Basic care and tips for using your computer

Turning your computer on and off

To turn on the computer, simply slide and then release the power switch on the left side of your TravelMate.

To turn the power off, do any of the following:

• Use the Windows Shut Down... command

C lic k on **Start**, **Shut Down...**, and select Shut down; then c lic k on **OK**.

• Use the power switch



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Note: You can also use the power switch to perform power management functions. See "Basic power management" on page 28.

• Use the customized functions for power management

You can also shutdown the computer by closing the display cover, or by pressing the sleep hot key (**Fn-F4**). See "Basic power management" on page 28.



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Note: If you cannot power off the computer normally, press and hold the power switch for more than four sec onds to shut down the computer. If you turn off the computer and want to turn it on again, wait at least two seconds before powering up.

Taking care of your computer

Your computer will serve you well if you take care of it.

- Do not expose the computer to direct sunlight. Do not place it near sources of heat, such as a radiator.
- Do not expose the computer to temperatures below 0°C (32°F) or above 50°C (122°F).
- Do not subject the computer to magnetic fields.
- Do not expose the computer to rain or moisture.
- Do not spill water or any liquid on the computer.
- Do not subject the computer to heavy shock and vibration.
- Do not expose the computer to dust and dirt.
- Neverplace objects ontop of the computer to a void damaging the computer.
- Do not slam the computer display when you close it.
- Never place the computer on uneven surfaces.

Taking care of your AC adapter

Here are some ways to take care of your AC adapter.

- Do not connect the adapter to any other device.
- Do not step on the power c ord or place heavy objects on top of it. C a refully route the power c ord and any c a bles a way from personal traffic.
- When unplugging the power cord, do not pull on the cord itself but pull on the plug.
- The total ampere ratings of the equipment plugged in should not exceed the ampere rating of the cord if you are using an extension cord. Also, the total current rating of all equipment plugged into a single wall outlet should not exceed the fuse rating.

Taking care of your battery pack

Here are some ways to take care of your battery pack:

- Use only batteries of the same kind as replacements. Turn the power off before removing or replacing batteries.
- Do not tamper with batteries. Keep them away from children.
- Dispose of used batteries according to local regulations. Recycle if at all possible.

Cleaning and servicing

When cleaning the computer, follow these steps:

- 1 Power off the computer and remove the battery pack.
- 2 Disconnect the AC adapter.
- **3** Use a soft cloth moistened with water. Do not use liquid or a erosol cleaners.

If any of the following occurs:

- The computer has been dropped or the body has been damaged.
- Liquid has been spilled into the product.
- The computer does not operate normally.

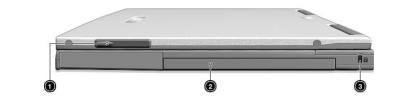

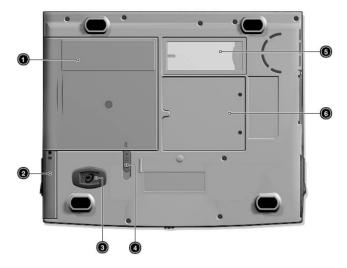

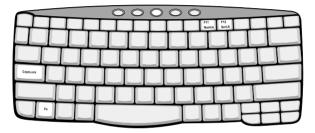
Using the keyboard

The keyboard has full-sized keys and an embedded keypad, separate cursor keys, two Windows keys and twelve function keys.

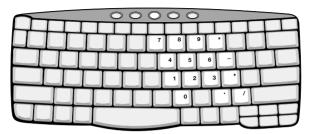

Note: To a c c ess the Num Loc k and Sc roll Loc k functions, hold the Fn key down while pressing the F11 and F12 keys respectively.

Embedded numeric keypad

The embedded numeric keypad functions like a desktop numeric keypad. It is indicated by small characters located on the upper right corner of the keycaps. To simplify the keyboard legend, cursor-control key symbols are not printed on the keys.

Hot keys

The computer employs hot keys or key combinations to a c cess most of the computer's controls like screen brightness, volume output and the BIOS Utility.

To activate hot keys, press and hold the ${\bf Fn}$ key before pressing the other key in the hot key combination.

