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### Introduction

# 1

Thank you for purchasing the *Action*tec Digital Media Player. The Digtal Media Player is the simplest way to connect your computer to your home entertainment system, creating a central location to store all of your digital music, movies, and photos. Using your television as a monitor, you can play all of your digital entertainment with just a few clicks of the Player's Remote Control. You can even surf the Web from the comfort of your couch. If you want to organize and instantly access your digital movies, photos, and music, the *Action*tec Digital Media Player is the right product for you.

### **Minimum System Requirements**

- · Television with composite video input
- · Stereo or A/C receiver with RCA audio input
- Computer equipped with 300 Mhz Pentium II or higher (700 Mhz or higher for video playback), TCP/IP installed, and 60 Mb of hard drive space available
- Windows 98 Second Edition (SE), Millennium Edition (Me), 2000, or XP

### **Player Features**

The Player has a series of informational LEDs (lights) on its front panel, and a variety of ports on its rear panel. It is recommended that the user become familiar with these features before installing or setting up the Player.

### **Front Panel**

There are 3 LEDs (light emitting diodes) on the front panel of the Player, as shown in the figure, below.



### Power

The Power LED illuminates when power is supplied to the Player.

### 10/100

The 10/100 LED illuminates when the Player is connected to a computer via an Ethernet cable.

### Link/Act

The Link/Act LED iluminates when the Player is connected via Ethernet cable to a computer. The LED flickers when the connection is active (i.e., data is passing from the computer to the Player).

### **Rear Panel**

The Player has 12 ports on its rear panel, as shown in the figure below.



### **DVI** Port

The DVI (Digital Visual Interface) port is used to connect the Player to a DVI-compatible high-definition television (HDTV).

### Y, Pb, Pr Ports

These three ports are used to connect the Player to monitors or televisions requirring component video input.

### S-Video Port

The S-Video port is used to connect the Player to a television or monitor using an S-Video cable

### COMP Port

The yellow COMP port is used to connect to a television's composite input port using an RCA video cable.

### Audio Out L and R

These two ports (L is red, R is white) are used to connect to the television or stereo audio input ports, using RCA audio cables.

### S/P Dif, Optical Ports

The S/P Dif (Sony/Philips Digital Interface) port is used to connect the Player to a compatible S/P Dif audio receiver. The S/P Dif uses an RCA cable to connect, while the Optical port uses an optical cable.

### Ethernet Port

The Ethernet port is used to connect the Player to a computer or hub/router using a crossover Ethernet cable. A crossover Ethernet cable must be used to connect the Player to a computer. A standard, straight-through Ethernet cable will not connect the Player to a computer.

### **Power Port**

The Power port is used to connect the Player to a standard electrical outlet using the included Power cord.

### Side Panel

On the left side panel of the Player (when viewing from the front) includes a PC Card slot, which is used to connect the wireless PC Card included with the Digital Media Player kit. To install the card, see chapter 2, "Setting up the Player."

## Setting Up the Player



The instructions that follow parallel the steps contained in the *Action*tec Installation Buddy<sup>®</sup>, which provides a visual guide to setting up the Player. It is recommended the user run the Installation Buddy first, before attempting any other procedures.

To use the Player, it must be connected to a television and/or stereo, the wireless connection must be set up, the *Action*tec Media Buddy must be installed, and the computer must be set up to find the media files.

### **Connecting the Player to a Television/Stereo**

The first step in using the Digital Media Player is connecting it to a television and/ or stereo.

**1.** Remove the **Wireless Digital Media Player** from its box and place near or on top of the television.



**2.** Remove the **Power Cord** from its white box.



**3.** Plug the smaller end of the **Power Cord** into the **Power Port** on the back of the Player. The Power Port is on the far right side of the rear panel of the Player.



4. Plug the larger end of the Power Cord into a Power Outlet.



5. Make sure the **Power light** on the front panel of the Player is illuminated.



**6.** Remove the **Black Audio/Video Cable** (with one white, one yellow, and one red RCA plug on both ends of the cable) from the package.



**7.** Plug **one White RCA Plug** into the **White Left** (**"L"**) **Audio Out Port** on the rear panel of the Player.



**8.** Plug the **other White RCA Plug** into the **White Audio In Port** on the television or stereo.



**9.** Plug **one Red RCA Plug** into the **Red Right("R") Audio Out Port** on the rear panel of the Player.



**10.** Plug the other end of the **Red RCA Plug** into the **Red Audio In Port** on the television or stereo.



**11.** Plug **one Yellow RCA Plug** into the **Yellow Video Out Comp Port** on the rear panel of the Player.



**12.** Plug the **other Yellow RCA Plug** into the **Yellow Video In Port** on the television or stereo.



**13.** Remove the **11 Mbps Wireless Card** from the package.



**14.** Remove the cover from the **wireless card slot** on the side of the Player and plug the **Wireless Card** into the slot.



