network's acknowledgement displays.

## Call barring (SIM Card Dependent)

Call barring allows you to restrict specific types of incoming and outgoing calls on your phone. This is useful if you allow someone to use your phone for a short period of time.

## Call waiting

This network service informs you when someone is trying to reach you during another call.

You can specify individual call waiting options for voice calls and/or data calls. To set your call waiting options:

1. Select the type of calls, Voice calls or Data calls, to which the call waiting option is to be applied by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key.
The screen informs you whether call waiting is activated or deactivated.
2. Press the Select soft key or the © key to access the call's status menu.
3. Highlight Deactivate or Activate and press the Select soft key or the © key.
Call waiting activates or deactivates for the selected call type.
4. Select the Cancel all option to deactivate Call waiting on all voice and data calls.

## Network selection

The Network Selection feature enables you to automatically or manually select the network used when roaming outside of your home area.

Note: You can select a network other than your home network only if there is a valid roaming agreement between the two.

To change the Network Selection mode:

1. Highlight the Search now option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
2. Press the Up or Down Navigation key until the network you want highlights and then press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
The phone scans for that network and, if available, you are connected.
To change your Default setup:
3. Highlight the Default setup option and press the Select soft key or the (o) key.
4. Highlight either the Automatic or Manual option and press the Select soft key or the © key.

- If you select Automatic, you connect to the first available network when roaming.
- If you select Manual, the phone begins searching for available networks. Press the Up or Down Navigation key until the network you want is highlighted and then press the Select soft key or the © key. The phone then scans the selected network to see if you can be connected, and if a connection is possible, you are connected.


## Caller ID

You can prevent your phone number displaying on the phone of the person you called.

Note: Some networks do not allow you to change this setting.
The following options are available:

- Default: the default setting provided by the network is used.
- Hide number: your number does not display on the other person's phone.
- Send number: your number is sent each time you make a call.


## Security

The Security feature enables you to restrict the use of your phone by others and to restrict the types of calls.
Various codes and passwords are used to protect the features of your phone.

## PIN check

When the PIN Check feature is enabled, you must enter your PIN each time you switch on the phone. Consequently, any person who does not have your PIN cannot use your phone without your approval.

## Note: Before enabling or disabling the PIN Check feature, you must enter your PIN.

The following options are available:

- Disable: the phone connects directly to the network when you switch it on.
- Enable: you must enter the PIN each time the phone is switched on.


## Change PIN

This feature allows you to change your current PIN, provided that the PIN check feature is enabled. You must enter the current PIN before you can specify a new one.
Once you enter a new PIN, you are asked to confirm the PIN number by re-entering it.

## Phone lock

When the Phone lock feature is enabled, the phone is locked and you must enter the 4 - to 8 -digit phone password each time the phone is switched on.
Once the correct password is entered, you can use the phone until you switch it off. The following options are available:

- Disable: you are not asked to enter the phone password when you switch on the phone.
- Enable: you are required to enter the phone password when you switch on the phone.


## Change password

The Change password feature allows you to change your current phone password to a new one. You must enter the current password before you can specify a new one.

Once you enter a new password, you are asked to confirm the change by entering the password again.

Note: If you change your password, be sure to record it and keep it in a safe place. If you forget your password, contact your Service Provider for assistance.

## Lock application

With this feature you can lock your applications which provide access to information such as call records, phonebook, messages, images, and sounds. Once you lock the contents, you must enter the phone's password to access the associated menus.

1. Press the Up or Down Navigation key to select an item to lock
2. Press the or key to place a check mark on the selected item.

- To lock all of the contents, select All.

3. Highlight the previously selected item and press the © key to remove a check mark.
4. Press the Save soft key to lock the marked items.
5. Enter a password and press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key or the © key.

## FDN mode

FDN (Fixed Dial Number) mode, if supported by your SIM card, allows you to restrict your outgoing calls to a limited set of phone numbers.
The following options are available:

- Disable: you can call any number.
- Enable: you can only call phone numbers stored in Phonebook. You must enter your PIN2. You can obtain your PIN2 from T-Mobile's customer service.


## Change PIN2

The Change PIN2 feature allows you to change your current PIN2 to a new one. You must first enter the current PIN2 (obtained from T-Mobile) before you can specify a new one. Once you enter a new PIN2, you are asked to re-enter the new PIN2 to as confirmation.

## Software Update

The Software Update feature enables you to use your phone to connect to the network and upload any new phone software directly to your phone.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key.
2. Scroll to Settings and press the Select soft key or the or key.
3. Select Software update by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key and press the Select soft key or the ©ey to begin the update process and follow the on screen instructions.

## Memory Status

You can check the amount of the memory being used and the memory remaining for Shared memory, Messages, Files, Calendar, Phonebook, and Notes.
The display shows the total space including the used and free space. You can also view how much space is currently occupied by each message box.
You can also check how many names and numbers are stored in Phonebook, in both SIM card and the phone memory. You can also see the capacity of both memories.

## Reset Settings

From this menu you can reset your phone and sound settings to the default settings.
The following options are available:

- All: Phone, Display, Sound and WLAN settings are returned to default values.
- Phone settings: only phone settings are returned to default values.
- Display settings: only display settings are returned to default values.
- Sound settings: only sound settings are returned to default values.
- WLAN settings: only WLAN settings are returned to default values.
- Bluetooth settings: only Bluetooth settings are returned to default values.

To reset your settings:

1. Highlight one of the options and press the © $<$ key to place a check mark next to the option.
2. Press the Reset soft key.
3. You are prompted with Reset settings?. Press the Yes soft key.
4. Enter the 4- to 8-digit password and press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key or the © key. You receive a reset confirmation message.

3. Highlight the Files option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.

## Sounds

In this menu, you can view the list of sounds downloaded from the web server or received in picture messages. You can also set a downloaded sound as the current ring tone.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Files option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
4. Highlight the Sounds option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
[^19]The following options are available:

## Browse MegaTones

Using the Browse MegaTones option on the sounds list, you can quickly access the T-Mobile website and download new sounds by using the $t$-zone browser. Press the Select soft key to purchase additional MegaTones.

## Browse HiFi Ringers

Using the Browse HiFi Ringers option on the sounds list, you can quickly access T-Mobile website and use the t-zone browser to download new Hifi Ringers.
Press the Select soft key to purchase additional ringtones.

## Sounds

Highlight an item in the Sounds menu and press the Options soft key. The following options are available:

- Download new: opens your web browser where you can download new sounds.
- Send via: allows you to send the sound file via a Picture message.
- Set as: allows you to set the sound as a default Ringtone, Caller ringtone, or an Alarm tone.
- Delete: allows you to delete the selected sound or multiple sounds.
- Move to memory card: allows you to move the original file to an installed memory card.
- Copy to memory card: allows you to move a copy of the selected file to an installed memory card.
- Rename: allows you to change the name of the sound.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to lock the sound to protect it from deletion, or unlock an already locked sound.
- Properties: displays the sound name, date, format, length, size, and Lock/Unlock status.


