
Chapter 1: Setting Up

Introduction

Welcome to Dazzle™ Universal TV Photo Show, a simple-to-use product that brings your digital photos to your living room to share with family and friends.

In just minutes, you can go from snapping a photo to viewing it full screen on your TV.

And for more versatility, you can also connect the unit to your computer as a removable drive. Once the images are on your computer, you can print, e-


Setting up Universal TV Photo Show

The package includes the following components:

- Universal TV Photo Show hardware unit
- Power supply
- Video cable
- Remote control
- 2 AA batteries for remote control
- Universal TV Photo Show User's Guide

Setting up is quick and easy – just plug in the connections and you're ready to go. The rest of this chapter details setting up to view photos on your TV. See Chapter 5 for instructions on using it with your computer.

Here is an illustration of the complete connections required. We'll go through each step individually with more detailed instructions on the following pages.



Step 1: Install the remote's batteries

The remote control requires two AA batteries (included).

- 1. Slide open the battery compartment cover on the back of the remote.
- 2. Insert two new batteries, making sure the +/- electrodes are facing the proper direction (see the diagram inside the battery compartment).
- 3. Slide the battery compartment cover back, clicking it shut.

Note: When you use the remote control, remember to point it at the front of the Universal TV Photo Show unit, not at the TV. It's the unit itself that signals the commands to the TV.

Step 2: Connect the Universal TV Photo Show to your TV

Plug one end of the video cable into the yellow VIDEO IN connector on the front or back of your television, then plug the other end into the yellow TV OUT connector on the back of the Universal TV Photo Show.




Note: Some older TVs do not have RCA Video In connectors. They use coaxial cable instead (you'll know that you have one if the video cable plug doesn't fit).

In that case, you will need to connect through an RF modulator (not included). You can purchase an RF modulator and cable from your local electronics store.

Follow the instructions included with the RF modulator to connect it to your TV. Then plug one end of the video cable into the yellow VIDEO IN connector on the RF modulator, and plug the other end into the TV OUT connector on the back of the Universal TV Photo Show. Set your TV to the channel that you set the RF modulator (usually 3 or 4).

Step 3: Connect the power supply

Connect the power cable to the Universal TV Photo Show power connector (labeled 6V) and then plug the AC adapter into an electric outlet.



Step 4: Select the setting

Check the NTSC/PAL switch on the back of the Universal TV Photo Show unit, to make sure it is correct.

In Japan, the United States and Canada, the switch should be set to NTSC. In China and Europe, it should be set to PAL.




Step 5: Insert your memory card

After you've taken photos with your digital camera, you need to remove the memory card according to your camera's instructions. Universal TV Photo Show works with SmartMediaTM (3.3V only), CompactFlashTM, MicrodriveTM, Secure DigitalTM, Memory StickTM and MultimediaTM (MMC) cards.

It's important that you insert your card correctly into the unit, so that you do not damage your card or the photos that are on it.



 There are two memory card slots on the front of the unit. Each type of memory card has a specific way that it needs to go into the slot so that the images can be read correctly. Position the card in the correct direction:



2. Then slide the card all the way into the appropriate slot (it will click into place). You can only use one memory card at a time.

Note: The slot is designed to accept the card only if you insert it in the correct direction. If the card does not slide in easily, check that you are positioning it properly – do not force it into the slot or you will cause damage to the card and lose your photos.

Step 6: Turn on the Universal TV Photo Show

On the side of the unit:

• Slide the POWER switch to ON. Check that the green light on the front of the unit comes on, ensuring that it is receiving power.



Step 7: Set up your TV

- 1. Turn on your TV.
- Set your TV to the appropriate video input source. Note that television
 manufacturers handle this differently, so there are several options. You will
 know that you have set it up correctly when your photos begin to appear on
 the screen.

You can check the manual that came with your TV for detailed information, or:

- Your TV or TV's remote control may have a TV/VCR, TV/VIDEO, SOURCE or INPUT button that changes the video input. Press that button to switch between the available video inputs. If your remote has more than one of these buttons, try them all.
- If you don't have these buttons, your TV may have a channel called LINE (frequently found before Channel 2). Click through your TV's channels until you find it.
- Universal TV Photo Show then displays an automatic slide show of your photos.

Turning off Universal TV Photo Show

If you are done with unit for the moment, but expect to use it again soon, press the **Power** button on the remote control, leaving everything else connected. When you are ready to use it again, press the **Power** button and it will start.