The Euro symbol

If your keyboard layout is set to United States-International or United Kingdom or if you have a keyboard with a European layout, you can type the Euro symbol on your keyboard.



Note for US keyboard users: The keyboard layout is set when you first set up Windows. For the Euro symbol to work, the keyboard layout has to be set to United States-International.

To verify the keyboard type:

- 1 Click on Start, Settings, Control Panel.
- 2 Double-click on **Keyboard**.
- 3 Click on the Language tab.

4 Verify that the keyboard layout used for "En English (United States)" is set to United States-International.

If not, select and click on **Properties**; then select **United States**-International and click on **OK**.

5 Click on OK.

To type the Euro symbol:

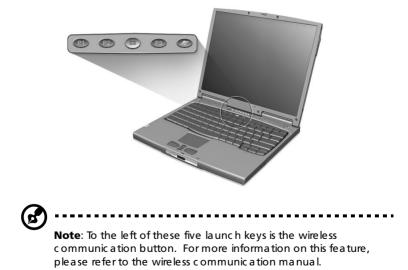
- 1 Locate the Euro symbol on your keyboard.
- 2 Open a text editor or word processor.
- 3 Hold Alt Gr and press the Euro symbol.

Email checking function

When you first start up your system, a Mail Checking dialog box will be displayed. In this dialog box, you have the option to launch the program at startup or not, set the time for mail checking, etc. If you a lready have an email account, you can fill in the Mail Properties in the dialog box.

The Mail Server is the server name where you get your email, for example: JohnSmith@hotmail.com, the Mail Server is **hotmail.com**.

Aside from the email c hecking function, there is a mail button that is used to la unch the email application. It is located above the keyboard

right below the LCD. The LED of the mail button will flash when the user has received an incoming email.

You can also access the Mail Checking dialog box by clicking on **Start, Programs, Launch Manager,** then click on **E-Mail checking setting**.

Touchpad

The built-in touc hpad is a PS/2-c ompatible pointing device that senses movement on its surface. This means the cursor responds as you move your finger on the surface of the touc hpad. The central location on the palm rest provides optimum comfort and support.



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Note: When using an external USB or serial mouse, you can press **Fn-F7** to disable the touc hpad. If you are using an external PS/2 mouse, the touc hpad is automatic ally disabled.



Touchpad basics

The following items teach you how to use the touchpad:



- Move your finger across the touchpad to move the cursor.
- Press the left (1) and right (3) buttons located on the edge of the touc hpad to do selection and execution functions. These two buttons are similar to the left and right buttons on a mouse. Tapping on the touc hpad produces similar results.
- Use the center (2) button (top and bottom) to scroll up or down a page. This button mimic s your cursor pressing on the right scroll

Note: Keep yourfingers dry and c lean when using the touc hpad. Also keep the touc hpad dry and c lean. The touc hpad is sensitive to finger movements. Hence, the lighter the touc h, the better the response. Tapping harder will not increase the touc hpad's responsiveness.

Storage

This computer supplies you the following media storage:

- High-capacity Enhanced-IDE hard disk
- External EasyLink™ combo drive
 - Standard 3.5-inch floppy drive.
 - High-speed optical drive

Hard disk

The high-capacity hard disk is the answer to your storage needs.

EasyLink combo drive

The EasyLinkc ombodrive is a two-in-one floppy/CD-ROM, floppy/DVD-ROM or floppy/DVD-RW "c ombo" drive that c onnec ts externally to the c omputer.

The floppy drive reads and writes standard 3.5-inc h diskettes. The optical drive provides the latest in multimedia in a mobile world.

Connecting and disconnecting the EasyLink combo drive

To connect the EasyLink combo drive:

- 1 Pullout the EasyLink combod rive cable connector from its storage slot.
- 2 Open the EasyLink combo drive connector door (a) on the computer.

3 Firmly connect the EasyLink combod rive (connector to connector) (b) to the computer.



To disconnect the EasyLink combo drive:

- 1 Click on the HotIDE ic on (¹) on the Windows taskbar.
- 2 Select the stop operation.

A message appears to confirm the stop operation.

- 3 Clickon OK.
- 4 Disconnect the EasyLink combo drive.
- 5 Tuck in the EasyLink combo drive cable connector into its storage slot.