## Voice list

The Voice list contains your recorded audio messages.

1. Press the © key to play the selected audio message. - or -

Highlight an item and press the Options soft key. The following options are available:

- Send via: allows you to send the audio message via a Picture message.
- Set as: allows you to set this audio message as a Default Ringtone, Caller ringtone, or an Alarm tone.
- Delete: allows you to delete the selected audio message or multiple audio messages.
- Move to memory card: allows you to move the original file to an installed memory card.
- Copy to memory card: allows you to move a copy of the selected file to an installed memory card.
- Rename: allows you to change the name of the audio message.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to lock the audio message to protect it from deletion, or unlock an already locked audio message.
- Properties: displays the audio message name, date, format, length, size, and Lock/Unlock status.


## Images

In this menu, you can view the list of images downloaded from the web server, taken with the built-in camera, or received in messages. You can set an image as the current background image.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Files option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
4. Highlight the Images option and press the Select soft key or the © key.

The following options are available:

## Browse Wallpapers

Using the Browse Wallpapers option, allows you to access the T-Mobile website and download new images using the t-zone browser.

- Highlight the Browse Wallpapers option and press the © key.

## Photos

In this menu you can review the photos you've taken.

- Highlight a photo and press the Options soft key to choose from the following options:
- View: allows you to view the photo on your display.
- Send to My Album: allows you to send your photos to My Album.
- Send via: allows you to send your photos as an attachment to a Picture message.
- Set as: allows you to set the photo as your Wallpaper or as a Caller ID.
- Delete: allows you to delete the selected photo or multiple photos.
- Default destination: allows you to Remove or Change where your photos are sent after you take them.
- Move to memory card: allows you to move the original file to an installed memory card.
- Copy to memory card: allows you to move a copy of the selected file to an installed memory card.
- Edit image: allows you to the a selected photograph by using some presets features such as: Effects, Frames, Emoticons, and Clip Art.
- Rename: allows you to rename the photo.
- Display mode: allows you to view the photos in Line view or Thumbnail view.
- Slide show: allows you to see all of your photos in a slide show presentation.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to lock the photo to protect it from deletion, or unlock an already locked photo.
- Properties: displays the image name, date, format, resolution, size, and Lock/Unlock status.


## My Album

My Album is a private online picture album that you can use to store and share pictures, videos, voice messages, and text. For more information, see "My Album" on page 158.
Use the following procedures to access My Album.

Note: When accessing My Album, charges may apply.

1. In your t-zone browser, select the My Albums Menu link and press the Select soft key or the © key.
2. Photos sent to this folder are stored in the Inbox Album.
3. Use the Up or Down key to highlight a particular image and press the © key to view the photos.
4. Press the $\approx 0$ key to exit $t$-zones and return to the Idle screen.

## My Journal

Use a web browser to make notes in My Journal, your online diary and Weblog. Keep it private to store your personal memories and send email invitations to ask people to view and comment on your album. See your service provider for more information. ## Downloaded images

## Videos

## Music

This options allows you to access your audio files in either your Music list or from your Memory card.

1. Press the Up or Down navigation keys to scroll between the Music or Memory card options and press the Select soft key or the © key.

- The Memory card option appears only if a microSD card has been previously installed into the internal slot below the battery. For more information, refer to "Inserting the Memory Card" on page 7.
- To be accessible Music must be stored into the Music folder on the memory card

2. Highlight the Music folder and press the ©ey.
3. Highlight a music file and press the Options soft key to choose from the following options:

- Play: allows you to play the selected audio file on the phone.
- Set as: allows you to set the selected audio as a default Ringtone, Caller ringtone, or Alarm tone.
- Delete: allows you to delete either the selected audio file or multiple files.
- Move to memory card: moves the selected audio file to the memory card.
- Copy to memory card: copies the selected audio file to the memory card.
- Rename: allows you to rename the selected audio file.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to lock the audio file to protect it from deletion, or unlock an already locked audio file.
- Properties: displays the Name, Date, Format, Bit rate, Length, Size, and Lock Unlock status of the selected music file.


## Other files

This option allows you to view other types of files that you have stored on your phone. This includes Excel spreadsheets, text files, wmf files, PowerPoint presentations, PDFs, MHTML and Word documents. You can send these files by picture message. You can also move or copy the files to your memory card.

## Memory card

You can check the contents of your microSD memory card and see what was saved there.

1. Press the Up or Down navigation keys to scroll between Images, Videos, Music, Sounds, and Other files.

[^21]2. After selecting a folder, press the Options soft key for the following options:

- Open: allows you to open the folder so you can access its contents.
- Create folder: allows you to create a new folder.
- Properties: lists the Name, Size, Contains, Created Time, and Last modified time.
- Memory card info.: allows you to view the settings for Maximum memory capacity, Used memory space, and Free memory space.

Caution!: Pressing the © key while viewing this option prompts "Formatting will erase all data. Continue?" and if confirmed, reformats the memory card and erases all data on the card.

## Memory Status

You can check the amount of memory being used and memory remaining for sounds and images.

- Press the Left or Right navigation keys to scroll between the memory status of Fun \& Apps, Sounds, Images, Videos, Music, JAVA, and Other files.


## Games

You can download MIDlets (Java applications that run on mobile phones) from various sources using t-zones browser and then store them in the My Games folder.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Games option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey. When you access the Games menu, the list of default games displays. Once you download new games, they are then added to the list.

## My games

This folder contains the default downloaded games and any other games you downloaded. After selecting a game, press the Options soft key for the following options:

Note: Some options are greyed out and not editable (Move to, Delete, and Unlock).

- Start: launches the application.
- Details: displays some of the game development information such as: name, supplier/vendor, software version, file size, etc...
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to lock the game to protect it from being used.
- Move to: allows you to move the selected game to another user-created folder.

## Voice Commands

Voice Commands is an advanced speech recognition software used to activate a wide-variety of functions on your phone. Voice Commands software automatically voice activates (up to 200 contacts) for voice dialing and searching. No pre-recording or training needed. Speak a contact name naturally to dial, and use your voice to look up contacts, launch applications and navigate phone menus.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Select Fun \& Apps and press the Select soft key or the
© key.
3. Highlight Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. At the voice prompt, say a command. The list of available commands is listed below.

Note: A list of voice commands briefly displays.

## Voice Recognition Commands

- Call <Name or \#>: dials a name from your contact list, or dials a number, even if the number is not stored in the contact list. For more information, refer to "Contacts List Voice Activation" on page 122.
- Send Text <Name>: displays the Create Text Message screen. For more information, refer to "Entering Text" on page 60.
- Lookup <Name>: allows you use a voice command to locate and display contact information stored in the Contacts list. For more information, refer to "Using Contacts List" on page 65.
- Go to <App>: accesses the Phonebook, Voice notes, Text messages, Picture message, Call records, t-zones, Calendar, Instant message, and Camera features of your phone.
- Check <ltem>: Lets you check your phone's status (that is signal strength, and battery in the same report), battery, signal strength, battery, and My phone number.

