### **IMPORTANT SAFEGUARDS**

#### 1. Read Instructions

All the safety and operating instructions should be read before the product is operated.

#### 2. Retain Instructions

The safety instructions and instruction manual should be retained for future reference.

#### 3. Heed Warnings

Disconnect this camera from the power supply before cleaning.

#### 6. Attachments

Do not use attachments not recommended by the camera manufacturer as they may cause hazards.

#### 7. Water and Moisture

Do not use this camera near water, for example, near a bath tub, wash bowl, kitchen sink, or laundry tub, in a wet basement, or near a swimming pool and the like.

#### 8. Accessories

Do not place this camera on an unstable cart, stand, tripod, bracket or table. The camera may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the product. Use only with stand, tripod, bracket, or table recommended by the manufacturer, or sold with the camera. Any mounting of the product should follow the manufacturer's instructions, and should use a mounting accessory recommended by the manufacturer.

### **IMPORTANT SAFEGUARDS (Cont.)**

#### 9. Ventilation

This camera should never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register. This camera should not be placed in a built-in installation such as a bookcase or rack unless proper ventilation is provided or the manufacturer's instructions have been adhered to.

#### 10. Power Sources

This camera should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supply to your location, consult your product dealer.

#### 11. Power-Cord Protection

Power-Supply cords should be routed so that they are not likely to be walked on or pinched by items placed upon or against them, paying particular attention to cords at plugs, screws and the point where they exit from the product.

#### 12. Installation

This camera should be installed on a firm and solid part of the ceiling or wall. If installed on a soft and weak place, the camera unit may fall. A person under it may be injured and things under it may be damaged.

#### 13. Lightning

For added protection for this camera during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the outlet and disconnect the power supply and cable system. This will prevent damage to the camera due to lightning and power-line surges. If lightning occurs, do not touch the unit or any connected cables in order to avoid electric shock.

#### 14. Overloading

Do not overload power supply and extension cords as this can result in a risk of fire or electric shock.

#### 15. Object and Liquid Entry

Never push objects of any kind into this camera through openings as they may touch dangerous voltage points or short-out parts that could result in a fire or electrical shock. Never spill liquid of any kind on the camera.

#### 16. Servicing

Do not attempt to service this camera yourself as opening or removing covers may expose you to dangerous voltage or other hazards. Refer all servicing to qualified service personnel.

#### 17. Damage Requiring Service

Disconnect this camera from the power supply and refer servicing to qualified service personnel under the following conditions.

- a. When the power-supply cord or plug is damaged.
- b. If liquid has been spilled, or objects have fallen into the camera.
- c. If the camera has been exposed to rain or water.
- d. If the camera does not operate normally by following the operating instructions in the instruction manual. Adjust only those controls that are covered by the instruction manual as an improper adjustment of other controls may result in damage and will often require extensive work by a qualified technician to restore the camera to its normal operation.
- e. If the camera has been dropped or the cabinet has been damaged.
- f. When the camera exhibits a distinct change in performance-this indicates a need for service.

#### 18. Replacement Parts

When replacement parts are required, be sure the service technician has used replacement parts specified by the manufacturer with the same characteristics as the original part. Unauthorized substitutions may result in fire, electric shock or other hazards.

#### 19. Safety Check

Upon completion of any service or repairs to this camera, ask the service technician to perform safety checks to determine that the camera is in proper operating condition.

#### · Do not aim the camera at the sun

Do not aim the camera at the sun or point it at sun even if you are not shooting.

NOTES ON USE AND INSTALLATION

#### Do not shoot intense light

Intense light such as a spotlight may cause a bloom or smear. A vertical stripe may appear on the screen. However, this is not a malfunction.

#### · Treat the camera with care

Do not drop the camera or subject it to strong shock or vibration. Otherwise, the camera may malfunction.

#### Never touch internal parts

Do not touch the internal parts of the camera other than the parts specified. Otherwise, the camera may malfunction.