If you are finished using the unit for some time, press the **Power** button on the remote to turn it off and then slide the switch on the side of the unit to OFF. You can then safely disconnect it and pull out the memory card. If you pull the card out unexpectedly, you risk damaging your card and losing the photos on it.

Note: Remove the memory card from the unit when not in use or when you are transporting it.

Changing the language


The pop-up menus and messages in Universal TV Photo Show are available in several languages. You can change to a different language at any time.

To change the language:

- Press the **Option** button on the remote control.
- The following menu appears. Press the down arrow to move the arrow beside the Setup option and press OK to select it.



- On the Setup menu that appears, press OK to choose Select Language.
- A Select Language screen appears showing your language options.
 Use the arrows to move the arrow beside the language you prefer.
 Then press OK.
- This returns you to the setup menu, which will now be in your chosen language. Select the Close Menu option and press OK to return to your photos.



Chapter 2: Viewing Your Photos

Sit back in your favorite chair and get ready to control your own TV slide show of your photos.

All you need to navigate is the remote control included with Universal TV Photo Show. Notice how the remote has clearly identified buttons that let you get to a task quickly.



Note: Remember to point the remote at

the front of the unit, not at the TV.

It's the unit itself that signals the commands.

When you start up the unit, you will see your own photos automatically appearing in a slide show. This slide show is just one way to view your photos. You can also use the **Thumbnails** button to display several smaller versions of your photos at once for easy review and selection.

And as you will see in the next chapter, you can also work with your photos to enhance their viewing. Rotate a photo, zoom in or pan to see the action more clearly, or move or hide photos to customize your own slide show.

Viewing a slide show


In the slide show, Universal TV Photo Show automatically displays each photo full screen in sequence, beginning with the first photo on your memory card or the one that you select. Each slide dissolves with a special effect that occurs randomly.

Although each photo appears on your screen automatically, you can still control the pace by pressing the and buttons. You can also pause by pressing . An icon then appears in the lower right corner of the screen to remind you that you have paused. Press again when you are ready to restart the show.

When it reaches the end, the slide show will start over so that you can show a continuous loop of your photos.



- The screen on the right appears. Select the Set Slide Time option and press OK.
- Choose the amount of time that you'd like each photo to stay on the screen during the automatic slide show. Press **OK**.
- 5. Select the Close Menu option and press **OK** to leave the setup menu.



Viewing the photos on your card

Sometimes it is easier to work with or review your photos if you can see several of them at one time. This is possible through the thumbnail view, in which your photos appear on the screen in a smaller version, called thumbnails. The screen displays up to 12 of your photos at once.

This allows you to quickly scan the photos on your memory card to choose one to view full size, manipulate, move or delete.

To view thumbnail images:

 Press the Thumbnails button. The following screen appears, displaying the first 12 photos on the card.

Notice that a white border frames one photo in the set; this is the photo you last viewed.

Use the arrow buttons to move that border until it frames the photo that you want to select.



If there are more than 12 photos on your card, you can use the arrow buttons to scroll to more photos or you can press or we to see the next or previous set of 12.

- Press **OK** when the white border frames the photo you want to view or work with.
- 3. The photo appears full screen on your TV. You now have several options:
 - Continue to view your photos one by one in full size by pressing and
 This is an easy way to control a slide show.
 - View your photos in an automatic slide show by pressing ...
 - Work with your photo as explained in the following chapter.
 - Return to the thumbnail view to choose another photo by pressing Thumbnails.

Videotaping a slide show

In addition to showing your photos on your TV, you can also videotape that showing. Now you can share your photos with family and friends by giving them a videotape copy that they, in turn, can show on their own television. This gives you another media form in which to store your digital memories.

To videotape a slide show:

- 1. Connect your VCR to your TV as usual.
- To add Universal TV Photo Show, plug one end of the video cable to the yellow VIDEO IN connector on the front or back of your VCR, then plug the other end to the TV OUT connector on the back of the Universal TV Photo Show unit.

Note: Some older VCRs do not have RCA VIDEO IN connectors. They use coaxial cable instead (you'll know that you have one if the video cable plug doesn't fit).

In that case, you will need to connect through an RF modulator (not included). You can purchase an RF modulator and cable

from your local electronics store.

Follow the instructions included with the RF modulator to connect it to your VCR. Then plug one end of the video cable to the yellow VIDEO IN connector on the RF modulator, and plug the other end to the TV OUT connector on the back of the Universal TV Photo Show unit. Set your TV to the channel that you set the RF modulator (usually 3 or 4).