Speak clearly when giving your command. If, after a few seconds, the handset does not recognize your command, a voice prompt asks you to repeat the command. If the software does not recognize your command the following message displays "Sorry, no match found," and voice recognition turns off.

Important!: You must end your current VoiceSignal call before you can make another call.

## Voice Recognition Tips

- Wait for the tone before you speak.
- Speak clearly and at a normal volume.


## Contacts List Voice Activation

On startup VoiceSignal reads your Contacts list and voice-activates all the names. When you have add or change contacts, VoiceSignal automatically reloads and voice-activates the list when you add or modify a contact.

## Call Digit Dialing

Digit Dial allows you to dial any phone number by simply speaking the digits into the phone. No training is necessary, and Digit Dial is programmed to understand natural speech.

1. Access VoiceSignal by doing one of the following:

- Press and hold the $*^{* ;}$ key.
- Press and hold the Multi-Function button on a plug-in headset or a Bluetooth headset.
- In the Fun \& Apps menu, select Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the © key.
After a brief pause, a list of optional commands displays on the screen (and the "Say a command" message displays on the external screen) and the audio prompt "Say a command" plays through the earpiece.

2. To use Digit Dialing, say "Call" and say the area code and number that you want to dial at a distance of 3-12 inches from the phone in a natural voice.
3. The number that you said is repeated through the earpiece and your phone dials the number.
4. If VoiceSignal is not sure of the number that you said, a list of possible matches displays on the screen.
5. You're asked to confirm the correct number as VoiceSignal displays the results. Say "Yes" or "No" to confirm or reject the number when prompted.

## Call Name Dialing

To use Name Dial, you'll need to have entries stored in your Phonebook. For information on creating Phonebook entries, see "Understanding Your Phonebook" on page 65.

1. Access VoiceSignal by doing one of the following:

- Press and hold the $*^{*}$ key.
- Press and hold the Multi-Function button on a plug-in headset or a Bluetooth headset.
- In the Fun \& Apps menu, select Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the © key.
After a brief pause, a list of optional commands displays on the screen (and the "Say a command" message displays on the external screen) and the audio prompt "Say a command" plays through the earpiece.

2. To use Name Dialing, say "Call" and the name of the contact that you want to dial.
3. The name that you said is repeated through the earpiece and your phone dials the number.
4. If VoiceSignal is not sure of the name that you said, a list of possible matches displays on the screen.
5. You're asked to confirm the correct number as VoiceSignal displays the results. Say "Yes" or "No" to confirm or reject the number when prompted.
6. The location is repeated through the earpiece and your phone dials the number.

## Send Text Message

1. Access VoiceSignal by doing one of the following:

- Press and hold the $*_{\infty}$ key.
- Press and hold the Multi-Function button on a plug-in headset or a Bluetooth headset.
- In the Fun \& Apps menu, select Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the ok key.

2. After a brief pause, a list of optional commands displays on the screen (and the "Say a command" message displays on the external screen) and the audio prompt "Say a command" plays through the earpiece.
3. Say "Send Text" at a distance of 3-12 inches from the microphone. "Say the Name or Number" plays through the earpiece.
4. After you say a name or number, you might be prompted, "Did you say?" To confirm a name or number, wait for the beep and then say "Yes."
5. You can also choose the correct name or number from the choice list using the phone's arrow keys.
6. When the Text Message client launches, enter your text message.

## Name Lookup

To perform a name lookup, you'll need to have some entries in your Contact list.

1. Access VoiceSignal by doing one of the following:

- Press and hold the **s key.
- Press and hold the Multi-Function button on a plug-in headset or a Bluetooth headset.
- In the Fun \& Apps menu, select Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the © key.
After a brief pause, a list of optional commands displays on the screen (and the "Say a command" message displays on the external screen) and the audio prompt "Say a command" plays through the earpiece.

2. Say "Lookup" at a distance of 3-12 inches from the microphone. "Say the name" plays through the earpiece.
3. Say the name exactly as it displays in your Contact list, first name followed by last name.
4. The contact name displays on the screen with other information that you've entered for that contact.

## Opening Applications

You can open an application or access a menu on your phone using VoiceSignal.

1. Access VoiceSignal by doing one of the following:

- Press and hold the $*^{*}$ key.
- Press and hold the Multi-Function button on a plug-in headset or a Bluetooth headset.
- In the Fun \& Apps menu, select Voice commands and press the Select soft key or the or key.
After a brief pause, a list of optional commands displays on the screen (and the "Say a command" message displays on the external screen) and the audio prompt "Say a command" plays through the earpiece.

2. Say "Go To" at a distance of 3-12 inches from the microphone. A list of options displays and a prompt of "Please choose" plays through the earpiece. If the option you desire is not listed, say "Next Menu" to scroll to the next page.
3. The spoken application menu option is then activated.

## Checking Phone Status

Use the Check command to see and hear status information from your phone, including its phone status, battery level, current signal strength, phone number. To check phone status:

1. Access VoiceSignal by doing one of the following:

- Press and hold the **s key.
- Press and hold the Multi-Function button on a plug-in headset or a Bluetooth headset.
- In the Fun \& Apps menu, select Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the © key.
After a brief pause, a list of optional commands displays on the screen (and the "Say a command" message displays on the external screen) and the audio prompt "Say a command" plays through the earpiece.

2. Say "Check" at a distance of 3-12 inches from the microphone. A list of options displays and a prompt of "Please choose" plays through the earpiece.
3. The spoken phone status menu option is then displayed.

## Voice Recognition Settings

## Choice lists

VoiceSignal uses choice lists when a name or number is not clearly recognized. The software displays three choices and prompts you to select a choice.

You can modify the way VoiceSignal uses the choice lists in the settings. Each time VoiceSignal activates you can choose to view the choice list even if there is only one choice. Additionally, you can choose never to view a choice list, even if there are multiple choices. When the name or number you speak is not recognized, the Automatic setting displays the choice list.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Select Fun \& Apps and press the Select soft key or the © key.
3. Highlight Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the key.
4. At the voice prompt, press the Settings soft key and select one of the following:

## - Choice lists

- Automatic: VoiceSignal displays a choice list only when it is not sure if it has correctly recognized the name or number.
- Always On: VoiceSignal always displays a choice list, even when there is only one choice.
- Always Off: VoiceSignal never displays a choice list.

5. Press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key or the © key to confirm the selection.

## Sensitivity

This option allows you to adjust the sensitivity monitoring of voice tones.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Select Fun \& Apps and press the Select soft key or the © key.
3. Highlight Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. At the voice prompt, press the Settings soft key, select Sensitivity and press the Select soft key or the ® key.
5. Use the Up or Down Navigation keys to adjust the selected Sensitivity setting to Reject More spoken commands or names or to Reject Less spoken commands or names.
6. Press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key or the © key to accept the new setting.