Next, go to "Installing the Actiontec Media Buddy" on the next page.

### Installing the Actiontec Media Buddy

The *Action*tec Media Buddy organizes and displays the media files on the computer, all from one easy interface. To install:

- **1.** Get the **Installation CD** from the Player's package and insert it in the CD-ROM drive of the computer.
- **2.** When the window shown below appears, click the box next to "Install the Actiontec Media Buddy."



3. When the next window appears, click Yes to install the Media Buddy.




4. In the next window, click Next.



**5.** In the next window, read the **License Agreement**. Click in the circle next to "I accept the agreement," then click **Next**.




6. In the next window, click Next.



7. In the next window, click Next.




8. In the next window, click Next.



9. In the next window, click Install.



**11.** Wait until the next window appears, then click **Finish**. The Media Buddy is installed.



**12.** Turn the Player off and on.

If the Player is set up to join an already existing wireless network, go to "Setting Up the Media Buddy" on page 18.

If the Player is set up to wirelessly connect to a single computer only (ad hoc connection), see the computer's documentation to set up the computer to connect.

### **Setting up the Wireless Connection**

After connecting the Player to a television/stereo, the wireless connection must be set up to share the digital media between the computer and the Player. There are two ways to do this, depending on whether or not there is a wireless network already in use. If a wireless network already exists, follow the procedure outlined in "Connecting to an Existing Wireless Network," below. If no wireless network exists, follow the procedure outlined in "Connecting to a Single Computer" on page 16.

### **Connecting to an Existing Wireless Network**

1. Turn on the television and the Player. The following screen appears.



**2.** After a few moments, the "Login" screen appears. Press **Setup** on the remote. The "Options" screen appears.



**3.** Highlight "WIFI Setup" at the top of the screen. The Wireless Setup screen appears.

- 4. Enter the name of the wireless network to which the computer is connected.
- 5. Make sure the box next to "Direct to a computer (ad hoc)" is NOT active (no "x" is visible in the box).
- **6.** Enter any WEP information (type of encryption and encryption key) the network may require in the rest of the text boxes.
- 7. Highlight "Save," then press Enter on the remote.
- **8.** In the "System Reboot" window that appears, click "OK" by pressing Enter on the remote.
- **9.** The Player reboots.

Next, go to "Setting Up the Media Buddy" on page 18.

### **Connecting to a Single Computer**

If no existing wireless network exists, the Player can be connected directly to a wireless-enabled computer to play media files. To do this:

1. Turn on the television and the Player. The following screen should appear.



**2.** After a few moments, the "Login" screen appears. Press **Setup** on the remote. The "Options" screen appears.

**3.** Highlight "WIFI Setup" at the top of the screen. The Wireless Setup screen appears.



- **4.** Enter the name of choice for the wireless network (using the alphanumeric keypad on the remote) in the "SSID" text box.
- **5.** Highlight "Connection" and place an "x" in the box next to "Direct to a computer (ad-hoc)" by pressing the Enter button on the remote.
- **6.** Highlight "Save," then press the Enter button on the remote.
- **7.** In the "System Reboot" window that appears, click "OK" by pressing the Enter button on the remote.
- 8. The Player reboots.

Next, go to "Setting Up the Media Buddy," below.

**Note:** To set up the Player via Ethernet, see Appendix B, "Setting Up the Player via Ethernet," on page 61.


### Setting Up the Media Buddy

After connecting the Player and installing the Media Buddy, the computer must be set up to locate the media files. To do this:

**1.** The **Welcome** window should already appear. If not, click the **Media Buddy icon** on the desktop.



**2.** Click **Video**, and make sure the Media Buddy locates the video files (the default folder is "My Videos" inside the "My Documents" directory). If the video files are in a different folder, see "Redirecting the Media Buddy" on page 20.



**3.** Click **Music**, and make sure the Media Buddy locates the music files (the default folder is "My Music" inside the "My Documents" directory). If the music files are in a different folder, see "Redirecting the Media Buddy" on page 20.

**4.** Click **Photos**. If the digital photos are already in the "My Pictures" folder inside the "My Documents" directory, click Update Photo. If the digital photos are in a different folder, see "Redirecting the Media Buddy" on page 20.



### **Redirecting the Media Buddy**

If the digital media files have been stored in folders other than the My Pictures, My Music, and My Videos folders, the Media Buddy must be redirected to the alternate folders.

**Note:** To temporarily designate a folder the Player can recognize and play files from, a watch folder can be created for video and music files. See "Video" on page 28, or "Music" on page 29 for more information.

To redirect the Buddy to another folder:

1. Make sure the Player, computer, and television have been properly configured, then, on the computer, right-click the Media Server icon in the system tray of the desktop, next to the clock, and select **Manage Media Files** from the list that appears.



**2.** The Media Buddy Home window appears. Click **Edit** from the menu at the top of the window, and select **Preferences** from the list that appears.