Note: If the computer is on, and you disconnect the EasyLink combo drive without using the HotIDE stop function, the computer will hang (stop operating normally). Connect the EasyLink combo drive again to solve this problem. It is a dvisable to follow the connect/disconnect procedures discussed a bove. If the computer is off, you can disconnect the EasyLink combo drive at your convenience.

Ejecting a floppy disk

Press the floppy disk eject button to eject a floppy disk from the floppy drive.



Ejecting the optical drive tray

To eject the optical drive tray when the computer is turned on, press the drive eject button.



When the power is off, you can eject the drive tray using the emergency eject hole. See page 60 for more detail.

Using software

Playing DVD movies

Some models come standard with a DVD-equipped EasyLink DVD combo drive. To play DVD movies on your computer, follow these steps:

1 Eject the DVD tray and insert a DVD movie disc; then close the DVD tray.

<u>م</u>

Important! When you la unch the DVD player for the first time, the program asks you to input the region code. DVD discs are divided into 6 regions. <u>Once your DVD drive is set to a region code, it will play DVD discs of that region only. You can set the region code a maximum of five times (including the first time), after which the last region code set will remain permanent. Recovering your hard disk does not reset the number of times the region code has been set. Refer to the table later in this section for DVD movie region code information.</u>

Audio

The computer comes with 16-bit high-fidelity PCI stereo audio, and includes abuilt-in sensitive microphone and stereo speaker.



There are audio ports on the front panel of the computer. See "Front view" on page 3 for more information on connecting external audio devices.

Adjusting the volume

Adjusting the volume on the computer is as easy as pressing some buttons. See "Hot keys" on page 15 for more informations on adjusting the speaker volume.

Basic power management

This computer has a built-in power management unit that monitors system activity. System activity refers to any activity involving one or more of the following devices: keyboard, mouse, floppy drive, hard disk, peripherals connected to the serial and parallel ports, and video memory. If no activity is detected for a period of time (called an inactivity timeout), the computer stops some or all of these devices in order to conserve energy.

This computer employs a power management scheme that supports ACPI (Advanced Configuration and Power Interface) which allows for maximum power conservation and maximum performance at the same time. Windows handles all power-saving chores for your computer.

Moving around with your TravelMate

This section gives you tips and hints on things to consider when moving around or traveling with your computer.

Disconnecting from the desktop

Follow these steps to disconnect your computer from external accessories:

- 1 Save your work in progress.
- 2 Remove any media, diskette or compact disc, from the drive(s).
- **3** Shut down the operating system.
- 4 Turn off the computer.
- 5 Close the display cover.
- 6 Disconnect the computer from the port expansion option, if necessary.
- 7 Disconnect the cord from the AC adapter.
- 8 Disc onnect the keyboard, pointing device, printer, external monitor, and other external devices.
- 9 Disc onnect the Kensington lock if you are using one to sec ure the computer.

Moving around

"when you are just moving within short distances, for example, from your office desk to a meeting room"

Preparing the computer

Before moving the computer, close and latch the display covertoplace it in Sleep mode. You can now safely take the computer anywhere you go within the building. To bring the computer out of Sleep mode, open the display.

If you are taking the computer to a client's office or a different building, you may choose to shut down the computer:

1 Click on Start, Shut Down....

2 Select Shut down and click on **OK**.

- or -

you can put the computer in Sleep mode by pressing ${\bf Fn-F4}.$ Then close and latch the display.

When you are ready to use the computer again, unlatch and open the display, and press any key. If the power indicator is off, the computer has entered Hibernation mode and turned off. Press, slide and release the power switch to turn the computer back on. Note that the computer may enter Hibernation mode after it is in Sleep mode for a period of time. Turn the power on to wake up the computer from Hibernation mode.

What to bring to short meetings

A fully charged battery runs the computer for about 3 hours under most circ umstances. If your meeting is shorter than that, you probably do not need to bring anything with you other than the computer.

What to bring to long meetings

If your meeting will last longer than 3 hours or if your battery is not fully charged, you may want to bring the AC adapter with you to plug in your computer in the meeting room.

If the meeting room does not have an electrical outlet, reduce the drain on the battery by putting the computer in Sleep mode. Press **Fn-F4** or close the display cover whenever you are not actively using the computer. Then tap any key or open the display to resume.

