## Important Safety Information

To reduce the risk of fire, electrical shock, and other injuries, keep these safety precautions in mind when installing, using, and maintaining your machine.

- Read all safety and operating instructions before operating the TV receiver.
- Retain the safety and operating instructions for future reference.
- Heed all warnings on the TV receiver and in the operating instructions.
- Follow all operating instructions.
- Unplug the TV receiver from the wall outlet before cleaning, Use a damp cloth, Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners.
- Never add any attachments and/or equipment without approval of the manufacturer. Such additions may cause risk of fire, electric shock, or other personal injury.
- Do not use the TV receiver where contact with or immersion in water is a possibility, such as near bath tubs, sinks, washing machines, swimming pools, etc.

## Familiarizing Yourself with The TV

## Front Panel Buttons

The buttons on the front panel control your TV's basic features, including the on-screen menu. To use the more advanced features, you must use the remote control.

(1) MENU

Press to see an on-screen menu of your TV's features.
(2) VOL $\ldots+$

Press to increase or decrease the volume. Also used to select items on the on-screen menu.

## (3) $\mathrm{CH}^{\top}$ and CH .

Press to change channels. Also press to select various items on the on-screen menu.

## (4) Remote Control Sensor

Aim the remote control towards this spot on the TV.

## 6 STAND BY indicator

Lights up when you turn the power off.

## (0) POWER

Press to turn the TV on and off.

## Side Panell Jacks

You can use the side panel jacks to connect an $\mathrm{A} / \mathrm{V}$ component that is used only occasionally, such as a camcorder or video game. (For information on connecting equipment, see pages $2.1-2.6$.)

(1) AUDIO input jacks

Audio signals from VCRs, DVD players and similar devices.
(2) VIDEO input jack

Video signals from VCRs, DVD players and similar devices.
(3) HEADPHONE jack

Connect a set of external headphones to this jack for private listening.

## Rear Panel Jacks

Use the rear panel jacks to connect an A/V component that will be connected continuously, such as a VCR.

For more information on connecting equipment, see pages 2.1-2.6.


## 1) VIDEO and AUDIO input jacks

Use these jacks to connect a VCR or other video equipment.
(2) VHF/UHF Antenna terminal

Use this terminal to connect an outdoor antenna or cable system.

## Remote Control

You can use the remote control up to about 23 feet from the TV. When using the remote, always point it directly at the TV.
You can also use your remote control to operate your VCR and cable box. See page 4.1 for details.

## (1) POWER

Turns the TV on and off.
(2) Number Buttons

Press to select channels directly on the TV.

## $+100$

Press to select channels over 100 For example, to select channel 121 , press " +100 ", then press " 2 " and " 1 ".

## (3) P.SIZE

Press to change the screen size. Your choices are Normal screen or Zoom screen.

## (4) R.SURF

Press the R.SURF button to automatically return to a preferred channel after a user-preset time delay.

6 SLEEP
Press to select a preset time interval for automatic shutoff.
(6) TURBO

Not available.

## (1) MUTE

Press to temporarily cut off the sound.
(6) CHA and CH (Channel Up/Down) Press CH or CH to change channels. (Also used to highlight selections on the on-screen menus.)
(9) PSTD

Adjust the TV picture by selecting one of the preset factory settings (or select your personal, customized picture settings).

(10) TV

Press to use your remote control to operate your TV.

## VCR

Press to use your remote control to operate your VCR.

CABLE
Press to use your remote control to operate a cable box.

## SET

Use this button when you are setting up your remote control to operate your VCR or cable box.
(1) PRE-CH

Tunes to the previous channel.
(13) MTS (Multichannel Television Stereo)
Press to choose stereo, mono or Separate Audio Program (SAP broadcast)

## (B) DISPLAY

Press to see the time, channel, etc., on-screen. Also press to exit (quit) the menu system.
(4) VOL -, VOL +

Press to increase or decrease the volume. (Also used to make selections on the on-screen menus.)
(15) MENU

Displays the main on-screen menu.
(16) TV/VIDEO

Press to display all of the available video sources (i.e., Antenna/cable, VCR).

