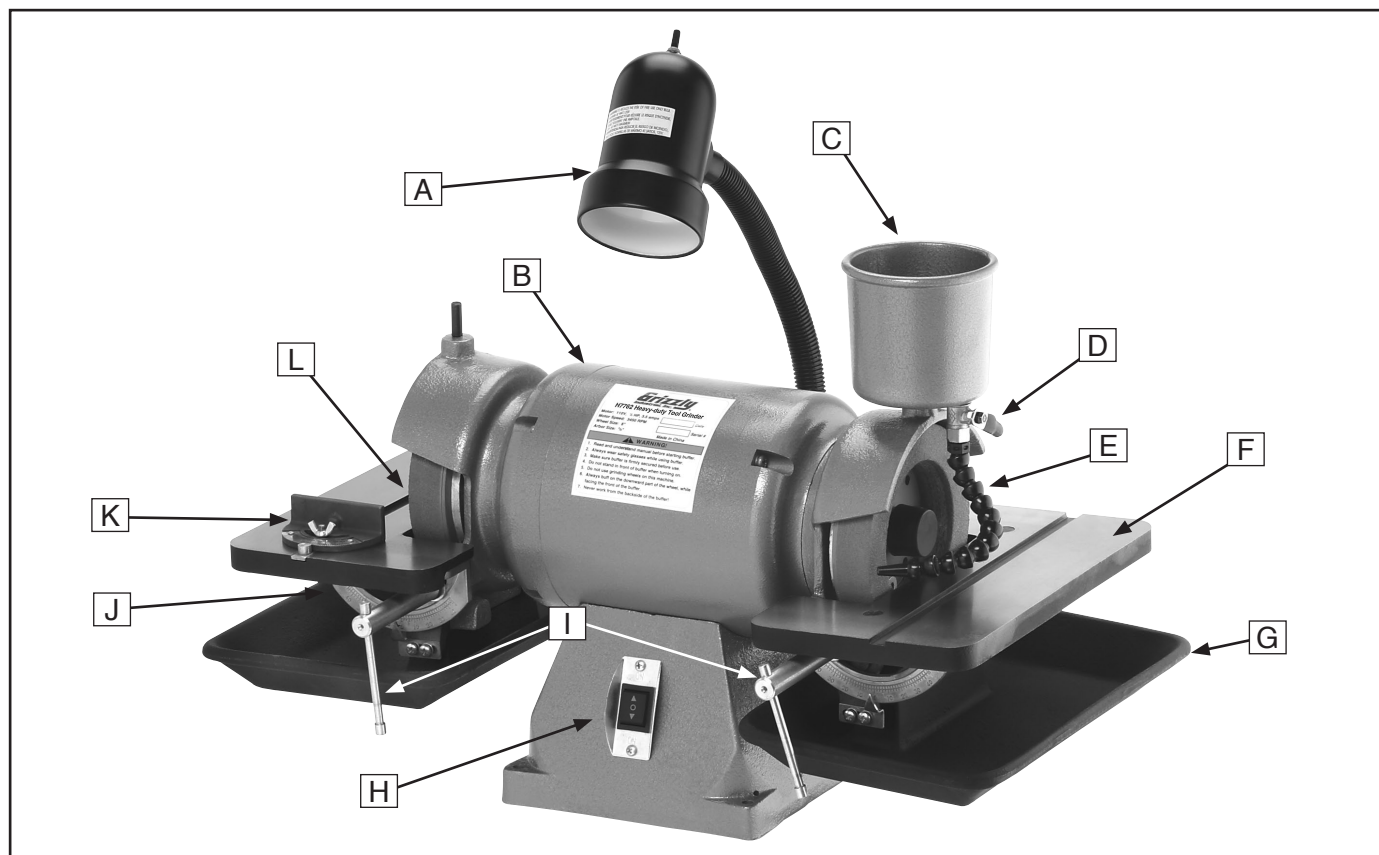


Figure 1. H7762 Identification.

SECTION 1: SAFETY


WARNING

Additional Safety Instructions For Grinders

- 1. EYE PROTECTION.** Grinding causes small particles to become airborne at a high rate of speed, which can cause serious eye damage. ALWAYS wear safety glasses when using this machine.
- 2. MOUNTING TO BENCH/STAND.** An unsecured grinder may become dangerously out of control during operation. Make sure grinder is FIRMLY secured to a bench/stand before use.
- 3. WHEEL SPEED RATING.** Wheels operated at a faster speed than rated for may break or fly apart. Before mounting a new wheel, be sure the wheel RPM rating is equal or higher than the speed of the grinder.
- 4. WHEEL INSPECTION.** Always visually inspect grinding wheels before use for cracks, chips, fractures or other damage. NEVER use a damaged wheel, and replace any potentially damaged wheels immediately.
- 5. STARTING GRINDER.** If a wheel IS damaged, it will usually fly apart shortly after start-up. To protect yourself, always stand to the side of the grinder when turning it **ON** and allow it to gain full speed before standing in front of it.
- 6. LUNG PROTECTION.** Grinding produces hazardous dust, which may cause long-term respiratory problems if breathed. Always wear a NIOSH approved dust mask or respirator when grinding.
- 7. WHEEL DIRECTION.** Only grind on the downward side of the wheel. DO NOT grind on the part of the wheel moving away from the work table. NEVER grind on the top part of the wheel.
- 8. SIDE GRINDING.** Grinding on the side of some wheels can cause them to break and fly apart. Always check the wheel specifications before attempting side grinding operations.
- 9. HAND/WHEEL CONTACT.** Grinding wheels have the capability of removing a lot of skin fast. Keep a firm grip on the workpiece and position your hands a safe distance away when grinding. Avoid wearing gloves as they may get caught in the grinding wheel and cause serious entanglement injuries.
- 10. TABLE POSITION.** If the table is too far away from the wheel, the workpiece may be pulled down, causing loss of control and pulling your hand into the grinding wheel. Keep the table within 1/8" of the wheel when operating.