**3.** The Preferences window appears. Select the type of media (Music, Video, or Photos) the alternate folder contains from the list on the right side of the window.

4. In the next screen, click Browse.

5. Locate the alternate folder, highlight it, then click Open.



The Media Buddy displays the media files in the selected folder on the Player.

**Note:** To view all videos, music files, or photos through the Media Buddy without redirecting to different folders, all media files must be consolidated in one folder (i.e., videos into one video folder, music files into one music file folder, etc.)

### Using the Media Buddy



The *Action*tec Media Buddy is the software component of the Player that organizes the media files stored on computers. After installing the Media Buddy on the computer, the Media Buddy places an *Action*tec Media Buddy icon in the system tray of the desktop (next to the clock).




### Home

Right-click on the *Action*tec Media Buddy icon, then select **Manage Media Files** to generate the "*Action*tec Media Buddy" Home window.



From the Home window, the user can browse through all the media files currently associated with the Media Buddy (these files are either set up using the Installation Buddy, or by redirecting the Media Buddy to an alternate folder). Click a media type (Video, Music, or Photo) to display the chosen type of media file.




**Note:** The files will be viewed in the same manner in which they are organized in the folder. For example, if all music files are contained in one folder, they will all be displayed as one list in the Media Buddy window, by file title. However, if the media folder is organized into subfolders, the files will be displayed in two panes: on the left, the subfolders (listed by artist, for example), and on the right, the files contained in the chosen subfolder (songs listed by title, for example).

### **Displaying Photos While Playing Music**

To display photos while music is playing:

- 1. From the Home window, select Music.
- **2.** The "Music" window appears. At the bottom of the window, click the down arrow next to the "Photo Albums" text box.



- 3. Select the photo album to be displayed while the music plays.
- **4.** Close the Media Buddy. Photos from the selected photo album will display on the television screen while music plays.

### **Playing Music While Viewing a Slide Show**

To play music while viewing a slide show:

- 1. From the Home window, select Photo.
- **2.** The "Photo" window appears. At the bottom of the window, click the down arrow next to the "Playlist" text box.



**3.** Select the music playlist to be played while viewing the slide show.

**4.** Close the Media Buddy. Photos from the selected music playlist will play while viewing a slide show.

Additionally, the amount of time a photo remains onscreen during a slide show is controlled from the "Photo" window. Next to the "Playlist" list box is another text box. Enter the onscreen duration (in seconds) in the list box, and each photo played during a slide show will stay onscreen for the selected time.

### Menu

The Media Buddy window contains a menu bar with the following items: File, Edit, and Help.

### File

The File menu contains one item, Exit, which closes the Media Buddy. Click **Yes** in the window that appears to close the Buddy.

### Edit

The Edit menu contains two items: Refresh Media Files, and Preference.

### **Refresh Media Files**

When viewing one of the media file types in the Media Buddy window, the user can refresh the file list, if additional files have been added. Select the type of media file (Video, Music, or Photo), select Edit from the menu bar, then select Refresh Media Files from the menu that appears. Any new files added since the last refresh will be added.

### Preference

Selecting Preference from the Edit menu generates the Preference window.

On the left side of the window, there is a list of options (Security, Video, Music, Photo, Language, and Theme).

**Security** - Selecting **Security** in the Preference window allows the user to create a password so that only individuals who know the password can access the Media Player.

To create or change a password:

- **1.** Make sure the box next to "Enable Password" is checked. If not, click in it to activate.
- **2.** Enter the password in the "New Password" text box. The password must be alphanumeric and at least three characters long.

- **3.** Enter the password again in the "Retype Password" text box.
- 4. Click Save.

The next time Media Player is accessed, the user must enter this password

**Video** - Selecting **Video** in the Preference window allows the user to redirect the Buddy to a new video folder, or configure a watch folder.

To redirect the Buddy to a new video folder:

- 1. Click Browse, navigate to the folder, and click Open.
- **2.** Click **OK**. The Buddy will now search for video files in the folder selected in step 1.

Additionally, watch folders can be set up to play videos from the CD drive, without having to redirect the video folder.

*Note*: DVD movies cannot be shown on the Player.

To set up a watch folder :

- 1. Click in the "Enable watch folder" check box.
- **2.** Press +.
- **3.** Browse to the folder or drive to be watched, highlight it, then press **Open**. The file or drive will appear in the "Please Select" list box.
- **4.** In the Video screen on the Player's television interface, the new folder appears. If not, press "Refresh" on the remote.
  - **Note:** If a designated watch folder exists on a removable drive, it will disappear from the watch folder list when the removable drive is disconnected or removed.

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**Music** - Selecting **Music** in the Preference window allows the user to redirect the Buddy to a new music folder, or configure a watch folder.

To redirect the Buddy to a new music folder:

- 1. Click Browse, navigate to the folder, and click Open.
- **2.** Click **OK**. The Buddy will now search for music files in the folder selected in step 1.