## Remote Control

## (17) VCR Controls

- REW (Rewind)

Press to rewind a tape in your VCR.

## - STOP

Press this button to stop a tape during play, record, rewind or fast forward. If the button is pressed during Full-Automatic play, the function will be cancelled.

- PLAY

Press the PLAY button to play back prerecorded tapes.

## - F.F

Press to fast forward the tape in your VCR.

- PAUSE

Press to pause your VCR's tape.


## (13) PIP Controls (Not available)

## SWAP

Exchanges the video signal that is currently displayed on the main screen with the signal in the PIP window.

## TV/VIDEO

Press to select one of the available signal sources for the PIP window.

## PIP/SIZE

Press this button to control the PIP window. Press repeatedly to cycle through this sequence: PIP ON with large window, PIP ON with small window, and PIP OFF.

# Ohapter Two 

## Connecting VHF and UHF Antennas

If your antenna has a set of leads that look like this, see "Antennas with 300-ohm Flat Twin Leads," below.


If your antenna has one lead that looks like this, see "Antennas with 75 -ohm
Round Leads," on page 2.2.


If you have two antennas, see "Separate
VHF and UHF Antennas," on page 2.2.

## Antennas with 300-ohm Flat Twin Leads

If you are using an off-air antenna (such as a roof antenna or "rabbit ears") that has 300 -ohm twin flat leads, follow the directions below.

## 1

Place the wires from the twin leads under the screws on the $300-75$ ohm adaptor (not supplied) Use a screwdriver to tighten the screws.

## 2

Plug the adaptor into the VHF/UHF terminal on the bottom of the back panel

## Antennas with 75 -ohm Round Leads

## 1

Plug the antenna lead into the VHF/UHF terminal on the bottom of the back panel.


## Separate VHF and UHF Antennas

If you have two separate antennas for your TV (one VHF and one UHF), you must combine the two antenna signals before connecting the antennas to the TV. This procedure requires a an optional combiner-adaptor (available at most electronics shops).

## 1

Connect both antenna leads to the combiner.


## 2

Plug the combiner into the VHF/UHF terminal on the bottom of the rear panel.


## Connecting Cable TV

To connect to a cable TV system, follow the instructions below.

## Cable without a Cable Box

## 1

Plug the incoming cable into the VHF/UHF antenna terminal on back of the TV,


Because this TV is cable-ready, you do not need a cable box to view unscrambled cable channels.

## Connecting to a Cable Box that Descrambles All Channels

## 1

Find the cable that is connected to the ANTENNA OUT terminal on your cable box.


This terminal might be labeled "ANT OUT," "VHF OUT," or simply, "OUT."

## 2

Connect the other end of this cable to the VHF/UHF antenna terminal on the back of the TV.


## Connecting to a Cable Box that Descrambles Some Channels

If your cable box descrambles only some channels (such as premium channels), follow the instructions below. You will need a two-way splitter, an RF (A/B) switch, and four lengths of coaxial cable. (These items are available at most electronics stores.)

## 1

Find and disconnect the cable that is connected to the ANTENNA IN terminal on your cable box.

## 2

Connect this cable to a two-way splitter


## 3

Connect a coaxial cable between an OUTPUT ter minal on the splitter and the IN terminal on the cable box.


4 This terminal might be labeled "ANT IN," "VHF IN," or simply, "IN."

## 4

Connect a coaxial cable between the ANTENNA OUT terminal on the cable box and the $B$ - IN terminal on the $A / B$ switch.


## 5

Connect another cable
between the other OUT terminal on the splitter and the A-IN terminal on the RF (A/B) switch.


O -
Connect the last coaxial cable between the OUT terminal on the RF (A/B) switch and the VHF/UHF terminal on the rear of the TV.