- 3. Set your VCR to record.
- Watch your slide show on the TV, according to the instructions in the "Viewing a slide show" section of this chapter.

Chapter 3: Working with Your Photos

Once you can view your photos on your TV, you may find yourself wanting to do more with them. Universal TV Photo Show allows you to be more creative with your photos. You can zoom in to see the action more closely. Then pan across the photo to change the center of interest or leave out unnecessary details on the edges. Rotate a photo if the world seems the wrong-way round.

You can also rearrange the order in which the photos appear by moving or hiding certain ones. You can even delete a photo entirely.

And if your photo captured that annoying red-eye from the flash, you can correct that too.

Rotating a photo

You can rotate your photo in 90-degree increments. This is especially helpful for vertical photos that you took by turning your camera sideways. You can rotate a photo either when viewing it in thumbnails or full size.

When you rotate, the change does not affect your original photo. The change will appear in your slide shows and when showing thumbnails, but if you use the photo on your computer, you will have the original.

To rotate the photo, select the photo that you want to rotate, then press \bigcirc or \bigcirc to turn it 90 degrees. Continue to press these buttons until the photo is in the position you want.







Zooming/Panning a photo

For a close-up view of the action or to cut out annoying details around the edges, you can use the 9 button, making the subject appear to be closer.

Each time that you press , a portion of the photo becomes larger. You can press it several times to get to the size that you want. Of course, you can likewise zoom out . You can zoom from 0.5x to 16x.

Note: Zoom affects photo quality. As you zoom in more and more, the photo will appear to be blurrier on your TV screen. However, this does not affect your original photo on your memory card.

When you have zoomed in on a photo, part of it is obviously not showing on the screen. You can then use the arrow buttons to move the photo (pan across it) so that you center the action on the screen.

When you zoom or pan, the change does not affect your original photo. The change will appear in your slide shows and when showing thumbnails, but if you use the photo on your computer, you will have the original.

You can do this either when viewing the photo in thumbnail or full size on the screen.

To zoom and pan:

- 1. Select the photo so that you are viewing it full size on the screen.
- 2. Press the **P** and **S** buttons to zoom.
- 3. When zoomed in, you can press the arrows to pan in that direction.

Note: You cannot zoom or pan photos that are hidden. To work with a hidden photo, you must first select and unhide it (see the Hiding a photo section in this chapter).

Correcting red-eye in a photo

Not all photos are perfect. One of the most common disappointments is to see your friends and family suddenly develop red eyes from the reflection of the flash in your photos.

Now you can correct that red-eye reflection if it occurs. The process is similar to adding a colored contact lens over the problem eye.

Note:

Universal TV Photo Show makes this correction on a copy of your original photo. When you view the photo, the corrected version will appear. But you can access both the corrected and original files on a computer if needed.

To correct red-eye in a photo:

- Select the photo you want to correct, either full screen or from the thumbnails.
- 2. Press the **Red-Eye** button.
- Your photo appears with an arrow added in the center for you to use as a pointer.

To do the necessary detail work of correcting an eye image, you need to focus in on that area.

Use the arrow buttons to move the arrow so that it points at the eye you want to correct first. Then press **OK**.



4. As in the screen shown here, the photo reappears, zoomed in to that area, with a corrective eye positioned over the eye that you pointed at.




You then need to fine-tune that correction by resizing, positioning and coloring that eye image so that it covers the red-eye image. This is easy to do:

• +/- to Size Eye: Begin by pressing 🔊 or 🙎 to make the eye the same size as the original that is underneath.

- Arrows to position eye: Then use the arrows to move the eye so that it
 covers the original eye.
- [Option] to change eye color: Now you can match the color of the iris
 (the part of the eye that gives it its color) with the one in your photo.
 Press Option to see the following choices.

Use the arrows to select the iris color to use. Press **OK** when you have selected your choice and the color will change on the photo. If it doesn't seem quite right, try another until it matches the color in the corresponding eye.



- When you have finished making your changes, as seen here, press **OK**. (If you want to leave the red-eye correction process without saving your changes, you can press Cancel.)
- 6. A menu then appears with choices for how you want to continue. You can preview how the changes will look in the final photo, continue working or finish. Use the arrows to position the arrow by your choice and press **OK**.



- 7. When you have finished with one eye, go on to the other. Universal TV Photo Show helps by using the same size and color eye as you specified in the first one. You just need to position and fine-tune it.
- 8. When you are done, choose the option to save your corrections. Your photo reappears in its original size without the red-eye.