Additionally, watch folders can be set up to play music from the CD drive, without having to redirect the video folder.

**Note:** Standard audio CDs cannot be played on the Player. The Player only plays files in the following formats: mp3, Ogg Vorbis, AAC, WMA, and wav. Also, any files encrypted with Digital Rights Management (DRM) software will not play on the Player.

To set up a watch folder:

- 1. Click in the "Enable watch folder" check box.
- **2.** Press +.
- **3.** Browse to the folder or drive to be watched, highlight it, then press **Open**. The file or drive will appear in the "Please Select" list box.
- **4.** In the Music screen on the Player's television interface, the new folder appears. If not, press **Refresh** on the remote.
  - **Note:** If a designated watch folder exists on a removable drive, it will disappear from the watch folder list when the removable drive is disconnected or removed.


**Photo** - Selecting **Photo** in the Preference window allows the user to redirect the Buddy to a new photo folder.


To redirect the Buddy to a new photo folder:

- 1. Click **Browse**, navigate to the folder, and click **Open**.
- **2.** Click **OK**. The Buddy will now search for photo files in the folder selected in step 1.

**Language** - Selecting **Language** in the Preferences window generates the Language pane. From here, the user selects the language the Buddy will use. Currently, only English is supported.



**Theme** - Selecting **Theme** in the Preferences window generates the Theme pane. From here, the user selects the theme (or "skin") the Player's television interface will use. Currently, only the "Blue" theme is supported.



# **Playing Digital Media**



The *Action*tec Wireless Digital Media Player is designed to play media files stored on a computer through the television or stereo to which it is connected. After the Player has been properly connected and set up, the Login screen appears.



From this screen, the user can access all digital media files from a properly configured computer.

### **Remote Control**

To interface with the Player, the included remote control is used.



#### **Power Button**

The red button in the upper left corner is the power button. Pressing this button causes the Player to turn on and off.

## **Alphanumeric Keypad**

This alphanumeric keypad is used to enter numerals or letters while using the Player's television interface. To enter the letter "n" in an active text box onscreen, for example, press the alphanumeric keypad button marked "6mno" three times in succession. The character next to the insertion bar will change from "6" to "m" to "n." After pausing for a moment, the insertion bar will move past the entered character, ready for the next character.

#### **BKSP (Backspace) Button**

The "BKSP" button deletes entries in the active text box, one character at a time.

#### Cap/Num (Capitals/Numerals) Button

The "CAP/NUM" button enters capitalized letters in an active text box (after pressing the button once; "CAP" in the bottom right corner of the television will be highlighted) or numerals only (after pressing the button twice; "NUM" in the bottom right corner of the television screen will be highlighted) using the alphanumeric keyboard. Pressing the button three times returns the alphanumeric keyboard to its default operation (lower case letters, numerals, etc.)

#### **Zoom Button**

The "ZOOM" button changes the view of the video displayed.

#### **Mode Button**

The "MODE" button cycles the Player through the various Video Setting options. See "Video Settings" on page 52 for more information.

#### **Setup Button**

Pressing the "SETUP" button generates the Option screen. See "Option Bar" on page 49 for more information.

#### **Mute Button**

Pressing the MUTE button mutes all audio from the Player.

#### Page Up, Page Down Buttons

When viewing a long file list, use the Page Up and Page Down buttons to quickly scroll through the list.

## **Directional Keypad**

The four Directional keypad buttons are used to navigate around the Player's television interface screens. When an item is highlighted on a screen, press the appropriate direction button to move the highlight to a different option.

#### **Enter Button**

The "ENTER' button activates the highlighted item on the television screen.

#### **Frame Button**

The "FRAME" button activates different frames within the currently active window, and can only be used while surfing the Internet via the Player.

#### **Tab Button**

The "TAB" button moves the cursor laterally (left to right) in the television interface screen, or when surfing the Internet via the Player.

#### Video, Music, Photo, and Internet Buttons

These buttons generate the Video (see page 41), Music (see page 43), Photo (see page 45), and Internet (see page 47) screens, respectively.

#### Action (Prev, Play, Next, Rew, Stop, Fwd) Buttons

These buttons are used, when viewing a video, in much the same way as the buttons on a DVD player. The "Prev" and "Next" buttons move the video to the next/ previous chapter (if applicable), the "Fwd" and "Rew" fast forward and rewind the video.

While viewing photos or playing music, the Prev and Next buttons will cause the next photo to appear, or the next song on the list to begin playing. The "Stop" button causes the song or slide show playing to stop.

#### **URL Button**

The URL Button causes the URL section of the Internet pane to appear. In the URL pane, enter the address in the URL text box to visit a particular Web site.

#### **Home Button**

Pressing the "HOME" button causes the Home screen (see page 41) to appear, unless no computer has been logged into, in which case the Login screen (see page 37) will appear.

