

#### Batteries that can be charged


#### Rechargeable Battery NH-20 (included)

🖞 Use the battery charger (BC-NH20) provided with the camera to charge Ni-MH batteries only. Attempting to charge batteries other than those specified for use with the charger (such as manganese, alkaline or lithium batteries) can cause the batteries to burst or leak. This could result in a fire or injury and consequent damage to the surroundings.





- The battery is not fully charged at shipment and must be fully charged before being used. When first used after purchasing or left unused for a long
- period, charge and discharge battery using the camera's "Discharging rechargeable batteries" function and then recharge it (⇒P.17).
- If the terminals of battery are soiled, it may not be possible to charge them. Clean the battery terminals and battery charger terminals with a clean, dry cloth.



If Rechargeable Battery NH-20 and Ni-MH batteries are charged repeatedly before there are fully discharged, the battery low warning to appear while there is still ample charge remaining in the batteries. At that time, discharge and recharge them several times using the camera's "Discharging rechargeable batteries" function (⇒P.17).

#### Charge the Ni-MH rechargeable batteries (commercially available)



Load the batteries into the battery charger (BC-NH20) correctly as indicated by the polarity icons.

- \* Wherever possible, use the Rechargeable Battery NH-20. When using Ni-MH batteries (commercially available), note the following:
- Different brands and types of Ni-MH batteries have differing charging and discharging characteristics. Some batteries may finish charging more quickly or give fewer available shots. If the power suddenly fails and the lens does not retract, set the Mode switch to Playback mode (=P.26). Then turn the camera on. After the lens retracts, turn the camera off again. If the lens still does not retract, fit new batteries or use the AC power adapter (⇒P.69).
- If the lamp blinks during charging, the charger cannot recharge those batteries. Use the correct charger (commercially available), for the batteries.

## LOADING THE BATTERY AND THE xD-Picture Card

#### **Compatible Batteries**

- Rechargeable Battery NH-20
- 2 × AAA-size Ni-MH rechargeable batteries (commercially available)
- 2 × AAA-size alkaline batteries (commercially available)

#### Alkaline batteries


Alkaline batteries are useful when the rechargeable batteries run out of charge while you are traveling and just a few more shots are needed. Note the following when using alkaline batteries:

- The shooting time provided by alkaline batteries varies depending on the type and brand. In some cases, the camera may stop taking pictures or may suddenly turn off without retracting the lens.
- The shooting time provided by alkaline batteries decreases further at low temperatures (0°C to +10°C/+32°F to +50°F). Use Ni-MH batteries since they provide consistent shooting times even at low temperatures.
- When the camera stops taking pictures or suddenly turns off without retracting the lens, this is not a camera fault. If the lens does not retract, set the Mode switch to Playback mode (⇒P.26). Then turn the camera on. After the lens retracts, turn the camera off again. If the lens still does not retract, fit new batteries or use the AC power adapter (⇒P.69).

How to use the battery

- Never use the following types of batteries, as they could cause serious Outer casing problems such as battery fluid leakage or overheating:
- 1. Batteries with split or peeling outer casings
- 2. Combinations of different types of batteries or new and used batteries together
- Do not use manganese or Ni-Cd batteries.
- Soil (such as fingerprints) on the battery terminals makes the batteries charge less reducing the number of images they will allow you to take. Carefully wipe the battery terminals with a soft dry cloth before loading.
- See P.78-79 for other notes on using batteries.
- When first used after purchasing or left unused for a long period, the time for which Rechargeable Battery NH-20 or AAA-size Ni-MH rechargeable batteries can be used may be shorter. See P.79 for details.
- When the surfaces of the Rechargeable Battery NH-20 terminals have become worn through repeated use or the battery has been taken out of the camera and left for a long period, the battery may stop supplying power or may become usable only for shorter periods.

To restore normal battery operation, open and close the battery cover several times to dislodge any soiling on the terminals.




Check that the camera is turned off (viewfinder lamp goes off) before opening the battery cover.

Opening the battery cover while the camera is on causes the camera to turn off.

Do not apply excessive force to the battery cover.

Do not open the battery cover while the camera is still turned on. This could damage the xD-Picture Card or corrupt the image files on the xD-Picture Card.


### LOADING THE BATTERY AND THE xD-Picture Card



Load the Rechargeable Battery NH-20 correctly as indicated by the polarity icons.

Load the batteries correctly as indicated by the polarity icons.




Align the gold marking on the xD-Picture Card slot with the gold contact area on the **xD-Picture Card** and then push the card firmly all the way into the slot.

If the xD-Picture Card is oriented incorrectly, it will not go all the way into the slot. Do not apply excessive force when inserting an xD-Picture Card.



Close the battery cover.

How to replace the xD-Picture Card +




Push the **xD-Picture Card** into the slot and then slowly remove your finger. The lock is released and the **xD-Picture Card** is pushed out.