#### Install the camera where no video noise appears

If cables are wired near electric lighting wires or a TV set, noise may appear in images. In this event, relocate cables or reinstall equipment.

#### Check the ambient temperature and humidity

Avoid using the camera where the temperature is hotter or colder than specified. Otherwise, the quality of images may deteriorate or internal parts may be affected. Special care is required to use the camera at high temperature and humidity.

#### Should you notice any trouble

If any trouble occurs while you are using the camera, turn off the power and contact your dealer. Continued use in this state might cause fire or electric shock. For details on repair, consult the place of purchase, or please contact the technical support number.

### **Precautions for Use**

#### **SD Memory Card**

- There is a limit to the number of rewrites that is possible with the SD memory card. Replacing the SD memory card when performing periodic maintenance of the camera is recommended.
- The camera supports the following SD memory cards. Do not use memory cards with other specifications.
  - SD memory card: 64, 128, 256, and 512 MB, 1 GB SD memory cards (3.3 V) supported.
  - Physical interface: Part 1. Physical Layer Specification; Version 1.01
- Images may not be recorded or read correctly if an unsupported SD memory card is used with the camera.
- Carefully read the User's guide, precautions on use, and any other information supplied with a purchased memory card.
- An SD memory card can be used for the loop recording of images. The lifespan (number of rewrites possible) of an SD memory card is greatly affected by the capacity of the SD memory card. The use of a 128, 256, or 512 MB, 1 GB large-capacity SD memory card is recommended for loop recording.
- To achieve maximum performance of the camera, the use of a Toshiba SD memory card is recommended. If a card of another company is used, the recording intervals may lengthen and the erasure time during overwriting may increase. As a result, the number of delivered frames of live video may decrease.
- Do not use a memory card containing the data recorded by another device with the camera as this may result in the camera not functioning correctly.
- Do not modify, overwrite the data, or change the folder name of an SD memory card. It may result in the camera not to function correctly.
- Data recorded with the camera do not comply with the image file format Exif and the DCF standard. If the SD memory card is to be removed to play images, use a personal computer to play the images. Other devices may not be capable of displaying the images.

### **AC** adaptor

Be sure to use only the supplied AC adaptor. Using a different AC adaptor may cause the camera to malfunction, heat up, or catch fire. Before using the AC adaptor, carefully read and observe the Important Safety Instructions (→page 7) and the notes below.

- Do not allow the connectors on the AC adaptor to come into contact with any other metal object as this may result in short circuit.
- To connect the AC adaptor, firmly insert the plug end of the cable into the AC adaptor jack. Do not insert the plug into other jacks as this may cause a malfunction
- When removing the connection cable, disconnect the cable by holding its plug.
   Do not disconnect the cable by pulling on the cable.
- Do not drop the AC adaptor or subject it to strong impact.
- Do not use the AC adaptor in hot and humid places.
- Do not use the supplied AC adaptor with devices other than this camera.
- Temperature increasing on the surface of the adaptor is normal. Before moving the adaptor to another location, unplug it from the wall outlet, and wait until its temperature decreases.
- Buzzing noises may come from inside. This does not indicate malfunction.
- Using the AC adaptor near a radio, TV, or cellphone may cause interference.
   Use the adaptor at sufficient distances from these devices.



### **Overview of the Network Camera**

The IK-WB21A network camera can deliver video images and sound in real time using the Internet or an intranet. The camera is equipped with Ethernet (RJ-45) 10BASE-T/100BASE-TX network interfaces.

IK-WB21A can be used in various indoor environments.



### **Features of the Camera**

#### Built-in pan/tilt mechanism

A built-in pan (left/right) and tilt (up/down) mechanism enables you to use the Internet browser to change the direction of the camera lens. The camera also comes with Scan, Presets, Auto Patrol and various other monitoring features.