## Digit dialing

If VoiceSignal frequently does not recognize your commands, adapting digit dialing to your voice improves the accuracy of digit recognition.

After you adapt Digit Dial, your phone recognizes only your voice. Other users are not able to use the handset with VoiceSignal unless the handset is reset to factory defaults.

Adapting requires recording multiple sequences of digits. The entire adaptation process takes approximately one minute.

## Select location

This option allows you to identify the country or region where you are using the handset.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Select Fun \& Apps and press the Select soft key or the © key.
3. Highlight Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. At the voice prompt, press the Settings soft key, select Digit dialing and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
5. Highlight Select location and press the Select soft key or the © $\times$ key.
6. Use the Up or Down Navigation keys to select your current location.
7. Press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key or the $\circledast$ key to accept the new setting.

## Adapt Digits

To adapt digits perform the following:

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Select Fun \& Apps and press the Select soft key or the © key.
3. Highlight Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the $\circledast$ key.
4. At the voice prompt, press the Settings soft key, select Digit dialing and press the Select soft key or the or key.
5. Highlight Adapt digits and press the Select soft key or the © key.
6. Press the Back soft key or the key to return to Idle mode.

Note: To reset digit dialing to factory default settings, see "Reset settings" on page 118.

## Adapting Digit Dialing Tips

- Select a quiet location when using the Adapt Digits feature.
- Wait for the beep (tone) before you begin speaking.
- Say each digit with a clear tone.
- Re-record the sequence if you make a mistake or if there is noise interference.

Adapt digits only if you regularly experience issues with digit dialing.

## Reset digits

To reset digits perform the following:

3. Highlight Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. At the voice prompt, press the Settings soft key, select Sound and press the Select soft key or the or key.
5. Select one of the following options:

- Prompts: allows you to turn audio prompts On or Off.
- Digits: allows you to turn audio digit playback On or Off.
- Names: allows you to turn audio name playback On or Off.
- Name settings: Lets you adjust the speed and volume of your phone's audio name playback.
- Speakerphone: allows you to turn voice recognition through the speakerphone On or Off.

6. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired setting.
7. Press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key, Select key or © key to accept the new setting.

## About

This options allows provides you with information about the Voicesignal application.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Select Fun \& Apps and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
3. Highlight Voice recognition and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
4. At the voice prompt, press the Settings soft key, select About and press the Select soft key or the $\circledast$ key.

## Organizer

The Organizer allows you to set alarms, view the calendar, create Tasks, perform simple math calculations, check world time, perform synchronization, perform unit conversions, compose notes, set a timer, use a tip calculator, and use a stopwatch.

## Alarm

This feature allows you to:

- Set up to 3 alarms to ring at specified times.
- Set the phone to switch on automatically and ring the alarm even if the phone is switched off.

The following options are available:

- Wake-up alarm: the alarm rings to wake you up in the morning.
- Alarm 1: set the day, time, and tone for this alarm.
- Alarm 2: set the day, time, and tone for this alarm.
- Auto power-up: alarm rings at the specified time even if the phone is turned off. If the option is set to $\mathbf{O f f}$ and the phone is switched off at the specified time, the alarm does not ring.

To set the alarm:

1. Highlight an alarm and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
2. Highlight the Alarm option and press the Right navigation key to set Alarm to On .
3. Press the Down key to highlight the Alarm time option. Enter the time you want the Alarm to sound.
4. Press the Down key to highlight the AM/PM option. Press the Left or Right navigation key to set to AM or PM.
5. Press the Down key to highlight the Monday-Sunday checkboxes. Press the © key to bring up a list of days.
6. Place a checkmark next to the days you want the alarm to sound. To place or remove a check mark, press the ©ey. Press the OK soft key.
7. Press the Down key to highlight the Alarm tone option. Press the © key to bring up a list of alarm melodies.
8. Press the Up or Down Navigation key to highlight a default alarm melody. Or, press the Right navigation key to display a list of sounds that you may choose from.
9. Press the Save soft key.
10. Press the key to return to Idle mode.

[^23]11. To stop the alarm when it rings, press any key or press the Snooze soft key.

## Calendar

With the Calendar feature, you can:

- Consult the calendar by month, week, or day.
- Set schedules and note anniversaries
- Create a miscellaneous event.
- Create tasks.
- Set an alarm to act as a reminder, if necessary.
- Check your memory status.

When you select the Calendar menu, the following options are available:

## Month view

When you select this option, the calendar displays the selected month with today's date highlighted.
At the bottom of the calendar, the following icons display along with the number of entries for each:


Schedule items
Anniversary events
Tasks

Miscellaneous items
The number of entries next to each icon reflects the number of entries for the selected day on the calendar.

The following options are available when you press the Options soft key:

- View mode: takes you to the Day view or Week view of the selected day.
- Create: allows you to create a Schedule, Anniversary, or Miscellaneous.
- Go to: takes you to the Today's date or another date highlighted.
- Delete: allows you to delete all events for a selected date, delete all events for a specified period, or delete all events for this month dates. You can also delete all event.


## Week view

When you select this option, the calendar displays the selected week with today's date and time highlighted.

The following options are available when you press the Options soft key:

- View mode: takes you to the Day view or Month view of the selected day.
- Create: allows you to create a Schedule, Anniversary, or Miscellaneous.
- Go to: takes you to today's date or another date highlighted.
- Delete: allows you to delete all events for a selected date, delete all events for a specified period, or delete all events for this weeks dates. You can also delete all events.


## Day view

When you select this option, you are taken to the Day view of the selected day with any events listed. The following options are available when you press the Options soft key:

- View: takes you to the Day view of the selected day.
- Create: allows you to create a Schedule, Anniversary, or Miscellaneous.
- Send via: allows you to send this event via a Text message or Picture message.
- View mode: allows you to choose between Month view or Week view.
- Delete: allows you to delete all events for a selected date, or delete all events for this days' dates. You can also delete all events.


## Schedule

This option allows you to write memos to a schedule.

1. Highlight the Schedule option and press the Select soft key or the key.
2. Press the Options soft key.
3. Highlight the Create option and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Enter the subject in the Subject text box then press the Down soft key.
5. Continue to enter other information including Details, Start date, Start time, AM/PM, End date, End time, AM/PM, Location, Alarm, before, Alarm tone and Repeat.
6. Press the OK soft key to check the Repeat option.
7. Press the Save soft key when you are finished. Your Schedule information saves to the Calendar.

## Anniversary

This option allows you to record Anniversaries in your calendar. You can also set an alarm to remind you of important anniversaries.