#### ① There is ample remaining battery charge.

- ② There is insufficient charge left in the batteries. The batteries will soon run completely out and replace fully charged batteries or recharge the batteries.


- When the power save (=P.58) is active and the "II" appears, the intervals of next shooting after a picture is taken and the flash charging time may increase.
- When the batteries run out, "in appears and camera operation automatically stops. When this occurs, the camera may work if you turn it on again even without loading new or fully charged batteries. However, this may cause camera faults such as the camera turning itself off without retracting the lens. Always load new or fully charged batteries.
- Due to the nature of the battery, the battery low warning may appear early when the camera is used in cold locations. This is normal and does not indicate a fault. Try warming the batteries in your pocket or a similar location before use.

When this function is active, the LCD monitor goes dark when the camera is not used for about 10 seconds. When the camera is not used for about 20 seconds, this function automatically turns the LCD monitor off temporarily (sleep) to reduce power consumption (See P.58 for details). If that camera remains unused for an additional interval of 2 minutes, the Power save function automatically turns the camera off. To turn camera back on, slide the Power switch to turn the camera off briefly and then turn it back on.

Slide the Power switch to turn the camera on and off. When turning the camera on, the viewfinder lamp lights (green).

In "D" or """ mode, the lens extends and the lens cover opens. Take care not to obstruct the lens, as it is a precision component. Obstructing the lens will cause a malfunction or fault and the "FOCUS ERROR " or "ZOOM ERROR " message will appear. Take care also not to get fingerprints on the camera lens as this will result in impaired image quality in your shots.

When first using the camera after purchasing, the date and time are cleared. Press the "MENU/OK" button to set the date and time.

If a confirmation message (left screen) does not appear, refer to "CORRECTING THE DATE AND TIME" (→P.15) to check and correct the date and time.

When also leaving the camera for a long period with the batteries removed, this confirmation message will appear. To set the date and time later, press the "BACK" button. If you do not set the date and time, this confirmation message will appear each time you turn the camera on.

① Press "◀" or "▶" to select Year, Month, Day, Hour or Minute. ② Press "▲" or "▼" to correct the setting.


✓ Holding down "▲" or "▼" changes the numbers continuously. When the time displayed passes "12:00", the AM/PM setting automatically changes.

Once you have set the date and time, press the "MENU/OK" button. Pressing the "MENU/OK" button changes the camera to Photography or Plavback mode.

At the time of purchase and after leaving the camera for a long period with the batteries removed, settings such as the date and time are cleared. Once the AC power adapter has been connected or the batteries have been loaded for 2 hours or more, the camera settings will be retained for about 6 hours even if both sources of camera power are removed.

## **PROCEDURE FOR DISCHARGING RECHARGEABLE BATTERIES**


Due to the nature of Ni-MH rechargeable batteries, the time for which they can be used may become shorter in certain situations, even when the batteries are fully charged.

In the following situations, the batteries should be discharged and then fully recharged before use.

- When first used after purchasing the camera
- •When you purchase new Rechargeable Battery NH-20 or Ni-MH rechargeable batteries (commercially available)
- When the batteries have not been used for a long period
- When the batteries can only be used for a short time after being charged normally
- The "Discharging rechargeable batteries" function can only be used with Rechargeable Battery NH-20 or Ni-MH rechargeable batteries (commercially available). The "Discharging rechargeable batteries" function should not be used with alkaline batteries as it will completely drain the battery charge.

The Rechargeable Battery NH-20 or Ni-MH rechargeable batteries (commercially available) are not discharged when the camera is set in the cradle ( $\Rightarrow$ P.77) or while using the AC power adapter (⇒P.69).

Remove the cradle or AC power adapter from the camera before discharging batteries.




# 2 Using the Camera

## **BASIC OPERATION GUIDE**

You've read the chapter on getting ready and the camera is now set up and ready to take pictures. "Using the Camera" describes the basic camera operations of "Taking Pictures", then "Viewing Images" and "Erasing Images".



Using the Camera

## STILL PHOTOGRAPHY MODE TAKING PICTURES (CA AUTO MODE)




① Slide the Power switch sideways to turn the camera on.

2 Set the Mode switch to "


For subjects closer than 60 cm (2.0 ft.), use Macro mode (⇒P.33). If the "CARD ERROR ", "NO CARD ", "CARD FULL " or

"CARD NOT INITIALIZED " message appears, see P.82.



To take pictures using the viewfinder, press the "DISP" button to turn the LCD monitor off (turning the LCD monitor off conserves battery power).

Note that you cannot turn the LCD monitor off in Macro mode



Brace your elbows against your sides and hold the camera with both hands. Position the thumb of your right hand so that it is handy for using the zoom.

The image will be blurred if the camera moves when taking the picture (camera shake). Use a tripod to avoid camera shake, particularly for shots in dark locations when the flash is set to Suppressed flash mode. There may be some unevenness in the brightness at the


lower edge of the LCD monitor. This is normal and does not affect the photographed image.