WARNING

Like all machinery there is potential danger when operating this machine. Accidents are frequently caused by lack of familiarity or failure to pay attention. Use this machine with respect and caution to lessen the possibility of operator injury. If normal safety precautions are overlooked or ignored, serious personal injury may occur.

SECTION 2: CIRCUIT REQUIREMENTS

110V Operation

!WARNING

Serious personal injury could occur if you connect the machine to the power source before you have completed the set up process. **DO NOT** connect the machine to the power source until instructed to do so.

Electrocution or fire could result if this machine is not grounded correctly or if your electrical configuration does not comply with local and state codes. Ensure compliance by checking with a qualified electrician!

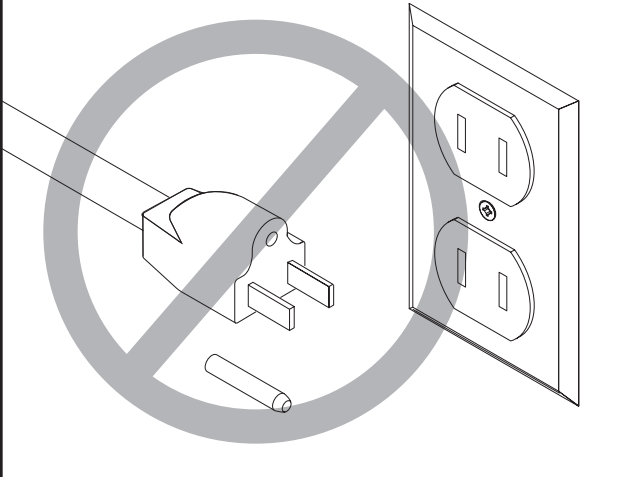
Circuit Recommendations

We recommend connecting this machine to a dedicated circuit with a verified ground, using the circuit breaker size given below. Never replace a circuit breaker with one of higher amperage without consulting a qualified electrician to ensure compliance with wiring codes. **If you are unsure about the wiring codes in your area or you plan to connect your machine to a shared circuit, you may create a fire hazard—consult a qualified electrician to reduce this risk.**

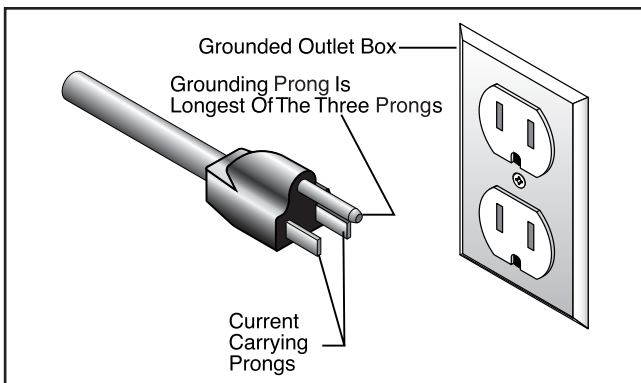


Figure 2. Typical type 5-15 plug and receptacle.

Extension Cords

We do not recommend the use of extension cords. If you find it absolutely necessary:

- Use at least a 16 gauge cord that does not exceed 50 feet in length!
- The extension cord must also contain a ground wire and plug pin.
- A qualified electrician **MUST** size cords over 50 feet long to prevent motor damage.

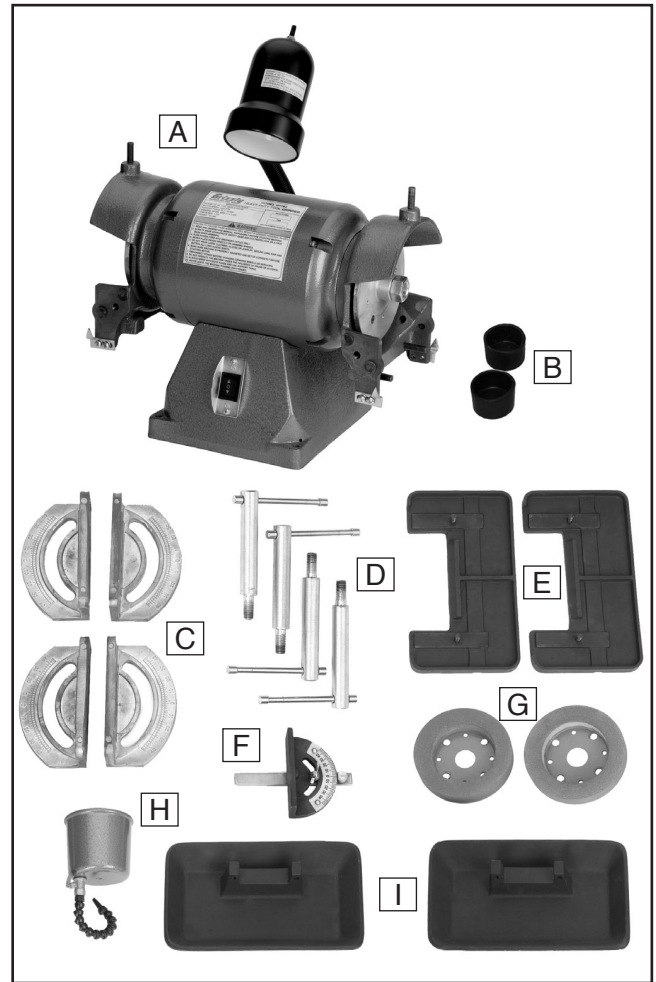














Figure 3. H7762 Inventory.