#### Motor powered 22x zoom lens

Allows maximum magnification of 22 times.

#### A high-resolution picture element CCD packaged

A high-resolution picture element progressive CCD (charge coupled device) built in the camera enables delivery of pictures maximum 1280 x 960 pixels. High-resolution pictures equal to those of a digital camera are delivered.

#### Supports multiple cameras

Toshiba's original protocol, RNCP, allows Toshiba network cameras to identify each other on the same network. This enables images from automatically identified network cameras to be displayed in multi-view screen in the same browser window.

The number of windows in the multi-view display automatically changes (4  $(2 \times 2)$  or  $9(3 \times 3)$  windows) accordingly to the number of identified cameras. The cameras on other networks can be displayed on the same multi-view display screen by registering the cameras manually.

#### Interactive two-way audio communication equipment.

Camera supports interactive two way audio communication.

#### Mailing function

This feature allows you to receive mail messages with images when alarms go off.

#### Built-in SD memory card interface

  - · Cover for mounting on ceiling


- Improper installation may cause the camera to fall.
- When installing on ceiling
- Make a hole in the ceiling where the camera is to be installed to insert the AC adapter cable, LAN cable and other cables.
- 2 Feed the AC adapter cable, LAN cable and other cables through the hole.
- **3** Mount the ceiling attachment below the drilled hole.
  - · Mount on a ceiling or other structure by securely fastening the four corners of the attachment by four wooden screws.
  - · Install securely on the ceiling where the ceiling is supported by a beam.
  - · If a beam cannot be found, put a support behind the ceiling to prevent falling of the camera.
  - · Mount the camera with the lens pointing in the direction of the arrow on the ceiling attachment.




#### Important

- Check if the ceiling structure and material have a sufficient strength before installing the camera onto a ceiling. If the amounting strength is inadequate, the camera will fall, potentially causing an injury or a camera failure. The wooden screws supplied as accessories do not provide an adequate strength with some ceiling materials. For example, special anchors are needed if the ceiling material is gypsum boards. Please consult the building architects regarding ceiling structure and strength.
- **4** Tie the safety wire of the ceiling attachment onto the safety hook of the camera.




5 Connect the AC adapter cable, LAN cable and other cables to the terminals on the camera.


### **6** Mount the camera on the ceiling attachment.








#### Important

- Due to the compact space of the power terminal, ensure that the plug is properly inserted. The camera may not work properly if the plug is not inserted properly.
- The terminal cover has the function to prevent coming off of the AC adapter cable. Be sure to mount the cover.
- Mount the terminal cover in the correct position and direction. The terminal cover facing a wrong direction disables the function to prevent coming off of the AC adapter cable. It also damages the cable.

#### Turning on the Power

The camera has no main power switch or button. To turn the power on, insert the plug of the power cord into a power outlet.

Turn the power on after you have installed the camera.



### **Setting Network Camera Environment**

#### Items needed for network camera monitoring system

Administrator's personal computer

The personal computer that is given all authorities for setting, operating, monitoring and other functions with the network camera is called the "administrator's personal computer" in this manual.

\* The terminal equipment only for viewing monitored images is called the "user's personal computer" in this manual. More than one user's personal computer can view monitored images of one network camera.

Recommended personal computer operating conditions

- · Windows® 2000 or XP as OS
- · Internet Explorer Ver 6.0 or later
- · CPU: Intel® Pentium® III 800MHz or higher
- · Memory: 256MB or more
- Network camera (TOSHIBA network camera IK-WB21A)
  - · Please purchase the required and appropriate number of cameras corresponding to the desired camera installation locations.
- Connection equipment such as a hub and router suiting the network system environment and LAN cable
  - The LAN cable type differs depending on the connection method. For further information, see "Connection Configuration" on page 26.
- Camera search application "Camera Finder"
  - Install this application from the CD-ROM supplied as an accessory.
     (Double-click "Setup.exe" in the CD-ROM and install the application in accordance with the instructions in the screen)

### IP Address

To connect to the network, the administrator needs to set the network camera IP address.