Take care to hold the camera so that your fingers or the strap do not cover the lens. flash or flash control sensor. If the lens, flash or flash control sensor is obscured by your fingers or the camera strap, you may not be able to obtain the correct brightness (exposure) for your shot.


Check that the lens is clean. If it is dirty, clean the lens as described on P.78.

When using the flash in very dusty conditions or when it is snowing, white dots may appear in the image due to the flash reflecting off the dust particles or snowflakes. Try taking the shot using Suppressed flash mode.



If the subject is not in the center of the picture, use AF/AE lock to take the picture (⇒P.24).


- To frame the shot precisely, take the picture using the LCD monitor.
- The image shown on the LCD monitor before taking the picture may differ in its brightness, color, etc. from the image actually recorded. If necessary, play back the recorded image to check it (⇒P.26).
- In some conditions it may be difficult to see your subject clearly on the LCD monitor, (such as in sunny weather outdoors or when you are shooting dimly lit scenes). In such situations, use the viewfinder to take the picture.

When using the viewfinder to take a picture at a distance of 0.6 m to 1.5 m (2.0 ft. to 4.9 ft.), only the shaded area in the figure is photographed.





### STILL PHOTOGRAPHY MODE TAKING PICTURES (CA AUTO MODE)



Pressing the Shutter button down halfway, the camera emits a short double-beep and focuses on your subject. At that point, the AF frame on the LCD monitor becomes smaller and the camera sets the shutter speed and aperture (the viewfinder lamp (green) stops blinking and remains lit).

- If "!AF" appears on the LCD monitor, the camera cannot focus. Pressing the Shutter button down halfway, the image on the LCD monitor freezes briefly. However, this is not the recorded image
- If "!AF" appears on the LCD monitor (e.g. the shot is too dark for the camera to focus), try standing about 2 m (6.6 ft.) from the subject to take the picture.
- If Ni-MH and alkaline batteries are being used together, or the batteries are low on charge, camera may be turned off without retracting the lens. At that time, set the Mode switch to Playback mode (=P.26). Then turn the camera on. After the lens retracts, turn the camera off again. If the lens still does not retract, fit new batteries or use the AC power adapter (=P.69).

Press the Shutter button down fully without releasing it. When a clicking noise heard, the camera records the photographed image.

- There is a slight delay between the Shutter button being pressed and the picture being taken. When "IMAGE DISP." is set to ON (⇒P.57), the results of the shot appear on the LCD monitor after you take a picture. The image shown may differ in its brightness, color, etc. from the image actually recorded. If necessary, play back the shot to check the image. When pressing the Shutter button down fully in one motion,
- the AF frame disappears and the picture is taken. When taking the picture, the viewfinder lamp lights orange
- (shooting disabled). The viewfinder lamp then changes to green to indicate that the next picture can be taken. The viewfinder lamp blinks orange while the flash is charging.
- If the LCD monitor is turned on, the LCD monitor may go dark. This is normal and does not indicate a fault.
- See P.82-83 for information on the warning displays.

#### Subjects not suitable for autofocus

Though the FinePix F420 uses an autofocus mechanism, it may have trouble focusing with the following subjects and situations:

- Very shiny subjects such as a mirror or car body
- Subjects photographed through glass
- Subjects that do not reflect well, such as hair or fur
- Subjects with no substance, such as smoke or flames
- When the subject is dark
- When there is very little contrast between the subject and the background (such as white walls or subjects dressed in the same color as the background)




#### ■ Standard number of frames per xD-Picture Card

This is the standard number shown for a new **xD-Picture Card** formatted on the camera. The larger the capacity of the **xD-**Picture Card, the greater the difference between the standard number and the actual number of frames appears. Also, because the amount of data recorded varies depending on the subject, the number of available frames may not decrease or may decrease by 2 when a frame is taken. Consequently, the actual number of frames may be more or less than what is displayed.

### **USING AF/AE LOCK**




In a shot with this type of composition, the subjects (two people in this case) are not in the AF frame. If the picture is taken at this point, the subjects will not be in focus.



Move the camera slightly so that one of the subjects in the AF frame.



Without moving the camera, press the Shutter button down halfway (AF/AE lock). Focusing is complete when the AF frame on the LCD monitor shrinks and the viewfinder lamp (green) stops blinking and remains lit.



Continue to hold the Shutter button down halfway (AF/AE lock). Move the camera back to the original image and then fully press down on the Shutter button.


 You can reapply the AF/AE lock as many times as you like before releasing the shutter.
 The AF/AE lock operates in all Photography modes and can be used to ensure excellent results.

#### AF (Autofocus)/AE (Auto-exposure) Lock —

On the FinePix F420, when you press the Shutter button down half way, the focus and exposure settings are fixed (AF/AE lock). If you want to focus on a subject that is off to one side of the image or if you want to set the exposure before you compose the final shot, lock the AF and AE settings and then compose and shoot your picture to get the best results.