1. Highlight the Anniversary option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
2. Press the Options soft key.
3. Highlight the Create option and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Enter the occasion in the Occasion text box then press the Down soft key.
5. Continue to enter other information including Date, Alarm, before, Alarm time, AM/PM, Alarm tone, and Repeat every year.
6. Press the Save soft key when you are finished. Your Anniversary information saves to the Calendar.

## Miscellaneous

This option allows you to record miscellaneous dates or events in your calendar.

1. Highlight the Miscellaneous option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
2. Press the Options soft key.
3. Highlight the Create option and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. Enter the subject in the Subject text box then press the Down soft key.
5. Continue to enter other information including Details, Start date, Start time, AM/PM, End date, End time, and AM/PM.
6. Press the Save soft key when you are finished. Your Miscellaneous information saves to the Calendar.

## Missed alarm events

You can check on all of the alarmed events.

1. Highlight the Missed alarm events option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
2. To view an event information, highlight an event and press the key. The missed alarm event information displays.
3. To acknowledge and remove the event, press the Confirm soft key or the (or) key. The event is removed from the Missed alarm events menu.

## Memory status

This menu item shows the number of calendar events that are stored on the handset as well as how much available memory space is left for additional calendar events. Events are broken down by Schedule, Anniversary, Miscellaneous, and Tasks.

## Tasks

This feature allows you to enter a list of tasks.

1. Highlight the Tasks option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
2. Press the Options soft key.
3. Highlight the Create option and press the Select soft key or the (or key.
4. Enter the Item to do in the Task text box then press the Down soft key.
5. Continue to enter other information including Start date, Due date, Priority, and Alarm.
6. Press the Save soft key when you are finished. Your Task list saves to the Calendar.

## Editing the Tasks List

When you select the Tasks list menu, the current contents display with a status checkbox and a priority marker.
If the item was done, a check displays in the checkbox.
High priority items display a red explanation mark, Normal priority items display a blue explanation mark, and Low priority items display a gray explanation mark.

1. To mark an item Done, highlight the item and press the © key.
2. Press the Options soft key.
3. Highlight the Done option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey. The status checkbox next to the Task item displays a check mark.
4. Highlight the item and press the © key to edit other fields in the Task item.
5. Press the Options soft key.
6. Highlight the Edit option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
7. Edit the items you wish to change.
8. Press the Options soft key.
9. Highlight the Save option and press the Select soft key or the key.

## Notes

This feature allows you to create a note.

1. Highlight the Notes option and press the Select soft key or the orey.
2. Press the Options soft key.
3. Highlight the Create option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
4. Enter the note text into the text box then press the Down soft key.
5. Press the Options soft key and select the Save option.
6. Press the Select soft key or the © key when you are finished.

## Calculator

With this feature, you can use the phone as a calculator. The calculator provides the basic arithmetic functions; addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.

1. Enter the first number using the numeric keys.
2. Enter the operation for your calculation by pressing the navigation key according to the illustration on the display. Use the $*_{\infty}$ key for the decimal. You can also use the $\#$ \#* $^{*}$ key to create brackets.
3. Enter the next number.
4. To view the result, press the © key.
5. Repeat steps 1 to 4 as many times as required.

## Tip calculator

This feature provides the percentage amount for tip. Use the following procedures to calculate a tip amount.

1. Highlight Tip calculator and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
2. In the Bill field, enter the check amount.

Note: To enter the decimal point for the exact dollar amount, use the ${ }_{* i n}$ key.
3. Use the Down Navigation key to highlight Tip(\%) percentage. 15 is the default value but this can be changed.
4. The Tip(\$) field value is calculated according to the values entered.
5. Use the Down Navigation key to move to the \# paying field to change the number of people contributing to the tip amount.
6. The You pay field displays what each individual is to pay.

## World Time

This feature allows you to assign two separate time zones to your phone by using the Left and Right Navigation keys. You can set the first setting to your home city and then use the second setting to check other city times.

1. Highlight the first field using your Up and Down Navigation keys.
2. Use your Left and Right Navigation keys to then assign the time zone for that time zone.
3. Repeat steps $1 \& 2$ for the next time zone entry.
4. Press the Options soft key for the following options:

- Save: this allows you to save your world time settings.
- Apply daylight saving time: use the © key to place a checkmark next to the cities that you want to set daylight savings time. Each city listed represents a time zone.


## Synchronization

This feature allows you to back up (synchronize) Contact information, Calendar, and Tasks stored on your phone with your T-Mobile account on the network. Each time you edit contact information your phone automatically synchronizes with the web Address Book.

## Unit Conversion

The conversion menu provides the following conversion categories:

- Currency
- Length
- Weight
- Volume
- Area
- Temperature

To convert a currency, length, weight, volume, area, or temperature, do the following:

1. Scroll to the conversion feature you wish to use and press the Select soft key or the © key.
2. Enter the quantity you want converted.

Note: To include a decimal point, press the $* *$ key.
3. Use the Navigation keys to select the From and To units of measure for the quantity you want converted.
4. Press the Options soft key and select the function to perform with the information entered in the From and To units of measure.
5. Press the Back soft key to return to the Unit conversion menu.

## Timer

You can use this menu to set a timer. To enable the Timer, use the following options:

1. Press the Set soft key to enter the length of time.
2. Enter the time and press the $\mathbf{O K}$ soft key.
3. Press the \%ey to start the timer. Press the ©ey again to stop the timer.

## Stopwatch

This feature allows you to use a stopwatch.

1. Press the orey to start the stopwatch.
2. Press the Reset soft key to erase all previously recorded stopwatch times.
3. Press the or key for the lap time. You can use up to 4 separate lap times.

## Music Player

The Music Player allows you to play music files stored on the phone.

Note: Note: The following characters cannot be used in the filename:

## Music Player Options

Use the Options menu to access the Playlist. The Playlist soft key (Up Navigation key) allows you to change the settings such as repeat or shuffle.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Music player option and press the Select soft key or the (o) key.
4. Press the Options soft key and select one of the following music player application options then press the © key.

- Add music from: allows you to add music from either your phone or inserted memory card. The memory card should contain a Music folder to house the desired music files.
- Open playlist: allows you to display either your current playlist or a userdefined My playlist. For more information, refer to "Adding Music to a Playlist" on page 142.
- Settings: allows you to configure the media player settings. For more information, refer to "Player Settings" on page 140.
- Shortcuts: displays the music player shotcuts. For more information, refer to "Music Player Shortcut Keys" on page 141.


## Player Settings

The Player settings menu configures your phone's music playing options such as Repeat mode, Shuffle, or Visualization. Settings for the Music menu determine the order in which music is presented for the selected music category.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Music player option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
4. Press the Options soft key, select Settings, then press either the Select soft key or the © key.
5. Highlight the Visualization option and then use the Right Navigation key to cycle through the available music player background visual effects:

## Type 1 or Type 2.

6. Highlight the Volume option and then use the Right Navigation key to choose a playback volume level.
7. Press the Save soft key to store the category selections and return to the previous Settings menu.