There are two options to set the IP address.

· Obtaining an IP address automatically from the DHCP server

**Connecting the Camera and Personal Computer by Network** 

- Entering an IP address manually(→page 86)
- Obtaining an IP address automatically from the DHCP server Your camera is set to get data automatically from the DHCP server (DHCP ON/OFF is set to ON in "Network/Basic Settings") by default. If your network is using DHCP server, you will not need to change the IP address of the camera.

#### Entering the IP address manually.

- Manually enter the IP address when the DHCP server is not used or when the DHCP server is not utilized even though it is connected.
- The IP address of the network camera is sometimes updated or changed from time to time when the DHCP server is used. For this reason, the network camera sometimes cannot be connected due to an IP address change if the network camera is accessed using the previously set IP address.

To enable accessing the network camera in this case, a fixed IP address needs be set with the network camera by setting an IP address through manual input. Please read the instruction manuals of the network system equipment also carefully such as the router, hub and modem.

· When entering the IP address manually, set DHCP ON/OFF to OFF in "Network Basic Setting" on page 86 and enter the IP address, subnet mask, default gateway, primary DNS and secondary DNS.

#### **Connection Configuration**


Two configurations are available for connection of network cameras.

- · Crossover connection
- · Connection via a hub, switch, or router
- •Using a crossover cable to establish a connection (example)



Crossover cable is not provided with the product.

Establishing a connection via a hub (example)



LAN cable (straight through) and Hub is not provided with the product.

#### NOTE

- You do not need to assign an IP address to a hub.
- The IP address of your camera after purchasing from the store is automatically set to 192.168.0.30 in case DHCP is not used. Set the IP address of your personal computer in the same subnet. (The network segment must be the same segment when directly connecting using a cross cable or connecting through the hub)

When connecting more than one camera, connect each camera using IP Address 192.168.0.30 and change the IP addresses of the second and subsequent cameras to other IP addresses, such as 192.168.0.31.

You can also use the LAN port of your broadband router.
However, when using the broadband router, if the DHCP server function is set to "ON", turn on the power after connecting the camera with the router.
The camera gets the IP address from the router's DHCP server and it may not be 192.168.0.30.

It is also recommended to set the computer's IP address from the router's DHCP server

#### **Connecting Camera and Personal Computer**

### 1 Connect LAN cable and turn the power on.

Connect the LAN cable (straight cable) connected to the camera to the hub. Or, connect the camera to a personal computer with the power turned on using the LAN cable (cross cable).

· Connect DC 12V to the power terminal.

- Setting the Overwrite mode to ON deletes files beginning with old files. If important data is to be saved, set the Overwrite mode to OFF.
- Getting a record list of the SD memory card sometimes takes more than 5 minutes after turning the power on. Data cannot be recorded while obtaining a record list.
- The camera recording period may not operate as set depending on the type of the SD memory card.

#### **Deleting Record File**

Image files recorded in an SD memory card can be deleted.



By using FTP server, it becomes possible to manage periodic transferring and saving huge recorded image data. You can record images by "Scheduled Recording", "Alarm Recording" or "Ext. Control In Recording" on FTP server.

  - · Select "Reconnect" when data transfer is not so frequent. In this case, network camera logs in/out for each file transfer.

- When selecting "Scheduled Recording" or "Ext. Control In Recording", network
  camera logs in to FTP server automatically before the scheduled recording
  starts. Even though the scheduled recording stops, when there are some
  unsent image data left in the camera, the camera will not log out from FTP
  server automatically until it transfers all the image data.
- When selecting "Alarm In" or "Ext. Control In Recording", network camera logs in/out automatically each time an alarm is detected. When there is more than one alarm at a time (receiving another alarm(s) while transferring a file) the camera logs out from the server after transferring last image data.
- If the "Recording Cycle" is set longer than the connection timout period of the FTP server, FTP connection will be cut off by the server side even with selecting "Continuous Connection" in the FTP Connection Method. (See pages 56 and 57)

Configures resolution. Higher Resolution results in larger image Possible settings: 1280×960 (SXVGA)/640×480 (VGA)/320× 240 (QVGA)/160×120 (QQVGA)

Compression Ratio

Set quality of delivered images. The size of image files (JPEG files) varies in accordance with compression ratio.