During single-frame playback, you can use the zoom to check your photo or trim the image so that only the part you want to show is saved.

#### If you use the viewfinder to take a picture in Macro mode, the field visible through the viewfinder does not match the field actually photographed because the viewfinder and lens are in different positions. Accordingly, you should use the LCD monitor to take pictures in Macro mode.

Macro photography is automatically cancelled in the following situations:

- When the Mode switch setting is moved to "#"
   When the SHOOTING MODE is changed
- When the camera is turned off
- Select the appropriate Flash mode for the conditions.
- If shooting in a dark location (when the "!"" camera shake warning icon appears), use a tripod to prevent camera shake.
   The LCD monitor is automatically turned ON and cannot be turned OFF.

### **\$** FLASH



Up to 6 Flash modes can be chosen according to the type of shot.

(1) Set the Mode switch to " $\square$ ".

- ② The flash setting changes each time you press the "**\$**" Flash button (►). The last Flash mode displayed is selected.
- Effective flash range (for DA AUTO) Wide-angle: Approx. 0.6 m to 3.5 m (2.0 ft. to 11.5 ft.) Telephoto: Approx. 0.6 m to 2.7 m (2.0 ft. to 8.9 ft.)
- When useing the flash in very dusty conditions or when it is snowing, white dots may appear in the image due to the flash reflecting off the dust particles or snowflakes. Try taking the shot using Suppressed flash mode.
- The flash charging time may increase if the charge remaining in the battery is low.
- When taking a picture using the flash, you may see the image disappear and the LCD monitor go dark as the flash charges. At the same time, the viewfinder lamp blinks orange.
- ✓ The available Flash modes are limited depending on the Photography menu selected (→P.36).



#### Auto flash mode (no icon)

Use this mode for ordinary photography. The flash fires automatically as required by the shooting conditions.

Pressing the Shutter button while the flash is charging, the shot will be taken without the flash.



#### Red-eye reduction

Use this mode to ensure that the subject's eyes appear natural when photographing people in low-light conditions. The flash fires a pre-flash just before the picture is taken and then fires again to take the actual picture.

The flash fires automatically as required by the shooting conditions.

Pressing the Shutter button while the flash is charging will result in the shot will be taken without the flash.

#### - • Red-Eye Effect •

When you use the flash to photograph people in low-light conditions, their eyes sometimes appear red in the picture. This is caused by the light of the flash reflecting off the inside of the eye. Use Red-eye reduction flash to effectively minimize the likelihood of the red-eye effect.

- Take the following measures to make Red-eye reduction more effective:
- Get the subjects to look at the camera. Get as close as possible to the subjects.







### **4** Forced flash

Use this mode to photograph backlit scenes, such as a subject against a window or in the shade of a tree, or to obtain the correct colors when you are shooting under lighting such as fluorescent lamps. In this mode, the flash fires in bright as well as dark conditions.

### Suppressed flash

Use this mode for photography using indoor lighting, for shots taken through glass, and for photography in venues such as theaters or at indoor sporting events where the distance is too great for the flash to be effective. In this situation, you can use the specified white balance ( $\rightarrow$ P.40) to take shots that retain the atmosphere given by the ambient lighting.

- To take pictures in Suppressed flash mode in dark conditions, use a tripod to prevent camera shake.
- See P.82 for information on the camera shake warning.

### St Slow synchro

This is a flash mode that uses a slow shutter speed. This allows you to take pictures of people at night that clearly show both your subjects and the night time backdrop. To prevent camera shake, always use a tripod.

• Slowest shutter speed: Up to 2 sec.

### Red-eye reduction + Slow synchro

Use this mode for Slow synchro shots with Red-eye reduction.

The image may be overexposed when shooting bright scenes.

To take a picture of a main subject at night with the background brightly lit, please use "C" (NIGHT) settings in the " $\hat{\mathbf{O}}$ " SHOOTING MODE ( $\Rightarrow$ P.36).

#### Focusing on a moving subject

If you press the Shutter button down halfway to focus on the subject at the starting point (A), the subject may no longer be in focus when it reaches point (B) where you want to take the shot. In such situations, focus on point (B) beforehand and then lock the focus so that it does not shift. This feature is also useful for photographing fast-moving subjects that are difficult to focus on.



### EV (EXPOSURE COMPENSATION)

Use the Brightness setting to obtain the correct brightness (exposure) when the subject is much brighter or darker than the background.

 Compensation range -2.1 EV to +1.5 EV (13 steps in 0.3 EV increments) See P.88 for more information on EV.

#### To obtain the optimum brightness

Adjust the exposure compensation according to the level of brightness or darkness in the photographed image.

- When the subject appears too bright Try a negative (-) compensation setting. This will make the overall photographed image darker.
- When the subject appears too dark Try a positive (+) compensation setting. This will make the overall photographed image brighter.