After you've made this connection, set the A B switch to the " " " position for normal viewing. Set the $A / B$ switch to the " $B$ " position to view scrambled channels. (When you set the A/B switch to "B," you will need to tune your TV to the cable box's output channel, which is usually channel 3 or 4.)

## Installation

## Connecting a VCR

These instructions assume that you have already connected your TV to an antenna or a cable TV system (according to the instructions on pages 2.1-2.4). Skip step 1 if you have not yet connected to an antenna or a cable system.

## 1

Unplug the cable or antenna from the back of the TV.


## 2

Connect the cable or antenna to the ANTENNA IN terminal on the back of the VCR.


## 3

Connect a coaxial cable between the ANTENNA OUT terminal on the VCR and the antenna terminal on the TV.


A coaxial cable is usually included with a VCR. (If not, check your local electronics store).

## 4

Connect a set of audio cables between the AUDIO OUT jacks on the VCR and the AUDIO jacks on the TV.


Follow the instructions in "Viewing a VCR or Camcorder Tape" to view your VCR tape.

## Installation

## Connecting a Camcorder

The side panel jacks on your TV make it easy to connect a camcorder to your TV.
They allow you to view the camcorder tapes without using a VCR. (Also see "Viewing a VCR or Camcorder Tape" on page 3.11)

## 1

Locate the AN output jacks on the camcorder. They are usually found on the side or back of the camcorder.


## 3

Connect a video cable between the VIDEO OUTPUT jack on the camcorder and the VIDEO terminal on the side of the


The audio-video cables shown here are usually included with a Camcorder. (If not, check your local electronics store.)

## Installing Batteries in the Remote Control

## 1

Slide the cover out completely.


## 2

Install two AA size batteries.


## 3

Replace the cover:


* Make sure to match the " + " and "--" ends of the batteries with the diagram inside the compartment.

Remove the batteries and store them in a cool, dry place if you won't be using the remote control for a long time.

The remote control can be used up to about 23 feet from the TV.
(Assuming typical TV usage, the batteries last for about one year.)

## Turning the TV On and Off

Press the POWER button on the remote control.
You can also use the POWER button on the front panel.

## Viewing the Menus and On-Screen Displays

## Viewing the Menus

## 1

With the power on, press the MENU button.

The main menu appears on the screen. Its left side has four icons: Picture, Sound, Channel, and Function.


- The on-screen menus disappear from the screen after about thirty seconds.


## 2

Use the $\mathrm{CH} A$ and CH buttons to highlight one of the 4 icons. Then press the $V O L+$ button to access the icon's sub-menu. Press the MENU button to exit.

- You can also use the MENU, CHANNEL, and VOLUME buttons on the control panel of the TV to make selections.


## Viewing the Display

## 1

Press the DISPLAY button on the remote control.

The on-screen display shows any or all of the following: Active channel, Audio source and the time.
 MTS
Signal : Mtereo
: Mono

The on-screen displays disappear after about twelve seconds.

When Closed Caption has been set, the icon( $\triangle C$ ) will appear by pressing the Display button.

## Operation

## Selecting a Menu Language

## 1

Press MENU to display the menu.

Press CH Wree times to select "Function", then press the VOL + button.


## 2

Press VOL + to select the appropriate language: English, Spanish, or French.


## 3 <br> Press MENU twice to exit.

## Memorizing the Channels

Your TV can memorize and store all of the available channels for both "off-air" (antenna) and cable channels. After the available channels are memorized, use the CH and CH buttons to scan through the channels. This eliminates the need to change channels by entering the channel digits. There are three steps for memorizing channels: selecting a broadcast source, memorizing the channels (automatic) and adding and deleting channels (manual).

## Selecting the Video Signal-source

Before your television can begin memorizing the available channels, you must specify the type of signal source that is connected to the TV (i.e., an antenna or a cable system).


## 2

Repeatedly press VOL + to cycle through these choices:
ANT (antenna)
STD, HRC or IRC (all cable TV).


Note: STD, HRC and IRC identify various types of cable TV systems. Contact your local cable company to identify the type of cable system that exists in your particular area.