This setting produces highest image quality. The Low compression: file size increases.

Mid-low compression:

Intermediate setting between standard and low

compression rates.

Standard: Standard setting.

Mid-high compression:

Intermediate setting between standard and high

compression.

High compression: This setting produces lowest image quality. The

file size decreases.

#### NOTE

- The picture quality and the file size change depending on the conditions of an object (splendor, resolution, movement).
- Size of the files affect the network and smaller file size may increase frame
- Brightness Adjustment

The camera automatically adjusts the level of brightness of images. Adjust so that the image level becomes optimum in accordance with conditions of the object. Images become brighter higher the level is. Images are dark lower the level is.

#### NOTE

- The brightness level of images are controlled automatically by adjustment of the lens, AGC and slow shutter.
- Mounting Method

Set to install the camera.

Ceiling mount: Suspended on a ceiling Desktop: When used on a desk

Focus Range

Set an focusing range.

Standard: Auto focus is in focus when the distance between the cam-

era and object is more than 3 ft.

Auto focus is in focus when the distance between the cam-Macro:

era and object is between 0.4 inch and 3ft.

#### NOTE

- Auto focusing is sometimes not possible when shooting through a glass pane, a flat object such as a wall and moving object. Achieve focusing of these objects by manual focusing.
- Auto focusing is sometimes disabled due to noise when the AGC function operates. Then adjust focusing in the Manual mode.
- Auto focusing is sometimes not possible when the object is dark and camera sensitivity is not low enough. Then adjust focusing in the Manual mode.
- Auto focusing is sometimes not possible with images that are output to a TV or a personal computer monitor. Then adjust focusing in the Manual mode.
- Focusing to 0.4 inch in the macro mode is possible up to about 3.5 x zoom. Focusing at a higher magnification will be possible only if the distance to the object is longer than 3ft.

#### AF Detection Area

Center: Set a focus detection area in the center of the screen.

### Camera/Basic Settings (Cont.)

#### Auto B/W

Configures Auto black and white function. Auto B/W is the function to gain sensitivity by turning to B/W automatically when it becomes dark. The image may have some noise in B/W mode.

ON: Auto B/W takes action.

OFF: Auto B/W does not take action.

#### White Balance (WB)

White balance adjustment is needed to obtain images of a correct color tone. The camera offers selection of a white balance mode auto white balance (AWB), fixed (indoor and outdoor), hold or manual. In the Auto mode, the camera automatically accomplishes a white balance.

The auto operating color temperature range is approx. 2500K to approx. 7000K when "AWB Range" is set to standard and is approx. 2200K to approx. 9000K when "AWB Range" is set to wide. WB is automatically achieved in almost all situations, except when the object is dark or un-white, in which case a good balance sometimes cannot be achieved. In this case, set to the Fixed or Manual mode.

#### NOTE

- The Auto mode may not be effective if lighting is insufficient and the object is dark. In this case, increase the camera sensitivity (high limit values of AGC and slow shutter) or set white balance to the Fixed mode.
- White balance may not be optimal depending on the type of fluorescent lamp even when shooting indoors (fluorescent lamp), in which case change to other setting.
- White balance may not be optimal in the Auto mode under a sodium vapor lamp. In this case, set the AWB control range to wide or to the Manual mode referring to "AWB Control Range."