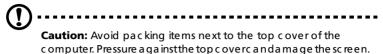

Preparing the computer

After disc onnecting the computer from your desktop, follow these steps to prepare the computer for the trip home:

• Make sure that you have removed any media, diskette and compact disc, in the drive(s). Failure to remove the media can damage the drive head.

• Pack the computer in a protective case that can prevent the computer from sliding around and cushion it if it should fall.



What to bring with you

Unless you a lready have some items at home, bring the following items with you:

- AC adapter and power cord
- The printed user's manual
- EasyLink module

Special considerations

Follow these guidelines to protect your computer while traveling to and from work:

- Minimize the effect of temperature changes by keeping the computer with you.
- If you need to stop for an extended period of time and cannot bring the computer with you, leave the computer in the trunk of the car to avoid exposing the computer to excessive heat.
- Changes in temperature and humidity cancause condensation. Allow the computer to return to room temperature, and inspect the screen for condensation before turning on the computer. If the temperature change is greater than 18°F (10°C), allow the computer to come to room temperature slowly. If possible, leave the computer for 30 minutes in an environment with a temperature between outside and room temperature.

Setting up a home office

If you frequently work on your computer at home, it may be worthwhile to purchase a sec ond AC adapter for use at home. With a sec ond AC adapter, youcan avoid transporting the extra weight to and from home.

If you use your computer at home for significant periods of time, you might also want to add an external keyboard, monitor, or mouse.

Traveling with the computer

Preparing the computer

Prepare the computer as if you were taking it home. Make sure that the battery in the computer is charged. Airport security may require you to turn on your computer when bringing it into the gate area.

What to bring with you

Bring the following items with you:

- AC adapter
- Spare, fully-charged battery pack(s)
- Additional printer driver files if you plan to use another printer
- EasyLink module

Special considerations

In addition to the guidelines for taking the computer home, follow these guidelines to protect your computer while traveling:

- Always take the computer as carry-on luggage.
- If possible, have the computer inspected by hand. Airport security X-ray machines are safe, but do not put the computer through a metal detector.
- Avoid exposing floppy disks to hand-held metal detectors.

Preparing the computer

Prepare the computer as you would normally prepare it for traveling.

What to bring with you

Bring the following items with you:

- AC adapter
- Power c ords that are appropriate to the country to which you are trave ling
- Spare, fully-charged battery packs

- Additional printer driver files if you plan to use another printer
- Proof of purchase, in case you need to show it to customs officials
- International Traveler's Warranty passport

Special considerations

Follow the same special considerations as when traveling with the computer. In addition, these tips are useful when traveling internationally:

- When traveling in a nother country, check that the local AC voltage and the AC adapter power cord specifications are compatible. If not, purchase a power cord that is compatible with the local AC voltage. Do not use converter kits sold for appliances to power the computer.
- If you are using the modem, check if the modem and connector is compatible with the telecommunications system of the country you are traveling in.

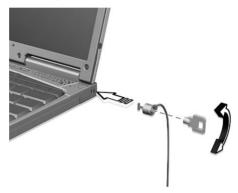
Securing your computer

Your computer is a valuable investment that you need to take care of. Learn how to protect and take care of your computer.

Security features include hardware and software locks — a security notch, smart card and passwords.

Using a computer security lock

A security keylock notch located on the right panel of the computer lets you connect a Kensington-compatible key-based computer security lock. Some keyless models are also available.



Wrap a computer security lock cable around a nimmovable object such as a table or locked drawer handle. Insert the lock into the notch and turn the key to secure the lock.

Using the SmartCard

This software includes the following components: PlatinumPAS[™], PlatinumSecure[™] and PlatinumKey[™]. Together, they provide you with multiple levels of security.

- PlatinumPAS implements the first sec urity measure at the BIOS level and runs during the BIOS routine check when a computer is powered up or rebooting. If no SmartCard or Emergency Card is detected, the computer will stop booting up to prevent any illegal access to the system.
- PlatinumSecure enhances the secure log on procedure for Windows

Millenium Edition (Me) or 2000 at the Windows operating system level. It provides user a uthentic ation through its encryption/ decryption function using the SmartC ard. If your SmartC ard is unavailable, you can use the Emergency C ard as a temporary replacement card.