#### **Login Button**

Pressing the "LOGIN" button causes the Login screen (see page 37) to appear.

#### **Options Button**

Pressing the "OPTIONS" button causes the Options bar (see page 51) to appear.

## **Login Screen**

When the Login screen appears, a list of previously added computers appears on the television screen.



If the computer icon is gray, the computer is currently disconnected. If it is blue, the computer is connected.

#### **Selecting a Computer**

To select one of the computers, use the direction buttons on the remote to highlight a computer, then press the Enter button on the remote. Another Login screen appears. If a password has been set up, enter it using the alphanumeric buttons on the remote, then press the Tab button on the remote to highlight the green right arrow button on the television screen. Press the Enter button, and the Home screen appears.



#### Adding Another Computer

**Note:** Since the Player automatically finds computers running the Media Buddy on the selected network, adding another computer manually is not recommended.

To add another computer to the Login Screen list:

- **1.** In the Login screen, use the direction keys on the remote to highlight "Add", then click the Enter button.
- **2.** Another Login screen appears. Enter the name of the computer as it will appear in the initial Login screen in the "Name" text box.

- **3.** Enter the IP address of the computer in the "IP" text box.
  - **Note:** Enter the IP address of the of the computer here only if it will not change (i.e., it is not set up to connect via DHCP).
- **4.** If this computer will be connected to the Player every time the Player is turned on, click in the "Always Connect" text box.
- **5.** Use the direction buttons on the remote to highlight the Save button, then click the Enter button on the remote. The computer is added to the Login screen list.

#### **Editing a Computer's Login Profile**

To edit a computer's Login profile:

- **1.** In the Login screen, use the direction keys on the remote to highlight Edit, then click the Enter button.
- **2.** An Edit screen appears. Highlight the computer profile to be edited, then press the Enter button on the remote.



- **3.** Another Edit screen appears. Change the computer's IP address in the IP text box.
- **4.** Use the direction buttons on the remote to highlight the Save button, then click the Enter button on the remote. The computer's profile has been changed.

#### **Deleting a Computer**

To delete a computer on the Login list:

- **1.** In the Login screen, use the direction keys on the remote to highlight Delete, then click the Enter button.
- **2.** Another Login screen appears, with a list of computers. Highlight the box next to the computer's name, then click the Enter button on the remote. An "X" appears in the box.



**3.** Using the direction buttons on the remote, highlight "Delete" and then click the Enter button on the remote. The computer is deleted.

## **Accessing Media Files**

Once a computer has been chosen in the Login screen (see "Selecting a Computer" on page 37), the Home screen appears.



## **Playing Videos**

To play a video:

- **1.** From the Selection screen, press 1 (or Video) on the remote.
- **2.** The Video screen appears. Select a video from the available list by pressing the appropriate number on the numeric keypad on the remote. For instance, if the user wants to play video 3, press 3 on the numeric keypad.



**3.** To view additional lists, page down by pressing the Page Down button on the remote, or navigate (using the direction buttons on the remote) to the number groups at the top right side of the screen (1-9 10-18, etc.), then press the Enter button on the remote to select another list of videos. Select a video from the next list that appears by pressing the appropriate number on the remote's numeric keypad.

While the video is playing, the controls on the bottom of the remote behave similarly to the controls on a DVD player (see "Action Buttons" on page 36).

#### Search for Videos

To search for a particular video:

- **1.** Use the direction buttons on the remote to highlight "Search" at the top of the Video screen, then press Enter on the remote.
- **2.** A Search screen appears. Use the direction keys to highlight the Search text box, then enter the first few letters of the video title.



- 3. Highlight "Search" on the screen, then press Enter on the remote.
- **4.** A list of videos appears. Select a video to play by pressing the appropriate number on the numeric keypad.

## **Playing Music**

To play music files:

- 1. From the Selection screen, press 2 (or Music) on the remote.
- **2.** The Music screen appears. Select a song from the available list by pressing the appropriate number on the numeric keypad on the remote. For instance, if the user wants to play song file 3, press 3 on the numeric keypad.



**3.** To view additional lists, page down by pressing the Page Down button on the remote, or navigate (using the direction buttons on the remote) to the number groups at the top right side of the screen (1-9 10-18, etc.), then press Enter on the remote to select another list of music files. Select a music file from the next list that appears by pressing the appropriate number on the remote's numeric keypad.

While playing a single song (i.e., selecting one song from a list), the "Prev" and "Next" buttons restart the song, while "Stop" stops the song and return the Player to the Music screen. While playing a song from a list (i.e., using the "Play" or "Play Random" options at the top of the screen), the "Prev" and "Next" buttons will play the previous and next songs on the list, respectively.

#### Play Entire List in Order

To play an entire list of music files in alphabetic order:

- 1. Locate a list of music files to be played.
- **2.** Using the direction buttons, navigate to "Play" at the top of the Music screen.
- 3. Press Enter on the remote. The first song on the list plays.