#### Guide to compensation

- Backlit portraits: +0.6 EV to +1.5 EV
- Very bright scenes (such as snowfields) and highly reflective subjects: +0.9 EV
- Shots made up predominantly of sky: +0.9 EV
- Spotlit subjects, particularly against dark backgrounds: -0.6 EV
- Scenes with low reflectivity, such as shots of pine trees or dark foliage: -0.6 EV

### **WB WHITE BALANCE**

Change the white balance setting when you want to take a picture with the white balance fixed for the surroundings and lighting when the picture is taken. In AUTO mode, the correct white balance may not be obtained for subjects such as close-ups of people's faces and pictures taken under a special light source. When this function is active, the LCD monitor goes dark when the camera is not used for about 10 seconds. When the camera is not used for another 20 seconds, this function automatically turns the LCD monitor off (sleep) to reduce power consumption (the viewfinder lamp (green) blinks at 1-second intervals). If the camera remains unused for an additional interval of 2 minutes, the Power save function automatically turns the camera off. Use this function when you want to conserve battery power.

The Power save setting is disabled during automatic playback, during rechargeable battery discharging and when a USB connection is being used.




When the camera is in Sleep mode, pressing the Shutter button down halfway wakes the camera up so that it is ready to take pictures. This is useful since the camera can be ready to take pictures almost instantly.

Pressing any other button as well as the Shutter button wakes the camera up.

The Sleep function does not operate in SET-UP or Playback mode, but the camera will automatically turn off if it is left unused for a set some time (2 minutes).





### 6.1.1 Using the AC power adapter (sold separately)


Always use a FUJIFILM AC Power Adapter AC-3V/AC-3VW.

Use the AC power adapter to avoid losing power at inconvenient times, such as when downloading photographed images to the computer. Using the AC power adapter also allows you to take pictures and play back images without worrying about depleting the batteries.

By using the optional cradle, the AC power adapter bundled with the cradle must be used. The use of AC power adapters other than the bundled product will cause faults.

I Only connect or disconnect the AC power adapter when the camera is turned off.


Connecting or disconnecting the AC power adapter while the camera is turned on temporarily interrupts the power supply to the camera, so that images or movies being shot at the time are not recorded. Failing to turn the camera off first can also result in damage to the **xD-Picture Card** or malfunctions during PC connection.



Check that the camera is turned off. Plug the AC power adapter connector into the "DC IN 3V" socket and then plug the AC power adapter into the power outlet.

- The socket-outlet shall be installed near the equipment and shall be easily accessible.
- The shape of the plug and socket-outlet depends on the country of use.
- See P.80 for notes on using the AC power adapter.

- When FinePixViewer is not included in the list of actions to perform Select "Take no action" and then select the "Always do the selected action" checkbox. (This checkbox may not be shown in some cases.) Click the [OK] button and launch FinePixViewer manually.

## 6.1.4 Disconnecting the Camera



- ① Quit all applications (FinePixViewer etc.) that are using the camera.
- 2 Check that the viewfinder lamp is lit green (no data is being exchanged with the computer).

For a DSC connection, proceed to step 2. For a PC CAMERA connection, proceed to step 3.

Even when "Copying" is no longer displayed on the computer, the camera and the computer may still be exchanging data. Always check that the viewfinder lamp is lit green.







▶ Be sure to read this information in conjunction with "Safety Notes" (→P.89), to ensure that you use your camera correctly.

#### Places to Avoid

Do not store or use the camera in the following types of locations:

- In the rain or in very humid, dirty or dusty places
- In direct sunlight or in places subject to extreme temperature rises, such as in a closed car in summer
- Extremely cold places
- Places subject to strong vibration
- Places affected by smoke or steam
- Places subject to strong magnetic fields (such as near motors, transformers or magnets)
- In contact with chemicals such as pesticides or next to rubber or vinyl products for long periods of time

### Notes on Immersion in Water or Sand

The FinePix F420 is affected by water and sand. When you are at the beach or close to water, ensure that the camera is not exposed to water or sand. Take care not to place the camera on a wet surface. Water or sand inside the camera can cause faults that may be irreparable.

### Notes on Condensation

If the camera is carried suddenly from a cold location into a warm place, water droplets (condensation) may form on the inside of the camera or on the lens. When this occurs, turn the camera off and wait an hour before using the camera. Condensation may also form on the **xD-Picture Card**. In this event, remove the **xD**-

# **Notes on the Power Supply**

## Applicable Batteries

- In this camera, use the Rechargeable Battery NH-20 or AAA-size Ni-MH rechargeable batteries.
   Do not use AAA-size manganese or nickel-cadmium (Ni-Cd) batteries in your FinePix F420.
- See P.11 for information on AAA-size alkaline battery.