 PlatinumKey auto-authentic ate and auto cache with one-click logons to all password-required websites (patent pending), eliminates the overhead costs associated with memorizing and typing user IDs and passwords when surfing the Internet with Microsoft or Netscape web browsers.

A c ard slot for your SmartC ard is located on the left panel of the computer. This new security feature helps you boot up your computer with all your settings built right into your SmartC ard. You don't have to remember your password to access your computer.

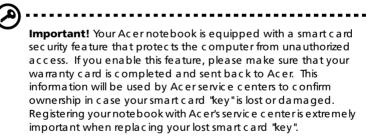

Pla tinumSec ure enhances the sec ure logon procedure for Windows Me or 2000 at the operating system level. It provides user authentication with an encryption/decryption function using the SmartCard. If your SmartCard is unavailable, the EmergencyCard canserve as a temporary replacement for the SmartCard. After installation, the

PlatinumSec ure ic on appears on the Windows desktop. Double-click on it or click the right mouse button, then select **Open** from the popup menu (or launch it from the PlatinumSec ret program group). From the menu that appears, you can directly access three operations: PlatinumSec ure Options, SmartC ard Manager, and Change Password.

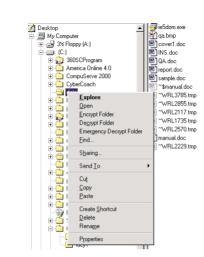

Running PlatinumKey

PlatinumKey provides one-click logon to all password-required websites. With its unique SmartC and caching technology, you can greatly extend the limited card memory size to unlimited use by storing your private data in an encrypted file either on the SmartC ard, or on the 360 Degree Web secure website server.

Information in PlatinumKey, like the ones in My Info and Credit Cards, can be transferred to other applications using the "drag-and-drop" method: simply point the cursor to the field containing the information, press and hold the left mouse button, then drag the cursor to the application and drop the information there.

Pla tinumKey a lso makes it convenient to change your password. There is a lways a PWD button available, which is equivalent to the Change Password button in Pla tinumSec ure.

Follow these steps to use PlatinumKey:

- 1 Open your browser to connect to the Internet.
- 2 Double-click on the PlatinumKey ic on on your Windows desktop.

Expanding through options

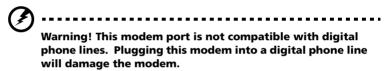
Your Trave IMate offers you a complete mobile computing experience.

Connectivity options

Ports a llow you to connect peripheral devices to your computeras you would with a desktop PC. For instructions on how to connect different external devices to the computer, see your online guide for more details.

Fax/data modem

Some models have a built-in V.90 56Kbps software modem.



To use the fax/data modem port, connect a phone cable from the modem port to a telephone jack.



Start your communic ations software program. See your communic ations manual for instructions.

Built-in network feature

The built-in network feature allows you to connect your computer to an Ethernet-based (10/100 Mbps) network.

To use the network feature, connect an Ethernet cable from the network jack on the rear of the computer to a network jack or hub on your network.



Fast infrared

The computer's fast infrared (FIR) port allows you to do wireless data transfer with other IR-aware computers and peripherals such as infrared printers. The infrared port can transfer data at speeds of up to four megabits per second (Mbps) at a distance of up to one meter. To use FIR, position two IR-a ware devices such that their IR ports are no more than one meter apart and offset no more than 15 degrees.



When the two computers are in position, simply begin the data transfer as you normally would. See your file transfer software for details.

Universal Serial Bus

The Universal Serial Bus (USB) port is a high-speed serial bus which allows you to connect and daisy-chain USB peripherals without taking up precious system resources. Your computer has two ports available.

PC Card slots

There is a type II C ardBus PC C ard slot found on the left side of the computer. This slot a c c epts c redit-c ard-sized c ards that enhance the usa bility and expandability of the computer. These c ards should have a PC C ard logo on them.

PC C ards (formerly PC MC IA) are add-on c ards for portable c omputers, giving you expansion possibilities long a fforded by desktop PC s. Popular type II c ards include flash memory, SRAM, fax/data modem, LAN and SC SI c ards. C ardBus improves on the 16-bit PC c ard technology by expanding the bandwidth to 32 bits.