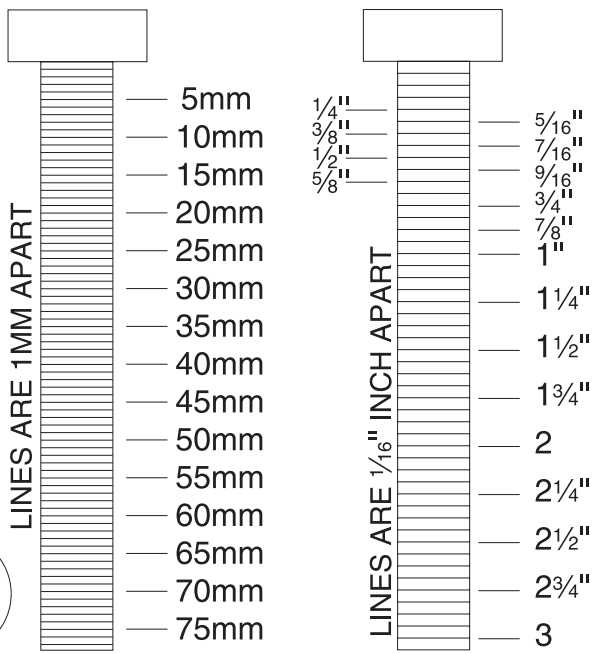
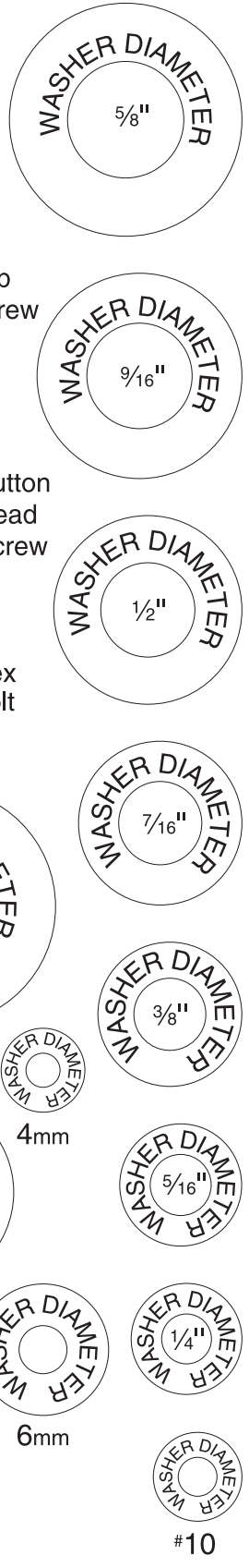
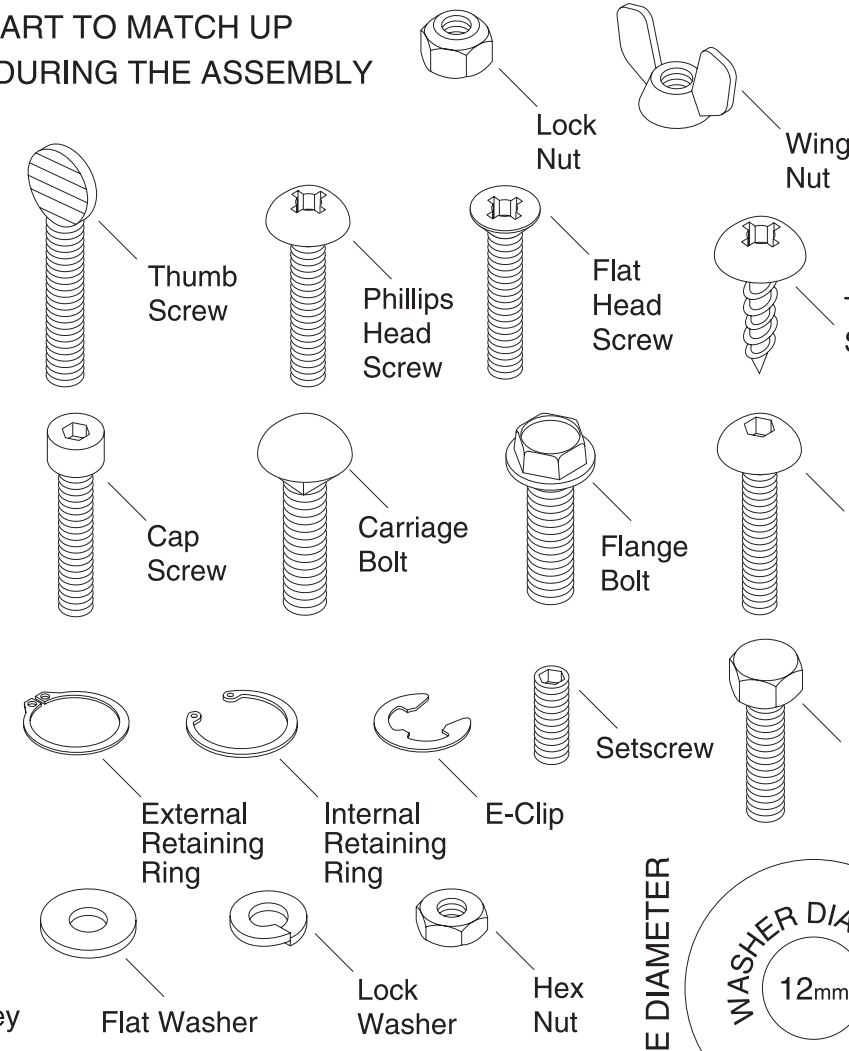

Clean Up

The unpainted surfaces are coated with a waxy oil to protect them from corrosion during shipment. Remove this protective coating with a solvent cleaner or citrus-based degreaser such as Grizzly's G7895 Degreaser. To clean thoroughly, some parts may need to be removed. **For optimum performance from your machine, make sure you clean all moving parts or sliding contact surfaces that are coated.** Avoid chlorine-based solvents, such as acetone or brake parts cleaner, as they may damage painted surfaces should they come in contact. Always follow the manufacturer's instructions when using any type of cleaning product.

	<p>⚠ WARNING Gasoline and petroleum products have low flash points and could cause an explosion or fire if used to clean machinery. DO NOT use gasoline or petroleum products to clean the machinery.</p>

Site Considerations

Workbench Load

Refer to the **Machine Data Sheet** for the weight and footprint specifications of your machine. Some workbenches may require additional reinforcement to support the machine.

Working Clearances

Working clearances can be thought of as the distances between machines and obstacles that allow safe operation of every machine without limitation. Consider existing and anticipated machine needs, size of material to be processed through each machine, and space for auxiliary stands or work tables. Also consider the relative position of each machine to one another for efficient material handling.