Hiding a photo

You may want to customize your slide show or photo viewing by showing only certain photos. Yet you might want to keep the other photos on your card for future use. The answer is to hide them until you once again want them available for viewing. When you hide a photo, the slide show will skip over it.

To hide a photo:

1. Select the photo that you want to hide, either through the thumbnails or viewing full size on the screen.

- 2. Press the **Hide** button.
- In the thumbnail view, the photo becomes dim and an icon of the button appears below it. In full view, the photo also dims and then immediately skips to the next available and unhidden photo.




4. To later reveal that photo, select it once again from the Thumbnail View screen and press **Hide**.

You can also easily hide or unhide all of your photos at once. This can be helpful if you are ready to design a new slide show - you can start fresh by

unhiding all the photos and then choosing which to hide. Alternatively, you might find it easier to hide everything and then select which photos should be displayed while the others remain hidden.

To hide or unhide all photos:

- 1. Press the **Option** button.
- The box on the right appears. Use the arrow buttons to position the arrow beside the Hide All or Unhide All option and press OK.



Moving a photo

To create a customized slide show, you may want to rearrange the order in which photos appear.

To move a photo:

- 1. Select the photo that you want to move, either through the thumbnails or viewing full size on the screen.
- 2. Press the Move button.
- 3. This screen then appears for you to select a new location for that photo.
- Use the arrows to position the "Move Here" mark at the desired new location. Press OK.
- The photo moves to the spot to the right of the "Move Here" marker. You can then move another photo or press Cancel if you are done.




Deleting a photo

You can delete a photo from your memory card. Once you have done so, it is permanently gone, so be sure.

To delete a photo:

- Select the photo to delete from either the thumbnails or when viewing it full size.
- 2. Press the **Delete** button.
- You have one more chance to keep your photo. This screen appears, showing the photo that you chose, to make sure it is the one you want to delete.




4. To keep your photo, press the **Cancel** button. To delete it, press the arrow button to select "Delete Photo." Then press **OK**.

Viewing information about a photo


Detailed information is available about each photo, including the file name, creation date and time, file size, resolution and directory.

To view photo information:

- Select the photo you want information on, either full screen or from the thumbnails
- 2. Press the **Option** button.
- The box on the right appears. Press OK when the arrow is beside the Photo Info option.



4. The following screen appears with information about the photo you selected.



5. Press Cancel to leave the photo info screen.

Chapter 4: Working with Your Memory Card

Universal TV Photo Show works with six different types of memory cards. This chapter explains the basics of changing and removing your card, as well as more advanced topics such as formatting a memory card and reclaiming space on it so that you can take more photos.

Changing/Removing your card

This option allows you to insert and work with a different memory card. You should also choose this option whenever you are leaving the unit and need to remove your memory card.

Note: If you unexpectedly pull out the memory card, you risk damaging the card and losing some of your photos.

To change your card:

- 1. Press the Change Card button.
- 2. A message appears, telling you that it is safe to remove your memory card and replace it with a new one.
- 3. When you do so, Universal TV Photo Show starts up again, displaying the photos on that card.

Formatting your memory card

Usually memory cards are already formatted when you buy them. But if you do need to format one, you can do so with this option (except for Memory Stick, see page 4-5).

You can also reuse a memory card that is full by formatting it. This erases all photos from the card.

Note: This process will permanently delete all of the photos or files that are on the card, including read-only ones. Make sure that you are formatting the right card! If you're not sure, check the contents of the card before you begin.

To format your card:

1. Insert the card that you want to format into the appropriate card slot (see chapter 1 for details).

2. Press the **Option** button.

3. The following menu appears. Position the arrow beside the Setup option and press **OK**.

- 4. Select the Format Card option and press **OK**.
- You have another chance to make sure that you really want to format this card. A screen appears, asking you to confirm that you want to format the card. To format the card, press **OK**.
- When the formatting is complete, the thumbnails screen appears with a message that there are no photos on the card.

You can then press **Change Card** to take the card out of the unit and use it in your camera.

Formatting a Memory Stick card

It is <u>not</u> recommended to format a Memory Stick memory card using the Universal TV Photo Show or a computer. Formatting on either device can cause damage to the card. Please go to the following web site for more details:

When you are at the site:

- Select "Type a Question"
- Then select "Memory Stick Devices & Media"
- Enter the word 'format' in the "Type a question or problem description in the text box" section
- Select "Find Solution"

More detail will be provided about how to format your Memory Stick media.