At this point the signal source has been selected. Proceed to "Storing Channels in Memory" (next page).


## Operation

## Storing Channels in Memory (Automatic Method)

## 1

First, select the correct signal source (ANT, STD, HRC, IRC). See steps $1-3$ on previous page.

Press the MENU button, then press the CH but
 ton twice to select
"Channel," then press the VOL + button.

## 2

Press the CH button to select "Auto program".


## 3

Press the VOL + button. The TV will begin memorizing all of the available channels.


The TV automatically cycles through all of the available channels and stores them in memory. This takes about one to two minutes. Press the MENU button at any time to interrupt the memorization process and return to the Channel menu.

## 4

After all the available channels are stored, the Auto program menu reappears. Press the MENU button twice to exit.

## Adding and Erasing Channels (Manual Method)

## 1

Press the MENU button. Press the CH button twice to select "Channel", then press the VOL + button.


## 2

Press the $\mathrm{CH} /$ or CH button to select
"Add/Erase"
Press the VOL + button.


## 3

Press the VOL $-1+$ or num ber buttons to select the channel you want to add or erase


## 4

Press the CH A or CH button to select "Select"

Press the VOL + or VOLbutton to select "Added" or "Erased"

Press the MENU button three times to exit.

## Changing Channels

## Using the Channel Buttons

## 1 <br> Press the CH - or CH button to change channels.

When you press CH or CH , the TV changes channels in sequence. You will see all the channels that the TV has memorized. (The TV must have memorized at least three channels.) You will not see chanmels that were either erased or not memorized.

## Directly Accessing Channels

Use the number buttons to quickly tune to any channel.

## 1

Press the number buttons to go directly to a channel.
For example, to select channel 27, press " 2 , then " 7 ".
The TV will change channels when you press the second number.

When you use the number buttons, you can directly select channels that were either erased or not memorized.
To select a channel over 100 , press the +100 button. (For channel 122 , press " +100 ," then " 2 ," then "2.")
To change to single-digit channels $(0-9)$ faster, press " 0 " before the single digit. (For channel " 4 ," press "0," then " 4 .")

## Using the PRE-CH Button to select the Previous Channel

## 1

Press the PRE-CH button.
The TV will switch to the last channel viewed.

- To quickly switch between two channels that are far apart, tune to one channel, then use the number button to select the second channel. Then, use the PRE-CH button to quickly alternate between them.


## Adjusting the Volume

Press the VOL + or VOL- button to increase or decrease the volume.

## Using Mute

At any time, you can temporarily cut off the sound using the Mute button.

## 1

Press the MUTE button and the sound cuts off. The word "Mute" will appear in the lower-left corner of the screen.

## 2

To turn mute off, press the MUTE button again, or simply press either the VOL - or VOL + button.

## Setting the Clock

## 1

Press the MENU button to display the on-screen menu.

Press the CH button
three times to select
"Function".


## 2

Press the CH button to select the "Time" menu,

Press the VOL + button: The Time menu will appear on the screen, and "Clock" will be selected.


## 3

Press the VOL + button again the hours digits will be selected). Press the CH or CH button repeatedly until the correct hour appears,

After the hour is entered, press the VOL + button, (at this point the minutes digits will be selected),

(When selecting the hours, be sure to select the proper time of day (AM or PM).

You can change the hours by pressing $\mathrm{CH} A$ or CH repeatedly (or by holding down either of these buttons).

Press the CH - or CH
button to select the correct minutes.

After selecting the correct minutes, press the VOL + button.


Press the MENU button
three times to exit.

## Customizing the Picture

You can use the on-screen menus to change the contrast, brightness, tint, color, and sharpness according to personal preference. (Alternatively, you can use one of the "automatic" settings. See next page.)

## 1

Press the MENU button to display the menu.


2
Press the VOL - or VOL + button repeatedly, until the word " Custom" is selected. (When Custom is highlighted, the word "Adjust" will appear on the screen.)