## Music Player Shortcut Keys

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Music player option and press the Select soft key or the ( © key.
4. Press the Options soft key, select Shortcuts, then press either the Select soft key or the © key.

## A Press to increase the volume <br> Press to decrease the volume



Up allows you to change the settings such as repeat or shuffle.
Down stops the currently playing song.
Left plays the previous song title.
Right Advances to the next song title.
While playing a song if pressed it displays the music player options.

While playing a song if pressed it displays the Fun and Apps menu.
on Press once to toggle the play state of the current song (Play/Pause).

Cycles through the available music player background visual effects: Type 1 or Type 2.

3 Toef Toggles through the Repeat mode:

- Repeat one: repeats the currently active song.
- Repeat all: replays each song in the current list and as the last song in the list ends, the player begins replaying all of the songs in the order the appear within the current list.

Emin Toggles the Shuffle mode On or Off.

- Shuffle: the current list of songs are randomly shuffled for playback.


## Adding Music to a Playlist

Before music can be played directly via the Music Player, it is necessary that the desired playlist be active before music is added. Unless otherwise selected, Playlist 1 is the default playlist when new music is added from either the phone or memory card.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Music player option and press the Select soft key or the (o) key.
4. Press the Options soft key, highlight Open playlist, and press the Right Navigation key.
5. Select either Current playlist (to add songs to the default playlist Playlist 1) or My playlist (to select from the list of available playlists).

- If you selected one of the other available playlist, press the Options soft key, highlight Open and press the Select soft key or the © key.

6. Press the Options soft key, highlight Add music from, and press the Right Navigation key.
7. Select either Phone or Memory card (to songs stored in the Music folder) and press the Select soft key or the © key.

- All supported music files are then displayed in a list.

8. Select the songs you wish to add to your currently selected playlist by using the Up or Down Navigation keys to highlight the song and then pressing the or songs you want to add to an existing playlist.
9. Press the ©ey to place a checkmark alongside the songs you wish to add or highlight and select the All option.
10. Press the Add soft key to associate all of the selected songs to the currently active playlist.

## Playing Music Files

Music can either be played indirectly (without the use of the Media player or playlists) by using the Fun \& Apps $>$ Files $>$ Music feature (page 117) or directly by selecting a desired playlist of songs which are then played through the media player.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Music player option and press the Select soft key or the (艹) key.
4. Press the Options soft key and select the Open playlist option. The current playlist information displays.
5. Press the Left and Right Navigation keys to access the desired playlist.
6. Press the Up or Down navigation keys to highlight the song to which you want to listen, and press the or key to begin playing the selected song.

Note: The Navigation keys can be used to play, pause, stop, and select either the next or previous songs from the current list.
7. While listening to a music file, press the Options soft key for the following options:

- Pause: allows you to pause the song you are listening to. Press the © to resume the song.
- Open playlist: allows you to display either the current playlist or select from one of the remaining three playlists (four tota).
- Remove from playlist: allows you to remove the actively playing song from the current playlist.
- Settings: allows you to configure the media player settings.
- Properties: displays the file properties such as: file name, creation date, format, bitrate, length, file size, and lock/unlock state.
- Shortcuts: displays the current shortcut key functions related to the media player application.


## Transferring Music Files

Music files can be downloaded to the phone via one of two methods:

- Downloaded to the phone from t-zones > Downloads.
- Music files can be directly stored on your phone from this site.
- For more information, refer to "t-zones" on page 160.
- Downloaded to the phone via a direct USB connection.
- Music files are stored into a Music folder on the microSD card.
- For more information, refer to "USB settings" on page 96.


## Deleting Music Files From the Memory Card

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Files option and press the Select soft key or the ©ey.
4. Highlight the Memory card option and press the Select soft key or the (or) key.
5. Press the Up or Down navigation keys to highlight the Music folder which contains the songs you want to delete and press the © key.
6. Press the Up or Down navigation keys to highlight the song to delete.
7. Press the Options soft key, highlight Delete, and press the Right Navigation key.
8. Select either Selected (to delete a single song) or Multiple (to delete several songs).

- If you selected Multiple, you select a song by first highlighting it and then pressing the Delete soft key or the ©K) key. Selecting All places a checkmark next to all detected songs.

9. At the "Delete?" prompt, press the Yes soft key to accept the deletion or the No soft key to cancel the process.

## Assigning Music Files

You can choose to assign music files as the Default Ringtone, Caller ringtone or as an Alarm tone. Songs used for these types of assignments must be copied to the phone.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.
3. Highlight the Files option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Highlight the Music option and press the Select soft key or the © key.
5. Press the Up or Down navigation keys to scroll between Music or Memory card options and press the Select soft key or the © key.

- The Memory card option displays only if a microSD card was installed into the internal slot below the battery. For more information, refer to "Inserting the Memory Card" on page 7.
- Music must be stored in the Music folder.
- Is you selected Memory card, you must highlight the Music folder and press the (or) key.

6. Highlight a music file and press the Options soft key.
7. Highlight the Set as option and then press the Right Navigation key to assign the selected song to a ring type.

- Set as: allows you to set the selected audio as a Default Ringtone, Caller ringtone, or Alarm tone.
- This type of audio assignment requires the song to be stored on the phone.
- If the selected song is on the memory card, you are prompted to copy the music file to the phone prior to use. Press the Yes soft key to continue copying the song to the phone or No to cancel the operation.


## Assigning a music file as a ringtone

1. Follow steps $1-6$ from the previous section.
2. Highlight the Set as option and then press the Right Navigation key.
3. Highlight the Default Ringtone option and press the Select soft key or the (o) key.
4. At the "Copy to phone and set as ringtone?" prompt, press the Yes soft key to continue copying the song to the phone or No to cancel the operation.

## Assigning a music file as a Caller ringtone

1. Follow steps $1-6$ from the previous section.
2. Highlight the Set as option and then press the Right Navigation key.
3. Highlight the Caller ringtone option and press the Select soft key or the (o) key.
4. From the Contact list, press the Up and Down Navigation keys to highlight a contact entry and press the Select soft key or the © key to assign the song. The selected audio file is assigned to the contact entry as part of their Caller ID. When this contact calls you, the associated music file plays.

## Assigning a music file as an alarm tone

1. Follow steps $1-6$ from the previous section.
2. Highlight the Set as option and then press the Right Navigation key.
3. Highlight the Alarm tone option and press the Select soft key or the or key.
4. From the Alarm list, press the Up and Down Navigation keys to highlight an alarm entry and press the Select soft key or the © key to open the properties of the alarm.
5. Press the Save soft key to store the music file to the selected alarm.

This section explains how to use the camera on your phone. You can take photographs by using the built-in camera functionality.

## Using the Camera

Using the camera module in your phone, you can take photos of people or events while on the move. Additionally, you can send a link to your My Album online to other people, set the picture as a Wallpaper, or as a Caller ID image.