Lighting and Outlets

Lighting should be bright enough to eliminate shadow and prevent eye strain. Electrical circuits should be dedicated or large enough to handle the amperage draw. Outlets should be located near each machine so power or extension cords are clear of high-traffic areas. Observe local electrical codes for proper installation of new lighting, outlets, or circuits.

	<p>⚠ CAUTION Unsupervised children and visitors inside your shop could cause serious personal injury to themselves. Lock all entrances to the shop when you are away and DO NOT allow unsupervised children or visitors in your shop at any time!</p>

Mounting

The Model H7762 weighs 92.5 lbs. Make sure the workbench on which you plan to mount the grinder is sturdy enough to hold the weight of the machine and any downward pressure that may be applied during operation. The workbench should have a level surface and be heavy, or attached to the floor so that it will not move or vibrate during operation.

Components and Hardware Required	Qty

Note: *Because sizes vary for each individual situation, the hardware in this step is not included with the Model H7762.*

Mount the grinder as shown below:

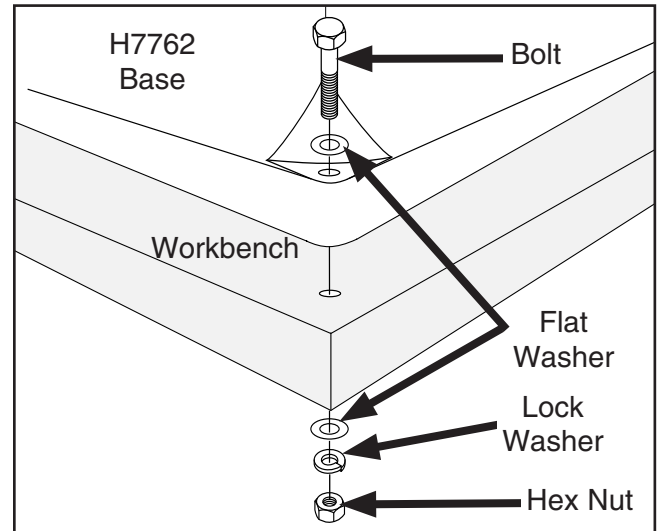


Figure 4. Mounting machine to the workbench.

Grinding Wheels

The Model H7762 features two Type 50 plate-mounted grinding wheels that must be attached to the grinder body before any operation of the machine.

Components and Hardware Required	Qty
Grinder Unit.....	1
Type 50 Plate-Mounted Grinding Wheels.....	2
Hex Bolts M6-1 x 25.....	8

To install the grinding wheels:

1. Remove the rubber shaft end bushing from the end of the arbor.
2. Carefully slide the grinding wheel onto the arbor. Be sure not to bump or scratch the wheel as it may dent, crack or otherwise damage the wheel.
3. Align the large holes in the grinding wheel with the large screw holes in the connection plate of the grinder.

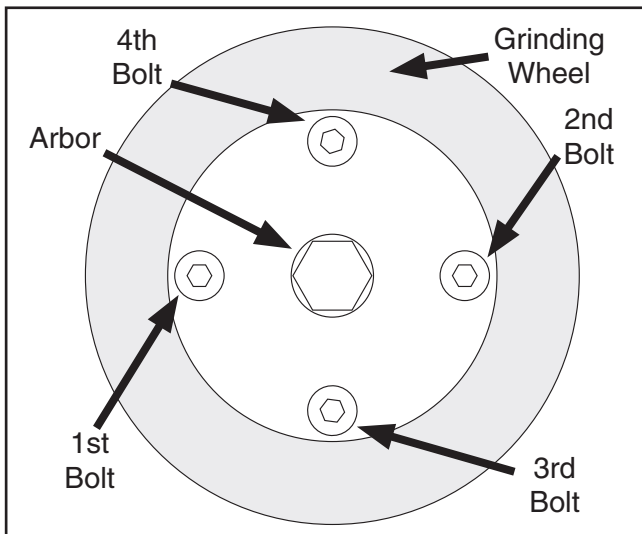


Figure 5. Wheel bolt mounting order.

4. Tightly fasten the wheel to the connector plate using the four hex bolts. In order to properly balance the wheel, tighten the bolts in the order shown in **Figure 5**.

5. Push the rubber shaft end bushing back onto the end of the arbor.
6. Repeat **Steps 1-6** for the second grinding wheel.

Work Tables

The Model H7762 also features two work tables that must be installed before any work can commence.

Components and Hardware Required	Qty
Grinder Unit.....	1
Work Table Angle Gauges.....	4
Lock Handles M10-1.25 x 23.....	4
Flat Washers 10mm.....	4
Lock Washers 10mm.....	4
Work Tables.....	2
Flat Washers 8mm.....	4
Hex Nuts M8-1.25.....	4

To install the work tables:

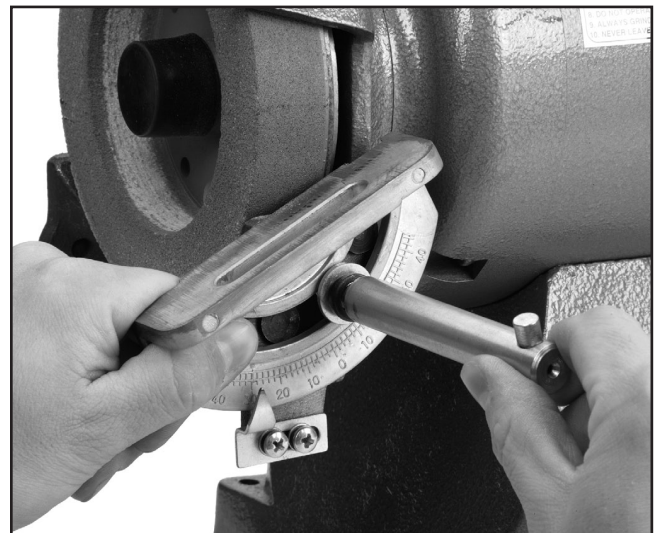


Figure 6. Attaching angle gauge.