Reclaiming memory card space

When you run a slide show that has many large photos in it, Universal TV Photo Show creates some duplicate images to help the system run faster when you display those images again. This uses up a small amount of space on your card.

If your card is very full with photos and you need to take more, you may want to reclaim some of that space. However, the tradeoff is that doing so will cause the unit to run slightly more slowly until it again creates those images.

To reclaim memory space:

- 1. Press the **Option** button.
- 2. Select the Setup option from the menu and press **OK**.
- The setup menu then appears. Select the Reclaim Card Memory option and press OK.



- **Note:** If there is no space available to reclaim, the option will appear in gray and you will not be able to choose it.
- 4. A screen appears telling you how much space you would free up and asking you to confirm that you want to reclaim the memory. Position the arrow beside your selection and press **OK**.
- 5. You then return to the Setup menu. Select the Close Menu option and press **OK** to return to your photos.

Chapter 5: Using Universal TV Photo Show with Your Computer

You can also connect Universal TV Photo Show to your computer. When you do so, it becomes a removable drive that works like any other, so that you can store images, send them via e-mail, print them or format your memory card. Universal TV Photo Show works on a PC computer running Windows (98SE, ME, 2000 or XP) or on a Macintosh computer running Mac OS 8.6, 9.x or X.

Note: You must purchase a USB cable in order to connect the unit to your computer. This USB cable must have a USB Type A connector on one end and a USB Type B connector on the other.

Setting up Universal TV Photo Show

Connecting the unit to your computer is even simpler than it was to connect it to your television. Refer to Chapter 1 for detailed illustrations of the connections to the unit.

- If you are running Windows 98SE, you must install a separate driver. This is available as a free download on the www.dazzle.com web site. You will also find instructions there for installing the driver. If you are running the 2000, ME or XP operating system, it will work automatically without a driver.
- 2. Connect the power supply to the unit's DC IN socket and then plug the AC adapter into an electric outlet.
- 3. Insert your memory card into the unit.
- 4. On the side of the unit, slide the POWER switch to ON. Check that the green light on the front comes on, ensuring that it is receiving power.
- 5. Plug one end of the USB cable (USB Type A connector) into an available USB port on your computer, then plug the other end (USB Type B connector) into the USB port on the back of the unit. Your computer can be running while you do this.

Using Universal TV Photo Show

Now that it is connected to your computer, you can access your digital photos on the memory card just as you would access files on a floppy disk or CD-ROM. Universal TV Photo Show appears as a removable device on your system. You can drag and drop files or even format your memory card.

To access your files:

- On a PC:
 - Go to the icon "My Computer" on your desktop and double-click on it.
 - After a few seconds, you will see a "Removable Disk" icon appear with a newly assigned drive letter.

On a Macintosh, the icon will appear automatically on your desktop.

- 2. Double-click on the icon to open the drive.
- 3. The content of your media card is listed on the screen. Now you can use your computer to manipulate, alter, organize and/or rename images that will be stored on the card for eventual viewing on TV.

Note: While Universal TV Photo Show allows you to manipulate your photos by rotating, zooming and panning, these changes are not done to the original files and will not show up on your computer.

Red-eye corrections that you made, however, are accessible. You will see that some files have duplicates with an –RE added to the file name (for example, files DSCF0001 and DSCF0001-RE). The RE files contain the red-eye correction for the original photo. You can work with both versions.

Formatting a Memory Stick card

It is <u>not</u> recommended to format a Memory Stick memory card while connected to a computer. This can cause damage to the card. Please go to the following web site for more details:

When you are at the site:

- Select "Type a Question"
- Then select "Memory Stick Devices & Media"
- Enter the word 'format' in the "Type a question or problem description in the text box" section
- Select "Find Solution"

More detail will be provided about how to format your Memory Stick media.

Removing a memory card

It's important to make sure that the computer is not busy before you eject your memory card. If the computer is in the middle of writing information, for example, you risk damaging the card and losing the photos on it.

Before removing your card:

- Do not remove the card while your computer is asleep. First wake up your computer and then remove the card.
- 2. Close any memory card files that you have open.
- If you are using Windows 98SE, ME, 2000 or XP, right click on the removable drive and select Eject. If you are using a Macintosh, eject or unmount your memory card by dragging the card's disk icon into the trash.

Disconnecting Universal TV Photo Show

When you are done working with Universal TV Photo Show on your computer, you can disconnect the unit. Make sure that you take out the memory card before transporting the unit anywhere.