## Notes on the Batteries

Incorrect use of the batteries could cause them to leak, become hot, ignite or burst. Always observe the precautions given below.

- Do not heat the batteries or throw them into a fire.
- Do not carry or store batteries with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins that could come into contact with the metal positive ⊕ and negative ⊖ poles of the battery.
- Do not expose the batteries to fresh or sea water, and take particular care to keep the terminals dry.
- Do not attempt to deform, disassemble or modify the batteries.
- Do not attempt to peel off or cut the battery outer casing.
- Do not drop, strike or otherwise subject the batteries to strong impacts.
- Do not use batteries that are leaking, deformed, discolored or exhibit any other obvious abnormality.
- Do not store batteries in very warm or moist
- 78 locations.

Picture Card and wait a short time before using it again.

### ■ When the Camera is Unused for Long Periods

If you do not intend to use the camera for a long period of time, remove the batteries and the **xD**-**Picture Card** before storing the camera.

### Cleaning Your Camera

- Use a blower brush to remove dust from the lens, LCD monitor or viewfinder, and then wipe lightly with a soft, dry cloth. If any soil remains, apply a small amount of lens cleaning liquid to a piece of FUJIFILM lens cleaning paper and wipe gently.
- Do not scratch hard objects against the lens, LCD monitor or viewfinder as these surfaces are easily damaged.
- Clean the body of the camera with a soft, dry cloth. Do not use volatile substances such as thinners, benzine or insecticide, as these may react with camera body and cause deformation or remove the coating.

### Using the Camera Overseas

When travelling overseas, do not place your camera in the check-in baggage. Baggage handling at airports may subject baggage to violent shocks, and the camera may be damaged internally even when no external damage is visible.

- Keep the batteries out of reach of babies and small children.
- $\bullet$  When loading the batteries into the camera, ensure that the battery polarity  $(\oplus \text{ and } \ominus)$  is as indicated on the camera.
- Do not use a new battery together with a used battery. In the case of rechargeable batteries, do not use charged and discharged batteries together. Do not use batteries of different types or brands together.
- If you do not intend to use the camera for a long period of time, remove the batteries from the camera. (Note that if the camera is left with the batteries removed, the time and date settings are cleared.)
- The batteries may feel warm immediately after being used. Before removing the batteries, turn the camera off and wait until the batteries cool down.
- When replacing the batteries, always fit new batteries.
- Here, "new batteries" denotes a pair of fully charged AAA-size Ni-MH batteries that were charged at the same time or newly purchased unused alkaline batteries.
- In cold locations (at temperatures of +10°C/+50°F or below), battery performance deteriorates and the time for which they can be used shortens markedly. This is particularly true of alkaline batteries. In cold conditions, put the batteries in your pocket or a similar place to warm them before loading them into

the camera. If you use a body warmer to warm the batteries, ensure that they are not in direct contact with the warmer.

 Soil (such as fingerprints) on the battery terminals can markedly reduce the number of available frames. Carefully wipe the battery terminals clean with a soft dry cloth before loading the batteries.

▲ If any liquid at all leaks from the batteries, wipe the battery compartment thoroughly and then load new batteries.

▲ If any battery fluid comes into contact with your hands or clothing, flush the area thoroughly with water. Note that battery fluid can cause loss of eyesight if it gets into your eyes. If this occurs, do not rub your eyes. Flush the fluid out with clean water and contact your physician for treatment.

#### Disposing of Batteries

When disposing of batteries, do so in accordance with your local waste disposal regulations.

## Notes on Using the Rechargeable Battery NH-20 and AAA-size Ni-MH Batteries Correctly

- When used as a power source for a digital camera, the Rechargeable Battery NH-20 and AAA-size Ni-MH batteries (referred to hereafter as Ni-MH batteries) are superior to alkaline batteries in that they allow more shots to be taken. However, to retain the original performance characteristics of Ni-MH batteries, care must be taken in the way they are used.
- Ni-MH batteries left unused in storage for long periods can become "deactivated" (=P.88). Also, repeatedly charging Ni-MH batteries that are only partially discharged can cause them to suffer from the "memory effect" (=P.88).

Ni-MH batteries that are "deactivated" or affected by "memory" suffer from the problem of only providing power for a short time after being charged. To prevent this problem, discharge and recharge them several times using the camera's "Discharging rechargeable batteries" function. By repeating this cycle several times, the temporary reduction in performance caused by "memory" or "deactivation" can be remedied and the batteries can be restored to their original performance levels.

Deactivation and memory are specific to Ni-MH batteries and are not in fact battery faults. See P.17 for the procedure for "Discharging rechargeable batteries".

Do not use the "Discharging rechargeable batteries" function when alkaline batteries are being used.