1. Attach an angle gauges to the grinder body with a 10mm washer, 10mm lock washer and lock handle as shown in **Figure 6**.

2. Align the angle gauge so that the pointer at the bottom of the gauge is pointing at 0°.
3. Tighten the lock handle further so that the angle gauge does not move.
4. Repeat **Steps 1-3** for the other three angle gauges.
5. Place a work table on a pair of angle gauges so that the bolts on the underside of the table fit through the slots in the angle gauges.

6. Align the work table so the gap between the table and the grinding wheel is approximately $\frac{1}{8}$ ".

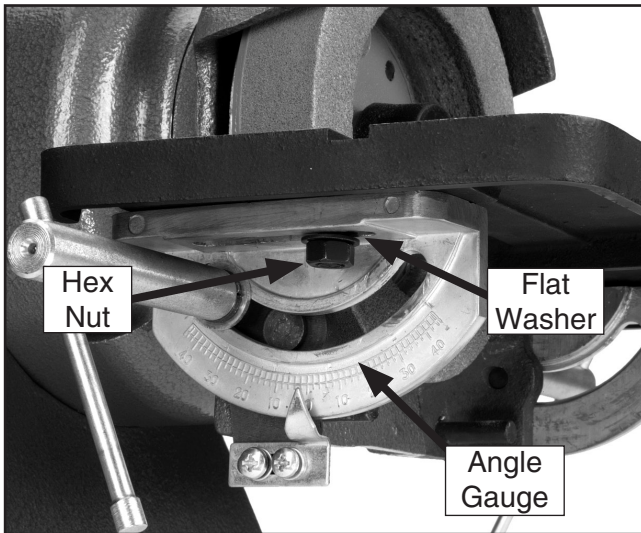
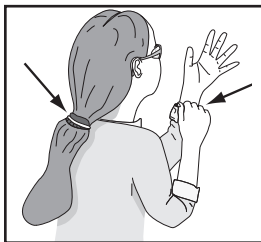


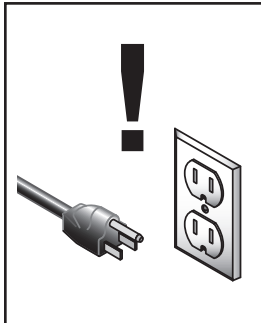
Figure 7. Work table attachment.

7. Fasten the table to the support dials using an 8mm flat washer and a hex nut on each bolt, as shown in **Figure 7**.

Note: *The fastening process can affect the gap between the work table and the grinding wheel. Always recheck the gap width after fastening and adjust as necessary.*

8. Repeat **Steps 5-7** for the other work table.

SECTION 4: OPERATION



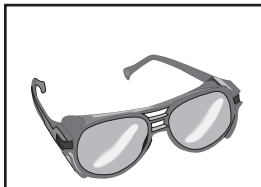
!WARNING

Keep loose clothing rolled up and out of the way of machinery and keep hair pulled back.



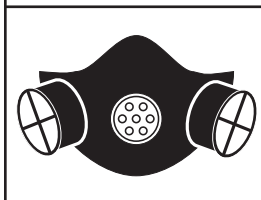
!WARNING

Disconnect power from the machine when performing any maintenance, assembly or adjustments. Failure to do this may result in serious personal injury.



!WARNING

Using this machine produces dust which may cause eye injuries or respiratory problems. Protect yourself by wearing safety glasses and a respirator during the entire operation process. **DO NOT** wear gloves while operating this machine as they can be caught in the rotating surfaces and become entangled. Failure to comply with this warning may result in serious personal injury.



!WARNING

All grinding wheels have the potential of breaking apart during operation, causing serious personal injury or death! Always stand to the side of the grinder when turning it **ON** and wear the proper safety equipment to protect yourself.

Test Run

Once mounting and adjustments are complete as described in the previous section, you are ready to test the machine.

This grinder has a two-way switch. When switched to the "up" position (the top arrow on the switch), the grinder wheels will rotate upward and away from the front of the machine. When switched to the "down" position (the bottom arrow on the switch), the grinder wheels will rotate downward and towards the front of the machine. Both positions are considered the **ON** position. The central switch position (the circle on the switch) is the **OFF** position.

To test run the grinder:

1. Plug the machine into the power source.
2. Stand to the side of the grinder wheel and turn the grinder **ON**.

The machine should run smoothly with little or no vibration or rubbing noises. Strange or unusual noises should be investigated and corrected before operating the machine further. If the machine seems okay, stay out of the line of rotation of either grinding wheel and let it run for one to two minutes to make sure both wheels are structurally sound.

If you cannot easily locate the source of an unusual noise or vibration, feel free to contact our Technical Support department for help.

NOTICE

This section provides only a basic description of grinder applications. There are many different grinding wheels available for your grinder. **WE STRONGLY RECOMMEND** that you read books, trade magazines, or get formal training to maximize the potential of your machine.



Grinding Tips

The grinder is a safe tool when used properly. In addition to the safety instructions in this manual, the most important safety consideration is to use common sense at all times. What may be okay in one situation, may not be safe in another.

Read and understand the following statements to protect yourself before grinding:

- Make sure all guards are in place.
- Stand to the side of the grinder when you turn it **ON** and allow it to run for one full minute before beginning any grinding procedure.
- Make sure there are no loose mounting bolts and that you have performed the “Test Run” instructions in this manual.
- Remember that grinding often produces sparks. **DO NOT** allow anyone to stand in the path of the sparks. **DO NOT** grind near potentially flammable materials, such as flammable liquids or gases, paper or cloth.
- Wear the proper protective clothing. Remember that particles flying off of a grinding wheel will be traveling very fast—prepare for this. Wear a face shield, a dust mask and a leather apron.
- **DO NOT** lean into the workpiece in a manner that may cause your hands to move into the spinning wheel if the workpiece slips off.
- Concentrate on the task at hand. **STOP** grinding if there are distractions.