Note: Do not take photos of people without their permission.
Do not take photos in places where cameras are not allowed.
Do not take photos in places where you may interfere with another person's privacy.

## Take and Send

Your camera produces photos in JPEG format.

Note: When you take a photo in direct sunlight or in bright conditions, shadows may appear on the photo.

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key to access Menu mode.
2. Using the Navigation keys, scroll to the Fun \& Apps icon. Press the Select soft key or the © key to enter the menu.

Tip: Press the key on the right side of the phone as a shortcut access to the camera module.
3. Highlight Camera and press the Select soft key or the © key.
4. Highlight Take and Send and press the Select soft key or the © key.
5. Adjust the image by aiming the camera at the subject.
6. Prior to taking a picture, press the Options soft key to access the camera options. For details, see "Configuring Camera Options" on page 150.

Tip: You can use the keypad to quickly change the camera options.
7. Press the or $\circ$ key to take the photo. The screen displays the Send to: My Album Online ? option.
8. Press the © key, which shows as (ECC) on the display before you save or send the photo to a location, to record an audio clip to be attached to the photo. Press the Stop soft option key to end the recording.
9. Once you have completed the audio clip or if you do not want to add an audio clip, press the Yes soft key if you want to send the photo to your TMobile My Album Online service. The phone's default destination is set to My Album. The photo is automatically saved in the Photos folder in the phone.

[^26]10. To send the newly taken photograph, press the Options soft key.
11. Highlight Send to and press the Select soft key or the or key.
12. Select from one of the following destinations by pressing the Up or Down Navigation key:

- Recent recipients: allows you to send to one of the recent recipients.
- Phonebook: allows you to select a recipient from the phonebook.
- New recipient: allows you to enter the phone number and e-mail address of a new recipient.
- My Album: sends the message to My Album.
- My Journal: sends the message to My Journal.

13. To return to Capture mode, press the Back soft key.
14. Press the Options soft key and select Take another.
15. Press the © key to take another picture.
16. Press the $-\infty$ key to return to the Idle mode.

## Configuring Picture Options

After you take a picture, press the key to access the photo's Options menu for the current photograph. This list of options differ from the Camera's main menu which allows you to configure options for the camera and not for the picture.

The following options are available:

- Take another: returns you to camera mode to take another photo.
- Send to: displays the Send to menu and allows you to select a destination for the currently taken photograph. This destination can be a single or multiple recipient(s) (such as, Recent recipients, Phonebook, Phone number or Email address) or to a remote folder such as My Album or My Journal.
- Edit message: allows you to edit the contents of the outgoing picture message (such as Subject, Photo, Sound and Text).
- Set as: allows you to use the current photo as an Caller ID or Wallpaper.
- Default destination: allows you to Remove a current destination location or Change the current location by establishing a new folder in which to place the pictures. Select from the following options: Recent recipients, Phonebook, Phone number, Email address, My Album, or My Journal.

Note: To change the default destination for your pictures, highlight the Default destination option, press the Right Navigation key, then select Change.

- Edit Image: allows you to edit the photo. Image editor has the following options:
- Send via: allows you to send the photo using a Picture Message.
- New image: allows you to open an existing photo or take another photo.
- Save as: allows you to save the photo to your default destination and with a default name. You may alter the default name.
- Effects: allows you to edit the photo using the following effects:


## - No effects

- Black \& White: allows you to save the photo as a black and white image.
- Negative: allows you to save the photo as a reverse image of the photo.
- Sepia; allows you to save the photo with a yellowish brown effect, as if the photo were old.
- Emboss: allows you to save the photo as an embossed image.
- Sketch: allows you to save the photo as a sketch.
- Insert: allows you to insert a frame, an emoticon, or clip art into the photo.
- Set as: allows you to set the photo as caller ID, or as wallpaper.
- Undo: allows you to undo any editing done to the photo.
- Delete: allows you to delete the selected photo.
- Rename: allows you to overwrite the currently defaulted photo name.
- Go to photos: takes you to your Photos folder.
- Lock/Unlock: allows you to lock the photo to protect it from deletion, or unlock an already locked photo.
- Properties: shows the properties of the current photo such as the Name, Date, Format, Resolution, Size, and Lock/Unlock.

1. To return to the Capture mode, press the Clear $\square$ key.
2. Press the $\approx 0$ key to return to Idle mode.

## Configuring Camera Options

1. In Capture mode (prior to taking a new photo), press the Options soft key to use various options for the camera module.
The following options are available:

## Health and Safety Information

Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals

## Certification Information (SAR)

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. government.

These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations, the National Counsel on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram ( $\mathrm{W} / \mathrm{kg}$ ). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram ( $1.6 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{kg}$ ). The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.
SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the exposure limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC. For body worn operation, this phone has been tested and meets FCC RF exposure guidelines when used with an accessory that contains no metal and that positions the handset a minimum of 1.5 cm from the body. Use of other accessories may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this mobile phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. The maximum SAR values for this model phone as reported to the FCC are:

- Head: 0.662 W/Kg.
- Body-worn: 1.43 W/Kg.

SAR information on this and other model phones can be viewed on-line at http://www.fcc.gov/oet/ea. To find information that pertains to a particular model phone, this site uses the phone FCC ID number which is usually printed somewhere on the case of the phone.

Sometimes it may be necessary to remove the battery pack to find the number. Once you have the FCC ID number for a particular phone, follow the instructions on the website and it should provide values for typical or maximum SAR for a particular phone. ## Consumer Information on Wireless Phones

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published a series of Questions and Answers for consumers relating to radio frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

## What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term wireless phone refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell," "mobile," or "PCS" phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radio frequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head. These RF exposures are limited by Federal Communications Commission safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies.

When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures well within the FCC's compliance limits.

## Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

## What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- Federal Communications Commission
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

## What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radio frequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health.
Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phones RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

## What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but ten or more years' follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do - may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

## What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).

FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization international Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.
FDA and Cellular Telecommunications \& Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

## What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

- If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna.
Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.


## What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.
Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

## Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.

## Do wireless phone accessories that claim to shield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption.

In February 2002, the Federal trade Commission (FTC) charged two companies that sold devices that claimed to protect wireless phone users from radiation with making false and unsubstantiated claims. According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable basis to substantiate their claim.

## What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio frequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a compatible phone and a compatible hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur, FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

## Road Safety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.
When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

1. Get to know your wireless phone and its features, such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
2. When available, use a hands-free device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience and safety to your wireless phone with one of the many hands free accessories available today.
3. Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, let your voice mail answer it for you.
4. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
5. Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or flipping through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility, driving safely.
6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan calls when your car will be stationary. If you need to make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
7. Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
8. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident or medical emergencies.
9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
10. Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency number.