3
Press the CH button to select "Adjust", then press the VOL + button The words Color Tone Contrast, Brightness, Sharpness, Color, and Tint will appear on the screen.) Press the CH or CH :
 button to select a particular item.


After adjusting an item, the gauge will automatically disappear (after about 5 seconds).

## Using Automatic Picture Settings

Your TV has three automatic picture settings ("Standard", "Natural", and "Mild") that are preset at the factory. You can activate either Standard, Natural or Mild by making a selection from the menu. Or, you can select "Custom" which automatically recalls your personalized picture settings.

## 1

Press the MENU button to display the menu.


## 2

Press the VOL - or VOL + button to select the "Standard," "Natural," "Mild, or " Custom" picture setting.


- Choose Standard for the standard factory settings.
- Natural: Optimal indoor screen condition.
- Choose Mild ("Mild Contrast") when viewing the TV in low light, or when playing video games.
- Choose Custom if you want to adjust the settings according to personal preference (see "Customizing the Picture, page 3.8).


## Operation

## Using Automatic Sound Settings

Your TV has four automatic sound settings ("Standard," "Music," "Movie," and "Speech") that are preset at the factory. You can activate any of them by making a selection from the on-screen menu.

## 1

Press the MENU button to display the menu.:

Press the CH button to select the "Sound" menu.


## 2 <br> Press the VOL - or VOL + button repeatedly to select the "Standard," "Music ${ }^{2}$ " Movie," or "Speech" sound settings.



- Choose Standard for the standard factory settings.
- Choose Music when watching music videos or concerts.
- Choose Movies when watching movies.
- Choose Speech when watching a show that is mostly dialogue (i.e., news).


## Operation

## Viewing a VCR or Camcorder Tape

You must select the appropriate mode in order to view the VCR or Camcorder signal on the TV.

## 1

Press the MENU button to display the menu.

Press the CH button twice to select
"Channel"; then press the VOL + button.


## 2

Press the CH button twice to select "TV/AV"


Quick way to view the external signal: Simply press the TV/VIDEO button on the remote control.

## 3

Press the VOL + or VOLbutton.
You will switch between viewing the signals coming from equipment con nected to the TV's AN jacks, and the TV signal.


## 4

Press the MENU button twice to exit


## Chapter Four

Special Features

## Customizing Your Remote Control

Your TV comes equipped with a "universal" remote control. In addition to controlling the TV, the universal remote can also operate a VCR and a cable box (even if your VCR and cable box are made by manufacturers other than Curtis Mathes).

## Setting Up Your Remote Control to Operate Your VCR

1
Turn off your VCR:


## 2

On your Curtis Mathes remote control, press SET.

## 3 <br> Press the VCR button on the top right of your remote control.

## 4

Enter both digits of the VCR code listed on the next page for your brand of VCR.

## 5

Press the POWER button on the remote control. Your VCR should turn on. If your VCR turns on, your remote control is now set correctly.

## 6

Once your remote control is set up, press the VCR button any time you want to use the remote to operate your VCR.

4 The remote control has three "modes": "TV," "VCR", and "Cable".
Press the "VCR" button to switch the remote control to the "VCR" mode.

Make sure you enter both digits of the code, even if the first digit is a " 0 ." If more than one code is listed, try the first one.

If your VCR does not turn on, repeat steps 2,3 , and 4 , but try one of the other codes listed for the brand of your particular VCR.

When your remote control is in the "VCR" mode, the volume buttons still control your TV's volume.

Troubleshooting

If the TV seems to have a problem, first try this list of possible problems and solutions. If none of these troubleshooting tips apply, then call your nearest Curtis Mathes authorized service center.

## Cleaning and Maintaining Your TV

With proper care, your TV unit will give you many years of service. Please follow these guidelines to get the maximum performance from your TV.

## Placement

- Do not place the TV near extremely hot, cold, humid or dusty places.
- Do not place the TV near appliances with electric motors that create magnetic fields, such as vacuum cleaners.

- Place the TV in a vertical position only.