!WARNING

After you have switched OFF the grinder, DO NOT continue grinding and DO NOT manually stop the grinding wheel with your workpiece!

Operating Grinder

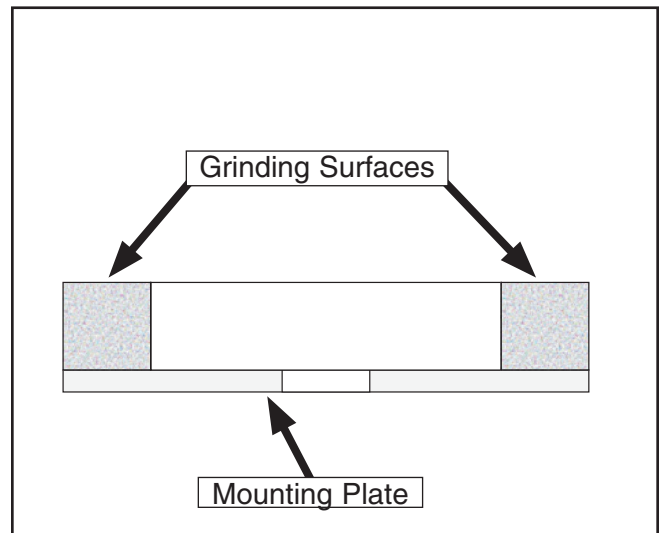


Figure 8. Type 50 grinding wheel surfaces.

The grinder is designed for use with ferrous metals only. Grinding non-ferrous metals and wood products will quickly load the grinding wheel surface with particulate matter and ruin its abrasive qualities. It can also cause the wheel to overheat and possibly explode. Always grind on the surfaces shown in **Figure 8**.

To grind with the grinding wheel:

1. Fill the water cup $\frac{3}{4}$ full with water.
2. With the machine plugged into power, stand to the side of the grinding wheel, and turn the grinder **ON**.
3. Allow the machine to run for one full minute to ensure that the grinding wheels are safe for use, then move to the front of the machine.
4. Grasp the workpiece tightly and properly support it on the work table.
5. Place the workpiece against the surface of the wheel with moderate pressure, moving it back and forth in a steady, even motion.

Note: Using too much pressure will slow the motor, may damage the wheel, and will overheat the workpiece. Using too little pressure will prevent sufficient contact with the wheel.



6. Depending on the type of metal, you may need to regularly dip the workpiece into the water cup to cool it off. For heat-intensive work, direct a stream of water onto the workpiece and grinding wheel with the flexible water pipe. The flow of water can be increased or decreased using the red valve just below the water cup. If the water supply is exhausted, stop grinding and refill the water cup.

Wheel Care

A large part of your safety while grinding depends on the condition of the grinding wheel. A wheel in poor condition may break apart during rotation, causing serious injury.

To properly care for your wheel, follow these tips:

- Always transport, store and handle wheels with care. Wheels may be damaged if dropped or if heavy objects are stacked on them.
- Select the right grinding wheel for both the job and the machine. **DO NOT** grind material that is not designed for the wheel. A machine that rotates at a higher RPM than the wheel is rated for may cause the wheel to fly apart.
- Mount the wheels properly. (See the "Replacing Wheels" instructions on **Page 19** for guidance.) Never use a wheel with the wrong arbor size for the grinder.
- **DO NOT** abuse the wheel by jamming the workpiece into the grinding wheel with excessive force. This can cause irreparable damage to the wheel.
- Learn how to use the grinder and the grinding wheels properly. Ask a trusted person with experience or consult with your local library to learn more.
- Dress the grinding wheel when the surface loses its abrasive quality or becomes unbalanced.

Wheel Dressing

Dressing restores the grinding wheel with a like-new abrasive quality. Whenever the front surface of the wheel loses its abrasive qualities or balance due to particle loading or polishing of the wheel surface, then the wheel should be dressed. Use a commercially-available dressing tool, such as those available on **Page 21**.

To dress the grinding wheel:

1. With the machine plugged into power, stand to the side of the grinding wheel and move the switch to the **ON** position.
2. Allow the machine to run for at least one full minute to make sure that the grinding wheel is safe to use, then move to the front of the machine.
3. Hold the dressing tool firmly on the tool rest with both hands and press it lightly against the front surface of the grinding wheel.
4. Move the dressing tool in a side-to-side motion, while keeping it even with the surface of the grinding wheel.
5. Regularly pull the dressing tool away from the wheel for visual inspection and repeat **Steps 3 & 4** until the surface of the wheel appears to be restored to its normal color and balance.



Wheel Selection

The Model H7762 only accepts Type 50 wheels with a 1¼" bore.

Aluminum oxide and silicon carbide wheels are marked in a somewhat uniform manner by all major manufacturers. Understanding these markings will help you understand the capabilities of various wheels. Always refer to the manufacturer's grinding recommendations when selecting a wheel for your project.

The basic format for wheel numbering is:

Prefix	Abrasive Type	Grit Size	Grade Type	Bond Type
Type 1	A	60	L	V

The *Prefix* is the manufacturer's designation for a particular type.

The most common *Abrasive Types* used are A for Aluminum Oxide and C for Silicon Carbide, and occasionally SG for Seeded Gel.

The *Grit Size* is a number that refers to the size of the abrasive grain in the wheel. The lower the number, the coarser the wheel. Grit sizes range from 10, which is a very coarse grit used for roughing, to 220, which is usually the upper range for fine finish work.

Grade is an indication of the hardness of the wheel—"A" being the softest and "Z" being the hardest.

Bond Type refers to the type of bonding material used to hold the abrasive material. Most general purpose wheels will have a "V" indicating Vitrified Clay is used. Vitrified Clay provides high strength and good porosity. The other common bond type is "B" for resin where synthetic resins are used. These are used to grind cemented carbide and ceramic materials.

There may be other numbers inserted that have meaning for a particular type of wheel. Refer to the manufacturer's technical data for a complete explanation.