## Responsible Listening

Caution!: Avoid potential hearing loss.
Damage to hearing occurs when a person is exposed to loud sounds over time. The risk of hearing loss increases as sound is played louder and for longer durations. Prolonged exposure to loud sounds (including music) is the most common cause of preventable hearing loss. Some scientific research suggests that using portable audio devices, such as portable music players and cellular telephones, at high volume settings for long durations may lead to permanent noise-induced hearing loss. This includes the use of headphones (including headsets, earbuds, and Bluetooth or other wireless devices). Exposure to very loud sound has also been associated in some studies with tinnitus (a ringing in the ear), hypersensitivity to sound and distorted hearing.

Individual susceptibility to noise-induced hearing loss and potential hearing problem varies. Additionally, the amount of sound produced by a portable audio device varies depending on the nature of the sound, the device settings, and the headphones that are used. As a result, there is no single volume setting that is appropriate for everyone or for every combination of sound, settings and equipment.
You should follow some commonsense recommendations when using any portable audio device:

- Set the volume in a quiet environment and select the lowest volume at which you can hear adequately.
- When using headphones, turn the volume down if you cannot hear the people speaking near you or if the person sitting next to you can hear what you are listening to.
- Do not turn the volume up to block out noisy surroundings. If you choose to listen to your portable device in a noisy environment, you noise-cancelling headphones to block out background environmental noise. By blocking background environment noise, noise cancelling headphones should allow you to hear the music at lower volumes than when using earbuds.
- Limit the amount of time you listen. As the volume increases, less time is required before you hearing could be affected.
- Avoid using headphones after exposure to extremely loud noises, such as rock concerts, that might cause temporary hearing loss. Temporary hearing loss might cause unsafe volumes to sound normal.
- Do not listen at any volume that causes you discomfort. If you experience ringing in your ears, hear muffled speech or experience any temporary hearing difficulty after listening to your portable audio device, discontinue use and consult your doctor.

## Operating Environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder if you are using an external antenna).

## Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

## Implantable Medical Devices

A minimum separation of six (6) inches should be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and an implantable medical device, such as a pacemaker or implantable cardioverter defibrillator, to avoid potential interference with the device.
Persons who have such devices:

- Should ALWAYS keep the phone more than six (6) inches from their implantable medical device when the phone is turned 0 N ;
- Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the implantable medical device to minimize the potential for interference;
- Should turn the phone OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.
- Should read and follow the directions from the manufacturer of your implantable medical device. if you have any questions about using your wireless phone with such a device, consult your health care provider.

## Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

## Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your phone off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

## Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

## Posted Facilities

Switch your phone off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

## Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your phone off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.
Users are advised to switch the phone off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

## Emergency Calls

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks as well as user-programmed functions, which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example).

Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.
To make an emergency call:

1. If the phone is not on, switch it on.
2. Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number). Emergency numbers vary by location.
3. Press the $\llbracket$ key.

If certain features are in use (call barring, for example), you may first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.
When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your phone may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.

## Restricting Children's access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your phone bill.

## FCC Notice and Cautions

## FCC Notice

The phone may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the phone if such interference cannot be eliminated.

Vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane) must comply with the National Fire Protection Standard (NFPA-58). For a copy of this standard, contact the National Fire Protection Association, One Batterymarch Park, Quincy, MA 02269, Attn: Publication Sales Division.

## Cautions

Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment, and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending or sitting on it.

## Other Important Safety Information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including both installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your phone off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless phone in aircraft is illegal and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.


## Product Performance

## Getting the Most Out of Your Signal Reception

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal.
If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

## Understanding the Power Save Feature

If your phone is unable to find a signal after searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key.
Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen.
When a signal is found, your phone returns to standby mode.

## Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

## Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.
There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- If your phone is equipped with an external antenna, hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended and over your shoulder.
- Do not hold, bend or twist the phone's antenna, if applicable.
- Do not use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- If your phone is equipped with an internal antenna, obstructing the internal antenna could inhibit call performance.
- Speak directly into the phone's receiver.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it is inoperable, call Customer Care for service.


## Availability of Various Features/Ring Tones

Many services and features are network dependent and may require additional subscription and/or usage charges. Not all features are available for purchase or use in all areas. Downloadable Ring Tones may be available at an additional cost. Other conditions and restrictions may apply. See your service provider for additional information.

## Battery Standby and Talk Time

Standby and talk times will vary depending on phone usage patterns and conditions. Battery power consumption depends on factors such as network configuration, signal strength, operating temperature, features selected, frequency of calls, and voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

## Battery Precautions

- Avoid dropping the cell phone. Dropping it, especially on a hard surface, can potentially cause damage to the phone and battery. If you suspect damage to the phone or battery, take it to a service center for inspection.
- Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Do not modify or remanufacture the battery as this could result in serious safety hazards.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power; talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Follow battery usage, storage and charging guidelines found in the user's guide.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge and the type of battery and charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time (talk time and standby time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. When a charger is not in use, disconnect it from the power source. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Do not use incompatible cell phone batteries and chargers. Some Web sites and second-hand dealers, not associated with reputable manufacturers and carriers, might be selling incompatible or even counterfeit batteries and chargers.
Consumers should purchase manufacturer or carrier recommended products and accessories. If unsure about whether a replacement battery or charger is compatible, contact the manufacturer of the battery or charger.
- Misuse or use of incompatible phones, batteries, and charging devices could result in damage to the equipment and a possible risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other serious hazard.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below $0^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(32^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$.
- Do not place the phone in areas that may get very hot, such as on or near a cooking surface, cooking appliance, iron, or radiator.
- Do not get your phone or battery wet. Even though they will dry and appear to operate normally, the circuitry could slowly corrode and pose a safety hazard.
- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short-circuiting can occur when a metallic object (coin, clip or pen) causes a direct connection between the + and terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery), for example when you carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Do not permit a battery out of the phone to come in contact with metal objects, such as coins, keys or jewelry.
- Do not crush, puncture or put a high degree of pressure on the battery as this can cause an internal short-circuit, resulting in overheating.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited. For safe disposal options for Li-Ion batteries, contact your nearest Samsung authorized service center. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.


## Care and Maintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years.

- Keep the phone and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children.
- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation, humidity and liquids contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits.
- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.
- Do not use or store the phone in dusty, dirty areas, as its moving parts may be damaged.
- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.
- Do not drop, knock or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.
- Do not use harsh chemicals, cleaning solvents or strong detergents to clean the phone. Wipe it with a soft cloth slightly dampened in a mild soap-and-water solution.
- Do not paint the phone. Paint can clog the device's moving parts and prevent proper operation.
- Do not put the phone in or on heating devices, such as a microwave oven, a stove or a radiator. The phone may explode when overheated.
- If your phone is equipped with an external antenna, use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas or modified accessories may damage the phone and violate regulations governing radio devices.
- If the phone, battery, charger or any accessory is not working properly, take it to your nearest qualified service facility. The personnel there will assist you, and if necessary, arrange for service.