#### Play Entire List Randomly

To play an entire list of song files at random:

- **1.** Locate a list of song files to be played.
- **2.** Using the direction buttons, navigate to "Random" at the top of the Music screen.
- 3. Press Enter on the remote. A random song from the chosen list plays.

#### Search

To search for a particular song file:

- 1. Use the direction buttons on the remote to highlight Search at the top of the Video screen, then press Enter on the remote.
- **2.** A "Search" screen appears. Use the direction keys to highlight the Search text box, then enter the first few letters of the song file title.
- **3.** Highlight Search on the screen, then press Enter on the remote.
- **4.** A list of music files appears. Select a music file to play by pressing the appropriate number on the numeric keypad, or navigate to the additional lists at the upper right of the screen.

#### **Viewing Photos**

To view photos:

- 1. From the Selection screen, press 3 (or Photo) on the remote.
- **2.** The Photo screen appears.



Select a photo or photo collection from the available list by pressing appropriate number on the numeric keypad on the remote. For instance, if the user wants to view photo list 2, press 2 on the remote.

**3.** The selected photo collection appears.



- **4.** To view a photo, press the appropriate number button on the remote, or highlight the photo and press **Enter** on the remote.
- 5. To view additional lists, page down by pressing the Page Down button on the remote while in the Photo screen, or navigate (using the directional buttons on the remote) to the number groups at the top right side of the screen (1-9 10-18, etc.), then press Enter on the remote to select another list of photos. Select a photo from the next list that appears by pressing the appropriate number on the remote's alphanumeric keypad.

While a photo is being displayed, the Previous and Next buttons on the remote cause the previous or next photo in the photo collection to appear.

#### **Play Entire List in Order**

To play an entire list of photo files in order:

- **1.** Locate a list of photos to be displayed.
- **2.** Using the direction buttons, navigate to Play Slides at the top of the Photo screen.
- **3.** Press **Enter** on the remote. The first photo on the list is displayed. After a few seconds, the next photo is displayed.

## **Play Entire List Randomly**

To display an entire list of photos at random:

- **1.** Locate a list of photos to be displayed.
- **2.** Using the direction buttons, navigate to Random Slides at the top of the Photo screen.
- **3.** Press **Enter** on the remote. A random photo from the chosen list is displayed. After few seconds, another photo is displayed

#### **Using the Internet**

To access various Internet services:

- 1. From the Selection screen, press the 4 button on the remote.
- **2.** The Internet screen appears. Select an Internet service from the available list by pressing appropriate number on the numeric keypad on the remote. For instance, to listen to Internet radio, press 4.



#### Web Bookmarks

Pressing 1 on the remote when in the Internet screen generates the Web Bookmarks screen.



Here, the list of bookmarks included in the "Favorites" folder of Internet Explorer running on the computer is displayed. Clicking on a link generates the Web page selected.

#### Web Directory

Pressing 2 on the remote when in the Internet screen generates the Web Directory screen.



Here, the user can visit various popular Internet destinations, including entertainment, shopping, and tech gear Web sites. Simply use the numeric keypad on the remote to navigate.

#### Radio

Pressing 3 on the numeric keypad of the remote when in the Internet screen generates the Internet Radio screen.



Here, the user can visit listen to popular Internet radio stations, in a variety of music genres. Use the alphanumeric keypad on the remote to navigate to the music category of choice, then select a station. To stop listening to a particular

station, press Stop on the remote.

#### News

Pressing 4 on the remote when in the Internet screen generates the Internet News screen.



Here, the user can visit various Internet news Web sites. Simply use the numeric keypad on the remote to navigate to the news Web site of choice.

## **Actiontec Link**

Pressing the "MISC" button, or choosing "Actiontec" in the Home screen, causes the Actiontec Internet link page to open.

## **Options Bar**

Pressing the Options button on the remote generates the Options bar at the bottom of the television screen.



## Web Button



Pressing the Web Button in the Options bar causes the URL bar to appear. Enter a URL address to visit a particular Web site (www.actiontec.com. for example), then press Enter on the remote to visit the Web site.



Pressing the Arrow buttons (Back and Forward) cause the previous screen to appear (left arrow), or, if applicable, the next screen to appear.

X Button



Pressing the "X" button causes the screen currently loading to stop loading.



Pressing the "Reload" button reloads the current screen.





Pressing the "Home" button causes the Home screen to appear.

## Language Button



Pressing the "Language" button allows the user to change the language used by the Player. When the Language button is pressed, a language name will appear in the left corner of the screen. Pressing Enter on the remote selects the language. Pressing the Language button again displays another language name.



Pressing the "Options" button causes the "Options" screen to appear.

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At the top of the Options screen are five links: Options, IP Config, WIFI Setup, Time Setup, and Update ROM.