To disconnect Universal TV Photo Show:

- 1. Close all of the files on the card.
- Check that the light on the front of the unit is not blinking. It blinks when it is accessing files.
- 3. If you are using Windows 98SE, ME, 2000 or XP, right click on the removable drive and select Eject. If you are using a Macintosh, eject or unmount your memory card by dragging the card's disk icon into the trash.
- 4. Unplug the USB connector cable.
- 5. Slide the switch on the side of the unit to OFF.
- 6. Remove your memory card from the unit.

Chapter 6: Troubleshooting

My photos didn't appear after I connected everything.

- Check that the green light is lit on the front of the unit. If it is not, check that
 the power is connected correctly and the power switch on the side of the
 unit is turned to ON.
- Make sure that your TV is set to the correct video input. To do this, turn on both your TV and Universal TV Photo Show, and then press the button on your TV or TV remote control that changes the video input source. This button could be called TV/Video, Input, Source or TV/AV.
 - If your TV doesn't have these buttons, it may have a channel called LINE (frequently found before Channel 2). Click through your TV's channels until you find it.
- You may have inserted the memory card incorrectly. See page 1-10 for specific instructions for your card.

The video cable plug doesn't fit into any of my TV's sockets./ My TV doesn't have an RCA Video In jack.

 Some older TVs do not have RCA Video In connectors. Instead, you'll need to connect with an RF modulator (not included). You can purchase an RF modulator and cable from your local electronics store.

The remote doesn't seem to be working.

- The remote control requires two AA batteries. Check that the batteries were inserted in the right direction and that they are fresh.
- Make sure you are pointing the remote directly at the front of the unit, not at the TV, and that there is nothing blocking the path.
- Move a little closer to the unit. You need to be within 16 feet (5 meters) or so.

The unit is saying that my card is "unreadable."

- There may be a problem with your memory card, perhaps caused by
 physical damage or heat. In this case, move your photos to another device
 and then reformat the card using your camera or PC and try it again in the
 unit. (Note that reformatting the card will erase all of the photos and files on
 it, so be sure to save your photos first.)
- You may have inserted the memory card incorrectly. See page 1-10 for specific instructions for your card.

Some of my photos didn't show up.

- Universal TV Photo Show reads JPEG files the most common file format used for digital cameras. Your photos may be in a format that the unit cannot display, such as grayscale JPEGs, CMYK, BMP, GIF, EPS, TIFF or other nontypical settings. If this is the case, you might be able to convert them to a compatible JPEG file format on a computer.
- Make sure there are photos on your memory card that you did not insert an empty one.

Photos are loading very slowly.

 Your photos may be of a higher resolution than necessary. Since the photos will be shown on TV, Universal TV Photo Show only requires VGA-level resolution of 640 x 480. Try setting your digital camera to a lower resolution mode when snapping photos to use with the unit.

The slide show feature doesn't work.

 In the lower right part of the TV, there might be a symbol that looks like "II", which indicates that the slideshow is paused. Press the button so that the automatic slide show is started.

I know I have more than 12 photos on my card but I can't find them.

 If you have more than 12 photos on a card, the first screen of the thumbnail view will only show 12 photos. Be sure to use the arrow buttons to view <u>all</u> your photos on subsequent screens.

I've mistakenly deleted a photo from my memory card.

 If you delete a photo from the memory card (you get two chances to keep it) then it is gone permanently.

Thumbnail and photo rotations are not being saved

Please check to see if your media card is "Write-Protected." If it is, then any
settings will not be saved. Some photos may appear rotated while the unit is
on, but after a power cycle (turn unit off and then on again) the photos will not
appear rotated.

The Windows 98 driver won't install.

 We support the Windows 98 second edition only, not the first edition. (The driver will not install on the Windows 95 version since you can't run the unit on that system, or the 2000, ME or XP operating systems, since they don't require the driver.)

The removable drive feature isn't working.

 Universal TV Photo Show operates as a removable drive on PCs running Windows 98SE, ME, 2000 or XP and on Macs running Mac OS 8.6, 9.X or X. Make sure you are using one of these operating systems. Note: if you are using Windows 98SE you must install a separate driver that is available at www.dazzle.com.

I deleted the "imageinfo.db" file, what does this mean?

This file saves the rotation, zoom and pan setting of your photos as you use
 Universal TV Photo Show. If deleted, the photos that you "edited" will no longer
 have this information saved for future use. However, any further rotation, zoom
 or pan of a photo will recreate this file and save the settings.