- Always use the battery charger BC-NH20 (included) or special battery charger (commercially available) to charge Ni-MH batteries. Charge the batteries as described in the instructions.
- Do not use the battery charger BC-NH20 (included) to charge batteries other than those specified for use with the charger.
- Note that the batteries may feel warm immediately after being charged.
- The camera mechanism is such that it draws a minute amount of current even when the camera is turned off. Note particularly that Ni-MH batteries and

the NH-20 will become discharged if left in the camera for a long period and may become unusable even when recharged.

- Even when not used, Ni-MH batteries and the NH-20 will naturally self-discharge so that the time for which they can be used is shortened.
- The NH-20 can be charged by battery charger BC-NH20 (included) or setting the camera in the PictureCradle CP-FX420 (sold separately).
- Ni-MH batteries cannot be charged using a combination of the camera and the cradle.
- Ni-MH batteries will deteriorate rapidly if overdischarged (eg. by discharging the batteries in a flashlight). Use the "Discharging rechargeable batteries" function provided in the camera to discharge the batteries.
- Ni-MH batteries have a limited service life. If a battery can only be used for a short time even after repeated discharge-charge cycles, it may have reached the end of its service life.

## Notes on Using the Battery Charger

- Rechargeable batteries and the battery charger itself will become warm due to the power stored inside the batteries. This is normal and does not indicate a fault. Wherever possible, use the battery charger in a well-ventilated location.
- There may be vibration noises from inside the battery charger during use. This is normal and does not indicate a fault.
- Do not use the battery charger to charge batteries other than FUJIFILM Rechargeable Battery NH-20 and Ni-MH batteries.
- The battery charger could cause interference if placed close to a radio during charging. In this event, move the radio and charger further apart.
- Do not touch the connections or contact points on rechargeable batteries with other metal objects as this can cause a short circuit.
- Do not leave the battery charger in the following locations: Locations subject to strong vibrations, in very dusty locations, or in locations with very high humidity or high temperatures, such as close to a heating appliance or in direct sunlight.
- The battery charger accepts input voltages of 100-240 V AC at 50 or 60 Hz and can be used all over the world. However, because the shapes of power sockets vary by country and by region, an appropriate plug adapter is also required for each country. Consult your travel agent for details.

## AC Power Adapter

Use only the AC Power Adapter AC-3V (sold separately) or the AC Power Adapter AC-3VW (bandled with PictureCradle, sold separately). The use of other AC power adapters may result in damage to your camera.

- The AC-3V cannot be used to charge the Rechargeable Battery NH-20.
- This AC power adapter is designed exclusively for indoor use.
- Plug the connection cord plug securely into the DC input terminal of the FUJIFILM Digital camera.
- Turn off the FUJIFILM Digital camera before disconnecting the connection cord from the FUJIFILM Digital camera's DC input terminal. To disconnect, take hold of the plug and pull it out (do not disconnect it by pulling on the cord).
- Do not use this AC power adapter with any device except the specified device.
- During use, this AC power adapter will become hot to the touch, but this is normal.
- Do not disassemble the AC power adapter. Doing so could be dangerous.
- Do not use this device in a place with high temperature and high humidity.
- Do not drop or subject this device to strong shocks.
- This device may emit a humming noise, but this is normal.
- If used near a radio, this device may cause static, so play the radio in a distant place.

# Notes on the xD-Picture Card<sup>™</sup>

#### Image Memory Card

 This Image Memory Card is a new image recording media (xD-Picture Card) developed for digital cameras. The Image Memory Card consists of a semiconductor memory (NAND-type flash memory) to record digital image data. The recording process is electrically performed and

enables erasure of existing image data as well as rerecording of new image data.

· When using a new Memory Card, or a Memory Card that has been initialized by a PC, be sure to initialize (format/initialize) the card with your digital camera before using it.

### Protecting Your Data

- Data may be lost or destroyed in the following situations. Please note that FUJIFILM assumes no responsibility for data that is lost or destroyed.
- 1. Removal of the memory card or turning the power off while the memory card is being accessed (i.e., during record, erase, initialization, and playback operations).
- 2. Improper handling and use of the memory card by the user or third party.
- For your safety, store important data to another media (i.e., MO disk, CD-R, hard disk, etc.).

### Notes on Handling xD-Picture Card

- Keep xD-Picture Cards out of the reach of small children. When storing xD-Picture Cards, ensure that they are kept in a location out of the reach of small children to prevent a card being accidentally swallowed. An xD-Picture Card could cause suffocation if accidentally swallowed. If a child swallows an xD-Picture Card, seek medical advice immediately
- Make sure that the memory card is straight when you insert into the camera etc.
- •The memory card is a precision electronic instrument. Do not apply pressure or shock, and avoid bending.
- Do not use the memory card in a hot, humid, or corrosive environment.
- If the contact area on the card is soiled (dust, fingerprints, etc.), wipe it clean with a soft, dry cloth.
- Clean the memory card with a soft dry piece of cloth when dirty.
- When carrying or storing xD-Picture Cards, keep them in the protective cases provided.
- The memory card can be used reliably for a long period of time, but will eventually lose its ability to store and play back image data. At this point, replace with a new memory card.
- Never remove the xD-Picture Card or turn the camera off during data recording, during data erasing (xD-Picture Card formatting) or during frame advance when images are being played back. These actions could result in damage to the xD-Picture Card.
- Always use xD-Picture Cards with the FinePix F420. The camera quality cannot be guaranteed when cards other than those manufactured by FUJIFILM are used.
- The xD-Picture Card may feel warm when it is removed from the camera after extended periods of picture taking or image viewing. This is normal and does not indicate a fault.
- Do not affix labels to the xD-Picture Card.