ZV (Zoomed Video) allows your computer to support hardware MPEG in the form of a ZV PC card.

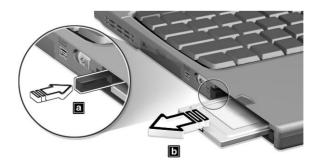
Insert the card into the slot and make the proper connections (e.g., network cable), if necessary. See your card manual for details.



Ejecting a PC Card

Before ejecting a PC Card:

- 1 Exit the application using the card.
- 2 Left-click on the PC Card icon on the taskbar and stop the card operation.
- **3** Press the slot eject button (a) to pop out the eject button; then press it again (a) to eject the card (b).



Port expansion devices

Two types of expansion devices are available for your computer:

- I/O replicator adds serial port and parallel port connections to your computer.
- EasyPort adds a host of ports for your computer, and allows you to connect and disconnect peripherals from your computer in one quick step.

Upgrade options

Your computer delivers superior power and performance. However, some users and the applications they use may demand more. This computer allows you to upgrade key components when you need increased performance.

Memory upgrade

Memory is expandable to 1024 MB or 1 G B, employing 128/256/512-MB and supports 133 Mhz industry standard soDIMMs (Small Outline Dual Inline Memory Modules). The computer supports SDRAM (Sync hronous Dynamic Random Access Memory).

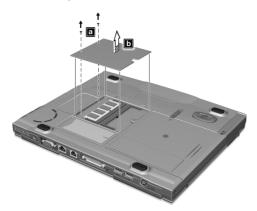
There are two memory slots on your computer, one of which is occupied by standard memory. You can upgrade memory by installing a memory module into the available slot, or replacing the standard memory with a higher-capacity memory module.

Installing memory

Follow these steps to install memory:

1 Turn off the computer, unplug the AC adapter (if connected) and remove the battery pack. Then turn the computer over to access its base.

2 Remove the screw (a) from the memory cover, then lift up and remove the memory cover (b).



3 Insert the memory module diagonally into the slot (a), then gently press it down (b) until it c licks into place.



4 Replace the memory cover and secure it with the screw.

The computer automatically detects and reconfigures the total memory size.

Notebook Manager

The computer has a built-in system setup program called Notebook Manager. The Windows-based Notebook Manager allows you to set passwords, the startup sequence of the drives, and power management settings. It also shows current hardware configurations. To start the Notebook Manager, press **Fn-F2** or follow these steps:

- 1 Click on Start, Programs, then Notebook Manager.
- 2 Select the **Notebook Manager** application to run the program.

Launch Manager and 802.11b Wireless LAN

By default, the 802.11b wireless LAN is set to "Always On". You can

manually switch off the 802.11b wireless LAN by pressing the S button. 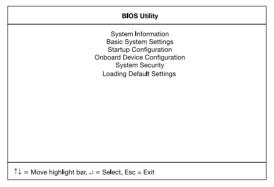

BIOS Utility

The BIOS Utility is a hardware configuration program built into your computer's BIOS (basic input/ouput system).

Your computer is a lready properly configured and optimized, and you do not need to run this utility. However, if you encounter configuration problems, you may need to run it.

To activate the BIOS Utility, press **F2** during the POST (power-on selftest) while the TravelMate logo is being displayed. See your online guide for more information.



3 Troubleshooting your computer

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This chapter instructs you on how to deal with common system problems. Read it before calling a technician if a problem occurs. Solutions to more serious problems require opening up the computer. Do not attempt to open the computer by yourself. Contact your dealer or an authorized service center for assistance.

Frequently-asked questions

The following is a list of possible situations that may arise during the use of your computer. Easy answers and solutions are provided for each one.

I pressed the power switch and opened the display, but the computer does not start or boot-up.