#### WB Manual GAIN - R. WB Manual GAIN - B.

Set a gain for a white balance in the Manual mode. Match the white balance by operating R gain and B gain. Increase the value to increase the set gain and reduce the value to reduce the set gain.

#### AWB Ye/Cy Offset, AWB Mg/G Offset

Set the white balance offset. In the Auto mode of white balance, offset the convergent point of white balance in the direction of a preset color, to obtain a desired color tone.

Ye/Cy Offset: The convergent point shifts to the yellow side when

the value is increased toward the plus side, shifting to the cyan side when increased toward the minus

siae.

Mg/G Offset: The convergent point shifts to the magenta side when the value is increased toward the plus side, shifting

to the green side when increased toward the minus

side.

#### AWB Range

Set the control range of white balance in the Auto mode.

Standard: The operating color temperature range is approx. 2500K to

approx. 7000K.

Wide: The operating color temperature range is approx. 2200K to

approx. 9000K.

#### NOTE

• A wide setting may cause an unnatural hue of the image.

#### Auto Gain Control

Set a maximum value for operational gain of the auto gain control circuit. Set to maximum if the object is too dark and camera sensitivity is low.

The camera sensitivity increases in the order of "OFF," "standard" and "Max" Noise also increases when Auto Gain Control is near maximum. Lighting is recommended to obtain good image quality.

#### NOTE

 If sensitivity is still short after setting Auto Gain control, set the high limit value of the slow shutter and auto B/W function, to further increase sensitivity.

# Camera/Basic Settings (Cont.)

#### Slow Shutter

Set a high limit value of the slow shutter. The camera sensitivity is maintained on an optimum image level between 1x and a set high limit value. Increasing the high limit value increases the camera sensitivity.

#### NOTE


• Setting the high limit value of slow shutter other than to 1x automatically increases the camera sensitivity to the set high limit value as the object becomes dark. When the sensitivity is high, the exposure time becomes longer and frame rate becomes smaller. Blurred images sometimes are prominent with moving objects.

#### Backlight Compensation

Set an area for backlight compensation. Backlight compensation is a function that achieves the brightness of a selected area to an optimum image level. This function is effective when the auto aperture lens tends to close due to an intense light that enters in areas other than those wished to view so that areas desired to see become dark and difficult to see. In this case, set the area so that the portion wished to see enters the selected area. The area size is roughly as follows.

(The image level of shaded parts is maintained appropriate)

(The image level of shaded parts is maintained appropriate) When OFF, rear light correction is not performed.



#### Auto Areas 1 to 6 are combined and controlled depending on the condition of the object.

#### NOTE

• The Auto mode controls to optimize brightness of a dark part of the screen by letting the camera to automatically decide such part. For this reason, part of an image of a bright part is sometimes washed out.

#### Sharpness

Set image outline correction. Chose "HIGH" when wishing to make the outline clearer, choosing "LOW" to make the outline softer.

LOW: The contour becomes soft.

MIDDLE: Standard setting

HIGH: The contour becomes sharp.

#### Color Difference GAIN R-Y, Color Difference GAIN B-Y

Set a color difference gain. Increase the value to increase the gain, reducing the value to reduce the gain.

Color difference GAIN R-Y: Sets a color gain of R-Y axis. Color difference GAIN B-Y: Sets a color gain of B-Y axis.

#### Noise Reduction

Set a noise reduction effect. The noise reduction effect increases in the order of "LOW" "MIDDLE." and "HIGH."

HIGH: Activates noise reduction strong.

MIDDLE: Standard setting

LOW: Activates noise reduction weak.

#### NOTE

 Setting to "LOW" or "HIGH" increases the noise reduction effect. After images, however, sometimes become prominent when a moving object is photographed.





- Fewer images than a set frame rate are sometimes sent depending on the image size and network condition.
- SetTing the delivery image size to 1280 x 960 sets the frame rate to 7.5 frames/second maximum.

## **Camera/Alarm Settings**




Installed on desk