This could result in the label peeling off and causing

a fault when the card is inserted or removed.

#### Notes on Using xD-Picture Card with a PC

- If you intend to take photos using an xD-Picture Card that has been used on a PC, format the xD-Picture Card on your camera.
- When you format an **xD-Picture Card** in the camera and then shoot and record images, a directory (folder) is automatically created. Image data is then recorded in this directory.
- Do not change or delete the directory (folder) names or file names on the xD-Picture Card from your PC as this will make it impossible to use the **xD-Picture** Card in your camera.
- Always use the camera to erase image data on an xD-Picture Card.
- To edit image data, copy the image data to the PC's hard disk and then edit the copied data.
- Do not copy files other than those that have shot by the camera.

# **Explanation of Terms**

#### AF/AE Lock:

On the FinePix F420, pressing the Shutter button down half way locks the focus and exposure settings (AF and AE lock). If you want to focus on a subject that is not centered in the frame or change the picture composition after the exposure is set, you can obtain good results by changing the composition after the AF and AE settings are locked.

#### Auto power save function:

If the camera is not used in any way for 30 seconds, this function changes features such as the LCD monitor off (Sleep mode) to prevent battery depletion and the waste of power when the AC power adapter is connected. If the camera is then left unused for a further period, the Auto power save function turns the camera off.

• The Auto power off function does not operate in PC mode, during automatic playback, or if it is disabled during setup.

### Deactivated batteries:

Leaving a Ni-MH battery unused in storage for a long period may cause a rise in the level of substances that inhibit current flow inside the battery and result in a dormant battery. A battery in this state is referred to as deactivated.

Because current flow is inhibited in a deactivated Ni-MH battery, the battery's original level of performance cannot be achieved.

## DPOF:

### Digital Print Order Format

DPOF is a format used for recording information on a storage media (image memory card, etc.) that allows you to specify which of the frames shot using a digital camera are to be printed and how many prints are made of each image.

#### EV:

A number that denotes Exposure Value. The EV is determined by the brightness of the subject and sensitivity (speed) of the film or CCD. The number is larger for bright subjects and smaller for dark subjects. As the brightness of the subject changes, a digital camera maintains the amount of light hitting the CCD at a constant level by adjusting the aperture and shutter speed.

When the amount of light striking the CCD doubles, the EV increases by 1. Likewise, when the light is halved, the EV decreases by 1.

#### Frame rate (fps):

The frame rate refers to the number of images (frames) that are photographed or played back per second. For example, when 30 frames are continuously photographed in 1 second interval, the frame rate is expressed as 30 fps. For reference, TV images are displayed at 30 fps.

#### JPEG:

Joint Photographics Experts Group

A file format used for compressing and saving color images. The higher the compression rate, the greater the loss of quality in the decompressed (restored) image.

### Memory effect:

If a Ni-MH battery is repeatedly charged without first being fully discharged, its performance may drop below its original level. This is referred to as the "memory effect".

### Motion JPEG:

A type of AVI (Audio Video Interleave) file format that handles images and sound as a single file. Images in the file are recorded in JPEG format. Motion JPEG can be played back by QuickTime 3.0 or later.

#### PC Card:

A generic term for cards that meet the PC Card Standard.

## PC Card Standard:

A standard for PC cards determined by the PCMCIA.

## PCMCIA:

Personal Computer Memory Card International Association (US).

#### Smear:

A phenomenon specific to CCDs whereby white streaks appear on the image when there is a very strong light source, such as the sun or reflected sunlight, in the photography screen.

#### WAVE:

A standard format used on Windows systems for saving audio data. WAVE files have the ".WAV" file extension and the data can be saved in either compressed or uncompressed format. Uncompressed recording is used on this camera. WAVE files can be played back on a personal computer using the following software: Windows : MediaPlayer Macintosh: QuickTime Player

\* QuickTime 3.0 or later

#### White Balance:

Whatever the kind of the light, the human eye adapts to it so that a white object still looks white. On the other hand, devices such as digital cameras see a white subject as white by first adjusting the color balance to suit the color of the ambient light around the subject. This adjustment is called matching the white balance is called an **Automatic White Balance function**.

## Exif Print

Exif Print Format is a newly revised digital camera file format that contains a variety of shooting information for optimal printing.