#### Options

In the Options screen (shown above), which opens automatically when the "Options" button is pressed, has various settings that can be changed by clicking on the menus. After making one or more changes in the Options screen, navigate to the bottom of the screen, highlight "Save," and press Enter on the remote to implement and save the changes made.

**Screen Saver** - Soreen Saver Wait To minutes - To change the time period until the Player's screen saver activates, highlight the Screen Saver list box, then press **Enter** on the remote. A list (1-60) appears. Select the number of minutes, then press **Enter** on the remote. The screen saver will activate after the number of minutes selected.

**Default Language** - Detault rengine - To change the language of the Player's television interface, highlight the Default Language list box, then press **Enter** on the remote. A list of languages appears. Select a language, then press Enter on the remote. The default language of the interface changes to the language selected.

**Internet Security** - Internet Security Issue - To change the Player's type of Internet Security, highlight the Internet Security list box, then press **Enter** on the remote. A list of options appears (SSL2, SSL3, TLSV1/SSL2/SSL3). Select a level of Internet security, then press **Enter** on the remote. The level of Internet security of the Player changes to the level of security selected.

**Note:** It is recommended that the default Internet security setting (SSL2 [Secure Sockets Layer 2]) be left unchanged.

**Video Setting** - Video Sotting Composite/S-Video NTSC - To change the Player's video setting, highlight the Video Setting list box, then press Enter on the remote. A list of settings appears (Composite/S-Video NTSC, Component NTSC, Composite/S-Video PAL, etc.). After consulting the documentation of the television or monitor connected to the Player to find out which video setting to select, highlight it, then press Enter on the remote. The video setting of the Player changes to the setting selected.

**Note:** For most standard televisions, the default setting (Composite/S-Video NTSC) should be left unchanged.

**Video Zoom** - <u>Video Zoom</u> - To change the Player's video zoom, highlight the Video Zoom list box, then press **Enter** on the remote. A list of video zoom settings appears (Fit to screen, Full screen, Actual size). Highlight a video zoom setting, then press **Enter** on the remote. The video zoom of the Player changes to the setting selected. Video zoom works only when a video is playing

**Audio Setting** - Audio Setting Istoreo Output - To change the Player's audio setting, highlight the Audio Setting list box, then press Enter on the remote. A list of settings appears (Stereo Output, AC3 5.1 Output). After consulting the documentation of the audio receiver connected to the Player to find out which audio setting to select, highlight it, then press Enter on the remote. The audio setting of the Player changes to the setting selected.

**Browse Option** - Browser Option R Enable Compact Browser - To enable the Player's compact browser, click in the box next to "Enable Compact Browser" and place an "x" there. The compact browser causes interface elements on the television screen (buttons, etc.) to shrink or move closer together, enabling smaller screens to display more interface elements

Sound Op Alert Sound - To select a sound while typing or navigating in the Player's television interface, or a sound when a system alert occurs, highlight the appropriate Sound Option box and place an "x" there by pressing Enter on the remote. The selected sound will play when the action occurs.

Restore Factory Settings - Restore Factory Settings

- To restore the Player's factory default settings, highlight the "Restore Factory Settings" button and press Enter on the remote. The factory settings will be restored on the Plaver.

**Save/Cancel** - To cause the changes made in the Options screen to activate on the Player, highlight the "Save" button and press Enter on the remote. The changes will be activated. If the user chooses to cancel any changes made in the Options screen before selecting "Save," highlight the "Cancel" button and press Enter on the remote. No changes will be made.

## **IP Config**

Clicking "IP Config" in the "Options" screen causes the "IP Config" screen to appear.



This screen shows the various addresses the Player is using while in its current network setup. Highlighting "Switch to Manual" and pressing Enter on the remote causes the fields to become modifiable.

*Note*: It is recommended that the default IP Config settings be R left unchanged.

#### WiFi Setup

Selecting "WIFI Setup" generates the WiFi Setup screen. For more information concerning the settings in the WIFI Setup screen, see "Setting Up the Wireless Connection" on page 15.

Here, the user enters the wireless information needed to connect the Player to the computer. After making one or more changes in the Options screen, navigate to the bottom of the screen, highlight "Save," and press **Enter** on the remote to implement and save the changes made.

**SSID** - **SSID** - Enter the SSID (Service Set Identifier), or name, of the wireless network to which the Player connects in the "SSID" text box by highlighting the text box, then entering the name using the alphanumeric keypad on the remote.

**Connection**- Connection Direct to a computer (ad-hoc) - To create an ad hoc (computer-to-computer) wireless network, highlight the box next to "Direct to a computer (ad-hoc)" and press Enter on the remote to place an "x" there. When this box is inactive (no "x" appears), the Player is set to join an existing wireless network.