Wheel Inspection

Before mounting a new grinding wheel, it must be inspected. DO NOT assume that a wheel is in sound condition just because it is new—often, damage can occur during shipping, with age, or with exposure to moisture.

The most effective way to check for damage is to give the wheel a **Visual Inspection**. Look for any cracks, chips, nicks, or dents in the surface of the wheel. If you see any of these, however minor, DO NOT use the wheel. Ideally a new grinding wheel will be in almost flawless condition.

Replacing Wheels

WARNING

The hazards of using a damaged wheel include flying chunks of sharp abrasive material that could cause serious injury or death. Inspect every grinding wheel before it is mounted and DO NOT use a damaged grinding wheel!

The wheel guard assembly must be removed in order to mount or dismount a grinding wheel.

To remove/mount a wheel:

1. DISCONNECT MACHINE FROM THE POWER SUPPLY!
2. Remove the work table by unscrewing the two hex nuts on the underside of the table.
3. Unscrew the four bolts that fasten the grinding wheel to the connector plate.
4. Carefully slide the grinding wheel free from the arbor.

5. Slide the new grinding wheel onto the arbor. Be sure not to bump or scratch the wheel as it may dent, crack or otherwise damage the wheel.
6. Align the large holes in the grinding wheel with the screw holes in the connection plate of the grinder.

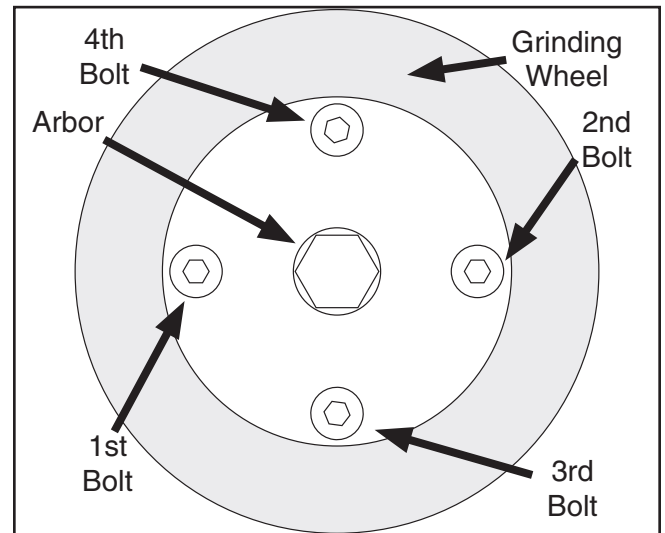


Figure 9. Wheel bolt mounting order.

7. Fasten the wheel to the connector plate with the four bolts. In order to properly balance the wheel, tighten the bolts in the order shown in **Figure 9**.
8. Run a new wheel for at least one minute while standing clear of the line of rotation. If a wheel does have defects it will generally fail as soon as it gets up to full speed.

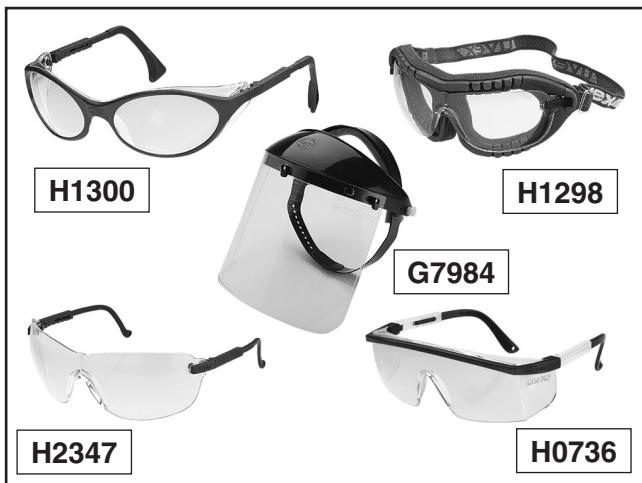


Figure 10. Our most popular safety glasses.

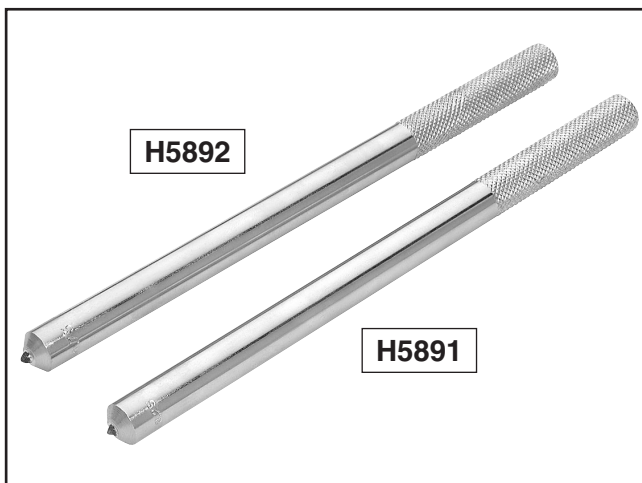


Figure 11. Our range of Diamond Dressers.

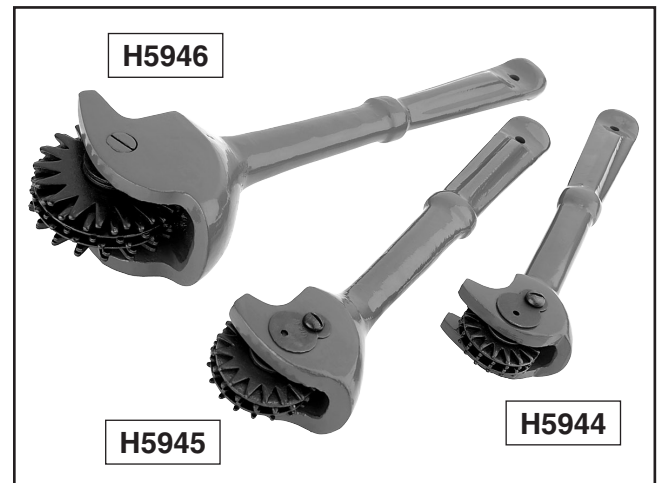
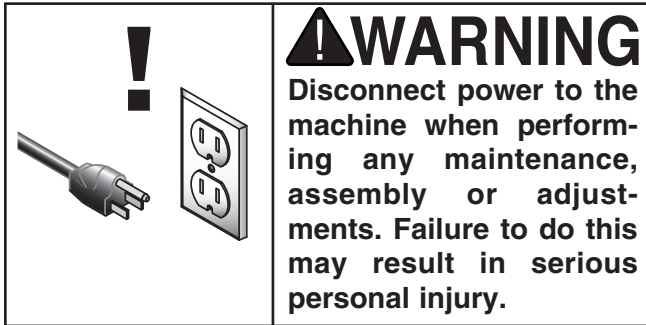


Figure 12. Our range of Wheel Dressers.