Look at the Power indicator (refer to "Indicators" on page 11):

- If it is not lit, no power is being applied to the computer. Check the following:
 - If you are running on battery power, it may be low and unable to power the computer. Connect the AC adapter to recharge the battery pack.
 - Make sure that the AC adapter is plugged in properly to the computer and to the power outlet.
- If it is lit, check the following:
 - If the Sleep indicator is lit, the computer is in Sleep mode. Press any key or tap on the touchpad to resume.
 - Is a non-bootable (non-system) diskette in the floppy drive? Remove or replace it with a system diskette and press Ctrl-Alt-Del to restart the system.
- The operating system files may be damaged or missing. Insert the startup disk you created during Windows setup into the floppy drive and press **Ctrl-Alt-Del** to restart the system. This will diagnose your system and make necessary fixes.

Nothing appears on the screen.

The computer's power management system automatic ally blanks the screen to save power. Press any key to turn the display back on.

If pressing a key does not turn the display back on, two things might be the cause:

- The brightness level might be too low. Press Fn→ (inc rease) and Fn→ (dec rease) to adjust the brightness level.
- The display device might be set to an external monitor. Press the display toggle hot key **Fn-F5** to toggle the display back to the computer.

Image is not full-screen.

Make sure that the resolution is set to 1024x768 which the system supports natively. Right-click on your Windows desktop and select Properties to bring up the **Display Properties** dialog box. Then click on the Settings tab to make sure the resolution is set to the appropriate resolution. Resolutions lower than the specified resolution are not full-screen on the computer or on an external monitor.

No audio is heard from the computer.

Check the following:

- The volume may be muted. In Windows, look at the volume control (speaker) ic on on the taskbar. If it is crossed-out, click on the ic on and deselect the Mute option.
- The speakers may be turned off. Press **Fn-F8** to turn the speakers on (this hot key also turns the speakers off).
- The volume level may be too low. In Windows, look at the volume control ic on on the taskbar. You can also use the volume control buttons to adjust the volume. See "Hot keys" on page 15.
- If headphones, earphones or external speakers are connected to the line-out port on the computer's right panel, the internal speakers automatic ally turn off.

I want to eject the optical drive tray without turning on the power. I cannot eject the optical drive tray.

There is a mechanical eject button on the optical drive. Simply insert the tip of a pen or paperclip and push to eject the tray.



The keyboard does not respond.

Try attaching an external keyboard to the PS/2 connector on the computer's rear. If it works, contact your dealer or an authorized service center as the internal keyboard cable may be loose.

I prefer using an external keyboard and mouse, but both have PS/2 connectors and there is only one PS/2 port on the computer.

To connect two PS/2-type devices to the computer, you need to use an optional PS/2 Y-bridge connector.

The infrared port does not work.

Check the following:

- Make sure that the infrared ports of the two devices are facing each other (+/- 15 degrees) a maximum of 1 meter apart.
- Make sure that there is a clear path between the two infrared ports. Nothing should be blocking the ports.
- Make sure that you have the appropriate software running on both devices (for file transfers) or that you have the appropriate drivers (for printing to an infrared printer).
- During the POST, press F2 to access the BIOS Utility and verify that the infrared port is enabled.
- Make sure that both devices are IrDA-compliant.

I want to set up my location to use the internal modem.

To properly use your communic ations software (e.g., HyperTerminal), you need to set up your loc ation:

- 1 Click on Start, Settings, Control Panel.
- 2 Double-click on **Modems**.
- 3 Click on **Dialing Properties** and begin setting up your location.

Refer to the Windows manual.

I get a "Not Enough Space for Allocation" error message from the Sleep Manager program.

This is an error message that may appear when Sleep Manager is creating the Hibernation file. There are several different reasons that may cause this error.

• The size of the free disk space on your hard disk is less than the required size.

For example, if the onboard memory (including video memory) is 64MB, the total free disk space required will be around 64MB. If the total free disk space is less than this, you have to free up space on the hard disk.

• The hard disk has enough free space, but this free space exists as small fragments.

The free disk space that Sleep Manager requires needs to be contiguous. To solve this problem, use tools such as Disk Defragmenter (Windows) to compact these free diskspaces. Then run Sleep Manager again to create the file.

• Disk compression utilities are used.

Sleep Manager can work with most compression software. However, Sleep Manager can only create the space on a host drive. A host drive stores original file information and cannot be compressed. The free space on the host drive is usually very small, so the compression software needs to be run again to enlarge the size of the host (uncompressed) drive for Sleep Manager.