**WEP** - WEP key - To activate WEP (Wired Equivalent Privacy) security on the Player's computer-to-computer network, highlight the box next to either "64-bit" or "128-bit" and press **Enter** on the remote. Then, highlight the "WEP key" text box and enter the hexadecimal key using the alphanumeric keypad on the remote. The computer connecting to the Player must be set up with the same type of WEP and WEP key to communicate wirelessly with it. If joining an existing wireless network that requires WEP security authentication, select the type of WEP and enter the key in the WEP key text box.

**Save/Cancel** - **Bave Cancel** - To cause the changes made in the WIFI Setup screen to activate on the Player, highlight the "Save" button and press **Enter** on the remote. The changes will be activated. If the user chooses to cancel any changes made in the Options screen before selecting "Save," highlight the "Cancel" button and press Enter on the remote. No changes will be made.

**Check Signal Strength** - To check the signal strength of the wireless network, highlight the "Check signal strength" button and press *Enter* on the remote. Signal and noise amounts will appear onscreen. To stop, highlight the "Stop signal strength check" button and press Enter on the remote.

Selecting "Time Setup" generates the Time Setup screen.

Here, the user can change various aspects of the time settings of the Player, including time servers (if the Player is online), time zone, and daylight savings time.

#### Update ROM

Selecting "Update Rom" generates the "Update ROM" screen.



By clicking on the link in the screen and following the subsequent instructions, the user can update the firmware of the Player.

# Troubleshooting and Frequently Asked Questions



This chapter details some troubleshooting strategies, as well as frequently asked questions and their answers.

## How far can I be from a computer or access point and maintain a connection?

The wireless card range depends on the environment. Indoor range is approximately 100 feet or more; outdoor range can reach up to 300 feet.

## How fast is the wireless connection with the Digital Media Player?

The rated speed of the wireless connection under optimal conditions is 11Mbps. This speed does vary, depending on distance from the access point or computer and the amount of attenuation (physical barriers, such as walls, glass, etc.) the wireless signal must go through.

## I'm getting skips and stops while watching movies from my computer using the Digital Media Player. What should I do?

Movies contain a very large amount of data. The speed and power of the computer controls how well you are able to watch movies using the Digital Media Player. If you are having problems, make sure that you close out of all unneeded programs on your computer. Other programs can take up processing time and slow down the movie you're watching.

## What can I connect the Digital Media Player to?

The Digital Media Player can connect wirelessly to a computer or an access point. It can also connect to a router or hub via Ethernet.

## Does the access point provide load-balancing capabilities?

No, the access point is not designed to track the load on the network resources; it is a data transport device only.

#### Will cordless phones interfere with the Digital Media Player?

The 802.11b Wireless Card uses 2.4 GHz frequency. If your cordless phone uses this frequency, problems may occur. Different cordless phones use different frequencies, and generally include a label stating which frequency they use. If you are having problems with interference caused by your cordless phone, try changing the wireless card's channel. This can sometimes clear up interference issues. Any wireless device using the 2.4 GHz frequency can cause wireless interference.

#### Can my wireless signal pass through floors, walls, and glass?

The effect of the physical environment can have varying effects on signal strength and quality. The denser an object (a concrete wall compared to a plaster wall, for example), the greater the interference will be. Concrete or metal-reinforced structures cause a higher degree of wireless signal loss than those made of wood, plaster, or glass.

#### What is WEP?

Wired Equivalent Privacy (WEP) is the standard encryption mode for 802.11b communications.

#### How do I make a HEX-based WEP key?

**64-bit WEP Key** – Composed of 10 alphanumeric characters (0-9, a-f); example: 843c29a562

**128-bit WEP Key** – Composed of 26 alphanumeric characters (0-9, a-f); example: 3c29f2536bef3276d32e364a2c

#### What is the difference between 40-bit and 64-bit encryption?

There really is no difference between the two. They are different terminologies used throughout the industry for the same level of encryption.

# Setting Up the **Player via Ethernet**



While it is recommended that the Player connect wirelessly to another computer to share digital media files, it can also be connected to an existing wired network or computer via Ethernet.



Note: Do not install the wireless PC Card when connecting via Ethernet.

## **Connecting to a Wired Network**

To connect the Player to an existing wired network via Ethernet:

- 1. Plug a standard, straight-through Ethernet cable into the Ethernet port on the rear panel of the Player.
- 2. Plug the other end of the Ethernet cable into an open Ethernet port on a router or hub connected to the wired network.
- 3. Reboot the Player.
- 4. When the Player has rebooted, all computers on the wired network with a Media Buddy properly intstalled and configured will display on the Login page.

## **Connecting to a Single Computer**

To connect the Player to a single computer via Ethernet:

- 1. Plug a crossover Ethernet cable into the Ethernet port on the rear panel of the Player.
- Plug the other end of the crossover Ethernet cable into an Ethernet port on 2. the computer with a properly installed and configured Media Buddy.
- 3. Start up the Player and the computer. After attempting to connect to each other, the process will timeout. At this point, both the Player and computer revert to default connection mode, and locate each other.
- 4. The computer displays in the Login screen of the Player.