SECTION 6: MAINTENANCE



General

Always be aware of the condition of your machine. Routinely check the condition of the following items and repair or replace as necessary:

- Damaged or loose grinding wheels.
- Loose mounting bolts.
- Worn switch.
- Worn or damaged cord.
- Worn or damaged support bearings.
- Any other condition that could hamper the safe operation of this machine.

Lubrication

Sealed and pre-lubricated ball bearings require no lubrication for the life of the bearings. All bearings are standard sizes, and replacements can be purchased from our Parts Department or a bearing supply store.

Grinding Wheels

The grinding wheel should be visually inspected before every use. Take care in storing grinding wheels to keep them free from potential damage due to being dropped or having other items dropped on them. Store all grinding wheels in a dry location. Type 50 grinding wheels should be stored vertically with cushioning material between each wheel.

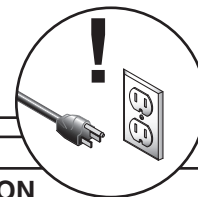
If a grinding wheel diameter has been reduced to 5", the wheel must be replaced. Operating a wheel at anything less than this diameter can lead to wheel explosion and serious personal injury.

Grinding wheels will require periodic dressing. Refer to the "Wheel Dressing" instructions on **Page 19** for details on how this is done.

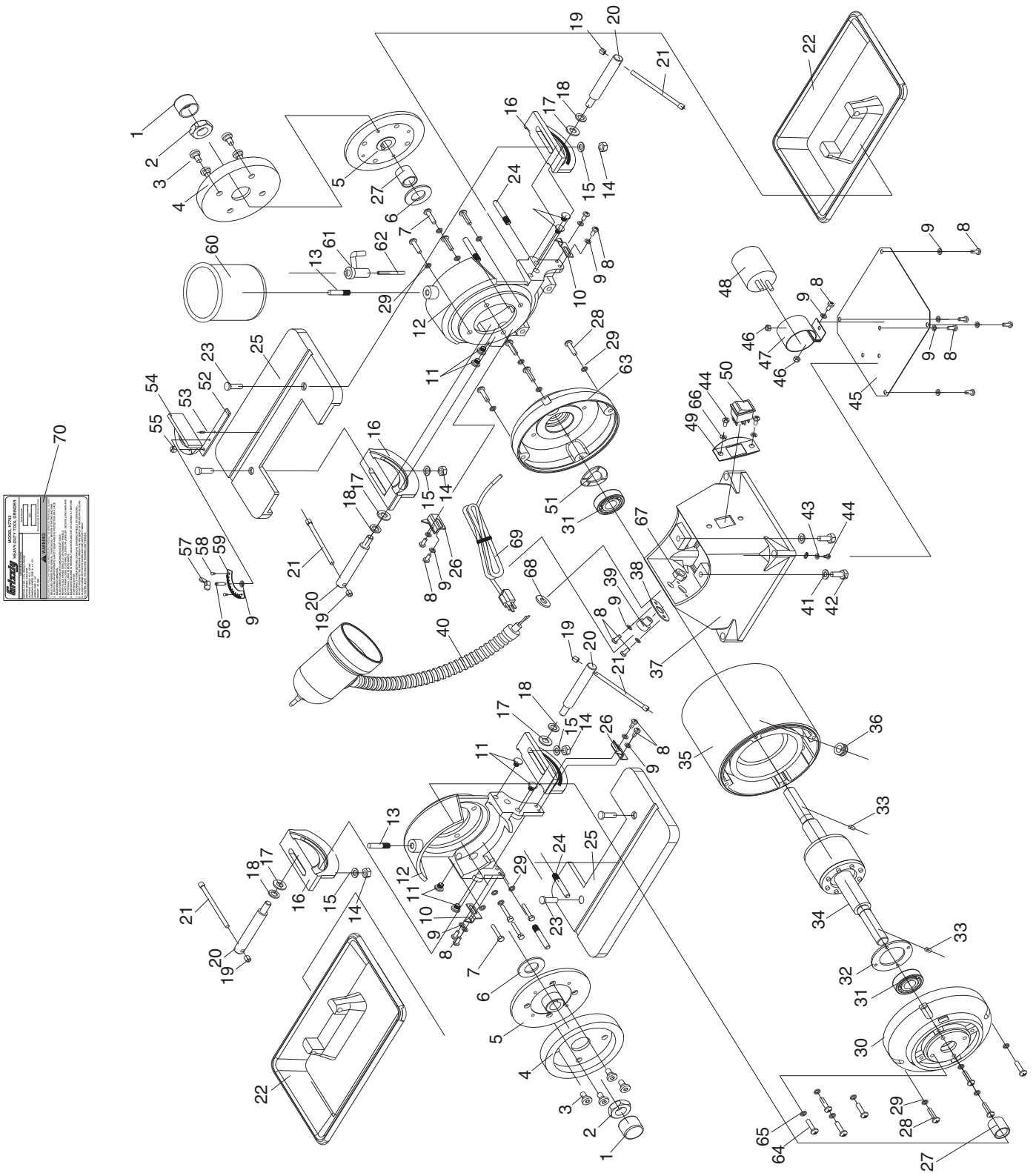
